BOARD OF EDUCATION.


First Public Meeting of the New Members.

At yesterday's meeting of the Board of Education there were present president Cooper, Mrs. Dillingham, Mrs. Jordan and W. A. Bowen. Inspector - general Townsend and his deputy, J. F. Scott, were also on hand.

The Inspector-general reported that he had ordered the government school at Halawa, North Koha'a, to be re-opened and the buildings to be gotten in readiness by September. He also had taken similar action in regard to the school at Mana.

Lum Wing Yin petitioned to be allowed to open a school for instruction in the Chinese language. The secretary was instructed to notify the applicant that no school could be open for children within years, except upon the basis of unless it be in writing and signed instruction in the English language. Schools for persons be-yond that age are not under the control of the Department of Education.

Applications for positions as teachers were received from Mrs. M. S. Goddard, Miss Venight and Miss Rasmussen and referred to the Committee on Teachers, consisting of Minister Cooper, Prof.
