HEALTH BOARD MEETING. (Continued from page 1.) tions would be relaxed. The letter gave some particulars of what the committee was doing. Mr. Smith stated that J. P. Cooke of Alexander & Baldwin had asked him to present the matter of a fumigating plant for Maui. It was voted to instruct the Maui committee how to transform portable forges into fumigators. A report from Dr. Hoffmann was read, giving the results of experiments with plague bacilli on Japanese food-stuffs. Dr. Nichols asked permission to send four mules from Wright's pasture to Wahiawa, which was granted subject to the prescribed conditions. Dr. Pratt, sanitary building inspector, reported his inspection of the old Chinese theater, which he found in bad condition. He described alterations required to make it permissible for a warehouse. Accepted. John Hind, agent of the Board at Kohala, reported satisfactory work of inspection by G. P. Talloch, at an expense of \$75. The bill was ordered paid when presented on a proper voucher. Alexander & Baldwin asked for permission to ship Manila cigars to Kahului. Cigars were being allowed shipment from bonded warehouse but not from private stores. As permission to one firm, however exceptional the reasons presented, would change the rule, the application was laid on the table. The president read a report from Dr. Hoffmann on recovered plague patients, to the effect that all, excepting the latest one in hospital, were free from the communicable after effects of the disease. It was decided to grant them their liberty on a certificate from Dr. Hoffmann. An application for serum from Ewa had to be refused, as the Board's supply is low. It was told the messenger that if it was for intending passengers to the Mainland, Dr. Carmichael would attend to the treatment of the applicants. An application for certain favors, including opium for habitual users, was received from Chinese at the Kailih detention camp. Dr. Garvin told of his refusing opium at the Punchbowl camp, referring the applicants to the city physician. This course was taken with the present request, and all the other matters were referred to the Executive Council. A request for an additional nurse at Malulu hospital at Wailuku was readily granted. Mr. Smith moved, seconded by Dr. Day, that all the furniture, medicines, etc., at Kailih camp dispensary be removed to the new government dispensary in Miller street. Carried. M. W. McChesney & Sons requested permission to ship flour and grain from their warehouse to the other islands after subjection to hot air fumigation. They did not consider it fair to be submitted to disadvantageous competition with other firms engaged in shipping merchandise from ships to island steamers. Dr. Wood said this was the question already often threshed out. It was simply a question of removing all restrictions. Foodstuffs particularly attracted rats. The application was tabled. An application to ship tea in original packages, from the same firm, was likewise laid on the table. C. A. McDonald was granted permission to send a horse to Waimanalo on complying with conditions. Dr. Pratt reported a vile condition of certain premises at Iwilei, in the neighborhood of where plague appeared, and it was voted to give the owners and lessees forty-eight hours' notice to put the places in good sanitary condition. An application from Chinese merchants for remission of duties on rice shipped here for relief of the destitute was referred to the Government. Dr. Wood stated that he learned, on board the U. S. transport Grant, that there was no plague at San Francisco when that ship left. Also, he remarked with pleasure that the day was Monday, and no plague had been reported in Honolulu for nine days. Except as specially permitted by the Board of Health from time to time upon showing of satisfactory cause in each case, no interment of the dead shall take place after October 1st, 1900, within the following limits in the District of Honolulu, Island of Oahu: Commencing at the sea shore at the south point of the land of Halawa, thence following the east boundary of Halawa to the summit of the Koolau mountains, thence easterly along the summit of said mountains to Palolo valley, thence southerly following the line of the east ridge of Palolo valley to the sea shore at the east side of Diamond Head, thence following the sea shore in a westerly direction to the point of commencement.
