Education Center Website Update: January 2014

During 2013, work continued on the website. About 400 new photographs were borrowed from 100th families to add to the collection, with another 200+ scanned and needing more preparation before they are uploaded to the website. This will bring the total of photographs (taken by the veterans during World War II) to more than 2000.

Many of the new photos have included images of veterans that to date had not appeared in other collections. If the person is identified, their name appears in a caption. This allows anyone searching the website for a specific person to find the photo. Sometimes we have gotten just one photo, so I will find a story that it can be added to. This happened with a photo of Jesse Oba that one of his nieces loaned. It was inserted into the story about the Hawaiian and hapa soldiers in the battalion.

In 2013, we got some very exciting examples of the reach of the 100th website. After seeing it, Pamela Varma Brown, the author of "Kauai Stories: Life on the Garden Island told by Kauai's People," contacted the Club Office and kindly allowed the posting of her story about Mr. Kazuma Nishiie that appeared in her book. The office received an e-mail from Damiano Parravano, a scholar who works for the Gustav Line Association based in Cassino, Italy. This group is trying to preserve the history of the men who fought in Italy during World War II and has been excavating the battlegrounds in the area and creating a small museum in Cassino. He found the information on the website very valuable to their efforts. Since we had extra copies of the important books about the 100th, they were mailed to him for their museum.

David Moreton, a Canadian scholar researching temples in Japan, also contacted the office after seeing our website. He had visited a temple in Kyoto that had a memorial stone to the 100th and other artifacts and sent photos of them. It was so interesting to find out that the temple was visited in 1962 by a large group of veterans and their wives. In December, the office received a message from a man who worked for the American Immigration Center. He had discovered our website and wrote "all the information we compiled quite extraordinary." He sent us a link to a timeline of Asian immigration to the United States on their website that he thought would be a useful addition to ours.

Ted Tsukiyama gave the Club a copy of an interview he and Sakae Takahashi conducted of James Lovell in 1964. That has been scanned and added.

Last year about \$15,000 was spent on adding more material to the website, regular system maintenance, and doing some system upgrades.

We have several items in the pipeline at the start of this year. They include two photo albums, one with terrific photos of a 299th Infantry unit of the Hawaii National Guard. There are two memoirs and letters to be transcribed.

If you know families that have photo albums and documents, please contact the office. Let's keep adding to the rich historical record of the 100th and the Japanese community! Your continuing support is very much appreciated.



100th Infantry Battalion Memorial Scholarship

Each year the 100th Infantry Battalion Veterans organization awards up to three college scholarships to direct descendants of a 100th Infantry Battalion World War II veteran or soldier who was killed in action. Applications and specific instructions on applying for the scholarship are available on the website for the Hawaii Community Foundation (www.hawaiicommunityfoundation.org/scholarships).

The deadline for applying for the scholarship is generally in February of each year with the exact date to be posted on the website.

The wooden mallets had to be cleaned and sanded so they would be free of splinters before being used. It was a huge undertaking for the Kawashimas and we really appreciate their willingness to do this. Everyone from veterans to grandchildren stood in line to take their turn in using the wooden mallet to pound the mochi. Veterans swinging the mallet included Don Matsuda, Sonsei Nakamura, Jack Nakamura, Charlie Tanaka, Masaharu Saito, Robert Sato, Denis Teraoka, Tom Tsubota and Ray Nosaka. Twenty five pounds of rice was pounded which made about 500 balls of mochi. It is so wonderful to sink your teeth into a warm freshly pounded mochi. That smooth chewy texture is unforgettable! It's hard to enjoy store bought mochi after that. Everyone got to eat mochi with azuki inside and mochi rolled in kinako. Plain mochi was also served in the Ozoni soup. Entertainment included The Small World Harmonica Band and Alan Miyamura, who played the bagpipes. Many of you know him because he plays at our annual Joint Memorial Service at Punchbowl. Bon Dancing was led by Eliott Peters (grandson of Kazuo Okada, B). I would like to thank the following individuals who helped to make the Shinnen Enkai successful: Jayne Hirata-Epstein & Family, Beverly and Michele Shiroma, Milton Tanaka, Arlene Sato, and Ann Kabasawa.
