### A MISAPPREHENSION.

Disatisfaction has been expressed about the projected visit of the steamer *Likilike* to the Molekai Settlement, on Sunday next, for the purpose of giving people in Honolulu an opportunity of visiting their friends segregated there. The murmuring is on the ground that healthy people will be allowed to mingle with those infected with a contagious disease, thus rendering themselves liable to the contagion. We believe this is an entire misapprehension. We understand that the visitors are not to be allowed to intermingle with the sick, but only to approach within easy talking distance. Mr. C. B. Reynolds will have charge, which we consider a sufficient guarantee that the regulation above noted will be strictly enforced.

### THE MAUI RACES.

Christmas Day at Kahului—The Go-Ahead Island Ahead Again!

The Fall Meeting of the Maui Racing Association, which, owing to the damp condition of the weather on the 16th of November, was postponed till Xmas day, proved a great success. The weather was very propitious, it being calm and bright, without being excessively hot; and although the track was quite heavy, loose and rather muddy in consequence of previous rains, the time made was very good, and goes to show the improvement in racing stock since the organization of the association, an improvement which nobody with a little knowledge of horseflesh can fail to notice, and which not only manifests itself in the time made, but in the looks, condition and whole bearing of the animals. Great credit is due to the association for its earnest, untiring, united efforts to improve stock and awaken the interest for good breeds.

The several vessels in port, as well as the *Likilike*, which arrived early in the morning, had their flags flying to the gentle breeze, and the spectators at Spreckel's Park, (which is the proud name of the race track, situate just back of Kahului), although not a big crowd, were composed of the most prominent people of the island—the very creme de la creme of our society. But for its being Xmas day, which kept the whole Roman Catholic portion of the population away, as well as many others, the crowd would probably have been near a thousand. The races commenced about 11 a. m., the programme containing the following events:

In the first race both horses were beautiful animals and equally favorites with the public. Hancock got the start, but was soon overtaken and left considerably behind by Ivanhoe Jr., which came in several lengths ahead.

The second race was a very good one, the horses getting a good start and coming round almost neck and neck, till the homestretch, when Red Oak took the lead and won the 1st heat by about a length. In the 2nd heat Billy S took the lead on the short turn, but Red Oak crept steadily up on him and took the pole before the 3 mile dash, increasing the distance on the homestretch, passing under the wire a length ahead of Billy S.

In the third race the horses were well matched, and were racing neck and neck nearly all the way. Birdcatcher winning by a full length, after a hard tussle for the laurels.

The Trotting Race was one of the events of the day, and great excitement prevailed during the different heats. Speculation won the 1st heat in 3:46, while Frank S broke badly and hardly trotted at all. In the 2nd heat he had come down to steady work and won it in 3:48. In the 3d heat Mr. Cornwell was unable to drive, owing to severe indisposition, and as Mr. Stelling declared himself unwilling to drive against a professional—Mr. Dick Davis taking Mr. Cornwell's place—

the matter after some animated discussion was settled by Mr. Jack Avery's driving Frank S which won the deciding 3d heat in 3:55, loudly cheered by the spectators, whose sympathies seemed nearly all enlisted on his side, a Hawaiian horse trotting against a superior bred imported one.

Jack delighted his backers and discomfited a good many by winning the race after a hot contest with Darling and Pet, which followed close on his heels all the way round and under the wire.

The Sweepstakes was an exciting race and the people evinced breathless interest while it was going on. Gray Eagle lead at the start and would probably have won the race, but stepped in a hole with his hind legs, almost sitting down on his haunches and falling back several lengths on the short turn. He pulled himself together very quickly, however, and made a noble effort to overtake his opponent, who meanwhile had got too good a start of him and came in, winning by nearly a length.

In the Maiden Race opinions were pretty evenly divided about the two contestants, and they kept closely together till the homestretch, where Billy S pulled ahead and won by a full length.

The Ladies' Bracelet Race was one of the best races of the day, and one in which the fair sex took a special interest, the horses being entered in the name of ladies, who though not present were well-known to most of them. After the usual little prancings and capers a fair start was attained, and away they sped, Pet taking the lead and maintaining it till the 3 mile post, where Barney and Darling whose riders had saved their noble animals for the last supreme effort, edged past and came up the homestretch in superb style, neck and neck, Darling winning by a neck after a most stubborn contest, both horses being admirably ridden by their respective owners, Messrs. Herbert and Potter, and tumultuously cheered by all present.

The Mule Race was not the least interesting feature of the programme and although Jimmy showed a tendency to bolting toward the Grand Stand they managed to get a fairly good start. Beauty leading, but overtaken and passed on the homestretch by Kula Boy, the victor of many mule races in days past. The goddess of victory gave him the wreath in this instance also he winning by several lengths.

The races were over about 3:30 p. m. and the crowd dispersed with the unanimous expression of satisfaction at having enjoyed a good days sport. Long life and prosperity to the Maui Racing Association!
