TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Something ought to be done by the Hawaiian Electric Company to prevent accidents through "live" wire. The town is "lively" enough without being electrocuted.

The report of the Grand Jury was unsatisfactory in one point. Our curiosity has not been satisfied as to whom "Colonel Mezuma" is. We want to locate the bad man, charged with attempting to bribe honorable legislators.

The excellent work of road supervisor Lloyd on Fort Street has gained the new official numerous supporters and admirers. Rome wasn't built in one day and it may take time to put the rotten roads of Honolulu in order. Lloyd will get there, if the Legislature passes a proper appropriation.

Mr. Cohen, the manager of the Orpheum theatre, is to be congratulated on the success of the Elford company which has played here under the manager's special supervision. It was a clean show, an excellent aggregation of talent and exactly what Honolulu wants. Now, Mr. Cohen, let us have some more of the same class, and we will all be truly grateful.

After Pilot Jordan.

Catherine Brady, widow of Second Assistant Engineer Thomas H. Brady, who was drowned on the occasion of the wreck of the Rio de Janeiro on the 22d of last February, filed suit in the United States District Court in San Francisco on June 17th, against Frederick W. Jordan and nineteen other pilots to recover \$15,000 damages for the loss of her husband.

The complaint alleges that the wreck of the Rio was caused by the negligence and unskillfulness of Pilot Jordan, who was in exclusive command of the vessel at the time she struck. Her four children are parties plaintiff to the suit.

A similar suit for \$50,000 damages for the death of Water Tender J. H. Smith was filed against the same defendants by the family of the dead man. It is alleged that all the defendants are partners.

Major Ennis to Leave.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13—Capt. E. Davis, Artillery Corps, has been detached from duty at the Presidio and ordered to Camp McKinley, Honolulu. He will assume command of the post, relieving Major William Ennis.

SUMMER SCHOOL.

The Course of Study and List of Instructions.

President David Starr Jordan of Stanford University may be one of the lecturers at the summer school session, which commences July 8. Prof. M. M. Scott and Jared Smith will be members of the corps of special instructors. The course of study and list of instructors are as follows:

Methods—Reading, spelling, writing, history, nature study, geography, number, school management. Teacher: Edgar Wood, principal. English—Myths, legends, historical stories, Evangeline and The Grandmother's Story. (a) Expression work—painting, drawing, modelling, etc.; (b) oral and written expression, presentation of correct forms, etc.; (c) formal grammar. Teacher: Miss Margaret Barton and one other to be selected.

Mathematics—Review of arithmetic, algebra, geometry. Teacher: J. Bicknell.

Geography—Observational geography, geography of the Hawaiian Islands, and current geography. Teacher: Mrs. L. G. Marshall.

Nature study—Study of insects, their habits and habits; lessons and suggestions for carrying out the requirements of the course of study. Teachers: To be selected.

Agriculture—Formation and preparation of soil; plants in relation to their environment; propagation of plants. Teachers: To be selected.

Art—Chalk modelling, painting, charcoal work, illustrations of geography, stories, etc. Teacher: W. H. Hilt.

Music—Course in music leading to primary and intermediate certificates. Teacher: Mrs. Anna B. Tucker.

Manual Training—Making of apparatus necessary in school work. Teacher: C. A. Donald.

Physical Culture—Exercises for school room and play ground. Teacher: Miss Nina Adams.

During the last week of the term examination of teachers for certificates will take place.

How They Stood.

In the recent Supreme Court decisions concerning the island possessions, the way the justices divided is interesting. They did not divide on political lines. Classified politically they were thus arrayed:

For the administration:

- Justice Horace Gray (Republican, Massachusetts)
Justice Henry Billings Brown (Republican, Michigan)
Justice George S. S. (Republican, Pennsylvania)
Justice Edward Douglas White (Democrat, Louisiana)
Justice Joseph McKenna (Republican, California)

Against the Administration:

- Chief Justice Melville Weston Fuller (Democrat, Illinois)
Justice John Marshall Harlan (Republican, Kentucky)
Justice David Josiah Brewer (Republican, Kansas)
Justice Rufus W. Peckham (Democrat, New York)

Divided as they were on points of law, the court was almost unanimous in one thing—in condemning the main argument of ex Attorney-General Griggs, that "the power of Congress over all the Territories is not restricted by the constitution." Against Mr. Griggs's argument the court stood 8 to 1, and Justice Brown was the only one who sided with the luckless Griggs. Chief Justice Fuller, with Justices Brewer, Harlan, and Peckham, held that Porto Rico is a part of the United States, and that the constitutional rule of uniformity in taxation applies to it. Justice White, on the other hand, held that Porto Rico is not a part of the United States, but that if it were, the constitutional rule would apply. Justices Gray, McKenna, and Shiras sided with him. Five justices upheld the power of Congress over the Territories, but one of the five—Justice Brown—arrived at his conclusions by reasoning which Justices White, Shiras, and McKenna pronounced to be unsound, though these three concurred in his findings. Justice Gray concurred for different reasons. Chief Justice Fuller and the minority denounce the court's opinion in such strong and bitter terms as have never been known to figure in the records of the court before.—S. F. Argonaut.

Very Aristocratic.

"We trust in Scottish pride to rise in its wrath against this invasion of the Almighty Dollar," says a noted paper of Scotland, commenting on Andrew Carnegie's munificence to Scotland's universities. "Many of the oldest and best families in Scotland," continues the periodical, "send their sons to Scottish universities, where they pay the fees, like the sons of their humblest neighbors, neither more or less. Is it to be believed that this will continue if the fees are paid for them by Mr. Carnegie? Imagine the Duke of Hamilton, Cameron of Lochiel, or MacDonald of the Isles, allowing his heir to get education at the cost of an American ironmonger! We shall next hear of some Chicago porkpacker proposing to buy up Oxford and Cambridge and dictating terms of admission and the subjects to be taught, or of Boss Croker forming a lobby to control the London University, with the object of inculcating Tammany principles in the minds of the rising generation of cockneys."

More Steamers.

Two new steamers are to be built in England for the Toyo Kisen Kaisha Company, running between San Francisco and Hong Kong. The new vessels are to be both large and fast, with elegant furnishings, the equal if not the superior of any steamers now connecting this port with the Orient. It will be nearly two years before they are ready for service. The company's three steamers now on the route—the America Maru, the Hong Kong Maru, and the Nippon Maru—are practically new, and have become very popular with the traveling public.

Death of Ben Holladay.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—Word was received in this city Monday announcing the death in Philadelphia of Ben Holladay, only son of Mrs. William G. Irwin. He had been ill for some time, but his death was not considered imminent. Recently young Holladay was well enough to make the trip to Honolulu with his mother, who had to see about the completion of the magnificent residence her husband is building there. It was thought that the sea voyage would benefit him, but the change did not bring about the hoped for result and the family returned some time before it had planned.

While on the way back from the Islands the invalid grew worse and by the time San Francisco was reached it was decided to proceed immediately to Philadelphia. The sufferer was placed in Dr. Weir Mitchell's hospital and everything possible was done in his case, but nothing availed. Brain trouble at the end was added to the complications and made recovery impossible.

There is the greatest sympathy in this city for the bereavement that has come to Mrs. Irwin, who is one of the most amiable and well loved of women. This death will close for many a day the residence the Irwins are building in this city on Washington street overlooking the bay. The opening of this home was being looked forward to as an epoch in the social annals of this city, for both Mr. and Mrs. Irwin have the happy faculty of planning so that their friends enjoy their vast wealth with them.

Ben Holladay, who was 24 years of age, was the only child of Mrs. Irwin's first marriage and she was devotedly attached to him. The fact that he has been an invalid for the past few years had so intensified that love that friends now fear the result of this affliction. It is thought that Mrs. Irwin will bring her son's remains to this city for burial.

Becoming Dangerous.

The frequent reports of "live wires" being found in the streets to the peril of people passing along the streets are becoming alarming. Last night a "live" wire fell down on Nuuanu street and it was fortunate that a sensible mounted patrolman was in the vicinity. He caused the Electric Company to be notified through Mr. S. F. Chillingworth, who lives in the vicinity, and kept guard, warning people away, during the long spell before the men from electric headquarters arrived on the scene. Had the policeman not been there some terrible accident would probably have happened to people passing by in tram cars or carriages.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

Something ought to be done by the Hawaiian Electric Company to prevent accidents through "live" wire. The town is "lively" enough without being electrocuted.

The excellent work of road supervisor Lloyd on Fort Street has gained the new official numerous supporters and admirers. Rome wasn't built in one day and it may take time to put the rotten roads of Honolulu in order. Lloyd will get there, if the Legislature passes a proper appropriation.

Mr. Cohen, the manager of the Orpheum theatre, is to be congratulated on the success of the Elleford company which has played here under the manager's special supervision. It was a clean show, an excellent aggregation of talent and exactly what Honolulu wants. Now, Mr. Cohen, let us have some more of the same class, and we will all be truly grateful.

After Pilot Jordan.

Catherine Brady, widow of Second Assistant Engineer Thomas H. Brady, who was drowned on the occasion of the wreck of the Rio de Janeiro on the 22d of last February, filed suit in the United States District Court in San Francisco on June 17th, against Frederick W. Jordan and nineteen other pilots to recover \$15,000 damages for the loss of her husband.

The complaint alleges that the wreck of the Rio was caused by the negligence and unskillfulness of Pilot Jordan, who was in exclusive command of the vessel at the time she struck. Her four children are parties plaintiff to the suit.

A similar suit for \$50,000 damages for the death of Water Tender J. H. Smith was filed against the same defendants by the family of the dead man. It is alleged that all the defendants are partners.

Major Ennis to Leave.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13—Capt. E. Davis, Artillery Corps, has been detached from duty at the Presidio and ordered to Camp McKinley, Honolulu. He will assume command of the post, relieving Major William Ennis.

SUMMER SCHOOL.

The Course of Study and List of Instructions.

President David Starr Jordan of Stanford University may be one of the lecturers at the summer school session, which commences July 8. Prof. M. M. Scott and Jared Smith will be members of the corps of special instructors. The course of study and list of instructors are as follows:

Methods—Reading, spelling, writing, history, nature study, geography, number, school management. Teacher: Edgar Wood, principal. English—Myths, legends, historical stories, Evangeline and The Grandmother's Story. (a) Expression work—painting, drawing, modelling, etc.; (b) oral and written expression, presentation of correct forms, etc.; (c) formal grammar. Teacher: Miss Margaret Burton and one other to be selected.

Mathematics—Review of arithmetic, algebra, geometry. Teacher: J. Bicknell.

Geography—Observational geography, geography of the Hawaiian Islands, and current geography. Teacher: Mrs. L. G. Marshall.

Nature study—Study of insects, their habits and habits; lessons and suggestions for carrying out the requirements of the course of study. Teachers: To be selected.

Agriculture—Formation and preparation of soil; plants in relation to their environment; propagation of plants. Teachers: To be selected.

Art—Chalk modelling, painting, charcoal work, illustrations of geography, stories, etc. Teacher: W. H. Hills.

Music—Course in music leading to primary and intermediate certificates. Teacher: Mrs. Anna B. Tucker.

Manual Training—Making of apparatus necessary in school work. Teacher: C. A. Donald.

Physical Culture—Exercises for school room and play ground. Teacher: Miss Nina Adams.

During the last week of the term examination of teachers for certificates will take place.

How They Stood.

In the recent Supreme Court decisions concerning the island possessions, the way the justices divided is interesting. They did not divide on political lines. Classified politically they were thus arrayed:

For the administration:

- Justice Horace Gray (Republican, Massachusetts)
Justice Henry Billings Brown (Republican, Michigan)
Justice George S. Ras (Republican, Pennsylvania)
Justice Edward Douglas White (Democrat, Louisiana)
Justice Joseph McKenna (Republican, California)

Against the Administration:

- Chief Justice Melville Weston Fuller (Democrat, Illinois)
Justice John Marshall Harlan (Republican, Kentucky)
Justice David Josiah Brewer (Republican, Kansas)
Justice Rufus W. Peckham (Democrat, New York)

Divided as they were on points of law, the court was almost unanimous in one thing—in condemning the main argument of ex Attorney-General Griggs, that "the power of Congress over all the Territories is not restricted by the constitution." Against Mr. Griggs's argument the court stood 8 to 1, and Justice Brown was the only one who sided with the luckless Griggs. Chief Justice Fuller, with Justices Brewer, Harlan, and Peckham, held that Porto Rico is a part of the United States, and that the constitutional rule of uniformity in taxation applies to it. Justices White, on the other hand, held that Porto Rico is not a part of the United States, but that if it were, the constitutional rule would apply. Justices Gray, McKenna, and Shiras sided with him. Five justices upheld the power of Congress over the Territories, but one of the five—Justice Brown—arrived at his conclusions by reasoning which Justices White, Shiras, and McKenna pronounced to be unsound, though these three concurred in his findings. Justice Gray concurred for different reasons. Chief Justice Fuller and the minority denounce the court's opinion in such strong and bitter terms as have never been known to figure in the records of the court before.—S. F. Argonaut.

Very Aristocratic.

"We trust in Scottish pride to rise in its wrath against this invasion of the Almighty Dollar," says a noted paper of Scotland, commenting on Andrew Carnegie's munificence to Scotland's universities. "Many of the oldest and best families in Scotland," continues the periodical, "send their sons to Scottish universities, where they pay the fees, like the sons of their humblest neighbors, neither more or less. Is it to be believed that this will continue if the fees are paid for them by Mr. Carnegie? Imagine the Duke of Hamilton, Cameron of Lochiel, or MacDonald of the Isles, allowing his heir to get education at the cost of an American ironmonger! We shall next hear of some Chicago porkpacker proposing to buy up Oxford and Cambridge and dictating terms of admission and the subjects to be taught, or of Boss Croker forming a lobby to control the London University, with the object of inculcating Tammany principles in the minds of the rising generation of cockneys."

More Steamers.

Two new steamers are to be built in England for the Toyo Kisen Kaisha Company, running between San Francisco and Hong Kong. The new vessels are to be both large and fast, with elegant furnishings, the equal if not the superior of any steamers now connecting this port with the Orient. It will be nearly two years before they are ready for service. The company's three steamers now on the route—the America Maru, the Hong Kong Maru, and the Nippon Maru—are practically new, and have become very popular with the traveling public.

Death of Ben Holladay.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 12.—Word was received in this city Monday announcing the death in Philadelphia of Ben Holladay, only son of Mrs. William G. Irwin. He had been ill for some time, but his death was not considered imminent. Recently young Holladay was well enough to make the trip to Honolulu with his mother, who had to see about the completion of the magnificent residence her husband is building there. It was thought that the sea voyage would benefit him, but the change did not bring about the hoped for result and the family returned some time before it had planned.

While on the way back from the Islands the invalid grew worse and by the time San Francisco was reached it was decided to proceed immediately to Philadelphia. The sufferer was placed in Dr. Weir Mitchell's hospital and everything possible was done in his case, but nothing availed. Brain trouble at the end was added to the complications and made recovery impossible.

There is the greatest sympathy in this city for the bereavement that has come to Mrs. Irwin, who is one of the most amiable and well loved of women. This death will close for many a day the residence the Irwins are building in this city on Washington street overlooking the bay. The opening of this home was being looked forward to as an epoch in the social annals of this city, for both Mr. and Mrs. Irwin have the happy faculty of planning so that their friends enjoy their vast wealth with them.

Ben Holladay, who was 24 years of age, was the only child of Mrs. Irwin's first marriage and she was devotedly attached to him. The fact that he has been an invalid for the past few years had so intensified that love that friends now fear the result of this affliction. It is thought that Mrs. Irwin will bring her son's remains to this city for burial.

The frequent reports of "live wires" being found in the streets to the peril of people passing along the streets are becoming alarming. Last night a "live" wire fell down on Nuuanu street and it was fortunate that a sensible mounted patrolman was in the vicinity. He caused the Electric Company to be notified through Mr. S. F. Chillingworth, who lives in the vicinity, and kept guard, warning people away, during the long spell before the men from electric headquarters arrived on the scene. Had the policeman not been there some terrible accident would probably have happened to people passing by in tram cars or carriages.

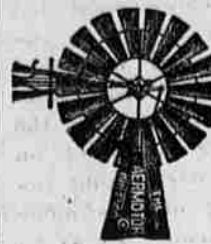
