

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

THE PREVAILING feeling during the past week among all who respected His Majesty was one of sadness that evil advisers should have held such sway in the Royal Councils. It was plainly evident that there must be an interruption of friendly diplomatic intercourse with foreign powers i a certain appointment was persisted in, and there was a general wish that any diplomatic remonstrance might be avoided by timely concession. This we believe was at last accomplished, but not before a rude shock had been given to public

THE LATE MINISTRY-Mesers. Wilder, Kapena Kasi, and Preston-took office on the 3rd of July, 1878. During the past two years they filled their respective offices with credit to themselves, and with the almost universal approbation of the public. Men holding high public positions, and also having business connections in the country, cannot fall to be criticized, but the victory is gained when that criticism is challenged. The ex-Minister of the Interior, to use his own words, made his mark in this country. He devoted the largest portion of his time to the country, and, had he been retained in office, we might expect to have seen in two or three years hence the development of those plans which he has devised, and the judicious expenditure of the large sums that have been appropriated for permanent improvements. Of his colleagues we can only speak in equally high terms, and it is further a pleasure for us to testify to the estimation in which they were beld, and the respect shown to them by their subordinates. The late vote of " want of confidence" brought forward in the Assembly proves their position with the Nobles and Representatives, and the general demonstration of public sentiment already expressed, and which still pervades this city, goes to show that their recent peremptory dismissal from office is inexplicable.

During the day of our last issue the prorogation of the Legislative Assembly, and the returning by His Majesty of some exceptional bills, had relieved the public mind from the anxious strain of the previous few weeks; and our citizens were about to turn to their usual avocations free from the anxiety caused by fears of reckless legislation, when it was suddenly announced that the efficient and capable Cabinet Ministers who had successfully, and entirely to the public satisfaction, conducted the affairs of the Government for the last two years, and who The Sir William Wallace is loading at Newcastle, N.S | had laid careful plans for the coming two years, which had received the sanction of the Legislative Assembly, had been summarily and rudely dismissed from office.

This sudden action alone was enough to cause anxiety, but it was hoped that it was but an act for which good reason would be given, and that their successors would be men worthy of public confidence; but even this hope was dashed when the names of the new Cabinet was made known. Not in the history of the present reign has the public mind been so agitated and alarmed, and it may be added so recklessly, for prosperous as the reign has been, there was never less need of a change in the Ministry.

WE ARE credibly informed that the China steamer Hochung brought over from China \$500, 000 for the purpose of tendering a loan to this Government. Now as it is a well known fact that the Hochung is a Government steamer, s statement we make on the letter of Mr. C. C. Moreno, to which appeared in the Hawaiian Gazette of November 26, 1879, we naturally presume this is Government money. Supposing the loan bill had passed, what might have been the result, and in this connection the question suggests itself why the sudden change of Ministry? There is a link in these matters which can possibly be detected. On the other hand, why not borrow from China if money can be had from there cheaper than elsewhere. But this hardly seems feasible when we know that China has, during the past six years, borrowed largely from foreign markets, principally London. For the informafollowing loans. Chinese Imperial Government loan of 1874, £533,415, bearing interest at 8 per cent. Ditto of 1877, £1,604,276 at 8 per cent. Ditto of 1878, \$2,599,333 at 8 per cent. These loans are secured by the Customs revenue which for the year 1879, amounted to nearly \$20,000, 000. China may be the treasury of the world, but she has not yet become a lender of money to other nations without some ulterior object in view. the country at large, then to discharge them.

But the dismissal of the last Ministry is not the question which is now pressing upon the community. It is insisted by some who regard the recent appointments as proper, that the public cannot call in question the propriety of the King's Cabinet appointments without en-croaching upon the Royal prerogative. No greater mistake could be made. The officers of he English service, civil and military, are styled Her Majesty's officers, of whatever rank or position. If it happens that Her Majesty has com-missioned a General in charge of her armies, for instance, who turns out to be incompetent, or to be unsuccessful in securing confidence, the officer is for that reason dismissed, and that without anyone imagining that the Queen's prerogative is affected. If Her Majesty's Premier is so unpopular that her national affairs do not work smoothly, a new Premier for that reason takes his place, and all the Ministers connected with him go out at the same time as a matter of course. in order that she may be free to make a new and barmonious Ministry. This is what should occur here in this country. The retirement of Mr. Moreno, for reasons which were satisfactory to His Majesty, involves the calling of another Premier who would have the right to suggest his associates. Turkish statesmen and functionaries, and the most in-telligent Turks, are fully alive to the dangers which threaten the Empire, and are prepared for the adoption of decisive and radical measures to avert them. The most distinguished of them have been sent away from the capital into honourable exile as Governors-General or to fill other posts, because they are known to advocate a change of systems, Mahmoud Nedim, Safvet, and Haireddin Pashas being the only men of note left in Constantinople. There is a general conviction that the only measures that can save Turkey from speedy collapse are the immediate dismissal of the present incompetent Ministry; the removal from the Palace and from access to the Sultan of those men who now exercise an evil inluence over him."

"Under these circumstances it appears to me that the Powers have a right, if they think fit to exercise it, to lemand that the National Assembly should be called to-gether. If Her Majesty's Government were disposed to do so alone, or in conjunction with other Governments, they would. I believe, be supported by the most intelligent, enlightened, and liberal public opinion in the Empire. An adequate control might, in this case, be placed in the arbitrary power of the Sultan, the few experienced and enlightened men who are still to be found in Turkey might be called to His Majesty's counsels, and those reforms which can alone save the country from a rapid and speedy downfall, might be put into execution

The following are the instructions of Lord Granville to the Right Hon. G. J. Goschen: "There are not wanting men of upright character who have shown themselves capable of a better system of government; but the Sultan has thought fit to reject their counsels, and to allow himself to be guided by an reforms, and who will complete the ruin of the Empire unless the Sultan frees himself in time from their unfortunate influence."

The above extracts should give food for reflection to those who affect to underrate the opinions and interests of foreigners, and the Representatives of Foreign Governments.

The appointment of " men of upright character, supported by the most intelligent, enlightened and liberal public opinion" of a nation to govern its affairs, is one of the highest duties which a Sovereign owes, not only to his subjects, but to the sovereigns and nations with which he holds relations. This is one of those necessary "That law is common to all nations, and if anyone o

them does not respect it in her actions she violates the common rights of the others." And he further says: States conduct themselves in a different manner from

individuals. It is not usually the caprice or blind im-petuosity of a single person that forms the resolutions and determines the measures of the public, they are car-ried on with more deliberation an circumspection." Alluding to the maxim of Cicero that-"with-

out a strict attention to the most rigid justice public affairs cannot be advantageously adminis-

"Providence occasionally bestows on the world Kings and Ministers who are impressed with this great truth. Let us not renounce the pleasing hope that these wise conductors of nations will one day be multiplied." Now rigid justice demands that wise and capable men be appointed to govern the nation. We shall close with one more quotation: "The law of Nations is the law of Sovereigns. It is principally for them and their Ministers that it ought to be written."

It will be seen that in the exercise of the high prerogative of appointing Ministers of State, attention should be paid to the obligations imposed by the laws of nations, which Hawaii comes under as one admitted to the rights of nations, and which cannot be evaded without relapsing into barbarism, and forfeiting those

The late Alexander McDuff, whose death we briefly announced last week, was an old resident and so universally known and respected for his sterling qualities that his departure from our midst calls for more than a passing notice. Born in Scotland in 1807, he at an early age enlisted in the British army and saw some active service in India. Subsequently he entered the British navy, was for several years on the West African station, and was a quartermaster with Admiral Thomas. He used to state with much satisfaction that he assisted in again hoisting the Hawaiian flag in 1843, which had been pulled down by Lord George Paulet. In 1845 he was with Fremont in California and took part in the "Bear Flag" demonstration which preceded the occupation of that country of the United States troops. He was in the mines in the early days of the gold excitement, and like many others, not realizing the great extent of the auriferous deposits and having secured a nodest share, came to Honolulu finally to reside. Here, in the various employments in which he engaged, he maintained a character for shrewd Scotch sense and sterling honesty. From 1861 up to the time of his death he held the post of keeper of the Honolulu Police Station. He was a very prominent Free Mason, having attained to the 32d degree of Ancient Masonry. He was also a member of the Order of Odd fellows, Knights of Pythias, and Red Men, deputations from all of which attended the funeral. The beautiful Masonic burial service was read at the gaave by P. M. Dayton of Lodge le Progress, No. 124, assisted by P. M. W F Allen, C. S. Bartow and D. K. Fyfe of Hawaiian Lodge No 21. Mr. McDuff leaves two daughters by a deceased

Meeting of Citizens. On Wednesday last a second meeting was convened in the Bethel Church, for the purpose of considering the " present state of public affairs." The circular calling the meeting was issued about 8 p. m. and was signed by Messrs. Cartwright, Pfluger, Atherton, Hall, Coney. Preston, Hartwell, Dole, Laine, Bishop. Jaeger, Loewenberg, Waterhouse, Hoting, Wilder, Nott, Austin, Hymen, Dillingham, Carter, Hutchinson, Berger, Thrum, Brown, Irwin, and in response a large assemblage of prominent

citizens met together at the appointed hour, 5 p. m. Judge S. L. Austin was appointed to the Chair, and B. F. Dillingham as Secretary. The Chairman said this meeting is called for the purpose of discussing public affairs. We had a Cabinet in which the community had faith and respected. His Majesty has dismissed them and chosen another Cabinet, in whom there is no confidence, and this meeting has a right to meet and discuss matters that affect us all. Tax-payers have the right to a good Cabinet, and one that other nations will respect. He felt that evil counsels had prevailed. We are not in a position to require the interference of Foreign powers. His Majesty he hoped, would see the necessity of being in accord

At this stage of the proceedings, Mr. Cartwright entered the hall and announced that Mr. C. C. Moreno had resigned the post to which he had been recently appointed, and furthermore that his half of the community, and that it be presented to His Majesty to-night. Mr. Moreno having already resignation had been accepted. (Tremendous cheering.) (Cries of long live the King.) (Three

cheers for Kalakaua.) The Chairman said that this unexpected good news almost rendered the meeting unnecessary. Mr. C. R. Bishop moved,-" That a committee be appointed to wait on His Majesty immediately, and to thank him for discharging Moreno." Carried

The Chairman appointed Messrs. Bishop, Pfluger, Cartwright, May, and Irwin. Mr. E. O. Hall said he felt relieved by the action that had already been taken. Still he was not satisfied with the rest of the Cabinet. (Hear, hear.) They were not fit people to represent the interests of this country.

The Secretary said that, before they met, they had prepared the following resolution, which still might not be out of place, even though the objectionable member had been removed, and read the following :-

" To His Majesty KALAKAUA: "Sire,—The undersigned citizens, residents of the Hawaiian Kingdom, desire to express to Your Majesty our deep sense of the critical condition of Hawaiian affairs from the recent appointment by Your Majesty of a Cabinet consisting of Hon. John E. Bush, Minister of the Interior; Mr. Celso Casar Moreno, Minister of Foreign Affairs; Rev. M. Kuses, Minister of Finance; Mr. W. C. Jones, Attorney-General.

"Regretting Your Majesty's action in appointing a Ministry which we are compelled by the dictates of self-respect and patriotism to oppose, "We respectfully beg that Your Majesty will

regard this expression of sentiment from those who have sustained Your Kingdom in the past, and are identified with its future, and to appoint as its Administrators those who can command our respect, and with whom we can co-operate.

" And your petitioners will ever pray." The petition was sent to His Majesty with the following: -- "A meeting of the citizens of Honolulu, held at the Bethel Church this 18th day of August, 1880, by a unanimous vote-

" Resolved, That the above petition to His Majesty, amended by omitting reference to Mr. Moreno, be signed by the Chairman and Secretary of that meeting, and submitted to His Majesty as the petition of the loyal citizens of Honolulu."

"S. L. Austin, Chairman.
B. F. Dillingham, Secretary."

Mr. S. N. Castle said the announcement had come to him, as apparently it did to all, like a thunder from a clear sky. During the sitting of the late Assembly, a large majority had expressed their confidence in the Ministry that was. Changes are not beneficial, and changes should be as infrequent as possible. He would be glad if the old Ministry were

back again. (Applause). To govern properly they must have the confidence of those who pay taxes, and the King should pay some attention to their wishes.

Mr. W. R. Castle said that he was only partly satisfied with the removal of the particularly objectionable personage, but deems that the work was not all yet accomplished, and he would therefore make a motion that the memorial be forwarded to

His Majesty. Mr. S. B. Dole seconded the motion said we are not rebels but intelligent people who see that the nation is in danger. What we want is a government of strength. The administration is principally carried on in the Interior Department, and it is our duty to see that there is a fit and reliable person appointed The Japanese Corvette Tsukuba, Commander

Mr. J. T. Waterhouse said he rose as a tax-payer to make a few remarks. He was of opinion that we should strive to obtain confidence abroad as well as at home. He referred to the appointment of Mr. Gladstone as the Premier of England, as the wish of the people, and not the wish of the Sovereign. He thanked God that the eyes of His Majesty had been opened. Everything was going on smoothly until this lobbyist came amongst us. He alluded to that miracle recorded in Scripture where the devil was taken out of man or woman and put into a herd of swine, as applicable to the present case. He exhorted the community to do all they could to save

Mr. A. S. Hartwell said this was the most auspicious hour that he had seen in Hawaii. This meeting was called for citizens to speak out their public minds, which they have hitherto been afraid to say. It was the best thing that could happen to His Majesty, for them to talk it out. The result of this meeting would be to strengthen His Majesty. Let us take hold with Hawaiians and assist them, and they will appreciate and reciprocate.

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

The Russian Government has again prohibited the press from publishing information in regard to armament against China.

The proposed naval demonstration by the Powers will take place simultaneously in the Adriatic and Ægean seas, off Antivari and Sa-

New Zealand has now over 1100 miles of railways, all built within about 12 years, and all narrow-gauge or 3 feet 6 inches.

At Monterey, Mexico, about 100 soldiers undertook to liberate an officer arrested for drunkenness. In the fight with the police a Captain and Major were killed, and fourteen soldiers were killed or wounded.

KEKULA (W) AND HUSBAND VS. PIQEIWA AND PAKU.

Opinion of the Court by Judd, J. This is a suit of ejectment for the possession of one undivided half of a tract of land of one hundred and seven acres in the district of Koolau, Mani, granted to one Manu by Royal Patent No. 3066, and the plaintiff claims the same as being daughter of Manc, now deceased. The detendant. Pioeiwa, is a minor, and bis guardan ad litem disclarmed all right of possession to the | Ministry.

The defendant, Paku, made no answer and was defaulted. Upon the testimony of the plaintiff, presented ex parte to the Court, it appeared that Manu had a wife, Lohelohe by name, and during his coverture with her, he cohabited with a woman named Paku, by whom he had the plaintiff Kekula. On the death of Lohelohe Manu married Paku in 1847 or 1848. It appears also that Manu had a son Moke, by his first wife, Lohelohe, who now survives, and who could be entitled to inherit from his father an interest in

The Legislature of 1866 passed an act in these words: " All children born out of wedlock, are hereby declared legitimate on the marriage of the parents with each other, and are entitled to the same rights as those born in wedlock." The question reserved for the consideration of

Court is whether Kekula is capable of inheriting from Manu. "The doctrine of the legitimation of offspring by the subsequent marseats. The usual salute from Punchbowl battery ringe of their parents is of Roman origin, introduced by Constantine, to put down that matrimonial concubinage which had become so universal in the empire, and the canonists based the law not on general views of expediency and justice, but upon a fiction, in order to reconcile the new law with established rules; for assuming that as a general rule, children are not legitimate unless born in lawful wedlock, they declared that fictione juris, the parents were married when the child was born. But the Scotch Courts have placed the rule once more where its thought to be recommended by these considerations of equity and justice, that it tends to encourage what is at first irregular and injurious to society into the honorable relation of lawful matrimony; and that it prevents those unseemly disorders in families, which are produced where the elder born children of the same parents are left under the stain of bastardy, and the younger enjoy the status of legitimacy.' We have failed to find a case where a similar act has been held to legitimate offspring of an adulterous intercourse. CHAS. C. HARRIS, A. FRANCIS JUDD, LAWRENCE MCCULLY Honolulu, July 30, 1880.

The Viceroy of India telegraphs the following report from General St. John, under date of Candahar, July 29 :- General Burrows marched from Kushki Nakute on the morning of the 27th, having heard that Ayoob Khan's advanced guard had occupied Mainwand. Three miles from the latter place the enemy's cavalry appeared, advancing from the direction of Hyderabad. The artiflery and cavalry engaged them about 9 o'clock in the morning. Shortly afterwards the whole force of the enemy appeared, formed in line of battle, with seven regiments of regulars in the center, three others in the reserve, 2000 cavalry on the right, 400 cavalry and 2000 irregular infantry on the left, and other cavalry and irregulars in reserve, and five or six batteries of guns, including one of breech loaders, the total force being 12,000. The ground was slightly undulating. The enemy were posted in the best position. Until I o'clock in the afternoon the action was confined to artillery work, which was so well sustained and directed by the enemy that our superior armament failed to compensate for the inferior number of guns. After the rifle-fire began our breech-loaders told, but the vigorous advance of the cavalry against our left, and of the Ghazis along the front caused the native infantry to fall back in confusion on the Sixty-sixth regiment, abandoning two guns. Our formation being lost, the infantry retreated slowly, in spite of the gallant efforts of General Burrows to rally them, and were cut off from the cavalry and artillery. This was at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and the camp followers and baggage were streaming towards Candahar. After a severe fight in the enclosed ground, General Burrows succeeded in extricating the infantry, and brought them into line in retreat. No efforts would turn the fugitives from the main road, which is without water at this season of the year, and thus a majority of the casualties occurred from the men falling from thirst and exhaustion. The enemy's pursuit continued to within ten miles of Candshar, but was not vigorous. The cavalry and artillery, with a few infantry, reached the banks of the river Argandale, forty miles from the scene of action, at 7 o'clock next morning, many not having tasted water since the previous morning. 





AN ACT

TO MAKE FURTHER AND BETTER PROVISIONS FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE PUBLIC IN THE DISTRICT OF HONOLULU.

Be it Enacted by the King and the Legislative Assembly of the Hawaiian Islands, in the Legislature of the Kingdom assembled :

Section 1. No dray used for the carriage of goods or freight of any description within the district of Honolulu shall, whether laden or unladen, be driven at a faster pace than a walk.

Section 2. The driver of every vehicle which shall be driven after dark within the said district of Honolulu, shall cause a sufficient light or lights to be kept burning on every such vehicle during the hours of darkness.

Section 3. Any person violating the provisions of this Act shall on conviction before the Police Justice of Honolulu, be fined in a sum not exceeding ten dollars for every such of-

#### AN ACT

TO AMEND SECTION 2 OF CHAPTER 46 OF AN ACT ENTITLED "AN ACT FOR THE PROTECTION OF PARTIES TO CONTRACTS, AUTHOR-IZED BY SECTION 1417 OF THE CIVIL CODE," APPROVED ON THE 25TH DAY OF SEPTEMBER, A.D. 1876.

Be it Enacted by the King and the Legislative Assembly of the Hawaiian Islands in the Legislature of the Kingdom assembled:

Section 1. That section 2 of the said Act be, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows :-

"Section" 2. In order to carry out the provisions of this Act the Minister of the Interior is hereby authorized to appoint an agent or agents in each elective district of this Kingdom, who shall have the power to take acknowledgments to the contracts authorized by section 1417 of the Civil Code; provided, however, that such agents shall be authorized to appoint a deputy during their temporary absence from their districts, and the deputy so appointed shall be empowered to perform all the duties of the said agents as prescribed by this Act; and provided further that nothing herein contained, shall authorize the appointment of any judge or his deputy or any store keeper to such agency.

Section 2. All laws or parts of laws in contravention herewith are hereby repealed.
