BROUGHT VERY LARGE CROWD

ALAMEDA ARRIVES THIS MORNING WITH ONE WEEKS MAIL AND MANY PEOPLE ABOARD.

There was rice flying about the S. S. Alameda this morning. The cause of the demonstration was the arrival of Louis Kenake and his bride from the coast. Mr. Kenake's friends were in large numbers at the Hackfeld wharf this morning when the Alameda came alongside and the pair were pelted with rice as they came down the gangway. The Alameda brought the largest crowd of passengers to Honolulu that has been landed from the vessel, in months. There were 53 cabin and 22 steerage passengers to arrive. The vessel left San Francisco September 26 and had 254 sacks of mail, representing seven days accumulation. The vessel brought 1,500 tons of general cargo. She experienced good weather during the trip. On October 27, the S. S. Doric was sighted and on the following day, two schooners steering northwest, were passed. The Nippon Maru was sighted last night. Captain Dowdell the regular master of the Alameda is back in her again, as he has recovered from his indisposition that necessitated his remaining ashore the last trip of the vessel.

The Alameda has a new feature now. Following the example of the big Atlantic liners, the Alameda has a band aboard. Purser Smith discovered that seven of the sailors aboard the vessel were German and had been on other Atlantic liners and were all good musicians. He proceeded without delay to organize them into a select band. The music will become a regular feature of the Alameda in future. The playing of the band was greatly enjoyed by the passengers on this trip of the vessel.

Last evening an entertainment was given by the passengers. Associate Justice Galbraith delivered a short address. There were instrumental selections by Mrs. Charles Crane, Mrs. Husted and Mr. Patton, instrumental music by Messrs. Jager, Ashley, Miss Swett and M. R. Smith, specialties by Mr. Patton and a recitation by Mr. Boulton.

Many of the passengers arriving were well known Honoluluans. Associate Justice and Mrs. Galbraith returned from a visit to the mainland. It was first reported that they would return by way of a sailing vessel to Hilo but their plans were changed.

S. B. Boulton and family are here for a visit. He is a wealthy English man who has come to the islands as a tourist.

J. A. Buck the plantation man returned, accompanied by his sons.

Captain B. C. Chapman returned from a trip to Tahiti.

J. F. Bowler the contractor returned from a trip to California.

RAISES CAIN WITH CANE & BEATS BEETS

NEW SACCHARINE PLANT FOUND IN SOUTH AMERICA THAT IS "TOO SWEET FOR ANYTHING."

WASHINGTON, Sept. 15.—The Agricultural Department is inquiring into the statement of Consul General Guenther that a new plant has been discovered in South America which promises to supplant the sugar cane and sugar beet. It contains a large amount of saccharine matter and a higher percentage of natural sugar properties, which are easy to extract.

According to Mr. Guenther, a dump the size of a liver pill will do the business in a cup of coffee, as the product made from the plant is from 20 to 30 per cent sweeter than cane or beet sugar. It is said to be easily cultivated in countries having climatic conditions similar to those of the southern portion of the United States and the Pacific slope.

BORING TO DETERMINE STRATA.

A boring machine is at work on the coal lot mounds of the Pacific Mail wharf for the purpose of enabling the Public Works Department to ascertain the variety of soils lying underneath. The purpose in securing this information is to give the Public Works authorities an idea of the amount of work and cost that will be necessary to dredge out that portion of the water front for the purpose of making new slips. Bids will be called for for this work later on as some extensive improvements are planned.

HOME RULE CHANGES.

Charles Notley has withdrawn as Home Rule candidate for supervisor at large and Frank Harvey, whom the Democrats named for supervisor of the Fifth district, has been substituted for him by Senator Kalaauokalani, president of the party. In West Hawaii Nawahine has withdrawn as candidate for assessor and W. P. McDougall has been put in his place on the ticket.
