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# Top officials named as shabu users

A number of government officials including those holding key positions in the government have been named by a federal agent as among the growing number of people known to be users of the illegal drug crystal methamphetamine.

Investigations conducted by a joint team of federal and local authorities reveal that these public officials, although not involved in the importation and

distribution of the deadly drug, are known to be drug dependents.

Firemen, police officers, teachers and counsellors, utility workers, Department of Health and Natural Resources employees were also some of the public servants which Federal Bureau of Investigation Special Agent Paul G. Amoy named in a talk he delivered before the conferees of the 2nd Annual Drug Abuse and Substance Control Prevention Conference.

For over a year now, the attempt of federal and local law-enforcement agents to crack down on drug traffickers in the Commonwealth has resulted in the prosecution and conviction of CNMI Immigration officer, Edward Seman Iriarte.

Another case imvolving a Customs personnel alleged to be involved in drug trafficking reached the court however, it was settled before any decision could be made.

This year alone, authorities have arrested six people currently facing indictments in federal court on charges of drug trafficking.

The arrest of Francisco Barcinas Mendiola and David B. Evangelista of Tinian and John San Nicolas Borja, Luis Aguon Reyes, Steven Teregeyo and Manuel C. Magofna, all Saipanese, the investigation of which dates back two years ago.

Mendiola's May arrest has resulted in the confiscation of more than \$2.2 million worth of Continued on page 40

# Hofschneider in very critical condition

Tinian Casino Gaming Control Commission Chairman John U. Hofschneider is in very critical condition at the Commonwealth Health Center's Intensive Care Unit where he was rushed to last Tuesday after reports of a stroke.

Hofschneider, according to hospital sources, was brought in at around 5:30 am of that day and was wheeled right into the hospital's intensive care unit fifteen minutes later at around 5:45 am.

Doctors at the center are going on shifts in making sure that the chairman is attended to round-the-clock, but his main attending physician is Doctor Anne Bollay.

According to reports issued to the Variety by a health official, Hofschneider's condition had worsened such that he doesn't seem to be responding to any stimuli being applied by his doctors.

"He has been in critical condition. Indications are that he is about to go. But we still hope that he makes it.

Aside from that we can't give out information on the diagnosis. It's up to the family if they want to give out information on his condition. But what I can say is that he is gravely ill," said the

# Zoning Board won't go thru poll process

Acting Governor Benjamin T. Manglona yesterday signed a bill that would eliminate the requirement that voters of senatorial districts shall elect to retain or remove members of that district's Zoning Board.

In simple rites held yesterday at the Governor's Office, Manglona signed the bill into law, thereby abolishing provisions in the Commonwealth Code that is being seen to politicize what should have been a non-political endeavor.

According to Public Law 6-32, the directors of the Zoning Board must be reaffirmed in their positions through the electoral process. It was specifically stated that starting with the forthcoming November 1991 elections, and every two years thereafter on that date, the name of each board member will be placed on the

ballot for the senatorial district.

Such a provision was met by the members with a howl of protest, and even prompted a resignation en masse of almost all members.

The disgruntled board members felt that their names on the ballot will tend to politicize their position.

The legislature in coming up with the bill that would carefully consider the board's recommendations, found out that the effective functioning of the Zoning Board, as created by Pubic Law 6-32, has been severely handicapped by a high turnover of its members.

The Legislature found further that among the probable causes of this high turnover are the quasipolitical nature of the position which requires that a member run for election in order to be retained in office; and the limited pool in

#### Munson denies Mendiola's temporary release

Federal District Court Judge Alex Munson denied the release of Francisco Barcinas Mendiola, a Tinian man accused of the importation and distribution of crystal methamphetamine, pending his scheduled January trial.

Munson denied Mendiola's motion for temporary release after the court ruled in a late Thursday hearing that there is probable cause to believe

Mendiola committed a crime.

In denying Mendiola's bid for temporary freedom, Munson accepted the arguments presented by prosecuting attorney Richard Pierce who argued that Mendiola continues to be a substantial risk to the community as he was a known drug dealer.

Mendiola had been under the custody of federal authorities since his arrest on September 5 for alleged involvement in drug trafficking.

On the same occasion, authorities also arrested David Boki Evangelista who was named as a co-defendant in the conspiracy case.

Guam-based lawyer David Lujan told the court that instead of being detained under government custody, Mendiola can be placed under house arrest pending his trial in the federal court.

Lujan also showed the court that Mendiola is not a flight risk as the government is in posses-

sion of his travel documents and that his client is willing to post a property bond in lieu of his temporary release.

Lujan also argued that authorities can monitor Mendiola's activities while he is on probationary release.

Pierce argued that Mendiola had violated the provisions of his temporary release issued by the CNMI Superior Court and that he continued with his illegal activities despite being placed

Now that election time is here, we encourage everyone to vote according to his conscience, for what he thinks is right, for whom he thinks would do right.


We owe it to our children and our children's children that we take part in laying the foundations of a responsive leadership in order that the foundations of good government will reap long-lasting benefits for the com-

Dear Editor,

On September 6, 1991, and again on October 18, 1991 the publisher of the Marianas Review saw fit to publish two ar-

ticles entitled "Half-Billion Dollar Agupa Project in Rota Imperilled," and "MPLC Gives Marianas Agupa a Chance," respectively. Each of these articles featured reported interviews with the Executive Director of MPLC, Wil-

liam Concepcion, where Mr. Concepcion allegedly reported that Marianas Agupa Enterprises is in default on its newly acquired lease of approximately 150 hectares of undeveloped public land in Rota, and by implication characterized Marianas Agupa Enterprises as "mere speculators or project promoters." Mr. Concepcion stated that Marianas Agupa is in default for its failure to pay \$126,000 for the annual rental fee and for its failure to provide bank credentials to verify Marianas Agupa's financial viability.

Mr. Concepcion acknowledges that Marianas Agupa initially paid \$30,000 on the lease, (in fact \$31,500.00 was paid). However, Mr. Concepcion fails to acknowledge the fact that additional payments of \$10,711.05 were made on September 13th and \$31,500.00 on September 30th. In fact, in his October 18th interview he states that "Other than the initial deposit they've made, we have not received any

further amount." Clearly, this statement is blatantly untrue. The additional payments were made at the direction of MPLC to comply with a payment schedule they themselves set up. The lease requires annual payments of \$126,000 payable quarterly in advance. MPLC asked for an individual payment for the month of June, hence the payment of \$10,711.05. The other two payments made to MPLC represent under the lease. Currently Marianas Agupa Enterprises has prepaid rent through December 31, 1991. Under the terms of the lease

Marianas Agupa is required to submit its financial credentials within four months after the commencement of the lease. Under the term of the lease, the lease is not to commence until six months after the lease is approved by the legislature. Speaker Pedro Guerrero acknowledged the legislature's approval by signing the lease on June fourth of this year. As a result, the lease will not commence until December 4, 1991, and Marianas Agupa Enterprises is not required to submit its credentials until April 4, 1992.


Three of the eight candidates for Saipan's Municipal Council and two candidates from a list of six aspirants for Board of Education will also be chosen by Saipan residents.

#### Tough drug measure becomes law

The much-awaited bill that would seek to eradicate the growing menace of drug and

substance abuse in the CNMI was signed into law by acting Governor Benjamin T. Manglona yesterday during the

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
closing day of the Second Anthe Diamond Hotel.

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signing of the measure. The new law, Manglona said, provides stiff penalties against users and traffickers who deal in illegal drugs, while also strengthening law enforcement capabilities and efforts by giving more flexibility to stop drugs and eradicate illegal substances at the CNMI's ports of entry and

The purpose of the act is to provide measures that will assist in the prevention of the importation of these substances.

It is also being viewed as one hat would enhance the detection of illicit money laundering activities by amending the authority of the Customs Service to include the conduct of outbound searches and requiring the declaration of \$10,000 or more in currency for passengers departing the Commonwealth.

It was also seen to prevent the flow of controlled substances between islands by amending the authority of Customs to include interisland searches. It also seeks to require government planning for a drug rehabilitation program.

"This is the kind of tool we need to fight the drug problem," says Pete P. Reyes, chief of the

Customs Service. "We can now go before any court and prevail. We are eager to go up there in our fight against the problem exercising unquestionable authority," Reyes said.

In a similar note, Manglona said the new law will encourage those who fail to heed the warnings and signals regarding drug abuse to seek treatment.

The acting governor, in addressing conference participants, made specific mention that the CNMI just recently had its fifteenth traffic fatality, one-third of which have been alcohol related. This is about double the normal average for such deaths -due to a totally legal drug that is affecting more and more people in the islands, Manglona said, apparently referring to alcoholic drinks.

It was also said that the average importation of more than 10,000,000 cans of beer every vear indicates that the Commonwealth has a tremendous problem with alcohol abuse, and that the terrible toll of highway deaths with its related sufferings and pain it causes to our families and children is "unpardonable."

"Although the new law will require some amendments to further strengthen its intent, such as stronger penalties against marijuana use and other matters. our urgent need to take the offensive now against drug abuse compels our administration and legislature to join hands to put this new law into effect immediately," the acting governor said.

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#### **Developers adopt wait** and see stance

Foreign investors and developers who look at the Commonwealth as a viable investment area are closely monitoring the on-going legal battle between two local residents and the owner-cum-developer of 31,830 square meters of land in San Roque, Saipan.

For a number of these developers, the case filed by sisters Teresita Camacho Dela Cruz and Estefania Cruz Chong against the management of Hotel Nikko will determine whether the CNMI is still a viable place to sink their money in.

After a rash of court cases which challenges Article XII of the Covenant to Establish a Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands in Political Union with the United States of America, investors and real-estate developers are being cautioned to proceed with care in forging land transactions in the

The 30 Article XII disputes filed in the local court have not only local businessmen worried. Foreign investors also share the same sentiment and some of them have already started to pack their suitcases in favor of locations where benefits are sure to be reaped and where they will not have to contend with such a stat-

Local businessmen who have developed close ties with foreign investors say that the current economic situation is much more serious than what the local government and the Chambers of Commerce seem to realize.

A month after the Supreme Court issued its ruling on the Leocadio Mafnas vs. Marian Aldan-Pierce case, a number of

investors have already decided to stall their projects. Many are awaiting the action of the local court on the Article XII cases. specifically the Chong vs. Nikko case currently undergoing liti-

Nine major developments included in the Coastal Resource Management's (CRM) list of pending major siting projects are in jeopardy and several other developments including the two others under the Hotel Nikko management have been put on hold for an indefinite period of

The current predicament among foreign investors is that land transaction and land ownership is considerably more complicated in the CNMI than in any other nation in the world.

Developers are convinced that the Article XII disputes have frightened foreign investors and that as a result of it, foreign bankers are influenced to tighten loan processing procedures.

The rash of Article XII cases came at a time when many have already seen the economic boom on Saipan and how previous land transactions may have caused people of Northern Marianas descent to lose their birthright from unscrupulous businessmen.

Up until March of this year when the Chong vs. Nikko case were filed in the Superior Court, a great number of land disputes involved individuals.

What makes the Nikko case unique is that for the first time, a corporation is being sued. To a number of these investors, the Hotel Nikko case is the key in determining whether the CNMI will continue to its move to become economically self-suffi-

#### The Nikko Case

It was in 1978 when a group of Japanese investors connected with the Nikko International chain of hotels came to Saipan to find a suitable location for their \$60 million project.

The project is now known as Hotel Nikko Saipan. It is a 313 room hotel cum first class resort which has a disco, a restaurant which has a 250 seating capacity, a swimming pool with a water slide, tennis and raquetball courts and a fitness center.

The hotel itself was just the initial phase of the project. The developers had also planned of adding a commercial complex, a staff housing for the employees and time-sharing condominiums and duplexes to the existing hotel structure.

All of those projects will continue to be put on hold until the time the Superior Court issues

their judgement on the case. The San Roque property was originally purchased from the Camachos by the Realty Trust Corporation, a company which

was 51% controlled by locals and a 49% control by foreigners.

Court documents show that at the time the Camacho deal was consummated, 49% of the stocks in Realty Trust Corp. was owned by former Saipan lawyers Roger Gridley and Jack Layne. The other partners in the company who owned 51% of the stocks were Bernie S. Cabrera and Josepha K. Flores of Blanco

Atty. David Nevitt of Carlsmith, Wichman, Case and Ichiki said that at the time when the Realty Trust purchased the Camacho property, the Article XII amendment stipulating that land in the Commonwealth had to be 100% owned by those of Northern Marianas descent has not yet been put in place.

The amendment was introduced in 1986, three years after the transaction between the Camacho's and Realty Trust Co. and Blanco Verde was consummated, thus the investors of the

later company were in adherence to the Article XII guidelines.

It was in July 1983 when the group of Gridley, Layne, Flores and Cabrera purchased the Camacho land at the rate of \$300 per square meter which, according to Nevitt was a competitive price at that time.

Later, Realty Trust Corp. was dissolved with the shares of Gridley and Layne being purchased by Japanese investor Riichi Yamamoto who was now in control of 49% of the Blanco Verde stocks.

The case against the Nikko management was filed by the Camacho's for the court to make a decision on whether or not Article XXII of the Constitution was violated, Atty. Ted Mitchell, the counsel for the Camacho's in the case claimed in an article authored by Cheryl Mitchell titled Indian Givers.

Management officials of the Nikko Hotel believes that the transaction between Realty Trust Corp. and the Camachos was legal and binding.

Nikko officials were in fact,

stupefied, when they learned they were named as a defendants in a case filed by the land's former

Foreign investors understand that the forefathers of this island-state would want their land to be protected, what they cannot understand however is that after a number of years, original owners will file lawsuits claiming they were cheated of their properties.

"This Article XII issue is a setback in the economic development of the Commonwealth. The image of the Northern Marianas is at its lowest ebb and already, investors are already wary of what the future may

Investors are keeping a tight watch on the Nikko case but right now, the sentiment is that the CNMI is a high risk area for developers.

To them, there is no guarantee that they are the rightful owners of the land as there is no system of proving the actual ownership of the land which the developers might show interest on.

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#### **EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE**



# Tinian Commission opens up for new applicants

The Tinian Casino Gaming Control Commission announced that effective November 1, 1991, applications for casino licenses will be accepted by the Commission.

In a news release, Commission Chairman John U. Hofschneider said that over the course of the last six months the Commission has received inquiries from around the world about gaming investment opportunities in Tinian.

Th release which came out on the 29th of October, was done immediately before Hofschneider was rushed to the Commonwealth Health Center after a reported stroke.

In the release, Hofschneider noted that "the initial licensing opening in September 1990 did not get publicized around the world and that many qualified companies that might have been interested in Tinian were not

aware of the application process."

"As a result of this, the licensing process is being opened to said that there is no for applicants but the tinuing need to get more costs of the investion.

reach the broadest possible spectrum of casino operators," said Gaming Consultant Fredric E. Gushin in an overseas telephone interview. "All interested parties are welcome to apply."

According to Gushin, the

move to restart licensing was aimed at basically trying to have the process moving quicker, such that it could entertain more license applicants while waiting for action from the current seven applicants whose financiers and casino operators have yet to be known.

Also such a move was meant to enable the commission to adopt new fee regulations based on other casino regulations around the world.

Asked whether that means an increase in license fees, Gushin

said that there is no one set fee for applicants but there's a continuing need to get more for the costs of the investigations of which the applicants will be made to shoulder.

The Commission, the news release said, has prepared an investor's guide discussing gaming opportunities in Tinian. Chairman Hofschneider stated that the combination of our geographical location, the Commonwealth's association with the United States and the tax exemption for money excited in the Commonwealth make Tinian a truly unique investment opportunity.

The Commission is extremely hopeful that this measure coupled with the establishment of a credible regulatory structure and environment will attract additional qualified applicants.

The Tinian Casino Gaming Control Act, passed by an initiative, authorizes up to 5 casino hotel projects. It is our expectation that this step will attract and encourage companies and financial sources to seriously consider either developing or associating with existing applicants to construct casino hotels, said the commission news release.

Chairman Hofschneider made it clear that the reopening of the licensing process would not impede the ongoing efforts to evaluate the existing seven applicants.

However, Hofschneider noted that "it has become clear to the Commission that some of the seven existing applicants have not been able to either enter into agreements for financing these projects or have not identified casino operators".

To date, the Commission has issued two licensing reports covering three of the seven initial applicants. Rather than wait any longer for the initial applicants to secure financing or a casino operator, the reopening is designed to facilitate the Commission's ability to find an entity that can be awarded a casino license, the news release said.

Chairman Hofschneider added that these are exciting times for Tinian and that today's announcement is another step in assuring the viability of the casino industry and further assuring that the promises made to the people of Tinian will be fulfilled.







Senatorial candidate Juan S. Demapan faces what may perhaps be the a tough challenge to his candidacy after a schoolmate at the Marianas High School came out in the open and questioned the candidate's integrity apparently because of his claim of being the valedictorian of the school's class of 1972.

Mary Anne De Leon Guerrero King, in identical letters to several members of the media, lambasted Demapan, saying that he was not the valedictorian and was not even part of the class that graduated in 1972.

The letters indicated that it was King herself who was the valedictorian during that school year, and that Demapan's allegedly false claim in one way or another reflects "lack of integrity or dishonesty."

"The voting population wants facts not fiction of a candidate's accomplishments, and not Juan Sablan Demapan's concocted fabrication of his (warped) personal reality," King's letter read.

"I would rather have the records speak for itself," said Demapan when sought to comment on King's letter.

In an interview with the Variety, Demapan said that King's letter may have been a lastminute ploy to destroy Demapan's chances in the forthcoming polls.

"I see this as a last ditch effort by my opponent to discredit me. To be fair, maybe we should ask him to show his transcripts also, just like what I am doing now, so that people could see," Demapan

King's statements were not accompanied by supporting documents but she indicated a firm resolve that what she was saying was apparently true.

"I have no difficulty accepting a candidate over-emphasizing and publicizing his true achievements, but to fabricate what wasn't and never had been. is total fiasco, especially when a candidate makes such claim to obtain votes for such a respectable position.

"The bottomline is, if Juan Demapan, as a running candidate for the CNMi Senate cannot at least be honest to himself, can he possibly be trusted to be honest to the public he will be representing, if he obtains enough votes and eventually represents

King statements were based on her own account of what she remembered during her high school days, as she provided a chronology of events in school during that time.

According to her account, Demapan started in grammar school with the class of 1972. but that he graduated from Marianas High School in 1971, and not in 1972.

In late 1969, MHS was established, with the class of 1970 being the first batch of students to graduate from that school.

MHS reportedly had a 2-track educational system, plus an optional program that allows a student to graduate early if the student had accrued and met the minimal accumulated number of credits requires for a high school diploma.

This program enables a student to graduate a year or the summer prior to his actual graduation, and obtain a high school diploma dated for the same time frame.

According to King, graduating at an earlier date drops the student out of the particular graduating class he belongs to.

"Juan Sablan Demapan decided to take the early graduation path and graduated with a small group of students who elected for the same option sometime in 1971," King said.

It was said that the very small group of students that Demapan graduated with was not merged or even made part of the actual grauduating MHS class of 71. His group's graduation ceremony was allegedly conducted separately.

King noted that having graduated and received his diploma sometime in 1971, Demapan was no longer an existing member of the the MHS class of 72. Moreover, from September 1971 to May 1972, while the MHS class of 72 was arduously finishing the final year of high school,

Demapan was reportedly somewhere in the US mainland going through his freshman year in secondary education.

Also, when the MHS Class of 72 and MHS school officials were presenting speeches and diplomas during the graduation ceremony, Demapan was a part of the audience as a spectator, and not as a participating member of the graduating class of 72, said Kings letter.


The letter came out less than a week before election day and was seen by some quarters as a direct assault to Demapan's can-

The senatorial candidate. however, did not want to put weight on the issue, almost brushing off the matter, saying it was a "non-issue", since he was clearly not up to making false statements in his leaflet.

He recalled that while it is true that during that time, he had to leave for college at the University of Michigan where he reportedly was given a scholarship, the records could speak for themselves that what he said in his leaflets that he was indeed valedictorian of his class, is true.

I know a person by the name of Mary Anne De Leon Guerrero King as a former classmate, but I believe that she might have been dragged into this issue which is meant to discredit me, especially now that election day is just around the corner," Demapan said.



At least one police officer will be stationed in the polling places to maintain peace and order and assist those who may be in need of help



# CHC expands OB/Gyn Dept.

The Obstetrics and Gynecology Department of the Commonwealth Health Center will be expanding its functions with the addition of three physicians to its staff.

Former CHC physician Dr. James Barnard is expected to assume his post on November 1, Dr. Helen Taro-Atalig chairwoman of the department and CHC physician for 17 years announced in a press release from the hospital.

Barnard decided to return to the post he vacated last summer because of the great need for more gynecologic surgery and his love for the island and people.

Two long-term additions to the department is expected to arrive early next year. Dr. Raymond Hegarty from Ireland and NovaScotia, will be arriving with his wife, Dr. Lesley Ruggles while Dr. Liane Mizgala from the University of Toronto Residency Program will be an additional member of the OB/Gyne team by February.

Hegarty, who will be spending a month on Saipan, aims to develop policies and procedures to guide practitioners in the overlapping areas of family practice and obstetrics.

Dr. Duncan Price, an OB/Gyne from Vancouver, Canada left after working with Taro-Atalig for the month of October. He was referred to Saipan by orthopedic surgeon Dr. Gavin Sutherland, a former physician of the Trust Territory days.

Price was involved in all aspects of patient care from the clinic to the operating room and saw a need for more full-time gynecologists in the CNMI.

The OB/Gyne Department is involved in the care of women including pre-natal care, infertility, unwanted fertility and cancer of the female organs.







# DARASENADOFSAIRAN

Our environment could spell disaster. This is an issue that I rank the top most significant issues for the Commonwealth as a whole and not only Saipan. And on a larger scale, as we all know, the environment is a global concern. Of course, this does not mean that priorities in other areas such as education, health care and social services and the like are number two, the last concern. These are just as equally important, and must be addressed with the same degree of concern. These are also my priorities, but at a larger scale, the environment must be protected because this will determine our future, especially if we are to continue to be reliant upon our major tourism industry. The environment will dictate at every comer how we shape our future; how investors will look to invest here; how we want our island to be; how tourists will perceive us. It is indeed a major driving force and should be used as a barometric gauge in how we want Saipan to be and in the type of economy we want.

The environment as an issue should not be disregarded. It is very fragile one and we should look forward to preserving it. Everyone wants clean beaches, well landscaped surroundings, clean streets, proper sanitary landfills (dumps), clean air; junk-free neighborhoods, more flame trees, well manicured lawns, especially in public areas, yet some of us oppose such regulations when government agencies try to impose even a little of some of the nice things we want.

We should understand that in order to develop and develop with maturity, that we must give up certain conveniences (like doing away without regulations) and accept a more orderly growth. For instance, in being regulated (and these will come, i.e. zoning, building code, etc.) we sometimes are opposed to such regulations, even if a regulations simply stipulates planting one tree in front of our development. It is difficult at times to accept change. This is understood, for in every move to change things, there is resistance. However, we must understand that in making our environment more liveable, we are enhancing the value of our island (even our personal properties); we are making the quality of life much more desirable; we are promoting a concern to live in harmony with nature; we are educating our children at the same time; we are creating an ambience in our island that could eventually become a model for other developing islands or island nations. This is something we can be proud of.

We have to strike a balance between keeping the status quo or moving forward with the necessary change to make our island's quality of life second to none. I am committed to this end to do just that. To improve our overall quality of life by beginning with preserving our environment first. Again, if we lose our delicate environment we will lose our economy, and the effect will be a domino effect on other industries. I also believe that once all things in life are gone or extinct, man will follow not far behind. This is why I say the environment is an extremely critical issue, not only for Saipan, but on a global scale. We on Saipan have to do our part, not only for us but for the entire world.

Division of Fish and Wildlife Arnold Palacios extends his invitation to the public to be a part

three years after it was prioritized by the DFW as one of those included in the boating infrastructure plan for the Commonwealth.

Palacios said the opening of the marina will surely boost sports fishing an the boat chartering business in the CNMI as it will provide local fishermen and fishing enthusiasts as well more access to water recreation.

The facility was constructed at a cost of \$2.3 million in local and federal monies. The primary source of funding for the floating dock facility came from the Department of the Interior and the Sports Fish Restoration Program of the U.S. Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Around 50 22 to 60 footer vessels will be accommodated in the marina which also features other amenities such as launching ramps, a parking lot for cars and trailers and water and power services. A 24-hour security guard will also be stationed in the area.

Around 200 applications from foreign and local companies and individuals wanting to rent spaces in the marina have been received by the DFW since the project was announce three years

The improvement of the marina has so far, been the largest project which involves public

Its architectural and engineering design was completed in 1988 after which dredging and shore protection activities which cost \$1.4 million, was undertaken.

The marina had been of use since the Japanese regime when it became Saipan's docking fa-

It was later developed by the Americans who also used it as a docking area for PT boats and barges. In later years, local fishermen used it as a mooring area for boats during a typhoon.





### **Controversial Interior** Order to be Reviewed

HONOLULU (AP) - Palau government leaders are expected to vent their frustrations with a year old Interior Department order which has restricted their spending and borrowing when they meet next week with Assistant Interior Secretary Stella

Palau President Ngiratkel Etpison is scheduled to head a delegation of top-level administrative and legislative leaders to the Wednesday session at Saipan, Northern Mariana Islands.

The meeting is to examine the order issued in October 1990 by Interior Secretary Manuel Lujan, Jr. to tighten fiscal management in the western Pacific island chain's government operations.

Guerra's Office of Territorial and International Affairs administers Palau's affairs under a U.N.

The Palau government became unhappy last December when Guerra earmarked how and where nearly \$16 million in U.S. funds could be spent.

She also held in abeyance Palau's fiscal 1991 budget until the government could show it had local revenues to meet local expenditures.

The secretarial order also said if Palau wanted to borrow \$250,000 or more it had to have the assistant secretary's approval. The same maximum was placed on capitol improvement projects and contracts. Palau Administration Minis-

ter Sandra Pierantozzi has called the earmarking and borrowing limitation features "the most objectionable."

She also said the limitation on borrowing "is too restrictive and does not allow Palau to seek large enough loans to pay off its creditors and (to) consolidate its debts into one manageable long-

In a September letter to leaders, Pierantozzi said the control on contracts capital projects "hinders economic development."

She also said her government should cook "complete flexibility" to seek foreign countries' economic assistance, especially

Larry L. Morgan, OTIA's director of legislative and public affairs, said the Palau government had sought the review which Lujan pledged should be held after the first year of the order's imposition.

Guerra will be in Saipan for the pacific Basin Development Council's annual meeting. The council's directors are the govemors of Hawaii, Guam, American Samoa and the Northern Mariana Islands.

# Senate acts on crime victim bill

The bill that would seek to provide justice and assistance to victims of violent crimes was recently passed by the Senate during its sixth day, 4th regular session held in Rota.

The measure was entitled, "A bill for an act to establish an office of victim's rights within the Department of Public Safety; to require informing victims of violent crimes of their rights; to provide for compensation to said victims; to require victim's impact statements be incorporated into every felony pre-sentence report; and for other purposes.

Otherwise known as Senate Bill 7-86, the bill was approved upon the recommendation of the Committee on Federal Relations and independent Agencies, but with amendments.

According to a committee report sent to Senate President Joseph S. Inos, there is a need for an effective criminal system to require the protection and assistance of victims in order to preserve their dignity and to encourage greater public cooperation in the apprehension and prosecution of criminal defendants.

It was specifically stated that the intent of the bill is to recognize and implement the inherent rights of crime victims and to lessen the financial burden placed upon those who suffer bodily injury or death as a consequence of such criminal acts.

According to the report, the bill's purpose is to establish an Office of Victim's Rights not under the Departments of Public Safety, but within the Attorney General's Office; to require that a victim's rights are thoroughly explained immediately after a crime is reported; to require that a victim's impact statement be solicited and considered prior to sentencing a convicted offender who has caused physical or emotional harm to a victim; and to assist in the just compensation of the victim who suffers bodily harm or death as a consequence of a criminal act.

A public hearing was held on the measure last July 16, 1991 at the Senate chamber wherein the overwhelming majority of agency representatives and professionals, involved in some aspect of victim assistance, fully supported the purposes of the bill in either their oral or written testimonies.

There was, however, a concern that the Office of Victim's Rights should not be placed within the DPS, because of the belief that the physical proximity of the perpetrator to the victim and the possibility of the victim's exposure to the him was unwanted and should be avoided.

In addition there was the belief that the duty of the DPS to serve the general welfare of the public may conflict with or at

least compromise with the needs of the victim.

'Most presenters during the hearing suggested that the alternative location for the victim's rights office was the Office of the Attorney General, which was apparently seen to possess the ability to best oversee the protection of victim's rights given the existing nature of criminal prosecution in the Common-

But such a suggestion was met by presenters of the AGO with little enthusiasm, saying that such a placement creates inherent conflicts of interest within the

"This does not appear to be

borne out by the experience of the existing victim's rights offices in various states and focus must remain at procountries surveyed," the AG

Office presenters was heard to have said. Another area of concern put up by the AGO was the suggestion to include "purse-snatching" under the umbrella of the bill. This was, however, rejected by the Committee, who said that remedies exist for recovery of monetary loss due to purse

Finally, there was a testimony that requiring a victim's impact statement be considered at sentencing impinged on a

defendant's rights. Article I, Section 11 of the commonwealth constitution, which ensures the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, and belongings against crime, shall be recognized at sentencing.

"Restitution to the crime victim shall be a condition of probation and parole except upon showing of a compelling interest," added the statute.





crystal methamphetamine which authorities found secured inside an oxygen tank. Federal drugenforcement agents say that it was the largest ice haul confiscated in an American territory.

Lawenforcement agents have noted the increasing popularity of crystal methamphetamine, a highly addictive substance commonly known as ice or shabu, among substance abusers in the CNMI.

Marijuana was considered as the drug of the 80's in the Commonwealth. In 1988, authorities started to encounter ice which was then smuggled in small quantities. Today, ice is the CNMI's "silent and growing menace."

The switch to methamphetamine may be due to various reasons. Among the most obvious ones noted by authorities is that unlike marijuana, ice is reusable and the chances of detecting it is almost nil.

"Ice is everywhere," a Special Operation's agent said. It is

smuggled into the CNMI through boats, planes, cargo ships and, there are also fishermen who moonlight as drug smugglers. Most shipment originate from the Philippines.

Ice trafficking is a lucrative business. The price of a pound of marijuana can compare to the price of a gram of ice. Authorities say it is currently sold for \$1,000 to \$1,500 a gram whereas last year, it was sold at a low of \$500 to a high of \$700.

Authorities say the key in eradicating ice is to hit the shipment at the ports of entry before it reaches the hands of dealers and users on the islands.

Local drug prosecutors however, are hampered from effectively prosecuting drug traffickers as constitutional and procedural challenges are posed to them.

The search and seizure operations of law-enforcement agents, particularly those in the Customs, is being challenged.

Only recently, Superior Court Judge Marty W.K. Taylor ruled in the case of alleged drug trafficker Isidro Lizama that CNMI Customs personnel do not have the authority to execute warrantless searches. Chief of Customs Lt. Col. Pete P. Reyes said an appeal on the decision is forthcoming.

Prosecutors are also faced with the challenge of proving they have probable cause to file charges and that they are not in violation of a person's Fifth Amendment rights.

Government prosecutor Dennis O'Shea said law enforcement agencies are faced with the challenge of working in a system which lacks the necessary funding to hire additional staff and resources to enhance their service.

The Department of Public Safety Special Operations Division (SOD) is understaffed. There is no crime laboratory in the Commonwealth and evidence is thus, sent to Guam or Hawaii for further testing. There are only two special prosecutors who are assigned to handle drug cases

The introduction of a bill authored by Garapan Congressman Stanley Torres proposing stiffer penalties for drug traffickers and rehabilitation to recovering drug dependents, has been a welcome move.

The surprising element to the bill however is that the punishment for marijuana traffickers remain as it was before, O'Shea said.

An SOD agent also laments their training has to be doubled to become more effective in interdiction. "Our techniques are already worn-out and those in the drug world come out with new ways of evading detection almost daily," the SOD agent said.

Lt. Joe Mafnas of the Customs said that Customs personnel are Continued on page 41

Continued from page 40 identifying their searches particularly among cargos and passengers from minimum to high risk areas such as the Philippines and Palau.

"We are moving in the right direction. The number of arrests we have made has resulted in the confiscation of a large amount of drug shipment," Mafnas said.

The Customs have so far confiscated 5.13 pounds of ice, 25 pounds of marijuana and 1,000 dosages of prescription drugs from the Philippines, Korea and China which is forwarded to the hospital.

Canine dogs are also an important part of Customs operation. They are currently awaiting the arrival of two passive dogs and an additional two aggressive ones which will be of use on Tinian and Rota.

Law-enforcement agents have one observation in common - drug interdiction can be more effective if the public and the community, continue to show their support and assistance.

"Similar events have proven very successful, blending modern and traditional forms of expression," she said.





#### **Utility operation** grant for Chuuk approved

A \$630,000 grant will assist the Chuuk State government of the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) with the inception of a Public Utilities Corporation (PUC), Assistant Secretary of the Interior for Territorial and International Affairs Stella Guerra announced today, according to news release from

Finally, the Commonwealth has stronger penalties against the importation, possession and trafficking of hard drugs, thanks to the efforts of Congressman Torres.





Commonwealth Utilities Corp. (CUC) employees are being asked to voluntarily submit themselves to drug testing.

"I will request the CHC for testing - voluntary testing - to identify you or your staff using any drugs. I will not tolerate any drug use," Guerrero said.

Guerrero said he will be on the front line by volunteering first for the drug testing.

All candidates, as they went up for their turns at the microphones were each met with thunderous applause from the very appreciative crowd.






