PROGRESS.

The Life of the Land is Established in Righteousness.

HONOLULU, JULY 11, 1894.

GO SLOW.

If the present government honestly mean to promote a stable and representative government here, we should suggest to them to postpone the election which, according to their constitution has to be held before November, as long as possible. The reason why this should be done is that it is nearly impossible to do away with the prejudices now existing among the people against the republic within a week or two. We offered no advice yesterday to the supporters of the principles for which we have been standing up. We simply said "fight or vote." "You pays your money and takes your choice." It is not difficult to see what the sensible majority of the people will do. Those who have the interest of Hawaii at heart will do all they can to further a government which some day, at least, may be able to create that long-looked-for boom. But Rome wasn't built in one day nor can a government be which is based on a totally opposite play, and which has met with and created much bitterness, much anger and much dissatisfaction.

As we expected we have during the day met with a great deal of abuse, and numerous insinuations because we now believe that the time has come to make an issue of the political situation in Hawaii. A further delay to arrive at that issue is in our opinion injurious to the country and damaging to the best interests of the people. The few sensible men who differ with us in this view, and who, with a strong tenacity await the "American miracle" oppose our theories on account of the tenor of the constitution. They hold that if we take the oath and vote, we will be in a hopeless minority, because everything has been "fixed" so as to suit the men in power. They claim that even if the people got a majority in the lower house, yes, even in the senate their power would be nil, because they would be unable to remove the president or his cabinet. They claim that by continuing the inactivity which now is the policy of the royal "protestants," it will be impossible for the United States to recognize the republic of Hawaii, and that thereby Mr. Dole's government will be pushed to the wall, and if the treaty is abrogated the country driven to ruin, and that through sheer despair, an uprising will take place which will crush the missionaries. They also believe that no fairness can be obtained at the ballot box. That the books of registrations will be inaccessible to the opposition, and that all possible means will be used to keep the majority of the people in an insignificant legislative minority. And they feel assured that even if the opposition did become a "loyal" opposition to the republic, and gained a working majority, the result would be another revolution by the Dole coterie, and the proclamation of another constitution suitable to meet that emergency. The last claim they base

on the fact, that Mr. Dole and his hired army will always have a military supremacy, and that the legislature business will simply be a farce, tolerated only, as long as it acts in accord with the men who compose the present government.

We believe, that the men who raise these objections against the formation by our party to a "loyal" opposition are taking a rather pessimistic view of the situation and of the men in power. We prefer to ask the *Advertiser* to answer the objections raised, but will only say as far as we are concerned, that we are inclined to believe, that Mr. Dole has yet, so much sense left and so much honest patriotism in his heart, that he will be willing to submit to an honest majority as long as he feels that he heads a truly representative, a truly popular and a truly *de jure* government. And then, we beg to state that we haven't 'sold out' to Mr. S. B. Dole.

Cruelty And Vandalism.

If this is going to be a community of hoodlums and brutes the quicker we know it the better. The mutilation of cow, belonging to Paul Isenberg, by cutting the tongue of the animal has filled all decent people with horror and disgust. The vandalism committed on Consul Schmidt's premises on Mount Tantalus has created a just indignation. It is time such things were stopped, and we sincerely hope that the police will ferret out the culprits. The only adequate punishment for such offenses is the whipping post, and it would perhaps be a wise step to introduce that remedy against all offenses emanating from brutality, cruelty and wanton mischief.

He Is A Cad.

It is very rarely, that we take anything written by the *Star*-editor *au sérieux*, but he is lately making himself obnoxious in a manner that is deserving of notice. The insulting language used by him against the Queen, is unbecoming any man, not to say any gentleman. Note these expressions, picked from half a column editorials in last night's *Star*. "Savage royalty," "the foolish savage," "the semi-savage head-chopper." The editor who uses such language against the Queen, has lived here sufficiently long to know, that he, by no means is picturing the Queen by his stigmas and innuendoes. He is married into a Hawaiian family, who often has received the hospitality of the "savage" and been pleased to be in attendance on the "head-chopper." By continuing his course, the editor doesn't do his paper any good, and he proves himself a consummate cad.

A SUGGESTION.

The question as to what will be the best design for the seal of the republic is causing some discussion.—*Advertiser*.

A full length picture of Stevens (without his pet chinaman) surrounded with ripe pears and burglar's tool and supported by Wiltze, Dole, Lucien Young and Hatch *en miniature*. And then add a letter to the seal and call it THE STEAL.

SOUND DOCTRINE AS TO HAWAII.

The resolution reported Thursday by the senate committee on foreign affairs and immediately adopted by unanimous vote in the Senate embodies the absolutely sound doctrine regarding the relation of our government to Hawaii, says the *New York Times*.

The country is to be congratulated on the unanimity with which the Senate has declared that "of right it belongs wholly to the people of Hawaii to establish and maintain their own form of government and domestic policy," and that the United States "ought not in any way to interfere therewith." Some of the senators may not be willing to admit it, but this is a distinct condemnation of the intervention of Minister Stevens, sustained by the last administration, and a complete vindication of the policy of the present administration. It brings the government back to the sound doctrine, so long maintained, of non-interference in the affairs of foreign nations, strong or weak, and of a recognition of the right of every independent people to determine their form of government and their domestic policy for themselves.

The declaration that any interference in the political affairs of those islands by any other government "will be regarded as an act unfriendly to the United States" is equally in accordance with our time-honored policy, and will meet the approval of the country, regardless of party. To have any other power, with which we might have complications hereafter, possessing a foothold off our western coast would be a manifest menace, and while we leave Hawaii to the Hawaiians, we have a right to demand that no other nation shall interfere with it. It is fortunate that the differences of view that have been at times so hotly asserted in Congress should have melted into a harmonious acceptance of a perfectly sound statement of policy.

Rome, June 16. As Premier Crispi was driving to the Chamber of Deputies today a man drew a revolver and fired at him. The Premier was not wounded. Springing from the carriage, he seized the wouldbe murderer and held him until a policeman arrived.

London, June 14. Lord Chief Justice Coleridge is dead. Lord Coleridge was unconscious for a few hours before his death. His death was painless. His son Bernard will succeed him in the peerage.

It was performed at the Queen's Hospital where the sufferer is now, doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances.

The case against Antone Cloys for receiving stolen goods was continued in the District Court this morning till next Friday. C. W. Ashford for the prosecution and Chas. Creighton for the defense.

Two Chinamen were held up last Monday evening by two white men and robbed of \$4.50. As the robbery took place directly opposite the palace, it is not difficult to guess what kind of "hairpins" it was who perpetrated it.

Washington, June 17. The Korean Legation received a cablegram this morning direct from the royal palace at Seoul, dated today, announcing the complete suppression of the rebellion and showing the falsity of the reports from China that the King had fled to Japan and the rebels had occupied Seoul.

HAWAII'S "BLUE" LAWS

CONSTITUTION and LAWS

Framed by the Missionaries.

LAWS of the HAWAIIAN ISLANDS.

If any man aid a person whom the police officer attempts to apprehend, his fine shall be ten dollars for his opposition to this officer, and if the criminal actually escape in consequence of his aid, he shall be fined again, at the discretion of the judges, but not to a higher amount than would have been paid by the criminal, whom he rescued. But if the police officer be wounded by him he shall be fined again, as all men are who commit assaults.

The police officers shall be paid for their services in the following manner: If a police officer seize a man for crime and he be tried and convicted, then one fourth part of the fine shall go to the police officer. The same also shall be the reward of all men. Whoever has knowledge of a crime and enters a complaint to the judges, shall receive one fourth of the fine.

This law shall go into operation on the first day of January, in the year of our Lord 1841, in all places on these Islands.

This law was passed at a council of the Nobles held at Lahaina, Maui, and received our signatures this tenth day of November, in the year of our Lord 1840.

CHAPTER VI.

QUARANTINE LAWS.

Whereas, it has been clearly ascertained that the small pox has prevailed on board of one or more ships now cruising in the Pacific Ocean, which may be expected to visit the Sandwich Islands, and whereas that disease is understood to prevail at the present time in ports on the western coast of America, frequently visited by ships on their way to the Sandwich Islands; therefore,

Be it enacted by the Kings and Nobles of the Sandwich Islands in council assembled,

1. That after the promulgation of this law, all canoes and boats, and all persons not authorized by the Board of Health, are prohibited from visiting any foreign ships whatsoever, until they shall have been examined by a Health Officer, or one of the Board of Health, as hereafter named and pronounced healthy. And whosoever shall visit any ship contrary to this law shall forfeit forty dollars, to be paid one half to the government and the other half to the person who shall give information of the same.

2. All vessels having the small pox, or any other contagious disease on board, and all vessels having had any contagious disease on board within a period less than four months, are hereby prohibited from anchorage at any port, harbor or roadstead of the Sandwich Islands, until visited by a Health Officer or by one of the Board of Health, and having received his approbation. And any master or officer of any such vessel, who shall land or permit to be landed any person or persons affected with a contagious disease or any article containing such contagion, shall, on being duly convicted thereof, be fined not more than one thousand dollars, or be imprisoned one year.

3. All vessels having had contagious diseases on board as above, on arrival at the Sandwich Islands, or at any port thereof, shall be entirely at the direction of the Board of Health, for a period not more than forty-two days. And all vessels in quarantine, or laid under restrictions as above, a yellow flag at the main top. And whosoever shall go on board any vessel thus put under the yellow flag, shall forfeit forty dollars, and shall be entirely at the direction of the Board of Health for a term not longer than forty-two days.

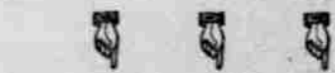
