

Manahane faces 4 drug charges

THREE more charges were filed against Ramon Luis Manahane yesterday, all in connection with his arrest Wednesday for alleged possession of crystal methamphetamine or "ice," this was learned in court yesterday.

At the same time, Superior Court Judge Marty Taylor increased bail for Manahane's temporary release to \$250,000 in cash or property, from the \$75,000 cash or \$150,000 property bond set following his arrest.

Manahane, a resident of Susupe, was arrested at the Saipan International Airport before he could leave with his wife, Benadita, on a flight to Guam. His wife was able to leave Saipan.

During Manahane's court appearance yesterday Assistant Attorney General Russell Marsh said Mrs. Manahane was arrested by authorities in Guam for alleged possession of four grams of ice and was being held on a \$10,000 bail.

Upon learning of Mrs. Manahane's arrest, Marsh filed additional charges against her husband, in addition to possession of ice.

Manahane is now charged with the following:

- Conspiracy to deliver controlled substance;
- Possession with intent to deliver controlled substance; and
- Delivery of controlled substance.

Preliminary hearing was set on July 29.

In another case, Taylor denied a request by Cody Young, who is facing forgery and theft charges, to go to Guam to take care of some "assets."

Public Defender Daniel DeRienzo, who took over Young's defense following the latter's failure to raise money for a private lawyer, said the accused, a former disc jockey, was jobless.

Taylor rejected the request because of Young's failure to return to Saipan on time when he was first allowed to go off island.

He will be tried on Oct. 12. Also in Taylor's court, Kevin

worth of gasoline from F and B service station on July 21.

He was also ordered to pay for the fuel. (NL)

Budget dispute continues

THE SENATE and the House of Representatives have remained divided on the budget for fiscal year 1993, mainly because of disagreement over how much of the available lapsed funds for each of the three major islands should be used for operations.

According to Sen. Edward U. Maratita, a member of the joint conference committee on the budget, the Senate might stand pat on its decision not to allow a provision that would use half of the total lapsed funding realized in the previous fiscal year to retire the government's \$7 million defi-

cit.

The House conferees has proposed that half of some \$3.2 million in total lapsed funds for Saipan, Rota and Tinian be used to cure the deficit.

This was opposed by Maratita, saying Rota and Tinian had been under-budgeted for the last three fiscal years.

"If you look at the budget, there is no CIP money for Rota and Tinian. So if we let the House take away half of some \$1 million in lapsed funds for Rota, for example, that would greatly affect our operations for the current fis-

cal year," he said Maratita in an interview yesterday.

"If the House would insist to have it their way in this aspect of the budget, I'd rather that we have no budget for this year, he said."

House Bill 8-226, which appropriates a total of \$159.16 million for government activities and the salaries, was sent to conference after the two houses disagreed on several provisions.

The House and the Senate conferees agreed Friday not to fund an additional 60 full time employees, 20 each for the three is-

Calvo criticizes candidate selection

FORMER Senate President Julian Calvo expressed disappointment yesterday over the manner the Rota Republican Party chose its candidates for the November elections.

Calvo criticized the candidates' fees which he said were meant to discourage potential candidates from pursuing the mayorship and other elective posts "so the preferred candidates will get the official endorsement."

"There was no official meeting to gather those who declared their intention to run. The credentials committee also set up very stringent standards to follow, like the \$30,000 candidate's fee for mayor and the listing of at least 100 signatures for one to get considered by the credentials commit-

tee," he said in an interview.

Calvo, earlier announced his intention to run for mayor under the Republican Party.

Senator Joseph S. Inos opted to run under the Democratic party banner.

The Rota Republican Party chose Vincent Manglona as its official candidate for mayor.

Calvo said he originally proposed to party officials that a forum be established first to appoint a party chairman to replace incumbent Chairman Joaquin Atalga, who decided to join the race for one of Rota's Senate seats. He said this was not done.

Calvo said he also insisted that a primary be held since he noticed there were more than one party

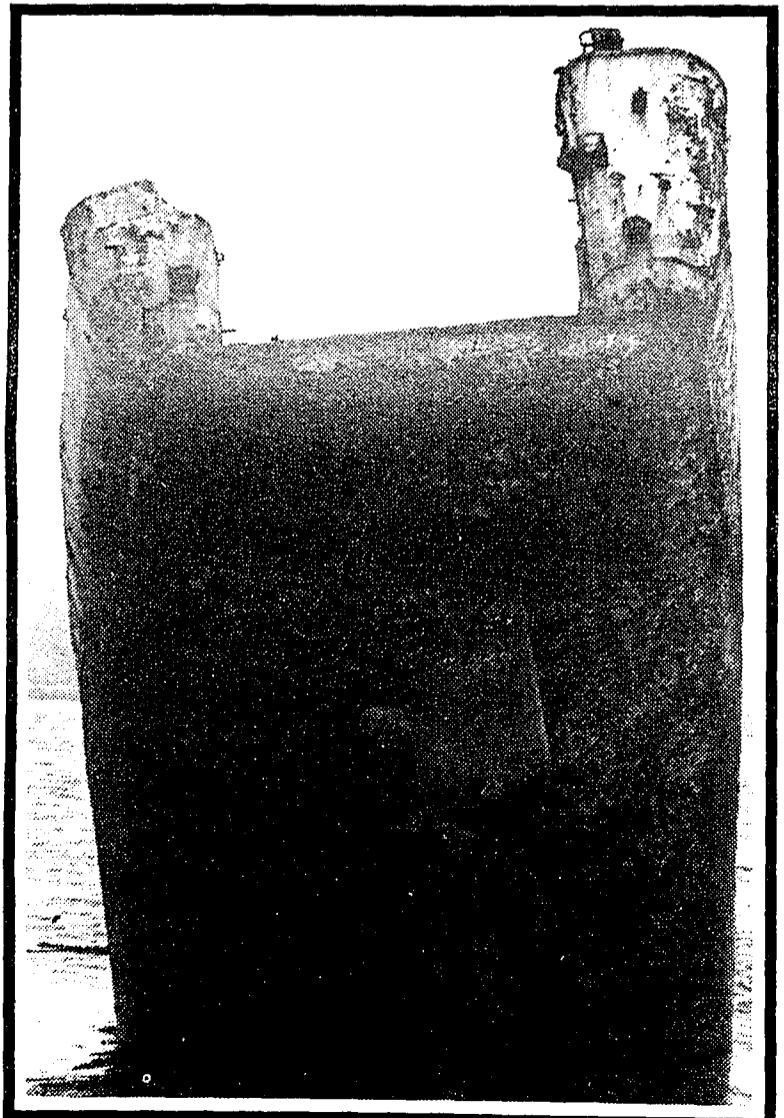
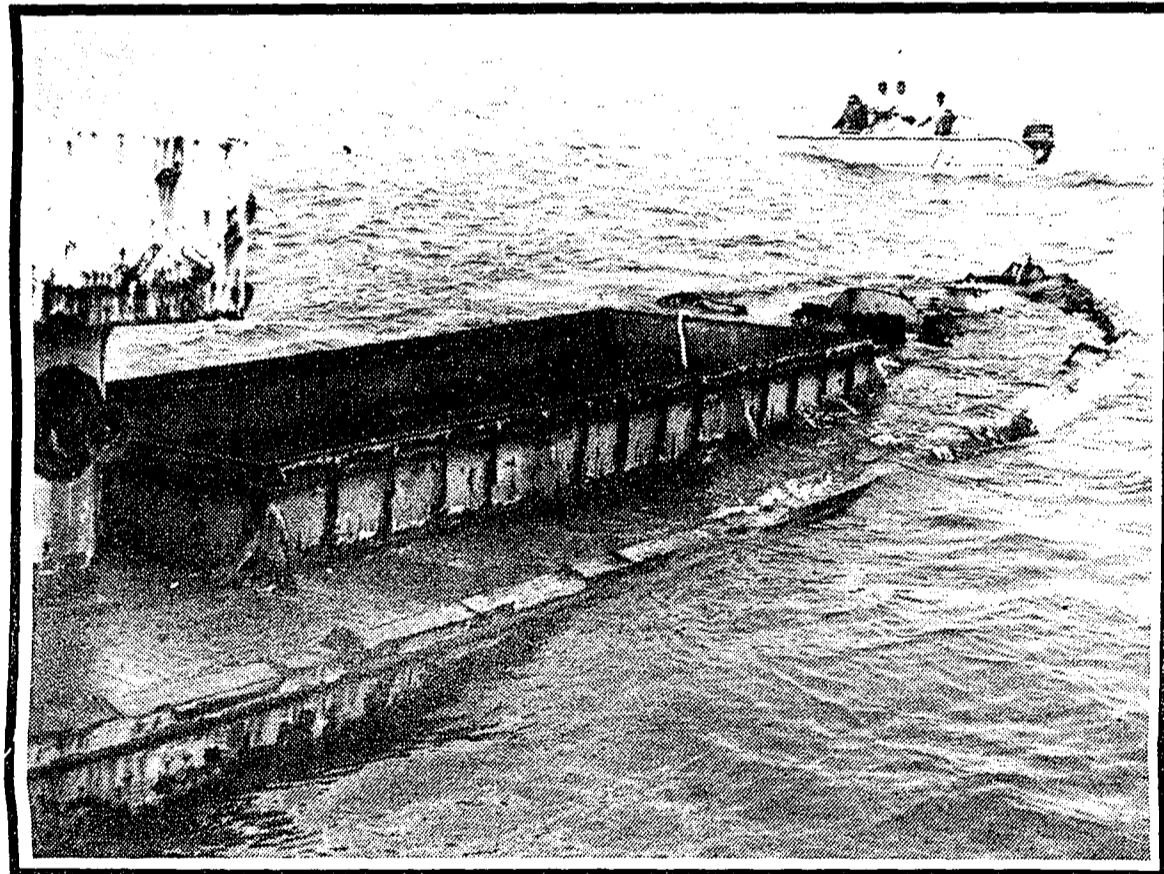
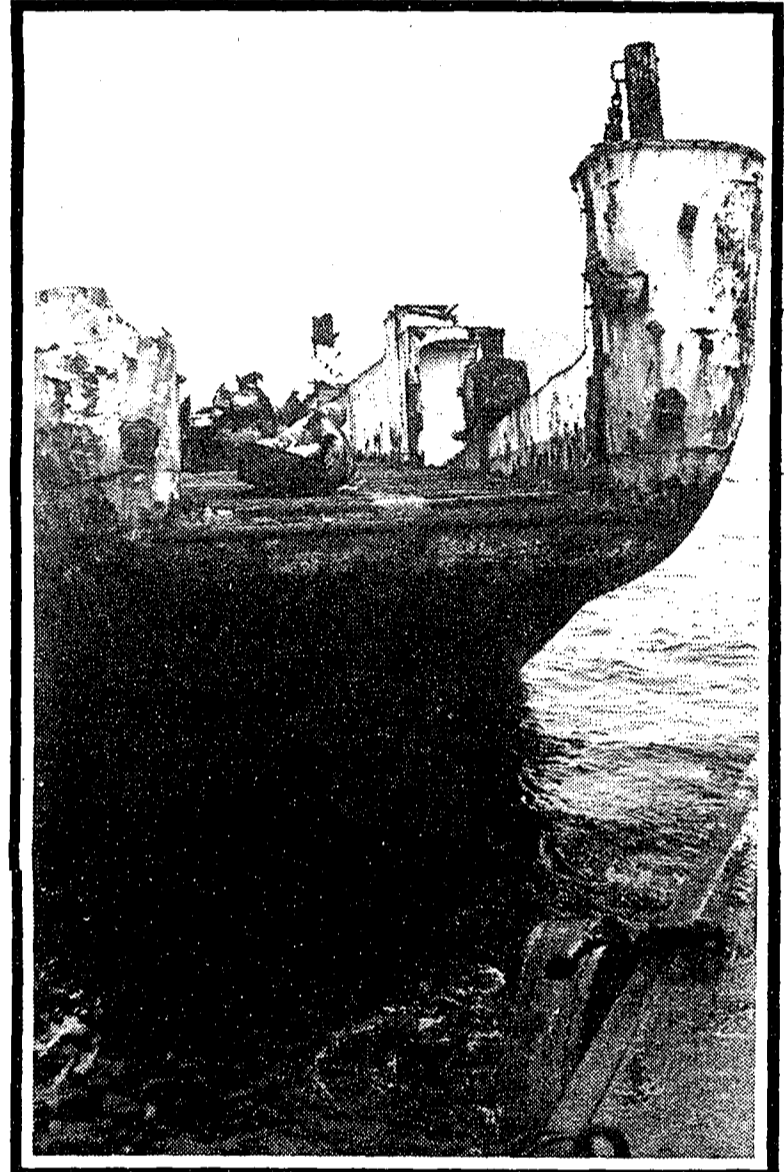
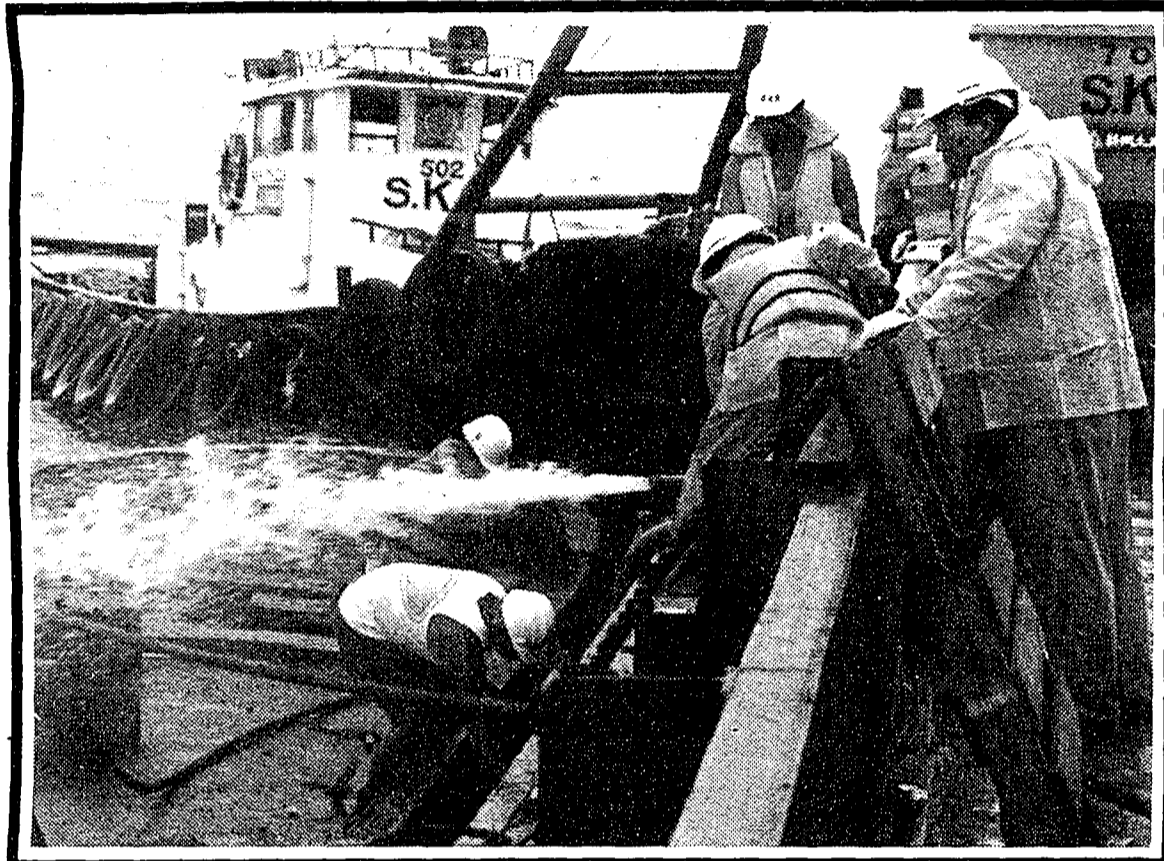
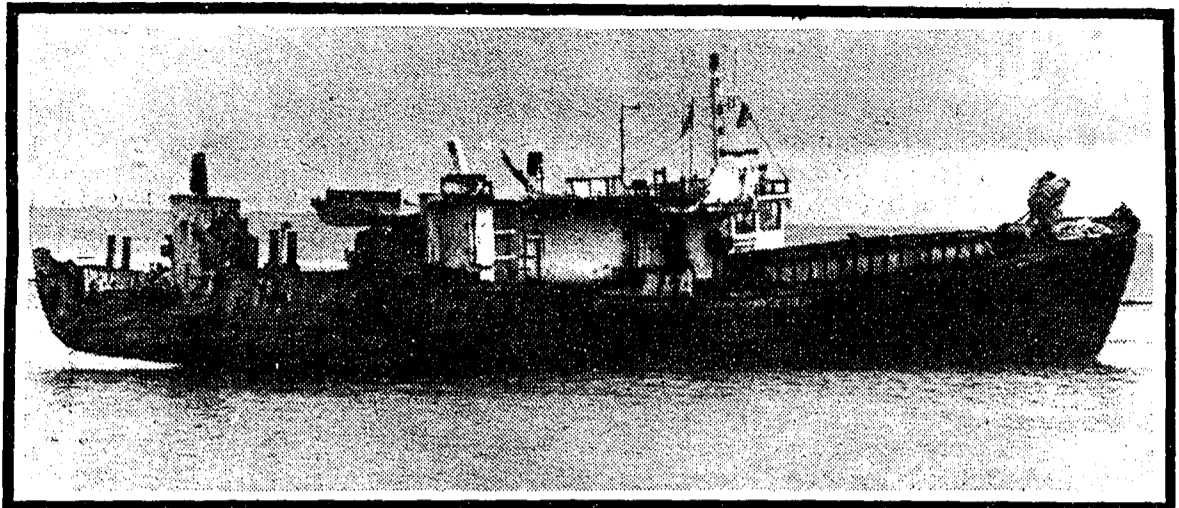

Burial at sea

THE MEN from Samsung Engineering and Construction Co., World-wide Salvage and Shin Kang America did their tasks as skillfully as they could. No emotions were visible except the feeling of accomplishing their assignment.

Yet the cloudy skies and the choppy water, which later became crystal clear on the surface and a very deep blue beneath provides, at least to the media representatives who witnessed the sinking of the Sagman Saturday, a feeling that a funeral was going on.

The men clapped when the rusty ship, devoid of all the equipment and furnishings that it once had, sunk to the bottom of the Philippine Sea, yet the captains of the two tugboats which took the old ship to its burial place were quiet, perhaps in sympathy. (NL)

Hearing on human rights bill set

THE BILL to establish a human rights commission looking at the basic legal rights of all persons in the Commonwealth will be the subject of an August 6 public hearing to be conducted by the House Committee on Health, Education and Welfare, Subcommittee on Education.

House Bill 8-193 was requested by Governor Lorenzo I. Guerrero due to growing congressional concerns about the conditions of foreign workers in the CNMI.

It seeks to outlaw racial, religious, sexual and forms of discrimination.

The creation of a human rights commission is also expected to ease congressional worry over the alien labor situation here, espe-

cially after a New York Times article revived talk about "slave labor conditions" in Saipan's garment factories.

"We plan to look at every angle and concern raised in the bill, but we will not allow that the bill be railroaded into passage just because Congress tells us to do so. We see a lot of room for improvement," said Rep. Herman T. Guerrero, who chairs the subcommittee.

In an interview, Guerrero cited some people who said there might not be a need for the bill.

Guerrero said he was soliciting input from the different community, ethnic and cause-oriented groups to come up with a widely-accepted bill.

"We certainly feel that we need a

forum where we could hear the objections and the good points of the bill. This is something that needs to be seriously looked at. It is ridiculous to have it passed first and

final reading as suggested by the governor's office," he said.

Among those invited to the hearing were representatives from Karidat, Saipan Chamber of Com-

merce, the Filipino, Korean, Japanese groups, Criminal Justice Planning Agency and Developmental Disabilities Planning Office. (RHA)

lands due to austerity considerations.

Going into the final details of the budget Saturday, however, complications arose with regards to how the previous budget deficit should be cured.

Maratita said that due to the possible collapse of the budget conference talks, he might change his position on the 20 additional FTEs for each island, among other moves.


"Maybe we would have to restore the highway fund that we deleted or put the \$1.2 million appropriation for the damages


wrought by Typhoons Brian, Omar and Gay on the island of Rota. We would not want the tradeoff always to be against us," he said.

Senator Jesus R. Sablan, who chairs the Senate conferees, declined to make any comment.

House conferees chairman Pete P. Reyes could not be reached for comment as of yesterday afternoon.

Early yesterday morning, Lt. Governor Benjamin T. Manglona urged both houses to act with dispatch on the budget. (RHA)

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Flores proposes lewd show ban

A BILL to prohibit lewd shows and entertainment featuring nude night club dancers is expected to be introduced soon by Representative Francisco A. Flores.

"I feel it is about time that we do something to protect our people, especially our youth from getting lured into such kind of entertainment. True, allowing this may mean good business for our night-clubs and perhaps more revenue for our government. But this is putting a dent on the moral fibers of our society," Flores said in an interview yesterday.

Flores said he found it odd that a predominantly Catholic community like the CNMI permitted such kinds of entertainment.

He said almost all night clubs which offer shows and exotic

dancing feature totally nude women as main attraction.

He said his bill would ban all such entertainment.

"I have always believed that such kind of shows corrodes traditional family life, and is taking a toll on the islands' morals. This practice should not be condoned any longer. I am compelled to take an action that may be unpopular for some but would definitely restore decency in the night time industry," Flores said.

The bill defines the prohibited exotic dancing as any performance during which sexual organs or any part thereof, or nipples of female breasts are exposed intentionally.

Under the bill violators will guilty of a misdemeanor punish-

able with imprisonment of not more 30 days, a fine of not more than \$500 or both.

Dances recognized by the Department of Community and Cultural Affairs to be of cultural or historic significance are not to be included in such a ban, Flores said. (RHA)

member interested in running for mayor. Such did not happen.

"Being a candidate, I was waiting that I be called in to participate in the nomination process. All I got was a letter indicating acceptance of my letter of intent. Afterwards, I just heard they have settled on Vincent as candidate for mayor," Calvo said.

"I feel I and the people of Rota were cheated because the party just narrowed down their choice by their own liking. There was no organized selection process just because some of the candidates

were not affluent enough to afford the high fees imposed by the party," he said.

Party sources in Rota said candidates for mayor had to turn in \$30,000 and senators \$20,000. The amount for House aspirants was not given. The candidates fee represents the candidate's contribution to the party's campaign sorties and propaganda, including the cost of food during rallies and pocket meetings.

According to Calvo, the amount was suspiciously high and that it may be one way to discourage

other members from running against those "preferred" candidates.

"I have been with the party and intend to stay with the party. But I feel what they did is not in the best interest of the party. Was it because I am a straight guy who will not tolerate personal interests from being entertained? I don't know," he said.

Asked whether he will still support the party in the elections or run independent, Calvo said he would still have to evaluate his options. (RHA)

China agrees to look at nuclear test ban

SINGAPORE (AP) - China on Sunday said it would give "positive consideration" to President Clinton's plea for a worldwide suspension of nuclear weapons testing, a senior US official said.

It was the first indication that China might accept the 15-month testing moratorium imposed by Clinton on July 3. Russia, France and Britain have agreed to the moratorium. China, the world's only other declared nuclear power, has not yet announced whether it will go along.

China's Foreign Minister Qian Qichen also promised visiting US Secretary of State Warren Christopher that his government was ready to consult with the United States on a proposal to ban all nuclear tests by Sept. 30, 1996, said the official who briefed reporters on condition of anonymity.

China's conciliatory messages were contained in a letter to Clinton from China's President Jiang Zemin.

Qian handed the letter to Christopher.

"China advocates the realization of a comprehensive testing ban in the context of a complete prohibition and thorough destruction of nuclear weapons," said Qian's spokesman Wu Jianmin.

For now, Wu told reporters, China was pledging not to be the first to use nuclear weapons and not to use them against non-nuclear states.

A high-level US delegation is to arrive in Beijing on Monday to discuss the ban on testing nuclear weapons and evidence that China has shipped missiles and missile technology to Pakistan.

The United States has threatened to impose sanctions on China if it determines that the Chinese are violating a pact that bans transfers of missiles with a range of more than 300 kilometers (185 miles) and a payload of more than 500 kilograms (300 pounds).

China says the missiles it sold to Pakistan are not in violation of the pact.

Beijing scraps fees to head off unrest

BEIJING (AP) - To head off unrest in China's huge countryside, the government has ordered officials to scrap dozens of fees and quotas that have incensed peasants, official media reported Sunday.

A circular issued by the ruling Communist Party and the Cabinet on Thursday is the latest sign of alarm among the leadership about anger among the peasantry, which accounts for about 80 percent of China's nearly 1.2 billion people.

Under the order, central government agencies are banned from collecting money for 37 kinds of activities, from rodent eradication to movie screening to water improvement.

Local officials are forbidden to demand money for 43 kinds of projects, from improving public toilets to building police stations.

The sheer scope of the fundraising activity now banned indicates how badly peasants have been squeezed by officials - there seems to be a charge for just about every public service imaginable.

"Reducing the peasant's bur-

den is not only an economic question, but a political question," reads the circular, which appeared on the front page of the nation's leading newspaper, the People's Daily, and was the lead item on the national evening television news.

"It has a bearing on the development of the national economy as well as political stability in the villages, even the whole nation."

Rural anger began to boil in the winter when officials in parts of the country ran out of money to pay peasants for crops contracted to the state.

There already have been several reports this year of violence by peasants fed up with arbitrary fees and taxes. In one of the most serious incidents, farmers in the southwestern province of Sichuan stoned police and burned vehicles in May to protest forced donations for road construction. Because villages have few other sources of revenue, most levy fees for services that come free in cities: security, water, public health, road paving. Add funds sought by the central government and the "management fees" that seem to go straight into the pockets of offi-

cials, and a peasant may pay as much as one-third of his income.

The central government already has ordered local officials to keep total assessments below 5 percent of peasant incomes.

The directive issued last week makes clear which fees must be jettisoned and which can be maintained - it's OK, for example, for police to charge a fee for issuing resident identification cards. Another 17 fees must be revised, such as those for marriage registration and road repair.

It also forbids officials from confiscating grain, livestock or furniture as part of fund-raising activities, and bans forcible deductions from state purchases of crops. Peasants also cannot be forced to take out loans to pay their share of fees.

The circular says the government next month will inspect progress made in reducing the peasants' financial burdens, and it threatened officials who don't follow orders with dismissal.

Still, there has been skepticism in the countryside over the government efforts, with some peasants convinced local officials will do as they please.

Northwest union votes on \$886M bailout package

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) - The mechanics and others who keep Northwest Airlines' planes in the air now may hold the key to the airline's solvency on the ground as well.

The International Association of Machinists, Northwest's largest and most mercurial union, votes Monday on an \$886 million concessions-for-equity package aimed at keeping the carrier out of bankruptcy. Results are expected Wednesday.

Rank-and-file Machinists have already rejected one concessions package, and some say the latest proposal isn't much better. But union leaders warn that the alternative - bankruptcy and the threat of the airline's liquidation - could be worse for the mechanics, baggage handlers, clerks and ticket agents who make up the 23,000-member union.

"Our backs are against the wall. But what do you do? You're damned if you do, damned if you don't," lamented one shop steward who said he would vote against the deal.

The package, seen as the key to keeping the nation's fourth-largest airline afloat for the next three years, is being closely watched throughout the industry. Giving employ-

ees equity stakes in exchange for wage and benefit concessions could help troubled, higher-cost carriers return to profitability. Deals similar to the one between Northwest and its unions are under discussion at United Airlines and TWA.

The Clinton administration is anxious to see the Northwest plan succeed because it's feared another airline bankruptcy could destabilize the industry.

The deal already has passed muster with Northwest's pilots, who are represented by the Air Line Pilots Association, and a smaller union representing meteorologists.

The 8,000 flight attendants represented by the International Brotherhood of Teamsters have received ballots and are expected to approve the deal. Two smaller unions will tally results on Wednesday.

But the machinists, who forced a new round of talks by torpedoing a similar version of the package last month, are a wild card. Tensions on the shop floor have run high.

Many machinists are angry about management ultimatums, another year without a raise and being cast as potential spoilers if the deal is shot down.

"We haven't been given a chance to explain our side," said the shop steward.

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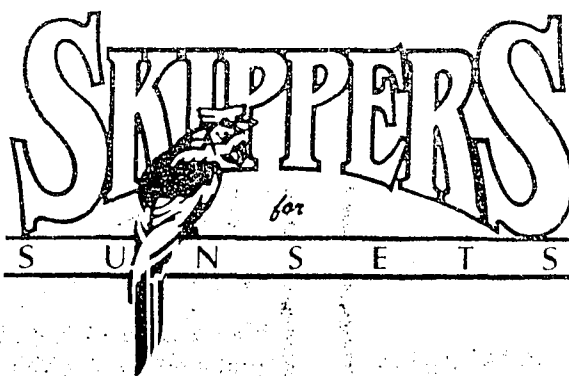
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Indian subcontinent: Home to child slaves

NEW DELHI, India (AP) - On the parched plains of India, children as young as 4 work at looms for up to 15 hours without a break, weaving carpets for the rich.

In Pakistan and Bangladesh, small boys are sold as jockeys for camel races in Saudi Arabia. In Sri Lanka, at least 10,000 boy prostitutes work the beaches, offering themselves to Western male tourists.

Across the Indian subcontinent, home to one-fifth of humanity, millions of children live in virtual slavery, toiling for little or no pay in fields, factories, mines and stone quarries, or as domestic help.

Child labor is part of a feudal system embedded in South Asia's history, but pressures against it are rising. Welfare organizations have forced governments to acknowledge the problem. The United States and Germany threaten to boycott products made by children.

In societies where poverty is endemic, however, the issue is colored by the constant struggle with hunger. Critics say child la-

bor perpetuates poverty, illiteracy, adult unemployment and overpopulation, but many people point out that not working can mean not eating.

To earn the equivalent of dhs 1 a day, Mohammad Sohrab, 8, carries heavy loads of fish, rice and vegetables from the market to shoppers' homes in Dhaka, capital of Bangladesh.

"My mother is ill, my father is dead," said Sohrab, who lives in a slum with four younger brothers and sisters. "The family will starve if I don't work."

"I hate to work," he added. "I want to play like other children." Bangladesh, an overcrowded land of 110 million people, has an estimated 4 million child laborers.

Sohrab's work is less exploitative than other jobs, such as prostitution, where young boys and girls are in growing demand.

Sujith Fernando was 8 years old when he met a German on a beach in Negombo, Sri Lanka, and became his lover for a price.

The German visits Sri Lanka three times a year to be with Sujith, who is now 19. He gives the young

6-year-olds work in glass factories

FIROZABAD, India (AP) - Orange fires glow through the doors of huge furnaces, spilling stifling heat into the gloom of smoke and dust.

Barefoot workers hurry across a floor littered with glass shards, carrying lumps of molten glass stuck to metal poles.

Many of the workers are children as young as 6.

Firozabad, a dusty town south of New Delhi not far from the Taj Mahal, is the center of India's glass industry. Its factories, with annual sales of about \$16 million, make dinnerware, lamps and bangles, the brightly colored arm bracelets worn by many Indian women.

With 50,000 children working in 300 factories, Firozabad is a microcosm of the child servitude rampant on the Indian subcontinent. For many youngsters, childhood does not mean school and games, but long hours of labor.

In India, where the annual per capita income is the equivalent of \$360, nearly one in three people

Man prepares for 28th wedding

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - It's a match made in the Guinness Book of Records.

The world's most married man celebrated his 85th birthday Sunday by preparing for his next wedding - to the world's most married woman. Glynn "Scotty" Wolfe plans to unite in wedlock with Linda Lou Essex, 53, of Anderson, as soon as she can fly to his home in Blythe, Calif. Wolfe has been married 27 times, and Essex is a veteran of 22 marriages.

Both are listed in the record book as having the most monogamous marriages. However, Wolfe also is listed as having died in 1991. "That was a surprise that I'm supposed to have passed away," Wolfe said Sunday. But he added, "I've been in heaven all the time."

Wolfe met Essex four years ago on a television talk show featuring Joan Rivers. Another TV show, "A Current Affair," took the couple to Las Vegas 1 1/2 years ago, hoping to get them paired up there.

But at that time, Wolfe's divorce from wife No. 27 wasn't final. So Wolfe said he gave Essex a diamond engagement ring to add to her collection, and made plans to marry her soon after she moves to California next month.

Essex said she doesn't "give a hoot about the umpteen thousands of dollars" the couple might get from public appearances as the world's most married couple.

"It's a big decision and a lot of responsibility," she said, adding that it would be difficult to leave her seven children and 17 grandchildren in Indiana.

Bogart hairpiece fetches \$500

NATCHEZ, Miss. (AP) - A toupee Humphrey Bogart wore while filming "The African Queen," "The Barefoot Contessa" and "Sabrina" fetched dhs 500 at auction.

The hairpiece was the centerpiece of a memorabilia sale Saturday by Verita Thompson, who told of being Bogart's mistress for 15 years in her book "Bogey and Me."

Thompson said she collected the memorabilia - including movie posters and furniture - during her affair and was selling the items to clean house before she moved.

The toupee had been valued at \$2,000 or more before the auction, but only one person bid. Harris McGraw, an employee of McCool Auctions, said he bid for an unnamed Jackson physician, who McGraw said was a Bogart fan.

As many as 130 people endured temperatures in the mid-90s Fahrenheit (mid-30s C) for the auction. The heat may have helped keep some bidders away, keeping most prices below expectations, said Larry McCool, owner of the auction company.

Bogart's other film credits include "Casablanca" and "The Maltese Falcon." He died in 1957.

Navratilova and lesbianism

NEW YORK (AP) - Martina Navratilova says she could have made more money as a tennis player if she hadn't been open about being a lesbian.

"My sexuality definitely has cost me a lot of money, but that's OK with me. I'd rather be who I am and make less," she said on the Sunday edition of ABC television's "Good Morning America."

"I certainly can't complain. I've made more than my share of money playing tennis."

The world's fourth-ranked women's tennis player also denied rumors that she plans to retire from singles play at the end of this year.

earns too little to eat more than once a day.

"I like to work because I get money," said Gul Sher, an 8-year-old who earns 35 rupees (about \$1) for a 9-hour day. "I don't want to go to school because the teachers can't give me any money."

Closer questioning revealed that his father was unemployed and spent what little money he could get on drink. Gul Sher has two younger brothers, a sister and mother to support.

A bellowing foreman does not allow Gul Sher or any of the 30 other children and 60 adults in the factory to rest. The children eat lunch as they carry their glowing loads to adult artisans, who are paid 90 to 300 rupees a day.

Even with only half the ovens working, the temperature is 120 degrees Fahrenheit (49 degrees C).

man 50 German marks (\$33) a month and gifts, including a motorcycle, TV and video player. The average Sri Lankan laborer earns about \$20 a month.

According to a UNESCO report, 10,000 boy prostitutes roam the beaches of Sri Lanka. Negombo, just north of the capital, Colombo, is advertised in European magazines for homosexuals as a "gay paradise." The government estimates 30,000 Sri Lankan children work as prostitutes, most of them boys.

India has the most working children of any country - 17 million, by government estimate, in a nation of 875 million. The Center of Concern for Child Labor in New Delhi puts the figure at about 45 million by comparing school enrollments and the number of

school-age children.

Millions of children work as bonded laborers for no pay, either because their parents sold them or because they were tricked.

About 300,000 children work on carpet looms in the Bhadohi and Mirzapur districts in northern India, sitting in cramped rooms for up to 15 hours a day to earn five rupees (15 cents).

They inhale wool fluff. It gets into their ears. Many children say loom owners hang them upside down and beat them with tree branches as punishment for mistakes.

In Firozabad, about 50,000 children aged 6 to 16 work nine hours a day in glass factories near fiery furnaces. The air is heavy with smoke and dust. The children walk in bare feet on floors strewn with broken glass.

"We are not allowed to go to urinals or even allowed a break for lunch," said Chander Prakash, 10,

who dropped out of school and began working early this year to help pay a family debt.

Like other youngsters in the glass factories, Chander is paid 35 rupees (\$1) a day. Most adults get 90 rupees.

Factories producing matches, fireworks, brass locks, leather and cut gems also are notorious for employing children.

All countries of South Asia have laws against child labor, but enforcement is lax. In India and Sri Lanka, the ban does not cover agriculture, where government figures indicate 75 percent of working children are found.

In Pakistan, hundreds of children between 4 and 8 are sent to Arab nations and sold to wealthy sheiks as camel jockeys, according to the Human Rights Commission in Islamabad, the capital.

Children are used as jockeys because they are light and their shrieks of terror are thought to frighten the

camels into running faster.

Liaquat, 10, worked as a jockey for five years, returning home in August 1992 after he lost an eye in an accident.

"The race had just started when my strap broke and I fell," he said. "When I came to in a hospital a month later, my left eye was permanently damaged."

Shehzad Piras, 8, who spent a year in the United Arab Emirates, said: "We were given bad food and often beaten up if we did anything against their wishes."

Human rights groups estimate more than 8 million children work in Pakistan, a nation of 105 million, said Hussein Naqi of the Human Rights Commission.

Kailash Satyarthi, chairman of the South Asian Coalition on Child Servitude, says awareness of child labor is increasing. The International Labor Organization allocated \$2.25 million this year as part of a program to fight it in India.

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LDP still looking for new leader

TOKYO (AP) - Just days before the Liberal Democratic Party is to elect its new leader, there isn't a strong candidate in sight - and that could spell trouble for the scandal-plagued party's bid to keep power.

In elections July 18, the Liberal Democrats fell short of a majority in Parliament's more powerful lower house for the first time since 1955, meaning their hold on government will end unless other parties agree to join them in a coalition.

But seven opposition parties,

which together have the votes to oust the Liberal Democrats, agreed in principle Saturday on their own coalition.

The LDP plans to vote Friday on a replacement for its outgoing president, Prime Minister Kiichi Miyazawa, who resigned over the election setback.

The new LDP leader will become the party's candidate for prime minister when Parliament meets, probably in the first week of August.

Although many LDP legislators agree that a reformist who can attract support from other parties should be chosen to lead

the Liberal Democrats, no such candidate had stepped forward as of Sunday, three days before Wednesday's filing deadline.

Justice Minister Masaharu Gotoda, 78, mentioned as a reformist candidate, said Sunday the chances of his running are "zero" because "it's not proper for an elderly person like me to be on center stage."

The only declared candidate is Michio Watanabe, 69, a former foreign minister and leader of a major faction of LDP legislators. But many younger legislators feel that the faction leaders symbolize the corrupt image that the party is

trying to overcome.

In what would have been an unthinkable move just a few years ago, one legislator in Watanabe's faction, Shokei Arai, 45, bluntly told Watanabe that he planned to support someone younger - then announced his decision in a television interview.

Among the younger candidates being mentioned are former Finance Minister Ryutaro Hashimoto, 55; Chief Cabinet Secretary Yohei Kono, 56; and Seiichi Ota, 47, who heads a group of 40 junior legislators. But Hashimoto has ties to scandal-linked politicians, and the others

lack a strong base of support.

While some basic policy differences exist among the opposition parties, they are seen as agreeing on one key point.

"These parties have said their goal is to overthrow the LDP's one-party rule, so unless there's some really good justification, it's difficult to see how they would join with our party," said a former LDP Cabinet minister, Shigeru Kasuya, on another television program.

Others in the LDP still hope to win over the Japan New Party and the Sakigake (Pioneer) New Party.

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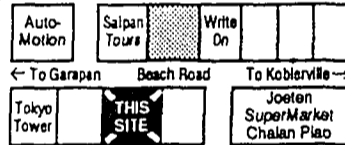
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US may help Cambodia

SINGAPORE (AP) - US Secretary of State Warren Christopher arrived here for a meeting of Asian foreign ministers Saturday as a senior administration official said the United States might be willing to aid the government of Cambodia, even if it included the notorious Khmer Rouge faction.

"The impression was developing that we were ruling out flatly any Khmer Rouge participation" in a Cambodian government being created by Prince Norodom Sihanouk, the official said. "We want to clarify that position is not that airtight."

The official, speaking on condition of anonymity, briefed reporters aboard the plane taking Christopher to the annual meeting of foreign ministers of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations.

The official's comments appeared designed to prevent the

unraveling of the fragile 1991 Paris peace accords that ended Cambodia's 12-year civil war, and to allay concerns that the United States was seeking to dictate the shape of its new government.

Sihanouk complained several days ago about what he termed US interference, and announced that he was calling off his planned talks with the Khmer Rouge because of US opposition to the faction's participation in a future government.

The Maoist-inspired Khmer Rouge has been blamed for the deaths of more than one million people during its 1975-78 rule of Cambodia. But last month its leader suggested he would be willing to call off his 14-year insurgency if promised a role in the government.

Given the faction's history of brutality and repeatedly broken promises, US officials are doubtful the Khmer Rouge can now

South Korea, Taiwan fail to sign pact

TAIPEI, Taiwan (AP) - Last-minute snags blocked Taiwan and South Korea from signing an agreement Sunday on establishing unofficial ties, Taiwan Vice Foreign Minister Fang Chin-yen announced.

In a written statement, Fang said differences remained over major issues, although Taiwanese and South Korean negotiators had initialed a draft agreement Friday after secret talks in Osaka, Japan.

Fang issued the statement after cutting short his visit to Osaka and returning home.

He had left for Osaka on Saturday, saying he was going to formally sign the agreement Sunday with his South Korean counterpart, Hong Soon-young.

South Korea switched its diplomatic recognition from Taiwan to China last August, and Taiwan retaliated by severing ties with Seoul.

Fang did not elaborate on why the agreement was not signed, but his statement said the "the talks have encountered various obstacles, as we had to negotiate under restrictions set by mainland China."

He said Taipei and Seoul would continue negotiations and would consider improving the names of proposed representative offices each side would set up in the other's capital.

The names in the draft agreement were "Taipei Mission in Republic of Korea" and "Korea Mission in Taipei."

Taiwan has dropped its demand to use "Republic of China," the official name of the Nationalist government, for its unofficial mission.

South Korea also agreed to obtain a new piece of prime land for Taiwan's new office as China has taken over Taiwan's embassy building in Seoul, Fang said.

A dispute over schools and other property held by ethnic Chinese in South Korea remained unresolved. Both Taiwan and China claimed ownership.

Giants win 3 of 4 weekend games

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) - The Giants took three of four weekend games from the Phillies as Bill Swift pitched seven strong innings Sunday in San Francisco's 5-2 victory over Philadelphia.

Swift (14-5) gave up three hits and struck out nine. It was his fourth consecutive victory, and the Giants won for the ninth time in their last 12 games.

The Giants took eight of 12 games from the Phillies this season in the matchup of first-place teams.

Barry Bonds hit a two-run homer off reliever Larry Andersen in the seventh inning for a league-leading 29 home runs and 79 RBIs. He finished the year with a .364 average, five homers and 16 RBIs against the Phillies.

Shortstop Royce Clayton hit a solo homer with two outs in the second inning to start the scoring off Danny Jackson (8-8). Clayton's homer gave him 53 RBIs, 16 against Philadelphia.

Consecutive singles by Kirt Manwaring, Swift and Darren Lewis followed Clayton's fourth homer and gave the Giants a 2-0 lead. They added an unearned run in the third.

Swift, who has worked at least six innings in 19 consecutive starts, had seven strikeouts before the Phillies got their first hit, a single into the hole at shortstop by Jim Eisenreich with two outs in the fourth inning.

The Phillies averted a shutout with an unearned run in the fifth inning. They added another unearned run in the seventh when Milt Thompson led off and reached second on Clayton's fielding error, went to third on Mickey Morandini's grounder and scored on pinch-hitter Pete Incaviglia's grounder.

Swift, who walked three, was replaced by rookie left-hander Kevin Rogers in the eighth inning. Dave Righetti pitched the ninth for his first save since May 22, 1992.

The Boston Red Sox are playing like a hungry team while keeping the Oakland Athletics from eating anything at all.

Mo Vaughn hit a grand slam and Frank Viola won at home for the first time since April 18 as the Red Sox beat Oakland 8-1 Sunday for their 10th straight victory,

tying the longest winning streak in the American League this season.

Boston, which was written off for dead by some critics when it was 13 games back in fifth place on June 21, has won 25 of 30 to move into first place in the American League East.

"We're so confident now, we don't expect to lose," said Viola (6-8), who had won just once in his previous 14 starts. "The way we're doing it, with a different hero every day, is the way you win divisions, because you have 25 guys doing it."

Oakland, in last place in the AL West, has lost nine of 10 to fall 15 games below .500 for the first time since Aug. 23, 1986. Manager Tony La Russa canceled the team's clubhouse meal.

"I don't see any reason to sit down and enjoy a post-game meal. I'm sure these guys' stomachs are upset like mine," La Russa said. "I'm not trying to make a statement. I'm just trying to remind people that it's not acceptable to lose when you're not competitive."

Andre Dawson also homered for Boston, which goes on a 13-game road trip after completing a 10-1 homestand.

The Red Sox tied the Orioles for the longest winning streak in the league this season and are one behind the best streak in the majors this year. Baltimore won 10 in a row in June and the Los Angeles Dodgers won 11 straight in May.

Viola allowed only four hits and had a 7-0 lead in the sixth when he was replaced by Paul Quantrill after walking two batters. Quantrill, who finished for his first save, gave up an RBI double to Mike Aldrete in the ninth.

Vaughn hit his second grand slam against Oakland in 17 days. He pumped his fist in triumph as the fifth-inning shot, his 14th homer of the season, landed in the Red Sox bullpen in right field.

The Athletics intentionally walked Dawson to load the bases for Vaughn, who now is hitting .528 (19-36) against Oakland this season.

"You take that personally. You always do," Vaughn said. "If you don't, I think there's something

wrong with you."

Vaughn, who doubled in a run in the eighth, tied his career best with five RBIs. He had four hits for the second time in the weekend series against Oakland.

Dawson hit his seventh homer of the season, a two-run shot into the screen atop the left-field wall, in the first. The Red Sox also got an RBI groundout from John Valentin in the fourth.

Oakland starter Bob Welch (7-7) allowed six runs in 4 1-3 innings. La Russa kept Welch in for 69 pitches, ending an experiment in which no pitcher was allowed to throw more than 50 pitches. Oakland went 1-6 during the experiment.

Notes: @ The Red Sox swept a four-game series from Oakland for the first time since August 1980. Boston has swept nine series this season, including seven at home. ... Athletics center fielder Lance Blankenship went 0-for-2 and is now 3-for-36 in his last 18 games and hitting .205 overall. ... The Red Sox have 35 wins at home, best in the American League. ... Welch had won his previous three decisions. ... The

Athletics left 11 runners on base. ... Dawson went 14-for-36 (.389) on the 11-game home stand to raise his average to .261.

Braves 13, Pirates 1

In Pittsburgh, David Justice went 4-for-5 with three RBIs and Atlanta, their offense sparked since trading for Fred McGriff, finished a weekend demolition of Pittsburgh's pitching.

The Braves outthit the Pirates 21-4, giving them 67 hits overall as they took three of four in the series by outscoring the Pirates 37-17.

Tom Glavine (12-4) pitched four-hit ball over seven innings and had a two-run double. Randy Tomlin dropped to 3-7.

Cubs 3, Astros 1, 11 innings

In Houston, Chicago rookie Kevin Roberson, who tied the score with a home run in the ninth inning, delivered an RBI single in the 11th to lift the Cubs over Houston.

Roberson hit a 1-2 pitch from Doug Jones (3-8) into right field to score Sammy Sosa with the go-ahead run.

Bob Scanlan (2-4) pitched two scoreless innings for the victory

and Randy Myers worked the 11th for his 30th save.

Mets 4, Dodgers 0

In Los Angeles, Eric Hillman pitched a five-hitter for first major league shutout and Joe Orsulak hit a home run as New York beat Los Angeles.

Hillman (1-4) tossed his first complete game in 17 career starts, striking out five and walking none.

Orsulak, ejected Saturday by plate umpire Bill Hohn for arguing a checked-swing strike, led off the sixth inning with drive to right-center off Ramon Martinez (8-6) for his fifth homer to snap a scoreless tie.

Cardinals 5, Rockies 4, 11 innings

In Denver, Todd Zeile had four hits and two RBIs, capped by a two-out run-scoring single in the 11th inning to lift St. Louis past Colorado.

The victory moved St. Louis within four games of first-place Philadelphia in the NL East.

Zeile led off the eighth with a homer to put the Cardinals ahead 3-2. But Dante Bichette hit a two-run homer in the bottom of the

change.

But, the official said, "if the Cambodians can work out reconciliation, if the Khmer Rouge abide by the peace accords, that can be a promising development."

US law bans direct or indirect aid to the group. But the official suggested ways might be found around these strictures, after consultations with Congress and with administration lawyers.

"If the Khmer Rouge are included under the conditions I outlined earlier, then there may well be ways to aid the government and make sure you segregate the funding so that it does not aid the Khmer Rouge directly," he said.

The United States is keenly interested in offering a new Cambodian government financial assistance, as well as possible military aid, he said.

The promising democratization of Cambodia is expected to be a prime topic of discussion at the ASEAN meeting, which includes representatives of Brunei, Indonesia, Malaysia, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Australia, Canada, the European Community, Japan, New Zealand and South Korea. The foreign ministers of China and Russia have, for the first time, been invited to join the others for dinner, and Christopher will meet with them.

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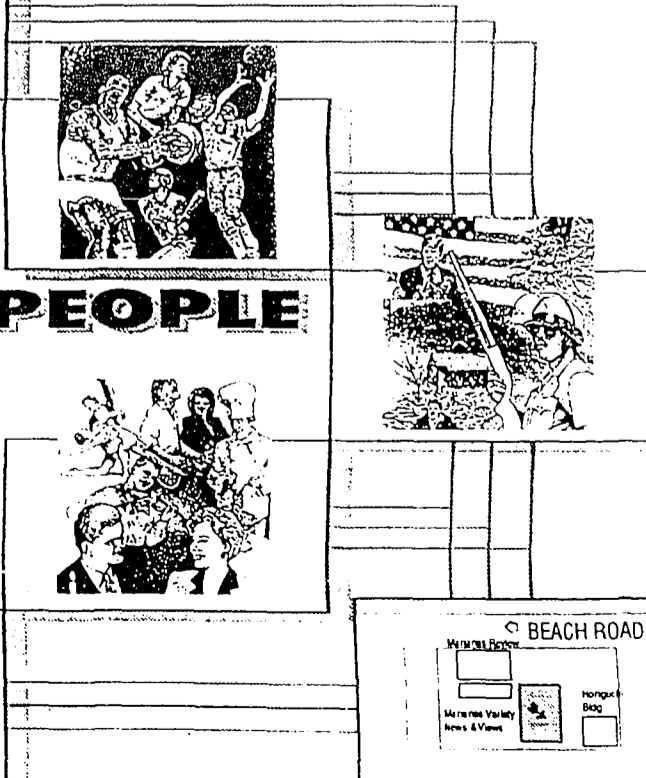
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ASEAN revives zone of peace idea

SINGAPORE (AP) - Once dismissed as an impossible dream, a zone of peace, freedom and neutrality in Southeast Asia was regarded Sunday as an idea whose time has come.

After reviewing progress in political and security cooperation, foreign ministers of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations noted that "conditions in South-east Asia today approximate those

envisaged" when ASEAN first proposed the zone 22 years ago.

In a joint communique, the foreign ministers endorsed a renewed push for the peace zone by ASEAN, which links Indonesia, Malaysia, Thailand, Singapore, Brunei and the Philippines.

The original concept seemed out of touch with the reality of 1971 - intense superpower rivalry between the then Soviet Union and the United States, while Soviet-backed Vietnam followed an

apparently adventurous line.

US officials rejected the idea of a nuclear-free zone in Cold War terms, insisting that a nuclear deterrent was necessary to preserve peace.

Other world powers mostly ignored the proposed zone as the wishful thinking of leaders in six relatively weak countries.

The shaping of new political and security arrangements in the wake of the Cold War makes the zone relevant, said Indonesian Foreign Minister Ali Alatas.

"Considering the inherent fluidity and instability that can be expected to mark its initial transition stage, the need for the early realization of Southeast Asia as a zone of peace, freedom and neutrality and as a nuclear weapons-free zone has, in my view, become even more evident," Alatas said.

The original idea said "the neutralization of southeast Asia is a desirable objective" because it would insulate the region from superpower rivalries, regarded by ASEAN as the cause of instability and potential conflict.

This was to be attained through guarantees from Washington, Moscow and Beijing that they would refrain from competing for influence. Just the opposite happened.

Officials said the new model zone calls for a code of conduct to govern relations between states in the region and elsewhere in the Pacific basin.

Asian news briefs

Europe, Asia to meet yearly

SINGAPORE (AP) - US Secretary of State Warren Christopher and foreign ministers from 17 Asia-Pacific nations and the European Community agreed to annual meetings Sunday during their first joint discussions on security and political issues.

The next Association of Southeast Asian Nations Regional Forum was set for the middle of next year in Thailand, after the annual ASEAN Foreign Ministers meeting, officials at the talks said.

"The intention is to help build mutual confidence and preserve stability and growth in the Asia-Pacific by evolving a predictable and constructive pattern of relationships in this region," said a statement issued after a dinner hosted by ASEAN.

The nations present included the ASEAN countries comprising Malaysia, Indonesia, Thailand, the Philippines, Brunei and Singapore; ASEAN's annual Post Ministerial Conference dialogue partners comprising the US, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Korea, Japan and EC nations and the foreign ministers of China, Russia, Papua New Guinea, Vietnam and Laos.

Train hits bus; 15 killed

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) - A passenger train slammed into a bus at a crossing in East Java, killed at least 15 people and severely injuring 20, a newspaper reported Sunday.

The mass circulation Kompas quoted Col. Edi Sukarno, chief of the local police, as saying the crossing gate had been left open by the guard, who apparently was sleeping. It said the guard had been detained for interrogation.

The inter-city bus was carrying 38 people when the Jakarta-Surabaya train hit it at dawn Saturday in the district of Jombang, about 825 kilometers (516 miles) east of Jakarta, the paper added.

It said 11 of the injured were soldiers bound for their post in the East Java capital of Surabaya.

Doctors separate twins

RANGOON, Burma (AP) - Doctors successfully separated a pair of Siamese twins Sunday, the second time the complicated operation has been undertaken in Burma.

A 35-member team of surgeons, anesthesiologists, nurses and technicians at Rangoon Children's Hospital worked for more than five hours to separate 2-year-old female twins Aye Aye and Ei Ei Nyein, state media reported.

The sisters were joined at the chest and had two sets of limbs. Born in August 1991 in Mon state in southeastern Burma, they weighed 14.5 kilograms (32 pounds) at the time of the operation.

The twins' mother, Ma Hla Kyin, and father, Ko Nyein, were present for the operation, as was Maj. Gen. Khin Nyunt, a leading member of the country's ruling military junta.

Only one twin survived the country's sole previous operation to separate Siamese twins, in 1970.

Police patrol Bangkok schools

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Two junior colleges in Bangkok were temporarily closed and police began patrolling their campuses after battles between students left two dead, local newspapers reported Sunday.

Two students died in a melee Friday night, when hundreds of students, armed with iron bars, knives, clubs and firebombs,

clashed at Kanok Technology School, the newspaper The Nation reported.

The brawl followed the fatal stabbing Wednesday of a student of Bangkok Technical College, allegedly by Kanok students, the newspaper reported.

Three companies of police commandoes were sent to the Kanok campus Friday night at the height of the battle, when 300 Bangkok Tech students invaded Kanok's campus, reports said. Kanok students earlier had laid siege to Bangkok Tech, about four kilometers (2.5 miles) away.

Police found the bodies of two young men, one identified as a Kanok student, after they restored order, The Nation reported. Six other Kanok students were seriously injured, it said.

Bangkok Police Commissioner Chamlong Iamchaengphan has ordered the two schools closed until Aug. 3 and called in the directors of the colleges to discuss measures to prevent more violence.

Brawling between students of rival technical schools is a perennial social problem, but the violence rarely affects outsiders.

Probers find black box

BELJING (AP) - Chinese investigators have found one of two black boxes from a domestic passenger plane that crashed while taking off, killing 59 people, official news reports said Monday.

The box was fished out of a lake where the plane landed and broke apart, the Xinhua News Agency said, and presumably will be studied to help determine the cause of the crash last Friday.

No official comment has been made on the cause, but that is not unusual. China rarely discloses the specific reasons for plane crashes. After five crashes last year killed a total of 310 people, official news reports vaguely blamed slack safety controls and violations of operating regulations, but gave no details.

In last week's accident, a British Aerospace 146 operated by China Northwest Airlines was trying to take off in clear weather from Yinchuan, a provincial capital about 900 kilometers (560 miles) west of Beijing.

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Merten captures US Women's Open

CARMEL, Ind. (AP) - Lauri Merten birdied on two of the last three holes to win her first tournament in nine years on Sunday, capturing the US Women's Open by one stroke.

Merten chipped from about 45 feet (14 meters) for a birdie on the 404-yard (364-meter) 16th hole. Then she just missed an eagle on the 400-yard (360-meter) closing hole when her 18-foot (6-meter) chip shot stopped 2 feet (60 centimeters) from the cup. The birdie gave her a 4-under-par 68 for the

day and an 8-under 280 for the tournament.

Helen Alfredsson of Sweden, who began the round leading by two strokes, slipped to a tie for second at 281 with a 74. She pushed a 15-foot (4.5-meter) putt on the final hole just to the right of the cup that would have forced an 18-hole playoff Monday.

Donna Andrews, one of four women to lead during the final round, shot 71 to tie Alfredsson.

Pat Bradley, who had moved to 8-under in quest of duplicating her 1981 Open triumph, faded with a bogey on No. 15 and a

double-bogey on No. 16 to finish tied for fourth at 73 with a 283 total.

Hiromi Kobayashi of Japan, who was second when the weather-delayed final round at the 6,311-yard (5,680-meter) Crooked Stick Golf Club began, bogeyed the final hole to tie with Bradley.

Merten, who had not won a tournament since 1984, missed the cut in two of her last three tournaments and finished in a tie for 75th in the other. She earned \$144,000 for her third tour victory and nearly doubled her pre-

vious winnings of \$175,706 this year.

Defending champion Patty Sheehan was at 284, followed by five others at 285. The group included second-round leader Michelle McGann and Nancy Lopez, whose bid for her first Open title faded with a triple-bogey on the eighth hole where she put one shot into the water.

"After I took my triple, I wished it (the hole) had been washed away," said Lopez, who had double-bogied the same hole Saturday. "I was disappointed because I felt this is where I could

win it."

The start of play was delayed an hour as volunteers and workers toiled to clear debris and water from an overnight storm that struck the course just north of Indianapolis. Officials said that 15 trees were toppled on the course and another 25 were severely damaged by winds of up to 50 mph (80 kph).

Workers began removing debris, pumping flooded bunkers and drying greens that were covered by water around 5 a.m. - less than four hours before play was scheduled to begin.

Eddie Merckx and Frenchmen Jacques Anquetil and Louison Bobet as the only riders to win three Tours de France in consecutive years.

However none of them could match what Indurain has done the past two years - win the Tour of Italy and Tour de France twice.

"To win the Giro and the Tour like that," Indurain said. "It's the first time and it will stay in history."

That represents more than 40 days of riding over a two-month period where one poor day, a fall or sickness can wipe out days of

top cycling.

And he's done it two years in a row.

Indurain is in a class by himself. He finished Sunday in the pack, having a 4-minute, 59-second lead over Switzerland's Tony Rominger. Poland's Zenon Jaskula became the first cyclist from his country to earn a place in the top three.

Fourth went to Alvaro Mejia of Colombia with fifth to Bjarne Riis of Denmark.

Claudio Chiappucci of Italy, who was in the top three since 1990, was sixth. Johan Bruyneel

of Belgium was seventh just ahead of American Andy Hampsten.

Amid waving Spanish flags and fans who had taken overnight trains from Spain, Indurain was relaxed over the final kilometers (miles) up and down the Champs Elysees. He had his work behind him, in the weeks before over the rambling route of 3,720 kilometers (2,312 miles) around France.

"I was the Number One favorite but the pressure was enormous and it is not always easy," Indurain said. "But I was perfectly prepared for this year and hope to be in the same kind of form next year."

Indurain was never threatened

throughout the race. He was the heavy favorite entering the event that started in Puy du Fou in western France on July 3. He took the prologue and waited until the first time trial to gain the yellow jersey, which he never relinquished.

He was always looming near the leaders of the stages in the mountains as the race went through the Alps and the Pyrenees.

He faltered a bit in losing the second time trial to Rominger on Saturday but still had enough of an advantage to remain in command for the third consecutive year.

Rominger was named the tour's top climber, having won two

mountain stages in addition to the time trial.

Abdouraparov took the award for most points gathered along the way with intermediate sprints and finishing bonuses on flat sections.

The Uzbekistan cyclist won his third stage of the Tour and erased memories of a spectacular fall at the finish of the 1991 Tour. Indurain joins three other riders at three victories. Greg LeMond of the United States won in 1986, 1989 and 1990 and did not participate in 1987 and 1988. French rider Philippe Thys has three along with Bobet.

But she was in trouble again in the next game. She saved two break points but committed a double fault to allow Sanchez Vicario to break back.

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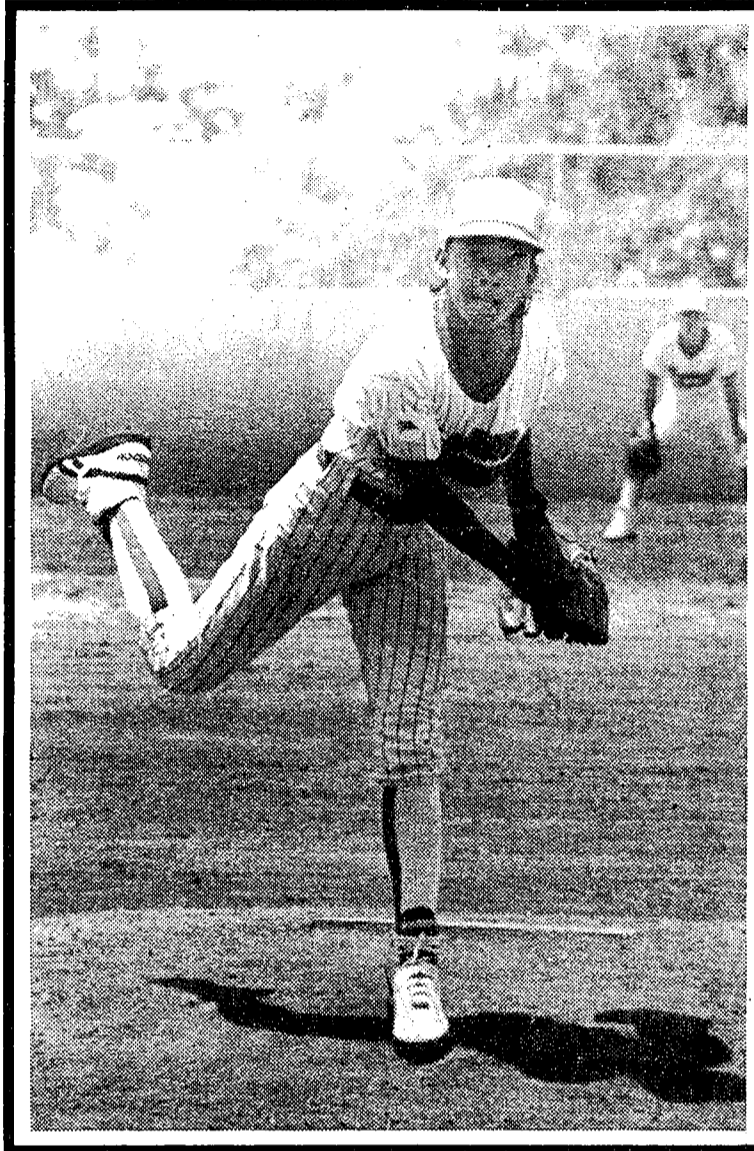

THE CNMI continued to shine in the 1993 Far East Little League Baseball Tournament, defeating Guam 11-0 in four innings in the second game yesterday.

The victory was an impressive follow up to the host team's opening performance Sunday, during which it beat Indonesia, 18-3.

In yesterday's encounter, the CNMI, led by most valuable player June Joyner, gave no quarter to neighboring Guam.

The two teams were both scoreless in the first two innings. In the third inning, the CNMI made its first two points. In the fourth, it put in nine, which Guam failed to counter, resulting in a shutout under the 10-point rule.

In the last game Monday, the powerful Japanese team beat Hong Kong 13-1. The British Colony scored one in the first inning, which was countered by the Japan with three. It was the only fruitful inning for Hong Kong. Japan strengthened its lead with two points in the third inning and eight in the fourth.

Hong Kong avenged its first-day loss with a 13-7 victory yesterday over the Philippines, which has now has two losses in the same number of outings, dousing hopes of retaining its Far East title won last year.

Hong Kong made eight points in the first inning, against three for the Philippines. Both teams scored one in the second, followed by three in the third for Hong Kong and one for the Philippines, then one for Hong Kong in the fourth against two for the Philippines.

In the third game yesterday, Japan proved no match to Taiwan, which has dominated the Far East Little League until its loss to the Philippines last year, as well as the World Little League in the United States.

Japan failed to score against the Taiwanese, which made one, three and three in four innings to end the game at 7-0.

China ended yesterday's games with a 20-3 victory over Indonesia, which was able to score only in the second inning. China made seven in the second inning and secured the win with 12 points in the fourth.

Korea will play for the first time today in an encounter with Hong Kong. Second game will feature Taiwan and Guam, followed by Indonesia and Japan, then the Philippines and China. (CT/NL)

Indurain captures Tour de France

PARIS (AP) - For Miguel Indurain, the third time's a charm. And the Spanish cyclist made it look easy Sunday as he won his third Tour de France title in as many years.

Fans waved Spanish flags along the Champs Elysees where the race ended, while bells pealed and hundreds of skyrockets went off in Indurain's Spanish hometown of Villava — much of whose population was in Paris celebrating.

"Every year has been different. The first year it was all new and I was very nervous," Indurain said after he won the gruelling, three-week race.

"The second year I was more relaxed and enjoyed the victory more," Indurain said. "The third was more like the second, you know how things work ... you know more people ... and can enjoy it a little more."

Indurain added his name to the list of such greats as Belgium's

Sanchez Vicario, Martinez gives Spain 2nd Federation Cup title

FRANKFURT, Germany (AP) - Arantxa Sanchez Vicario and Conchita Martinez, winning in singles and doubles, gave Spain its second Federation Cup title Sunday with a 3-0 victory over Australia.

In a one-sided final, the top-seeded Spanish team dominated the unseeded Australia, which was seeking its first title since 1974.

Martinez, ranked sixth in the world, beat Michelle Jaggard-Lai 6-0, 6-2 to put Spain ahead.

Sanchez Vicario, ranked third on women's pro tour, then defeated Nicole Provis 6-2, 6-3 to give Spain an unbeatable 2-0 lead in the best-of-three series.

"The title means a lot to me and it's special to win it for the second time, I am very proud," Sanchez Vicario said. "It's good to be with the team once a year."

The doubles match was only a matter of pride, and went to Sanchez Vicario and Martinez, who beat Elizabeth Smylie and Rennae Stubbs 3-6, 6-1, 6-3.

Smylie was also on the team in Australia's last previous final in 1984, when she played doubles with Wendy Turnbull, the team's current non-playing captain, and lost to Czechoslovakia.

Turnbull said the experience brought by the Spanish team's two top-10 players made the difference.

"They were so much stronger on the important points," she said. "It's a disappointment not to win, but we are pleased to have reached the final."

Sanchez Vicario and Martinez captured the title in the women's version of the Davis Cup for the first time in 1991 against the United States and lost to Germany in last year's final.

The Spanish team shared \$100,000 for its victory, while the Australians received \$55,000.

Martinez broke Jaggard-Lai in the opening game to set the tone of the match.

The Australian, ranked 91st by the Women's Tennis Association, dropped her serve again in the third game with a double-fault.

Martinez cruised through the first set, content to wait for Jaggard-Lai to make mistakes.

The second set began like the first - with Martinez going a break up.

Jaggard-Lai held for the first time in the third game of the second set, but she was broken again in the seventh and Martinez wrapped up the match in 62 minutes.

"It was important to have won both singles, we both played very well," Martinez said.

Australia, winner of seven Federation Cup titles, was rated an outsider on the red clay courts in Frankfurt but had a dream run through the tournament.

The Australians first upset Germany, the No. 2 seed and the defending champion, in the opening round, with Provis beating Steffi Graf. In the quarterfinals, Australia defeated the third-seeded team from former Czechoslovakia.

But against the clay-court specialists from Spain, the Australia-
