THE LEHUA'S CRUISE.

Why the Hawaiian Government Needed a Revenue Cutter.

There is a certain little yacht now lying behind the old fish-market which has caused the Hawaiian Government a good deal of anxiety. She is now ostensibly owned by one "Pat." Curtis who claims to have purchased her from Captain Calway of the Waimanalo. When the transfer was made the little yacht was lying at Ewa.

Soon after the purchase the revenue officials became suspicious and in fact saturated with the idea that the vessel was engaged in the opium trade, and the Government tug made a hurried trip to Ewa. The yacht was not there and the tug went off at full speed in search of her. She was found off Molokai in a calm, and was searched. Nothing was found on her and the discomfited officials returned to port.

So did the Spray, and soon after arriving "Captain" Curtis applied at the Custom House for papers to use the Spray as a trading vessel. Not being able to file the necessary bond of \$500, his application was refused, whereupon to use Curtis' own words in an interview had with him this morning by a BULLETIN reporter, "I hoisted the American flag and defied them. I am an American citizen and have got a right to trade or not as long as I am under that flag."

"How about your last trip?"

"Well, I got back last night. When I left here a few days ago I had the American flag flying and it has been at the peak ever since. The Lehua followed me, but could not catch up with me. She might creep up to me in a calm, but with a breath of wind I can sail all around her."

"What success did you have on the trip, Captain?"

"What do you mean?"

"How much did you land?"

"Well, I brought back 200 tins with me?"

"What was in the tins?"

"A portion of the island of Lanai. Some of its soil."

Further questioning could not elicit more information, but the reporter gathered from the subsequent conversation that the Custom House officers believe that a quantity of opium was landed on Lanai by the schooner Norma some time since, and that Pat Curtis and his little schooner are employed in distributing it about the islands.

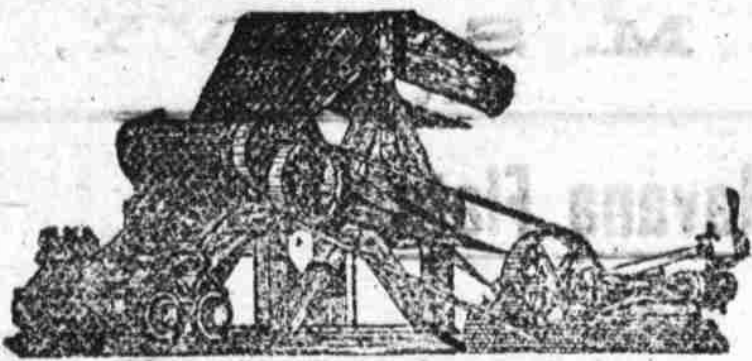

The Sins of Londoners.

The Londoners and their sins here referred to are those persons who, last year, attracted the notice of the Metropolitan police, and whose sins were found out, arrest following the discovery; the number of persons among whom these sinning Londoners were distributed being 5,800,000 all told. Let us glance over the more popular kinds of offences, and, for the sake of convenience, we will also regard them upon the basis of their respective ratios to every 10,000 of the population just stated.

Sad to relate, the "drunk and disorderly" characters score an easy first—40 per 10,000 Londoners incurred this soft impeachment last year. Persons who were "disorderly," but not drunk, take the second place; 16 per 10,000 is the ratio. Then come those persons with confused ideas about property, but who did not go beyond "simple larceny (not from the person) without violence"; these numbered 14 per 10,000. Fourth on the list of sins are those who committed a "common assault" on another person—13 per 10,000; and 13 is also the figure for people who got drunk, but who did not molest others; this group was usually helpless.

The next lot comprises the unfortunate wights whose sin was "being a vagrant"—7 1/2 per 10,000; assaults on police rank next, and show that 6 in every 10,000 Londoners were guilty of this bad act. Gambling—illegal gambling, that is—has a fair number of adherents; 4 1/2 persons per 10,000 were "run in" for this offence last year. The ninth most popular sin is that committed by pickpockets, "larceny from the person"; 3 1/2 per 10,000.

Now come five groups of sinners each of the same numerical strength, viz., 2 1/2 per 10,000—these are persons in charge of a hackney carriage, people who did wilful damage to property, servants who committed petty thefts from their employers, those merchants who could not satisfactorily explain how certain goods came into their possession, and last of the five groups are the "suspicious characters." The only other sin of much numerical importance is the fifteenth on this list, and relates to cruelty to animals; two persons in every 10,000 were guilty of this inhuman action.

The fifteen most common sins of Londoners have now been stated in the order of their numerical importance, and they add up to 132 sins per 10,000 of the London population. The total records is 146 per 10,000, and the balance of 14 sins per 10,000 is distributed over a host of offences, none of which, however, possess any great attraction for the average London sinner—who is found out.

There seems to be a good deal of the farce in the repeated trips of the Lehua after the little "Spray." If the captain of the yacht is engaged in illegal practices, which we doubt, it seems as though there should be enough ingenuity in the entire customs force to devise ways and means for stopping it. If these mysterious cruises keep on the Government will be as much a source of ridicule in this respect as the monarchy was in the days of the old Kaimiloa.

"Unto him" who hath shall be given."

If the readers of the daily newspapers have scanned the By Authority column in the various dailies published here they could not help commenting upon the number of government employees who are being appointed Notaries Public and Agents to take acknowledgments, and it shows that in the distribution of these plums the officials are sticking close to the words of the text.

It may be necessary for the government to practically confine the appointments to these not-very-great positions to men employed by the government; it may be that there are not men out of the government employ who seek the offices, but what becomes of the petitions from those who do want them and from which the persons who send them never get any returns.

A petition was presented to the Minister of the Interior yesterday signed by the candy merchants generally requesting that official to issue an order forbidding the peddling of articles on the sidewalk. The blow is evidently aimed at the dealer in French Boss, who finds it more profitable to spread his counter before him and move his stock with the tide than to rent a store. The matter is a question that will be decided entirely by the law, in the meantime the peddler is being well advertised through the action of legitimate dealers. There is no doubt the peddler does a better business through the method adopted than if he had a permanent location, and if there is nothing in the law that will prevent his wandering from one end of town to the other it is a question whether the officials of the government will deem the matter of sufficient importance to have the Legislature enact a law covering it.

When as conservative a citizen as Prof. W. D. Alexander advocates the building of a series of inter-island cables it is time that a popular movement in that direction should be started. The business carried on annually between the merchants of Honolulu and those on the other islands has reached such a proportion that a cable is as much a necessity now as the telephone system. The increase in the trade between ports would no doubt be inducement enough to the merchants throughout the group to assist in the enterprise through liberal contributions to the stock of the corporation.

We understand the Government has no fund that could be used in building the line, but it is probable the Legislature might find a way to assist it with a small subsidy.

The enterprise should be started at once whether it has Government support or not—the conditions demand it, and if the citizens here are not shrewd enough to see that it is to their advantage to build it, outsiders may come in and reap the benefit.

KAWAIAHAO CHURCH.

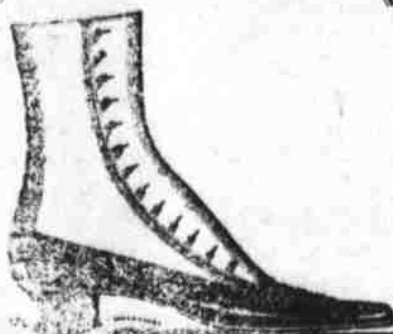
The Work of Repairing Goes Rapidly On.

Contractor Peter High is making good progress on the Kawaihaeo Church. To one who has not visited the place lately it would be hard to form an idea of the extent of the improvements being made. The church to-day presents a somewhat similar appearance to the opera house, there being little left of it but the walls. The old roof has been torn down and with the exception of the floor joists everything in the shape of woodwork has disappeared. New supports have been placed under the floor. Carpenters are now busy framing the timbers for the new roof. These are so large and heavy that it will be necessary to hoist them into position in sections. The main rafters consist of single sticks of timber, 10x12 inches in thickness and 80 feet long.

Much valuable property in the shape of lumber and material is scattered about the church yard, though a good deal of it has been surreptitiously carried off in the past few days, so much so that it has been found necessary to employ a watchman to prevent further depredations and stop a horde of children from endangering their necks in running about the building. The natives and Portuguese in the vicinity have reaped a rich harvest of kindling wood in the shingles from the old roof which were valueless.

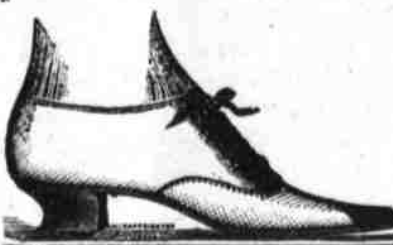

THE POLICE COURT.

Judge Wilcox Dispatches Business With His Usual Neatness and Celerity.

When His Honor mounted the judicial bench this morning he was not accompanied by usual frown. In fact his face was wreathed in smiles probably over the fact that it was Saturday morning and that he would get a day and a half off before coming down to stern realities of sentencing a few poor unfortunates to pay a fine of \$2 each with the costs added next Monday for, as Mrs. Partington would say, "desiccating" the Sabbath by being drunk and disorderly. Be that as it may a gentleman named Akaka has no reason to complain of the Court to-day. He is accused of malicious injury and mischief in Honolulu on the eleventh day of the present month in poisoning a dog of the value of ten dollars the property of one Oio. The records of the Court do not show whether the dog died from the effects of the poisoning or not, and this will probably account for Akaka's case being postponed until moved on by the prosecution.

While convictions for maintaining, assisting and carrying on a certain lottery game known as che fa have been frequent enough to deter ordinary offenders, a native named David thought he could do it without coming under the eagle eyes of the marshal "sleuths." It cost him just a hundred dollars to find out his mistake, and for fear that was not enough, His Honor charged up \$3 more to hold pay Jimmy Thompson's salary.

Ahewa and Poepoe, two other individuals charged with the same crime, pleaded not guilty and preferred standing trial and the consequent extra sentence if convicted, which they would do otherwise. The prosecution entered a nolle prosequi and the two defendants went on their way rejoicing and will probably be found shouting for the Kamehamehas at this afternoon's ball game.

Keawekulua is a pretty long name for one man to carry about with him, especially when it carries with it a charge of running a che-fa game. However, as he has been honorably discharged on that count cheerful mention is made of the fact and the hope expressed that his name will not appear again on police records. If he had been convicted he probably would have changed it to Dennis.

Mow Chow Foo ought to know better than to carry lottery tickets around the streets with him. He says he didn't and the Republic of Hawaii says he did, and His Honor will endeavor to determine who is the hardest swearer on the 20th of May next.

After remanding a couple of other cases until such time as visions of Waikiki mermaids and Sunday dinners were not floating around him, His Honor ordered the bailiff to close up the court and surrender it to the tender mercies of the Japanese convict who usually sweeps out what is left of it.
