



BALLOONING.

G'S ANSWER TO MR. HORNER. EDITOR BULLETIN :- Permit me, Mr. Editor, to give Mr. Horner a short answer to his lengthy article. I have read it very earefully, and, notwithstanding its 1 ngth, I find very little in it worth answering. My questions were short, and required only a short response, and some of them Mr. Horner has not touched on at all. I still hold the

opinion that; 1st, Moderate drinking, as a glass of light wine or beer at the dinner table, does not hurt, but to the con-

2nd, That it is no sin against religion or morals to do it.

3d, Where prohibition is enforced it fosters hypocrisy, foreing people to deceive others, and that is a greater sin than the moderate use of liquors. I can give many examples from these islands to substantiate the above statement.

4th, That it is not contrary to health to use liquor moderately. 'The British Medical Association' has recently published statistics of the causes of 4234 (four thousand two hundred and thirty-four) deaths. The committee nominated to ascertain the effects of liquor on the human body, divided the different classes as follows: 1st, Total abstainers; 2d, habitually temperate drinkers; 3d, careless drinkers; 4th, free drinkers; 5th, decidedly intemperate drinkers. The result of the investigation is that in class: 1st, the lifetime averaged, 51 22-100 years, in 2d, 63 13-100, in 3d, 59 67-100, in 4th, 57 59-100, in 5th

In another test all deaths under 10 years were excluded, and the result was: In class 1st, 57 31-100, in 2d, 66 48-100, in 3d, 61 52-100, in 4th, 58 87-100, in 5th, 52 62-100. I suppose that Mr. Horner considers the body bearing the name of "The British Medical Association" an authority, and I hope that Mr. Horner excuses, me for believthe B. M. A. a more reliable source in what statistics concern than Mr. Horner and the one sided advocates of prehibition.

In conclusion I will take the liberty to cite the old proverb: "If a cause is good, the most violent attacks of its enemies will not injure it so much as an injudicious defence of it by its friends."

AERONAUTIC!

No Balloon Ascension on Saturday ... The Reason Why.

Close on to five thousand persons assembled in Kapiolani Park and vicinity on Saturday to witness a balloon ascension by Prof. Emil Melville. Soon after seven o'clock in the morning people started for the THE tram car track is being laid park, and towards noon the scene on the Waikiki road was a lively one. The tramears were crowded to their utmost capacity, and the busses and backs were also largely patronized. Hundreds of peop e were to be seen on the top of Punchbowl while a good many took position on the slopes of Diamond Head. The spectators at the Park were composed of all classes and the utmost good order prevailed, notwith-

> fessor commenced to make arrangements for the ascent. The balloon was secured at the top by a rope extending from two poles. A board fence, some fifteen feet high, had been erected to shelter the balloon from the wind, which blew rather strong during the afternoon. Prof. Melville has an apparatus of his own for inflating the balloon. The furnace was buried in the ground the balloon being supplied with the gas through a funcel. A few minutes before 4 o'clock when the inflation was going on as nicely as possible, a rent about a foot long was noticed near the top of the balloon with smoke issning from it. When this became generally known there was a bitter disappointment among the crowd and a good many people at once left for home. Melville at first decided not to attempt the ascension, but a little later on the rent was sewn up and inflation again begun. The strong wind seriously interfered with the work of inflation. A few minutes before o'clock the balloon caught on fire and for a few moments until it was put out there was the liveliest kind of a scene. Fortunately no accident occurred. A general rush for home was now made by the crowd as it was quite certain there would be no ascension. The King and Queen, Princesses Liliuokalani and Poomaikelani, Princes Kawananakoa and Kalanianaole, attended by Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Robertson were in the Jockey Club stand during the afternoon. The Hawaiian band

played several selections. Of course the crowd was disappointed, and many expressions to that effect were heard. No one felt it more than Prof. Melville himself. and he is bound to keep faith with the public. Next Saturday he will give a free ascension from a central position, and it is to be hoped that the weather will be entirely favorable. Prof. Melville has sent the following letter for publication:

DEATH OF MR. S. HARDGASTLE.

At four o'clock this morning Mr. Simon Hardenstle, a well known resident, died at the White House, Nuuana avenue, after a brief illness. The deceased was a native of Yorkshire, England, and when a young man visited Canada and Australia, working in the gold mines in the latter country. He came to these islands in 1863, being first employed by Mr. Hugues at the Honoiulu Iron Works as a machinist. He was engineer at Lahaina plantation for about three years, and was also with Mr. Afong in the same capacity for a number of years. 'He assisted in the erection of machinery at many of the plantations on Hawaii. He saved considerable money and for several years past did no work at all, oceasionally taking a trip to the Coast and back. He was unmarried, about 66 years of age. The funeral takes place this afternoon at four o'clock from the White House.


