THE LIQUOR TRAFEIC,
The closing of the liquor saloons on Saturday last, on necount of ite being election day, suggests a few reflections which may be considered ns pertinent. To a stranger just arrived in the country, it would naturally excite a good many questions, to be told that by the laws of the country the keepers of these saloons, and everybody else, are strietly forbidden to sell, give or furuish any intoxicating drink to ative Hawaiians at any time, and that as a rule, the law is faithfully observed by the saloon keepers and the great majority of foregners. The first question asked by the innocent stranger would be, If the natives cannot get liquor, why then close the saloons? It would be difficult to frame a satisfactory answer. Perhaps it is thought best to " assume a virtue, if you lave it not.'

The fact is admitted that, notwithstanding the law, the natives can get as much liquor as they are nble to pay for, and not from the liquor saloons either. This is illustrated, particularly on Sundays, when all liquor establishments are, we are as-
sured, faithfully kept closed. It is next to an impossibility for a foreigner to buy a bottle of liquor on that day, but it is well known that native with money can obtain it are told, are not infrequent of foreigners employing natives to get their supplies of liquor on Sundays. Good and salutary laws are out of place on the statute books, if they are constantly and notoriously broken. In order to secure the strict and honest enforcement of any penal law,-like those under cons deration, for instance, respecting the liquor traffic and Sundsy obser-vance-it must have the backing of a solid, intelligent public opinion.

## LATE FOREIGN NEWS.

The Dublin assassins had heen ound and arrested, but subsequently escaped from jail; and the report was circulated, May 18th at Dublin, that they had escaped in the garbs of priests, and were then on their way to the United States.
On board the steamer Altnower in San Francisco harbor, there was 63 cases of small-pox among the coolies, and some of the ship's cren had been stricken down. Hengkong was to be declared an infected port and all vessels thence ordered into quarantine.
The Anti-Chinese movement gathers strength in San Francisco. Employers of the labor were giving notice that they would havo no Chinese.
Russia finds that the Anti-Jewish movement has cost her over one millions of dollars.

The brigantine Vesta arrived last Saturday afternon from New Castle, N.S.W. She brings a cargo of coal to Messrs. T. H. Davies \& Co.
The steamer City of New York is due to-day from the Colonies en route to San Francisco.
The Consuelo, Forest Queen and ane A Falkenberg were up for this port when the Ella left.

The Falkenberg was to sail the day after the Ella.

essel was the synonym of utter frugality; nud to say as David does, that Zion's king would dash his enemies to pieces like a potter's vessel, was to threaten with ruin and remediless destruction. We, who are accustomed to the strong stoneware
of considerable value can seareely or cousiderable value can scarcely ferences, but for Palestine, they are as appropriate and forcible as ever Arab jars are so thin and frail that they are literally dashed to shivers at the slightest stroke. Waters jars are often broken by merely putting
them down upon the floor; nud the them down upon the floor; and the
servant frequently returns from the mountain cmpty-handed, having all his jars smashed to atoms by some
irregular behavior of the donkey.
