THE DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM

As Adopted In Convention at the
Orpheum Theatre Last Night.

The Democratic Party in Territorial Convention assembled does, for itself and for its candidates, make declaration of the following principles:

We indorse the nominees of the Democratic party for President and Vice President of the United States and the platform upon which they stand.

We indorse the candidates of the Democratic party of the Territory of Hawaii for senators and representatives, and believing that no more fitting representative of the Hawaiian people could be chosen for Congressional honors than the one who stood in the line of succession to the Hawaiian throne, we indorse the candidacy of David Kawananakoa, a lineal descendant of Kaunualii, King of Kauai, for Delegate to Congress.

The National Democratic party has declared itself in favor of territorial expansion when such expansion "takes in desirable territory which can be erected into States of the Union and whose people are willing and fit to become American citizens," and the Democratic party of Hawaii denounces, as antagonistic to the interests of Hawaii, the policy of the National Republican party which favors a territorial expansion taking in other sugar producing islands.

The National Democratic party has declared itself to be unalterably opposed to imperialism, which is the "seizing or purchasing of distant islands to be governed outside the Constitution and whose people can never become citizens."

We charge that the plank of the platform of the Republican party of the Territory of Hawaii favoring Statehood, is not in harmony with the fixed plan of the National Republican party which aims to prevent and hinder the further admission of States to the Union, as is so clearly evidenced by the failure of that party to carry out its past pledges to grant Statehood to the Territories of Arizona, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

We charge that the plank of the platform of the Republican party of the Territory of Hawaii favoring the construction of the Nicaragua Canal under governmental ownership and control, does not harmonize with the record of the National Republican party. And we denounce the refusal of a Republican majority in the last Congress to pass the Nicaragua Canal bill, as an act unfriendly to Hawaiian interests.

We charge that every plank of the platform of the Republican party of the Territory of Hawaii, which on its face would seem to denote friendship for the native Hawaiian, is but an ingenious bid for votes, and that the Republican ticket, as a whole, and the past record of a large majority of its active supporters, makes it but too patent that the seeming concern of the Republican party in the political welfare of the native Hawaiian has its hypocritical beginning and end in a selfish purpose to corral the forgetful voter.

The Democratic party, as the acknowledged and trusted friend of the laboring classes, declares itself to be in favor of an eight-hour labor law, and the giving of all government work to citizens of the Territory of Hawaii, not, however, to the exclusion of male Hawaiian residents of European nationality who, because of their inability to speak, read and write the English or Hawaiian languages, are denied American citizenship.

We favor the immediate passage by the next Legislature of laws

THE DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

There can be no denial that a wise platform has been framed and adopted by the Democratic party of the Territory of Hawaii. There are those of course among the haoles, who smile or even object to the mention of the royal blood of the delegate elect to Congress. The Hawaiians who have an overwhelming majority of the votes, are still imbued with their native born aloha for their Alii and they approve of the idea that the first representative of the Hawaiian Territory to Congress shall be a man representing the Hawaiians, the Alii as well as the commoner.

The plank which refers to the hypocritical platform of the Republicans find a ready response in the hearts of the Hawaiian voters. How can any self respecting Hawaiian join a crowd which would have murdered him in 1887, 1889, 1893 and 1895 if they had possessed the courage needed for carnage? It is too late in the day for the men who wanted the scalps of the Hawaiians who shot them down with unrestricted glee whenever an opera bouffe revolution occurred to talk about their aloha for the Hawaiians. No affiliation, no fusion can be made between the "missionaries" and the Hawaiians; the Republicans are hostile in their hearts towards the Hawaiians, while in the Democratic and Independent ranks they find only trusted friends, who have suffered with them, wept with them at the wrongs done and fought with them in the noble attempt to save their flag and the independence of their country.

How can any Hawaiian cast his vote for Samuel Parker or for the men selected to represent the people in the Legislature? Mr. Parker may be a valuable man as a delegate in Washington, but if he goes there he does certainly not represent the people of this Territory. Do you think, dear reader, that the sugar barons love Sam, or admire his talents? Dig up some copies of the Star of 1893 and see what the present editor of the Advertiser had to say about Sam Parker, and even that great journalist, who never can be moved to tears would blush by stultify himself in the manner he now is doing.

The plank referring to the immediate establishment of municipal and county governments will have the endorsement of every honest man who favors fair play and who does not approve of a policy which makes the taxpayers at Niihau and Oahu pay for Honolulu listening to Burger's hand, and enjoying an ample water supply and a sewerage system—to come.

We are pleased to see that the question of compulsory cremation has been touched upon in the platform and that a liberal construction has been made on the question which certainly will appeal to the Roman Catholics as well as to those

who for reasons of their own are opposed to cremation.

The Democrats, if elected, will see that the claims from the sufferers from the Board of Health bubonic plague season will be repaid for their losses, and, while it will be a severe drain on the treasury, the claims should be met in the name of justice and fairness.

The plank referring to the incompetent but arrogant Board of Health was hardly necessary in the platform, but it met with a hearty approval of every thinking citizen immaterial of the party he belonged to. It is high time that the wings of the members of the Board Health be clipped and the Board be taught its proper place. The Democrats and the Independents will see that some very needed reforms are made and the board reconstructed from beginning to end.

The plank relating to our labor laws are especially gratifying to the Portuguese colony, among which there are many, unable to become American citizens owing to their inability to read and write English we quote this important plank in full.

The democratic party, as the acknowledged and trusted friend of the laboring classes, declares itself to be in favor of 8 hour labor law and the giving of all government work to citizens of the Territory of Hawaii, not, however, to the exclusion of male Hawaiian residents of European nationality, who, because of their inability to speak, read and write the English or Hawaiian languages, are denied American citizenship

That the Democratic party will support any proposition for a liberal allowance to Queen Liliuokalani goes without saying. The Democratic party here is based on justice, honor and fairness and will at all time do the square thing even if the millionaires have to pay the taxes which they have failed to do for a number of years.

As a whole the Democratic platform is very acceptable, and it does not clash with that promulgated by the Independents. The one object now is to select good practical men to the Legislature, a truly representative delegate and to snow under every man whose name appears on the ticket of the despised Republican Party.

The issue as far as the election of a delegate to Congress is concerned now lies between Wilcox and Prince David. The voters should realize the fact and decide who is the better representative of the two for our interests. The supporters of Sam Parker ought to back Prince David after seeing the impossibility of electing their candidate. If they don't, Mr. Wilcox may yet be our first delegate, to the disgrace of the Territory.

The Independents will hold a meeting at the Drill Shed to-night and to-morrow evening the third party will endorse its delegate to Congress and the ticket for the Legislature. We trust that the brainy young men affiliated with the party will remember the necessity of choosing men who can wrestle with the critical financial condition now confronting us. Let them show their patriotism by sacrificing some of their party pride and let the prosperity of the Territory and the interests of the people overshadow their personal feelings, and the political vanity which, natural as it may be, has often proven the rock on which a political party was wrecked. If a strong ticket of honorable men is nominated we believe

that the country at large will support it, irrespective of party views. If on the other hand an anti-haole ticket is put forward, we predict that even if it is elected, the treasury will remain empty and the many reforms promised by the Independents evaporate into thin air. Let it be remembered that under the Territorial Act Hawaii cannot borrow money here and there as in days gone by, without the sanction of Congress. And with an irresponsible Legislature, and a more than irresponsible man as Delegate, it is not likely that Congress will endorse our territorial votes. We trust that Independents will act wisely to-morrow. They have perhaps the future of Hawaii in their hands.

Two Important Decisions.

In the case against Geo. L. Edwards, a decision has been filed by the Supreme Court, the opinion being by Justice Galbraith, and concurred in by Circuit Judge Humphreys, who sat in place of Justice Perry, absent. They find that the writ of habeas corpus issue and the petitioner be discharged. Chief Justice Frear dissenting.

And in the case of W. H. Marshall, editor of the late Sunday Volcano, a majority opinion by Chief Justice Frear, and concurred in by J. Alfred Magoon, who sat in place of Justice Perry, absent, has sent him to six months' imprisonment at hard labor. Justice Galbraith dissents.

DAVID NOMINATED.

The Democrats Meet at the Orpheum, Nominate a Delegate to Congress and Elect a Central Committee.

Sterling enthusiasm was displayed at the Democratic gathering at the Orpheum theatre last evening. The house was comfortably filled with citizens of renown and voters and those who will be voters in the due course of time, and a band played merry martial and patriotic music at intervals.

The stage was neatly arranged and the press conveniently and comfortably provided for. As Prince David was absent on "apellibinding" bent his portrait was present as was that of W. J. Bryan.

On the chairman's table was displayed a beautifully emblazoned scroll of Major Geo. C. Potter's escutcheon of the arms of the Republic of Hawaii with all its heraldry. American and Hawaiian flags helped to assist the mise en scene while the electric lights occasionally developed dramatic effects. The delegates wore handsome badges of the McKinley natural color but with the Prince's emblem neutralized the effect.

Col. C. J. McCarthy and Ed. H. Hart were respectively nominated for permanent Chairman and Secretary and Hon. J. E. Bush as interpreter.

The Committee on credentials consisted of Hon. W. H. Cornwell, Julius Asch and W. F. Peachy and they reported the following delegates as entitled to a seat in the convention.

S. K. Kaloa, in a very eloquent and forcible speech, nominated Prince David Kawanakoa as delegate for Congress. The speech was made in Hawaiian and translated by Bush, and was frequently interrupted by most enthusiastic applause. The nomination was seconded by Hon. W. H. Cornwell and others amid even greater applause and three cheers and a tiger were given.

The chair announced the next order of business was the party platform. Peachy moved a committee of ten on platform be appointed, which was done. The chair appointed the following to serve: McClanahan, Mossman, Ellinger, Rhodes, Hayselden, Wm. Sheldon, Wilder, Jr., Woods, Sims and Cornwell.

After a recess Mr. McClanahan presented the platform which appears elsewhere. It was adopted as a whole.

The appointment of the Territorial Central Committee was the next business in order, and after the general public had retired to the Cafe for refreshments for a brief period.

Rhoder, chairman, read the report for the various districts, as follows: Oahu—McCarthy, Wilder, Jr., Campbell, Camara, Kaloa, Dwight. Maui—Coke, Richardson, Hayselden. Kauai—Wm. Sheldon, Sims. The Democrats of Hawaii asked to be permitted to name their members later.

The convention then adjourned with prolonged cheering for David and the Democratic party.

Citizens of all parties register before midnight, and be early at the polls on election day or tricks will be played.

Court Notes.

In the guardianship of David Manuel, a spendthrift, summons has been returned as not served, due and diligent search having been made for said David Manuel, but he cannot be found within the Court's jurisdiction, but Deputy High Sheriff Chillingworth is informed that he is now in San Francisco.

On the final account of Richard Autone, executor of M. A. Barete, deceased, Judge Humphreys has confirmed the master's report and approved the executor's accounts. The executor was ordered to pay money in his hands into Court, and he is to be discharged upon filing receipt with the clerk. The accounts show a balance of \$2,435.85.

In the suit of L. B. Kerr & Co. vs. Jno. S. Walker and Blanche C. Walker on a note of \$100, no appearance, demurrer or answer having been filed by defendants, Judge Humphreys has signed an order for default and judgment to be entered against them.

Return of service of summons has been made in Bishop & Co. vs. J. M. and M. D. Monsarrat, suit on a promissory note for \$700, duly protested.

A stipulation has been filed in Wong Bat Nam vs. Chock Sing et al. that a decree be entered for plaintiffs in pursuance to his prayer and that the temporary injunction be made perpetual.

The Waiata Agricultural Co., Ltd., has filed its answer to the action to quiet title brought by Helen A. Holt et al.

S. K. Kane, guardian of Elizabeth H. Robinson and Isaac J. Robinson, has filed his accounts, showing \$2,899.36 as being the one-half share due Elizabeth H. Robinson.

A unanimous decision of the Supreme Court has been filed in the case of Elizabeth Kelihihine vs. Catherine Vierra et al., overruling exceptions and remanding the case to the Fourth Circuit Court for such further proceedings as may be proper. It is signed by Chief Justice Frear and Justice Perry, who gives the opinion, and J. Alfred Magoon, who sat in place of Justice Galbraith disqualified.

Germany to Fight China.

WASHINGTON, D. C., September 26.—A member of the Diplomatic Corps informed The Bulletin reporter to-day that the recent actions of the United States respecting China were based solely on the fact that this Government has in its possession information that a formal war will start in the Far East in the next two months at the outside, and the United States did not care to take the risk of becoming involved in it. The man who communicated this information is not an alarmist. He believes the administration has shown excellent judgment in getting out of the range of this great event. He said:

"President McKinley ordered his troops to withdraw from China because he came into possession of information that could not be delayed much longer. He ordered the American warships to the Far Eastern waters because we must have something there to protect American interests. I feel absolutely sure that he was correct and that the war will begin within sixty days. I expect it much sooner. Probably it will start by a formal declaration of war on the part of Germany against China but how it will end no living man can tell."

creating out of the Territory of Ha-
waii, counties, towns and munic-
ipalities, and to further the wise
establishment of the governments
of such counties, towns and munic-
ipalities and as a guide to the
Legislature, we advocate reference
of the form of such governments to
a direct vote of the people of each
county, town and municipality so
to be formed.

We favor the appropriation, by
the next Legislature of the Terr-
itory of Hawaii, of a liberal pension
to the ex-Queen of Hawaii as a just
acknowledgement, due her for her
great loss.

We favor the passage of only such
laws on the subject of cremation as
shall respect and heed the wishes of
all relatives and friends of deceased
persons, who, because of religious
or other conscientious scruples, are
opposed to the cremation of the
bodies of their dead.

We favor the payment of all
proven and just claims resulting
from loss by fire incurred through
the suppression of the recent
epidemic of bubonic plague.

We favor a revision and a modifi-
cation of all existing license laws.

We favor the enlargement and
comprehensive development of all
the harbors of this Territory.

We charge that the Board of
Health of the Territory of Hawaii,
as now constituted, is inefficient,
and we demand that its unrestrain-
ed and extravagant expenditures of
public funds be stopped. We call
upon the public to bear witness to
the fact that the Board of Health of
this Territory is degenerating into a
political machine and that its pub-
lic duty is fast becoming subservi-
ent to its political power and au-
thority.

We praise the good sense and
judgment of the hundreds and
thousands of native Hawaiians who
have accepted the honor of affiliat-
ing with the Democratic party—a
party whose principles will live as
long as civil liberty shall endure; a
party whose life of a century
breathes the political teachings of
men whose excellences brighten the
pages of constitutional governments
throughout the world; a party great

honor that is thus held out to him,
