The duties of this Ways and Means Committee are: (1) to check into the monthly income and disbursements with an eye toward keeping within the bounds of our budget for the year. (2) Should monthly deficits ever accumulate, to take counter measures through the project committee to meet the situation. (3) to initiate steps now in an attempt to provide for a healthy and prosperous Club 100 on a long range basis.

The balancing of our current year's budget hinges very much so on dues collection.

Capable Richard F. Hosaka and his band of hustling chapter treasurers have dispatched statements to your door steps. We sincerely request your kokua in meeting your annual operating dues of \$8 for Oahu members an \$2 for those of you who are residing elsewhere. To the fair ladies of the One Puka Puka house holds, we wish to take this means of bearing this appeal, "If your 'Old Man' has forgotten to pay his dues, just make out a check and send it in for him". We are sure our paisans and husbands will appreciate your initiative and thoughtfulness.

The project committee has sent out feelers in search of a suitable attraction to raise revenue for the year. Income derived from this source will go toward meeting expense for the year and the creation of a reserve for the next term.

Balloting for the mortgage proposal, as this is written, in a matter of two weeks. Result of this plebiscite is eagerly awaited as a possible means of preparing for the future.

As reported in another separate column, plans for a bazaar are rapidly taking shape. Revenue from this undertaking is slated for keeping up our clubhouse in good shape in the years to come. A new coat of paint or repair here and there needs a fund to take care of the situation and now is as good time as any to start the ball rolling along this line.

Emphasis is being placed to reduce the operating expenses wherever feasible and as possible. This, plus the combination of measures listed above, it is hoped, will make for sound dollars and cents Club 100 structure for now and in the future.

In subsequent issues we will outline our proposals for organization of a separate profitable corporation for members and next of kind group life insurance, etc.

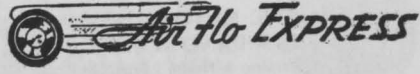

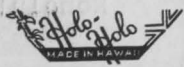
