

McGREGOR'S

LANDING

Where New Wharf Should Be Built.

The question of abandoning the wharf at Maalaca Bay and building a new wharf at McGregor's Landing is under consideration, and there is no doubt but McGregor's Landing is for many reasons far preferable to Manlaca Bay as a landing point for pessengers and freight. Wailukans who do not stop to consider, naturally feel a bias in favor of Maalaea Bay simply because it is nearer to Waiyzed, it is found that in actual point of time consumed McGregor's Landing is nearer to Wailuku than Maalaca Bay. 
