### A Railway in the Tree Tops.

It may not be known outside the neighborhood where it is situated, but it is nevertheless a fact, that in Sonoma county, Cal., we have an original and successful piece of railroad engineering and building that is not to be found in the books. In the upper part of this county, near the coast, may be seen an actual roadbed in the tree tops. Between the Clipper mills and Stuart's Point, where the road crosses a deep ravine, the trees are sawed off on a level and the timber and ties laid on the stumps. In the centre of the ravine mentioned, two huge redwood trees, standing side by side, form a substantial support, and they are cut off seventy five feet above the ground, and cars loaded with heavy saw logs pass over them with as much security as if it was framed in the most scientific manner. "All roads lead to Rome," except this one. The builders never contemplated a terminus at San Francisco, Petaluma or Chicago, but merely to convey heavy timber from the woods to the mills. There are many places in our redwood forests where this example might be followed profitably, as it would be cheaper to grade through with a cross-cut saw and lay the ties on the stumps than to remove the trees. We can boast of a broad-gauge, a narrow-gauge, and a road in the tree tops—yet we are not all happy.—*Herald*.

THE SUNDAY LAW.

Notice has been given in the Assembly of a bill to amend the existing law in respect to violation of the Sabbath. It is not as yet before the House for action, but has been prepared and will be presented at an early day. We understand it proposes to strike out, in Section 2 of Chapter 35 of the Penal Code, the taboo on "amusements and recreation," so that no one shall be liable to a fine for being "present at any dancing, public amusement, show or entertainment, or taking part in any game, sport or play on the Lord's day." The interdiction will then be only on "all worldly business," keeping open a shop, store, warehouse or workshop for business purposes and excepting works of necessity and charity. The idea is apparently to allow the same license on Sunday as is seen in New Orleans, St. Louis, San Francisco, and some other cities of the American Union, and in some countries of Europe; so that theatres may be opened, balls and concerts be given and probably horse-racing be carried on, just as legally on Sunday as on a week-day.

Recently we observed an item in the papers about "Sunday in St. Louis," in which it was stated that by actual count on the last Sunday in April, while there were 24,277 persons who attended the Protestant Churches, 20,242 were in the parks, beer gardens, and other not very religious places, and more than 6000 of these witnessed ball games.

The fourth of the series of Free Organ Recitals will be given this evening at the Episcopal Church by Mr. Wray Taylor, assisted by Madle, Ponti, Mr. D. McCartney, and Mr. C. R. Scarborough.

The Band will give a concert this evening at 7.30 o'clock at the Hawaiian Hotel in honor of the birthday of Her Majesty Queen Victoria. Programme can be had at the publishing office of the DAILY BULLETIN.

LEGISLATIVE.

Monday, May 22.—By request of the Assembly, His Honor the Chief Justice appeared and administered the oath to the Minister of Foreign Affairs and the Attorney-General, as members of the House of Nobles, ex-officio.

Mr. Gibson formally resigned his seat as one of the Representatives for Honolulu, and the Secretary was instructed to notify the Inspectors of Election, according to the statute.

Among petitions presented were two in favor of the Ten Million Loan project; one against it; one to take off the restrictions on liquor, and one to keep them on; one that the Hawaiian language be no longer taught in schools; and several for roads, artesian wells, &c., &c.

The Assembly then adjourned over for one week, in order to give Ministers an opportunity to prepare business.

**An Impending Fashion.**

The New York Herald has startled society with the announcement that "digitated stockings are coming into fashion." A digitated stocking must, of course, be one with five separate receptacles for the toes, such as the glove has for the fingers. Who wants digitated stockings? It is all a busy man can do now to get his non-digitated stockings on right side out. What, then, will be his vexation and despair if he has to adjust each toe to its proper place in the new article? Suppose the house should be on fire and a man had to put digitated stockings on! And what good are they after the big toe and the little toe and the three nameless little ones have all been tucked up for the day? The shoe or boot would cover them as a mitten would a glove, and the world be none the wiser for one wearing a digitated stocking, unless the boots and shoes are digitated also. The Ministerial Policy.

On the opening of the Legislative Assembly yesterday morning, the Minister of Foreign Affairs spoke as follows:

"By command of the King, I and my colleagues take our places here as Ministers and advisers of His Majesty.

"It will be our hope that the choice of the Sovereign represents also the approval of the community to an extent that may assure us a reasonable share of the confidence of this Assembly.

"We shall endeavor to deserve your confidence.

"The welfare of the People,—to promote their health and interests,—will be a paramount consideration in our policy of Government, and at the same time we hope to prove that we will not neglect any interest pertaining to the material welfare of this Kingdom.

"In our foreign relations, we shall endeavor to compensate for the smallness of our State by active and judicious diplomacy; and to continue to deserve the friendship of all treaty powers.

"We recognize the great importance of our Treaty of Reciprocity with the United States, and shall be ready to make all due efforts for its continuance; and at the same time we will endeavor to prepare the country for the contingency of its abrogation.—Let us put our house in order.

"We desire and aim to promote administrative reform in all the branches of the public service.

"We advocate increased facilities for the transmission of information, and the transportation of people and products, and shall recommend to you liberal expenditures for postal service, highways, harbors, cable communications, and ocean steamship service.

"We propose to call your attention to some features in our labor laws, which may need emendation.

"We shall submit for your approval our estimates in an appropriation bill, in which we have sought to apportion the revenue of the Kingdom in a judicious and economical manner.

"We shall recommend a scheme of immigration to promote the repopulation of this Kingdom with families of races whom we may hope will assimilate with the chief population of this Archipelago. Also a scheme for internal improvements, which may require the negotiation of a moderate loan."

Charley Luce, of Mendocino county, says that he has demonstrated the entire practicability of raising amber cane in that section, and is certain that the people can raise enough to supply all the syrup their families will consume, and that there will then be some to spare, while the cane will go far towards the keeping of sheep and stock in seasons when feed is short. If Luce is correct in his views the industry may result in breaking the force of the sugar refiners' power. In the West the amber cane is proving the best forage plant yet tried.—*Sacramento Union.*

Inquiries were instituted, and it was discovered that the intention was to blow up the whole Kremlin during the festivities attending the coronation of the Czar. At the man's residence were found a number of peasant's caps, the crowns of which were filled with explosive material. It is supposed that these caps were intended to be thrown into the air in greeting to the Czar, and that on falling to the ground the contents would explode with the effect of bombs. Bogdanowitch and 300 Nihilists have been arrested.

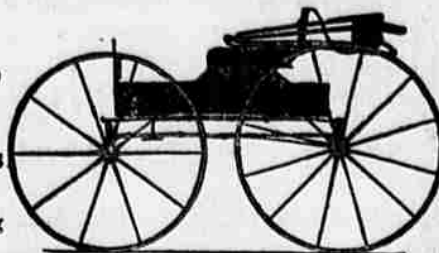

Leahi Cup, \$40—  
Mule Race; mile dash; free to all;  
catch weights. Entrance, \$5.

Kapiolani Plate, \$100—  
For Hawaiian bred horses; mile  
dash; catch weights. Entrance, \$10.

King's Plate, \$125—  
For three-year-olds; open to all;  
best 2 in 3; to carry 100 lbs. En-  
trance, \$15.

Park Cup, \$75—  
3-4 of mile; free for all two-year-  
olds bred in the Kingdom; catch  
weights. Entrance, \$10.

Reciprocity Plate, \$100—  
Trotting Race; mile heats; best 3 in  
5 to harness; free to all horses that  
have not a better record than 2:40  
in any public race in this Kingdom.  
Entrance, \$15.

Queen Emma Plate, \$100—  
Running Race; 3-4 mile dash; free  
for all to carry 100 lbs. Entrance,  
\$10.

Express Cup, \$75—  
Trotting Race, one mile, free to all  
horses that have been driven in a  
public hack six months previous to
