Public servants receive special recognition

The Commonwealth Utilities Corporation (CUC) was named as this year's recipient of the Agency of the Year award while CUC Executive Director Ray S. Guerrero headed the list of government employees who were given recognition for their efforts in providing quality public service to the community during the awards banquet held at the Aqua Resort poolside Sunday evening.

Gov. Larry I. DeLeon Guerrero led department agency heads in recognizing the service

22 CNMI personnel employed in different government agencies.

The awards banquet was the kick-off event for the week-long celebration of Public Recognition Week.

Since its inception in 1985, this is the first time the CNMI will join 320 cities in the United States and Guam in recognizing the achievements of the more than 20 million men and women who work in the federal state and local government.

In conjunction with the celebration, a Breakfast of Champions was held Monday morn-

ing honoring all department Employee of the Year nominees and department PSRW committees.

Special in-house department/activity employee award ceremonies have also been scheduled for the rest of the week.

Also recognized during Sunday's gathering were former Department of Public Works (DPW) Director Nick Sablan who was named as the Director of the Year and the DPW as the Department of the Year.

Gregorio Torres Sablan of the Department of Public Works, including 12 other government employees, were also given spe-

cial recognition for their length of service to the government.

Sablan headed the list of awardees as he has been connected with the government for the past 40 years.

Beautification, community service and exceptional service awards were also given to several government agencies.

Students who participated in the poster and essay writing contest were also given recognition for their entries.

Nicole Butalid, 16, of Grace Christian Academy earned first place in the essay writing

division while six year-old Inas Hocog garnered first place for his entry in the poster design contest.

The employees of the year awardees were chosen by their colleagues and supervisors to represent nearly all governmental departments on Saipan and Tinian.

Those who have been named as department employees of the year will then vie for the recognition of CNMI Employee of the Year who will be recognized during the annual Labor Day gathering.

Marianas officials, staff travel to Washington

CNMI Delegates to the Covenant 902 talks left for Washington Friday.

The CNMI team is headed by Lt. Governor Benjamin T. Manglona to meet US Delegates for the 10th round of talks on May 13.

The Covenant 702 talks will also be held on the 16th and 17th of this month.

Other 902 representatives who left Friday include House Speaker Pedro Guerrero, Senator Herman Guerrero, Joe Lifofoi, while Maria Pangelinan will leave this week.

Washington Rep. Babauta, the groups' co-chairman will meet them in Washington, where he holds office.

Manglona, in an earlier inter-

view, said that they are expecting that the US President's permanent representative will be among the US delegates.

He also said that the 10th round of talks will be a continuation of the pending issues, as the exclusive economic zone, submerged land and other items.

The 702 talks, on the other hand, will come next after the 902 discussion, it will be the second meeting this year.

The first meeting was held on Saipan from April 4 to 5 and the US delegate was headed by OTIA Assistant Secretary Stella Guerra.

Manglona's 702 team will be composed of Speaker Guerrero, Senate President Joseph Inos, Finance Director Eloy Inos, Planning and Budget Officer David Sablan, and Mike

Garapan water system sees surplus funding

The Commonwealth Utilities Corporation told members of the House of Representatives the urgent need to come up with the funding for the upgrade of the Garapan water distribution system, which already poses health risk.

House Speaker Pedro Guerrero, on the other hand, responded and cited that the house recently passed the supplemental budget and that \$2.7 million of the bulk will be allocated "to remedy the water distribution system in Garapan."

In a letter to Speaker Guerrero, CUC Executive Director Ray

Guerrero said that there are thirteen miles of water pipes serving the Garapan area... "most pipes are 40 years old and asbestos-cement made."

CUC's Guerrero further informed the house that there are at least one million gallons of water being lost each day due to "severe leaks."

According to Guerrero, leaking asbestos-cement pipes "present two serious dangers to the public..."

His letter specified that a "combination of permeable pipes and water hour creates a situation where sewage or sewage-contaminated water penetrates

the water supply lines."

When such occurrence takes place, water delivered to various houses will contain portions of the pipe... "When septic system effluent comes into contact with these pipes, the contaminated liquid is sucked inside."

Guerrero said that through that process, public water supply will contain "pathogenic organism" that can cause cholera, typhoid, hepatitis among many others.

Furthermore, the letter mentioned that asbestos fibers in old pipes "slough off" into the water supply, causing gastrointestinal cancer.

According to the CUC head,

the Environmental Protection Agency have already included asbestos among contaminants that should be regulated in water supplies.

He stressed that the EPA likewise confirmed that there is "risk of asbestos" in the water system supplies for Garapan area.

Guerrero told the house that one effort to resolve the problem was by soliciting proposals for the design of the Garapan system upgrade.

He said that they have chosen a "local engineering firm" which submitted a 64-

Labor Dept. needs employers cooperation

The CNMI Contractors Association held Saturday evening its monthly meeting, with Assistant Chief of Labor Juan Q. Inos as guest speaker. He spoke on various labor regulations.

Assistant Chief of Labor Inos likewise touched on labor problems the department is experiencing right now.

He said that their common problem includes backpay and living quarters of employees.

No salary deduction should be asked for room and board of employees, unless that agreement is included in the contract, he mentioned.

Inos provided that those workers receiving less than the \$2.15 minimum wage should be given free housing by the employer.

And in cases where housing is deducted, the maximum deduction should only be \$50, which could only be increased upon justification at the labor office.

"One can not deduct more than the actual amount of the house..." he said.

He mentioned that salaries and wages should be guaranteed to be given during payment time..."Should have reserve funds for it."

Inos also voiced out that workers already concurring 40 hours of work should be receiving overtime..."if exempted from it, such as fisherman and maids...they should still receive extra compensation."

According to him, every working man should be paid..."there is nothing free on

earth."

The Assistant Chief of Labor urged members of the association should do things right..."we are available to render any assistance...we are here to help you."

Inos said that the Department of Commerce and Labor functions to enforce the law, reiterating that even though a lot of people does not accept labor laws..."still our responsibility is to enforce."

He reminded members of the association that if anybody who does feel that the laws should be changed, the best thing to do is go to the legislature which creates laws.

According to Inos, as the years passed by, labor regulations goes on changing due to so many amendments passed and introduced by various lawmakers.

He cited that it all started in Public Law 3-66 which provided for the hiring of non-resident workers in the CNMI, then it was amended by PL 5-32.

His remarks pointed out that PL 5-32 called for a stricter employment of alien workers such as prohibiting their transfer from one job to another, and prohibiting the issuance of temporary workers' permit.

He mentioned that the PL further established a maximum of four years for non-resident workers, although with exemption.

Then came PL 6-28 which amends PL 5-32 four-year limit stay..."now there is no limit for alien workers."

PL 6-39, another amendment later, allowed several leniencies in hiring of certain employment classifications, he said.

According to him, the most recent statute that will provide new enforcement by them is PL 7-19, requiring all financial statements and records of all business establishments to be written in English.

The guest speaker then encouraged all association members to start complying with the new regulation.

Richard Szimel, President of the association presided over the meeting.

He announced that the association has now a total of \$6,597 funds, with new members like Empress Enterprises, PM and O Lines.

Szimel also announced in the meeting that they will soon come up with a newsletter.

NMC 10th charter day celebrated

Students from the Northern Marianas College (NMC) celebrated the school's 10th Charter Day with festivities that featured a number of musical and cultural performances from the school's students.

Booths selling food and native handicrafts were also set up by five student organizations and groups in the school. Associated Students president John Oliver Gonzales said that they hope to promote the NMC through its Charter Day which will become an annual community event.

The festivities started with a release of balloons marking the event. Opening ceremonies were attended by Gov. Larry I. DeLeon Guerrero, NMC President Agnes McPhetres, NMC Board of Regents Chair Bennett Seman and Gonzales.

In his speech, Gov. Guerrero said that the NMC has become an institution of higher learning where both academic and vocational education can be availed of.

Guerrero noted that the growth of the College coincided with the growth of the Commonwealth as well as its prosperity.

NMC President McPhetres

paid tribute to three individuals who have contributed to the growth and success of the college.

McPhetres made mention of former Gov. Carlos S. Camacho's vision and faith in the future of higher education in the CNMI through the College.

The College President also cited the contributions made by Felicidad Ogumoro-Uludong who, as one of the CNMI's first woman legislators, initiated a task force that studied the possibility of initiating a college in the CNMI and former Dean Kit Porter for her coordinating efforts during the period when the NMC coordinated teacher education programs being taught at the Universities of Guam and Hawaii and the San Jose State University.

McPhetres also cited the contributions made by the late Misael Ogo who introduced the bill which became Public Law 3-43 separating the College from the Department of Education.

From 1981 to 1983, the NMC was merely a "paper" college whose major function was to coordinate and administer training programs within the Commonwealth Government.

The College's major work

was to coordinate teacher education programs being taught by accredited universities so that CNMI teachers could meet the 1978 Board of Education policy requiring all teachers in the Commonwealth to earn at least an Associate degree to teach in the public school system.

The NMC started with 78 students in 1983 and offered limited programs for transfer credits to a comprehensive college offering its own accredited degrees in academic, professional and vocational areas as well as certificated programs in both technical and vocational education.

The College used a 10'x20' building at the edge of the Marianas High School campus to coordinate classes taught in the high school classrooms.

The College currently sponsors commencement exercises with two or three other colleges offering baccalaureate and master's degrees to local graduates.

Odoshi Miss Chamolinian

Begonia Odoshi, a senior student of the Marianas High School won the Ms. Chamolinian during the 13th Annual Marianas High School Cultural Heritage Day held on the school campus, according to a PSS press release.

Funding to construct stairway to Mt. Tapochao sought

A plan to improve and beautify the area leading to the statue of the risen Christ in Mount Tapochao is being planned by the special projects committee of the Saipan Chamber of Commerce (SCC).

Speaking before the regular monthly meeting of the group, special projects committee

member Justice Ramon Villagomez said that the plan to construct a stairway that will lead to the monument and the improvement of the outlying area will help tour agencies boost and improve tour activities to the place.

The committee plans to construct a narrow walkway that will lead to the statue so as to make it more accessible, safer

and convenient for the tourists. The project will be constructed in a way that will enhance and not destroy the natural terrain of the area.

Villagomez said that the project, which is expected to amount to \$23,000, will be constructed in three phases.

The project's first phase which

is the proposed walkway leading to the statue is expected to cost \$7,000. The second and third phases of the project will be to convert the area surrounding the statue into a mini-park and another walkway that will lead to the southern end of the mountain.

Villagomez said that the committee will solicit monetary contributions from some of the

tour agencies on the island. Initially, Villagomez said the Chamber of Commerce will be able to provide a \$2,000 starting fund.

He said that the help of various civic organizations such as the Saipan Rotary Club and the Marianas Visitor's Bureau will also be solicited for the construction of the project.

Zoning for Saipan close to reality

The need to enforce and implement performance zoning on Saipan before the island experiences uncontrolled development, this is the main thrust of Zoning Administrator Cindy Bower-Camacho's presentation at the regular monthly luncheon of the Saipan Chamber of Commerce.

Camacho introduced to the Chamber members the function of her office and the varied ways by which performance zoning can benefit and help Saipan maintain its natural beauty.

Camacho informed the Chamber members about the work being done by the Zoning Board which is tasked to develop a zoning code and a land use plan for Saipan. The Zoning Board is currently working in finalizing a series of issue papers which will be used as a basis for the discussion of zoning needs and concerns within the community.

The issue papers will be disseminated to the community so the agency can gather data and information that will attempt to seek solutions to the problems confronting Saipan.

The Zoning Code will only be applicable to Saipan however, Camacho said that she hopes the Tinian and Rota delegation will also show interest to the code so that it could be applied on their respective islands.

Camacho said the new zoning code will be applicable once a new developer shows interest at a particular site.

The Zoning administrator has also been meeting with various civic organizations and government agencies to discuss about the concept of performance zoning.

Robberies acts increase on Saipan recently

A Japanese tourist was robbed of her bag containing \$400 in cash, about 55,000 in yen and personal documents by an unknown assailant whom she described as a long haired and dark complexioned man.

30-year old Yoshimi Sumikama told responding police that she was walking near the vicinity of the GIG Discotheque in Garapan at about 8 p.m. Saturday when she was approached by the unidentified man.

Capt. Frank Duenas of the Department of Public Safety said that the assailant punched Sumikama in the forehead and tried to grab her bag.

Duenas said that the unknown assailant was able to get away with the loot after he punched Sumikama twice in the stomach area.

The assailant fled the scene through a get-away vehicle and

no arrest has been made, Duenas said.

Sumikama was later transported to the hospital for treatment.

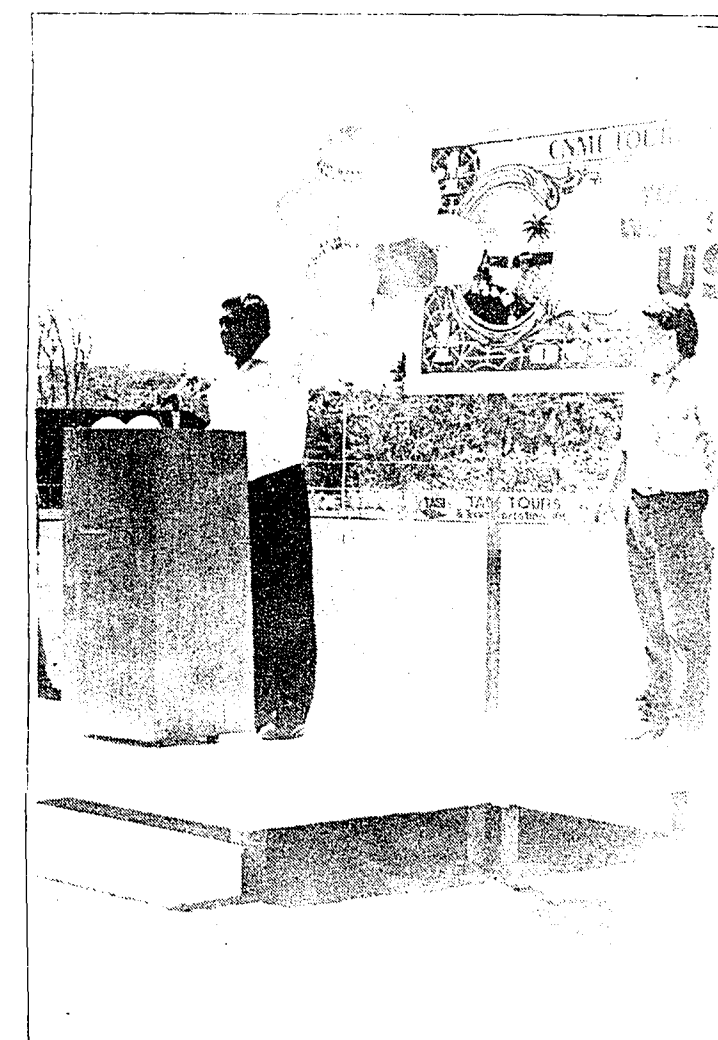
Duenas said the case is still under investigation.

In other news:

*Police are still investigating a robbery involving a Korean national who reported that two unknown assailants robbed him of his wristwatch worth \$1,500 at the Lim's Building in San Jose early Sunday morning.

Duenas said 39-year-old Chang H. Shin of Capitol Hill reported to the police that he was driving his car heading south from Garapan when he noticed a car following him.

Based on the police report, Shin said he was attacked by the assailants when he stopped his

car at the parking lot of the building at about 2:35 a.m. Sunday.

Duenas said that one of the attackers hit Shin with a metal object in the facial area while the other sprayed tear gas.

No one was arrested for the incident, Duenas said.

*34-year-old Carissa Sablan was arrested Saturday evening

in connection with a robbery which allegedly occurred at the Western part of Garapan.

Duenas said that the victim, Allan Myers of San Antonio said that he and Sablan went for a ride around the area when Sablan allegedly forced to take out a \$100 bill from his pocket.

Myers said that Sablan also forced him to get out of his car.

NMI Crime Stoppers Week proclaimed

CNMI Governor Larry I. Guerrero signed last Friday two proclamations declaring the week starting May 12 to 18 as the 'Commonwealth Crime Stoppers Week' and beginning Monday until Friday this week will be the 'Law Enforcement Week.'

Attending the separate signing includes Cong. Stanley Torres, Justice Ramon Villagomez, DPS Director Greg Camacho, and other government officials.

According to the proclamation, the crime stoppers program was established on April 26, 1989 by the Rotary Club of Saipan with the prime purpose of involving

the public in fighting crimes and criminal activities.

It said that the program assisted individuals by providing a method of reporting crimes committed or about to be committed, without exposing themselves.

According to the signed proclamation, setting aside one week each year is then needed to reduce crime in the CNMI and honor those people responsible for it.

The other proclamation, the law enforcement week, provides that the Commonwealth's future "lies in the quality of life enjoyed by every levels of the society."

It said that the safety of all lives and property is a big factor in determining the quality of life, where in CNMI law enforcement "continues to demonstrate positive growth and improvement for our betterment."

According to the proclamation, law enforcement plays an important role in the society, which must be supported and designating one week will recognize law enforcers.

The Governor then urge ev-

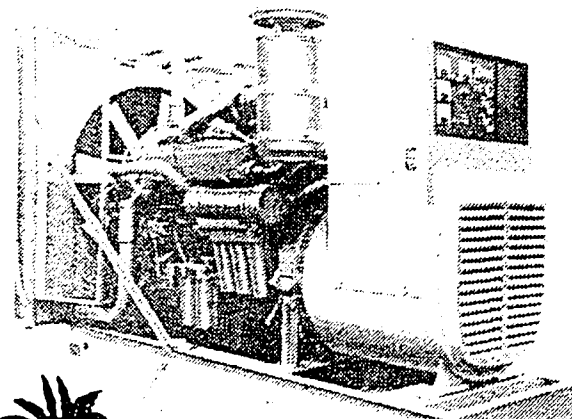
erybody present to participate in programs and activities that will contribute to the betterment of both the law enforcement community and the general public.

Foundation to channel funds for CNMI possible

CNMI Governor Larry I. Guerrero expressed Friday that the Commonwealth is still in the process of discussing the possibility of foreign private investors

channeling funds to the government through a private foundation.

Gov. Guerrero said that this could be done through the establishment of a Marianas Improvement Foundation.

He said that the foundation will serve as a "conduit between the government and foreign private companies...and majority of the funding will come from Japanese firms."

The members of the foundation, which will serve as the board of Trustees, will be composed of three Japanese, three Americans and three NMI residents. Names of the members were not identified.

The Japanese members will collectively collect those contributions that will be coming in, that will be funneled to the foundation, the US part of it is basically administering and overseeing the foundation, he said.

He added that "money from the foundation would be turned to the CNMI government in the form of low interest loans for infrastructure development."

The Gov. said that it will function like a development bank...but still do not know how

much money can be loaned...the length period of time given before we start paying, and at what interest rate..."

He said that those things still has to be resolved by the members of the Board of Directors.

He cited that other key things that needs to be established is how will the foundation receive the money and "how can we best use the money."

The Governor also clarified that the being formed Japanese League of Friendship is far different from the concept of the Marianas Improvement Foundation.

Guerrero, earlier in his State of the Commonwealth Address said that "We are optimistic about this concept...firmly believe that with the assistance of such a foundation, new projects to remedy our infrastructure problems will begin soon."

He likewise stated earlier that the State Department voiced no opposition over the funds that

will come from a foreign business source and not a foreign government.

In a PDN Column by Jack Anderson Column, Ex-Sen. James McClure is said to head the foundation which will channel the funding to the CNMI.

The Governor, when "informed" did not make any comment.

The Anderson Column said that the foundation makes some CNMI government officials "nervous," since it would be administered by the US.

Governor Guerrero then said that materials being referred to still has to be reviewed, which might be misinformed.

However, he said that funding is not necessarily to be sifted to Washington...it is not that we don't want it, in as much as we like it."

Gov. Guerrero said that what he is concerned more is the benefits that the CNMI can actually get from it.

Saipan Cable responds to customer needs

Saipan Cable TV refuted contentions made by Washington Resident Representative Juan Babauta that they are not providing good service before the general public.

Saipan Cable TV Acting General Manager Ernie Galito, through a letter sent Friday, told Rep. Babauta that his comment about the cable's "lacking interest in providing good service is 'unjustified.'"

"The cable company has provided many hours of good television service over the past 16 years..." Galito stressed.

Galito's letter is in response to Babauta's letter to Sandra McKenzie who was asking assistance from the Washington Representative on how cable TV's monopoly on the Commonwealth can be stopped.

McKenzie's letter mentioned "severe problems on Cables' services and maintenance of their equipments."

Babauta then shared McKenzie's concern and promised that he will bring the matter into the US Congress, which is conducting hearing on local and federal regulatory levels of cable companies.

Galito's letter informed the rep. that McKenzie's reception problem was repaired the same day she called Saipan Cable and wrote Babauta... "we apologized to her."

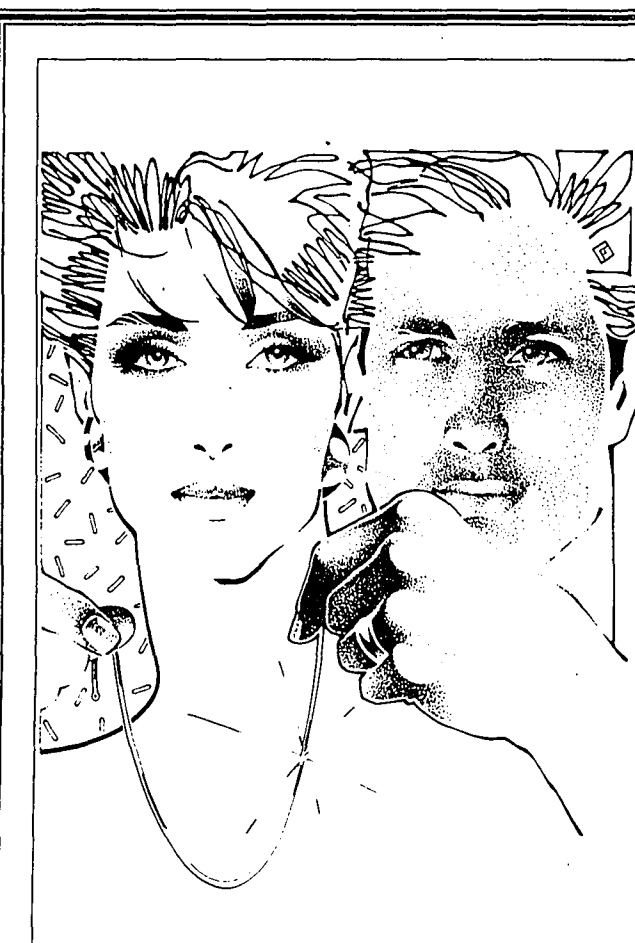
It said that Saipan Cable TV responds "faster than anyone else on Saipan...when customer complaints are neglected, we try to correct the employees or managers that were responsible."

According to him, back in 1976, they started only with two channels up to the present capacity of 23 basic channels and 5 premium movie channels... "making sure that customer needs are tended to."

Cables' letter pointed out that Babauta need not seek legislative regulation... "it is unnecessary..."

It explained that complaints from customers are just normal in any business, adding that it is the

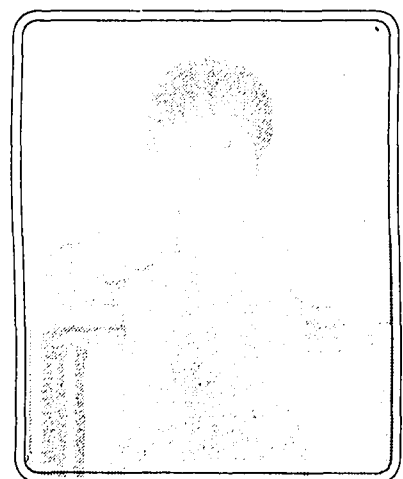

Gov. signs Historic Preservation proclamation week

Governor Larry I. DeLeon Guerrero signed on Friday a proclamation designating May 12-18 as CNMI Historic Preservation Week.

An on-site lecture and tour of the Kagman archeological site is one of the major highlights of the week's celebration.

The Historic Preservation Office will also mount a display of artifacts featuring a unique

collection of indigenous and the most recent historic collections, a series of lectures on historic preservation and archeology in the CNMI and a video presentation about the department's program are also some of the

scheduled activities in observance of the week.

The tour of the Kagman Latte site consists of an on-site visitation to six sets of latte stone structures situated at a minimum of 5 to approximately 10 hectares of land in the Kagman area.

The site is the largest and the most well preserved latte village yet discovered on Saipan. Besides the latte stones, visitors will also see mortar stones which were used by the ancients to plant foods and to prepare medicines.

The week-long display of artifacts at the department's office in Lower Base will feature some of the unique collection which the department has preserved

over the years of work in various sites throughout the CNMI.

CNMI Historic Week is celebrated in conjunction with the National Historic Preservation Week which is observed annually in the Mainland.

The department was created so as to promote the study and appreciation and understanding of the CNMI heritage. It also functions in matters dealing with land-use developers and environmental concerns.

The department is also responsible for the review of all construction projects to ensure that they do not damage or destroy archeological, historical and cultural properties.

page set of design drawing with specifications, costing about \$256,000. The letter pointed out that the CUC have already chosen a contractor through bidding, whose estimate for the construction of the system is placed at \$2.8 million.

The utilities corporation, to that effect, said they can not issue Notice to Proceed since they do not have the money... "I am hereby asking for your assistance."

Speaker Guerrero, in an immediate response, said that the legislature is "very much aware" of Garapan's water system... "allocating the sum of \$2.7 million in the Supplemental Budget"

He cited that the amount will be used for both the Garapan and Gualo Rai water line and pipe replacement project.

The Speaker concluded that they will soon be contacting the CUC once the funding is "affirmed".

The house passed the surplus budget with the \$2.7 M funding, but final approval will have yet to be decided by the Senate.

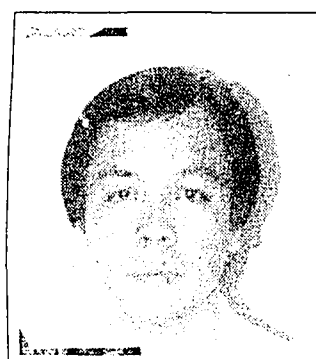

Gov. signs Historic Preservation proclamation week

Governor Larry I. DeLeon Guerrero signed on Friday a proclamation designating May 12-18 as CNMI Historic Preservation Week.

An on-site lecture and tour of the Kagman archeological site is one of the major highlights of the week's celebration.

The Historic Preservation Office will also mount a display of artifacts featuring a unique

collection of indigenous and the most recent historic collections, a series of lectures on historic preservation and archeology in the CNMI and a video presentation about the department's program are also some of the

scheduled activities in observance of the week.

The tour of the Kagman Latte site consists on an on-site visitation to six set of latte stone structures situated at a minimum of 5 to approximately 10 hectares of land in the Kagman area.

The site is the largest and the most well preserved latte village yet discovered on Saipan. Besides the latte stones, visitors will also see mortar stones which was used by the ancients to plant foods and to prepare medicines.

The week-long display of artifacts at the department's office in Lower Base will feature some of the unique collection which the department has preserved

over the years of work in various site throughout the CNMI.

CNMI Historical Week is celebrated in conjunction with the National Historic Preservation Week which is observed annually in the Mainland.

The department was created so as to promote the study and appreciation and understanding of the CNMI heritage. It also functions in matters dealing with land-use developers and environmental concerns.

The department is also responsible for the review of all construction projects to ensure that they do not damage or destroy archeological, historical and cultural properties.

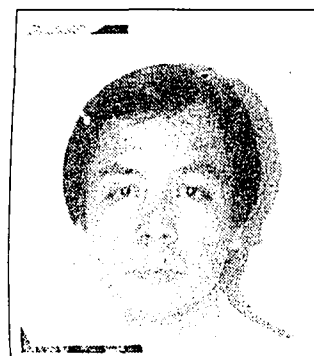

page set of design drawing with specifications, costing about \$256,000. The letter pointed out that the CUC have already chosen a contractor through bidding, whose estimate for the construction of the system is placed at \$2.8 million.

The utilities corporation, to that effect, said they can not issue Notice to Proceed since they do not have the money... "I am hereby asking for your assistance."

Speaker Guerrero, in an immediate response, said that the legislature is "very much aware" of Garapan's water system... "allocating the sum of \$2.7 million in the Supplemental Budget"

He cited that the amount will be used for both the Garapan and Gualo Rai water line and pipe replacement project.

The Speaker concluded that they will soon be contacting the CUC once the funding is "affirmed".

The house passed the surplus budget with the \$2.7 M finding, but final approval will have yet to be decided by the Senate.

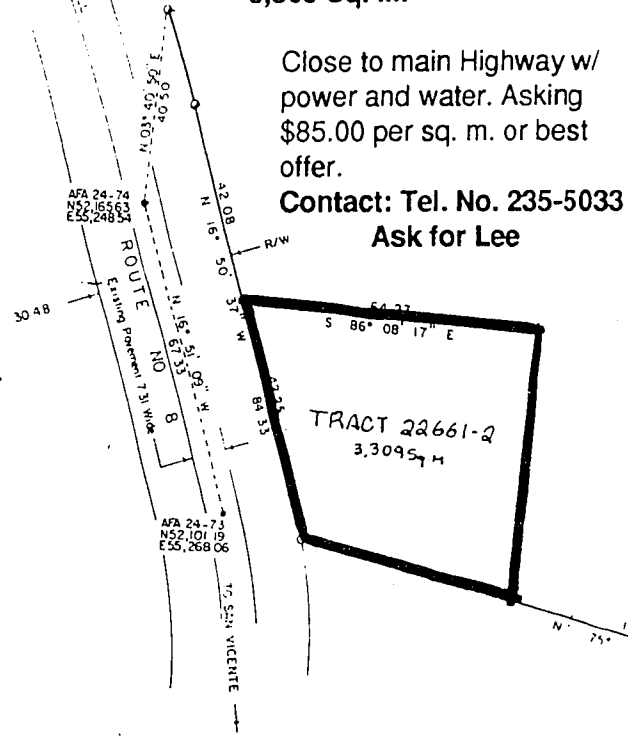

It cited that CNMI citizens had the chance of visiting the states of Melekeok, Ngaraard, Peleliu and Ngchesar... "which made their visit very memorable."

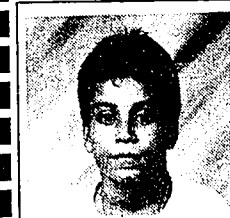
According to the resolution, the "red carpet" treatment was the result of efforts of various Palau officials, especially their Office of Aging.

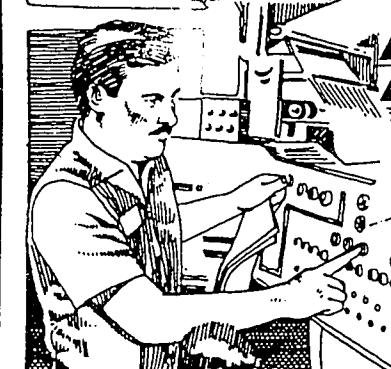

Ground was broken on Friday at the Marianas High School as Gov. Larry I. DeLeon Guerrero led Public School System (PSS) officials in the ceremony that will ensure nine additional classrooms to house the growing student population of the school.

The construction of the project has been awarded to Solid Builders, a company represented by Benigno Fejeran. The additional facility is expected to be completed in time for the September school opening.

In his speech, the Governor said that the additional rooms will alleviate the existing problem of overcrowded classrooms at the high school.

The present enrollment at the

high school is placed at 1,320 but the school can only handle 900 students. The rise of the student population which has caused the overcrowding situation was unanticipated by PSS officials.

The school's population rose to its present level as grade 9 students who were being housed at the Hopwood Junior High School were transferred to the school effective school year 1990-91.

Acting Commissioner of Education Lee Torres, Deputy Commissioner for Instruction Justo Quitugua, MHS Student Council President Elaine Inos and MHS Principal Herman Sablan were also present during the ceremony.
