**THE HOUSE**  
FORTY-THIRD DAY.  
Afternoon Session.  
Representative Carley yesterday afternoon in the House introduced a loan bill which calls, among other things, for \$100,000 for Honolulu harbor improvements and \$75,000 for judiciary building improvements. Other items are: Kula pipe-line, \$100,000; Kapoianui Girls' Home, \$15,000; Boys' Industrial School, \$12,000; addition to Normal School, \$8,000; armory, on condition that the Federal Government gives back the barracks lot, \$10,000—a total of \$250,000.

Senator Coelho's Lahauna hospital bill was referred back to the health committee in Coney's request.  
Senator Kalama's bill, which provides that on payment of a judgment lien the creditor shall at the expense of the debtor execute and record a release, passed third reading.  
Coelho's bill to appropriate for claims contracted under the first and faulty county act, was passed on third reading.

The House received from the City and County Supervisors a resolution that the present postoffice building be handed over for a City and County headquarters at such time when the United States shall have finished with its use as a postoffice.  
Rice put in a bill to provide for the payment of the expenses of district courts by counties, taking away from supervisors the right to fix salaries of district magistrates and naming sums to be given and the services expected therefor.

Two Senate bills were tabled, they being under the head to encourage diversified industries, exempting tobacco land, and property used in the cultivation of seal, castor beans, copra, vanilla, starch, pineapples, arrowroot, and casawa, from taxation.  
C. W. Rinear exhibited his algaroba bean mill in operation yesterday and it worked successfully.

**ALICE COOKE HAS A LONG RECORD**  
**PORT TOWNSEND, March 15.**  
(Special)—With a record of seventeen years' smart service, carrying lumber from Washington mill ports to Honolulu and other points of the Hawaiian group, the four-masted schooner Alice Cooke holds the distinction of having been actively connected with the commercial development of Hawaii. The schooner recently sailed for the islands on the 50th voyage out of Puget sound. Carrying an average cargo of 1,000,000 feet—the record is one to which all associated with the vessel point as an achievement not excelled by another ship of her class on the Pacific.  
Capt. David B. Penhallow, a master widely known over Puget sound, occupies a notable position in Pacific shipping, in every way as remarkable as that of his command. Capt. Penhallow was born at Honolulu, 63 years ago. His father, a shipmaster, was among the first navigators to reach the islands, and acquired a residence at Honolulu, where a family was born that has become identified prominently with the development of the present The Alice Cooke is a trim and speedy sailer, one of the fleet of two built and owned by Robert Lewers and W. A. Cooke, of Honolulu. The vessels by class supplanted a type of sailing craft that had brought the islanders communication from Pacific coast ports many years. The era of schooners completely put out of commission a large fleet of box-like barks and other square riggers, whose voyages from the Coast to Honolulu were as liable to require as many weeks sailing as days used at present.—Seattle P.-I.

**THE AFTERNOON SESSIONS**

**THE SENATE**

Forty-third day. Afternoon Session.

Woods presented a report of the select committee of Hawaii members on House bill to prohibit the taking of fish with nets in the waters of the Bay of Hilo, saying:

"Your committee finds that the Bay of Hilo is four miles long and one and one-quarter miles broad, and believe that if this bill should become law a large fleet of patrolling vessels would be necessary to enforce the same. Your committee therefore recommends that the bill be laid on the table. If, however, a majority of the members of Senate do not agree with the members of this committee, and this bill becomes law, your committee recommends the insertion of a suitable amount in the appropriation bill to provide for its enforcement."

Adopted, tabling the bill.

A petition was received from the Mayor and Supervisors of Honolulu asking for a joint committee to report on the advisability of having the postoffice building transferred, after its surrender to the Territory on the completion of the proposed Federal building, to the City and County for a municipal building. Under a motion by McCarthy, the president appointed Chillingworth, Quinn and McCarthy as the Senate members of such committee.

**LIBRARY BILL HELD UP.**

House bill to provide for the Library of Hawaii was read a second time.

Fairchild asked if any provision was made for the expense. Being told there was an item of \$10,000 proposed, he said money was wanted for the College of Hawaii and they ought to consider carefully before incurring more expenditure.

Knudsen moved to refer the bill to the ways and means committee. Carried.

**THE DEPOSITORY BILL.**

Fairchild announced that the ways and means committee would hear all persons interested in the depository bill tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

**THE APPROPRIATION BILL.**

The Senate went into committee of the whole on appropriations for general expenses for the coming biennial period. Senator Knudsen in the chair. For a basis the House bill was taken, with other bills for reference. Items were passed as follows:

**THE GOVERNOR.**

National Guard—Adjutant General (\$225), \$5,400; Clerk and Assistant (\$75), \$1,800; Janitor and Armorer (\$40), \$960; Expenses, \$12,000; total, \$20,160.

Fairchild moved to put salary of adjutant general back to \$225. Baker moved \$175. Fairchild had been told by a U. S. Major that the proposed salary was smaller than any paid for the office anywhere else in the Union.

Kalama moved \$200 as the House made it. Chillingworth argued the great amount of work, quoting figures of its great increase here in late years, and thought the job worth the highest figure moved.

Robinson asked if the work would take all of the officer's time, and Colonel McCarthy gave information in reply showing the great importance of the position. Harvey thought \$200 a good salary for the job.

Passed at \$225.

Baker asked about the band. White

penses to \$16,200, speaking of increased work owing to cases appealed to Washington.

Smith supported the motion but it was lost and the schedule passed as in the bill.

Fairchild moved an amendment making items under the head of high sheriff, prisons, jails conform to proposed transfers of services to the counties. After some talk the items were deferred.

**AUDITING DEPARTMENT.**

Auditor (\$275), \$6,600; Deputy Auditor (\$200), \$4,800; Clerks, (\$400), \$9,600; Expenses, \$3,600; total, \$24,600.

McCarthy moved to reinsert \$4800 for deputy auditor. The House struck out the office on account of reduction of the duties, but the House later added new duties that made the work as great as ever. Carried.

Coelho, when the Treasury department had been reached and the salary of the Treasurer passed at \$275, moved to rise to enable the members to attend the reception of Admiral Ijchi and officers of the Japanese squadron.

Smith was sorry for the interruption but it was a matter of courtesy of some importance.

Chairman Knudsen asked how it would be if they had an invitation for every afternoon. If the committee rose now it ought to sit at night.

Smith said night sessions were usually unprofitable as undisturbed meeting at 9 o'clock in the morning.

The committee rose and reported progress.

**THE ENABLING ACT.**

Knudsen presented a report of the judicial committee on the bill to amend the act of this session relating to the expenditure of public money. It recommended the passage of the bill with amendments, the chief one being this provision:

"All purchases made after the 3rd day of April, 1909, and prior to the approval of this act, are hereby legalized and the Auditor is hereby ordered to approve the same."

The provision making the act so amended take effect on July 1 next remains. By adoption of the report the bill passed second reading.

Makekau moved to adjourn to 9 a. m. tomorrow, Woods to 7:30 and Quinn to 10. Chillingworth asked about sitting on Good Friday, and Knudsen said not being a public holiday it counted against them, and they could not afford to lose a day.

At 4:25 adjourned to 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.

**TABLET FOR THE UNKNOWN.**

There has just been turned out by the Hawaiian Iron Fence and Monument Works a handsome tablet to be mounted at the entrance to Kawaiahaeo cemetery as a memorial to the unknown dead buried there. Many of the graves of the very old days are unmarked—some of them of Hawaiians of note and influence in those times. It has been found impossible to identify any large number of them and the beautiful tablet is dedicated to them all.

The tablet is of dark granite and the lettering is bold and clear. On the front appear these words: In memorial to the dead whose ashes lie in unmarked graves of Kawaiahaeo cemetery this tablet is affectionately dedicated. Beneath the inscription are the figures "1908."

The tablet will be placed on exhibition at the King street offices of the designs, and in about a week will be set upon a pedestal at the entrance to the cemetery.
