ASTRONOMICAL STUDIES.

The Minister of Interior holds that an inspector of election, in the discharge of his duty as an inspector, "is not 'assisting' or 'procuring' the election of any person any more than is a judge assisting in the conviction of a criminal at whose trial he presides." The comparison is comical. If Mr. Minister had been present at the recent treason trials perhaps he would have been impressed, as I was, with the belief that the presiding judge did "assist" quite considerably. I hope that no inspector of election will "assist"

quite so much. Bumps and Jinks don't seem to like Judge Widemann, or one of the pair is against him, which I don't remember. They-or he, whichever it may be-object on the ground that nobody knows which way he is going to shoot. For that very reason I respect and admire him. The Judge is an independent man, which his record proves, and can always be depended upon to vote in the Legislature according to his conscientious convictions of right, although he may stand alone, and that is the kind of men we need the man who does a thing simply because another does it.

On principle I am against Government officials being Inspectors of Election, personally I do not object to a single one on the list. Some of them, in my opinion, are pre-eminently qualified for the duties of the position. I will instance one -Luther Wilcox, whom we all know as the capable interpreter for the courts, legislature, and everything else where the Hawaiian and English languages are combined or concern-

never was and never will be. In fact he is not built that way. Any duties imposed upon him will be discharged faithfully and impartially. A better man than he could not have been chosen for Chairman

of Inspectors for the fifth district.

It is a little remarkable that an accusation should be made by the Reform Party against the National Reform Party, charging the latter with "stealing" the platform of the former, when the Reform Party is addressing circulars to citizens, soliciting assistance in constructing a platform. The course pursued seems to be a proper one; but the very fact that the party desires help in making a platform seems to imply that it has none, and if it it has not be stolen from it. But if it has one, which it desires to supersede by another and better, why censure the other party for having done the same thing?

"Essenian" charges the Rev. W. B. Oleson with having, at a Fort street Church prayer meeting, enlarged upon the political situation in this kingdom, urging all rightthinking people to stand by reform, etc. Mr. Oleson declares that he did not say so, and explains "that the rulers of to-day are the men who walk our streets, holding the power of the ballot, and that good government can come to a land only as these men realize the sacredness of their responsibilities, and give effect to their convictions by attendance at primary meetings where they can make their intelligence and character count." Now, it appears to me that the reverend gentleman introduced something of near kin to polities, into the church, anyhow; and that is just the wrong thing to do. The church is no place for politics, and clergymen are not the proper men for politicians.

MR. WIDEMANN AND THE IN SPECTORS OF ELECTION.

EDITOR BULLETIN:-In my communication to you of day before yesterday, I stated that the list of inspectors for Honolulu had been "submitted to, among others, H. A. Widemann, J. S. Walker, and T. R. Lucas, and pronounced satisfac-

In yesterday's issue, Mr. Widemann states in a communication to the BULLETIN that he "had not seen the list and consequently could not pronounce it satisfactory.'

Had Mr. Widemann been as anxious to state the truth, as he was to juggle with words and convey the impression that I had made a misstatement, he would either not have sent you the communication or have tated the facts, which are these:-

A day or two before the list was published, I went personally to Mr. Widemann's office and told him that I was making up the list of inspectors: that I desired that all parties should be satisfied, and that I understood he was a candidate, I should be pleased to make an appointment with him to go over the list at my office the next morning at 9 o'clock, at which hour there would be a meeting for the purpose. He replied that he did not know whether he was going to be a candidate

or not, but would try and come. He did not come the next morning, but Mr. F.R. Lucas did, and he said thatMr. Widemann had spoken to him about the matter saying that he was coming if he could. Mr. Lucas inspected the list, suggested some additions and changes which were made, and finally pronounced the list satisfactory to himself and those whom he represented. If Mr. Widemann did not "see" the list when it was submitted to him, it was not because he did not have the opportunity to do so, and the list was "pronounced satisfactory" by a representative of his party.

The last will of the late Capt. Thos. H. Hobron is filed for probate in San Francisco. There is real estate in these islands valued at \$38,000, besides stocks, cash, etc., aggregating \$235,000. THE SHIPWRECKED CREW. Account of the Wreck of the Whating Bark Jacob A. Howland.

The shipwrecked crew reported

being brought to town by the

steamer Kaala yesterday proved to be that of the whaling bark Jacob A. Howland, and the bark that brought them to the offing of Waianae was the whaler Abram Barker, Capt. Giffard, that left San Francisco the same day as the Howland, but was never in sight of her again until she fortunately was sighted by the shipwrecked crew on the desert island. Besides the master and four officers there were on the Howland 23 men in the foreeastle, four boat steerers, one cook, one cooper, one eng neer, one steward, one cabin boy, and one steerage boy-making 38 all told. The men arrived here without clothing except what they wore, as there was such a has none, how can that which long pull over the reef they left their dunnage behind. An account of the disaster from the "declaration and protest" at the United States Consulate is given below, From the captain and some of the crew it is learned that there was no white water on the reef when the vessel struck.

The bark Jacob A. Howland left the port of San Francisco on Saturday, Nov. 30. All went well until the 26th Dec. On that day, in lat. 17° 23' N., long, 169° 56' W. by observation, she had strong casterly wind during the night, sailing on different tacks. At 3:30 o'clock a. m. ran on the reef on the southwest side of Johnston Island. At daybreak broke out provisions and landed them. They also took 10 barrels water and anchored them inside the reef, as the tide was too low to land them. At 5:30 o'clock (p. m.) all hands left the vessel. After an hour there was 27 inches of water in the hold and gaining rapidly. Five of the boats started for the island, one of which was capsized, and Geo. McDonald, one of the crew, was drowned. The rest of the boat's crew reached the island, with the exception of the third officer and one man, who reached the vessel and remained there all night.

They found a house on the island | Ma but unoccupied, no water but plenty | Zee of birds. The 27th came in with strong wind from E. N. E. At daylight started off to the vessel, but the sea was breaking so badly over the reef that it was impossible to go out. The bark at this time was lying over on starboard side, with main and mizzen masts gone and hull going to pieces very rapidly. Saw third officer and man on the foremast. Shot a line with bomb gun over the reef to the vessel and hauled them ashore. Started in to get the casks of water

On the 28th commenced to make sails for the boats, as those belonging to them were lost. At 1 o'clock p. m. sighted a vessel to windward and sent off a boat to it, and it proved to be the bark Abram Barker. At 6 p. m. all hands went on board and proceeded to Honolulu. On Jan. 6 sighted the island of Kauai, and on the 9th the island of Oahu and at 10 a. m. arrived off the port of Waianac. Sent a boat ashore and found the steamer Kaala anchored there. Made arrangements for steamer to come to bark, receive erew and bring them to Honolulu, as the winds would not permit their getting here, and at 6 p. m. arrived in Honolula and reported to Consul-General.

"The "declaration and protest" is signed by John McInnis, master; John H. Egan, 1st mate; Abram F. Cooper, 2d mate; Johnson P. David, 3d mate; Geo. W. Bailey,

4th mate. The Howland had a clean hold when she met her fate, baying sight ed nothing but a few humpback whales. Capt. McInnis and some of the crew go home by the Mariposa to-day, the rest will follow by the next steamer, and all have been well provided for here-with shelter, food, and clothing-by Consul-General Severance and his energetic Deputy Richardson. When the Kaala took off the men, the Abram Barker squared her sails and return-

ed on her cruise.

A KONA TRACEDY.

Stoning and Strangling. The Victim Scarcety Expected to Recover-Other Konn Dalogs.

The road between Mr. John Gaspar's and Kaawalot was the scene of a rather ugly tragedy about sunset on Wednesday. A Portuguese named Mannel, who lives a short distance manka of Barritt's blacksmith shop, was on his way homeward from Gaspar's store with a bag of flour. He was hit on the back with a stone. The blow felled him, and looking round he observed a Portuguese neighbor of his own, known by the name of John, coming at him. His assailant proceeded to pound him on the head and also to throttle him. John seems to have concluded that he might as well make a thorough job at it. He got a rope round his victim's neck and proceeded with the strangulation act, after which he turned homeward, but before he had gone far, one of Mr. Gaspar's men passed him on the road with a bag of floor on his head.

Manoel managed to work clear of the strangling cord and struggled back to Mr. Gaspar's; where he was taken in and, after being somewhat revived, was brought by Gaspar and two of his men, to Dr. Mack. He was in a very bad plight, covered with blood, meaning with pain, spitting blood, and showing very distinctly the marks of the cord on his neck. The doctor rendered what medical assistance was required and then, with a posse of citizens, proceeded in search of John. This gentleman was in bed when the party reached his house. A parley was held through the window, John being informed only that a bag of flour was missing and that he was charged with its possession. By working the bag of flour for all it was worth, the interviewing party induced John to join them. He was conducted to where the wounded man was lying and thereupon en-sued a piece of interviewing that would make a San Francisco reporter's mouth water. The prostrate man then and there gave the account of the assault detailed

An examination of John's clothes resulted in the discovery of a couple of blood marks on his shirt. Dr. Mack, who while in Kona held a commission as special policeman. thereupon informed John that he should remain where he was until morning. Mr. Gaspar, at the request of the doctor, despatched a special messenger to Hookena for the deputy sheriff, who strived about sunrise and, at the time of this writing, has probably taken his man in charge.

There is a woman in the affair. Manoel's wife has been, according to her husband's statements, a special object of John's attentions. There has been a protracted domestic battle going on between the two men for the possession of the woman to the great scandal of the virtuous in the community. The woman, has some kerkis, the youngest of which, she says, is John's. There are other "doings" in Kona of rather sensational interest which must keep for next mail.

Latest-John's clothes were found to-day in a washtub in the housebloodstained, trousers evidently new from the wash. He is locked up in Hookena jail. The victim's recovery is very doubtful-much blood-spitting to-day.

The ballot boxes for the election are on hand, having come by the steamer on Saturday.

A refreshing slice of wet weather was sandwiched into the "dry season" between the 4th and 6th. Saturday and Sunday afternoons and Sunday night brought heavy rains which were as welcome as they were unexpected at this time of year.

Kona is again doctorless. Dr. Mack leaves by the Hall on Thursday for the Lahaina district. Lahaina has roads for a doctor to drive on while Kona has nothing but excerable bridle trails. So Kona must prescribe for herself or die, while Lahaina will have the services of a well qualified practitioner.

Mr. Myers has made a good start with a gang of men on the new road at Holualoa. It is to connect the road along the mountain with the beach near Kailua. It begins at Mr. Gouveia's place, Holualoa, and slopes gradually down the mountain side, the grades to be, at no part, more than six feet per hundred. Another line of road is in course of construction from Hookena mountainward and will be graded by the same rule. Whichever of the aforesaid roads is first completed will be a phenomenon in Kona. It will be the first "instituotion" of the kind in the district. Its opening ought to be celebrated. Berger's band ought to be employed for the occasion to go over the track with martial tread playing Hawaii Ponoi and every other ponoi. The inhabitants having occasion to pass over any of the new highways will carry silk stockings in their pockets to put on before they step on the "phenomenon" and put off again when they leave it. Your street cars and Oahu rail ears are cheap novelties compared with a Kona road. It is doubtful if Kona quadrupeds will be able to walk on the new roads for the first year or so. They won't know what such things are for.

This water is intended to be utilized for fluming cane to the mill. More power to the man or body of men who will convert the wild wastes into waving cane and make the earth produce something for the benefit of man or beast.




