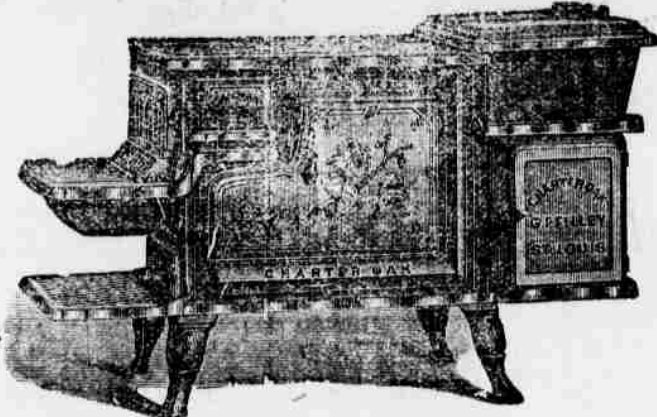

FAREWELL BANQUET.

The Myrtle Boat Club Entertains Three Departing Members at the Hamilton House.

A banquet in a rich and elaborate style was given by the Myrtle Boat Club, at the Hamilton House on Saturday evening, in honor of Mr. A. G. M. Robertson, retiring captain, and Mr. A. W. Carter, a leading stroke oar, who are about to leave for a three years' course in the Law School of the Yale University. In the send-off was also included Dr. W. T. There was a large attendance of members of the club. Two long tables ran up and down the room, set in elegant fashion, with beautiful bouquets interspersing the standing dishes. Mr. W. G. Regulations for Hacks.

By virtue of the authority vested in me by "An Act to Regulate the Carrying of Passengers and Freight, and Letting to Hire of Carriages, Wagons, Carts, Drays and other Vehicles in the District of Honolulu," I do hereby make the following New Rule in relation to standing Carriages and Hacks to be numbered Rule 12th A, viz:

12th A—Licensed Carriages in waiting at the Honolulu Depot of the Oahu Railway, shall align along the Ewa side of the southerly Grass Plat from King street to the makai sidewalk, thence along the sidewalk to the corner of the Station Building. Also, along the makai side of the Central Grass Plat facing Ewa. Also, along the north westerly Grass Plat from King street facing makai.

Daily Bulletin

Pledged to neither Sect nor Party, But established for the benefit of all. MONDAY, AUGUST 24, 1891.

The exploits of "Barefooted Bill" are growing entirely too monotonous. Perhaps if a reward were offered he might be caught. That his doings are not altogether due to lack of police vigilance, however, is proved by the fact that since the series of burglaries began, several house-breakers have been arrested. Still there seems to be one audacious hand, with one big bare foot, that has eluded all attempts to be caught.

THE WATER SCARCITY.

Honolulu is not farther away from an actual water famine than it was a month ago. Facts can be given, and may be within a day or two, showing that the supply from every visible source is away below the usual rate of consumption with irrigation restricted. A large and populous area on the plains has been without a drop of water for thirty-six hours—it will be forty-eight hours this evening unless some shall have been turned on to-day. The mountain springs from which the gravity system is fed are

steadily diminishing, with no sign of the heavy showers necessary to replenish them. Even the artesian wells are growing slack under the prolonged drought. All this time a large proportion of the Nuuanu watershed supply is being wasted, on account of the false economy under which reservoirs were constructed without water-tight lining. Pending a fuller statement of the water situation from observation and official data, we would recommend that the Government take some measures immediately for averting, if possible, the serious dearth of water that is threatened. It is bound to come, indeed, unless the supply be more rigorously husbanded or copious showers come within a month.

BEN HOGAN'S LECTURE.

Central Union Church was filled to repetition last evening, the special event which brought together the increased gathering being the occupation of the pulpit for a portion of the evening, by the ex-pugilist and sport, the reformed "Ben" Hogan. After the preliminary exercises had been completed Mr. Hogan was introduced and he, without hesitation, commenced and continued to relate the details connected with the days when he was "without the pale" of Christian living. The audience was both interested and amused at his, at times, graphic, slangy descriptions of his exploits while practicing his previous unsavory profession as fighter and gambler. Some of his expressions were truly of the type used by those who were his former associates and the depth of his past sinning was summed up by him in the expressive slang that "in anyway I could skin a sucker I would beat him."

He told of his conversion in detail and acknowledged the many rebuffs that met him while climbing the ladder to righteousness. In one instance he brought forward the hypocritical acts of those who sold themselves as converts and who only held on to the rope of righteousness while being fed and clothed by money from his hands. When his supply failed his converts disappeared. On his conversion, Mr. Hogan stated, he had given away, to his barkeepers, his elegant saloon which brought him in a revenue of \$300 per day. Soon after in the earnestness of one of his prayers he prayed that, as the law could not reach and stop the continuation of the business place formerly owned by him, then that God Almighty would intervene—and the same night the place was burned down.

The mission of Mr. Hogan was, in its inception, successful, many a familiar face being visible last evening, beneath the roof of the Central Union Church, which is but rarely seen within the walls devoted to worship. The next meeting, at which Mr. Hogan will speak, will be duly announced.

SLICER TRIAL.

The "Williams' Cane Slicer," for the Ewa Plantation Co.'s diffusion process, was practically tried at the Union Iron Works on Saturday afternoon. A large number of citizens, those interested in sugar predominating, witnessed the operation of slicing up a ton of cane. The machine was the second one built for the Ewa mill. It worked with great ease of running and scarcely any noise. Mr. R. More, superintendent of the Union Iron Works, with assistants used to sugar mill work, fed the machine. Its knives were not the ones belonging to this machine, so that the work was not quite up to the assured capacity. For a new machine, without the automatic feed it will have in the mill, it stood the test quite satisfactorily. The chips made by this slicer are much finer and more even than those made by the slicers that were imported with the first diffusion plant to the islands.

THE TRAMWAYS LINE.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The Tramways Co. have a strong gang of men at work up Nuuanu avenue, doing some repairing. It is to be hoped that the Government will see their way clear to raise the roadway, at once, the two or three feet necessary to put it on grade, and make it level, so that carriages will not have to drive with one side of the wheels two feet higher than the other. This shows sufficiently that the manager of the Tramways Co. is carrying out the assurances expressed in Mr. Paty's letter. It is to be regretted, however, that the franchise of the Tramways Co. escaped forfeiture, because one or two of the petitioners might be able to run the tramways better than any other man. 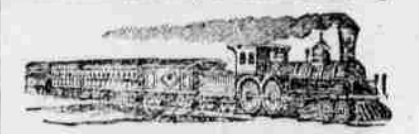

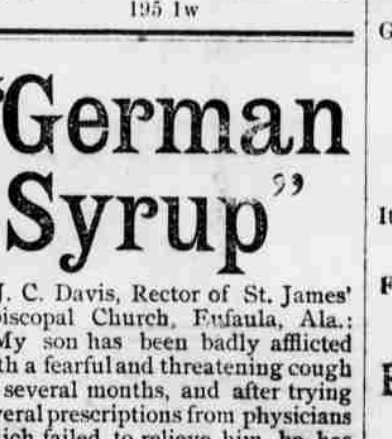
