Beware of Japanese Drugs.

Dr. Shorey, Food Commissioner, reported on Wednesday to the Board of Health on Japanese drugs which had been sent from Hawaii for examination, as they were considered dangerous to the lives of the users. His report is as follows:  
HONOLULU, H. I., May 8, 1901.

To the President of the Board of Health.

Sir: A few days ago I received from Dr. Irwin of North Hilo through Dr. Pratt two packages of Japanese medicine for examination. With regard to this medicine I beg to report as follows:

Each of the packages contained the same medicine; one which had not been opened contained fourteen envelopes each containing five pills; the other contained seven such envelopes, half having been used. The active principle in these pills was found to be Thalline Sulphate. Thalline salts are powerful antipyretics and may act as a direct blood poison; and would produce the effect noted by Dr. Irwin. Recent authorities state that the internal use of these salts is obsolete; and I have not been able to find any evidence of their use in this way by regular physicians or of their sale for this purpose by reputable druggists.

As this seems to be a case of Japanese suffering at the hands of other Japanese, and as people of other nationalities are not likely to use this medicine as sold at present, perhaps the best plan would be to draw the attention of the Japanese Consul to the matter.

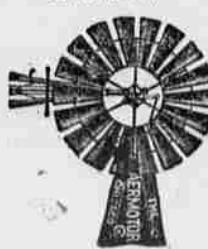

## HOW THEY LOOK AT US.

"The Hawaiian Legislature may be in the hands of 'niggers,' yet it has done one good thing already in providing for the establishment of municipal and local self-rule. Under the monarchy and under the sugar planters' republic the central government exercised all power, and all expenses were paid out of the central government's treasury. Now each town or city must shift for itself, more or less. Honolulu may suffer by this new law, for Honolulu always received more in state funds than it contributed in taxes. A city band was maintained at the expense of all the people of the islands, and other luxuries were not unknown which the country people had to pay for. Honolulu must now pay for its own music, if the band be maintained." Springfield (Mass.) Republican, April 23th, 1901.

## DON'T CRIPPLE THE POLICE.

The intention of the Legislature to slash salaries and make the biennial "spiral" of retrenchment is commendable and natural. We shall at all times back retrenchment in its proper place. We ask, however, the members of the Legislature to carefully consider existing conditions before they "slash" at the appropriation for the police department. The members must know that the present force is totally inadequate and that the men are under paid. We ask the members from Maui whether they consider it a sufficient police protection to have three (3) officers for the District of Hana, four (4) for Lahaina, (of course Oily Bill is there) and twelve (12) for the district of Waikuku which includes Spreckelsville and Kihel plantations. Thousands of negroes and Porto Ricans will be imported here during the year. They have no fellow feeling towards the Hawaiians and they are of a most suspicious character. Are the honorable gentlemen from the country district willing to sit in the Legislative hall while their families and friends are daily in danger of assault and murder simply because the small force of police now available cannot cover a hundred miles in a minute? The Independents and some Republicans have no use for the Mounted Patrol. Let that branch go if it is considered wise, and let us go back to the old system when the government owned a stable and horses and could dispatch a man at a moment's notice to any suburb or valley. But by all means let Honolulu have the police-call system which will probably, effectively replace the mounted patrol. We have heard of a kick against the secret police. It is necessary to have such a branch of

the Department in a Territory like Hawaii, with its cosmopolitan population. No work could be done here by detectives publicly announced as such. We have no love for a "police spy" but he is a necessary evil here. We claim that if the people, through the Senate, expressed confidence in the High Sheriff, the legislature should express its further confidence by voting a liberal appropriation for the police department and place a sum at his disposition for secret service or perhaps better call it an emergency fund.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

District Attorney Baird is improving. He has learned the meaning of the word "pau." May it extend to his official position.

The new appointments give general satisfaction but the new incumbents should remember that the Independents are the men who secured the offices for them and that their party should be recognized in the patronage of the new "ministers." We are glad to see that Land Commissioner Boyd, who is a true Hawaiian, has made Stephen Mahaulu his chief clerk. It never pays for a chief of a department which is of a political nature to become "hookano" or try to kick against the majority. If he does he will be turned down because majority rules in America.

There are few men whom we respect more than Mr. Alfred S. Hartwell. Although he has been able to eat the pap of the Treasury for some years, in and out of office, he has always been, to our knowledge at least, a fair and honest man to deal with, when matters connected with Hawaii were in question. We regret, under the circumstances to see Mr. Hartwell publicly take up cudgels, in a political sense, for Governor Dole. We make no reference to Mr. Hartwell's innuendoes and attacks on men who differ from him which appear in his published letter. All we ask is that he and other earnest citizens will act as honest men and we put this question to Mr. Hartwell in his capacity as a fairly good citizen, a good jurist, and a very good personal, whether Governor Dole should not have allowed an extension of a session which was cut prematurely short owing to the system of interpretation, and which was undoubtedly hampered by the lack of knowledge of the men who the country sent to organize the beginning of a new Territory. We wish General Hartwell had been a member of that Legislature, and we are willing to bet that he would often have followed the example of Senator Baldwin who twenty times a day turned around to Senator Carter and said: "Can't you shut up?" Governor Dole should have made allowances for the crudity of the work of the first Legislature of Hawaii. That he failed to do so is his political death, but we honestly say that we feel sorry to see Hartwell as his undertaker or the person laying the political remains at rest.

We were pleased to read the following paragraph in the local columns of the Advertiser this morning:

"At a meeting of the Protective League yesterday afternoon the principal business was the creation of a special committee to secure a provisional home for any person needing the aid of the society. Many children and young women who have been arrested or have gone astray, need such a place to live in. The committee will act immediately, as several applicants are now waiting."

For years has THE INDEPENDENT called attention to the abnormal conditions existing in this rich city, in regard to poor girls whom the police is forced to drag into court. For years has the District Magistrate expressed his regret that neither the government or the

"good" people would help him in placing the unfortunate girls in a reformatory house or in some place which would not compel him to send them to jail. For years have we looked for court missionaries who should be on duty whenever a poor girl is arraigned, but we have so far failed to see any practical results of the alleged work of the "good" people who make nights hideous by their screeching and drumming in the streets. The men may need reforming but they are supposed to be able to look after themselves. If they don't, the police will. But the poor young girls who go astray have never had any protection here, because there has never been a place to which the magistrate could send them, except to jail. Leave the men alone, friends of the Penal Mission, Salvation Army and the Protective League and devote your time and your work to those who in course of time may become mothers of men.

Beware of Japanese Drugs.

Dr. Shorey, Food Commissioner, reported on Wednesday to the Board of Health on Japanese drugs which had been sent from Hawaii for examination, as they were considered dangerous to the lives of the users. His report is as follows:

HONOLULU, H. I., May 8, 1901.

To the President of the Board of Health.

Sr: A few days ago I received from Dr. Irwin of North Hilo through Dr. Pratt two packages of Japanese medicine for examination. With regard to this medicine I beg to report as follows:

Each of the packages contained the same medicine; one which had not been opened contained fourteen envelopes each containing five pills; the other contained seven such envelopes, half having been used. The active principle in these pills was found to be Thalline Sulphate. Thalline salts are powerful antipyretics and may act as a direct blood poison; and would produce the effect noted by Dr. Irwin. Recent authorities state that the internal use of these salts is obsolete; and I have not been able to find any evidence of their use in this way by regular physicians or of their sale for this purpose by reputable drug gists.

As this seems to be a case of Japanese suffering at the hands of other Japanese, and as people of other nationalities are not likely to use this medicine as sold at present, perhaps the best plan would be to draw the attention of the Japanese Consul to the matter.

HOW THEY LOOK AT US.

"The Hawaiian Legislature may be in the hands of 'niggers,' yet it has done one good thing already in providing for the establishment of municipal and local self-rule. Under the monarchy and under the sugar planters' republic the central government exercised all power, and all expenses were paid out of the central government's treasury. Now each town or city must shift for itself, more or less. Honolulu may suffer by this new law, for Honolulu always received more in state funds than it contributed in taxes. A city band was maintained at the expense of all the people of the islands, and other luxuries were not unknown which the country people had to pay for. Honolulu must now pay for its own music, if the band be maintained." Springfield (Mass.) Republican, April 23th, 1901.

DON'T CRIPPLE THE POLICE.

The intention of the Legislature to slash salaries and make the biennial "spiral" of retrenchment is commendable and natural. We shall at all times back retrenchment in its proper place. We ask, however, the members of the Legislature to carefully consider existing conditions before they "slash" at the appropriation for the police department. The members must know that the present force is totally inadequate and that the men are under paid. We ask the members from Maui whether they consider it a sufficient police protection, to have three (3) officers for the District of Hana, four (4) for Lahaina, (of course Oily Bill is there) and twelve (12) for the district of Wailuku which includes Spreckelsville and Kihikihi plantations. Thousands of negroes and Porto Ricans will be imported here during the year. They have no fellow feeling towards the Hawaiians and they are of a most suspicious character. Are the honorable gentlemen from the country district willing to sit in the Legislative hall while their families and friends are daily in danger of assault and murder simply because the small force of police now available cannot cover a hundred miles in a minute? The Independents and some Republicans have no use for the Mounted Patrol. Let that branch go, if it is considered wise, and let us go back to the old system when the government owned a stable and horses and could dispatch a man at a moment's notice to any suburb or valley. But by all means let Honolulu have the police-call system which will probably, effectively replace the mounted patrol. We have heard of a kick against the secret police. It is necessary to have such a branch of

the Department in a Territory like Hawaii, with its cosmopolitan population. No work could be done here by detectives publicly announced as such. We have no love for a "police spy" but he is a necessary evil here. We claim that if the people, through the Senate, expressed confidence in the High Sheriff, the legislature should express its further confidence by voting a liberal appropriation for the police department and place a sum at his disposition for secret service or perhaps better call it an emergency fund.

## TOPICS OF THE DAY.

District Attorney Baird is improving. He has learned the meaning of the word "pau." May it extend to his official position.

The new appointments give general satisfaction but the new incumbents should remember that the Independents are the men who secured the offices for them and that their party should be recognized in the patronage of the new "ministers." We are glad to see that Land Commissioner Boyd, who is a true Hawaiian, has made Stephen Mahaulu his chief clerk. It never pays for a chief of a department which is of a political nature to become "hookano" or try to kick against the majority. If he does he will be turned down because majority rules in America.

There are few men whom we respect more than Mr. Alfred S. Hartwell. Although he has been able to eat the pap of the Treasury for some years, in and out of office, he has always been, to our knowledge at least, a fair and honest man to deal with, when matters connected with Hawaii were in question. We regret, under the circumstances to see Mr. Hartwell publicly take up cudgels, in a political sense, for Governor Dole. We make no reference to Mr. Hartwell's insinuations and attacks on men who differ from him which appear in his published letter. All we ask is that he and other earnest citizens will act as honest men and we put this question to Mr. Hartwell in his capacity as a fairly good citizen, a good jurist, and a very good personal, whether Governor Dole should not have allowed an extension of a session which was cut prematurely short owing to the system of interpretation, and which was undoubtedly hampered by the lack of knowledge of the men who the country sent to organize the beginning of a new Territory. We wish General Hartwell had been a member of that Legislature, and we are willing to bet that he would often have followed the example of Senator Baldwin who twenty times a day turned around to Senator Carter and said: "Can't you shut up?" Governor Dole should have made allowances for the crudity of the work of the first Legislature of Hawaii. That he failed to do so is his political death, but we honestly say that we feel sorry to see Hartwell as his undertaker or the person laying the political remains at rest.

We were pleased to read the following paragraph in the local columns of the Advertiser this morning:

"At a meeting of the Protective League yesterday afternoon the principal business was the creation of a special committee to secure a provisional home for any person needing the aid of the society. Many children and young women who have been arrested or have gone astray, need such a place to live in. The committee will act immediately, as several applicants are now waiting."

For years has THE INDEPENDENT called attention to the abnormal conditions existing in this rich city, in regard to poor girls whom the police is forced to drag into court. For years has the District Magistrate expressed his regret that neither the government or the

"good" people would help him in placing the unfortunate girls in a reformatory house or in some place which would not compel him to send them to jail. For years have we looked for court missionaries who should be on deck whenever a poor girl is arraigned, but we have so far failed to see any practical results of the alleged work of the "good" people who make nights hideous by their screeching and drumming in the streets. The men may need reforming but they are supposed to be able to look after themselves. If they don't, the police will. But the poor young girls who go astray have never had any protection here, because there has never been a place to which the magistrate could send them, except to jail. Leave the men alone, friends of the Penial Mission, Salvation Army and the Protective League and devote your time and your work to those, who in course of time may become mothers of men.
