GRAND JURY HESITATES AT NEW INDICTMENTS FOR MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE.

Edward M. Jones for a short time this morning had a chance of escaping trial for his life. In anticipation of decision from Judge Gear declaring he two murder indictments against him defective, Attorney General An-CAPTAIN SHERBURNE OF BRITISH drews nolle prossed the two charges of murder against him and the case was presented to the Grand jury again, for new indictments. There is said to have been some difficulty in the Grand jury room, however, over the proposition of bringing an indictment. It was reported that some of the jurors were doubtful whether there was a showing of intent such as would warrant an indictment for murder in the first

Indictments were returned, however, and Jones was at once arraigned before Judge Gear, on the two charges. Before the arraignment J. J. Dunne raised another point of objection, based on the absence of Samuel Parker as foreman and substitution of Fred Church. Dunne referred to the jury is a "pretended Grand Jury without my foreman.

THE IMMIGRATION OFFICIALS AS RESULT OF KICK.

A decision of some interest was received in the mall today by Acting Collector Robert Stackable, regarding the imposition of head tax on people coming from the Philippine Islands. The ruling was contained in a telegram sent to the Commissioner of Immigration at San Francisco by the Acting Commissioner General of Labor at Washington. The telegram was as

"No person coming to the United States from a port in the Philippine Islands is subject to head tax advise War Departone on this ground."

The occasion for sending this telegram was to enable 31 Filipinos carpenters to be admitted to San Francisco. These carpenters arrived last month at San Francisco by one of the transports from the Philippines. They were held up by the immlgration authorities who refused to permit them to land. The War Department evidently made a kick with the result that the immigration department ruled that no head tax was to be collected from any body arriving from the Philippines.





## A COMMERCIAL CHANGE.

The battle of free trade versus protection which is being waged in England is interesting to us, inasmuch as we have theorists in the Unit ed States who are very earnest free traders, and who would, if they had the opportunity and power upset our protective policy. It is interesting moreover to see how utterly wrong the theorists of the past upon British trade have been. Among the strong free trade writers of thirty years ago was Professor Fawcett, a member of parliament, and at one time postmaster general. Taking his arguments published in 1877 it is almost ludicrous to see how the figures he quoted for that year have utterly changed in the latest statistics, and how his reasoning is all astray.

For example, Mr. Fawcett wrote: "In the year 1877, when the iron trade was most inactive, the entire quantity of iron and steel, manufactured and unmanufactured, imported into England amounted to only £2,515,034" (\$12,239,412). This importation, even excluding iron ore amounted last year to \$7,988,519 (\$38,876,127); and the inference fails, "With regard to Belgian iron competing successfully against English and the IRON supplies what is wanted iron in our own market, so little reason is there to suppose our trade for the CIRCULATORY SYSTEMcan be so injured that the value of iron exported from Belgium to Eng- MAKES THE BLOOD RIGHT; the land in 1877 exceeded by only £210.724 (\$1,024,488) the value of the wine is a general stimulant. Upon this he generalized and said: "No single case can be brought forward in which English trade suffers to any appreciable extent by foreign products underselling in our own markets the same articles of English manufacture." One may safely accept Mr. Fawcett's word that this was true twenty-six years ago. But who is bold enough to repeat the assertion today? Any one with a knowledge of English markets could adduce not a single case merely, but many examples of trades ruined in the way that Mr. Fawcett spought impossible. Or again, he remarked that the value of all the exports from the United States to England, excepting articles of food and raw produce, amounted to the "comparatively" small sum of £2,578,000 (\$12,545,837). Last year they amounted to about £13,000,000 (\$63,264,500).

Indeed it is the so-called American invasion which has called forth such an overhauling of trade consideration. It needs ver," little thought to understand that a country, no matter how large its bulk of trade may be, must become alarmed when it realizes that its manufactures are retrograding, while those of other countries are increasing. It is thoroughly natural that there should be a careful reconsideration of the theories or policies which have guided the commercial methods of such a nation. The immense bulk of British trade has blinded many thinkers to the obvious facts. Thus to take example in the following table the exports of manufactured articles from Great Britain, the United States and Germany are compared in three periods which cover eleven years. 


