HAWAII'S PRETTY PARK

THE NEW COMMISSION IS ACTIVE
IN LOOKING AFTER IT.

A Thorough Inspection—Needs—Di-
amond Head—Roads—Sprinkling—
Drainage—Race Course—Surveys.

The new Kapiolani Park Commis-
sion, appointed by President Dole, has
taken hold of the magnificent beauty
spot with a firm grasp and with the
determination to keep it up to the
standard and to make improvements
when means are afforded. The Star
is able, by the courtesy of Secretary
Thurston, to present the following ac-
count of a recent meeting of the Com-
mission:

MEMBERS PRESENT—W. G. Irwin,
Cecil Brown, E. S. Cunha, Paul Isen-
berg, Jr., and L. A. Thurston.

Mr. Thurston was unable to be pres-
ent owing to ill health.

INSPECTION OF THE PARK—The
Commissioners secured a wagonette
and drove in the Park for about two
hours, examining different points of
interest and matters which needed in-
vestigation.

BOUNDARIES OF PARK—A resolu-
tion was adopted instructing the Sec-
retary to obtain a map of the Park
and ascertain whether or not the pres-
ent westerly boundary of the Park
was the true boundary line or whether
some of the land lying beyond did
not belong to the Park. He was
authorized, if necessary, to secure the
services of a surveyor to investigate
this matter.

OWNERSHIP OF DIAMOND HEAD
—A resolution was also adopted in-
structing the Secretary to ascertain
whether or not Diamond Head was
under the control of the Park, and if
so, what the location of the boundary
line between the private property
along the foot of Diamond Head and
Diamond Head was. Mr. McCullom
stated that cattle pasturing on the
slopes of Diamond Head were killing
off the young trees.

PIPE FOR FLUSHING PONDS—A
resolution was adopted appointing W.
G. Irwin and Cecil Brown a committee
to wait on the Minister of the Interior
and see if he would not let the Com-
missioners have some of the secondhand
pipe belonging to the Government
sufficient to lay from the Government
artesian well at Waikiki, which runs
brackish water, and also to see whether
he would not allow the Commis-
sioners to lay such pipe from such
well and use the water for flushing
the ponds in the Park, as, under the
existing conditions, in dry weather
the water was insufficient to properly
flush the ponds and the odor from
them became offensive.

NEW ROAD ALONG THE WEST-
ERN BOUNDARY OF THE PARK—
Mr. Irwin stated that the road along
the western boundary of the Park cost
the Park more than all the other
roads put together, for the reason that
all of the rice raised on the rice fields
lying mauka of the Park was carted
to town over this road in heavy drays,
thereby cutting up the road and ruin-
ing it for pleasure purposes.

A resolution was adopted instruct-
ing the secretary to communicate
with the Minister of the Interior and
see whether the Government would
not bear the expense of building a
separate freight road down the west-
ern boundary of the Park in order to
preserve for park purposes the pres-
ent road, the location of such new
road to be decided upon when the
definite western boundary of the Park
was ascertained.

LEASE OF THE RACE COURSE—
Mr. Irwin stated that there was no
longer any lease on the race course,
to the Jockey Club, and that in his
opinion it was preferable to continue
on in the same way, charging the

Club or any one else when they used
the course; the charge made for use
of the course was from \$25 to \$50 a
day; separate rent was also charged
to those occupying stalls for training
horses and to those who occupied re-
freshment booths in the rear of the
main stand.

Mr. Cecil Brown concurred in Mr.
Irwin's opinion as to leasing the
course.

There was some general discussion
of the subject, but no definite action
taken.

DISPOSITION OF LAND IN THE
CENTER OF THE COURSE—There
was considerable discussion as to what
could be done with the land inside of
the race course.

Mr. Thurston suggested that coco-
nut trees might be planted as such
distances apart that they would not
interfere with the view of the course.

Mr. Irwin thought that they would
interfere no matter how far apart
they were planted. Mr. Brown thought
it would be a good idea if it were laid
out in a flower garden when money
sufficient therefor was available. No
definite action was taken.

SALE OF GRASS AND KLAWE
PODS—Mr. Irwin stated that some
time ago a Chinaman had been paying
\$300 a year for the privilege of cutting
grass and picking up the Klawe pods
in the Park. Lately this had been re-
duced to \$200 and now nothing was
being done, it being left to any one to
pick up the pods.

A resolution was passed authorizing
the Secretary to advertise for tenders
to cut grass and pick up pods in the
Park.

IMMEDIATE NEEDS OF THE
PARK—Mr. McCullom stated that
there were only three horses belong-
ing to the Park and no mules and that
it was quite necessary to have two
mules to carry on the work efficiently.
There being no money available no
action was taken.

WATERING CART—He also stated
that the present watering cart held
only 300 gallons and was insufficient
to water the Park roads going around
the outside road only. He wanted a
1200-gallon cart, which would require
two animals to pull and which would
be sufficient to water all of the roads
every day; watering the roads was a
great saving as it prevented their
wear.

No action was taken upon the mat-
ter, as the present income of the Park
is barely sufficient to pay running ex-
penses.

PRESENT INCOME OF PARK—Mr.
Irwin stated that the present income
of the Park was limited to the Govern-
ment appropriation of \$2,500 a year
and what was obtained from the sale
of grass and wood.

As a consequence of the blow last
year which blew down a number of
acres of trees he had sold firewood to
the amount of \$1,000, but this was an
extraordinary sale, the ordinary in-
come being only a few hundred dol-
lars.

BAND STAND—The Commissioners
inspected Makee Island and band
stand and improvements which had
been made there. The band stand had
been erected by subscription, and left
no margin over.

It was considered by the Commis-
sioners that the system of bridges in-
stituted at Makee Island should be ex-
tended so as to connect all of the
islands, but that course cannot be
pursued at present as there is no
money to pay for it.

THE EXTENSION OF THE ROAD
BEYOND DIAMOND HEAD—Mr.
Brown stated that the entire approp-
riation for that purpose had been ex-
pended, but that he had earnest hopes
that the extension would be made at
an early date.

Mr. Thurston suggested that if the
property owners beyond Diamond
Head would agree to contribute to-
ward the cost of the road, it would be
in their interest, and much more liable
to facilitate the obtaining of the ap-
propriation.

Mr. Isenberg said he would be will-
ing to contribute something toward
the extension of the road.

TIME OF MEETING—A resolution
was adopted setting 3 p. m. and the
first Wednesday in each month as the
time for holding meetings by the
Commissioners; the place to be the
office of W. G. Irwin.

ton hotel Thursday evening. Judge
Frear and Professor Colsten of Oahu
college will debate the merits of
classical vs. scientific institutions.
President Dole and Minister Smith will

OFFICERS ARE AT WORK HAS BEEN A BAD BOY

ANNEXATION CLUB OFFICIALS
HOLD IMPORTANT MEETINGS.

Committees Are Chosen—Covering the
Details—Lists to Be Put Out—Head-
quarters—Big Mass Meeting Soon.

The newly elected officers of the
Annexation Club have been active in
perfecting an organization. Two
meetings have been held in the law of-
fices of Lorin A. Thurston since the
club was placed on deck again at a
mass meeting earlier in the month.

At a meeting held late yesterday af-
ternoon, there was a full representa-
tion of the new corps of officers.
President Thurston presided and Sec-
retary J. L. McLean was on hand to
attend to the duties of his position.

President Thurston announced the
following committees:

Literature—A. V. Gear, C. B. Wood,
C. B. Ripley.

Finance—J. H. Fisher, B. F. Dilling-
ham, J. B. Atherton.

Printing—F. J. Lowrey, E. A. Jones,
Public Meetings and Speakers—L. C.
Ables, W. R. Sims, D. L. Naone, G. F.
McLeod.

Temporary headquarters were dis-
cussed and it was deemed advisable
to rent the vacant rooms on the ground
floor of a building on the makai side
of Merchant and just a few doors
above Fort street.

It is the plan of the present admin-
istration to employ an assistant sec-
retary at fair salary, whose duty it
will be to remain at headquarters and
receive callers and give out general in-
formation. The appointment will be
made this week.

The enrollment lists have been pre-
pared and will be put in circulation
tomorrow.

An organization committee will
likely be added to the list of commit-
tees. This committee will look after
the formation of new clubs.

The first public meeting of the new
club will be held on January 12 in the
Drill Shed. The public meetings com-
mittee will select a number of speak-
ers for the occasion.

The methods to be pursued under
the new regime was the all absorbing
topic under discussion at both meet-
ings. "The officers have decided to
inaugurate a campaign of education."

New clubs will be organized in Ho-
nolulu and on the other islands but all
must have membership in the general
club. This has been thought best as
it would enable the Hawaiians, Portu-
guese and those nationalities favoring
annexation to hold their own meet-
ings.

MONTAGUE-FAUST.

CONVICTED.

Judge De la Vergne this morning
announced his decision in the A. L.
Morris opium case. He found Morris
guilty and imposed a sentence of five
months in Oahu prison and \$500 fine.
"The evidence in the case is purely
circumstantial, but I find it conclu-
sive," said Judge De la Vergne, in giv-
ing his decision.

Attorneys Thurston and Davis, for
Morris at once gave notice of appeal
to the Circuit Court. Morris secured
bail for \$1,000 at once.

ELMER RUSSELL, THE CHILD VOC-
ALIST, GOING HOME.

Shipped by the Elsie Adair Company—
Misbehaved—Used a Pistol—Glad to
Get Home, He Says.

Among the through passengers on
the Belgic today was Elmer Russell,
the boy baritone of the Elsie Adair
company. He is being sent to his
home in Chicago by the manager of
the company, on account of his mis-
chievous propensities.

Young Russell endeavored to "jump"
the company shortly after it landed in
Shanghai.

While traveling on a steamer Rus-
sell shot a Chinaman in the leg with a
small gun, and a private letter, re-
ceived by the Belgic states that he
shot another Celestial in the face at
Tientsin.

While in Shanghai Russell took two
shots at W. C. Kenake, of Honolulu,
but both went wide of their mark.

Young Russell is calling upon his
Honolulu acquaintances today. He de-
nies that he is a "bad egg," and says
that he is glad to get back. The lad
is about 14 years of age.

nu cemetery today and placed aboard
the Belgic, to be taken to San Fran-
cisco. At San Francisco the remains
will be cremated and then sent on to
Mount Auburn, the final resting place.

BARK SELADON HAS BEEN POSTED BY LLOYD'S AS LOST.

Sixteen in the Crew—Coal for Honolulu—A Grand Rush of Big Steamers This Week—Hull Making a Trip.

The Waialeale got away on time last night for Kauai.

The Australia will sail at 4 p. m. tomorrow for the Golden Gate.

The Andrew Welch has backed out from the railway wharf into the stream.

The little steamer Lehua, sailing at 4 this afternoon, will take a full load of lumber for Hamakua.

The S. N. Castle and bark Ceylon are sharing the berth at Allen's wharf, the former taking sugar and the latter discharging.

The Aloha has moved over to Nuuanu wharf, where she will discharge her freight. She will remain there until the Belgic and Doric have cleared out.

The Likeli, sailing at 5 this afternoon, will take fifty-seven contract Chinese for Haiku and Paha. This will finish up the batch brought by the China.

The Miowara, from Vancouver, and Doric, from San Francisco will both be along tomorrow. These, with the Alameda on Thursday, the Belgic today and the Australia leaving tomorrow seems a bit like rushing things.

The coal bark Seladon, from Newcastle to this port, consigned to Wilder Co., has been posted by Lloyd's as missing. She is now out more than 150 days and no hopes are entertained that she will ever turn up. Officers and crew number sixteen men.

The Mikahala, arriving this afternoon, will sail again at 10 a. m. Friday on her new route to Maui and Hawaii. It is the purpose of the I. L. S. N. Co. to send the Manna Loa out two weeks from today on the same route. The Mikahala will then intermediate her trips.

The W. G. Hall came off the Marine railway this morning and will sail at 5 o'clock on the Mikahala's Kauai route. She will call at Nawiliwili for the accommodation of passengers only. When she returns she will receive her finishing touches and will then leave every Tuesday afternoon on the Kauai run.

The O. & O. S. S. Belgic, Captain I. H. Rinder, arrived at 7:30 this morning, ten days from Yokohama. Fair weather and a pleasant voyage. She brought four cabin passengers, thirty-six free Chinese, two free Japs and about 800 tons of freight for Honolulu. The Belgic will resume her voyage to San Francisco at 5 o'clock this afternoon.

The neat appearance of the bark Woolahra, now in port, has been the subject of considerable comment along the waterfront. She is painted a bright green, which is attractive and brings out her fine lines. The Woolahra was built at Sunderland, Eng., and is owned in Sydney. Her destination from this port is not yet known.

NEW CHURCH FOR HILO

FOREIGNERS TO PROVIDE THEMSELVES A FINE HOUSE.

Plans by Ripley & Dickey—To Cost \$20,000—A Double Auditorium—A Grade Organ Has Been Ordered.

The foreigners of Hilo of all church denominations have combined and they will worship together in one of the finest church edifices on the islands. The plans for the new structure have already been drawn by Architects Ripley & Dickey, of Honolulu, and the material has been ordered, and will be shipped direct from San Francisco to Hilo within the next fortnight. The estimated cost of the new building will be upwards of \$20,000. The present church has been in existence for a number of years.

Contractor H. S. Pratt, of this city, has the job. He was in Honolulu recently and stated that he would begin work the moment the material arrives and will rush the contract to its completion.

The Hilo Foreign Church, as it will be known, will have a shingle exterior down to the verandas, will be low-pitched with flamboyant arches and a large tower containing a clock. The clock has been donated by the Wetmores. It contains four glass dials, each five feet in diameter, and a bell of fine tone weighing 500 pounds. Electric light will be introduced to give the necessary light to show the time during the night.

The main auditorium, which is forty feet square, is entered through a broad porch in front of the church. The rostrum is in the corner with the organ loft back of it and the choir on the side. The gallery faces on two sides of the main auditorium.

The Sunday school room is on the same floor and it measures 25 by 40 feet. Adjoining this room are the ladies' parlor, pastor's study and library. The Sabbath school room is approached by a separate entrance. The gallery is reached by two stairways; one from the front porch and the other from the side porch. A large cloak room opens off of the front porch.

The chief feature of the architecture of the new church is the fact that the main auditorium and the Sunday school room can be thrown open into one large room by means of a sliding partition. The rostrum on which stands the pulpit is connected with a similar rostrum in the Sunday school room, when the entire building is thrown into one, the pulpit occupies the center of the auditorium. The arrangement is a very unique one.

Along with the new church has been purchased a magnificent organ, which is said to be the finest on the islands. It was bought through Mr. Bergstrom. By means of a reverse action the organist faces the choir and has the organ at his back.

Hilo foreigners have reason to feel proud of their proposed new church home.

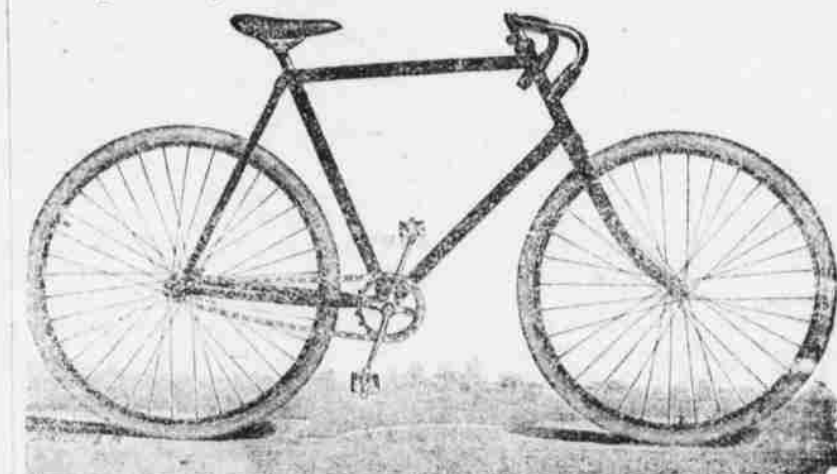

That Hilo is to have a new foreign church second to perhaps but one edifice of the character in the Islands is a sign of progress that is reassuring and pleasing. Hilo also has some quite creditable schools and other public buildings and is to have still more.

WATCH THE ENEMY.

The Advertiser quotes Gen. Porter as relating that Grant laid down as a principle of warfare the dictum: "Let the enemy take care of itself." The paper then proceeds to advise application of this rule to those engaged in renewal locally of the Annexation movement or agitation. Of course Grant did not declare this policy in the way it has been interpreted by the Advertiser. By doing so he would have ignored or disregarded completely not only a cardinal and fixed idea with all generals, but common sense as well. The fact is that Grant referred directly to the culminating incident in the chain of happenings which resulted in "Little Mac" being relieved of his command. McClellan had lost a glorious opportunity to "break the backbone" of the rebellion by pausing to permit the enemy to bury its dead. This was humane enough but under the hard adn fast conduct of war was regarded as fatal sentimentality. The Annexation forces here are being again marshalled in fine style, with spirit, earnestness and enthusiasm and with the certain and positive advance of an element held to a faith by profound belief in its merits. The Star would modestly suggest that a proper campaign feature is to watch the opposition closely. How else can effort aimed at defeat of Annexation be circumvented? Let the march be steadily forward on the lines laid down in the constitution of the new club, with a weather eye on opposition at home and abroad. Let it continue to be asserted and understood that the movement has one goal and that all who will help in reaching the same are welcome to the ranks. Watch all the time and remember that a renewal of organized opposition, such as was manifest in 1893-94 is threatened and may materialize at any time.

SCHOOL HOUSES.

The first thing the Gentiles did when they wrested control of Salt Lake City from the Mormons was to build more than a score of modern school houses. They did this before putting in sewers or paving streets. Up to the time of the change from a passive to an active administration school houses had been provided about as they have been in Hawaii. They were built by the mile and chopped off in desired sizes. Just as here they were one, two, three and four room houses, perhaps picturesque in their downright homeliness and meanness. Under the new administration here, especially since the star chamber or independent Board gave place to the Bureau with a Cabinet Minister at the head and with disbursements subject to Finance Department checking, there has been wondrous improvement. But little more progress can be made excepting to maintain and add to general excellence until there is co-operation and further assistance from the Legislature. The Star wishes to make a preliminary plea for new school houses and for more of them. Aside from the new High School building there is not a structure devoted to education here worthy the cause or the city. Some of them are little less than disreputable. Take the Bereania street public school for instance. It is a low, unpretentious house not so good as the average workingman's cottage. It has lately been enlarged in fearfully makeshift manner. And this is the story of scores of school buildings throughout the group. Everywhere, almost, they are unworthy and inefficient. The school population is increasing very rapidly and it must be accommodated. Let the new buildings be up to date, creditable structures. There are no reasons for clinging to stereotyped box plans. For a small house try something after the design of the Child's Garden building in the grounds at Bereania and Alapai. The larger structures should

have some distinctiveness in architecture. What is required for these purposes is the practical sympathy of the legislators. Public sentiment cannot but be with the Bureau in the desire to have better houses.

OAHU SUGAR COMPANY STOCK
NOW ON THE MARKET.Success of Mr. B. F. Dillingham's Pro-
ject—Work to Begin Very Soon—A
Very Lively Listing of Subscribers.The new Oahu plantation is going
as the Star has reported from time to
time.The Oahu Sugar company will be in-
corporated and organized within the
next fortnight with H. Hackfeld & Co.
as agents. The capital stock will be
listed at \$1,800,000. Fully two-thirds
of this amount was subscribed by noon
today. H. Hackfeld & Co., took a
block of \$500,000.Mr. B. F. Dillingham is authorized
to receive subscriptions for the next
ten days. This will allow persons on
the other islands to secure stock if
they so desire. The company will be
organized with ordinary holdings with
the exception of the large amount
placed in the enterprise by Hackfeld
& Co.In June last Mr. B. F. Dillingham,
who has done much toward promoting
big enterprises in Hawaii, gave an op-
tion to Hackfeld & Co. on the land and
water possession that he had secured.
This brought about a visit to Germany
by Mr. Paul Isenberg, Sr., who laid
the plans of the new company before
several German capitalists.Upon his return Mr. Isenberg stated
publicly that he had been partly suc-
cessful. More time was needed. Every-
body has been waiting with the great-
est anxiety to learn of the outcome.

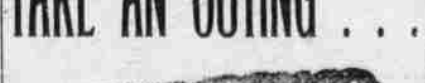
