BOERS STOP THE BRITISH ADVANCE

General Gatacre's Forces Ambushed and Defeated.

General Methuen Again Attacks Enemy and Suffers Loss—Is Now Intrenching—London Doubtful Over the Returns.

Gen. Wauchope Killed.

London, Dec. 13.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from general Forester-Walker:

"Cape Town, Tuesday.—Methuen wires that General Wauchope was killed in action yesterday."

Major General Andrew G. Wauchope, C. B., C. M. G., entered the army in 1865, was promoted Colonel 1888, served in the Ashanti war 1873; in the Egyptian war 1882; in the Sudan expedition of 1884, and in the Nile expedition of 1884-85. He was in command of the First brigade of Egyptian expeditionary force in 1898. General Wauchope has been wounded four times, three times severely.

London, Dec. 13.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from General Methuen, dated Tuesday, Dec. 12:

"Our artillery shelled a very strong position held by the enemy in a long, high kopje from four until dusk Sunday. It rained hard last night."

"The Highland brigade attacked at daybreak on Monday, the south end of the kopje. The attack was properly timed, but failed. The guards were ordered to protect the Highlands right and rear. The cavalry and mounted infantry with a howitzer artillery battery attacked the enemy on the left, and the Guards on the right supported by field artillery and howitzer artillery. They shelled the position from daybreak, and at 1:15 I sent the Gordons to support the Highland brigade. The troops held their own in front of the enemy's entrenchments until dusk, the position extending, including the kopje, for a distance of six miles to the Modder river.

"Today I am holding my position, and entrenching myself. I had to face at least 12,000 men. Our loss was great."

BOER REPORT OF MODDER RIVER. Pretoria, Dec. 11, Monday.—An official report says:

"A battle at Modder River began yesterday with cannon firing, heavy fighting proceeding from 3:30 o'clock in the morning until 9:30 o'clock, and the fighting still continues. A balloon has just arisen above the British position, where it remained ten minutes and descended. There were heavy rains during the night."

At 9 o'clock this morning a dispatch rider brought word that all the Boer positions have been maintained, and that forty-one British prisoners had been taken. At 9:30 o'clock it was reported that the heavy cannon fire had somewhat abated. The British are constantly using their balloons.

The fighting was still going on at noon.

Kimberley is still quiet.

BRITISH AT COLENSO.

London, Dec. 13.—A dispatch from Frere camp, dated Tuesday, December 12, morning, says:

"This morning a Union brigade consisting of English, Scottish, Irish and Welsh Fusiliers, under General Barton, with several naval guns, advanced and took up a strong position three miles from Colenso, meeting with no opposition."

BRITISH WOUNDED 320.

Orange River, Cape Colony, Dec. 13.—Three hundred and twenty wounded, including 27 officers, have arrived here from the Modder river.

GATACRE'S DEFEAT.

London, Dec. 11.—The War Office publishes the following dispatch from General Forester-Walker at Cape Town:

Gatacre reports: Deeply regret to inform you that I met with a serious reverse in the attack on Stormberg. I was misled as to the enemy's position by the guides and found impracticable ground.

London, Dec. 13.—Alarm is beginning to be expressed in many quarters as to the situation of General Methuen. The Westminster Gazette says: "If England ever needed a victory, it is now, and it is to Buller, the soldier, strong, cool-headed and reticent, that the country looks for this victory."

The other papers are abusing the Government for its "complacent optimism," and inability to grasp the strength of the opposition it has to overcome in South Africa.

Considerable significance attaches to General Methuen's statement that he is entrenching himself, indicating fear that the Boers may follow up their advantage, adopt the offensive and attack him. Indeed, the gravity of the situation from the British point of view can hardly be over-estimated. General Methuen's long lines of communication to De Aar are most vulnerable. Should they be cut, General Methuen will find himself in a very tight place, if only from lack of supplies.

The latest advices from Gen. Gatacre show that no anxiety is felt for the safety of his remaining troops, who have been withdrawn to good positions along the railroad south of Molteno.

It is said that Bushman's Hoek is impregnable. The Boers decline to furnish the names of the killed or wounded. They say they buried the dead and are sending the prisoners to Bloemfontein. The Boer loss on Sunday is reported to have been four killed and nine wounded. Probably this is correct, as no genuine attack was made by General Gatacre's troops who were completely surprised while in column. The British apparently simply rushed up the nearest hill without orders or knowing where the enemy was. It also appears that the British were so exhausted that they were unable to accomplish anything. They had been on the move since 4 a. m. Sunday, traveling by train in open trucks in the broiling sun to Molteno. After an hour's rest they proceeded on an hour's march over the most difficult and unknown country.

General Buller's advance in the direction of Colenso seems to have actually commenced.

There are renewed reports of a Cabinet crisis at Cape Town, where it is said Governor Milner is about to act, in consequence of the disclosures involving the Ministry's loyalty.

The War Office at London received the following message from General Forester-Walker:

Cape Town, Tuesday, Dec. 12.—No further details from Methuen. "Gatacre is moving from Bushman's Hoek to Sterkstroom today. The Magistrate at Sterkstroom wires that the situation there has slightly improved. Many of the missing have turned up. French reports that a detachment of cavalry, with two guns of horse artillery reconnoitered the Boers' position at Quifontein and Valkoep, eight miles north of Arundel. They shelled a farm and drove the enemy from Vaalkop. The Boer loss was one killed and several wounded. Our casualties nil."

FAUST AGAIN.

On account of the tremendous success of the performance of Faust it has been decided to repeat this beautiful opera at the matinee on Saturday, when Mrs. Annis Montague Turner will again appear as Marguerite, also the entire Hawaiian band. Mrs. Turner has kindly consented to appear for the benefit of the school children. This will be the last matinee performance of the Boston Lyric and Col. Thompson has arranged so the school children can secure their tickets by applying at the box office at Wall-Nichols or from the Board of Education. The children can secure reserved seats at 50 cents as at the matinee given before.

Bellini's great masterpiece La Sonnambula, will be given a big production at the Opera House Thursday night. Pretty Miss Stanton will assume "Anina," the sleep walker, while Henry Hallam will do "Elvino." Sonnambula is one of the few grand romantic operas that has a pretty love story interwoven with pretty music and striking situations. A pleasing production is looked for.

Logan Not Murdered.

Washington, Dec. 13.—Col. Long, the quartermaster in charge of the army transportation at San Francisco, who was recently instructed by Quartermaster General Ludington, to investigate the report published in certain newspapers that Major John A. Logan, U. S. V., had been killed by his own soldiers as an act of revenge, reports to the Quartermaster General by telegraph today that he has mailed a report of the result of the investigation. Col. Long says that Kopyitz, the freight clerk who was alleged to have made the assertions, denies officially and positively having made any such statement to a newspaper representative, or to any other person.

"Capt. Coulling can find no one on the ship," says Col. Long, "who made such remarks, and is satisfied, if made, it was by some irresponsible party."

Republicans Win Kentucky.

Frankfort, Ky., Dec. 8.—The State Board of Elections tonight gave out its official findings. The report says that on the face of the returns W. S. Taylor for Governor and the rest of the Republican ticket have been elected.

INSURGENTS ON THE RUN

American Campaign Now Resolved Into a Big Chase.

Leader General Pilar Is Dead—Aguinaldo in Disguise—Insurgent Supplies Are Gone—Otis Reports.

Washington, Dec. 13.—General Otis had some stirring news to report today from Manila, his advices going to show that the insurgents are, as he predicted a few days ago, at the end of their resources from a military point of view and are running away before the rapid advance of the American troops at all points. His cablegrams were as follows:

"Manila, Dec. 13.—Fifty men of the navy and fifty men of the army, transported by the navy, took Laog on the 10th inst. General Young, with staff, followed next day. He reports Howes with Pennsylvania battalion of the 33d Infantry passed north of Pidding, east of Laog. Marsh's battalion of the 34th was at Cayan, province of Lepanto, on 7th inst. The Third Cavalry was along the coast and in the mountains pursuing the enemy.

"Young states his extreme northern force passed over mountains driving the insurgents under General Tino, who was badly wounded, killing fifty and wounding many. He made large captures of rifles and property with all insurgent transportation, and released all the Spanish prisoners in that section to the number of two thousand. Our casualties were two wounded. Our troops are still pursuing the remnant of Tino's command.

"Marsh's battalion of the 33d reports from Cayan, Lepanto province, on the 8th inst., that he has destroyed Aguinaldo's body guard and killed General Gregorio Pilar; received the surrender of General Concepcion and staff, killed and wounded 52 insurgents, released 575 prisoners, including 150 friars and captured considerable property. His loss was two killed and nine wounded. My information is that Aguinaldo has disguised his individuality, abandoned his troops and is hiding in the provinces of Benguet."

Otis's second dispatch follows:

"Manila, Dec. 13.—Admiral Watson informs me that the province of Cayan surrendered unconditionally to Captain McCalla of the Newark, on the 11th inst., all arms being surrendered. Major Batchelder is ninety miles south of Aparri, command in good condition. "Navy will take supplies to Batchelder in launch at once; this surrender doubtless includes the province of Isabella.

"General Bates at Zamboanga, reports affairs there as satisfactory. Reports affairs there as satisfactory. Nearly all rifles surrendered; MacArthur, at Bayambang reports that he holds as prisoner of war, Mabini, the ablest of insurgents, and founder of the late government."

Extend Contract Labor Law.

Washington, Dec. 8.—Representative Hitt of Illinois today introduced a bill to provide a territorial form of government for Hawaii. It is similar to the measure reported to the House last year, providing a territorial Governor appointed by the President, and a Legislature of two houses.

Sherman of New York introduced a bill, authorizing the Postmaster General to contract with an American Cable Company to send official messages to Hawaii, the Philippines, Japan and China for twenty years, at not to exceed \$400,000 a year.

Flynn of Oklahoma introduced a bill for additional homestead lands to those who participated in the war with Spain or in the Philippines.

A bill by McRae of Arkansas would extend the contract labor laws to Hawaii.

Have Traveled Pleasantly.

Washington, Dec. 13.—Gen. Leonard Wood has been assigned as military commander of Cuba and Governor of the island.

PROVIDE FOR ROYAL FAMILY.

[Washington Special to the Bulletin.]

Washington, D. C., Dec. 7.—The first legislation of the present Congress will doubtless be the adoption of a resolution introduced in the senate today by Senator Clark, of Wyoming. The resolution provides for reservation of a tract of land containing 119,670 square feet off Nuuanu street, Honolulu, to be used for all time as the sepulcher of the Hawaiian rulers and members of the royal family now buried there. Under Senator Clark's resolution the friends of the royal family will be given control of the burial place and it will be used forever for the purpose designated. The most beautiful floral offering at the funeral of Vice-President Hobart was said to be that of Col. Parker and Prince David and consisted of an immense wreath of orchids with silk ribbons on which was the word "Hawaii."

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

The brig J. D. Spreckels sailed from San Francisco for Honolulu December 11 in command of Captain Erratt.

The American Maru arrived in San Francisco one day ahead of time from Honolulu, having made a quick trip.

William Savidge has been appointed guardian of the estate of Mary Alice Porter under bonds in the sum of \$12,500.

In the case of Harrison vs Magoon et al., a commission has been issued to F. Wilson Smith of Auckland, N. Z., to take the deposition of Alfred E. Gilmore, a material witness, who lives in Auckland.

Capt. Henri Berger and the Hawaiian band made a decided hit in one of the scenes of Faust and responded to an encore. Mr. Harold Mott-Smith was in the orchestra for the occasion with his cello.

Tonight Mr. M. B. Curtis will again appear in his popular representation of Levinsky the pawnbroker, in "Mulberry Bend." Tomorrow evening the Orpheum has a change of program. The new talent just arrived by the Australia will also perform.

The Ket On Pui Association have given or distributed to the distressed Chinese and Hawaiians 4,000 pounds of rice and 500 pounds of biscuits in the quarantine district. The rice and biscuits were sold to the said association by Mr. Ki Chong below cost price for that purpose.

Stanley's Decision Confirmed.

The Supreme Court has decided the case of the Antone Phillips Estate against A. S. Cleghorn. The decree of the Circuit Court is affirmed and the administrator is ordered to pay into court \$3478.14.

In concluding the decision reads, "In justice to the administrator, Mr. Cleghorn, it should be said that in transferring the estate to Mr. W. R. Castle he acted in good faith, desiring to be relieved of the responsibility of the administration, relying upon Mr. Castle, considering that when he parted with the property his connection with the estate was legally severed."

The opinion is by Justice Whiting and concurred in by Justice Frear and Judge Perry sitting in place of Chief Justice Judd, absent.

The Supreme Court held no session today, but will continue hearing cases tomorrow.

CABINET HANDS OUT A HINT

Advise the Appointment of a Commission on Chinatown Cleaning.

Mr. Damon on the Scene Again—A Road Water Letter From Delegate Hartwell—Land Legislation.

The Cabinet meeting this forenoon lasted nearly two and a half hours. All members were present and Mr. Damon, who will probably return to his portfolio tomorrow, Mr. Lansing having resigned to take effect at once, was in attendance and took part in the deliberations.

It was intimated that Mr. Damon, who had dropped his active efforts to secure Italian immigrants when his resignation was turned back by President McKinley, had learned that the Government of Italy was rather favorable to plans to send some of their people here.

Voted by the Cabinet—That the Board of Health be advised to appoint a commission of three capable men to investigate and make a report with recommendations, to place Chinatown in a "permanent sanitary condition."

Voted by the Cabinet—That the government make a proposal to have the Bishop Estate deed sixty feet of width of land for the Alamoana road, the government to agree to build within two years.

Several letters from General Hartwell were read. The special delegate speaks encouragingly of the progress of the territorial bill. He says there is some opposition to it and that probably some parts of it will fail. Land matters he expects to be handled in another bill to be presented at an early day.

Samuel M. Damon, head of the banking house of Bishop & Co., in his way the most notable commercial traveler of the Pacific and the stand-by Minister of Finance for the islands, is home from the United States and Europe and is in finest fettle physically. He stopped at Washington a couple of times, went to Italy on the matter of securing emigration from that country to the islands and was in London, where he is now quite well acquainted. "The immigration business," said Mr. Damon, "is in abeyance. Politically I have nothing to say excepting that I appreciate now more than ever that we should be in closest touch with Washington. Mr. McKinley is the President of Massachusetts and Hawaii and all other sub-divisions of the United States of America. I sent my resignation as Minister of Finance here to President McKinley while at Washington and he declined to accept it."

Mr. Damon was at the Cabinet meeting this forenoon and made an extended verbal report to the President and Ministers.

THE "PLAGUE" SITUATION.

Ethel Johnson, Dr. Scaparoni reports, is much better. It is said there are now fair chances for her recovery. It is added that, with relation to "plague," her case is no longer considered as "suspicious."

A postmortem was performed on the body of a Japanese dying suddenly last night. Heart disease was the cause of death.

The suggestion by the Executive that a Commission be appointed to recommend improvements in Chinatown is a most excellent one. It gives reasonable assurance of action and displaces criticism with honest discussion and guarantees calm judgment based on facts.

The most significant item in the dispatches from the Transvaal is the statement that President Kruger is making preparations to accommodate 50,000 more prisoners at Pretoria. If the results continue to follow the line maintained since the opening of the war, the number of prisoners taken is likely to be a factor in the Boers' undoing. Up to the present time the Boers have won every point in the game. Leading off with a crushing defeat of White's forces at Ladysmith, the Boer generals have succeeded in practically defeating every relief column sent out by the British. Methuen's "victory" was one that stopped his progress and the result of Gen. Gatacre's encounter with the enemy shows that the British have much to learn in dealing with Boer strategy. Well may the London papers say, "If Britain ever needed a victory she needs it now."

BOARD OF HEALTH MONEY.

Still the wranglers over the Board of Health money question have failed to touch upon facts that will enable the public to draw definite conclusions. If a detail of what the Health Bureau asked for could be obtained and compared with the Cabinet's estimate of what was needed, it would doubtless be shown that the Board's original estimate was cut down by the Cabinet, and later reduced to some extent by the Legislature. The documents showing the Board's original estimates are said to be among W. O. Smith's private papers and cannot be obtained. It is not likely the Advertiser will make a diligent search for them, since its whole campaign has been, not to establish facts, but to condemn the officials. It is known, however, that the Board asked for a garbage crematory and failed to get it. Provision was also asked for a crematory in connection with the cemeteries. This was not granted.

As to the legal authority of the Board to condemn property, the public knows that every board and bureau is controlled from and by the Executive. Had the proposition to improve Chinatown by opening up passageways appealed to Mr. Dole at any time during the past two years he could have accomplished the work. The government organs are basing their whole campaign on after thoughts, with the result that they are giving free rein to criticism of certain officials whom they dislike to give credit. The Star has always had a knife out for Dr. Day, and the Advertiser is not disposed to allow Minister Cooper to receive credit for anything, since it apparently supposes that such action might assist Mr. Cooper in worthy ambitions.

The public is unanimous in its support of the members of the Board for their prompt and vigorous action of the past week. Every member has been prompted by broad minded, honest motives and highest regard for the public welfare and the Board has done its work to complete public satisfaction. The attempt to cast discredit upon present action, by discrediting the work of the past demonstrates the motives that prompt the critics. Discussion to secure better administration of any department is to be commended. Captious criticism at a period when assistance should be rendered on every hand, accomplishes nothing for public good.

If the Government organs will read over some of the issues of the late Sunday Volcano, they will find that they are now taking up a line of argument which several months ago they joined in condemning. If the Board has been short sighted and neglectful, the government organs now practically charge themselves with a right to a place in the same category.

Pope Declares the Century.

Washington, Dec. 11.—In the Roman Catholic world the twentieth century begins at midnight, December 31, 1899, according to the text of diocese of congregation of rites, solemnly dedicating the year 1900 as the holy year. This decree was received today by the apostolic delegation here. The decree permits the celebration of a midnight mass in all the churches of Christendom upon the night of December 31st next. This is a privilege of unusual interest. Never before in the history of the church has any priest of the church, except the Roman pontiff, been permitted to celebrate a mass at midnight on the eve of the new year.

Hale's Cable Bill

Probably Successful

New York, Dec. 13.—A special to the Tribune from Washington, says: The naval project for a Pacific cable connecting San Francisco, Honolulu, Guam and the Philippines gives greater promise of practicability than other plans suggested to Congress for facilitating commercial and military communication in that ocean, and the bill embodying its features and authorizing its construction and maintenance, which has been introduced by Senator Hale, is likely to become a law.

The only cable surveys of a route across the Pacific have been made by the navy and they have enabled the naval authorities to count the cost of the enterprise and its feasibility with confident accuracy. The army scheme for a cable to remain always a military line has been planned wholly on theoretical considerations.

The private cable companies which have been rivals in seeking Government aid have made no surveys and their projects have savored strongly of speculation at Government expense. The principal private company asks Congress to give it a charter and guarantee a subsidy of \$400,000 annually for twenty years. During that period it offers to carry Government messages free and thereafter will charge the Government one-half commercial rates. Under this plan the Government would pay out \$8,000,000 and in the end the company would have the cable and could sell it to England, Germany, Russia or Japan.

The naval project calls for a \$10,000,000 plant, including submarine lines, stations and equipment, to be laid by regular naval vessels and to be delivered when completed to the Postmaster General who will manage, operate and maintain the service in the same manner as the postal system, with a single regard for the public interest.

In explanation of the appropriation called for, it is said by Rear Admiral Bradford, who has had charge of the matter, that \$1,000,000 is estimated as the cost of maintenance for the first year, after which the Postmaster General could pay the expense out of the receipts.

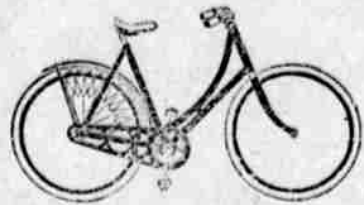

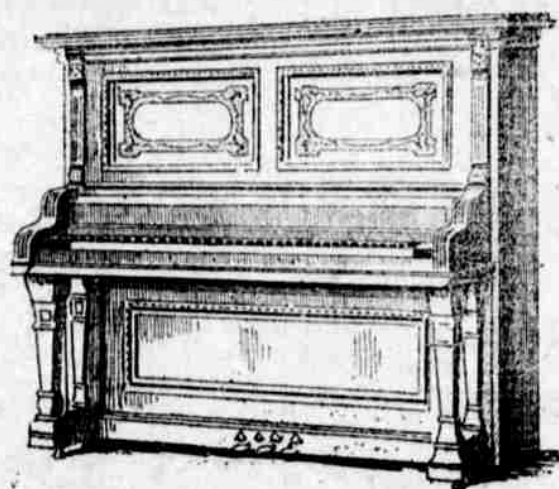

HAWAII IN COMMITTEE.

Washington, Dec. 12. — Whether
Dewey, acting for the United States

purpose of Smith's visit is to furnish
what information Congress may desire
about the political and industrial con-
dition of the islands.

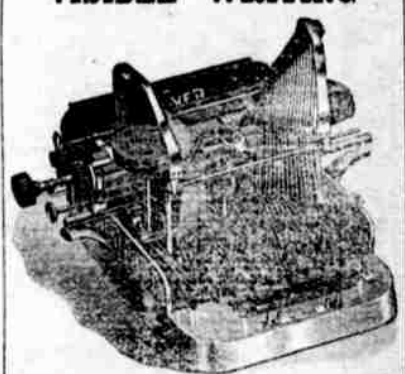

Three Steamers in Port.
The Aorangi from the Colonies and the Coptic from San Francisco anchored off port last evening. The Australia, came in to harbor this morning and docked at the Oceanic wharf. The Aorangi and Coptic both anchored outside, the Aorangi waiting for daylight before coming into the harbor, while the Coptic sent all the passengers, mail and freight for Honolulu ashore on the tug.

Many passengers on board the Coptic had anticipated spending a week or more in Honolulu, but the fact that the black plague had been here stopped them.

No passengers or freight will be taken on either the Coptic or Aorangi from Honolulu and what water was needed on the Coptic was taken out by the Inoquois. The Aorangi came into the harbor early this morning and anchored in the stream opposite the Pacific Mail dock her Honolulu cargo to be taken off by 11 hters.
