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

#### MUTUALLY DEPENDENT.

The planter cannot succeed without the mechanic and the laborer, nor can the mechanic and thelaborer subsist without the planter. They are mutually dependent on each other, and it is the interest of each to serve the interest of the other, for thereby self-interest is promoted. Nine-tenths of everything in this country lean upon the back of the planter, and without the "bone-andsinue" class to support him, he will have no back to lean upon. It is absurd for either to profess independence of the other. The planter knows this, but the other is sometimes too wooden-headed to perceive

"What dependence upon the planter has the laborer or the mechanic who earns his bread in Honolulu?" is a question just now propounded to us. We answer by another question or two: What employment would there be in Hono-Iulu for mechanics, laborers, merchants, shop-keepers, lawyers, doctors, editors, or anybody else, were the planter dead and buried? Whence comes the means to maintain trrde and manufactures, to erect buildings, to effect improvements, and in brief, to keep alive the capital city, if not from the planter?

We have frequently heard it said within the last day or two past, that the planter has too much of his own way, that too much consideration is shown him in legislation and administration, that he has become arrogant and should have his wings clipped, and much more in the same strain. This may be all true. We do not know, however, and do not believe, that it is.

It is certainly contrary to the genius of our Constitution to allow any man or class of men a superiority to others before the law, or to confer upon any the power of oppressing their fellow men of any color or country whatever; and we cordially endorse the Constitution. But while denying to the planter any special prerogatives or privileges, we would be very careful not to withhold any which are his natural heritage or constitutional legacy. Those who talk of "clipping his wing" are, unconsciously no doubt, seeking to "kill the hen which lays the golden egg." Considering the paramount importance to this country of the planting interest, no sensible man could ever wish to see it crippled with an oppressive embargo. Enlightened policy and wise statesmanship are opposed to the imposition of burdensome restrictions and harrassing impediments to our one great industry. So far as can be, consistent with the general good, it should be encouraged and fostered by liberal legislation.

### "LET THERE BE PEACE."

"Let there be peace," says the "Gazette." Amen, say we. Peace is what we want-"peace with honor" and the maintenance of constitutional law; but not peace with dishonor, humiliation, and shuffling. Unrest and disquiet have agitated this little community for years; but it was earnestly hoped that the popular uprising which culminated in a new Constitution would bring contentment, satisfaction, and peace. When that document was scattered around the streets of Honolulu by the Marshal of the Kingdom, the people eagerly seized copies and retired to their homes, believing that an era of prosperty and peace had commenced. Since then but five short months have passed, and yet the hopeful and confiding people have seen that very Constitutionthe bulwark of their rights and liberties-deliberately violated by

it and were solemnly sworn to support it. Reflective men can feel no satisfaction nor cry ''peace, peace' under these circumstances, knowing full well that if the Constitution can be violated in one article it may be violated in all. No, no, this kind of thing is not calculated to ensure peace, and it is not merely "a small circle of aspirants to office" who think so.

#### "HONOR THE KING."

The King is the Head of the Government, and as such the Head of the Nation. A Constitution emanating from the People and promulgated by the King on the 7th day of July, 1887, declares the Government of this Kingdom to be "A Constitutional Monarchy, under His Majesty Kalakaua, His Heirs and Successors."

Proper and becoming respect is at all times due to the King as Head of the Nation. A person wanting in that respect is either destitute of breeding or of the instincts of a gentleman.

When the unknown person signing himself "Junius" attacked the King of England in a series of published letters, he criticised the actions and conduct of His Majesty in the most cutting and scathing language, but always respectfully. Never once that we can remember from our reading did he forget or omit the respect due the Head of the Nation. Junius was a gentleman, and the productions of his pen are specimens of classical English and plain, pointed, incisive, digni-

fied criticism of men in high places. Junius, an educated English gentleman, invariably evinced deep respect for a national Head whose course was subversive of the rights and liberties of the subject, and whose doings he undertook to dissect, analyze, and expose in language extremely severe; but here in this Kingdom of Hawaii, where the Head of the Nation is placed by the Constitution in the position of a reigning Sovereign, with responsible Ministers, and who has given unmistakable proof of his willingness to be guided by their counsel, becoming respect is sometimes wanting in speeches made in the House. This scents of the backwoods academician and not of

EDITOR BULLETIN:-It seems to me and many others that there is something 'rotten in Denmark' with our whole reform. To prove this, one need not go far. The grumbling and dissatisfaction seem to increase daily, perhaps hourly, and what is more significant still is the fact that this fault finding is not alone confined to a class of men, whose intelligence, social standing or power is below notice, but seems to have taken root actually among the very best of this community. Surely there must be some reason for this; certainly some explanation could be offered. Is it perchance that the very spirit and intent of our much expected new Constitution does not pervade and unite, invigorate or vivify every part of our little Kingdom? Striking discord where unity was expected, blighting hopes where certainties were looked for, lowering selfrespect when all Hawaii had risen as one man to maintain the honor of their nation's flag?

If this new inaugurated order of affairs has not brought all and every one of the above mentioned evils about, still who would dare truthfully to aver that this has not been the case in a great many instances? I don't think that any of those present will forget the disgust and disappointment when the new Magna Charta of little Hawaii saw its first light of day among the people who asked as with one voice, "was this what we were ready to fight for?" Was this the best the wisdom of the Kingdom would give us? But our feelings at that time were quickly quieted. We had leaders and we had work to do. We were told that certain objections would be remedied "as soon as possible," and trusting to our champions we went ahead, finishing the work of our Leaders, and finished ourselves, our unity with it, finding ourselves this very day without leaders, without one single man who would dare to say "come, follow me, these are my sentiments! this is my policy!" If I am wrong, please correct, and I will gladly be instructed; but if right, then I and many others say, give us a policy to follow, give us leader either in the Cabinet or

Legislature. The question than with you gen-tlemen of the Cabinet and Legislature is, not whether you have a right to forsake the people and render them miserable; but whether it is not your interest to unite them and

Who would dare to deny the right of men to demand a change, under existing circumstances? Or is it that people are overawed by a certain puritament bred sect who intend falling into the same ways of the old regime, with only this change, that they and theirs shall have all the good things now while formerly Mr. Gibson had them?

The times when the Calvanistic followers of Satan held high sway and commanded the people who were foolish enough to cater to the demands of those hypocrites have gone by. Now the electors with their majestic right and might dictate their wants to their representatives who are bound to carry out the sacred demands of their constituents, the Ministry meantime pursuing their policy, and responsible for their acts to the peoples voice? Have we this now? Or does

#### FROM BAD TO WORSE.

EDITOR BULLETIN: - Matters seem to be going from bad to worse in the Legislature. After the Hitchcock episode had cleared the political atmosphere somewhat, by a wholesome censure of the Cabinet for a violation of the Constitution, the Attorney-General confessed to further deliberate breaches of the organic law.

During Tuesday's proceedings the Attorney-General confessed to having retained three other lawyers, members of the Legislature, to act for the Government in certain cases. A fee had been paid in one instance, and fees were promised in the other. The members implicated are Messrs. Castle, Smith and Kinney to have participated in drafting the new Constitution, which was ap-

some of these gentlemen are known proved July 7, 1887, they must have known that they were violating the express provision of Article 20 of that instrument, by accepting "emolument from the Government." besides forfeiting their seats in the Legislature. There is no ambiguity about the Article in question, and the disqualification expressed in it was put there to satisfy popular demand, and as the complement of "reform." It should there-fore have been held sacred by its framers, who were placed in office by a popular uprising to give it effect. But the first opportunity that arises for trampling it underfoot and reverting to former practices, was seized upon with avidity by the Attorney-General.

Article 20 of the Constitution, so far as it relates to the qualification of members of the Legislature, reads as follows: "No executive or judicial officer, or any contractor or employee of the Government, or any person in the receipt of salary or emolument from the Government, shall be eligible to election to the Legislature of the Hawaiian Kingdom, or to hold the position of an elective member of the same," Under this Article of the Constitution the seats of the Hons. D. H. Hitchcock, W. R. Castle, W. O. Smith and W. Kinney are forfeited, and should be forthwith declared vacant by the Legislature. They are not competent to take part in any Legislative work, being absolutely disqualified. The duty of the Legislature is clear in the premises. CONSTITUTION.

### MINISTERIAL RESPONSIBILITY.

EDITOR BULLETIN: - Ministers cannot now allege that they coloy the confidence of the Legislature. A majority of 31 to 10 censured the Attorney-General for violating Article 20 of the Constitution; but as the preamble to the resolution declared that the Attorney-General acted in this matter with the consent of his colleagues the entire Cabinet is included in this con-

demnation. If Ministers hold to the principle of responsible Government they should resign. If they had a modicum of selfrespect they would do so; but if they should be lacking in appreciation of the spirit of responsible Government and were entirely innocent of self respect, then the Legislature should compel their resignation, by adopting an address to the King calling his attention to the resolution aforesaid, and requesting him to exercise the power of dismissal conferred upon him by Article 41 of the Constitution of law you may do, but what you are July 7th, 1887. One of the most solemn promises. i. e., (to the Portuguese) the Asiatic immigration stopped, and, more still, the passports granted by the "old fraud" would be, if not cancelled, severely investigated and the parties identified. But where are all those promises? Where is their fulfilment? Alas! After the easy chair is gotten it matters not how.

By this time it must appear clear to all who are impartial, that it is not intended by the ruling clique to treat the Portuguese with true regard to equality of race or nationality. This clique is prejudiced against the Portuguese, and the common excuse that they are too costly and so on is only a hand full of dust thrown on their eyes, and an effort to prejudice people against them. I say the intentions of that clique is to screw them down and prevent them to get on a level with the other white people, because if they did, it is feared that other in-

terests would be spoiled. Instead of this narrow policy, clearly surprising from the Reform party, why does not this country or Government adopt the system so successfully carried on by our great neighbors, the United States of America, where not only Portuguese but every nationality is awarded the same rights and privileges. The only way that a nation can prosper is to allow every man to obtain fortune through his industry, but here where a part of our community is trying to hold the black snake and the infamous contract system over the laborer, we never will prosper; a few of the said clique, the planters, may thrive, but the laborers will remain slaves. And the dream of these islands being in the hands of the people in general and not of the planters, as we were told on the 30th day of June last, that dream is well nigh vanished by the neglect of fulfilment of the promises made specially to us.

#### A REMEDY FOR THE COMMON WART

It is very pleasing to know that a cure for the common wart, so unthe hands and face, has been announced by physicians. According to the Medical Press, small doses of sulphate of magnesia taken internally will remove them. M. Corat, of Lyons, has drawn attention to this extraordinary fact. Several children treated with three grains of Epsom salts, morning and evening, were promptly cured. M. Aubers cities the case of a woman whose face was disfigured by these excrescences, and who was cured in a mouth by a dram and a half of magnesia taken daily. Another man reports a case of large warts which disappeared in a fortnight from the daily administration of ten grains of salts.

CROTON-WATER. According to the Sanitary Journal, a district including 239 square miles, in which the water that supplies New York City is collected, contains a population of 20,000 persons, nearly 2,000 dwellings, the same number of privies and cerspools, nearly as man barn-yards and pig pens, and, in addition, cemeteries, slaughter-houses, and other sources of animal decay and filth. 


