



President's Message

Over the past month, I've given three of our Education Center presentations to various groups. As more of these presentations are given, I'm increasingly cognizant about the injustices that Americans of Japanese ancestry (AJA) faced during the 1940s and specifically what our Nisei soldiers had to endure. It started with the removal of the AJA soldiers from the Hawaii National Guard, the unceremonial departure from Hawaii aboard ship without being told where they were going, then transported across country with train windows completely covered, and continued on during basic training with the audacity of Cat Island. A statement I heard recently gave more clarity to what happened: "...When there is fear, the Constitution and human rights go out the window." That makes it all the more reason (important) that we get the 100th's story out and educate as many as we can. More than once I've been approached after my talks by people who could not believe that injustice and discrimination happened, especially in our racially diverse State. In history, 70 vears is really not a long time and if we don't keep our veterans' legacy alive, their story and its lessons will be forgotten. If you think about it, what happened to the AJAs could easily happen again today to any ethnic minority. Fear is a motivator and it is relevant today more than ever with the events of 9/11 and terrorism. I'm afraid that our youngsters are complacent, just as we once were, and this is where we should focus. I'm proud of what we have begun with the Education Center but there is so much more we can do.

Recently I gave a presentation to University of Hawaii American studies students and will host a group of high school students from Castle High School who will visit the clubhouse in April. Iolani School has also brought some of their seniors to "talk story" with our 100th and 442nd

Nisei vets to hear first-hand about their life experiences during and after WWII, as well as aging challenges they face (most are in their mid-to-late 90s). Talks were also given to middle-school students, senior citizens groups, a retired teachers sorority, the FBI, and to a world-wide young entrepreneurs convention. We are only touching the surface and I think we can make a real difference. Let us know if this is something you would like to help with or have a group that is interested in learning more about our Nisei American warriors.

Another way we can get our story out is to support relevant programs and events. A photo exhibition by **Eric Saul**, noted scholar of the Nisei Soldier, has been donated to the Nisei Veterans Legacy Center and will be exhibited in various venues on Oahu and the Neighbor Islands. The first venue is at the State Capitol at the end of March, followed by City Hall, and the Maui Veterans Legacy Center. Future venues, including our Clubhouse, will be announced in the near future. This is another way you can get involved as the NVLC is looking for docents and volunteers. Please let the office know if you can help.

Professor Edwin "Bud" Nakasone Visits Clubhouse



A recent visitor to our Clubhouse and Education Center was Edwin "Bud" Nakasone from White Bear Lake, Minnesota. Bud was born in Wahiawa, Oahu, and graduated from Leilehua High School. He was promptly drafted into the Army and after basic training in Alabama, was sent to Military Intelligence Service Language School at Fort

Snelling, Minnesota. He was deployed to Japan where he served 18 months during the Occupation of Japan. After discharge, Bud completed his education at the University of Hawaii and with the GI Bill education benefit, finished his schooling in Minnesota where he also received his master's degree. He became a professor of history at several colleges in Minnesota and also on US Navy ships.

Some of you may remember Bud from his presentation to a packed Turner Hall in early 2000. He donned the uniform of a Japanese fighter pilot and began his monologue with visual aids about this pilot's participation in the bombing of Pearl Harbor. The audience was captivated by his impersonation. Many wished their own history teachers could have been as imaginative, creative, and dynamic. During his recent visit, Ed promised President Lloyd Kitaoka that he would do a repeat performance on his next visit. War Memorial Plaque - Neal S. Blaisdell Center

On September 12, 1964, the Honolulu International Center, now the Neal S. Blaisdell Center, was formally dedicated to honor Hawaii's war heroes. A Memorial plaque was placed there to commemorate this. The plaque is gone and knowledge of it and the Memorial dedication has been lost to the City & County of Honolulu and Hawaii State governments, and to society at large.

The text of the Memorial plaque is quoted in the Sept 13, 1964 Star-Bulletin & Honolulu Advertiser: "Honolulu International Center: Dedicated to All the Sons and Daughters of Hawaii Who Served Their Country in Time of War and in Special Tribute to Those Who Gave Their Lives in Order That Freedom and Justice Might Prevail Throughout the World."

This dedication ceremony was announced by the media and filmed by a news crew. The plaque was attached to a boulder probably located in the vicinity of the current Blaisdell Box Office. Likely gone by 1970, it may have been a victim of vandalism.

I am requesting oral history, photos, and other items regarding the dedication, Memorial plaque, and Blaisdell Center's planning and early history in general.

Blaisdell Center was dedicated to our honored war dead and that has been forgotten. Please help to document and preserve this history so it is not forgotten again. Green Thumb News Little Fire Ants

At our last Green Thumb Club Meeting on Saturday, February 22, we viewed an interesting video about the Little Fire Ants. The orange-yellow ants were first found in Puna, Hawaii in 1999. It is as long as a penny is thick, about 1/16 of an inch. Each massive super colony has lots of queens and can span acres. It likes wet and shady areas and can make nests in trees. The intense bites can cover your body with welts that can last for weeks and can blind pets. It promotes garden pests such as aphids, white flies and scale insects, which secrete plant sap that the ants eat. It can infest houses, beds, furniture, classrooms, parks, beaches, and hiking trails. These pests can hitchhike onto your property in potted plants, mulch, hapuu, and soil. Besides Hawaii, the ants have been found on Maui, Kauai, and recently on Oahu.

If you suspect these ants on your property, here's what you should do. The ants are attracted to peanut butter so put some on a chopstick, leave it out for 45 minutes, and if any are caught, put the stick in a plastic bag and freeze it. Contact the Hawaii Department of Agriculture. They will be able to confirm it for you.

There is a bait that you can make to try to get rid of them but it takes months for it to work. The explanation is too long to be covered in this article. Check out the <u>Little Fire Ant</u> on the internet. A helpful site is: <u>http://</u> <u>littlefireants.com</u>/.

Broccoli-Cauliflower-Crabmeat Salad

In the 1970s and 1980s the 100TH Infantry Battalion Veterans' wives had a Cooking Club. The following recipe from Nancy Sakaki (A) was demonstrated by Gladys Kawakami (A) at the cooking class on April 8, 1984. Nancy Sakaki has since retired as a cafeteria worker from Hahaione Elementary School. She is in good health and is a regular volunteer at our monthly Puka Puka Parade collating. Broccoli-Cauliflower-Crabmeat Salad

1# broccoli 1/2 # cauliflower 1/4 -1/2 # imitation crab meat, kamaboko, etc. 2 eggs or more, hard boiled 1/8 t. black pepper 1/2 c. mayonnaise Optional: cucumber, celery

Wash and cut vegetables into bite-size pieces. Cook broccoli and cauliflower being careful not to overcook. A slightly crunchy texture should be maintained. Transfer into colander and run tap water to cool and to prevent further cooking. Place drained and cooled vegetables into a large bowl. Tear crab meat chunks in half and add to vegetables. Add eggs that have been diced. Cover and chill. Before serving, add mayonnaise and pepper and toss lightly. Serves 4.

CLUB 100 April 1, 1946

Visitors to the Clubhouse




