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Two AG's will call it quits

Saying that he "was caught by surprise," Commonwealth Attorney General Robert Naraja said Wednesday that he has accepted the resignations of two assistants attorney general and is expecting a third to resign if she obtains a position with the CNMI Legislature.

He said that his assistants Craig Platt, former chief of the prosecution division and Steve Nutting, one of the prime criminal prosecutors, had submitted their respective resignations Tuesday, but both had given what he termed a "fair 60-day" notice.

"I think that will be plenty of time to find replacements," Naraja said. "We already are looking through a lot of resumes and letters that have come through the office in the past few weeks and we are getting back to them as soon as possible."

However, he has some concerns that the CNMI AG's office low pay offering will deter hiring the best of the applicants.

A third assistant, Pamela S. Brown, also in the criminal division, has also told her boss that she may be moving on, but has not given formal notice, he said.

Neither of the two men who

have given their formal notice gave reasons for their resignations Naraja said.

Nutting recently passed the Commonwealth Bar examina-

tion, the attorney general said and it is assumed that he will be going into private practice. "He has not become associated with a local firm yet, but heard he's

been looking at several," Naraja said.

The attorney general said Platt "had told me that he was thinking of leaving," Naraja said. See: AG LOSING, Page 31

Anatahan won't be resettled

"... I just can't risk it."

Gov. Larry Guerrero

Gov. Larry I. Guerrero told a contingent of Anatahan residents and their families Tuesday evening that he had decided that the dangers of their returning to their island home far outweighed the advantages of them being able to live the way they wanted.

He broke the news to the group at a special meeting held in the Carolinian Ute at Garapan. Before making his announcement the governor sat with the crowd of about 30 people and watched a 35-minute video tape taken on Anatahan when a group of scientists visited there.

The video showed a small lake inside one of the craters which was boiling so rapidly that the waters appeared white.

Other pools of what appeared to be boiling mud were shown in the video. Steam or gas rose off the surface of these lakes and pools which the scientists said were poison gas and carbon dioxide.

Saying that that as a person "I just can't risk it..." and as governor he had the responsibility of safeguarding their lives, and based on a report issued by a team of volcano experts, there is a clear and present danger that the dormant volcano on Anatahan could erupt at any time.

"I know there have been a lot of years put in up there trying to develop the island," he said. "But we are just at a very critical point there and just can't take the chance."

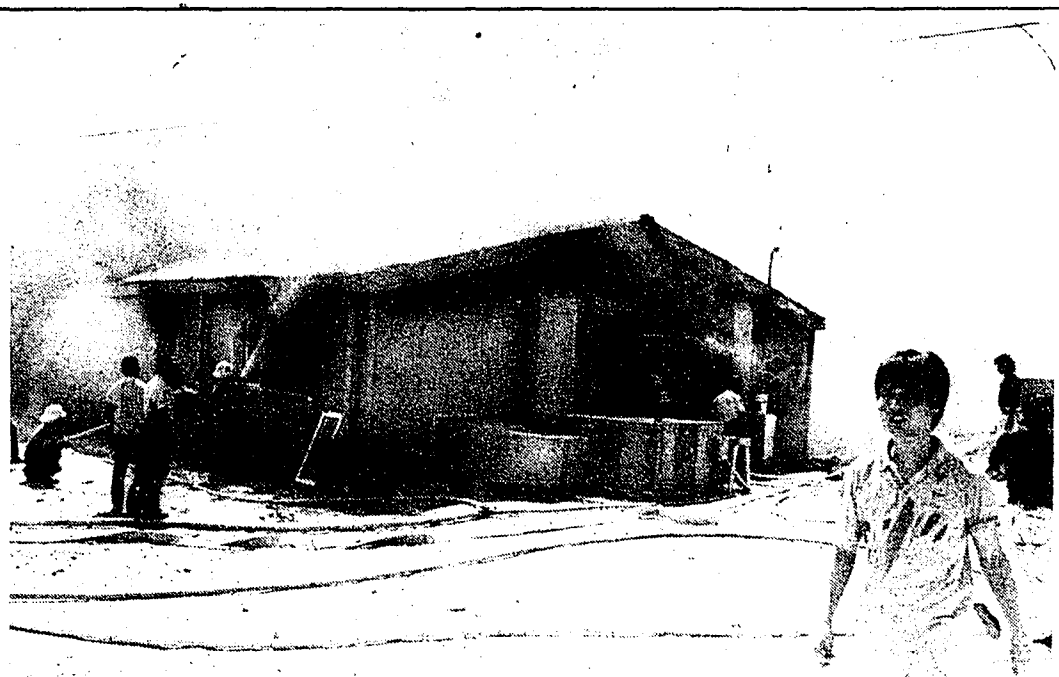
Guerrero said that he agonized over the decision and reviewed the scientific report several times and asked the opinion of others, including Civil Defense Coordinator Felix Sasamoto.

All agreed that while the volcano's present activities do not pose a danger to the 22 residents of the island, the scientists said that the "earthquakes" felt there were in all probability reverberations from the molten rock called "magma" moving around under the earth's surface in the vicinity of Anatahan.

The governor said he understood how the news would affect the people who chosen to take their families there and live a traditional way of life, but Guerrero said that as things now stands, "it just is impossible to allow them to go back."

"I know they get used to the way they live up there, they have

Fire destroys Sam Marianas barracks

Police and fire officials are attempting to piece together what happened May 8 when one of barracks at Sam Marianas Corporation suddenly burst into flames, completely destroying the 12-room complex.

Department of Public Safety spokesman Capt. Francisco C. Duenas said Thursday that Chong S. Park, one of the employees at Sam Marianas called in the alarm at about 2:09 p.m., but the fire started at 2 p.m..

When trucks arrived at the Tanapag site about nine minutes later the barracks was completely engulfed in flames. "There was really nothing they

could do, it was too late," Duenas said.

Firefighters were able to save buildings surrounding the inferno, he said. "They were very fortunate that the barracks were a 'split type,' in other words, separated from each other by about 50 feet," he said.

One woman was almost caught in the conflagration, reports show. Cata P. Loreta told police that she was sleeping inside the barracks when she heard an explosion and the barracks was in flames.

She had to break a window to escape, according to reports.

U.S. developer sees world class golf resort at Obyan

A San Francisco-based company, Haas and Haynie Corporation, has expressed an interest in developing public land at Obyan Beach into what they term a "world-class golf club resort," and at the same time wants to help upgrade infrastructure in surrounding villages.

In an April 30 letter to Senate President Joseph Inos, company representative David L. Wickline wrote that "... we have acquired the key beachfront parcel of private land at Obyan, and they need to acquire an

undisclosed amount of public land to make the resort possible.

"We want to make this a partnership with the government," Wickline said in a Thursday afternoon telephone interview and he made it clear that the company isn't trying to grab all the public land in the area - an estimated 17 million square meters.

"We don't know how much land we are going to need," Wickline said, "but it won't be anywhere near that amount."

In his letter to Inos he said "Speaking frankly, we understand that some people are skep-

tical about the promises made by developers. You have our proven record as responsible first class developers to review and take confidence in."

Wickline said that Haas and Haynie have been major players in the development of Hawaii. "We... believe CNMI and Micronesia are prime spots for world class resorts."

He said the San Francisco corporation has developed such major sites in Hawaii as the Mauna Kea beach Hotel, the Royal Hawaiian, Kahala Hill. See: GOLF RESORT, Page 23

Legislature must be under FOI law

It is pleasant to see that the Senate has passed what could possibly be one of the most important steps in opening up the government's business to the people. But, while it's nice to see senators want an open government, it is unpleasant to see that they want the proposed bill to leave them alone.

Senate Bill 7-28, as passed and originally proposed by Rota Senator Paul A. Manglona, would force all governmental agencies and bodies to open their records and hold public meetings. However, Manglona's bill would allow the Legislature to pick and choose what meetings of theirs are open and what records would be made available to the public for scrutiny using their own rules, not the law.

The Senate bill says "... The people of the Commonwealth do not yield their sovereignty to the agencies which serve them. The people, in delegating authority, do not give their public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know.

But, SB 7-28 says that the people don't have the right to know what's being done in the legislature.

Plus, the bill's Section Four attempts to assure the so-called "right to privacy" guaranteed under the Commonwealth Constitution's privacy Amendment by saying that public records would not be open to scrutiny "... only if disclosure of information about the person would be highly offensive to a reasonable person and is not of legitimate concern to the public."

What's to keep a member of any board or agency from withholding information or minutes of a meeting because what's there would "embarrass" them.

Under Article Four it would be allowed.

We feel that the public's right to know and the privacy Amendment are mutually exclusive. If someone is a public official, by definition the business they conduct is the public's business and as such are not entitled to personal privacy protection under that act.

What if someone charged with a crime invoked the privacy statute saying that revealing anything about his or her crime to the public would be "embarrassing" ...?

No, we feel that ALL public records, except those identified specifically in SB 7-28 like ongoing police records, real estate deals, private business records (except corporate formation papers), etc. are public and should not be held to be "private information."

We urge the House to continue the Senate's lead and pass a freedom of information and public meetings law. Its time has come, but we urge them to conduct public hearings on the matter and to "clean up the language."

Public officials must have the public confidence, and like the bill's author said, "... the people, in delegating authority, do not give their public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know. ..."

Governor should fight for NMI citizens

Dear Editor:

Right in the middle of our sewage crisis our Governor travels to Washington, D.C. to fight hard for the garment industry. Why? What does the Commonwealth get from this industry? We get taxes, right?

Consider this: we have the lowest paid teachers. We have been unable to pave a road. We have power outages and fluctuations. We still have water hours even though next year we celebrate the tenth anniversary of the famous statement that we will have 24 hours of water a day in six months! Drinking clean water from

the faucet is, of course, unthinkable; a dream for late the next century.

Also, we can't treat our sewage, we can't have a sanitary landfill, most of our social programs lack money and salaries essentially stay the same as inflation gets worse because our business people cater to the rich. So, if this industry is contributing so much in taxes, why is there so little to show for it?

One of the functions of the legislature is to investigate. The last time they did that was the Millard hearings; a joke on all of us. It would be perfectly proper to thoroughly investigate the garment industry so all of us

MTC expands to meet CNMI growth

Roy Morioka, vice president and general manager of Micronesian Telecommunications Corporation told members of the Saipan Chamber of Commerce May 7 that while telephone technology has improved service in the CNMI, "progress" has dealt phone service some mortal blows lately.

Morioka reminded the businessmen and women of the chamber about recent problem which locked up Saipan's intra-island and international communications for almost an entire day once and isolated Capitol Hill's telephone exchange most recently.

He said that there was nothing "wrong" with the telephone service when the problems occurred, but when contractors cut the cable on these occasions, MTC's computer system thought there were a lot of requests for dial tone at once. These "phantom" dial tone requests essentially put the computer into a tailspin.

"The recent rash of cable cuts have not only caused a 30-percent increase in trouble reports over 1989," Morioka said, "...

but they have impacted all telephone users by causing the frustratingly slow or no dial tone conditions. ..."

Morioka said that MTC uses a 16-bit processor in its DMS 10 digital switching system at Susupe. "It's operating at its maximum safe capacity now," he said.

"This leaves little capacity to handle the restoration and recovery activities associated with a cable cut," Morioka said.

What's the solution? Morioka said that since Congressman Stanley Torres authored and steered passage of legislation requiring the location of any buried cables before excavation is done, the situation has not really improved, in fact it has worsened.

Morioka said the company has purchased a lot of media advertising to seek public support and to call MTC before digging.

However, while cooperation is being observed, Morioka said more has to be done to keep the problems from happening over and over again when cables are cut.

MTS is in the process of installing what Morioka said was a "diversity network," or a fiber-optic ring network to minimize future cut problems.

Additionally, the phone company is, as a part of their \$42.5 million capital expansion program, changing the

computer "brain" which handles the island's calls to and from the rest of the world. Morioka said the new \$100,000 system operates in the 32-bit mode - more than twice as fast as the present system.

This new brain will be further improved by the third quarter of this year when MTC will replace their DMS 10 with a

DMS 100/200. This device has 10 times the capacity of the present unit, Morioka said.

MTC is also increasing its emphasis on customer service. "This has been a challenge and embarrassment for us as our previously conservative efforts ... were foreshadowed by explosive growth. Morioka said the company is expecting a 12.5 percent growth over the next five years and their customer base has doubled in only five years.

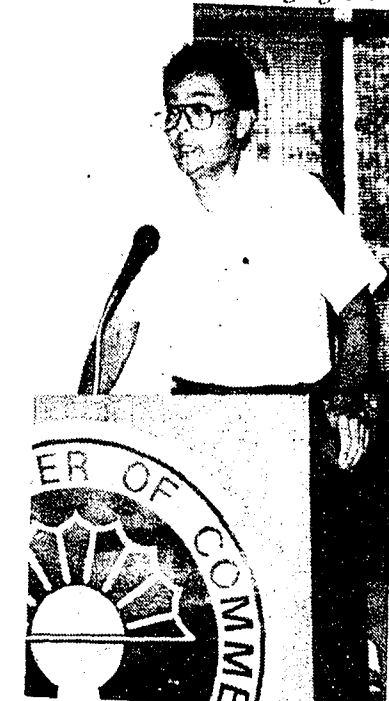
This expansion, translated into real-world terms means that MTC will be adding 392.4 miles of new metallic cable by the middle of 1990, making a

total of 573.3 miles of underground cable on Saipan alone.

MTC also plans to double its analog microwave system connecting Saipan with Tinian, Rota and Guam, expand the earth station to new digital connectivity by the third quarter of 1990, new digital switching centers will be erected in Kagman, the airport, Gualo Rai and Capitol Hill during the last three months of this year and a new international toll gateway will be opened to bring additional trunk capacity for long distance service, both data and voice.

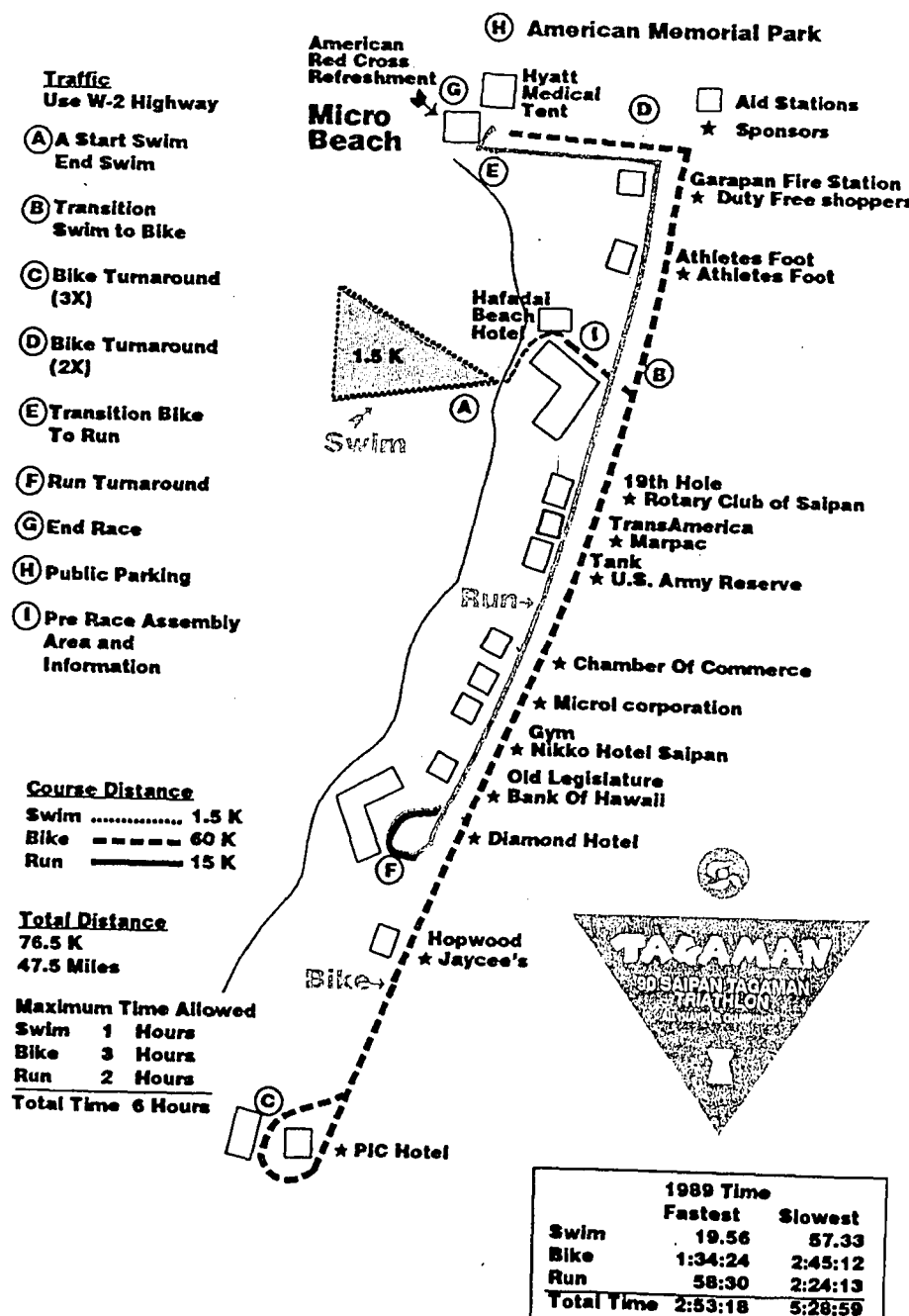
All of these new services will be in addition to the Centrex services and Cellular telephone which has already been implemented on Saipan, Morioka said. That cellular phone service will be located on Mt. Topochau and will serve Saipan and almost all of Tinian, he said.

MTC is installing redundant power supply generators in Susupe and at their remote radio station sites "in preparation for the worst weather situations," he said.

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Appeals court decision impact limited

Federal District Judge Alex Munson said Thursday that a recent Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals decision in the case of the CNMI vs. Leonara F. Bordallo dealing with a Tinian land issue "is a very narrow, and unpublished decision that has no effect on any other case."

That Ninth Circuit decision filed on May 1, 1990 said that "Appelle's motion to dismiss the appeal for lack of jurisdiction is granted. See the Com-

monwealth Judicial Reorganization Act of 1989, Northern Mariana Islands Public Law 6-25 (1989).

Munson said on its face it may appear that the Ninth Circuit had taken the CNMI's side in the question whether the Commonwealth's Supreme Court or the recently-concluded federal appeals panel had the jurisdiction to hear appeals from Superior Court.

The Wabot case is still the law of the land on that matter,

he said, but what the general public should know is that since the Ninth Circuit's decision was unpublished it may not be used as a precedent in any future case.

Judge Munson said the case was filed before the Ninth Circuit on May 2, 1989 after the Judicial Reorganization Act went into effect. "The CNMI won the initial case," Munson said, "but they wanted to appeal the case to the Ninth Circuit," he said.

Since the CNMI was the appellee and Bordallo didn't file any opposing briefs with the court, Munson said the Ninth Circuit "probably decided to award the decision to the CNMI based on the fact there was no contest." He said such actions were not unusual. "This court hears hundreds of cases a year, and if there is no opposition, as in

this case, the justices grant the decision out-of-hand to the side presenting an argument."

The federal jurist stressed several times that the Ninth's decision was not precedent-making and any attempt to use it as such in future arguments would meet with no success.

"The decision is specific to THAT case," he said, not to that "type" of case. "Just that case," he said.

He also said a typographical error in a Variety story last week in which he expressed confidence in the CNMI Supreme Court could leave the reading public with the wrong impression of a judge's power.

The sentence should have said that judges do NOT have the power to make their own arbitrary decisions, but are guided by precedents.

"That goes for all courts," he said.

Cabrera shows up, sentencing June 7

Convicted embezzler Frances Cabrera showed up on Saipan Wednesday, but no police officers rushed to arrest her as she got off the plane.

It was all a big mistake. . . That's what local attorney William M. Fitzgerald told Superior Court Judge Marty Taylor last week when he appeared to explain why his client, Frances Cabrera did not appear for sentencing last month.

Judge Taylor confirmed Wednesday that he held a hearing May 4 in which Fitzgerald told him that Cabrera had not been given formal notification of the late April sentencing date.

He said that Fitzgerald explained in court that "he couldn't find Cabrera on Guam because she had moved from one place to another and he didn't have her new address. . ."

The woman had also changed jobs, he said.

"She was on Guam all the time," Taylor said, and part of the problem was that Fitzgerald was off-island when the problem came up and as soon as he heard about it efforts were renewed to find her.

The judge also said he was giving Cabrera the benefit of the doubt " . . . because she has always shown up before for her hearings." He also said that he has vacated the arrest order and the decision which forfeited her \$10,000 appearance bond.

Although Cabrera didn't appear in the May 9 hearing, only Fitzgerald, Taylor ordered her to be on Saipan at 9 a.m. Wednesday to see probation officer Gabe Camacho and she was there on time.

Camacho said he couldn't

discuss what they talked about, but she repeated the same story as Fitzgerald that she "had no idea that she was supposed to appear on April 21, or on the re-set April 22 sentencing date."

Taylor said that her original sentencing and restitution trial was moved from April 21 to 22 because she couldn't be found then. "It was just an opportunity for the lawyer to find Cabrera," he said.

Asked why Cabrera had not been arrested when she set foot on Commonwealth soil, Taylor said the original arrest warrant had never left the office and immigration or police officials had not received it.

Taylor said her restitution and sentencing date was now "firmly" set for June 7 at 9 a.m. in Superior Court's room "C."

This is the latest in a long list of continuances or delays granted the woman convicted of taking about \$80,000 from the Commonwealth Utilities Commission during her tenure as comptroller of that agency. Her original trial date was Aug. 7, 1989, then Oct. 30, then Dec. 11, Jan. 25.

Finally, Cabrera pleaded guilty to the thefts.

Taylor declined to discuss what he felt Cabrera's sentence would be or if she would be made to pay back the money.

Zoning board will convene

The Commonwealth Zoning Board will hold its monthly meeting on Thursday May 17 at 12:00 noon at Century Insurance Company's Conference Room located in San Jose, Saipan. The meeting is open to the public.

Pressure mounts for Senate to pass budget

The cries to get on with House Bill 7-140, the supplemental appropriations bill, are getting more strident, this time the Tinian Gambling Commission is asking Senate President Joseph S. Inos to get things going.

But, Rota Senator Paul Manglona, chairman of the Fiscal Affairs Committee in the Senate, says his group "has some concerns basically about the administrative provisions, not necessarily the money aspect, its how the money is going to be used."

He estimates revisions in the House bill will be available for debate soon, possibly Tuesday.

John F. Hofschneider, chairman of the Tinian gambling commission, wrote Inos in a May 1 letter that their group needs the almost \$1 million in money appropriated in the House bill to obtain office space, buy the furniture to put in the offices, hire the people to sit behind the desks in the offices and other equipment like telefacsimile machines and copiers.

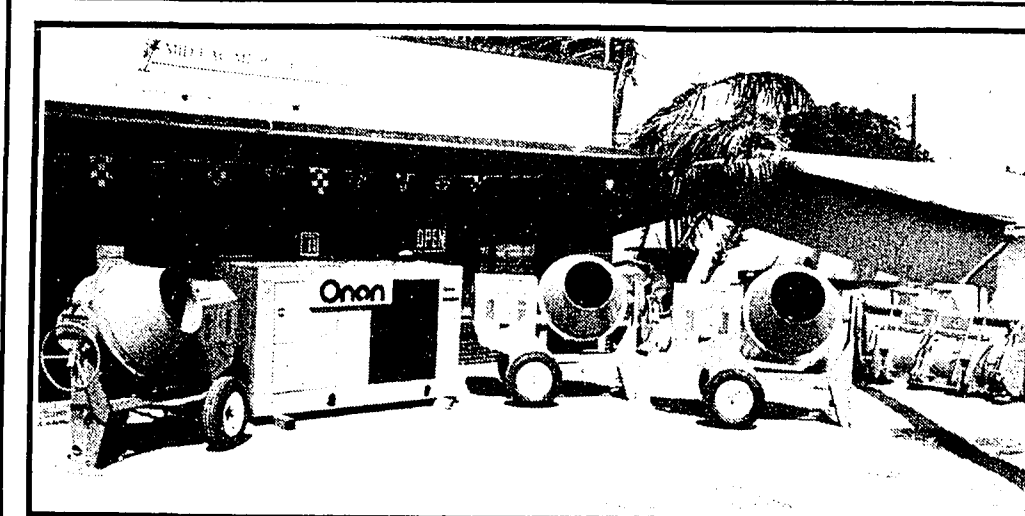
"The generated income from this industry will tremendously increase the revenue base of the Commonwealth, Hofschneider's letter said.

Lt. Gov. Benjamin Manglona has also written to Inos asking that the House Bill be reported on in an expeditious manner.

As far back as April 26 Manglona wrote as acting governor that there was an " . . . urgent need to appropriate \$2 million to immediately begin the improvement of the Sadog Tasi Sewage Treatment plant. . . In view of this alarming situation we desperately need the support and assistance of the Commonwealth Senate.

Lt. Gov. Manglona said in his letter that other agencies like the Marianas Public Lands Corporation and the Marianas Visitors Bureau was contributing a total of \$3 million.

Funding for the Commonwealth's 902 delegation is also being held up while Sen. Manglona's committee wrangles over funding provisions, as is additional monies for the public school system.



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Senate rejects Manglona nod

Because of his "activity in politics . . ." Gov. Larry I. Guerrero's choice of Vincente M. Manglona to be Tinian's representative to the CNMI's Civil Service Commission was rejected by the Senate's Committee on Executive and Legislative Appointments and Governmental Investigations.

The full Senate concurred on the rejection Tuesday.

Committee chairman Francisco Borja's letter to Senate President Joseph S. Inos said that while they felt Manglona " . . . was considered qualified, most felt that because he has been very active in politics to confirm him to serve on the said board will not be in the interest of the Commonwealth as a whole."

Borja said the committee solicited oral and written comments and found that because of said political activity and the fact that " . . . Manglona has run for public office in several elections . . . unsuccessfully...

If confirmed, he will . . . not represent the best interest of the people of Tinian, as well as the rest of the Northern Mariana Islands.

There was little debate on the rejection, and in other Senate business they confirmed:

• Pedro J.L. Igitol and John T. Flores to the Marianas Visitors Bureau Board of Directors

• Marian DLG Tudela and Nicolas T. Palacios to the Retirement Fund Board of Directors

• Oldiais Ngirakelau as Public Defender

• Joaquin Q. Atalig and Norman T. Tenori to the Mariana Islands Housing Authority Board of Directors.

Senate bill would make bomb threats felony

Sen. Edward U. Maratita said Tuesday that he is introducing legislation which would make it a felony to call in bomb threats of any kind.

He said that the proposed bill "is being reviewed by the legislative counsel and could be introduced as soon as next week."

Maratita said he felt the bill was badly needed because there

are no laws specifically addressing the crime.

Capt. Frank Duenas, public information officer for the Department of Public Safety on Saipan, said recently that a series of bomb threats at the Public School System general offices and other schools have caused a lot of concern. Chief Jose Castro echoed that concern, saying that the department had allocated a lot of resources to the investigation.

In the CNMI, once caught, the person or persons involved in these calls could only be charged with minor local offenses, such as disturbing the peace.

Federal statutes do apply, according to information supplied by the U.S. Attorney's office, but the FBI would not be involved in such an investigation or prosecution unless requested to do so by the local authorities.

Maratita's bill, if passed by both houses and signed by the governor, would provide as-yet-undisclosed penalties, but he said they would be severe because of the type of crime.

AAUW meeting

The American Association of University Women will be holding its next meeting on Wednesday, May 16 at 6:30 p.m., at the Cowtown Restaurant in Marpi, just past the Last Command Post Memorial, according to a press release from the group.

Hotel Open House will give children an opportunity to see the various hotel facilities on island. The Saipan Hotel Association will provide guided tours for children from grades one through seven.

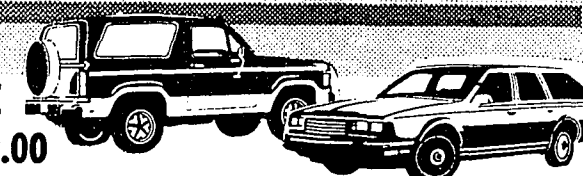

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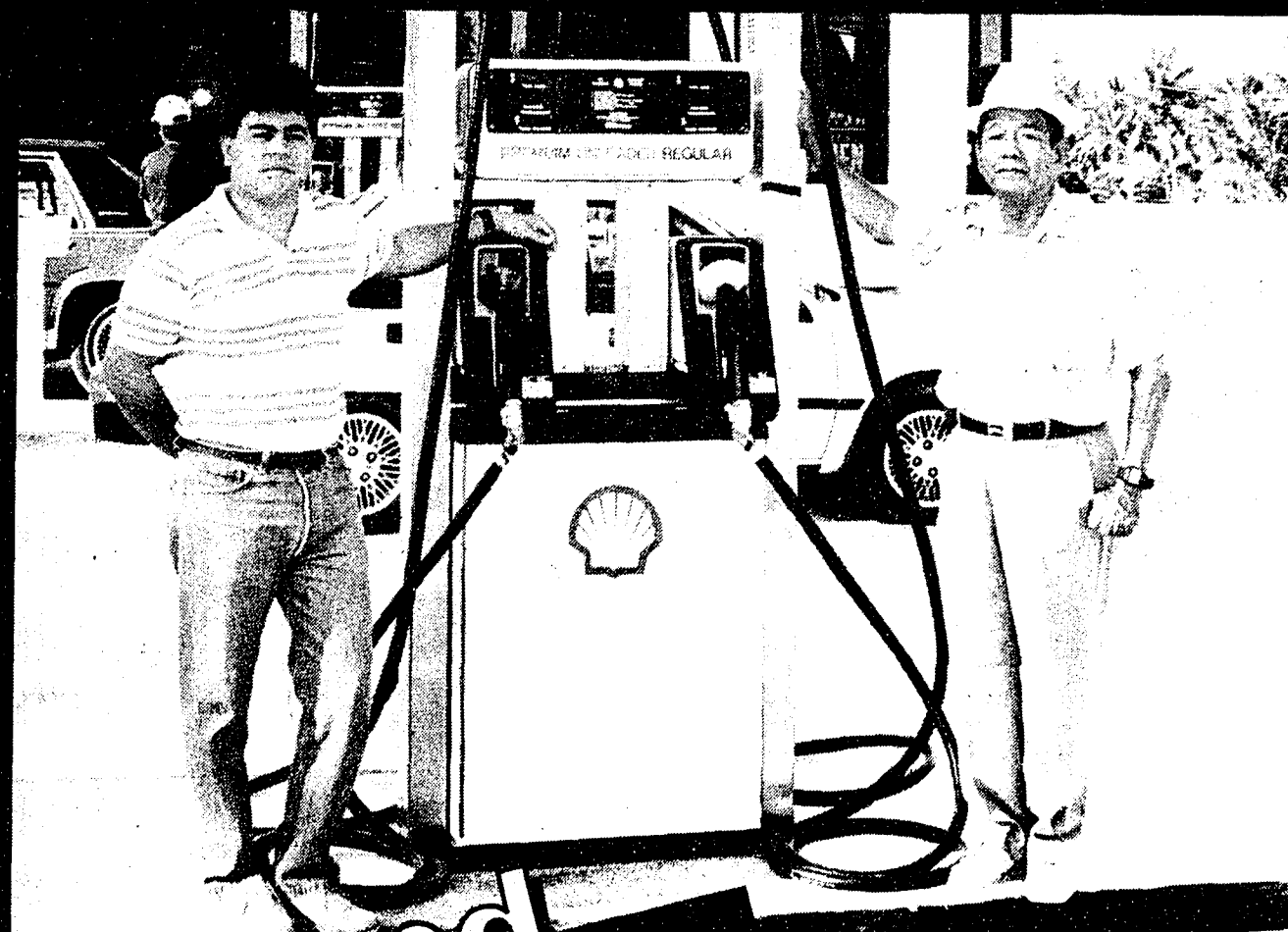


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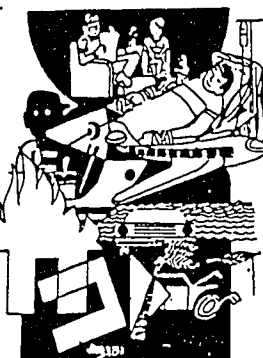

Senate passes freedom of information bill, exempts legislature

The first step toward opening meetings and records of the government were taken Tuesday when members of the Seventh Legislature passed Luta Senator Paul Manglona's measure on its "second and final reading."

Senate Bill 7-28 would open almost all government records and meetings to public scrutiny... except those of the legislature itself.

Saying that the people of the CNMI have the ultimate "sovereignty," and that they did "not give the public servants the right to decide what is good for the people to know and what is not good for them to know,"

"It's about time to open up the government," Manglona said during Tuesday's 15-minute discussion of the bill.

Speaking in impassioned tones Manglona said "We can't allow the Seventh Legislature to allow this opportunity to pass us by."

"We have to take a chance...," he said.

SB 7-28 says that the legislature would declare that all public commissions, boards, councils, committees, sub-committees, departments, offices and all other public agencies in the CNMI "exist to aid in the conduct of the people's business..." and the act's intent is that "...their actions be taken openly and that their deliberations be conducted openly."

Manglona's bill said that if passed by the legislature and signed by the governor the opens records and meetings provisions would be "liberally construed."

But, the senator's bill also said that portions of the legislation which define which meetings will be closed should be "strictly construed against closed meetings and non-disclosure of records."

Some members of the Senate

expressed serious concerns about guarding the "privacy" of the public from the prying eyes of their fellows and the media.

Floor Leader Sen. Jesus R. Sablan said he acknowledged the need for members of government to have access to records, but "...the bill would permit non-governmental intrusion into privacy."

Manglona assured Sablan that his bill was "sensitive" to privacy provisions of the Commonwealth's Constitution.

The invasion of "privacy" issue as hotly-debated among the members, but Manglona put an end to the debate when he said, "Pass it now! Let's get on with it."

Sen. Juan Torres said his concerns dealt with the "deficiencies" he saw in the bill. "Why pass it now and have it go back and forth (between the House and Senate for amendments)?"

Manglona told fellow senators that by at least getting the bill into the legislative stream and made law, it would start providing the public with information about the government.

"If we find out later something is wrong with it, it can always be amended," Manglona told the Senate.

Manglona Tuesday defended Section 14 of his proposed law which would allow the legislature to set their own rules. "...however, provisions relating to notice, agenda and minutes of meetings, and such other requirements as may be necessary, shall be governed by the respective rules and procedures of the Senate and House of Representatives, which shall take precedence over this act."

In other words the legislature can - at its own discretion - enact rules or procedures which bypass the proposed public information laws.

Manglona said that since the Legislature deals with many

sensitive issues they should not be held to the disclosure laws. However, he said the body's own rules should be amended to allow access to basic information such as expense reports and how the public money is spent.

Failure to abide by the law, under SB 7-28, would mean that a member "who attends such a meeting where action is taken..." knowing that the meeting was illegal will be personally liable for \$100 for the first offense and \$1,000 for a subsequent offense.

But the bill says that being assessed the fine by the Commonwealth Trial Court doesn't make it a crime.

Manglona's bill passed without opposition, but several members of the House have expressed dismay at its provisions and said they would introduce amendments to the act. However, none of the legislators on either side of the hall had any problem with the secrecy provisions dealing with their actions.

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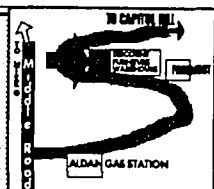
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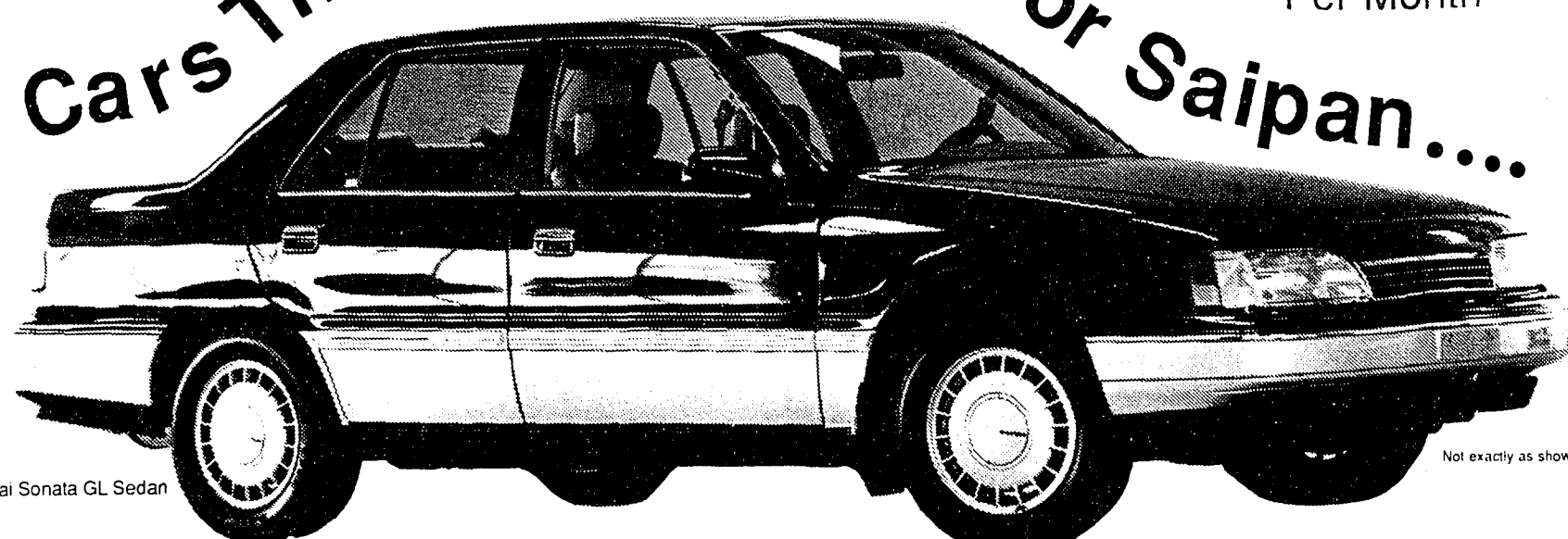
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Saipan agricultural fair in June

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Experts worry about Chamorro language

The Chamorro Language "is dying out" is the concern of Dr. Donald M. Topping the man who wrote the first Chamorro language dictionary, according to press release from PSS.

In a paper he issued recently, the University of Hawaii professor said, "There are those who maintain that the Chamorro language is dying out. There are even those who are anxious to hasten its death. If such is indeed the case, let us hope that something can be done to stop this trend."

Dr. Topping added, "Chamorro is the native language of the Chamorro people. It forms a very critical part of their personal and social vitality. It is the language they use to communicate their most intimate thoughts to their God and their loved ones. 'It is the language they use for fun by playing with both the sounds and meanings of words. It is the language they use to create dreams and fantasies and for secret thoughts. For the Chamorro people to lose this language would be a great loss indeed, one that could never be replaced. I am hopeful that the Chamorro language will continue to survive. People without a language are poor people indeed," Dr. Topping concluded.

Dr. Topping will be one of the guest speakers on the symposium on the Chamorro and Carolinian languages set to be held at the CNMI Convention Center May 23-25.

Another expert on the Chamorro language is also concerned about the fact that the knowledge of the Chamorro language is quickly disappearing. Dolores I. Marciano, Director of the PSS Chamorro Bilingual Program, said that it is very vital for everyone in this community to realize the importance of preserving the local languages.

"Let's do something to preserve our culture or languages before it is too late," Marciano said. "I totally agree with Dr. Topping that people without a language are poor

people indeed."

She coordinates the upcoming symposium with PSS Director of the Carolinian Bilingual Program, Frank Olopai.

A number of guest speakers will address the symposium. They include Dr. Topping, Dr. Robert Underwood, Dr. Bernadita Dungca, Jesus Elameto, Congressman Manny Sablan, and John Del Rosario.

Drawing and essay contests have been launched in the schools as part of the activities leading up to the symposium, Marciano said.

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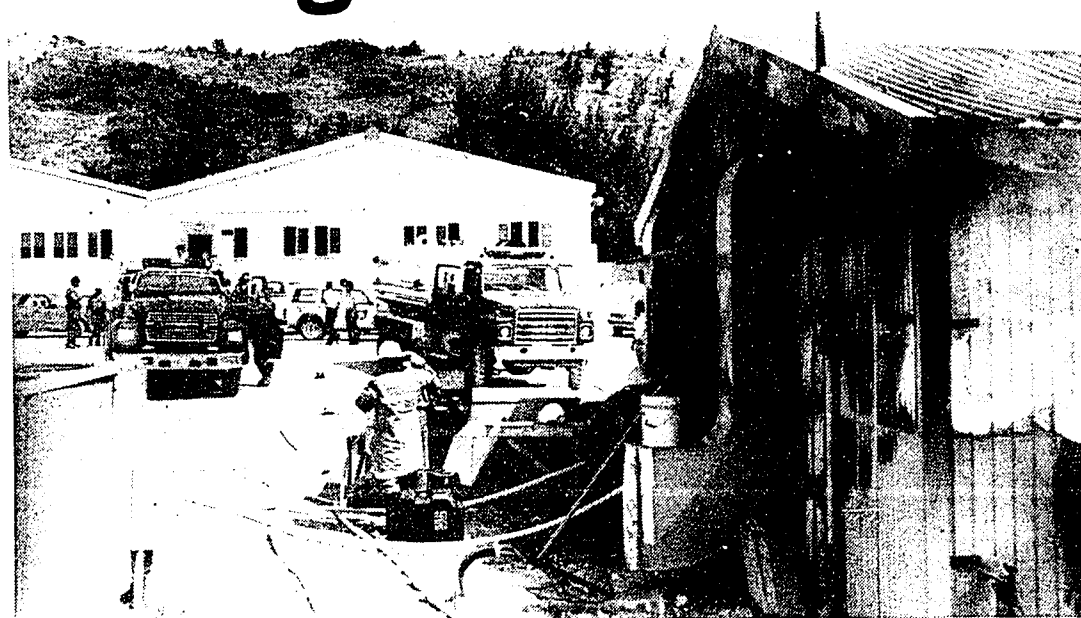

ing to police records.

While one woman broke a window to get out, another broke one to get into the building while it was in flames, Duenas said.

Clara Garcia was slightly injured when she broke into the building to retrieve some of her property, Duenas said. "We don't know what she was after, but she got it," he said Thursday.

The woman was treated at the scene by DPS ambulance technicians and transported to Commonwealth Health Center where she was diagnosed as having a lacerated leg.

Duenas said the building had 12 bedrooms, but about 29 people were staying in the rooms, and the building was "a total loss," making them homeless.

Observers at the scene said the building was not hooked up to the island's power supply and the building was relatively new. One officer who asked not to be identified said he wouldn't even term the building as a "barracks," it was more like staff quarters.

As of press time police had no estimate of damage to the building, or if there was insurance to cover the loss.

Duenas said firemen had plenty of water to fight the fire, especially with the help of a water truck from the Saipan Municipality.

No one was injured fighting the fire, he said.

Interpacific fellowship restrictions relaxed

Commonwealth residents who have been considering applying for the Inter-Pacific Fellowship Program got some good news recently. Age and background requirements for the fellowships, which can provide up to \$10,000 for educational purposes leading to a career change, have been eased, according to a press release.

The age limit for applicants has been reduced to 18 and there is no longer a requirement for prior work experience.

The changes were announced at last weekend's workshop on careers and career strategies that attracted nearly 50 participants to the Saturday morning session at Pacific Islands Club-Saipan.

The InterPacific Fellowships were instituted in the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands in 1988 by the San Francisco-based Inter-Pacific Group and co-sponsored by Continental Air Micronesia. The program is aimed at adults who want to change their lives through additional career education and training.

The fellowships are based on evaluation of potential

candidates by local advisory boards in the CNMI, Guam and Hawaii. The next deadline for Fellowship applications is September 15.

SVS would like to extend their sincere appreciation to all the generous support both from within and without the school. The additional funds will help them to continue their computer program and to motivate the students to excellence in education.

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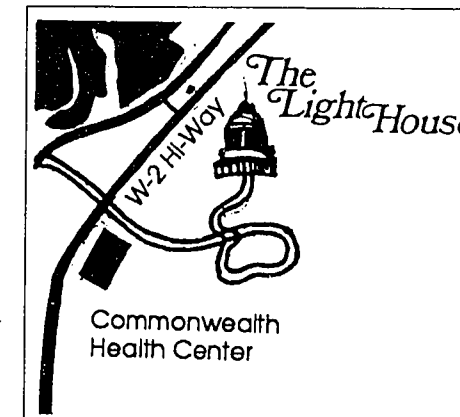

Students dropout workshop held

"Dropout is not only a school issue. It is also an economic issue; it is also a political issue."

So said Dr. Robert C. Williams in his opening remarks at the Dropout Prevention Workshop, which got underway at the Hibiscus Room at the Diamond Hotel last Monday to Wednesday, according to a press release from PSS.

Dr. Williams, who arrived in Saipan over the weekend from the States, is the Executive Director of the National Dropout Prevention Network.

He was one of the two-member team from the Western

Association of Schools and Colleges which visited Marianas and Rota High Schools last month.

He said that the whole community must be involved in the dropout issue.

The dropout rate in the United States is 30 percent of the total student enrollment, he said. But there is not much help from the national government to the dropout prevention network, he added.

He said the U.S. Congress appropriated only \$24 million for the national dropout program for school year 1991-92. This amount, he said, is inadequate, considering the fact

that the State of South Carolina, for example, expended \$24 million for its own local dropout prevention program.

The aim of the workshop is to come up with a more effective dropout prevention plan for the CNMI, said Catalino (Nunu) Sanchez, PSS Family Improvement Coordinator.

William S. Torres, Deputy Commissioner of Education for Instruction, represented Commissioner of Education Elizabeth D. Rechebei in welcoming the participants to the workshop.

Among the people who attend the workshop are school principals, vice principals, school counselors, PTA presidents, and private school representatives. Other participants are from the local youth-serving agencies and Saipan Chamber of Commerce.

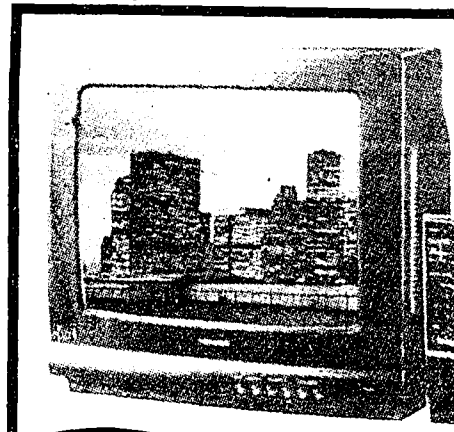


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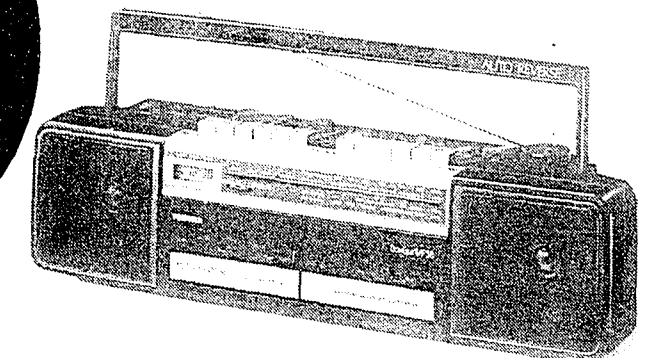
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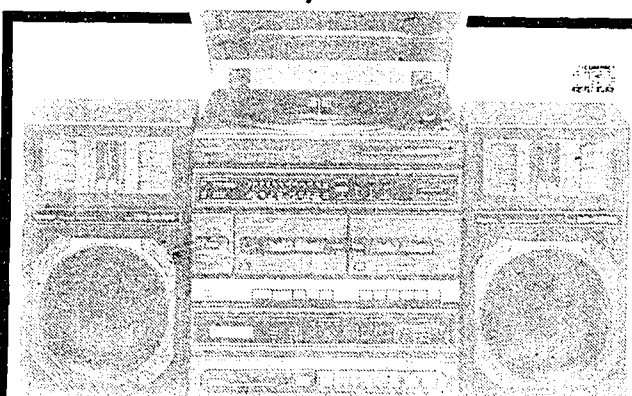
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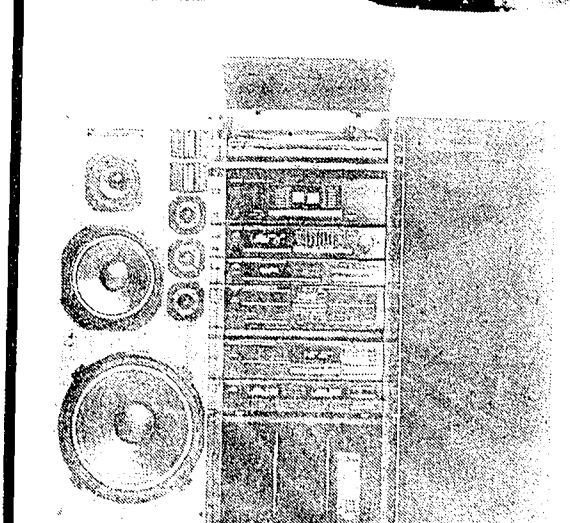
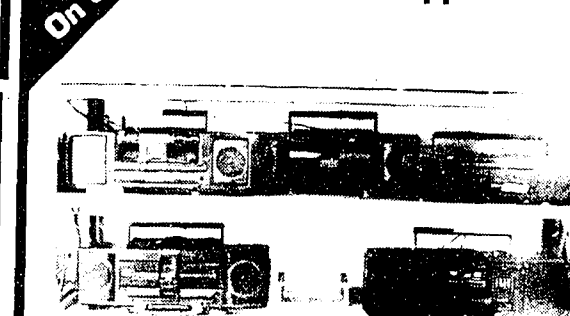
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Girl Scout leaders prepare for the future

Archaeological report presented to local libraries

Three libraries on Saipan were presented with copies of an archaeological study of the Afetna area of San Antonio which was funded by Pacific Islands Club-Saipan, according to a press release from PIC.

The archaeological survey was conducted for the Division of Historic Preservation after human remains and various artifacts were found during construction of the San Antonio resort.

Archaeologist Rick McGovern-Wilson of New Zealand's University of Otago authored the lengthy report based on excavations made throughout the property.

The report indicates a long period of prehistoric occupation. World War II activity and later construction activity disturbed some artifacts, but the report indicates much material survived undisturbed.

Pacific Islands Club-Saipan General Manager Terry Short presented copies of the volume to the Northern Marianas College and Mount Carmel School during a ceremony last week at the NMC library's Pacific Collection. The Marianas High School library is also receiving a copy of the book.

Mr. Short said that the resort is currently working with the Division of Historic Preservation to prepare a display of material turned up during the archaeological "dig".

Shell Marianas donates to NMC program

During a brief ceremony Tuesday at the Shell Marianas terminal office, terminal manager Bill Hartman presented a \$500.00 check to officials of the Northern Marianas College (NMC). The

donation is earmarked for the college's Early Childhood Program, according to news release from NMC.

In presenting the check, Hartman said, "Shell Marianas is pleased to assist NMC in its

efforts to enrich the educational opportunities of our young children. We feel it is an important investment in the future."

The purpose of NMC's Early Childhood Program is to test and evaluate model educational programs for young children, with specific regard for potential application in the CNMI schools.

The first program targeted for evaluation is called "Writing to

Read". A computer-based instructional system that teaches young children how to write what they can say and to read what they write, it is being used successfully in the U.S. Through an agreement between NMC and the Public School System, the Writing to Read Program will be implemented at San Vicente Elementary School during the 1990-91 school year. The school's kindergarten and first grade students, about 100

children in all, will participate in the program.

NMC's Pakka Kavan, Research Coordinator for the program, explains, "Tremendous results have been achieved where this program has been used in the U.S., particularly in schools where many children are acquiring English as a second language. We're hoping to see similar results here, to strengthen the reading skills beginning at the very first grades in schools."

ton, Maui Intercontinental, Sheraton +, as well as facilities on the mainland.

"With your support we can create a golf course resort on Saipan that will resemble the Mauna Kea beach Hotel. . . . Our development . . . was so highly regarded that it sparked the overall development of the Big Island of Hawaii," Wickline wrote.

Wickline wrote that the development concept id to " . . . create a championship gold course resort that highlights the beauty of Obyan beach and Naftan Peninsula and to have a five-star hotel and low density condominiums.

"We have found a lot of people are interested in us because we are American developers," Wickline said in the telephone interview, "and we hope that will work to our advantage."

He said in the letter that "We have worked for over one year to plan and assemble the site at Obyan Beach . . . (and) . . . We respected the government's policy that developers first acquire private land before permitting use of public lands for development."

But, the letter said there isn't enough private land in the area to develop, and that's where the need for the leasing of public land comes in.

Wickline said the company is actively seeking the advice of lawmakers as to what they think is needed and they are preparing a master plan for the resort using a Honolulu firm who are considered " . . . one of the world's top designers of resorts," he wrote, "as well as the gold course will be designed by a world famous golfer."

Local residents will be able to attend a specially designed golf school, Wickline said in his letter, and the development will provide an improved public access to the beach, improvement of the infrastructure to benefit surrounding areas, nature trails in the conservation area, improve the Boy Scout camping facilities, create a botanical garden and a cultural center where island artists can perform and exhibit.

He said Thursday that plans are still in a "very formative stage," and felt that within a few weeks the company could have more concrete plans.

Wickline stressed the letter to Inos was one of several that went out to tell them what's going on and to solicit support and advice.

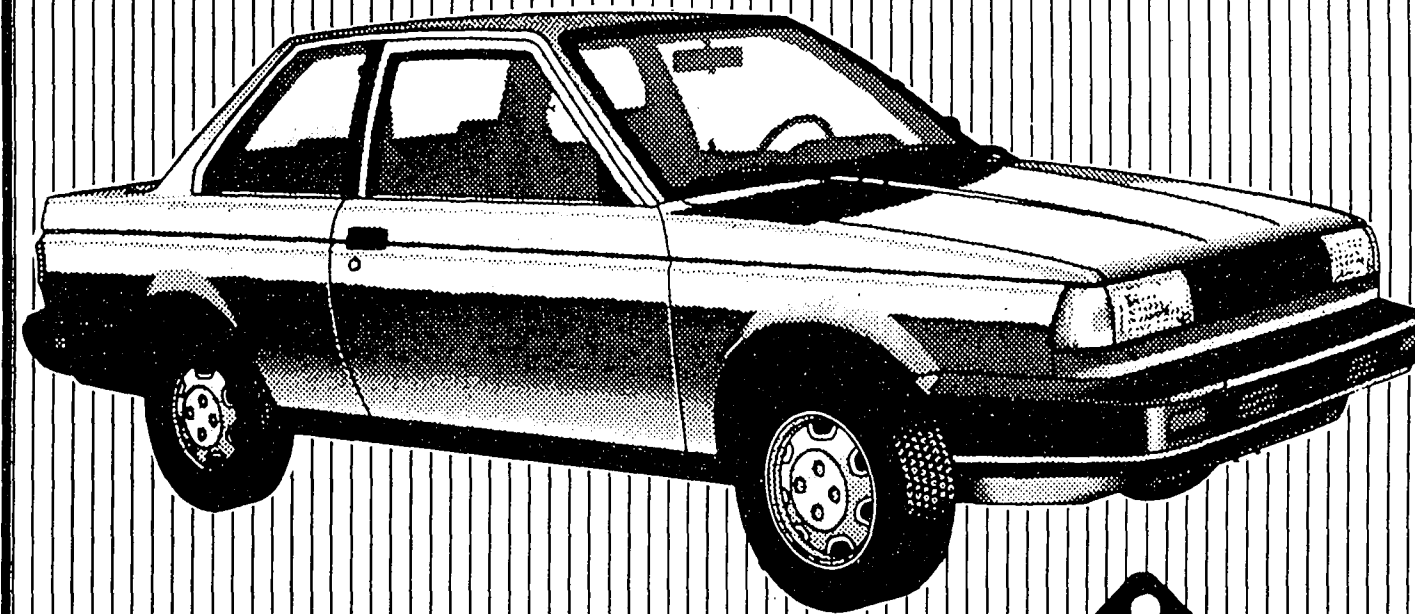

professional listings, including Who's Who in America, American Men of Science, Contemporary Authors, Outstanding Educators of America, and Who's Who in Computers and Data Processing.

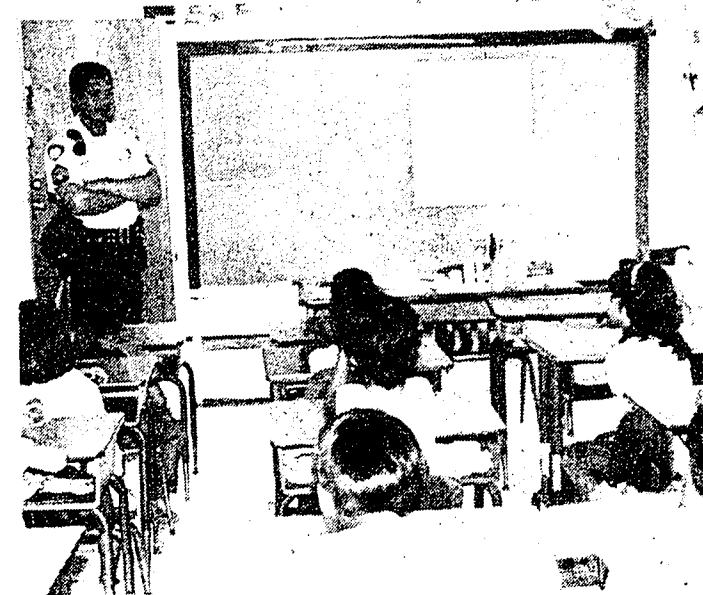

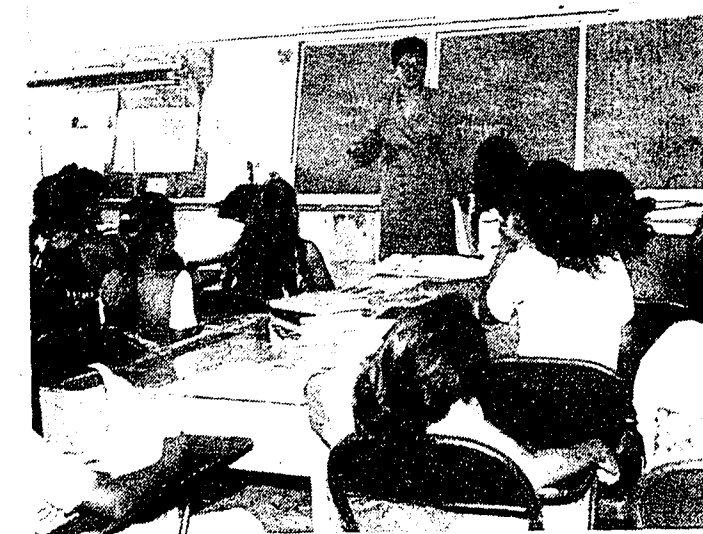

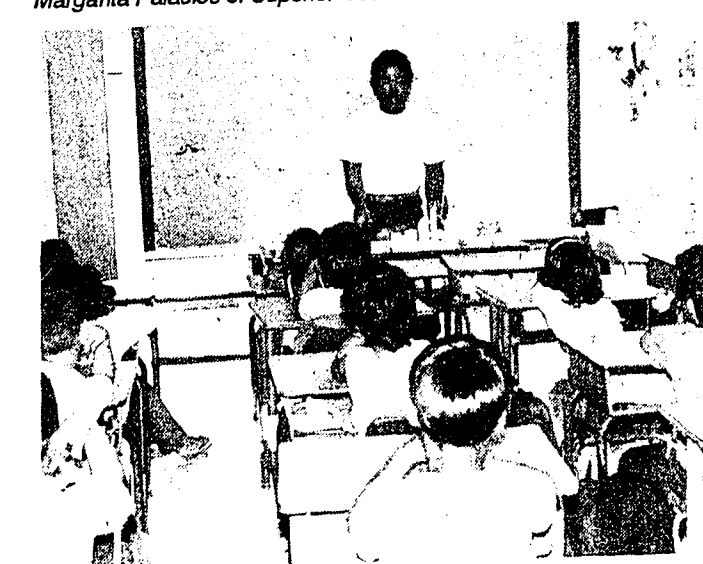
