253 packages sundries, and 10 pigs.  
The schooner Mary brought 1100 bags  
paddy from Hanaui.  
The four-masted schooner Olga is in  
the stream waiting for sugar.  
The tern Fred E. Sanders has been  
doctored at the Inter-Island Company's  
wharf where she is unloading her cargo  
of coal.

with 75 Japanese immigrants for Ku-  
kuihae.

## EXCEPTIONS NOTED.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—I suppose you  
didn't have room to-day to attend to  
Mr. Thurston's letter about Inspectors  
of Election; I am presuming you  
consider it not "too thin" to  
take notice of, but I'll forgive you  
if you say I'm too presumptuous;  
to me it seems the thinnest thing the  
"grand young man" has done yet.  
He admits that there are 47 out of  
171 inspectors drawing public pay,  
that is over 28 per cent, and whether  
28 is an enormous percentage or not  
depends upon circumstances. In  
regard to the case in point, I don't  
think your use of the adjective was  
out of place.  
But Mr. Thurston says that 18 of  
the 47 are "Justices or employees  
of the Supreme and Circuit Courts,  
over whom the administration has  
no control." Admit that the 18 are  
so employed, and, in view of the  
way the Supreme Court allowed the  
administration to bulldoze it in the  
famous manslaughter trial, admire  
the texture of the "veil of thinnest  
lawn" which Mr. Thurston tries to  
throw over your readers' vision.  
Perhaps, though, I should have re-  
served the superlative flimsiness for  
the next item—"quite a number of  
school teachers." Knowing the boss  
teacher and his record.

Why didn't Mr. Thurston go a  
step further and say that the Col-  
lector General, not the Cabinet, had  
charge of the Custom House?  
About the spirit of the law and the  
judicial position of the Inspectors,  
I'll tell you a little story—little  
stories being in fashion: At the  
election of '87 a friend of mine, a  
new chum, being desirous of help-  
ing forward Reform, made his way  
to one of the polling places for the  
purpose of recording his vote in its  
favor; somehow or other he got  
hold of the wrong ticket, and was  
about to drop it into the box in re-  
gulation form, when one of the  
"judges" for that particular busi-  
ness, "the very nature of whose du-  
ties prevented his being a partisan,"  
said, "Hold up; you don't want to  
vote that ticket, do you?" And it  
was so. Perhaps we have changed  
all that, and perhaps not; the elec-  
tion-judge may still take it upon  
himself to instruct the election-jury,  
and if Mr. Thurston had been very  
anxious about the spirit of the law  
and could not get Inspectors outside  
of the public service, he could at  
least have refrained from appointing  
any noted partisans. Then, about  
the letter of the law; if there is "no  
statute preventing a Government  
official from holding two offices at  
once," is there not one preventing  
his drawing pay for two at the same  
time, or am I thinking of some other  
people's statutes?

I see Mr. Widenmann has dis-  
claimed having had even a passive  
hand in the Honolulu appointments,  
and altogether it looks as if there  
had been a little partiality some-  
where.

## SUPREME COURT.

Chief Justice Judd presided at  
the Supreme Court term this morn-  
ing, owing to the indisposition of  
Mr. Justice Preston. Divorce cases  
were disposed of as follows:Miriam Keau vs. James Keau.  
Divorce granted for failure to sup-  
port.Louis Rodrigo vs. Ellen Rodrigo.

## A KONA TRAGEDY.

Stoning and Strangling.—The Victim  
Scuriously Expected to Recover—  
Other Kona Duties.

The road between Mr. John Gas-  
par's and Kaula was the scene of  
a rather ugly tragedy about sun-  
set on Wednesday. A Portuguese  
named Manoel, who lives a short  
distance from Gaspar's store with a  
bag of flour, was on his way home-  
ward from Gaspar's store with a  
bag of flour. He was hit on the  
back with a stone. The blow felled  
him, and looking round he observed  
a Portuguese neighbor of his own,  
known by the name of John, com-  
ing at him. This assailant proceeded  
to pound him on the head and also  
to throttle him. John seems to have  
concluded that he might as well  
make a thorough job of it. He got  
a rope round his victim's neck and  
proceeded with the strangulation  
act, after which he turned home-  
ward, but before he had gone far,  
one of Mr. Gaspar's men passed  
him on the road with a bag of flour  
on his head.

Manoel managed to work clear of  
the strangling cord and struggled  
back to Mr. Gaspar's; where he  
was taken in and, after being some-  
what revived, was brought by Gas-  
par and two of his men, to Dr.  
Mack. He was in a very bad plight,  
covered with blood, moaning with  
pain, spitting blood, and showing  
very distinctly the marks of the cord  
on his neck. The doctor rendered  
what medical assistance was required  
and then, with a posse of citizens,  
proceeded in search of John. This  
gentleman was in bed when the party  
reached his house. A parley was  
held through the window, John  
being informed only that a bag of  
flour was missing and that he was  
charged with its possession. By  
working the bag of flour for all it  
was worth, the interviewing party  
induced John to join them. He was  
conducted to where the wounded  
man was lying and thereupon en-  
sued a piece of interviewing that  
would make a San Francisco re-  
porter's mouth water. The pros-  
trate man then and there gave the  
account of the assault detailed  
above.

An examination of John's clothes  
resulted in the discovery of a couple  
of blood marks on his shirt. Dr.  
Mack, who while in Kona held a  
commission as special policeman,  
thereupon informed John that he  
should remain where he was until  
morning. Mr. Gaspar, at the re-  
quest of the doctor, despatched a  
special messenger to Hookeana for  
the deputy sheriff, who arrived  
about sunrise and, at the time of  
this writing, has probably taken his  
man in charge.

There is a woman in the affair.  
Manoel's wife has been, according  
to her husband's statements, a  
special object of John's attentions.  
There has been a protracted domes-  
tic battle going on between the two  
men for the possession of the woman  
to the great scandal of the virtu-  
tous in the community. The wo-  
man, has some keikis, the youngest  
of which, she says, is John's. There  
are other "doings" in Kona of  
rather sensational interest which  
must keep for next mail.

Latest—John's clothes were found  
to-day in a wash tub in the house—  
bloodstained, trousers evidently new  
from the wash. He is locked up in  
Hookeana jail. The victim's re-  
covery is very doubtful—much  
blood-spitting to-day.

A refreshing slice of wet weather  
was sandwiched into the "dry sea-  
son" between the 4th and 6th. Sat-  
urday and Sunday afternoons and  
Sunday night brought heavy rains  
which were as welcome as they were  
unexpected at this time of year.

Kona is again doctorless. Dr.  
Mack leaves by the Hall on Thurs-  
day for the Lahaina district. La-  
haina has roads for a doctor to drive  
on while Kona has nothing but ex-  
ecrable bridle trails. So Kona must  
prescribe for herself or die, while  
Lahaina will have the services of a  
well qualified practitioner.

Mr. Myers has made a good  
start with a gang of men on the new  
road at Hookeana. It is to connect  
the road along the mountain with  
the beach near Kailua. It begins at  
Mr. Gouveia's place, Hookeana, and  
slopes gradually down the mountain  
side, the grades to be, at no part,  
more than six feet per hundred.  
Another line of road is in course  
of construction from Hookeana moun-  
tainward and will be graded by the  
same rule. Whichever of the afore-  
said roads is first completed will be  
a phenomenon in Kona. It will be  
the first "instituted" of the kind  
in the district. Its opening  
ought to be celebrated. Berger's  
band ought to be employed for the  
occasion to go over the track with  
martial tread playing Hawaii Poni  
and every other ponoi. The inhabi-  
tants having occasion to pass over  
any of the new highways will carry  
silk stockings in their pockets to put  
on before they step on the "phenom-  
enon" and put off again when they  
leave it. Your street cars and Oahu  
rail cars are cheap novelties com-  
pared with a Kona road. It is  
difficult if Kona quadrupeds will be  
able to walk on the new roads for  
the first year or so. They won't  
know what such things are for.

He is said to be a benefactor  
of his race and country who makes  
two blades of grass grow where only  
one grew before. The Hookeana plan-  
tation company are surely entitled  
to credit for making not exactly a

blade of grass but many acres of  
sugar cane grow where nothing of  
any value grew before. Their cane  
fields are in a thriving condition.  
The planted areas are being contin-  
ually extended. A large plot of  
land, mounds of the planted fields,  
containing some hundred acres, has  
been cleared and is about ready for  
seeding. A mill is said to be on the  
way from Germany for Hookeana. A  
fine stream of water comes down  
over the rocks toward the planta-  
tion. It is said to originate in a  
swamp some miles up the mountain.  
This water is intended to be utilized  
for fluming cane to the mill. More  
power to the man or body of men  
who will convert the wild waste  
into waving cane and make the earth  
produce something for the benefit of  
man or beast.

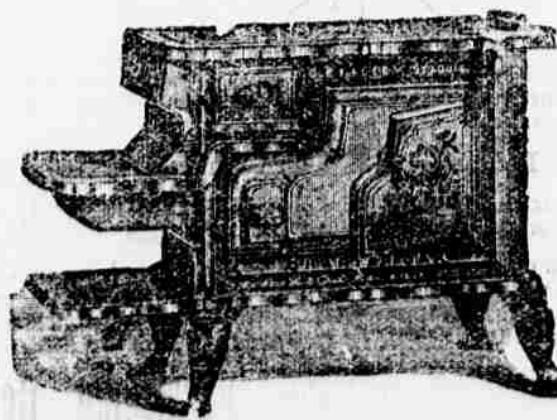

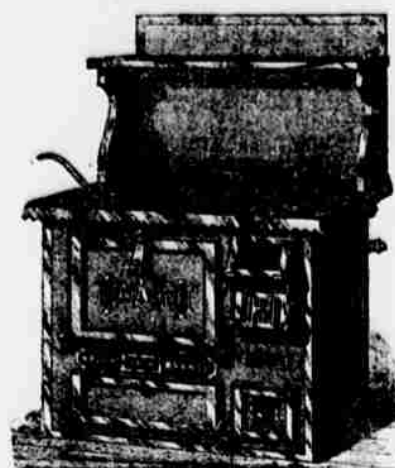

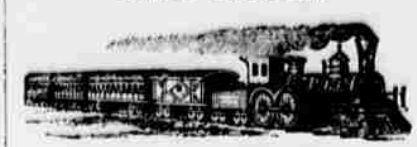
