A letter was received from the Hilo dent. health committee by Dr. Moore, secretary, remonstrating against the possible granting of permission of travel to the island of Hawaii from Honolulu before twenty-one days elapsed since the appearance of a plague case in any part of Honolulu. They also stated that there was no lack of provisions there. If their wishes were disregarded the agents of the Board forming the committee would resign their commissions. In the discussion that followed con-

sideration was given to the principle of self-preservation which might reasonably be adopted by any community.

Resolved, It is the opinion of this ommittee, which represents the sugar interests on the Island of Oahu, that in view of the complaints emanating from the sanitary committee of the non-in-fected districts of this island, more systematic, consistent and reliable precautions should be taken by the officials of the Board of Health in the matter of allowing travelers, who have taken Haffkine's prophylactic sarum. to take train or cross over the various quarantine boundaries into the clean which it is claimed is not properly car-ed for after it leaves the fumigating and bathing establishment, and further that persons having prophylactic passes are allowed to visit parts of the city, and to ride in vehicles which have not been disinfected before crossing such boundaries. Third-That no vehicles or animals be allowed across the said quarantine boundaries without the driver of same can present to the guard in charge written permission bearing the signature of the president of the Board of Health. The driver to be disinfected and accompanied with a guard as in suggestion No. 1.

HILU AGAIN DICTATORIAL

THE ORPHEUM CAFE Ultimatum of Agents of Board of Health to Board.

> If the Tail Can't Wag the Dog it Will Drop Off The Dog Barks at

Following is a summary of the letter of the agents of the Board of Health at Hilo to the Board and the Board's reply thereto:

The Hilo agents of the Board, as was stated in yesterday's Bulletin, wrote a dictatorial letter to the Board. They prescribed a fifteen days' quarantine in Honolulu until the plague was twenty-one days out of the capital, and

dictated that no freight could be land-e. in Hilo except that stated in the freight list arranged for in January. The letter concluded by caying: "The town and district of Hilo is with us, and we wish this to be under-

stood, if this movement of ours is not allowed by the Board of Henoiulu, for protection to ourselves and community, then we as a body will act no longer as the agents of the Board of Health."

While members of the Board were making remarks on the letter at yesterday's meeting, President Wood drafted the following reply, which was adopt-W. L. Moore, Secretary of the Hilo

Sanitary Comimttee. Sir:-The regulations adopted by the Board of Health have been formulated after careful consideration, apply to all parts of Hawaii nel Hilo included. The agents of the Board appointed in the different districts of the Islands were instructed when appoint-

ed that they were to act for the Board of Health in carrying out its regulations and accepted the appointments with this understanding. When the time comes that the agents of the Board refuse to carry out instructions from this office, the Board can no longer recognize such agents as acting for the Board."

IMPROV. MENT FOR KALIHI.

Citizens of the Kaiihi district through the recently organized improvement club are putting energetic effort into a public work, which merits favorable action on the part of officials and the unanimous support of the community. Wide streets, good streets and plenty of them are first of many important foundation measures necessary to the progress of the modern city along modern lines.

Certainly it cannot be said that the Kalihi and Palama districts have had more than their share of the lcaves and fishes of legislative favor that make for the improvement of the city as a whole. For years the only direct avenue for an immense amount of traffic to the portion of the town has been King street which is hardly better than a inne. No district of the city has suffered more neglect or more inconvenience.

The Kalihi Improvement Club has already established its right to existence and to a hearing by securing for the government a large part of the land necessary for widening King street at practically n oexpense to the taxpayers. The next request equally worthy of the good record of the club is to secure the extension of School Vineyard and Kuakini streets, thus giving three additional avenues to the residence and business portions of the city on the Ewa side of Nuuauu stream. That this extension is a public necessity, it is hardly necessary to argue before the taxpayers or the authorities. The only subjects for argument are the details of ways and means.

It is understood that the first request will be for the Interior department to the surveys for this extencion. This is not only feasible but every citizen will recognize the advisabillty of the Interior department taking immediate action. It is merely a matter of time when these streets will have to be extended. To establish immediately the lines for the extension will forestall the probability of houses being erected on the street lines and assure the final extension at the least possible cost to the government for land damages. They did not consider at fair to be submitted to disadvantageous competi-tion with other firms engaged in shipping business who transferred similar merchandise from ships to island steamers. Dr. Wood said this was the question already often threshed out. It was simply a question of removing all restrictions. Foodstuffs particularly attracted rats. The application was tabled.

An application to ship tea in original packages, from the same firm, was likewise laid on the table.

C. A. McDonald was granted permission to send a horse to Walmanalo on complying with conditions.

Dr. Wood's Reply.

On receiving the foregoing communi cation Dr. Wood, president This was approved at vester reply. day's meeting:

"In reply to your communication alow me to state that I will be pleased to submit your resolution to the Board of Health at its next regular meeting. In the meantime permit me to say that the Board has issued no 'prophylactic The resolution passed by the Board of Health concerning the prophylactic was as follows: 'All persons who shall receive injectious of Haff-kine's prophylactic, shall after an interval of seven days, be allowed to leave Honolulu for other localities without undergoing preliminary quarantine.' It was distinctly stated by myself at the time that all other conditions concerning the proposed departure were to remain exactly the same as if the quarantine had been performed. The certificate of injection wa never intended as a pass, it read as follows: 'This is to certify that Mr. has received an injection of Haffkine's prophylactic.' The regulation concern-

ing permits has never been rescinded No instructions have been given for the certificates to be used as passes. I was surprised to learn several days ago that these certificates had been ac-cepted as passes and immediately upon learning that such was the case, I gave imperative orders to the Police Department to instruct the guards to refus permission to anyone to pass without a proper permit, and not to accept certificate for a permit. These certifi-cates are the personal property of the persons to whom they are issued and cannot be taken up by the guards."
