### BOUND FOR WASHINGTON.

Colonel G. F. Little of Hilo Now at the Palace.

Among the distinguished passengers who arrived yesterday from the islands is Colonel G. F. Little now at the Palace Hotel. Colonel Little is a resident of Hilo and is on the way to Washington to look after the interests of the American party in the Hawaiian Islands during the passage through Congress of the Hawaiian bill.

When seen last evening Colonel Little said that as a resident of the islands he had the interests of the people very much at heart, and as an attorney who understood the technicalities of legislation he had been delegated by those known as the American party, or, in other words, the opposed to the Dole administration, to go to Washington and do his best to rush the passage of the bill through Congress.

The bill as it now stands is not, so says the colonel, entirely satisfactory to the majority of the people in the islands. In consequence several amendments will be asked for, and it is expected they will be granted.

The principal of these pertain to citizenship and the land laws. It will be asked that all those residing in the Hawaiian Islands at the time of the overthrow of the monarchy be considered citizens upon taking the prescribed oath; also those having established a residence of one year.

The land laws, it is claimed, give too much authority to the land agent and allow too much latitude for discrimination. These Congress will be asked to eliminate and to substitute the regular land laws of the United States instead.

Congress will also be asked to insert a clause declaring all the commissions vacant upon the passage of the law thus give the people an opportunity to express their wishes as to future officials. The only man they have seriously in mind at present is Arthur M. Sewall, whom they wish to make Governor. There are many other amendments looking to the securing for the people of the Hawaiian Islands the same form of government enjoyed by the Territories of the United States.

Senator Cullom will introduce the bill, which will be referred to a committee, where it will be fought out. —S. F. Call.

### The Queen's Christmas Gifts.

The Secretary of State for War has received the following from Sir Fleetwood Edwards:—

"Windsor Castle, Nov. 19, 1899.  
"Dear Lord Lansdowne,—The Queen commands me to inform you of her anxiety to make some little personal present as soon as possible to each of her soldiers serving in South Africa.

"Her Majesty has decided upon sending chocolate, which she is given to understand will be appropriate and acceptable.

"It will be packed for each man in a tin that has been especially designed for the occasion.

"The Queen hopes that you may be able to arrange for its conveyance and distribution.

"Believe me, yours very truly,  
"FLEETWOOD J. EDWARDS.  
"The Marquess of Lansdowne, K.G."

The Queen's order for a hundred thousand boxes of chocolate for the troops has been divided among three firms. The chocolate, which will be suitable either as a beverage or a sweetmeat, will be supplied in tin boxes, each containing half a pound—a quantity sufficient to make from twelve to sixteen cups. A special box has been designed. The lid will have a red ground with a large "gilt medallion" of the Queen in the centre as well as the Royal monogram in red, white, and blue, and the inscription, "South Africa, 1900."

Edward Bok writes, in the December Ladies' Home Journal, that "there must be some radical and growing departure from the right and best way of celebrating Christmas when each recurring year we hear a larger number of men saying, 'Well, I'll be truly thankful when this Christmas business is over.' terday morning what he meant by calling a soldier a "P. G. soldier." The answer was that P. G. stood for Provisional Government. The Marshal asked with some heat whether the witness didn't know that the Provisional Government was dead and buried. The Magistrate interposed and said that the witness by saying a "P. G. soldier" probably referred to a soldier of the P(resent) G(overnment).

It is very pleasing to record that Judge Wilcox is putting his foot down on offenders convicted of brutal assaults. He has the hearty support of the community in his endeavors in stamping out rowdiness and brutality. It is to be hoped that the Attorney-General's department will take the same view as the District Magistrate and no longer create the feeling now existing among "sluggers" that there is always a noli pros. awaiting them in the "higher" courts.

Once upon a time there lived two men. One had a horse and a stable. The horse was stolen and he went to town, bought a padlock and closed the stable. The other man had a well and a boy. The boy fell into the well and was drowned and the man closed the well. Hawaii has a Board of Health and every four years a plague. After the epidemics are over the Board of Health enforces the laws and prosecute those who caused the epidemics. History repeats itself indeed.

Should the Council of State grant the request of the Board of Health, by appropriating \$100,000 for "sanitary" purposes, an act will be committed that certainly will not reflect favorably on the Dole regime. We have no war, no pestilence and no visible emergency, and it is only under such circumstances that the Councillors are allowed to take upon themselves the task of the Legislators. We all know the efforts made by P. C. Jones and others to get into that "surplus." When Minister Damon's time was up, there was a triumphant howl, but his temporary successor Mr. Lansing stood by Mr. Damon's policy and refused access of the vultures into the vault. Mr. Damon is back and plagues, smallpox, yellow fever, and other "emergencies" will be devised by those who want to finger that surplus. Mr. Damon fortunately will simply answer the attack on the treasury with a smile.

We don't think that the vagrancy law has been enforced sufficiently in Honolulu, but when the authori-

ties do make an attempt to do it, they start at the wrong end. We endorse every step the Marshal may take in ridding the town of those who are vagrants in the eyes of the laws; but he should carefully study the intention of the law before taking steps which may cause him a great deal of annoyance and grief and indignation to the other party. A few days ago an old citizen, of 64 years of age, was arrested as a "vag," by Marshal Brown. The man has resided in the island during the past thirty years and has been a prominent mechanic. Now in his old days he works at his trade whenever called upon, and he lives with a friend, who is in lucrative circumstances and who wants the old man around his premises. The alleged "vag" has never committed any act of vagrancy. He may or may not draw a regular salary and may be unable to prove "steady employ." But if any old kamaaina in the same position is to be called a "vag" by the Marshal why not begin the scooping in of the class of men in the Central Union Church or lock up poor old blind "dandy" who sits as a beggar every day next to the police station. It is a serious matter for an old man to be charged with vagrancy and locked up, and in this instance we think the temper of the Marshal got the best of good judgment.

Faust To-morrow.

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Observe Them From the Beginning  
of the New Year.

If you have to look after your  
children yourself, don't let them  
sit up late, as a general rule, on any  
terms. You need and ought to have  
some time to yourself for rest and  
recreation; and it will be bad for the  
children as well as for yourself if  
you do not get it. The important  
thing is to get your thoughts direct-  
ed into fresh channels, or in time  
you will find it difficult to think or  
talk of anything except the house  
and the children.

(If you have no children don't  
bother about this "hint" or get  
children.)

The theory of two meals a day is  
all right, and so is the practice, as  
experience has proven. Omit the  
breakfast. One cannot do hard work,  
mentally or physically, with a full  
stomach.

(There are those who "omit" three  
meals a day, and who do hard work  
on account of an empty stomach.)

The proper vegetables to serve  
with turkey are rice croquettes, boiled  
rice with cream sauce, or stewed  
celery. If white potatoes have been  
served with a previous course, baked  
sweet potatoes or sweet potato cro-  
quettes may be used.

(If you cannot afford the turkey  
be satisfied with the vegetables.  
They don't cost so much.)

Many people complain that they  
cannot drink milk without suffering  
from indigestion. Probably this is  
because they take it too quickly or  
at the wrong time. It should be  
remembered that milk is a food and  
not a beverage, and therefore should  
not be taken with a meat meal. Only  
a very robust digestion could cope  
with meat and milk simultaneously,  
though everybody can take a glass  
of milk with benefit at the right  
time.

Another reason why many people ex-  
perience difficulty in digesting milk  
is that they swallow it too quickly.  
Very shortly after entering the  
stomach milk is converted into curd,  
and if a glass of milk is swallowed  
at one gulp, the result is that the  
mass becomes an almost solid lump  
of curd, very difficult indeed to  
digest. If, however, the milk be  
taken in little sips, the curd is form-  
ed in small pieces, and trouble is  
avoided.

There is, perhaps, no better "pick-  
me-up" than a cup of hot milk, and  
it is one which may be safely in-  
dulged in. It is especially useful to  
some people on going to bed, for it  
enables them to sleep, when without  
it they probably would lie awake for  
hours. Those people who cannot  
take milk comfortably after noting  
the above hints will find they can  
do so if they add to it a little lime-  
water; a teaspoonful to a tumbler  
will be about right.

(On this "hint" we have no sug-  
gestion to offer. We have only  
met milk diluted with something  
stronger.)

The simplest and also cheapest  
way to cool a room which is oppres-  
sively hot is to wet a cloth of any  
size—the larger the better—and sus-  
pend it in the place you wish to cool.

Let the room be well ventilated,  
and the temperature will sink as  
much as 12 deg. in an hour. This  
suggestion may be carried out suc-  
cessfully for those who are compelled  
to lie in bed with a broken limb,  
and who are apt to feel overpowered  
by the heat.

(If you have no cloth to wet, ask  
your landlady to come in with her  
bill—and the temperature will be  
very chilly indeed.)

Flowers, in the summer especially,  
should be watered before sunrise or  
after sunset.

(Try it, and the man from the  
water works will be around in  
double quick time.)

TO CLEAN CUT GLASS.—First scrub  
well with warm water and soap.  
Rinse in clear water, and then brush  
well into every crevice a paste made  
of whiting and water. Let dry,  
brush off, and polish with a soft  
duster.

(The first line is dropped from  
the "hint." It should read "first get  
your cut-glass," etc.)

MENDING STOCKINGS FOR TENDER  
FEET.—Stockings mended with silk  
instead of the ordinary wool will not  
chafe tender feet. The silk should  
be almost as thick as buttonhole  
twist, and, as it lasts a long time, it  
is not as extravagant as it sounds.

(An easier method is to buy a new  
pair and charge it.)

Common salt rubbed into the roots  
of the hair at night will remove dan-

druff and prevent the hair from  
coming out.

(If bald headed don't do it.)  
Children should be taught that to  
help mother is a pleasure rather  
than a duty.

(A theory of the mothers when  
they ceased to be children.)
