Manila, July 21st, 1902. The Editor, Manila Times:

Dear Sir:-I was rather amused while reading the leading editorial in your issue of today regarding "Marcus Island." Your deductions are far astray when you give the location as the Marquesas group.

I have visited the Marquesas group, and have also attempted a landing on Marcus Island, which is located about 800 miles west by south of Japan and is uninhabited. There is only one point on the island where a landing can be made, and even there it can seldom be accomplished.

The only value that attaches to it is the deposit of guano it contains, which is apparently limitless.

Captain Rosehill, of the bark "Koko Head," discovered the islnad in 1879, and attempted to land and take possesweather. BELIEVES HE CAN **CURE LEPROSY**

Experiments of a German Specialist Arouse the Medical World.

WASHINGTON, July 26 .- Experiments in the treatment of leprosy are being conducted at the Medical Missionary society's hospital at Canton by Dr. Adolph Rezlag, a noted specialist of Vienna. United States Consul Mc-Wade, at Canton, has forwarded a preliminary report to the Secretary of State which was furnished him by Dr. Swan of the hospital staff. The report

"After carefully considering the matter and obtaining the approval of our board of hospital managers to lend Dr. Rezlag what aid we could we have admitted three marked cases of leprosy into an isolated room and have given the doctor what aid we could in providing suitable conditions for the treatment of these cases. Every precaution has been taken against infetcion from these cases which in twenty-four hours' time have begun to show signs of im-

"From Dr. Rezlag's intelligent methods of treatment and the enthusiasm he shows in the management of these cases, I am led to believe that gratifying results will be obtained. I may add that one or two physicians will be asso-



Mr. Bowen testified that he knew of of the corporation between E. D. Tenney and C. H. Atherton. "There is no such thing as intangible property," concluded Mr. Bowen. "All the property is in this return. Castle & Cooke have no good will. Yes it is better than a new enterprise would be. It seems that this is a struggle on the part of the government to place a valuation upon something not defined by law. The law does not include a return upon brains, experience, clear good conscience or anything of that sort. A smile may have a commercial value but I don't see it specified in the law."

"Don't you think that if a smile increases the value of your property it is taxable?" asked Mr. Wilder.

"If the smile is shown in dollars and cents to have increased the value it should be taxed, but an intangible value cannot be taxed. Brains, experience and character are not taxable."

"Don't you think if the same property was managed by different persons it would effect the value. Isn't that good

"Good will is put down in solid coin," was the answer. Assessor Pratt was also on the stand

and testified that he had assessed the stock at its market value of \$275 a share and made the usual deductions. There was some argument at the conclusion of the testimony as to points involved. W. R. Castle appearing for the appellant contended that tax upon open accounts and notes was double taxation, and that the assessor had gone outside the law in making his assessment. He argued further that corporations could not be taxed upon the results of investments. Attorney Wilder for the government answered that intangible property was taxable, and that a tax should be paid upon values made by the showing of profits, Good will or more properly, a combination of brains, skill and management could be taxed if they increased the value of the

The Rapid Transit case was next taken up, Manager Ballentyne appearing as the only witness. The return was made at \$266,730 and the assessor increased this to \$509,500. 



was destroyed by fire on August 20 1901, and in which the plaintiff claims to have incurred a loss of \$12,600. In the declaration it is set forth that in July and August, 1901, the plaintiff was engaged in the construction of a two-story frame building at the corner mentioned and had expended upon it the sum of \$12,500 when it was destroy-ed. On July 20, 1901, in consideration of the payment by the plaintiff to de-fendant of the premium of \$150, the defendant by its agents, Henry Waterhouse & Co., executed and delivered to plaintiff its contract or policy of insurance in writing, number 1,347,824, whereby it insured the plaintiff for the term of one year against loss or damage by fire while in the course of construction for \$3000. On August 20, while it is alleged the policy was in full force and unforfeited and unsurrendered, and before the building was wholly finished and completed, the same was almost entirely destroyed by fire. The plaintiff alleges that it furnished proof of the loss, but that defendant refused to pay the sum. Other sums of insurance are mentioned as having been taken out with the same company, amounting in all to \$5000.

Porto Rico is not a territory. The people are foolishly sensitive on this point, as they say they are not American citizens and they want to be. They have an educational and small property qualification for voters. They elect the lower house of the legislature. The upper house consists of twelve men called the executive council. effect of the American occupation of Porto Rico has been a godsend to the people and more or less of an inspiration to the people of the United States. I can see no cloud in the future. I do not expect great things from a tropical people. For their own good they should not be allowed to become a territory: for our good they should not be allowed statehood.





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

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Y. Kimura Indicted For Criminal Libel.

CHARGES AGAINST F. WOODBRIDGE

Slaver of David Kanewanui is Indicted - Kimura's Story About Prominent Japanese.

Another case of criminal libel cropped out of the grand jury report yesterday. Yoshigoro Kimura, editor of the Honolulu News, a Japanese newspaper, is the man indicted, and Salji Kimaura, a prominent Japanese merchant, is the complaining witness.

The defendant is alleged to have published in the News issue of July 31, 1902, a false and malicious libel concerning Saijo Kimura. Translated into the English language, the indictment says the libel was as follows:

"A Friendly Warning to Mr. Saiji Kimura by a Friend.

"It is not necessary to point out the name of a scoundrelous and unreasonable 'eminent merchant' who in such skillful manner betrays the person classed lower than he is; for we know that it is Mr. Saiji Kimura, a merchant of Honolulu, well known in Hawaii.

"We may know that, while to all outward appearances he pretends to be an amicable and upright person, yet inwardly he is a scoundrel, simply look-

ing for his own private gains. "We would call the attention of the public as well as himself to his disgraceful and brutal conduct, most shameful to our countrymen. It is as follows: The funeral of the late Toyomatsu Nakamura, a close friend of aiji, was conducted under the supervision of the latter, who was master of ceremonies and gave orders which were obeyed by the other defendants. When the subject of the property of the dead was taken up, he was not in position able to make an explanation, but deceitfully turned the conversation away from the subject, and in order to avoid further conversation in regard to the property, he had at each occasion of the ceremonies, held respectively at the time when the dead body was bathed, when the dead body was taken into coffin, when the coffin was carried out, and when finally buried, an abundance of sake served with foods, and Japanese guitars played and drums beaten, and there he had also a woman, a relative of the dead, as a singer and player. He took all his clothes off and be-

gan to dance as if he were insane. "A dog makes a single bark, then all others follow; all the attendants at the funeral-relatives of the dead, gentlemen, merchants, yardmen and servants -were moving about in crazy manner. This cannot be thought to have been a state of mourning, but more as if they had been celebrating something. What insanity is this? There was another occasion of a ceremony held seven days after the funeral at which time he went to the grave with a company, headed by himself. Before the tomb he offered sake and foods, and a Japanese guitar, accompanied by loud singing, just as a picnic seen in Japan, out to look for flower biossoms or climbing up mountains. What knavish conduct is this? Where is the dignity of the eminent merchant as called by himself and others? He occupies his high position of today because of aid of sul. He ought to have more respect for himself to maintain his present position, and it is his duty to be a good

example to ail. "We would not further discuss his personal bad reputation, but such insanity as above stated, will greatly cause social corruption. We cannot pass the matter over in silence, but we are obliged to make it public to the world at large. If he knows that he was wrong, let him apologize to the community, but let him remember that if he does not repent in future, a punishment will be inflicted upon his person some of these days. We make this public, as well as warn him."

The defendant is also alleged to have put the above statement in circulation. Daniel Yowell was indicted for manslaughter in third degree on David Kanewanui. This is the case of alleged accidental shooting of David Kanewanui, editor of the Kuokoa, as a result of which he died.

Against Frank I. Woodbridge there were returned four indictments for embezzlement. The defendant is alleged to have embezzled from M. Phillips & Co. various sums, as follows: \$756.89, \$499.24, \$601.69 and \$25.

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



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

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Rosehill Won't Go Unless He is Forced.

Lively Time for America and Japan.

despatch from Japan to the New York Hongkong: M. Estermaux, Shanghal what can I say? If Rosehill complies A. T. Galbraith, Honolulu. with his instructions, he will not yield except to a superior force, and if there is a superior force he will place the Japanese government distinctly in the position of expelling American citizens engaged in a peaceful occupation, from territory claimed by the United States and the right to occupy which was granted them by the President of he United States.

"The last despatches from Tokio stated that the proclamation of Japan formally claiming Marcus Island was dated in 1898 and that the Japanese ound 'signs of previous American occupancy.' That fixes the claim of Japan as being based solely upon the ground that the United States or Rosehill had abandoned the island. Rosehill made formal claim in 1889 and Secretary Blaine recognized his claim by filing it in the State Department and he visited the island in 1893 and again in 1897 and he was engaged in the meantime in constant efforts to enlist capital to develop the guano deposits. "If there had been a failure for nine years-between 1889 and 1898, or for thirteen years-between 1889 and 1902 to utilize Marcus, still the island could

not be considered a derelict. I do not know what period of time under the law of nations should elapse to work a forfeiture of title by abandonment, or if there is any doctrine of international law on the subject. But judged by the analogies of the civil law, the common law and the statute law nine years or thirteen years is too short a time. The right of the public to use a highway once established can, according to many authorities, never be forfelted by abandonment while others hold that it may be lost by non-user for the same period of time required by the statute of limitations to create a title by adverse possession. That period both at common law and civil law and by the statutes of many states is Elite Bldg, over by the statutes of many states is twenty-one years and is in few states less than ten years. Abandonment and non-user for 20 years was held to exinguish the right of a city to a public alley. 
