# 12 trade mission participants in governor's tab

Governor Lorenzo I. DL. Guerrero will be paying for the travel expenses of at least 12 persons, including himself, during the planned CNMI Trade and Investment Promotion Mission to Taiwan and the Republic of Korea slated April 4 to 16.

In a letter to Senate President Joseph S. Inos and Senate Fiscal Affairs Committee Chairman Paul A. Manglona, Guerrero detailed the delegations expenditures for the twelve-day mission that was meant to promote the CNMI to the two nations as a worthy investment destination.

The mission was organized as per the directive of the governor in to tap probable investors in the two Asian nations into bringing in more capital for business ventures, preferably in partnership with local businessmen.

Th group, which is scheduled to leave 11:50 a.m. on April 4, hopes to promote the CNMI as a viable investment destination in an effort to diversify an economy that is heavily reliant on a fickle

tourism industry and a"tarnished" garments industry.

According to the budget breakdown submitted, the governor would be paying for the airfares, meals, and hotel accommodations of twelve members of the governor's entourage, including two members from the Senate, three from the House of Representatives, five members of the Governor's Council of Economic Advisors, and one mayor. All will be traveling under the CNMI Government Travel Authorization in adherence to all establishe **CNMITravel Regulations and per** diem rates.

The governor was reported to have been asking the legislature a total of \$105,000 to cover the expenses that would be incurred by the CNMI team, to be included in the fiscal year 1992 budget currently being considered in the Commonwealth's lawmaking body.

Budget explanations indicate

that a total of \$17,040 is appropriated for the airfares of the twelve people, with about \$34,150 being budgeted for hotel accommodations in Taipei, Kaohsiumg, and Taichung in Taiwan; and in Seoul and Pusan in the Republic of Korea.

# Demapan suit not in court's jurisdiction — Inos

The lawsuit filed by Saipan Senator Juan S. Demapan was seen as an exercise in futility in that the case delves into a political

that there is nothing wrong with the way the standing committees are composed since it is the prerogative of the leadership to appoint members and officers of the committees.

'I am not aware of any precedent that the court delved into legislative rules in order to determine whether an official is able to effect " equal representation" to his or her constituents. I would predict that the trial court would be loathe to get involved in the inner workings of the Senate rules," said Inos. He foresees that if he answers the complaint to the effect that the senate rules were followed in his actions, the court may adopt a position that there is no "justiciability," in that the issue is of a "political question."

**Palau politician** denies presidential assassination role

Serving CNMI for 20 Years

KOROR, Palau (AP) - John O. Ngiraked says he didn't mastermind the murder of Palau's first president nearly seven years ago. He says he is the victim of a political conspiracy.

The 59-year-old prominent political figure says Patrick Ramarii, his first cousin, was offered \$100,000 to say that he (Ngiraked) plotted the death of Haruo Remeliik.

"If Patrick sticks to his story and he serves as the government's witness against me, he will be paid \$100,000 in cash by a (Palau) politician who I won't name," Ngiraked said Wednesday night from a hospital bed.

Ngiraked said he underwent prostate surgery Tuesday.

Ngiraked said he and Remeliik were political rivals in 1984 when he called for Remeliik to resign.

At the time of the June 30, 1985, shooting, Remeliik was the first head of a Pacific government to be assassinated. Palau is a U.N. trust territory about 4,500 miles southwest of Hawaii and 600 miles east of the Philippines. The archipelago now has about 15,000 residents and is a world renown underwater dive area. Ngiraked said Ramarif, about 30, became "wild when he was told that I stopped an attorney from paying his \$100,000 bail after the attorney had indicated it would be paid. He threatened to kill me." Ramarii was in Palau's prison charged with attempting to kill his wife last Dec. 7. Eight charges filed against

him carried potential prison sentences of nearly 85 years.

Ramarii, who confessed to prosecutors to being the shooter in the assassination, implicated Ngiraked, his wife, Emerita Kerradel, Sulial Heinrick and Heinrick Ngewakl, who is dead.

Sulial Heinrick, about 28, has not pleaded guilty to any role in Remeliik's death. He is in prison after being convicted of killing Ngewakl, his stepfather.

In a plea bargain, prosecutors agreed to a 15-year sentence on the Remeliik murder charge and 10 years for aggravated assault, both to be served concurrently.

Ngiraked and his wife, charged with first-degree murder, are free each on \$25,000 cash bail posted by their relatives.

Ngiraked and Kerradel are under house arrest from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. for their own protection. The couple asked to spend nights in the prison's juvenile section.

Kerradel, 40, has four children. She owns three small businesses in Palau. Ngiraked was in an upbeat mood, frequently laughing and gesturing as he willingly talked to an American reporter. Tubes protruded from his body as he lay on his side in a hospital room marked "intensive care unit." In discussing the alleged political conspiracy, Ngiraked said "Patrick was toying around with some rich politicians who are my rivals. I think this group is trying to shine the light intentionally on me and my family. By doing so, they will be whitewashed" of the Remeliik death. Responding to a reporter's question, Ngiraked said on the night Remeliik was slain, he continued on page 30

The first cause of action alleges that Saipan senators are inadequately represented on certain Senate committees, thus, violating the "equal\*representation" clause of Section 203 (c) of the Covenant.


Demapan was also charging that the Senate President, in allocating the operational funds for the last three quarters of fiscal year 1992 for each individual senators, Newspaper Pac

Plaintiff Demapan alleges that the committee composition in the Senate deprives Saipan of being equally represented in the Senate.

It was observed that in the Committee on Rules and Procedures, and in the Committee on Executive Appointments and Governmental Investigation, there is only one member from Saipan, while Tinian and Rota have three and two, respectively.

The CNMI faces a serious economic dilemma:

# EDITORIAL. Projecting the right image

Tomorrow morning, the governor, along with an optimistic team of government officials, and businessmen leaves for an important mission ---to seek opportunities for more foreign investment to strengthen a brittle economy like the CNMI.

The intention of the trade mission is noble. The timing is superb. And of course, money is badly needed because, as the governor himself said in his State of the Commonwealth address, the economy is on an apparent slowdown necessitating that efforts to diversify be doubled.

It is not hard to imagine that the governor, or any other government official meaning well for the people, for that matter, would be feeling a bit concerned on the disastrous effects of a slump in the economy's main engine that is tourism.

The holding of the trade mission is by all means a reasonable gambit, to take the so-called "economic eggs" out of the tourism basket, so that should anything go wrong with the CNMI's "pristine beach economy," there is still a viable fallback position to take as manufacturing, fishing and agriculture to count on.

The organization of the mission is good performance in itself, as one can see a professional group of distinguished individuals being tapped to take the cudgels to flash a good image for the Commonwealth. All for the sake of effecting a healthy influx of foreign capital into the economic mainstream of society.

True, there is still a wide horizon ahead for the CNMI, in terms of probable areas of viable investment ventures.

The Commonwealth still has a long way to go in its efforts to achieve a reputation of being able to produce export quality products.

Although Saipan has its own problems with infrastructure, it is heartening to note that we've been heading towards the right direction.

The trade mission is being put up despite the trouble and the difficulties encountered in organizing government departments into one cohesive force ready to address the needs of probable investors.

At the least, efforts should definitely be exerted so that we can clean up the mess here before we can promote the CNMI to the outside world.

Before investors are encouraged to come here there has to be a wellorganized, well-meaning government to speak of. Good government is of essence before a good economic potential and a sound business climate is projected to the outside world.

Talk about proper controls, good fiscal policies, sound financial management, and proper austerity measures when needed.

For the record, we honestly feel that it would have been more appropriate to have a smaller delegation to Taiwan and Korea, if only to show that we have that professional and disciplined approach in handling the affairs of government.

It would be very apt for us to show the Chinese and Koreans that we have everything under control here, that we can cut on unnecessary expenses if we so like, if only to show that the CNMI is a disciplined lot of people who are not prone to abuse whatever resources they have in their hands.

Come to think of it, the delegation could have cut down on the participants, with perhaps one or two to represent the various levels of interests; a legal representative, one or two from the business sector, one or two from the legislature, a couple of economists, one from tourism, and one from labor to explain the different aspects of CNMI business and way of life.

Furthermore, the length of stay should have been reduced to a barer minimum. Two or three days in Taiwan would have been enough for one big show and for a series of meetings with local businessmen.

The object is to be concise, brief, direct to the point, and to eliminate excessive expenditure.

Lastly, the group's staying in luxurious hotels should have been prenpted, because we're going there to show that the CNMI has a conscientious government responsive to people, and not to show them how we can afford to spend money in a lavish manner. After all its the image that counts the most.

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Accommodate additional development which means leasing large parcels of public land to spur revenue generation or, slam the brakes to development so we could keep our land and keep our fingers crossed that taxation and a reduction in force in both the government and private sectors doesn't turn up its ugly face.

This dilemma is further aggravated by the deterioration of U.S. and Japanese economies, coupled by the lack of coherent policies here at home conducive to sound investment climate Marianas-wide. Altogether, it is quite an amalgam of confusion that even the most sturdy voice of reason in our legislative halls find it difficult deciphering which alternative is best for the people they represent.

The controversy becomes even more acute given the apparent inability of the Marianas Public Land Corporation to resolve longstanding land encroachment problems, including the accommodation of the more than two-thousand homestead applicants waiting for lots to build permanent family dwellings.

But it is important to understand that the exercise of opening up homestead areas has taken on a new face. Before the institution of our constitutional government, all we need is establish an area for residential homesteads and applicants are quickly issued their lots.

Today, this process involves meeting DEQ and CRM permitting. In short, it costs about \$10,000 to prepare a single homestead lot to which we pay only \$10.00 in fees. It is now caught in a bureaucratic red tape in that MPLC must meet requirements set forth by federally controlled regulatory agencies. Yes, I can understand your tolerance level being put through a new test of endurance where the net result is frustration!

It is a tedious process and it is about time that both sides of the street (executive and legislative branches) step in to salvage the trust of its people in a system that has frustrated even landowners well into their graves. It is duly unfair that both our people and their future are placed in such a situation where both well meaning investors and the indigenous people are left in the center of a ring to slug it out when in fact such is the fiduciary responsibility of the Marianas Public Land Corporation.

Indeed, the ultimate culprit, it seems, is MPLC. The future economic well-being of both our people and friends from distant shores who wish to partake in building a healthy economy for the CNMI. I say that no amount of rhetoric for or against development will quell the discontentment that is quite prevalent in our local community until these two concerns are resolved with finality.

This is a difficult juncture in our developmental history. It puts to a test those at the helm in what we call leadership. The true mark of leadership is not simply to support what is popular but to make what is unpopular popular, if that serves our future economic interest.

Our leaders must also understand that public opinion responds to threats, not to opportunities. And, mind you, it is easy to mobilize support to meet a clear threat but difficult to rally it to seize a fleeting opportunity. Yes, I am reminded of a famous saying:"In the midst of difficulty lies opportunity." The opportunity is here to build a healthy economic future. I am sure most of you will shy away from being architects in an economic project I call "Building A Fortress of Economic Poverty" for our islands. Thanks.

The much-awaited joint session where both houses of Legislature are expected to give their final approval on three land lease agreements for golf resort development projects was called off by the leadership of the House of Representatives.

House Speaker Thomas P. Villagomez decided to defer the holding of the joint session and sought for an April 7 rescheduling, reportedly due to concerns raised by House minority members, and because of a confusion that arose on some amendments entered on the land lease proposals of the United Micronesia Development Association (for a golf resort hotel in Marpi) and Haas & Haynie (for a golf resort hotel in Obyan Beach).

The third lease proposal was that of Nico Corporation for the planned Emperor Golf and Country Club on the island of Rota.

The postponement of the lease approvals gave rise to rumors that the House is allegedly attempting to add a last-minute rider to go with the approval of the said three land leases being considered. Speculation had it that a fourth



Even as the fate of a golf resort hotel complex in the Obyan Beach area remains uncertain due to delayed legislative approval, another golf course development project was reportedly transmitted to the Legislature for the necessary go signal.

The Pacific Resort Development Inc. was reported to have entered into an agreement with Marianas Public Land Corporation over the lease of about 60 hectares of public land near Obyan Beach for a first-class 18-hole golf course to be designed by an internationally recognized, reputable, and experienced golf course designer.

The agreement has reportedly been submitted to the Legislature March 30, at a time when both the House of Representatives and the Senate are still to give the required legislative nod for the Obyan Beach golf resort development project proposed by the Haas & Haynie.

Among the other things PRDI is proposing is the construction of a clubhouse, a pro shop, snack shop and restaurants, equipment and golf cart maintenance facilities, parking areas, and other facilities and support infrastructure related.

# Fate of three dev't projects up in air House calls aff joint session for land lease approval

Resort Development Inc., was also a factor as to why the joint session is being postponed repeatedly, to give time for an unknown congressman to garner support for the project.

Such a rumor, however, remained unconfirmed.

On the issue of the three earlier leases, a letter from House Minority Leader Mametto U. Maratita indicated that the Eighth Legislature is not yet in a position to fully consider the approval of the said leases because it has not conducted any public hearings yet on the matter.

It was said that only the Seventh Legislature was able to have a hearing on the proposed land leases.

"I wish to point out that the action of the Seventh Legislature is now history, and we members of the current lawmaking body are not a party to the previous legislature," said Maratita in his letter addressed to Villagomez.

Minority members reiterated the concerns aired by Representative Jesus P. Mafnas on homestead applicants that may be affected by the said land leases and indicated that they have not been accorded the "professional courtesy" of being given copies of the proposed land leases, comlease proposal, that of Pacific mittee reports and resolutions.

"Ample time should be given to all members to review all documents, as we cannot in good conscience support the approval when we don't have assurances that land problems on Saipan will be solved," read Maratita's letter.

But according to Speaker Villagomez, the Minority's concern was not all there is to the joint session's postponement.

Apparently, a confusion arose over amendments entered into two of the land leases in question.

Villagomez indicated that the attorney for Marianas Public Land Corporation has mistakenly entered three minor amendments to the UMDA lease that was not contained in the legislative amendments thus requiring a verification from the land management firm whether the lease submitted was the right one sanctioned by the legislative committees.

"So what we had to consider in the joint session was a lease amended by the MPLC submitted just today," said the speaker in an telephone interview last night

The joint session was to have been held yesterday, after it was postponed once before, and this drew quite a reaction from the Senate.

"This is very disappointing,"

said Senate President Joseph S. Inos, in an impromptu press conference minutes after the joint session was called off. "The Senate is ready to entertain these land leases because these proposals are not new. We are fully aware of their importance to our people and our economy and we are ready to deliberate on them."

"All of us know we need action to benefit our sluggish economy, and it is so sad that it looks like politics, ulterior motives, and personal reasons may have gotten in the way," he indicated.

According to Inos, the April 7 schedule is a "no-retreat, no-surrender for the Senate, and that if it is postponed again the land lease proposals may have failed.

He, however, clarified in a statement that although he favors the approval of the land leases, he will not be participating in the deliberations for the Nico project due to "conflict of interest."

He said that Nico Corporation is leasing a portion of his property in Rota adjacent to the proposed site for Emperor Country Club.

"I will not participate in any way in the approval of that project,' said Inos.

Another senator, Edward U. Maratita, was a bit more vocal in criticizing the House decision to defer the holding of the joint session, saying that this was just another of their "delay tactics."

"I feel the April 7 schedule will not push through because of the trade mission. Some of those guys are going with the governor to Taiwan and Korea, and this may be enough reason to postpone it anew," said Maratita in an interview.

Maratita, in a letter to Villagomez sent before the postponement, indicated that while he appreciates the difficulties in the House in finalizing its approval of the Marpi and Obyan leases, there is no reason why the Nico project in Rota should be affected.

"We do not appreciate any postponement of the scheduled joint session, as we in the Senate are ready for the scheduled vote for the approval of the Nico project," said Maratita.

When asked about the existence of a fourth lease proposal, Villagomez admitted that indeed, another lease agreement was recently submitted to the legislature by MPLC, but that the report that a House member was behind may not be true.

The PRDI lease, which involves approximately 60 hectares of public land also in the Obyan Beach area for a golf course development, was transmitted to the Legislature last March 30, 1992, by MPLC.

"Assuming that the House may be entertaining that project, I believe nobody is planning to include it along with the three earlier land lease proposals. And I hope that none in the Senate will also do that," said Villagomez.

According to the speaker, the House has not looked into the proposal, much less study its merits, and that it is his position that the Legislature only entertain for approval the three leases.

"For the record, I will not entertain the PRDI lease yet. If it happens that some House members want to do that, I'll lobby not to put that in the agenda of the joint session," he asserts.

Meanwhile, in apparent frustration over the calling off of the joint session, members of the Senate Resources and Development Committee quickly scheduled for a series of public hearings for the three projects.

A notice of public hearing for the UMDA project was set for April 8; for the Haas & Haynie, April 22; and for the Nico project, April 29, all to be held at the senate chamber.

Another golf course in Obyan proposed

proposed is for a period of 25 years with an option to extend for one additional term of 15 years subject to the approval of the Legislature as provided by Article XI, Section 5(c) of the NMI Constitution.

Under the lease agreement, PRDI covenants to pay to MPLC the sum of \$2,332,800 as prepaid rent for the premises for the first five years of the lease.

In addition, the lessee agrees to pay to MPLC as annual rent, aside from initial payment for the first five year period, the sum of \$503,884.80 for the second fiveyear period; \$544,195.58 for the third five-year period; \$587,731.23 for the fourth five-year period; and \$634,749.73 for the fifth five-year period.

Also, a percentage rent based on the gross receipt of lessee from the use and operation of the premises will also be paid to the extent the percentage of gross receipts in each year of the term exceeds the annual base rent.

The percentage of gross receipts will be 3% for the first five-year period, 3% for the second, 4% for the third, 4% for the fourth, and 5% for the fifth five-year period.


This percentage rent shall be assessed against a portion of the gross receipts of the entire development project determined by comparing the area of leased public land to the

area of leased private lands, together comprising the entire premises of the project.

Percentage rent, if any, shall be computed quarterly based on the gross receipts for the prior calendar quarter, and paid by the lessee within forty five days following the end of such quarter, with adjustments, if any, to be made at the end of every calendar year upon the submission of the annual certified financial statements.

Under the lease agreement, the lessee shall also contribute: the sum of \$333,333 for the construction of a Boy Scout camp in the vicinity of Ladder Beach the sum of \$2,999,999 for village homestead infrastructure in Dandan and Koblerville expansion; the sum of \$946,666 for Community College (\$646,666), Youth Center (\$66,666, Village Park (\$66,666), and Anti Culture (\$666,666); and the sum of \$1 million for the construction of the new "Guma Ma Galaae' (Governor's House).

Among the other provisions of the agreement is local rates and accessibility to the golf course for CNMI residents, and that the lessee will use its best efforts to ensure that no less than 18% of its employees residing on Saipan shall be CNMI residents.

In an effort to address this problem of overpopulated prisons, the Department of Public Safety is now scouting for a suitable location to set up an honor farm for low-risk inmates.


Director Greg Camacho of DPS said yesterday that he had already communicated with the Marianas Public Land Corporation to set aside an appropriate area for the honor farm.

Camacho said they will need about three hectares of land with fertile soil and having easy accessibility to water sources to set up this penal colony.



A land lease granted by the Marianas Public Land Corporation (MPLC) to a Japanese developer is not an immediate indication that the rights to a clean and health environment will be violated, lawyers of the local land management agency said.

The new fee scale which hospital officials say was implemented as an exigency measure to meet its current growth and demands, was implemented apparently without meeting any negative feedback from the community. But, Congresswoman Ana S.


Teregeyo, R-San Vicente, Chairperson of the House Committee on Health Education and Welfare has shown concern over the reasons behind the rate increase.

"If the purpose is to raise the revenues, then the hospital should develop a system where it can still provide affordable, quality health care. Raising hospital rates is not the best way to address the issue," Teregeyo said in a Tuesday interview.

Teregeyo said one method by which the hospital can raise its revenue is to implement an effective and efficient collecting system to assure the return of the hospital expenditures. The move to implement the

rate hike is seen as one factor that may hamper the delivery of health care services to those in the lower income bracket.

Reports have it that there is a very large number of people in the CNMI who do not have medical insurance or a majority of contract workers who are in-

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

The proposed zoning measure is expected to cut bureaucratic red tape and hasten processing of the necessary paperworks required from a developer before the actual project construction begins.

Acting Zoning Administrator Judy Daniel said permit processing will be streamlined since developers can immediately determine their project's viability through the proposed zoning ordinance.

Developers currently are faced with the problem of going from one local government agency to another in an effort to secure a permit for a proposed development. This process tends to be a tedious one and may even take years before it becomes a reality.

Under the proposed zoning ordinance, developers will first have to secure a zoning permit before they can secure permits from local environmental and permitting agencies such as the Coastal Resources Management Office, the Department of Environmental Ouality and the Department of Fish and Wildlife among others.

Daniel said they will be producing a brochure in cooperation with the other local agencies to inform developers of the steps

they need to take before a permit can be issued.

The proposed zoning ordinance and the draft zoning map for Saipan is currently under review by the community. Daniel said they will soon start gathering all the opinions and commentaries which the Zoning Board will use as a reference in the creation of the zoning map and regulations.

The members of the board have also met with the members of the Saipan Legislative Delegation who appear to favor the proposal. The same is also true among members of the community who participated in the two-week of public meetings.

"Zoning comes when you feel threatened. People here somehow feel that because they see the impact of these developments to their environment. Zoning is a means to protect and preserve the things you may lose," Daniel said.

The proposed zoning map is based on a 30-year projection and shows in detail the infrastructure, character and actual projection of the economic and population growth on Saipan.




Acting Zoning Board Administrator Judy Daniel explains the details of the draft zoning map which is currently being reviewed by the community.



### **Bases withdrawal**, recriminations, strain relations

MANILA, Philippines (AP) -The removal of U.S. troops is straining U.S.-Philippine relations as President Corazon Aquino's government seeks to deflect criticism for sending the Americans packing.

Last September, the Philippine Senate rejected a 10-year extension for the Subic Bay naval base. Mrs. Aquino gave the Americans until the end of this year to leave, although surveys showed most Filipinos wanted them to stay longer.

The departure of the Americans from their last base here will cost thousands of Filipinos their jobs. Many of them have already been laid off in the runup to national elections May 11.

Political in-fighting within the Aquino Administration delayed establishment of a Bases Conversion Authority to oversee the transfer of Subic from a military installation to a civilian port and industrial zone.

Mrs. Aquino signed legislation establishing the Authority last month. Many skilled workers, skeptical of their government's conversion plans, are already applying for jobs abroad.

Economic dislocation caused by the withdrawal could have an impact on the May elections, in which Imelda Marcos and six other candidates are competing to succeed Mrs. Aquino.

In an apparent attempt to sidestep charges of mismanagement, the Aquino Administration has sought to blame the Americans for the conversion delays.

Press Secretary Horacio Paredes, in a series of national radio broadcasts, has accused the Americans of a "hard-hearted" attitude and a lack of cooperation. Government sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, say the attacks had Mrs. Aquino's approval.

"We already know what kind of people we are dealing with," Paredes said in one broadcast. "I am wondering why we should pay any more attention to the Americans since the biggest aid loes not come from the United States but from Japan."

#### **Geothermal suit sent** back to circuit court

HONOLULU (AP) - The state Intermediate Court of Appeals has sent an anti-geothermal lawsuit back to Big Island Circuit Court for further action.

The suit, which challenges the validity of Puna Geothermal Venture's permit to operate, was dismissed in 1990 by Judge Ernest Kubota.

The Pele Defense Fund and others claimed in their suit that a construction permit should not have been granted to Puna Geothermal because one of the conditions of its Geothermal Resource

This week, Paredes accused the United States of failing to establish a withdrawal committee as required by the 1988 U.S.-Philippine base agreement.

But the agreement contains no such requirement. U.S. officials say they have been working closely with Filipino authorities. U.S. Ambassador Frank Wisner is in the United States encouraging American businesses to invest in the Subic area.

Last month, Mrs. Aquino claimed the U.S. military asked for access rights to an airstrip at Subic despite questions about the constitutionality of such an arrangement.

That angered U.S. officials, who said no such request had been made although they would not rule one out later.

Much of the criticism has centered on alleged "stripping" of the base by the Navy. The 1988 agreement commits the United States to leave behind non-removable items, such as buildings, generators and other fixed assets. The Philippines has a first option to purchase removal U.S. property designated as excess.

Philippine officials expressed interest in three drydocks but U.S. officials say they could not be declared excess because the Navy needed them elsewhere. Two of the drydocks have already left for Guam and Hawaii.

Publicly, the U.S. Embassy has avoided a "war of words" with the Aquino government, which leaves office June 30. Privately, however, U.S. officials are dismayed over the Aquino government's tactics. American withdrawal of sup-

port for the late President Ferdinand Marcos was instrumental in Mrs. Aquino taking office in the 1986 "people power revolution."

The U.S. government continued to support the Aquino Administration, even dispatching two Air Force jets to fly air cover for government forces in a 1989 coup attempt.

"We are trying to build a new relationship but this doesn't help," said one senior U.S. official, speaking on condition of anonymity. "It will be a long time before people back there (in Washington) forget this."

### Thieves steal earthquake, volcano monitéring equipment

MANILA, Philippines (AP) -The government's chief volcanologist complained Thursday that remote sensors at the two most violent Philippine volcanoes have been stolen or vandalized, delaying reports on volcanic activity.

Raymundo Punongbayan, director of the Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology, said that the problem has reached "unmanageable levels" and has cost "a temporary but significant loss of opportunity" to study earthquakes.

Leyo Bautista, a spokeswoman of the institute, said the sensors have been installed at the Taal Volcano south of Manila and at the Mount Pinatubo north of the capital.

Last June, Pinatubo erupted in this century's most violent volcanic eruption. More than 300 people were killed from the effects of the eruption and forced the closure of the U.S. Clark Air Base.

Taal Volcano, one of the most violent of the 21 active volcanoes in the country, showed signs of eminent eruption last year and early this year. More than 2,000 people died in an eruption of Taal in 1911.

She said that one seismograph and the batteries of at least eight telemetry stations have been stolen at Taal and Pinatubo. One electronic distance meter that measures bulging of the ground was destroyed by a fire caused by slash-and-burn farmers at Taal.

"They are quite expensive and hard to acquire," she said. ### Lawmakers debate on cockfighting legality

HONOLULU (AP) - Fighting cocks were on the table at the Senate Judiciary Committee on Wednesday - one live one in the feathers and dozens of dead ones in color prints.

While the measure before the committee would only shift the criminal offense of cruelty to animals from the criminal code to the agriculture code, the debate again was over whether or not cockfighting should be legal. Mike Cakin of Pahala on the

Big Island again brought one of his prized fighting cocks to show off to the lawmakers as cockfighting enthusiasts said their sport is a cultural activity.

Hawaii County Police Lt. Charles Chai, meanwhile, presented the committee with a dozen color photographs taken by police at raided cockfights over the past few weeks.

They showed the bloodied carcasses of the losers.

Pamela Burns of the Hawaii Humane Society said her organization opposes the bill, even though it only shifts the cruelty to animals provisions to another section of the law.

"We see this as a first step in the effort to legalize cockfighting," she said.

Committee Chairman Russell Blair deferred any immediate decision on the bill that he agrees is symbolic at best and does nothing to change the enforcement of the law against cockfighting.

To help him make his recommendation, Blair asked that proponents of the bill to provide better evidence that cockfighting was a cultural activity of Hawaiians before their contact with Westerners. He also asked that someone provide him a video tape of a cockfight.

Following the hearing, Blair said he personally is reluctant to support the bill, but likely will leave that decision up to his committee members.



Rep. Alex Santiago also attended the trip, but only spent \$717 on airfare, the cost of a regular coach fare.

The two were among 26 state lawmakers who made the trip. The amount of money spent on travel by each varied between Apo's and Santiago's expenses. Others who chose to take a first-class trip at taxpayer expense

included Sen. Dennis Makasato, who spent \$3,751; Sen. Jimmy Aki, \$3,531; and Sen. Mike Crozier, \$3,399. On the low end with Santiago were Rep. Reb. Bellinger, \$739; and Reps. Bertha Kawakami and Julie Duldulao, \$740, the newsletter reported.

In all, six lawmakers charged iaxpayers more than \$3,000 to attend the conference.

Apo, an official of the national organization, said his trip cost more because his decision to go to the conference was made at the last minute and first-class travel was the only thing available.

He said he also visited three other states during that trip. It wasn't the only time Apo went traveled first class. He spent

House turns back proposal to redesign coins

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turned down a compromise offered by Sen. Alan Cranston to order a redesign of only the back sides of the quarter and half dollar over the next two years.

The Treasury Department also would have had to consider redesigning the backs of the penny, nickel and dime but changes in them would not have been mandated by Congress.

"We are going into debt as a country by dlrs 1 billion a day and here we are bickering about pocket change,"complained Rep. George Allen. "It's just another example of the wasted time that his house spends on minutia." Allen particularly objected to the possibility that the bill could lead to removing Thomas Jefferson's home, Monticello, in his Vermont district from the back of the nickel.

It also could lead to removing the Lincoln Memorial and Liberty's torch from the back side of the penny and dime while directing that the eagle on the back sides of the quarter and half-dollar be replaced with designs based on themes in the Bill of Rights.

"None of us wants to do any sacrilege as far as coins are concerned... but let's give some artists some license to explore," said Rep. Doug Barnard. "Coin redesign is very common in most other countries."

Just six weeks ago, the House rejected by a much larger 241-172 vote Cranston's effort to order a redesign of the backs of all five coins over the next five years.

He attached it to a much more popular bill for several commemorative coins, including one wanted by first lady Barbara Bush to finance the collection and restoration of antiques and paintings in the White House. The bill now goes back to conference committee of House and Senate negotiators with instructions to remove Cranston's coin redesign. The Senate has approved the redesign plan seven times since

\$1,817 to attend the Western Legislative Conference in Cheyenne, Wyo., in September. By contrast, Rep. Suzanne Chun made the trip for \$718. Critics say some lawmakers make extensive use of first-class air travel and other luxury accommodations, failing toplan and manage their travel in a way that would cut costs.

Despite guidelines that explain the Legislature's travel policies, few restrictions are placed on lawmakers regarding travel. Travel expenses are authorized only for "official legislative business," such as attending a conference or to conduct studies into pending legislative matters. To get reimbursed, requests were be authorized by Senate President Richard Wong or House Speaker Daniel Kihano beforehand.

In all, senators seem to travel more than their House counterparts. A dozen senators spent more than 30 days last year on "official business," while no members of the House were gone that long, the newsletter reported.

### Virtual reality networks allow shared artificial reality

KANAGAWA, Japan (AP) - A car designer sits at a computer screen in Tokyo working on a new model for the American market. Instead of punching a keyboard, he guides his fingers as if he were shaping a clay model.

But his hands are empty. Special gloves with sensors convey the motions to the computer, and a pair of animated hands on the screen duplicate his actions, shaping curves or adding compo**n**ents to a three-dimensional image of the car.

In Detroit, another technician at the company's U.S. subsidiary is working on the same design and sees the same image on a linked computer. He suggests a different shape for the car's trunk and, using his own gloved hand, "grasps" the trunk and reshapes

Such cooperative product design by technicians thousands of possible by the beginning of the 21st century, researchers say. Already, NEC Corp. has devel-

oped a system that can link any number of computers in different parts of the world to do simple versions of these functions.

The system uses "virtual reality," new computer techniques in which body movements translate into changes in a scene viewed on a computer screen or in special goggles equipped with small viewers.

Simple versions of virtual reality already are appearing in video arcade games. More complex systems are being developed by car manufacturers and architects to allow computer-aided design without the chore of entering instructions by keyboard.

With virtual reality, an architect's drawing could be brought to life so you could "walk" through the plan of a new house, turning miles (kilometers) apart will be your head to view different angles, and using your hands to shift furniture around.

By developing a way to link several computers together, NEC says it is further widening the possibilities for virtual reality.

For example, a customer could visit a nearby showroom and use a computer linked to a faraway factory to help design custom furniture, says Takao Nishitani, senior manager of NEC's terminal systems research lab. Or perhaps someone could invite a computer-equipped friend in another country on a virtual reality trip to Disneyland or the Rio carnival.

A famous surgeon could "take the hand" of a doctor in another city and guide him through a computer-simulated operation. "We hope our system will become an actual product by the beginning of the 21st century," Nishitani says.

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### **Over a tenth of earth's fertile soil** damaged or lost in last 45 years

UNITED NATIONS (AP) - The world's future food supply is threatened by damage done by mankind to more than a tenth of the Earth's fertile soil since 1945, an area the size of China and India combined, a new U.N. report says.

Overgrazing by livestock, inefficient farming practices and deforestation are about equally to blame for the loss of fertile land. the U.N. Environment Program study found. Urbanization and pollution are other factors. Environmental scientists fear that as the Earth's population grows from some 5.5 billion now to 10 billion by the year 2050, the loss of fertile land will lead to a permanent global food shortage.

"As land becomes scarce, how are we going to make sure that the common man in a developing country is able to get the food that he needs, when he needs it?" asked Visvanathan Rajagopalan, a World Bank vice president who heads its Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research.

"We are going to have to feed an increasingly large population on a finite base of arable land," soil researcher Dirk Bryant said. "A conservative assessment is that you try to save that base."

Bryant is with the World Resources Institute, which included the U.N. report in its biennial report "World Resources - A Guide To The Global Environment."

About 3 billion acres (1.2 billion hectares) of land has sustained moderate to extreme degradation since 1945, accounting for 10.5 percent of the planet's fertile land, an area the size of China and India combined, the study found.

Of that land, some 740 million acres (300 million hectares) is severely degraded. Most of the rest of the degraded land has lost some of its fertility, but can still be used for some agriculture, the report said.

But even that land is threatened, the report says. If it is not improved, "one may fear that at least part of it may become strongly degraded in the near fu-

Worldwide, about 25 billion tons of soil are lost each year due to erosion and other damage, said Gustavo Nores, director of the International center for Tropical Agriculture in Colombia. The vast majority of the dam-

aged land is in Asia, with 1.1 billion acres (453 million hectares), and Africa, with 792 million acres (321 million hectares), where most of the world's poor subsistence farmers live.

Central America has the highest proportion of damaged land, 24 percent of its total. About 17 percent of Europe's land, 14 percent of Africa's and 12 percent of Asian's soil is degraded.


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HONOLULU (AP) - Lt. Gov. Ben Cayetano is again suggesting that the state Legislature hold a special session this summer to take up proposed changes to the control of the state's public school system.

Cayetano appeared Wednesday night before a joint hearing of the state Senate Education and Judiciary Committees on whether or not to retain the state's current system of an elected school board that hires and fires the superintendent of education.

The committees deferred any immediate decision on what to propose, if anything.

Cayetano heads a special task force on school governance which has recommended that the voters be given three new options to select from in next fall's elections.

Judiciary Committee Chairman Russell Blair suggested that the task force should have come up with a specific recommendation on a change for the voters to accept or reject, instead of giving them a multiple choice. Cayetano said he didn't think the task force had abdicated its responsibility in making that decision.

If that was the case, he said, it could be said that the Legislature had abdicated its responsibility in the matter when it set up the task force last year.

Cayetano suggested the Legislature come back in a special session this summer, hold extensive hearings like the task force did and then come up with a single proposal to put on the ballot.

The task force feels whatever configuration the Legislature comes up with to govern the school system, it's important that the board that sets the policy for education not be the body that selects the superintendent to execute that policy.

Jim Yoon of United Parents for Education said the biggest problem is that "everyone has a vested interst. Everybody's got his fingers in it."

"What difference does it make if you don't get the money down to where it is needed in the classrooms?" Yoon said. Hawaii has an onerous distinc-



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

The CNMI's Task Force on Immigration headed by the Attorney General is now formulating stricter measures to screen visitors coming to Saipan in the light of unabated entry of illegal aliens who are using the island as a transit point for travel to other destinations such as Japan.

Assistant Attorney General Tom Sheldon said yesterday that they are now drawing up new systems with the help of federal agencies to enable them to deal more effectively with the problem of illegal aliens especially those using forged United States travel documents.

The new system will entail some changes in the airport screening of both arriving and exiting passengers and the future installation of a harmonized computer system to effectively monitor the entry and exit of passengers with forged travel documents, Sheldon said.

"Because of the generally liberal policies of the CNMI on

illeoal aliens

tourists, certain groups of individuals are now using Saipan as a transit point for other travel destinations," Sheldon said

The clamp down was spurred by the apprehension late Wednesday night of another Filipino who was deported by Japanese immigration authorities after he tried to enter Nagoya using a tampered US passport after coming from Saipan.

Capt. Frank Villanueva, Deputy Chief of the Immigration and Naturalization Office here in the CNMI, identified the Filipino as Elmer G. De Jesus.

According to Villanueva, De Jesus arrived in Saipan on board a Continental Airlines flight from Manila on March 24 using a Philippine passport.

Claiming he is a tourist, De Jesus was reportedly admitted and stayed for a few days before he left on Tuesday for Nagoya, Japan this time brandishing a U.S. passport with the name Robert S. Ramos and his photo on it. Immigration authorities at the Nagova airport, however, sent him back

after detecting that the U.S. passport he presented was not authentic.

nabbed here in Saipan employing the same methods as three other Filipinos who were likewise apprehended earlier last month.

In fact, Villanueva attested that the case of De Jesus and the other three who had already been deported back to Manila had a lot in common like coming from the same province of Pampanga and the use of forged U.S. travel documents.

When interrogated. De Jesus claimed that he bought the travel documents which include a U.S. social security card from a guy he knows only as Manuel Santos of Makati. Santos was allegedly paid P50,000 or about \$1,900 by De Jesus for the travel documents.

Villanueva, however, disclosed that this Santos very likely belongs to the same syndicate who entice Filipino workers with the prospects of being able to travel and work in Japan using the continued on page 16

a veteran PBA player back in Manila, was found in possesion of several forged U.S. passports when subjected to inspection at the Saipan International Airport.

Lazaro was deported later to Manila using a one-way travel document as his Philippine passport was confiscated by the Consulate here in Saipan, Villanueva said.







# GENEVA (AP) - The number

of women killed by cigarettes will double by the year 2020, with more than 1 million women each year dying of smoking-related illnesses, the World Health Organization said Wednesday. The new report by the U.N. health agency said in some countries the number of female smokers would likely outnumber men in the near future. It said about 20-35 percent of women smoked in rich nations, compared to 2-10 percent in the Third World.

WHO described the report as the first international study on women and tobacco. It is to be presented at a conference in Buenos Aires, Argentina. A summary of the report published in Geneva said cigarettes were even more harmful to women's health than to men's.

WHO said female smokers were more susceptible to infections of the reproductive tract and more likely to suffer fertility problems when they wanted children. Smoking during pregnacy caused premature births, spontaneous abortions and infant deaths, it said. It said children constantly ex-

posed to their mother's tobacco smoke were more likely to develop respiratory problems and ear infections. "Last but not least, nicotine reduces the circulation of blood and the uptake of oxygen, with adverse effects on the skin, hair and eyes," the report said.

"Contrary to the images promoted in cigarette advertising, smoking causes premature wrin-

kles, bad breath, stained teeth and ginernails, gum disease, dental problems, a hoarse voice and chronic cough," it said. WHO accused the tobacco industry of creating women's brands using promotional tactics to give women the impression that smoking will make them suc-

cessful, youthful, happy and slim. Once women start smoking, they often find it more difficult to quit than men, partly because many fear weight gain, it said.

Denmark topped the league for women smokers in Europe, with 45 percent in 1988, according to WHO data. In Norway 34 percent of women were reported to smoke in 1990, compared with 30 percent in France and Luxembourg.

Portugal was at the lowest end of the scale with 12 percent in 1988, Some 26 percent of American women smoked in 1990, it said.

In the United States and northern European countries, it said, women are now following men in kicking the habit.

"Although smoking was first

adopted by the more affluent educated women, these women were also the first to give it up," it said. "The female smoker is now more likely to have a limited education, have a lower status job


or be unemployed.'

However, the report said although men and women were quitting at the same rate in some developed countries, more young women than men were starting to

"If this trend continues, female smokers will outnumber male smokers in the near future," it said, citing the example of the United States and Australia.



BEIJING (AP) - China expects tion has had a deficit for 11 of the past 12 years.

Wan did not detail how China plans to finance the Games, but he and other officials from the bid committee said they were willing to accept donations.

They said about 2,000 people and businesses already have donated money, but did not say how much. A bid committee brochure said one woman donated 600 yuan (\$110), and a child sent in 8 fen (less than 2 cents).

Wan said China expects to earn about \$100 million profit from hosting the Games, including \$40 million from the sale of television rights.

The six other contenders for the 2000 Games are Berlin; Sydney, Australia; Manchester, England; Brasilia, Brazil; Istanbul, Turkey; and Milan, Italy.

The International Olympic Committee is to make its choice in September 1993.

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## **Atlantis lands in Florida**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) - Atlantis glided through the dawn sky and landed in Florida on Thursday with seven astronauts who spent more than a week in orbit studying Earth's atmosphere.

The shuttle touched down at Kennedy Space Center at 1123 GMT, its arrival heralded by the customary twin sonic booms. Commander Charles Bolden Jr. brought the spaceship to a clean stop on the concrete runway.

"Welcome back to the planet, Atlantis. Congratulations on an outstanding flight," Mission Control's Sidney Gutierrez told Bolden.

More than 150 people gathered at Kennedy's landing strip to welcome Atlantis home, including NASA's new chief, Daniel S. Goldin.

About 300 guests, including the astronauts' families, had to watch from eight miles (13 kilometers) away because of the wind direction

officials feared shuttle fumes might blow toward the crowd.

Atlantis circled the world 143 times during its nine-day voyage and traveled 3.7 million miles.

The shuttle streaked across central Florida on its way to Kennedy, passing just north of Tampa and over Orlando. It was a rare event - shuttles have landed at Kennedy only eight times before and generally come in from the north.

Ngiraked was Palau's minister of state under Lazarus Salii, who was president when he killed himself in August 1988.

On March 18, two days before his arrest, Ngiraked wrote a threepage double-spaced, typewritten statement about Ramarii's personality, violent attitude and said "Patrick is in the business of peddling sensationalism." "I gave it to the police for my security," he said. "I asked one of my friends to distribute it throughout Koror for my protection.

"In response, I was arrested in front of a bank about 1 p.m. Friday, March 20. The police asked me to come to the police station and said they were holding me for suspicion of murder."

Ngiraked said he wants a speedy trial. The trial date is Aug. 4.

"I'm innocent," he said. "They have no evidence against me. I'm going to come out of this clean. "The worst thing I am getting is

the bad publicity. But the news is talking about John O. as a prominent political figure. "For that, I am a better man," he

said with a laugh as he waved goodbye to the reporter following the 45-minute talk.

### New watch uses radio signals to stay accurate

TOKYO (AP) - For the truly time conscious, Citizen Watch Co. says it has developed a watch that keeps exact time by automatically setting itself to special radio time signals.

Citizen says the watch is the first with a built-in radio that tunes to time broadcasts in different parts of the world that are linked to highly accurate atomic clocks.

The coded time signals are available in Japan, Britain, Continental Europe and the United States, but are broadcast at different frequencies in each area, Citizen says.

The wristwatch has a tubelike antenna coil across its face to receive the radio signals. Outside the radio reception areas, the watch runs with a normal quartz movement.

Citizen, a leading Japanese watch maker, says it will begin marketing the wristwatch in Europe at the end of this year at a still-undetermined price. Marketing plans elsewhere haven't been decided, spokesman Masahito Kainuma said Thursday.

At present, the watch can't be used in the United States because the time broadcasts there use different kinds of coding, he said. Citizen anticipates the watch

will be bought by people whose jobs require accurate timing, like television directors, and by Japanese "who have a strong desire to be precise," Kainuma said.

"There are probably more people like that in Japan because Japanese society relies on accurate timing," he said.

workplace may be seeing a glimmer of hope at the end of the tunnel-another site where women are believed to bring bad luck.

With much media fanfare, Construction Ministry official Yasuko Tokoro two weeks ago became the first woman to enter a publicly funded tunnel before its completion.

And, superstition notwithstanding, there have yet to be any mishaps at the tunnel, being built for a highway through Kasugai city, in central Japan. She was allowed into the tunnel to conduct an inspection.

"We don't make any special differentiation between men and women on the job," said ministry official Hiroshi Ota. "But as far as we know, this is a first."

The taboo on women in tunnels stems from an age-old superstition that they would arouse the jealousy of the spirit of the mountain, which is believed to be a woman, and lead to disaster.

Ota said the superstition remains strong among construction workers, although young people generally tend to be less superstitious than their elders.

"Even today, working in tunnels is extremely dangerous, with the constant fear of accidents," he said. "Many workers cling to superstitions like this out of the desire to somehow reduce the danger."

He added, however, that he believes the superstition also has a practical explanation.

"When you put men and women together working in cramped conditions, it's distracting," he said. "I think that is another part of it."

Similar superstitions have discouraged women in the past from climbing mountains or boarding fishing boats. Blacksmiths also have maintained a long ban on women in their workplace.


Attempts by women to gain access to places believed to be sacrosanct or the domain of potentially vengeful goddesses have had only mixed results in recent vears

In 1990, a female reporter with Japan's largest newspaper who tried to cover a ceremony marking the completion of a tunnel in

northeastern Japan was at first turned away by site officials. She was later allowed to enter, but kept at a distance from the ceremony.

In another highly publicized case that year, a women's group sought to gain access to the sumo ring - not to wrestle but to hand over a trophy - only to be angrily rebuffed.

Sumo wrestling is closely related to Shinto, Japan's indigenous religion, and officials argued that women would defile the ring, which is considered sacred.

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### 7 chinese put in custody, 13 others still missing

TOKYO (AP) - The search continued Thursday for 13 Chinese missing at sea, while seven others who were rescued or swam ashore have been detained on suspicion of entering Japan illegally, officials said Thursday. Police officials said the bodies of four men were found Thursday along the shores of Hachijo Jima, an island 280 kilometers (175 miles) south of Tokyo, but if was not immediately known if they were among the 13 reported missing.

coming to Japan in search of jobs. Preliminary police reports said 19 Chinese men and two Chinese women on a fishing boat boarded three life rafts Tuesday night and headed for Hachijo Jima.

When one raft, carrying eight men, overturned before arriving at the island, one of them swam ashore and reported to a seaside hotel. In the ensuing search, six were rescued and one body was recovered, the reports said.

All seven known survivors were brought from the island to Tokyo Thursday for questioning, said the

BEIJING (AP) - Disasters in China last year killed more than 7,300 people and caused \$22 billion in losses, according to an official report seen in Beijing on Thursday.



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Social News reported in its Tuesday edition. Wide areas of China were inun-

dated by severe summer floods. The hardest hit were coastal Jiangsu and Anhui provincea. More than 40 percent of cropland in the two provinces was flooded, the report said.

Drought last year also was more severe than normal. Central China's Henan, Shanxi and Shaanxi provinces were hardest hit, with drought conditions spanning summer, fall and winter, the paper said.

The report did not detail the other deaths, but said no one died of starvation, froze to death, or died as a result of epidemic disease.

#### South Korean consortium gets suntec city's letter of intent

SINGAPORE (AP) - Suntec City Development Pte. Ltd. said Thursday it has issued a letter of intent to award the main contract to the South Korean Hyundai/ Ssangyong consortium to build a convention and exhibition center and three buildings.

The contract, worth 1.03 billion Singapore dollars (\$624.4 million U.S.), is to build the Singapore international convention and exhibition center, an 18story office building and two 45story office towers, in two phases. The first phase is to be com-

pleted by mid-1994 and the second by mid-1995, the company said in a statement.

Suntec City also has issued a letter of intent to award a mechanical and electrical contract worth 184.5 million Singapore dollars (\$111.8 million U.S.) to the Lee Seng Kwang (LSK)-O'Donnell Griffin-MF Kent consortium.

The Singapore-Ireland-Australia consortium is to install air conditioning, ventilation, electrical and fire protection systems, the statement said.

## **Navy punishes 13 sailors for** gay activity at base in Japan

group for homosexuals in the military says the Navy has launched a "witch hunt" to find gay activity at a U.S. base in Japan, already resulting in two court martials and 11 discharges. The investigation reportedly is continuing and may result in charges against up to 40 more Navy enlisted men and officers, including two commanders and three lieutenants.

Investigators began with allegations of homosexual activity, but now are looking into reports of fraternization between male officers and enlisted women and female officers and enlisted men, an unnamed Navy source said in a story published Wednesday by the Los Angeles Times.

The sailors who have been charged are based at the Yokosuka Navy Base in Japan and assigned either to the aircraft carrier Independence or the command ship Blue Ridge, also the flagship of the U.S. 7th Fleet, Navy officials said.

A support group for gay veterans and gays still in the military, the San Diego Veterans Association, has received requests for assistance from sailors caught up in the investigation, said Jim Woodward, theorganization'svice president.

Woodward said sailors targeted by the investigation told his group that the inquiry started about three weeks ago, when two crewmen on the Blue Ridge were caught during a sex act.

"The witch hunt began after that," said Woodward, a former Navy officer.

"The Navy has taken an incident of sexual misconduct by two individuals, which was adequately handled by using the (military justice code), and turned it into a major flap which is damaging some 40 individuals' lives," he said.

Anderson also confirmed that two sailors were court-martialed after they pleaded guilty to "committing sodomy and indecent acts." They were ordered to serve four months and five months, respectively, of hard labor but will serve only 45 days each under a plea agreement, he said.

Both also were reduced in rank, fined \$523 per month of confinement and received bad conduct discharges, said Anderson.

The other 11 sailors charged in the investigation "admitted to being homosexuals or were identified as homosexuals" and will receive administrative discharges, he said. Such discharges are considered non-punitive.

the nation's biggest company despite losing\$4.45 billion in 1991, when the recession sent corporate profits plunging, Fortune magazine said Tuesday in an annual ranking.

The economic slump transcended business lines as 103 of the Fortune 500 companies lost money, the most in the list's 38 years.

Only one of Fortune's top 10 made more in 1991 than the previous year. Three of the top four - GM, No. 3 Ford Motor Co. and No. 4 International Business Machines Corp. combined to lose nearly dlrs 10 billion.

Overall, combined profits of the 500 companies sank 41 percent to \$55.1 billion from \$93.4 billion in 1990. Total sales fell by 1.8 percent, and 238 companies recorded declines. Fortune bases its list on total revenue and rates only industrial companies. The magazine also compiles separate rankings by profits, assets, stockholder equity and other financial indicators.

GM remained No. 1 with \$123.8 billion in revenue, a 1.1 percent drop. Exxon Corp. \_ the biggest moneymaker with \$5.6 billion in profits \_ held on to second place.

Ford lost \$2.6 billion and IBM lost \$2.8 billion. General Electric Co., Mobil Corp., Philip Morris Cos., Du Pont, Texaco Inc. and Chevron Corp. completed the top 10.

In a competing list, Forbes magazine said GE retained the title of "most powerful" corporation. GM, IBM and Ford were left off that ranking because they lost money.

Forbes also ranks 500 companies by sales, profits, assets and market value. To distinguish itself from Fortune, it does a composite measurement combining all categories to determine its "Super 50."

On the composite list, GE was followed by Exxon, Philip Morris, Mobil, Sears, Roebuck and Co., Du Pont, GTE Corp., American International Group Inc., Federal National Mortgage Association and Chevron.

Sears, GTE, AIG and Fannie Mae are not on Fortune's list because they are not industrial companies. In addition to manufacturers, the Forbes list includes service companies, retailers, financial institutions and utilities. The rankings showed the recession's impact. On the Fortune list, seven of 26 industry groups were the red, led by motor v parts, where 18 companies combined to lose \$7.6 billion.

The other laggards were building materials, computers and office equipment, industrial and farm equipment, metals and textiles, and transportation equipment.

Themagazinesaidaccountingcosts for severance, future employee retirement payments and other programsloomedlarge. Employment at the 500 companies fell 3.9 percent to 12 million, down more than 480,000 employees.

Amgen Inc. recorded the biggest sales increase, 127 percent to \$705 million. The biotechnology company joined the Fortune list at No. 427. In all, 19 companies made the list for the first time.

# Feminists group criticize sex tour guide

TOKYO (AP) - A popular Japanese publisher is coming under attack from feminist groups for offering tour books that tell where to find prostitutes and strip shows in Asian nations.

The feminists claim the publisher, K.K. Bestsellers, already has promised to withdraw "Southeast Asia for Men Traveling Alone."

On Thursday, they also demanded that Bestsellers donate profits from its guidebook to groups that promote sexual equality.

"Even though they've removed the books from bookstore shelves. the human rights of women, which they have walked all over, will remain damaged," said Asayo Aoki, a representative of the Osaka-based Woman Against Sexual Violence, which has about 120 members.

"I still don't think they understand what a terrible thing they have done." It's not the first time a prominent Japanese company has come under fire for what feminists view-as sexist products. Last year, Japanese feminists

were enraged over a card game. made by a major toy company in which women were depicted as sex objects to be bought and sold.

Aoki said the guidebook reflects typical sexism in Japanese society. Although there has been an increased awareness of sexual harassment, many Japanese men read pornographic comic books and magazines while they commute on subways.

The 1,500-yen (dirs 11) travel guide is still available at some stores, and at least one major bookstore chain, Asahiya Bookstore, said it had received no instruction from the publisher to

withdraw the book.

Instead of focusing primarily on descriptions of historical sites, restaurants and boutiques as in ordinary travel books, the single men's guidebook is filled with pictures of scantily dressed women, recommended night clubs and massage parlors.

"Make your hot night in Manila even hotter. ... So many spots for lovemaking," says the Philippines section.

In the Thailand section, the book, written by freelance writer Toshio Shoji, says, "Many young girls, and cheap too."

"There is no fixed price here, so the appropriate price is about half of what they say. Bargaining is normal," says a chapter on the Indonesian island of Bali.

Local newspapers say Bestsellers, a publisher known for its how-to book series, has sold

about 50,000 copies of the edition on Southeast Asia, and another 30,000 copies of a guide to Europe.

"Our purpose was to introduce foreign countries the way they are, and we have no intention to promote prostitution. We made the guidebooks into something different from those of major publishers because they were our first foreign tour guides," Japan's largest newspaper, Yomiuri, quoted a Bestsellers editor as saying.

Bestsellers refused to discuss the book with The Associated Press.

Mizuho Fukushima, a lawyer active in feminist issues, said the guidebook reflects Japanese sexism as well as prejudice toward other Asian countries.

"Japan is too easygoing toward prostitution. There are many Japanese men who don't realize prostitution violates human rights," she said.

Fukushima said the thinking of Japanese men remains the same as when Japan's Imperial Army forced Asian women into prostitution during World War II. On Tuesday, a group of feminists visited a radio station in central Japan to criticize a program

depicting a Japanese man trying to pay a woman, apparently from Southeast Asia, to sleep with him. The radio station, FM Nagano,

acknowledged that the skit was inappropriate, and said it would broadcast an apology.

Last year, several women's groups also criticized an anti-AIDS poster showing a Japanese man with a passport and the message "Have a nice trip! But be careful of AIDS." They said it condoned sex tours abroad.

### **Ramos campaigner** killed inside mosque COTABATO, Philippines

(AP) - Hooded gunmen killed a campaigner for presidential candidate Fidel Ramos inside a mosque in the southern Philippines, witnesses reported Thursday.

Tuka Baliwan was shot Wednesday while praying in a mosque in a village near Ampatuan in Maguindanao province, 785 kilometers (490 miles) south of Manila.

"What they are doing to us is too much. They are killing even those in prayer," said Rep. Guimid Matalam, chairman of Ramos' Lakas Party in the southern Autonomous Region of Muslim Mindanao.

Matalam said the killing was connected with the May 11 presidential election, but did not name any suspects. Baliwan was the fourth prominent Ramos supporter killed since the election campaign began in February. Ramos, a former defense secretary, is backed by President Corazon Aquino in his race against six others, including Imelda Marcos, widow of former President Ferdinand Marcos: House Speaker Ramon Mitra and Eduardo Cojuangco, a close Marcos associate and Mrs. Aquino's estranged cousin. ### **Philippines wary over** reduction of Libyan diplomats

MANILA, Philippines (AP) -The Philippines is wary about following a U.N. resolution urging members to reduce the number of Libyan diplomats in their countries for Tripoli's refusal to hand over suspects in the bombings of U.S. and French planes.

Foreign Affairs Undersecretary Pablo Suarez said such a move against Libyan diplomats could trigger retaliatory action against the Philippines, endangering up to 20,000 Filipinos working in Libya.

"This move to expel Libyans will in effect mean expulsion of Filipino diplomats, which we cannot afford at this time since we have many workers there who need our assistance," said Suarez, whose department is often accused of ignoring Philippine nationals abroad.

"These are some of the constraints that we are looking into," Suarez said. The resolution was part of sanctions approved

Local Muslims said the killing had desecrated the mosque. It also occurred on the eve of the last day of the Ramadan, a monthlong fast by Muslims.

Ramos' campaign staff in Manila also reported that a land mine exploded early Wednesday, minutes after an advance campaign party for the former defense chief passed on its way to the Cagayan provincial town of Tuao, 345 kilometers (215 miles) north of Manila.




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
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### **Reported cases rose to** 484,148 by end of March

GENEVA (AP) - There have been 37,467 new reported cases of AIDS in the past three months, the World Health Organization said Wednesday. In its quarterly update, the U.N. health agency said it had received reports of a total 484, 148 cases since records first began about 10 years

ago. However, because of under-diagnosis and delays in reporting, the true worldwide total of people who have caught AIDS is estimated at close to two million. This includes 500,000 children.

WHO said most of the new cases registered between Jan. 1 and April 1 were from the United States and Africa. WHO reported a total 446,681 cases in its January update.

All the statistics are cumulative totals since records were kept.

The WHO update said U.S. authorities notified a total 213,641 cases, an increase of 10,798 from the previous report.

Uganda has the second highest official total of AIDS victims. In a year-end report, it said a total 30,190 cases had occured. This was 8,471 higher than its previous report at the end of 1990.

Tanzania follows with 27,396 reported cases, although the figures have not been updated since last August.

Elsewhere in Africa, Zimbabwe reported 3,140 new cases, giving it a total of 10,551. Rwanda said it had 6,578 cases, 1,478 up on the previous report.

The figures, reported to WHO's Geneva headquarters by national governments, do not give an ac curate picture of the extent of the AIDS virus.

Developing countries in particular under-report the disease, especially among children. The cause of death is often recorded as pneumonia or tuberculosis, even though it is in fact AIDSinduced.

WHO's statistics only include actual cases of Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome, and not the Human Immunodeficiency Virus, HIV, that leads to the fullblown disease.

It takes on average 10 years for HIV carriers to develop symptoms of AIDS. Once the full symptoms appear, virtually everyone dies within a few years. WHO estimates that 9-11 million adults have been infected by HIV since the virus first spread. About 1 million children are estimated to have been bom infected with HIV after contracting the virus in their mother's womb. The AIDS virus is spread by unprotected sexual intercourse, contaminated blood and from mother to child. WHO says about 75 percent of all HIV infections to date have been due to heterosexual intercourse.





Thai spokesman Sakthip Krairiksh, quoted on the state-run Radio Thailand, said Egypt and Tunisia have agreed to allow evacuation of Thai workers from Libya through their territory, and Egypt would permit the setting up of a reception center at its border.

Sakthip said the Foreign Ministry is closely monitoring the situation, but will wait until the April 15 deadline set for U.N. sanctions before deciding on an evacuation. The sanctions, approved Tuesday, ban weapons sales to and air links with Libya. In reaction to the sanctions,

crowds were reported to have atacked Western embassies in the Libyan capital of Tripoli on Thursday.

Thailand has several hundred thousand workers overseas who remit millions of dollars of foreign exchange back home each year.

In Manila, Suarez said of another proposed sanction, "This move to expel Libyan (diplomats) will in effect mean expulsion of Filipino diplomats, which we cannot afford at this time since we have many workers there who need our assistance.

"These are some of the constraints that we are looking into," Suarez said. The United States and its allies want Libva to turn over two nationals indicted by the United States and Britain in the 1988 Pan Am bombing and four accused by France in the 1989 bombing of a French airliner over Niger. In Kuala Lumpur, meanwhile, Malaysian Foreign Minister Abdullah Ahmad Badawi said Thursday that U.N. sanctions against Libya should be imposed only after all diplomatic and other means to solve the problem have been exhausted.

Abdullah said Malaysia was studying the resolution on sanctions.

He reiterated Malaysia's policy of condemning all forms of terrorism.





### German firm wins **Major Rapid Transit** System contract

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) - A German company and its Taiwan partner have won an 18.8 billion Taiwan dollar (U.S. \$752 million) contract to build a segment of Taipei's mass rapid transit system, officials reported Wednesday.

Officials said the bid from Bilfinger and Berger of Wiesbaden and Taiwan's Eastern Construction Co. was the lowest submitted for construction of the 6.5-kilometer (4-mile) magnetorail line from downtown Taipei to the suburban community of Chungho.

The contract is the largest ever awarded by the government for a construction project.

Officials declined to identify the other bidders, but press reports said several were from Japan.


The transit network is to cover 88 kilometers (54.6 miles) when completed in 1998. The entire project is expected to cost 300 billion Taiwan dollars (U.S. \$12 billion).

The transit system is part of a six-year, U.S. \$303 billion government plan to improve Taiwan's infrastructure.





### **Tyson shows no reaction** to appeals court rejection

INDIANAPOLIS (AP)-Mike Tyson reacted calmly to the news that the Indiana Court of Appeals rejected his plea to go free while he appeals his convictions for rape and criminal deviate conduct, a prison spokesman said Wednes-

"He showed no reaction at all," said Department of Correction spokesman Kevin Moore. "He

Moore said Tyson, who is still refusing to take solid food, "went to the dining room for dinner iast night and breakfast Wednesday, took something to drink and interacted regularly with the other

Wednesday, Moore said, the former heavyweight champion was to meet with his attorneys. who plan to ask the Indiana Supreme Court to review lower court decisions denying Tyson bail while he appeals his convictions. The attorneys hadn't filed any papers with the state's highest

court Wednesday morning. A three-member state Court of Appeals panel on Tuesday rejected Tyson's plea to be freed on bail pending his appeal. That decision upheld an earlier order by Marion Superior Court Judge Patricia Gifford, who sent Tyson to prison last week to begin serving

Tyson, 25, was found guilty of assaulting Desiree Washington, a Miss Black America beauty pageant contestant, in his Indianapolis

Tyson's attorney, Alan M. Dershowitz, said, "We're going

to pursue it with the Supreme Court as soon as possible. We're in the extremely unfair position of having bail denied without any explanation, without any grounds."

Dershowitz said he was surprised the appellate court decision came without comment.

"I suspect the appellate court would have a very hard time coming up with opinions that are plausible," he said.

"I think they couldn't articulate a ground for denial. It's not clear the Indiana Supreme Court will find that acceptable."

Court of Appeals Judge V. Sue Shields, who signed Tuesday's order, declined to disclose the judges' reasons for denying the request after conferring for about three hours since hearing oral arguments last Friday.

"We just considered all the arguments that were presented ... and did our own review and consultation, and based on that, the determination was made," Shields told The Associated Press. "I'm not going to discuss the specifics of the decision today."

Modisett declined to call the ruling a victory for his office, but said "the winner is justice. ... The benefit we want to see it that it does tell rape victims to come forth."

Modisett said Tyson would likely now serve between six months to a year before a decision is made on his appeal.

Shields predicted her court could finish work on the appeal in six months.
