High court ponders land case

Justices of the Commonwealth's highest court heard arguments Monday afternoon debating whether Article XII of the CNMI Constitution was either a "shield" to protect local landowners or a "sword" to punish those who attempt to subvert it by using "agents."

Attorney Theodore Mitchell, representing Leocadio Mafnas, alleged that an early 1980's land deal between his client and Antonia Villagomez and Marian

Aldan-Pierce should be vacated by the court because the money to consummate the deal was tainted.

It came from local attorneys Randy Fennell and Brian McMahon.

Mitchell said that since the two men engineered the deal - using Aldan-Pierce as a willing "agent," - and provided the money for the land purchase, they were the "principals" and retained a de-facto interest in the land.

"It's time to end this interminable litigation..."

Article XII of the CNMI Constitution prohibits ownership of land by persons of non-NMI descent and since the two men allegedly retained "control of the property," Mitchell said the deal was void and the land should be returned to his client.

Opposing attorney Don Williams disagreed, saying that the case was not an Article XII issue, but nothing more than a "commercial dispute" between Mafnas and the persons now owning the land and their subsequent leaseholders, Fennell, McMahon, and the Nansay Corporation which plans to build a hotel on the San Roque property.

Williams said that Mafnas and his attorney had taken the matter to court because "Mafnas thought he got a bad bargain..." when

he sold the property to another local who then turned around and re-leased the land to the two lawyers.

"As a matter of fact," Williams said, "Mafnas had granted lease options to them since 1980."

In effect, Williams said that Mafnas felt that he should have had a piece of the big deal, not the little deal he ended up with.

But, Williams said that even if Mafnas were able to reclaim the land he could not benefit from subsequent re-leasing rights by others.

He said that Article XII was enacted as a "shield" to help local people maintain and control their own land, not a "sword" to kill legal transactions between persons of NMI descent.

Throughout his presentation to the court consisting of Chief

Justice Jose Dela Cruz, Associate Justices Ramon Villagomez and Jesus Borja, Mitchell stressed the fact that Aldan-Pierce was used as an agent, she admitted it, and two previous courts had also agreed that the two men used her as a conduit through which to gain "control" if the land by lease.

But, he disagreed with the trial and appeals court decisions that said "Yes, it was an agency agreement - a technical violation, but since the agency relationship 'went away' when the lease was consummated, everything is OK." Mitchell's contention was that since the men initiated the deal, paid the money and received direct benefit, that they were the direct beneficiaries.

Williams argued that

Air Mike adds new flights to Taipei from Guam

Walter Freund, general manager of Continental Air Micronesia in Saipan said the airline have added flight service to new location.

On October 15, Air Mike will start to schedule direct flights from Taipei to Guam, and on Oct. 28 from Seoul to Guam four times weekly.

He said this is the airline's first time to serve these routes. He said the specific days have not been established.

Freund said the jets scheduled to make the trips are Boeing 727, economy class which can carry a total number of 164 passengers.

"This is another service to promote tourism and trade relationship between Micronesia and the Asian countries," Freund said.

He said Continental flights only make most direct calls to Guam because "it is the heart of our operations in Micronesia."

He said there is no future plans yet for Continental aircrafts to call Saipan direct from Seoul or Taipei.

Freund said he has been with the airline since 1978 and finds it very interesting and loves to find challenges and opportunities in his kind of work.

Longest water line project completed

The completion of the Chalan Kanoa-Susupe waterline project of the Commonwealth Utilities Corporation (CUC), was inaugurated Friday, July 27 during ceremonies held in front of the Susupe gymnasium.

The ceremony was attended by CNMI Governor Lorenzo De Leon Guerrero, Lt. Gov. Benjamin Manglona, and other dignitaries from the legislature and the government.

The \$1.7 million Chalan Kanoa-Susupe waterline project will provide 16 hours a day of water service to consumers.

According to the speech delivered by Gov. Guerrero, the project, which is the largest water distribution system on Saipan "replaces the previous one of rusted galvanized and cast iron pipes which either leaked or were clogged, and which often in times

of low pressure, were unsanitary."

Guerrero pointed out the new system includes over nine miles of PVC transmission and distribution lines which goes from Chalan Kanoa, to Susupe to part of Chalan pio, San Antonio and all the way to San Jose.

Guerrero added you can actually put valves in every single road intersection, meaning if there is a water leaks in any area, "we can isolate it instead of shutting off the main valve of the reservoir."

"This will allow convenient repair or maintenance," he said.

"I salute the Contractor, OCK Construction for their fine work and the CUC for its role in helping bring this project to a successful conclusion," Guerrero stressed.

Guerrero also announced the US Geological Survey is con-

Babauta: U.S. says it is 'donor nation'; NMI foreign aid nixed

Washington Resident Representative Juan N. Babauta as guest speaker during the recent meeting of the Rotary Club of Saipan discussed current issues facing the CNMI specifically the 902 talks and the re-negotiation of the Seven-year Strategic Development Plan.

Babauta informed the rotarians that the US-CNMI negotiation in the 902 talks will be held September 17 in Rota.

Covenant Section 902 negotiation include issues such as self-government, marine zone and resources, congressional authority to pass legislation affecting the internal affairs of the CNMI, federal audits of Covenant funds, immigration and third country assistance.

He commented on certain items and said the ability of the inspector general to audit several funds here in the CNMI has to do with the quest for a defining self-government.

Babauta said he is for an internal ruling body to take care of corporate affairs in the CNMI as they take their concerns on the federal government.

He added with regard to foreign assistance to CNMI "it is the position of the US government that we cannot have a government to government foreign assistance and the US is a donor nation rather than a recipient nation, and we are part of the US and therefore we cannot receive foreign assistance from foreign countries."

He said arrangements can still be made to receive funds which may come indirectly from a foreign country.

He likewise stressed that CNMI has to have an

exclusive control over the economic zone or marine resources because of an opinion in the US congress that they want to take full control over the said zone.

Babauta also cited that they would like to re-enter into

Baker visit coup for NMI

Let there be no mistake about it . . . the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands scored a 'diplomatic' coup last week with the visit of United States Secretary of State James Baker. His few hours on Saipan will pay long-term benefits.

While Baker's visit was not 'official' in the diplomatic sense - he is concerned with external relationships with other nations - the CNMI is part of the United States' political family and has been attempting to be treated on an equal par with other national entities, not a territory.

When the 'big picture' regarding the changing relationships within Asia - especially the Republic of the Philippine Islands - is considered, keeping close ties with the CNMI is important. We are 'unique' for several reasons, including the fact that we are so far away from the U.S. mainland and not a great many of the powers-that-be in Washington, D.C. know where we are, and what we are like.

Now, one of the most powerful men in President George Bush's cabinet not only knows where we are, he has first-hand knowledge about what our island looks like and some of the problems we are now facing. (Too bad the motorcade didn't go down Beach Road . . .)

With the exception of vice-president Dan Quayle, perhaps Baker is the highest-place bureaucrat in the cabinet.

Baker actually honored us by deciding to stop here instead of neighboring Guam. It lends credence to the Commonwealth's contention that we should be dealt with on a "higher" diplomatic level than a 'mere' state or Territory.

Also, Baker - in a left-handed way - snubbed Guam's repeated and strident attempts to declare their distance from the United States by wanting Commonwealth status.

The secretary saw with his own eyes as he was whisked out to the island's tourist stops that Japan's (and Korea's) influence is very strong here, not only for tourism, but also within the business community. There is no way he could have missed the hundreds of tourists, tourist buses and signs in Japanese.

Perhaps he also saw that the the United States needs the CNMI more than the CNMI needs the U.S. . . .

Law shows no 'favorites'

Once upon a time "who" someone "was" had an effect on whether the Commonwealth's laws were enforced. The recent arrests of two immigration officials on charges of dope importation knocks a few holes into that defunct practice.

It's refreshing to see that CNMI and federal law enforcement officials are not blinded by the reflected glint from fellow officers' badges when it comes to holding those who are charged with upholding the law of the land to those same laws.

Taxpayers should also realize that while hundreds of people work for the government, what those individuals do on their own "unofficial" time does not reflect their duties for the people.

A governmental agency should not be judged by an arbitrary yardstick based on the alleged wrongdoing of a few bad apples.

More donations coming for RP earthquake victims

More donations are being given by the public to the relief fund organized by the Philippine Consulate to aid the victims of the July 16 killer quake that struck the Philippines.

"The community has shown support by sending monetary donations and boxes of canned goods and used clothing to be distributed to the victims of the calamity in the Philippines. However, I am still waiting for a response from various businesses on the island who are hiring Filipino workers," Consul Julius Torres said.

Torres said that as of July 30, the Consulate has received monetary donations amounting to \$23,536.60 while 30 boxes containing used clothing, canned goods and medicine are awaiting shipment to the Philippines. Donations made through the sub-

centers have not yet been accounted for.

Torres also said that Mayor Prudencio Manglona through Sen. Edward Maratita has informed the Consulate that a similar fund drive has been organized in Rota. Tinian residents have also extended their help through a fund drive organized by former Senator Herman Manglona.

"The cash donations for the earthquake victims will either be hand-carried by a staff of the Consulate or would be sent through a special account opened by the Philippine National Bank. Donations in kind would be given to the Earthquake Management Centre which will be responsible for the distribution of goods to the quake victims," Torres said.

Torres also relayed a message from President Aquino expressing confidence that the country

will be able to rise from the ruins of brought by the powerful earthquake.

The Philippines was hit by a killer quake measuring 7.7 in the Richter scale last July 17. This has caused the Pacific Tsunami Warning Center in Honolulu to issue a warning informing NMI residents of a possible tsunami as a result of the earthquake.

Baguio, the mountain resort located 110 miles North of Manila was hardest hit by the quake which have killed almost 1,597 people.

Placed under areas of calamity are the provinces of Benguet, Pangasinan.

A cease fire has been called by both right and left wing rebel groups in the country as long as the government suspend efforts to capture them.

DPS identifies Scrap Yard, 90 days to remove junk cars

To remove eyesores such as junk cars highly visible in commercial and residential areas, the Department of Public Safety has issued a directive creating a Government Scrap Yard at the Lower Base.

DPS Police Chief Jose Castro said that the statute aims to eliminate junk cars which are not only eyesores but are also health hazards since some of the cars are used to store garbage. The Scrap Yard, which is proposed to be located at the Lower Base, will be screened by solid fencing.

The storage of the scrap metals would be handled by the Department of Public Works which may periodically put the items out to bid, for sale to scrap metal dealers, according to the statute.

Scrap metal, as defined in the statute are "all abandoned metal objects and unused or inoperable vehicles, cars, trucks, and other mobile type equipment which are inoperable or in a state of disrepair for more than 90 days."

The statute states that the DPS would provide information to the Mayor's Office as to the site where

the scrap metal would be removed. A DPS officer would be assigned on a special assignment basis to oversee its implementation. The Mayor's office would provide the necessary equipment to haul the cars free of charge.

A charge comparable to those in "tow services" would be charged by the Mayor's office to business entities, based on the statute.

According to the statute, by June 18, 1989, the owner or lessee of any property should have delivered to the government scrap

yard any scrap metal. Auto repair shops and other businesses that "retrieve parts from inoperable vehicles and equipment" should store the "junk cars" inside a building or a structure and removed from public view, based on the statute.

Anyone who fails to remove scrap metal within the specified time of 90 days, will be allowed to comply within 10 days after the notice is issued by the DPS.

Beside a \$50 a day fine, a charge of maintaining a nuisance will be filed against the owner or the les-

see of the property. Imprisonment for six months and a fine of not more than \$1,000 could be assessed to the owner upon conviction, based on the statute.

All funds received through the implementation of the statute would be established in an account established by the Director of Finance called "Third Senatorial District General Fund." The fund will be available for appropriation only by the Third Senatorial District delegation, according to the statute.

Illegal dumping increase around island

(CNS) - A survey conducted by the Division of Public Health revealed that the number of "Illegal dumping" around the

island of Saipan have increased in recent months, according to Dr. Jose L. Chong, Director, Department of Public Health and

Environmental services. Illegal dumping areas discovered during the survey run from Quartermaster Road

towards Marpi, Kagman, south towards susupe, Texas road, Chalan Kanoa, road to Fina Sisu, leading to Saipan Cultural Center, Dandan, Airport road, Koblerville, Agingan Point, San Antonio and Afeina areas.

Trash and garbage are visible along roadsides, public places, private premises, abandoned lots and "midnight dumps", thus creating unsightly and unsanitary conditions in the community and contributing to the breeding of rodents, mosquitoes, flies and cockroaches.

The Division of Public Health is requesting the general public not to dump anywhere but the Puerto Rico dump. "We must learn to love and respect our fragile island environment and form positive lifelong attitudes," said Dr. Chong. "Remember that people are the cause of pollution and therefore must seek the solution. If they don't feel

responsible for causing such a problem, they won't feel responsible for solving it".

Dr. Chong added that he will "not tolerate littering, illegal dumping and any blatant disregard to the environment." He said with active interest and support to protect the environment, the CNMI should be able to rid the island of the litter problem.

"As a community, we must be more aware of the massive task of protecting our irreplaceable and previous environmental resources, and our beautiful, natural island setting which attracts tourist by the thousands for more years to come," Dr. Chong said. "We must preserve this beautiful islands for ourselves and for future generations. We must face the challenge together now - help keep saipan and all of the CNMI healthy and beautiful.

Cheney offers Pacific leaders a tour of chemical weapon facility

HONOLULU (AP)--U.S. Defense Secretary Dick Cheney has offered to allow representatives of Pacific Nations to inspect the recently completed chemical munitions incinerator at Johnston Atoll, according to a letter obtained by the Associated Press.

Many Pacific leaders have raised concerns about the safety of the Army's plan to store and destroy chemical weapons at the facility 800 miles southwest of here. Hawaii Gov. John Wainane has said he worries the Pacific will become the dumping ground for the world's chemical munitions.

The issue is sure to be discussed at the next week's meeting of the South Pacific Forum, an organization that includes leaders of Pacific countries, including Australia and New Zealand. The annual meeting will be held in Port Vila, Vanuatu.

Cheney wrote Wednesday to Vanuatu Prime Minister Walter Lini, chairman of the South Pacific Forum, assuring him "the United States has no plan to dispose of any chemical munitions at Johnston Atoll other than those now stored there and those to be shipped from the Federal Republic of Germany."

The only exception, Cheney wrote, are mustard gas shells discovered recently in the Solomon Islands.

Cheney said he hoped that "members of the South Pacific Forum will pause in their deliberations to consider our achievements in bringing about negotiated agreements to reduce substantially existing stockpiles of chemical weapons and to prevent the proliferation of these terrible weapons elsewhere in the world."

Cheney also said he welcomes the forum's ideas on ways the U.S. government can address remaining concerns about the safety of the facility. He offered to allow representatives tour to Johnston Atoll.

The representatives would be allowed to observe and monitor the incineration facility and analyze the emission data, according to one of the two memoranda prepared for Assistant Defense Secretary Marilyn Meyers that were obtained by the Associated Press.

The U.S. weapons will add 100,000 round to the 300,000 rounds of nerve and mustard gas stored at the remote facility since 1971. The U.S. began removing the munitions from West Germany on Wednesday.

Containers containing the weapons will be put in storage on Johnston Atoll until the Army finishes testing an incinerator for them. The tests are to be completed late next year, and full scale destruction is not expected to begin until at

least 1992.

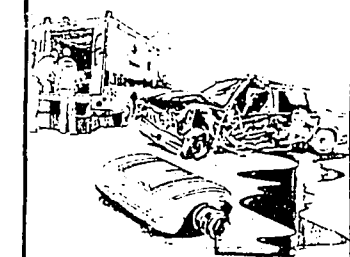
The memoranda to Meyers said the sea transport of the munitions was expected to take place within three months.

In order to ensure the security of the operation, the route of the ships will be not be disclosed, the memoranda said.

The \$240 million disposal system was built to meet a 1985 congressional requirement to destroy all U.S. chemical weapons by 1997.

The Army has said moving the weapons and destroying them at Johnston Atoll would have minimal public health, safety and environmental effects.

**Third survivor pulled out
after 14 days under rubble**

MANILA (AP)--Rescuers pulled a 27-year-old cook from the ruins of a hotel at a northern resort Monday, 14 days after the building collapsed in an earthquake, news reports said.

The latest survivor brought to three the number rescued at the hotel since Friday. Radio stations said the man, Pedrito Dee, was pulled out about 3:45 a.m. Dec told radio station DZRH that he was without food during his ordeal but drank his own urine to survive.

Dee, who was suffering from dehydration but seemed healthy otherwise, said he was among 12 people trapped in the basement with him are dead.

"I am calling for my wife and parents: I'm alive, I'm alive," Dee said in Ilocano, the dialect of the northern Luzon island.

"I'm OK." Effort to contact officials in Baguio, 130 miles north of Manila, were unsuccessful because telephone lines were down.

The July 16 earthquake measured 7.7 on the Richter scale. It left at least 1,653 people dead, 1,000 missing and presumed dead, 3,000 seriously injured and 110,000 homeless.

Foreign rescue teams in Baguio abandoned the search for more survivors more than a week ago because they said sensor instruments indicated there were no more people alive in the ruins of eight hotel which collapsed during the quake.

But Filipino crews, many of them volunteers, continued the search. There was renewed optimism after two survivors were pulled from the rubble of

the Hyatt on Friday, where they had been trapped for 11 days.

The two survivors--Luisa Mallorca, 20, and Arnel Calabia, 26 were reported in good condition and were flown Sunday from Baguio to Manila for medical treatment.

Hector Castillo, one of the rescuers, said searchers heard cries for help early Monday in the ruins. "We believe up to this time there are still some survivors," said Castillo, a miner. "We are tired, but we will continue with our efforts."

About 60 people, including 12 Americans of Filipino origin, are still believed buried beneath the Hyatt, one of the eight Baguio hotels that collapsed in the earthquake.

**Public Health begins crackdown on
aliens without physical exams**

(CNS)-The Division of Public Health will start cracking down on all aliens who are in the Commonwealth and have not yet reported to the division for their initial or yearly physical examinations as required by law.

According to Dr. Jose L. Chong, Director, Department of

Public Health and Environmental Services, those who are found in violation will be reported to the Director of the department of Commerce and Labor for possible deportation.

Dr. Chong urged those aliens who are residing in the

appointments for the required annual medical checkup. He said he does not know the number of aliens who have not been checked at CHC but emphasized the need for physical examinations.

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RP rebels ask for cease-fire to free Americans

PHILIPPINES (AP)-- Communist rebels asked for a three-day cease-fire to free U.S. Peace Corps volunteer and a Japanese aid worker held on the central island of Negros, a retired Roman Catholic bishop said Sunday.

The Rev. Antonio Fortich said he expected Timothy Swanson, 26, of Cheyenne, Wyo., and Fumio Mizuno, 36, of the Organization of Industrial, Spiritual and Cultural Advancement, to be released between Wednesday and Friday.

Fortich, who has been negotiating for their release, told reporters that the rebel request was contained in a letter received Sunday from the New People's Army.

The retired bishop said the rebels asked for a three-day cease-fire in six Negros towns to give them time to come down from mountain strongholds, release the pair and then return to the hills.

Fortich aid military commanders on Negros were willing to allow the arrangement.

But he said the letter also contained demands. He refused to elaborate but said they did not include ransom.

"We are now preparing everything that they are demanding," Fortich told reporters. He said Swanson would probably be freed in Silay, about 10 miles north of Bacolod, and Mizuno in Murcia, about 10 miles to the southeast.

Bacolod is about 300 miles southeast of Manila. Mizuno was abducted May 29 and Swanson was kidnapped June 13. The United States closed down Peace Corps operations in the Philippines last month because of reported rebel threats against volunteers.

But the U.S. Embassy only learned about the kidnapping nearly two weeks later, when they tried to contact him about the Peace Corps evacuation.

Swanson's Filipino wife said she had been told not to report that her husband was missing and did so only after he and the more than 200 volunteers were ordered home.

The New People's Army, the armed wing of the outlawed Communist Party of the Philippines, has been waging a 21-year insurgency to establish a Marxist state in the Philippines.

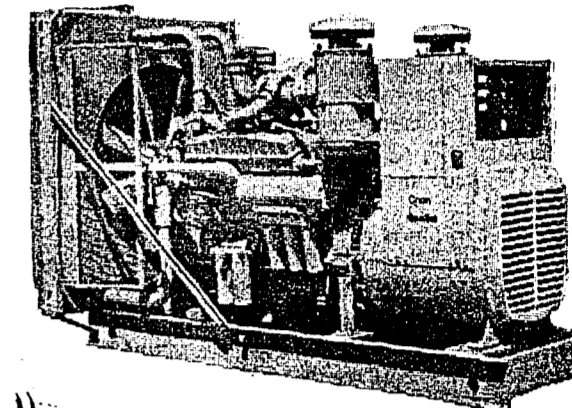

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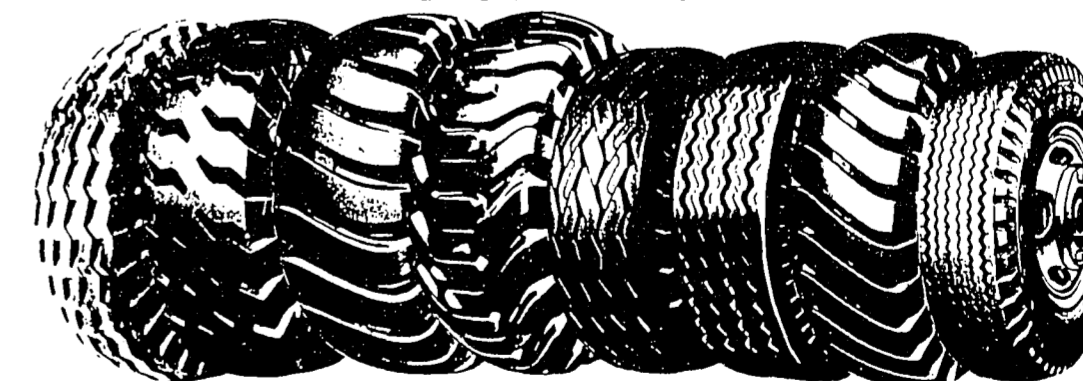

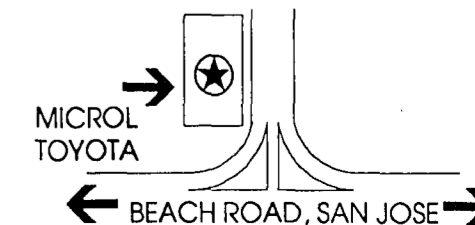

Injuries caused by line or leaders are not considered disqualifying injuries, he said.

However, all fish mutilations must be fully explained to tournament officials, he said.

Participants are required to submit their daily catch for re-

ording which must be certified by an authorized weighmaster, Cepeda said.

Weighing hours are: 8 a.m.; 1 a.m.; 6 p.m. on Saturday and 8 a.m.; 1 p.m., and 5 p.m. on Sunday at the designated fishing areas Ponia Point, As Matmos and Liyop cliff below Pau-Pau Hotel.

The final decision of any discrepancy during the derby will be determined by the tournament officials, Cepeda said.

is basically a fun activity for crusty old salts and wenches included a treasure hunt with a surprise prize at the final destination was organized by Captain Dan of PIC.

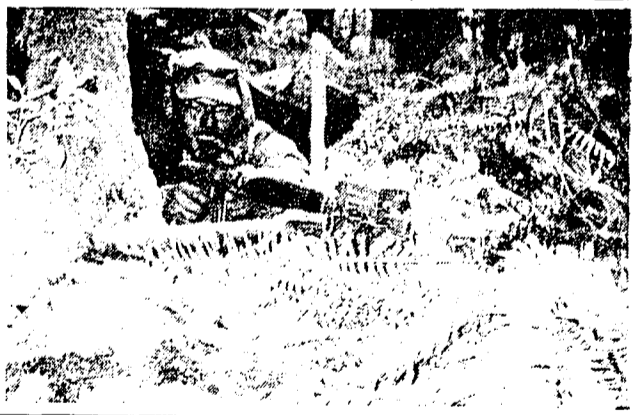
"Actually, there was a light wind which made the competition boring," said CNMI sports coordinator Bill Sakovich, who was also one of the 30 participants.
