MUST FLY THE AMERICAN FLAG

MEASURE TO RESTRICT TRADE WITH THE PHILIPPINES TO THE VESSELS OF UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, December 9.—Senator Frye has introduced a bill to regulate commerce between the United States and the Philippine archipelago providing that on and after July 1, 1904, under the penalty of forfeiture, no merchandise shall be transported by sea or any passengers carried between ports of the United States and ports and places in the Philippine archipelago in any other than vessels sailing under the flag of the United States.

The bill does not apply the counting laws in their entirety to trade between the Philippines and the United States as was done in the cases of Alaska, Hawaii and Porto Rico, but simply restricts the transportation of freight and passengers to American vessels.

Frye also introduced a bill to remove discrimination against American sailing vessels in the coasting trade, by providing for the licensing of pilots for terms of five years when the applicant has been found competent and trustworthy.

APPROPRIATION SUSTAINED

The Supreme Court this morning rendered a decision sustaining the appropriation bills as made by the last legislature, for two separate periods.

The land registration act seems to assume (Laws of 1902, Act 56, Sec. 7) that there might be a deputy registrar, and provides (Sec. 13) that the salaries of the assistant registrars, examiners of titles and other assistants and messengers (without mentioning the deputy registrar specifically) may be fixed by the Governor, and the Governor has fixed the salary of the deputy registrar at \$1500 a year.

The appellant's contention is that the legislature could not after the passage of the Organic Act divide the biennial fiscal period into two parts, that so much of the eighteen months bill (Laws of 1902, p. 442) as purports to limit the appropriation for the expenses of the Land Registration Court to the last eighteen months of the biennial period is void, and that that appropriation therefore became available as soon as the biennial period began.

## AN ARCHBISHOP ON THE CHINA

ARCHBISHOP HARTY, MANILA'S AMERICAN CATHOLIC ARCHBISHOP, IS PASSING THROUGH.

Among the passengers on the China are Archbishop J. J. Harty the Archbishop of Manila and head of the Catholic church in the Philippine Islands, and his secretary Monsignor E. W. Fowler. Archbishop Harty was born in St. Louis and is fifty years of age, a man of splendid physique and charming manners. He was ordained a priest in 1878.

Early in June last he received a cablegram from the Holy See announcing his appointment to the See of Manila. He went to Rome and was consecrated on August 13th. He was also Bishop of the late Forth and Leith, and the first to be confirmed by the new Pope, Pius X, by whom he was presented with a beautifully chased pectoral cross, which he prizes highly.

Archbishop Harty, in speaking of his new field of labor, said he had formed no plans for the future conduct and management of church affairs in the islands. Although he has familiarized himself in a measure with conditions in the islands he said he had determined upon no plans except to do the work which he will find when he reaches the islands. He went on to explain, however, that he would take a very decided interest in educational matters and by the building up of schools and colleges in the islands hoped to accomplish a great deal in the way of the up-building of the people.

"I was glad to learn upon investigation," he said, "that the people of the Philippines, on the whole, are not uneducated. There is in every other section of the world, you will find many people who have been denied the opportunity to obtain an education. We have illiterate people in this country, and in some sections—Tennessee, for instance—there is a considerable population of illiterate people. The percentage of illiteracy in the Philippines, however, is quite small, and I hope to see this condition greatly improved as the years roll by."

Archbishop Harty had quite a little to say about the friars and the friar land question.

"The friars began work in the Philippines 350 years ago," he said. "They civilized the natives and taught them agriculture. During these 350 years they received grants of land from the Government, which lands are separate and distinct from church property, the ownership resulting from their personal efforts in lines of industry apart from their church work. Whereas the church property in the islands, as in the United States, belongs to the people of the respective parishes, the title resting in the name of the several Bishops, and held by them for the benefit of the parishes. The lands of the friars are the property of the orders to which they belong, and held for the advancement of the community interest, which is an educational one."

"Now, if the friars choose to sell this property and they are offered a satisfactory price, they are at liberty to do so. They may dispose of their lands precisely as a man sells realty in this country. The acreage of the friar lands in the Philippines is not as great as some people suppose. There are individuals in California whose holdings of lands are as great as the entire holdings of all the friars in the Philippines. Their holdings approximate 400,000 acres."

Archbishop Harty said that many of the Spanish friars had left the islands since they passed under American control. He said that 400 friars have gone back to Spain and 200 more have gone to South America, leaving about 400 in the entire Philippine archipelago.

## HOSMER COMING.

The Board of Agriculture and Forestry yesterday received a cable from Clifford Pinchot, stating that Forester Hosmer, who is to take charge of forestry work in Hawaii, will leave Washington on December 25 and arrive in Honolulu on the Siberia January 14.

## A FAREWELL DINNER.

A farewell reception and dinner was tendered Rev. and Mrs. E. S. Muckley by members of the Young Men's, and the Young Women's Christian Associations at the rooms of the latter in the Boston Building. Thirty-four sat down at table. John Martin gave an address expressing the appreciation of the church and the community for Mr. Muckley's work and worth, and Mrs. Muckley's grace and helpfulness. Mr. Muckley, in replying, expressed the pangs of regret he felt at leaving a community which had been so hospitable to efforts for good, and in support of workers for betterment.

## A HAWAII BOOKLET.

A neat booklet in colors has been received by the Hawaii Promotion Committee from the Raymond & Whitecomb Co., Boston, announcing on its title page: "A Tour to Hawaii, Inclusive of a Visit to the Volcano of Kilauea. Leaving San Francisco Saturday, March 12, 1904." The itinerary of the tour from leaving San Francisco to returning thither is given, also a great deal of attractive information. There are several good pictures, including one of Kilauea.

**OPPOSED WOOD'S ACTION AT HAVANA**

ADVISERS WARNED HIM THAT GRANTING OF GAMBLING CONCESSION WAS AGAINST LAW.

WASHINGTON, December 9.—When the Wood investigation case was resumed today Colonel Edgar S. Dudley, professor of law and history at West Point Military Academy, who was judge advocate-general at Havana during General Wood's administration as Governor-General, submitted a copy of his opinion, rendered in Havana at the request of General Wood, concerning the application of the Jal Alai Company for a concession to operate an amusement amphitheater. This opinion declared that the concession should not be granted on the ground that it would be a violation of the Foraker amendment.

General Tasker H. Bliss was recalled. He said, in reply to questions, that he strongly opposed the admission without payment of duty of the silver service purchased in New York by the Jal Alai. He received mandatory instructions from General Wood to admit the silver service, however, and obeyed them.

**HAD A NARROW ESCAPE.**

Henry the cowboy who rides a mule about the city had a narrow escape last night. He and his mule fell into the culvert on the Hotel street line of the Rapid Transit, just as a car was coming along. ## CAN VISIT SHIP SUNDAY

KENTUCKY AND WISCONSIN WILL BE OPEN TO INSPECTION BY PUBLIC ON SUNDAY.

The battleships Kentucky and Wisconsin and cruiser New Orleans will all be hauled out today. The Kentucky finished yesterday while the Wisconsin got through this morning. The Kentucky hauled over to the Waikiki side of Naval Ship No. 1 as to enable Captain Niblack, the captain of the Naval yard, to bring the coal lighters alongside Naval Wharf No. 2 and load them for the other vessels of the fleet. The battleship Oregon shifts from Naval Row over to the Pacific Mail wharf this afternoon. She will begin coaling tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock. The New Orleans shifts into the stream.

Captain Niblack had the coal hauled up to midnight last night. The vessels can take coal faster than it can be supplied by the shore people, so in order not to have any time wasted, he worked at night loading scows. Two scows were taken out alongside the cruiser Albany today and coaling was begun on that vessel at once. It is expected that all of the fleet will be through coaling by Sunday and be ready for sea Sunday night or Monday morning.

It is likely that public receptions will be held on the Kentucky and Wisconsin on Sunday afternoon. The vessels will be cleaned by that time. The public will be permitted aboard the boats. The reception hours will be from 1:30 until sundown. Inasmuch as both boats are at Naval Wharf No. 2, a fine opportunity of visiting two of the greatest naval ships in the world is offered.

Considerable amusement was caused at Naval Wharf No. 2 this morning. The Kentucky goat, a white haired animal, and the Wisconsin goat, as black as a coal, marched off their respective boats and went on the wharf. They soon came together. The Kentucky goat routed the Wisconsin fellow and caused him to break ground repeatedly. The crews of both vessels stopped work and watched the fun.

Admiral Terry, the commandant of the Naval Station, paid his official calls this morning on the captains of the fleet.

### HE HELD THE INVADERS AT BAY

MAN BESIEGED BY PORTO RICANS AT IWILEI SCARED THEM AWAY WITH A WORTHLESS REVOLVER

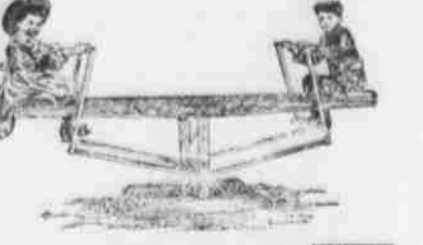


