GIVING SIGHT TO THE BLIND.

An Old Woman Whose Lifelong Blind-

At the recent meeting in New London, Conn., of the American Ophthalmological society, the proceedings of which are re-ported in The Medical News, Dr. L. Weister Fox read a clinical paper on a case of congenital cataracts successfully removed in a patient 60 years of age. Omitting the purely technical portions, Dr. Fox's paper

purely technical portions, Dr. Fox's paper was as follows:

On Feb. 4, 1884, a negress presented herself at the eye clinic of the Germantown hospital, suffering with cataracts. The lenses were opaque, with well-marked deposits of calcareous concretions, situated in the interior or visible portions of the lenses.

Upon examination, good projection of light was obtained. The history elicited was that since birth the vision had not changed, simply being able to distinguish day from simply being able to distinguish day from night, or the light of a lamp, or the shadow of a dark object when brought directly in front of the patient's face. Feeling assured of the sensibility of the retina, an operation

for the sensibility of the rethin, an operation for the cataract in one eye was suggested, and was performed. The lens was successfully removed in its capsule with a Critchett's spoon. There was a small loss of vitreous, which was fluid. The eye was cloed immediately, and the wound healed without reaction; the eye being bathed daily with a mild astringent lotion, but the lil was not disturbed.

was not disturbed.

At the end of eight days the bandages were removed, when it was found that the wound was closed and a keyhole iridotomy existed which was perfect in outline and showed a clear media. The patient was astonished; she could see objects several feet distant, but was quite at a loss to under stand the visual phenomena. She was quite nervous from the effect of the shock, of the control of the shock, and started violently and closed her eyes as Sundays, 9 to 17 A. M. if from fear. She was unable to name any readily distinguished a watch which was shown her. This was distinguished, not by its form, but by its ticking. At this time wools of different colors were placed before her, and a certain one given to be matched, which was done without confusion, proving accurate sensibility of the retina to the most delicate tints, although not a name waknown to the patient. After several days the object and wool test was made again. When ooking at a distance she tried to grasp the objects, and a flock of sparrows were supposed to be teacups. Owing to her first impression of distances, she was for quite a time afraid to walk with her eyes open, the floor appearing at a distance. After the bandages were removed she was allowed the freedom of a moderately lighted room to become accustomed to the objects about her, as well as to learn to measure distances

The Ends of the Earth Encompassed-Shipping a Bible to South Africa-Why the Express Service Is

So Efficient.

[Pittsburg Dispatch.]
A man entered the office of the express company, and, placing a small package on the counter, will: "I want to send this to Auckland, New Zealand. When can it go?" Without he flation the clerk answered him and gave a research for the package—which contained money—sying: "I will forward it on the Pallatelenia mail tenight." Curious to know how an express company could thus control delivery at such a distant point, the reporter sought out the superintendent of the company's business in Pittsburg, and learned the following facts

superintendent of the company, be these in Pittsburg, and learned the following facts in regard to the express business:

"Yes, sir, that is a common occurrence here. We have package come in here from all parts of the word, and we give a receipt for them, no matter where their destination may be, and we forward them by the most direct route, and have never yet failed to make a delivery. In one case which happened when I was in the eastern part of the country, a man came to me and said he wished to ship a Bible to a mis-donary friend in South Africa. We took the package and forwarded it. Some weeks after he called to know if it had been delivered, and we sent out a "tracer." We began by calling up the various offices through which it passed after it left us, and finally traced it to our agent; at Cape Town, in South Africa. After two months he wrote the home office that he sent the package out only to find that the consignee had been murdered by the savages, and his multilated body was all they found. Did they deliver the book! Why, of course, they did; and when the remains of the misionary were brought home and the case opened the first thing that met the sight of the bereaved relatives in the case was a package bearing the name of the express company.

"We will forward that package you just

"We will forward that package you just saw delivered to San Francisco, Cal., and there our agent will way-bill it to the agent at Auckland, New Zealand, and in due time it will arrive there by P. M. S. S. company's steamer, just as surely as it would go to East Liberty. Lost on the road! No. If our employes attend to their in tructions it can not be lost, only through shipwreck, and then, if insured, we make good the loss.

"I entered the service of this company over thirty years ago, when stage clackes were in common use and frequently robbed. I had a bag of gold dust to take from a northern town into Elmira, and I put the dust into a bottle and place! It in my outside coat pocket in plain sight. I fille! the bag with iron filings at the mill, and my friend and myself laughed at an imaginary robber finding a bag full of iron filings. We were not on the road an hour when three men road up from behind and cleaned us out, particularly taking my bottle and overlooking the bag. The company made good the lost gold dust, and I never tried since to fool a robber. I think my quondam friend helped to work the game.

"We carry millions of money for the government, and have never lost a penny, except in case of a wreck and fire, and then it was known what money was burned, and "I entered the service of this company

it was known what money was burned, and it was easily replaced. The other day we took \$8,000,000 from Washington in one lot and transported it to San Francisco, Cal., and of course had no more trouble than if it was \$1,000.

"We operate some 38,000 miles of road in this country and Canada, and ten times that amount throughout the world, and the percentage of loss on goods in trausit, or total loss, has been for many years almost nothing. There are fully 15,000 men in our employ, including all, from piatform men to superintendent, and we have the strictest kind of civil service rules, avery man being to superintendent, and we have the stricts:t kind of civil service rules, every man being promoted in the order of his seniority withard to influence, and obtaining promotion in no other way. This is one reason why the express service is so efficient, for no man can enter it on any other man's recommendation and overstep another who has already served and is capaci-tated. We run 10,000 hores and 8,000 tated. We run 10,000 hor os and 8,000 wagoos of all styles, and make a specialty of raising horses particularly fitted for our service. There is probably no private corporation in existence in which the detail is so thoroughly arranged as ours and in which a loss or delay can be so readily traced. A feature in our history which proves this is the total freedom from embezzlement and defalcation among our employes, which is accounted for by the simple fact that they can not go far without detection, and all trusted employes are under an approvablond, which is always responsible.

"At any one moment of the day or night our company has millions of dollars' worth of merchandise and valuables in transit, and each morning, with the regularity of clockwork, we are assured of safe delivery and the coasing of responsibility by the company."

"The great utility of express service was shown while the reporter was in the office by a young man entring, relling an enormous bicycle before him, which was booked and taken to the same train that carried him into the country, and delivered at his hotel in good order for a price that seemed ridiculous when compared with the service rendered.

"We carry cats, dogs, mules, and frequently valuable racing stock. We have taken lunatics and convicts and any number of babies; in fact, our messenger: are broken in on a milk bottle, and can tance a baby just like a real women. Singular as it may seem we carry whole cities, too, having sent three train leads of ready-made house to a point in Texas, and followed them with the worldly goods of those who were to occupy them when built. The only time I ever knew the company's men to be knocked out was when some fellow shipped a Mechitis Americana on one of our cars in New Hampshire. This animal had been caught and caloroformed, and as the train rattled on it came to, and shortly after the car was vacated and all hands found lying on the roof gaping for air. The station people were about to attack us for having brought ickness among them, and we had a great time before we could make them under tand the case. The car and contents were side-tracked and burned, and we never knew who played us the trick."
