THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

The following extract from the President's Message was issued as an Extra, on Saturday, by the P. C. Advertiser.

THE HAWAIIAN KINGDOM.

At the recent Coronation of his Majesty King Kalakaua this Government was represented both diplomatically and by the formal visit of a vessel of war. The question of terminating or modifying the existing Reciprocity Treaty with Hawaii is now before Congress. I am convinced that the charges of abuse and frauds under that treaty have been exaggerated. I renew the suggestion of last year's message that the treaty be modified wherever its provision have proven onerous to legitimate trade between the two countries. I am not disposed to favor the entire cessation of treaty relations, which have fostered good will between the countries and contributed toward the equality of Hawaii in the family of nations.

"NO MONEY"

Is the cry of Road-Supervisor Hart, when asked why he does not repair this or that street, and make it passable, at least for foot passengers. Our roads and sidewalks are a disgrace to a city which has now such pretensions as are aimed at by the powers of Honolulu. Wherever any citizen walks there is nothing but mud and slush, mixed with street scrapings that are seldom, if ever, removed, and which gradually accumulate at the sides of the streets, choking what should be the gutters and making them higher than the center of the road. If there be "no money" available for thorough repairs, could not prisoners be utilized to clear the gutters and throw the mud of the gutters into the middle of the streets; this might prove of some little benefit. Ask Waikiki residents what they think of the road beyond Thomas' Square, and they will tell you that it is unsafe, because they cannot see where the holes are owing to the depth of mud and slush. Why should there be "no money" for repairing the bridges recently destroyed on Hawaii, and for repairing our streets? "We flaunt our gay feathers of meaningless uniforms before the mocking eyes of real power and prosperity," we send our envoys and annexationists abroad, "we strut like mountebanks in trappings that do not belong to us." And Why? Because "We (The Premier) love pomp." Whilst we do this there remains, for the necessary improvements of the Kingdom, "no money."

THE Y. M. C. A.

Held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday evening, the attendance being small in consequence of the usual notice of the meeting not having been made in the BULLETIN. Mr. C. M. Cooke, Vice-President, was in the chair.

The Building Committee reported that the work of the alterations had been let to Mr. Lucas for \$645, but that he had been dilatory with the work since the Fair; he had however promised to put on a gang of men and finish it. The new room was badly needed as there were now three classes a week, and they disturbed people who came to read. The gas pipes would be a little extra expense. Furniture bills of \$300 had been paid and \$450 was left, from the Fair, for the building. There was \$250 in hand on the original building fund, besides some outstanding pledges, and it was anticipated that the Building Committee would present their accounts at the next meeting and turn over some money to the Treasurer.

The question of payment of taxes was raised. The premises had been valued at \$10,000 and the amount of taxes was \$120. It was thought that the institution should be exempt, as it was of an educa-

tional character, classes being held for the purpose of giving instruction.

On motion of Rev. A. Forbes, "the cordial thanks of the association were rendered to all the ladies and others who assisted so earnestly in getting up the Fair." The Secretary was instructed to communicate the resolution to each lady who had assisted.

Mr. J. B. Atherton reported that he had heard nothing further about a general secretary. He advocated the payment of a larger salary than had been proposed, in order to secure a good man who would build up the institution so that it would be able to take care of itself. There was a vast difference in Secretaries and he referred to Mr. McCoy of San Francisco as being an enthusiast as well as a thorough business man.

A collection was made and the meeting closed with prayer.

THE AUSTRALIAN CONFERENCE.

Sydney, Dec. 6th.—A resolution adopted by the conference of delegates of the Australian Legislature, called to consider the question of the annexation of New Hebrides, New Guinea and other South Sea Islands to Australia, declares it the unanimous belief of the Conference that any further annexations of Pacific regions south of the equator by foreign powers would be highly injurious to the interests, safety and well-being of Australia and the British Empire. The Conference leaves to England the initiative of action, confidently believing she will promptly adopt the wishes of the Conference and take the most effectual measures to secure the safety and contentment of Australia by incorporating so much of New Guinea and adjacent islands as is not claimed by Holland. The Conference urges England to make a definite arrangement with France and thereby prevent the islands being made subject to foreign dominion, and to seize the first opportunity of negotiating with France for the purpose of obtaining control of the New Hebrides in the interest of Australia. The colonies offer to bear a fair share of the cost of those undertakings. The Conference protests in the strongest manner against France sending criminals to the islands of the Pacific, and urges England to make serious representations and do her utmost to prevent a practice which is disastrous to the interest of Australia. The Conference is now discussing the Constitution and functions of the Federal council to deal with interests common to the whole of Australia, and a complete arrangement is expected.

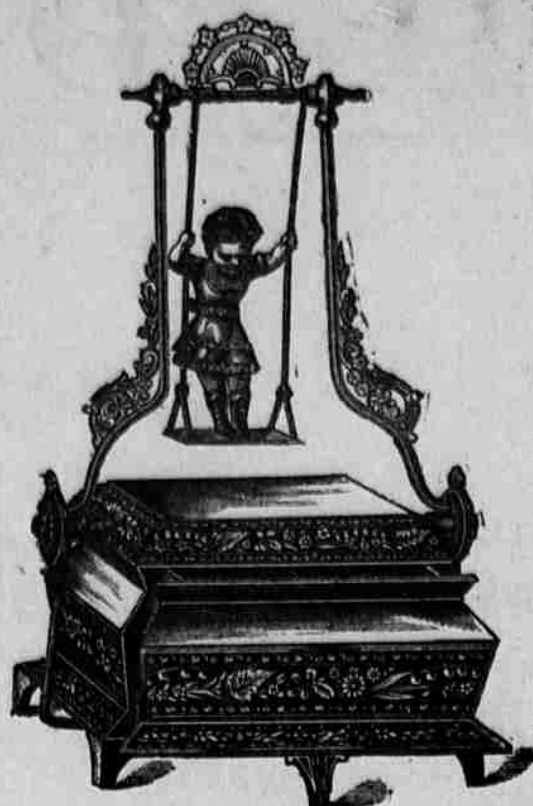

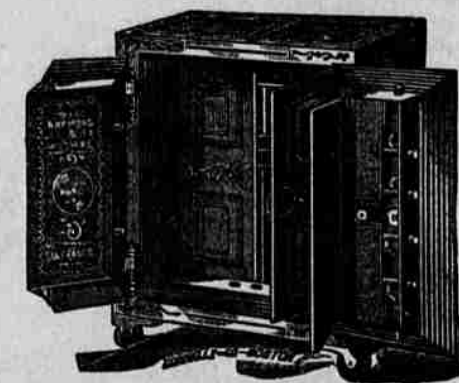

SUPPLEMENT TO THE DAILY BULLETIN.

HONOLULU, H. I., MONDAY, DECEMBER 24, 1888.

SWEPT INTO THE SEA.

HALIFAX (N. S.), Sept. 18.—A tale of terrible suffering is told by Captain Gasston and three seamen, survivors of the British bark Britannia, which was wrecked off Sable Island Monday. The Britannia sailed from Marant Bay, Jamaica, for Montreal August 10th, with a cargo of sugar and rum. She withstood safely considerable bad weather, but at one o'clock Monday morning grounded on the bar off the island in avoiding an iceberg. With all their boats gone, the crew were obliged to stay on the wreck, where they remained until Tuesday evening. Then the ship began to break up, and a raft was made. By dark, the crew of twelve and the captain's wife and four children had boarded it. The sea was running high and they were in great danger. As Captain Gasston was at one side, endeavoring to strengthen their support, a sea swept over them and carried all into the water. The captain and eight men regained the raft. Two of the children, aged six months and three years respectively, were pulled out, but died in their father's arms from fright and exposure. The steward was tied to the planks for safety, but died there, the water continually washing over him. Shortly after, another sea carried off three others, who failed to regain the raft. Efforts had been made to keep the raft alongside the Britannia, but at nine o'clock it broke away. At day-break Captain Gasston and the four others who had survived the night, found themselves to be about three miles from Sable Island. At nine o'clock another seaman was washed overboard. At ten o'clock the four survivors were rescued by a boat from shore, and brought here by the steamer Newfield.

The following is a list of the lost: First Officer George Foye, Second Officer Arthur Holmes; steward, name unknown; John Johnson, Lewis Frith, Frederick Henderson, Arthur Porthouse, Ernest Molton, Mrs. Emily Gasston and four children.—*S. F. Bulletin.*

The girl set the meat in the ice-chest, and pretty soon I went down cellar, 'cause I didn't like cold liver, and pulled out the rawhide, and I gave the rest to that lame dog you see me have here a spell ago. Oh, a boy can get enough to eat if he has got any originality about him."—*Peck's Sun.*

POLICE IN CHURCH.

Honolulu is not the only place where the police are "seen in the house of God." The following is from the *Australasian*.

"It is just possible that our guardians of the peace may be over ecclesiastical, over spiritual, or over virtuous, for the performance of their simple duty. In some of the suburbs sergeants and constables have unexpectedly turned up as Salvation Army soldiers, or burning and shining lights of the Tabernacle and Little Bethel. This is all very well if the bats are not neglected. In a mining village on one of the main railway lines several roughs indulged, unchecked for hours, in brutal mischief in the main street—varying their amusements from persecuting a newly-married couple to slaying a fellow-creature. And where was the local policeman? He, worthy man, was attending a church meeting! Had he been doing the duty for which the state pays him the guilt of blood-spilling might not now have stained the hamlet.

In another not distant township a citizen visiting the police camp to give information concerning a larceny, found that the three constables (being the entire police strength of the district) had all gone to the meeting of a friendly society much affected by persons of a nationality and creed from which the police force is chiefly recruited. Thrift and religion should not be sneered at, but neither justifies neglect of public duty.

A SACRED BULL FEIGNING DEATH.

A correspondent of *Nature* gives the following remarkable example of animal intelligence: "Some years ago, while living in Western Mysore, I occupied a house surrounded by several acres of fine pasture land. The superior grass in this preserve was a great temptation to the village cattle, and whenever the gates were open trespass was common. My servants did their best to drive off the intruders, but one day they came to me rather troubled, stating that a Brahminy bull which they had beaten had fallen down dead. It may be remarked that these bulls are sacred and privileged animals, being allowed to roam at large and eat whatever they may fancy in the open shops of the bazaar. On hearing that the trespasser was dead, I immediately went to view the body, and there sure enough it was lying exactly as if life were extinct. Being rather vexed about the occurrence, I did not stay to make any minute examination, but at once returned to the house, with the view of reporting the affair to the district authorities. I had only been gone a short time, when a man, with joy in his face, came running to tell me that the bull was on his legs again and quietly grazing! Suffice it to say that the brute had acquired the trick of feigning death, which practically rendered its expulsion impossible, when it found itself in a desirable situation which it did not wish to quit. The ruse was practiced frequently, with the object of enjoying my excellent grass, and although for a time amusing, it at length became tiresome, and resolving to get rid of him the sooner, one day, when he had fallen down, sent to the kitchen for a supply of hot cinders, which we placed on his rump. At first he did not seem to mind this much, but as the application waxed hot, he gradually raised his head, took a steady look at the site of the cinders, and finally getting on his legs, went off at a racing pace, and cleared the fence like a deer. This was the last occasion on which we were favored with a visit from our friend."

It really does not seem to be by any means a bad game to be a temperance lecturer. Mr. Francis Murphy, when employed by the Edinburgh Gospel Temperance Union, received £100 for four weeks' work, and had his hotel bill paid. The latter item is by no means inconsiderable, as it amounted to £52. When I stay at an hotel I generally calculate my expenditure at £1 a day, wine included; but temperance lecturers, who, of course, abjure alcoholic drinks, must evidently be pretty severe on the eatables. If I could get £1,200 a year, and 37s. per diem for expenses, I would become a rapid Blue Ribbonist to-morrow. Mr. Murphy, I notice, "would hardly go anywhere without a mob." No more would I—if I could get some one else to pay for it.—*Life*.
