## Evangelista says he was 'ousted' from CDA Board because of Cing

A FORMER board member of the Commonwealth Development Authority yesterday blamed Sen. David M. Cing's (D-Tinian) "vindictiveness" for the Senate's rejection of his reappointment this week.
Francisco B. Evangelista, in a media statement, alleged that Cing used the Senate to "retaliate" against him after the Tinian cockfight commission decided to terminate the senator's franchise license to operate the Tinian cockpit.
Cing, when asked for com-

ment yesterday, denied Evangelista's allegations.

Under the new scheme, individual employers, or those who hire farmers and domestic helps, would be required tax report copies. Also, they must be earning at least $\$ 20,000$ a year for them to be allowed to hire the workers.

## Tenorio 'dares' PIA to pull out

GOVERNOR Froilan C. Tenorio yesterday said commuter airliner Pacific Island Aviation can suspend its flights if it wants to, as there are other airlines that could fill the void.
This developed as the joint House-Senate special committee conducted a public hearing on the anticipated air transport crisis on Rota in the face of PIA's reduction of its flights to Rota by 60 percent.
"Let them (PIA) suspend. If they're not making money, they
should close down," Tenorio told the Variety.
Tenorio was interviewed during a reception at the airport celebrating the 20th anniversary of the Japan Airlines Japan-Saipan route.
The governorsaid Freedom Air, which is the other airline serving Rota's air service needs, can fill the void left by PIA should it stop operation.
PIA President and Chief Executive Officer Robert Christian said the other day the airline was not discounting the option of serving a 90 -day notice of suspension
of its flights after Oct. 20.
At the legislature, a task force was formed whose membership comes from the Senate, the House, the Marianas Visitors Bureau, Commonwealth Ports Authority, Freedom Air, PIÁ, and the Hotel Association of the Northern Mariana Islands to address the air transportation problem.
The task force will meet within the next seven days and has been tasked to come up with recommendations and submit them to the Legislature in 30 days.

PALAU has to hurdle several contraints if it has to develop economically, the republic's National Master Development Plan says.
The Plan, which is currently being discussed for adoption in Congress, identifies the key constraints that arenotably also being experienced by other Pa cific island economies.
They are as follows:

- A small domestic market spread across a number of islands,
-High unit costs for infra-structure and industry services; -Narrow resource bases; -Heavy dependence on external trade and foreign assistance; and
- Price of exports lower than the price of imports.
The master plan says Palau, which has a resident population of about 17,000 , has no option to overcome the disadvantage of a small market other than to "seek an expansion of the privately traded-goodssector and, particularly, exports where scale economies can be Continued on page 24

## SOME MYTHS AND FACTS CONCERNING LABOR AND IMMIGRATION IN THE CNMI

 Myth: All labor complaints are human rights abuses.Fact: The majority of complaints are wage and hour violations - labor violations that exist throughout the world.

## Myth: There is a persistent pattern of labor abuse in the CNMI.

Fact: There are individual instances of abuse, which are never acceptable, but that does not constitute a pattern. When alerted to these instances, the Department of Labor and Immigration responds immediately. The Philippine Consul has said she sees no pattern
abuse. "Labor problems which may have undertones due to cultural differences are not necessarily labor abuses," she says.

Myth: There is a pattern of Chinese alien smuggling between Rota and Guam.
Fact: There has been one case of smuggling from Rota to Guam. CNMI Immigration alerted the INS in Guam. The two agencies worked together to successfully abort the operation

My th: The CNMI is unable to protect workers against crimes such as illegal recruitment.
Fact: The CNMI does not condone any act or crime against workers.
The Department of Labor and Immigration has taken significant steps to protect workers. As a result of a recent MOU with the Department of Commerce, Labor will be able to screen employers for fiscal health and deny insolvent employers the right to hire guest
workers. It is also suspending hiring of workers in classifications for which the demand has already been filled, such workers. It is also suspending hiring of workers in classifications for which the demiand has already been filled, such as security guards. By unisg LIIDS, the Department has been able to detect irregularities on the part of employers who have subsequently been
charged with criminal violations.

The CNMI has no control over unscrupulous recruiters in countries of workers' origin. We can be of assistance by providing information necessary to overcome this problem. Ultimately, this is a problem with which the government of the country of origin must wrestle.

Myth: The two separate databases for incoming guest workers - the LIIDS entry permit and the registration card from the Division of Immigration -
are an indication of how labor intensive ond duplicative record-keeping in the Department is are an indication of how labor intensive and duplicative record-keping in the Department is and the Department apparently doesn't know it. Fact: The current labor code provides for a two documentation process and must be observed. The new labor code, which the Administration has transmitted to the Legislature, provides for only one documentation. So , if the law is passed, there will be only one document, the LIIDS document.

Myth: Federal agencies have worked closely with CNMI leaders to correct problems.
Fact: While the U.S. Department of Labor, the FBI, and the DEA have been very helpful, the key agency, the INS, has only very recently given the kind of support the CNMI has been asking for for years.

## Myth: 20th century U.S. Immigration Policy will meet 21 st century needs.

Fact: U.S. Immigration Policy is based on migration for settlement. This is an admirable policy when there is a frontier. However,
here are fewer and fewer frontiers left in the world, much less the U.S., and hordes of people seeking to better their lives, The future lies in migration for work purposes, rather than migration for settlement.

Myth: The problems of Labor and Immigration in the CNMI can be eesolved by outsiders.

learn to be part of the solution.

If you have resided in the CNMI since September 17, 1997, and you are a citizen of the United States, then you are eligible to vote in the upcoming General Election.

But, you must first be registered to vote.
"Why register?"
Because you are now a part of a community that needs your voice to be heard on many important issues. Complaining is pointless; voting counts!
"I'm only here for a two year contract."
That's what many our long time stateside residents said when they first came to the CNMI.
The fact is that teachers are still in the classroom long after their initial two year contract expired, and many former government attorneys have "hung their shingle" in private practice. For whatever the reason, a large number of statesiders have remained in the CNMI well beyond their intended stay. "If I registered last year am I still eligible to vote this year?"
If I registered last year, am I still eligible to vote this year?"
Good question! If you were registered to vote before the 1996 Constitutional Convention, but did not vote, then you must register again. CNMI law requires that you vote in every election to keep your registration valid.

Registration is easy! Bring with you to the Board of Elections a valid U.S. Passport or CNMI driver's license and your social security number.
"Enough! Just tell me where I need to go to get registered to vote."
The Board of Elections, located on Beach Road across the street from the Garapan Fire Substation, will extend its office hours to meet the October 2 registration deadline.
