

OPA audits 'ignored'

SEVERAL government agencies audited by the Office of the Public Auditor have ignored the watchdog agency's recommendations to correct irregularities in their systems.

According to an OPA report released yesterday, at least 126 of the 191 recommendations it had made between July and December 1997 remain unacted upon.

Public Auditor Leo LaMotte noted that cases of delinquencies

had increased since June 1997 when OPA released its last annual report in which it noted 35 recommendations that were ignored.

The increase in cases of delinquencies has prompted LaMotte to seek the assistance of the Inter-agency Audit Coordinating Advisory Group in enforcing compliance from the "auditees."

LaMotte, in an annual report submitted to the audit advisory

group, noted that there are still outstanding recommendations since 1994 and 1995.

Because of this, LaMotte reiterated an earlier proposal for the Governor to designate an official from his office to enforce OPA's audit recommendations.

The public auditor initially made this proposal in 1996 when OPA first noted delinquencies among government agencies.

"This suggestion was not con-

sidered, however, because the coordinating group members did not hold any discussion, and no recommendation was made to the governor," LaMotte said. "From July through December 1997, OPA tracked 199 audit recommendations in 41 final reports issued to various departments and agencies of the Commonwealth government during the year and outstanding from previous years. Of the 199 audit recommendations, 23 are closed and 176 are either open or resolved. Of the 176 open or resolved recommendations, 126 are considered delinquent," stated the Report on CNMI Agencies' Implementation of Audit Recommendations March 1998.

The report contains summaries of investigations and findings on 19 agencies and programs audited by OPA. These include the Office of the Governor, the Departments of Commerce, Public Safety, Public Works, Community and Cultural Affairs, Public Health, and Lands and Natural Resources.

YESTERDAY afternoon's power outage on Capitol Hill prevented the Senate from acting on the so-called amnesty and poker/sunset bills.

Senate President Paul A. Manglona (R-Rota) has vowed to push for the passage of H.B. 11-76, the bill that would allow illegal aliens to seek amnesty and legal employment

But the Legislature has no back-up generator, and the Senate adjourned in darkness.

However, the Senate confirmed the following nominations before adjourning: Commonwealth Utilities Corp. board

member Juan S. Dela Cruz, Marianas Public Land Trust board member Joey Patrick San Nicolas and Civil Service Commissioner Diane H. Borja.

Manglona, in an interview yesterday, said the amnesty and the poker/sunset bills were the items on the agenda when the power interruption occurred before 1 p.m.

"We will, of course, take up these important bills in the next session," he said.

In an earlier interview, Gov. Pedro P. Tenorio said he supports the amnesty legislation and will act immediately on the bill that would limit a person to only

Gutierrez vetoes tax measure

TAMUNING, Guam — No new taxes.

This was Gov. Carl T.C. Gutierrez's emphatic announcement as he vetoed Bill No. 238 yesterday during a media conference at the Ricardo J. Bordallo Governor's Complex.

Bill No. 238 seeks to raise real property taxes, including for the

manamko and people with disabilities.

Gutierrez was adamant that the increase in taxes is totally inappropriate.

"It is not a time to again zap the citizenry with higher taxes especially the senior citizens and the disabled," Gutierrez said.

Joey Duenas, the Director of Revenue and Taxation was also present when the Governor ve-

toed the bill. He shared Gutierrez's view that a tax raise is just not acceptable.

"It represents a 100% increase on the tax rate on land," Duenas pointed out.

Expressing disappointment with the Legislature for moving the bill, Gutierrez said: "This bill kind of shook me up."

The memorial will consist of a reflection area with benches and a walkway heading north and ending at a spot overlooking the

airport runway in the distance.

A 20-foot obelisk inscribed with the names of all people on board the fateful flight will be erected at the overlook.

Korean Airlines flight 801 crashed about three miles short of the Guam International Air Terminal on August 6, 1997. Some 228 of the 254 passengers and crew aboard perished in the accident.

Hun Sen rules out amnesty

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—Cambodian strongman Hun Sen on Thursday ruled out amnesties for Khmer Rouge leaders still fighting the government, saying the guerrillas chieftains must stand trial for their crimes. "It would be unacceptable to raise the question of giving amnesty to people like Ta Mok, Nuon Chea and Khieu Samphan. These people can't avoid a trial," Hun Sen said at a press conference in Bangkok on the last day of a two-day official visit to Thailand.

The Cambodian co-prime minister was referring to the three top leaders of the remnants of the Marxist guerrilla group.

The trio have been on the run from a government military offensive in the jungles of northern Cambodia near the Thai border.

The United States has said it

wants to put the remaining Khmer Rouge leaders on trial for crimes against humanity if they are apprehended, and has asked the Cambodian government not pardon them.

The Khmer Rouge were responsible for the deaths of as many as 2 million Cambodians from executions, torture, overwork and starvation during their 1975-79 rule.

The U.S. has pushed for the formation of a tribunal, but has been blocked by United Nations Security Council counterpart China, which was once a strong supporter of the Maoist-inspired guerrilla movement.

Estrada gets Iglesia backing in RP election

MANILA, Philippines (AP)—The Iglesia ni Cristo, a large Philippine church group, declared its support Wednesday for Vice President Joseph Estrada, the chief opposition candidate in next week's presidential elections.

The endorsement by the group, which expects all its members to vote according to its instructions, will further solidify Estrada's wide lead in popularity polls.

But the church group said it is backing the ruling party's candidate for vice president, Sen. Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo.

Political analysts estimate that Iglesia ni Cristo could bring in as many as 2 million votes for its picks.

The far larger Catholic Church has said it will not officially back any candidates in the May 11 national elections.

But outspoken Manila Archbishop Jaime Cardinal Sin has warned that the leading presidential candidate may be "disastrous for the country."

Sin did not identify Estrada by name, but it was a clear reference to the vice president, a former actor and college dropout who has a formidable 19 percentage point lead in voter surveys over ruling party candidate Jose de Venecia, his closest rival. Estrada has been criticized for a history of womanizing, heavy drinking and gambling.

He claims that his only vice now is cigarettes.

"We chose Vice President Estrada because we perceive him to be the most credible in fighting graft and corruption and criminality," Iglesia ni Cristo said in a statement.

It said its intention is not to meddle in politics, but to "preserve the unity of the members of the church in expressing judgment on those who are running for public office."

Ten candidates are running to succeed President Fidel Ramos, who is constitutionally barred from a second six-year term.

At least 100,000 other candidates are running for 17,340 national and local posts.

High Court rules vs 'Dadang 6'

THE six Rota residents, known as the "Dadang Six," will now have to vacate a public land they are occupying in Songsong Village after the Supreme Court refused yesterday to stay a trial court's eviction order.

The case stemmed from the government's suit against the six "squatters" who have built homes at the Dadang property in Songsong Village.

Ruling paves way for eviction from Rota public land

Ordered to leave the property were Vivencio Anglo, Celso Catindig, Nestor Jingco, Andronico Pelen, Aquilino Semana and Donicio Semana, all of whom are Filipinos who have acquired US citizenship.

Last year, the Superior Court ruled in favor of the government, saying the six had trespassed on a public land. Associate Judge Miguel Demapan or-

dered them to leave the property in 30 days after the promulgation of the order.

Last November, the six appealed the eviction order, but Demapan denied their motion.

On behalf of the six, then Rota Mayor Joseph Inos had appealed to the Board of Public Lands to allow the six to remain in the Dadang property.

But board chairman Thomas

dered the enforcement of the eviction order.

Incumbent Rota Mayor Benjamin Manglona, inheriting the case from his predecessor, filed another appeal last May 4, telling the Supreme Court that "Rota will be forced to assist the families in finding replacement homes."

Manglona also told the court that the "public benefited" from the improvements made by Anglo's group in the property.

In dismissing the Mayor's appeal, the Supreme Court said that "the issue raised has already been sufficiently addressed" in the trial court's ruling.

The court said "Dadang Six" would have been allowed to stay in the property had they proved that their eviction would cause them "irreparable injury."

US, Marshall Islands start economic talks

MAJURO—U.S. and Marshall Islands officials open talks Thursday in Majuro aimed at reviewing economic progress and use of American funding under a Compact of Free Association treaty.

With the end of the Compact just three years away, these economic consultations "are gaining more significance," said Foreign Affairs Secretary Robert Muller.

"It's a useful opportunity to sit down with the U.S. and review what's taken place to develop our economy."

Marshall Islands officials view these talks as helping to set the stage for renegotiation of the Compact scheduled to begin in 1999.

The U.S., which is providing about \$55 million in funding this year to the Marshall Islands, is keen to hear reports on progress in economic development.

"We are looking forward to an update on the Marshall Islands' progress on its public sector reform program," said U.S. Ambassador Joan Plaisted.

Muller said that the Marshall Islands would be giving reports on its Asian Development Bank-supported reform program and efforts to improve the environment for private sector development.

The Marshalls has cut about 20 percent of its government workforce in the past two years, but despite reform efforts aimed at stimulating a productive economy the country remains almost entirely dependent on U.S. and other donor country aid.

State and Interior Department officials are flying in from Washington, D.C. for the two days of talks in Majuro.

Susanne Butcher, the Director of State's Office of Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Island Affairs, will be in Majuro for the discussions.

Plaisted said the U.S. is particularly interested to hear from the Marshalls side what is happening on the economic and government budgetary situation, as well as the status of a loan from the Asian Development Bank of \$3.5 million that has been held up for almost nine months because the Marshalls had not met conditions laid down by the ADB.

Plaisted said that the U.S. is particularly concerned to learn of the Marshalls plans for a hospital for the large urban population on Ebeye Island that remains unfinished despite multi-million dollar funding from the U.S.

"We're concerned with the long-delayed Ebeye hospital," she said.

Also of interest to the U.S., said Plaisted, is what kind of followup has been undertaken to the government-sponsored National Economic and Social Summit held in January that brought together 150 community representatives to produce a plan of action to deal with the Marshalls' economic problems. The summit made recommendations for stimulating the private sector and establishing stricter ethics in government, among other plans she said, adding that the U.S. is interested how the these summit

Filipino in ARC case asks US court to cite Teno in contempt

THE Filipino contract worker who sued officials after he was sent back to the Philippines for allegedly having an invalid alien registration card last March filed the other day at the federal district court two motions, one of which is seeking to hold in contempt Gov. Pedro P. Tenorio and the other defendants.

In his motion, Marmil Cayabyab claimed the defendants—who also included Labor and Immigration Secretary Mark

D. Zachares, acting Atty. Gen. Robert Dunlap, Assistant Atty. Gen. Robert Goldberg and the CNMI—disobeyed a temporary restraining order by failing to provide him breakfast or lunch on March 28 while under detention.

Cayabyab also filed a motion for a preliminary injunction ordering the defendants to return him to the CNMI at their expense and not to arrest and detain him in connection with the pending case.

Both motions, filed by Cayabyab's lawyer, V.K. Sawhney, will be heard on June 5.

Cayabyab was detained by the Department of Labor and Immigration for seven days, from March 22, the day of his arrival from vacation in the Philippines, to March 28, when he was flown back to his country.

The TRO, issued on March 27, required the defendants to provide Cayabyab with food, medical care and access to his attorney during his detention. Sawhney said.

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Man gets 6 mos. for 'ice,' marijuana

SUPERIOR COURT Associate Judge Edward Manibusan has ordered a man to spend six months in jail for illegal possession of "ice" and marijuana.

Manibusan following a plea agreement asked Juan Diego Aguon to enroll in a government-approved drug treatment program.

Aguon was also required to pay \$250 fine and \$250 as restitution to the CNMI drug program.

The defendant was charged in 1997 with illegal possession of a controlled substance ("ice") and illegal possession of controlled

substance (marijuana).

In 1996 the government charged Aguon with illegal possession of a controlled substance (marijuana) and illegal possession of a controlled substance with intent to deliver.

The defendant was also slapped with illegal possession of ammunition in separate case filed in 1996, court documents showed.

Aguon and counsel Assistant Public Defender Masood Karimpour signed a plea agreement with the government represented by Assistant Atty. Gen. Marvin Williams.

Aguon pleaded guilty of illegal

possession of "ice" and marijuana in the 1997 case.

In return, the Attorney General's Office recommended the dismissal of Aguon's two 1996 cases.

The court accepted the plea and dropped Aguon's 1996 cases.

Court documents indicated that on March 5, 1997 Drug Enforcement Agency arrested Aguon who was found in possession of three grams of "ice" and 2.5 grams of marijuana.

The defendant was caught in possession of ammunition and marijuana in 1996, court papers showed.

Bold action needed to fight battle against prostitution

THE PROPOSAL aired by DOLI Secretary Mark Zachares for an anti-loitering law could not have come at a more opportune time.

DOLI, as well as other law enforcement agencies, have long failed miserably in containing the problem of prostitution especially at tourist areas on Saipan.

One only needs to pass by Garapan's red light district at night to realize the magnitude of this problem and how the trade has flourished unabatedly.

While there is a law that outlaws this nefarious trade in the CNMI, it seems to be insufficient in actually stopping the world's oldest profession from flourishing here.

The problem with prostitution is, it is being conducted clandestinely and away from the prying eyes of the public.

Only the pimp, the prostitute and the customer get privy to a transaction. And unless law enforcers go undercover, it is very difficult if not impossible for them to really catch the people engaged in this kind of activity hand-to-hand.

That is why despite the fact that DOLI patrols have been fielded back in Garapan, pimps and prostitutes continue to ply their trade right under the very noses of immigration agents.

If this problem is to really be solved, there needs to be something in the books to help law enforcers pin down their quarry.

And Mr. Zachares has the answer—enact an anti-loitering law. Having such a law would empower government agents to accost suspicious-looking characters standing at street corners and who apparently have no reason to be there.

This way, as Mr. Zachares points out, DOLI could at least check on these individuals for any possible links to prostitution rings.

Take them in and ask questions later. Is this too harsh? Maybe.

But the important thing is it is not as harsh as it is just. For without such a law, agents are underhanded in chasing these lawbreakers. They have absolutely no grounds to take these people in even if they are really engaged in this underground trade.

True, that while an anti-loitering law could be a most effective method of flushing out the pimps and prostitutes lining up Garapan's red light district, it may entail serious concerns about the manner it is to be implemented.

Arrests should be done very discriminately and professionally.


While some people may say that there is a great potential of authority being abused and of individual rights being trampled upon, parameters should be carefully laid out so that arbitrary arrests are avoided.

The important thing is that the battle against prostitution has to be fought and won and a law against loitering is the only viable option left to overcome this problem.

No more running around, no more excuses. As long as reason is on their side, let DOLI agents use the strong arm of the law. To dabble on technicalities would only weaken the campaign.

An adversary as powerful as prostitution syndicates, after all, deserve the boldest action.

By a mile and a half

A GUAM-based newspaper came out recently with a typically platitudinous editorial on how leaders of cash-strapped governments "must rethink their spending habits," which was also the opinion piece's title and not "Uh, Duh," as some would suppose after reading it.

Particularly deplorable for the opinion writer is the "almost \$11 million" spent by "past administrations" on Washington lobbyists and consultants, when that money could have been used to—"you guessed it right—"improve the quality of life in the CNMI." It then went on to inform us that "since tourist income—which is a major industry on Saipan—has declined more than 31 percent... residents need to insist that government leaders re-evaluate their spending accordingly." To buttress its painfully banal and thoroughly self-evident "moral of the story," the editorial cited the plight of 350 NMC students who may not be able to graduate "because their CNMI-funded scholarships haven't been paid." It was not mentioned, however, that the "scholarships" are outright grants to students whose families are not necessarily indigent; and that it was the ongoing economic slump, and not the fees paid to lobbyists, that is causing the government revenues to drop faster than Guam leaders could say "We want a commonwealth, too."

In short, the editorial, by pointing out the obvious, missed the point. (See this op-ed's title.) It seemed unable to appreciate, moreover, the extent of the new administration's austerity measures: the reduction in the number of "official trips," government cars and mobile phones; the laying-off of the more expendable government employees; and, perhaps more glaring, the continued non-employment of hundreds of local Republican partisans. The administration, it should be noted, has adopted these austerity measures in a community where the government is the local residents' main, some say sole, employer. Therefore, it is not taking all the austerity measures that need to be instituted? Probably because "this year," according to the editorial, "more than \$400,000 has been spent for lobbying?"

I cover the Hill myself but this is the first time someone in the media has fingered a figure on the CNMI's lobbying expenses so far this year. Which, of course, doesn't necessarily mean that the figure is false. So let's suppose that the number is factual, together with the millions paid by the previous administration to lobbyists, particularly to Preston Gates. What do they prove? Misplaced priorities? Not at all. Considering the dynamics of US con-

gressional politics, and the vulnerability of continued local control over immigration and labor, which used to have critics in both the US GOP and Democratic parties—considering all this, the hiring of Preston Gates two or three years ago was a brilliant, almost inspired, move. Once set loose on D.C.'s Capitol Hill, its lobbyists approached members of the party that is expected to retain its majority for years to come—the GOP. Preston Gates depicted the commonwealth as a place where GOP ideas are already realized, which silenced the CNMI's critics in the party, whose leaders then vowed to help fend off the "liberal" feds.

This is the point that the editorial missed. For the CNMI's leaders, nothing is more important than this economic setup, from which most if not all the blessings every local resident enjoys emanate, including generous grants to college students. Premised on continued local control over immigration and labor, the system, despite the current economic downturn, can still produce \$240 million for the next fiscal year, and that doesn't include the \$6 million from public land revenues. Hence, if this economic setup is threatened, its defense would be, and is, the commonwealth government's main task. The CNMI's leaders, contrary to the homilies of the aforementioned editorial, know what their priorities are.

Indeed, the editorial could have raised more relevant issues, but didn't. It could have, for instance, asked the following questions: Why should a US commonwealth's economic setup still need intensive and "high tech" lobbying in order for it to survive? What kind of a setup is this that has managed to create the modern and tamer, though no less lamentable, equivalent of a caste system in which others could vote and own land, while others could only vote, and most could "only" pay taxes and neither vote nor own land? Why does it continue to attract too much adverse attention and has even been blamed for the miseries of some alien workers? And, despite Preston Gates, why are the CNMI's congressional allies seemingly affected by media reports the commonwealth and its lobbyists consider as "slanted, sensational and exaggerated"? Why should these US House Republicans sponsor a reform legislation that is almost a clone of the Democrats' federal takeover proposal?

The CNMI's leaders, to be sure, need to do some pretty serious rethinking. Not solely about what funds to allocate where, but, more important, what economic setup should accommodate who.

Florida cracks down on insurance fraud

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Dr. John Rende, a 38-year-old dentist in Jacksonville, decided he didn't want to work anymore. But he still wanted to be paid.

So he arranged to have a pair of miscreant brothers, Robert and Kenneth Alberton, chop off his right index finger with an axe. Because he could no longer practice dentistry without the crucial digit, Dr. Rende was set to collect at least \$72,000 a year in disability for nearly three decades. (He was also making a sizable amount from his homeowners insurance policy for the "woodcutting" accident.)

But the Albertons were not satisfied with their cut for the cut, and began pressing the digitless dentist for more money. Dr. Rende got frightened, and went running to the FBI.

Based on his confession and other evidence, in 1994 the Albertons were each sentenced to 33 months in jail for fraud, and were ordered to make restitution. The nine-fingered dentist got 27 months in jail.

The Rende-Alberton case was a rare one at the time for Florida, because the con artists were caught. But lately, this state's officials are cracking down. Workers comp claims had been skyrocketing, and a significant number of them are believed to be fraudulent.

"When claimants steal money by padding claims or faking injuries, we all suffer," charged reform-minded Florida Insurance Commissioner Bill Nelson to our associate Dale Van Atta. Nelson has been applauded by officials in other states for the example he has set by cracking down on fraud.

He believes that the issue is a no-brainer. "Every state should be placing the highest priority on fighting this fraud because we are all paying for it, one way or another. We're all victimized when someone commits workers comp insurance fraud."

Part of his initiative included the impaneling of a grand jury specifically to investigate workers compensation and other insurance fraud. And it was not a moment too soon. It's been costing state taxpayers millions of dollars — and hiked insurance rates, costing businesses and individuals more in premiums.

Until now, the Rende-Alberton case was an exception because it was uncovered and prosecuted. And so was the Lenahan case, one of the most colorful we came across in a thorough investigation of workers comp fraud.

Bill Lenahan, a friendly ex-New York cop known as Uncle Bill to friends and neighbors, was working a private security job when he got into an argument over a parking space with a man who then threw him over the hood of a car. The injury required the removal of a ruptured disc.

Lenahan and his wife, Phyllis, maintained that Dr. Douglas Martin had botched the surgery, which had somehow unsettled his 64-year-old brain. First, the couple applied for a workers comp claim and handily won \$900,000 in workers compensation, including \$60,000 a year paid to Phyllis for the 24-hour care of her husband.

Had the Lenahans stopped there, they might never have been found out. But they got greedy. They lodged a malpractice suit against Dr. Martin and put on a slam-dunk civil suit with seldom-equalled panache. A half-dozen highly respected neurosurgeons pronounced Lenahan mentally incapacitated.

The jury, hearing Mrs. Lenahan's tales of her husband's mental impairment, was moved to tears and awarded him \$2.6 million. The insurance company quickly settled for \$2.25 million.

That should have been the end of it, except Dr. Martin was furious. He couldn't believe his back surgery could have caused such mental problems. He was so sure the Lenahans were faking, that he hired a private investigator to tail Uncle Bill and videotape his movements.

It was hard to keep up with the traveling couple, who used the settlement to buy a fleet of luxury cars, three boats, a custom-built home and two condominiums in the Florida Keys. But with persistence, the gumshoe caught Lenahan dancing a jig, jogging, climbing stairs, and decorating their \$250,000 yacht, as well as conducting numerous coherent conversations with individuals.

Armed with this the civil trial judge vacated the settlement, and Palm Beach prosecutor Moira Laisch tried and convicted them of defrauding the state workers comp system and of grand theft. They were sentenced to seven years in prison and ordered to turn all their assets over to the insurance company.

And the Lenahan lawyers? They had been fooled along with everyone else, consequently maintaining that they should not have to give up their contingency fee, which was a third of the insurance settlement. The courts upheld them: They were allowed to keep the \$750,000, not a dime of which they'd have received if the fraud had been uncovered just minutes before the jury reached its verdict.

How much of our resources are we directing towards youth programs and activities? An insignificant amount and most of it is intended for programs that deal with already troubled youths with virtually zero for preventive and alternative programs.

We have a tilted perspective considering the extravagant spending on luxurious government buildings. It's like buying a cheap car and spending a lot more on repairs.

If we are in agreement that a strong family unit is a key element for social stability then we should reflect on that. Let's build parks and recreational facilities in every village.

Maybe then we won't need to build police substations instead. The prevailing attitude, it seems, is that sports and recreational proposals are considered "pet projects" intended to only serve political ends. It's time to change that outlook.

The media play an instrumental role in promoting positive alternatives for youths. Coverage of sports activities needs to be expanded. Consider it a civic responsibility.

The Church and other religious organizations should reach out to these youths and make an impact on their lives.

Mr. Sam Joyner represents a role model for civic volunteer work. He's definitely making a difference.

The school, yes the school is such a critical factor in this equation. We should focus more on the affective or social/emotional development of children. I think the school as an institution has unintentionally sacrificed that over intellectual growth.

In my visits to schools, I find it rather disturbing not to hear children singing and rarely engaging in social/emotional building activities.

The conscience of this community has been wounded and we are all left a little less secure in our lives.

Let's not let the passing of a youthful life once full of promises go in vain.

Why pay for 'unnecessary' ads?

Dear Editor:
Businesses are required to publicly announce all openings they plan to fill with workers from foreign lands.

So for days on end, week after week, month after month, year in and year out, businesses, in order to comply with labor rules and regulations, must put out job announcements for openings, (to include those that we already know, from years of experience, no local applicants will come forward to apply for).

This requirement is premised on the idea that jobs must be announced for the benefit of all resident and other U.S. eligible applicants who, by law, have first shot at any employment opportunities in the CNMI.

This, even after it has become clear that there are jobs which resident workers, for various reasons, simply don't want. Resident workers

refuse to work in the private sector for reasons ranging from the unrealistic expectations of some employers (particularly in light of management's tendency to compare resident workers versus non-resident workers) to uncertain work environment, from lack of incentives to insensitive management, from the vastly different set of motivational factors that guides local workers than one that guides guest workers, to a take home pay (that doesn't take you home, that is!).

Businesses, however, continue to pay the advertising fees which amount to \$35.00 per print advertisement and up to \$70.00 per radio and/or TV ad thereby demonstrating a real need for workers and pinpointing the shortage of local workers or the hesitancy of these workers to join the private sector for reasons cited above.

Others have argued that businesses either pay these small fees

to bring in foreign workers or adjust salaries and wages in the private sector in order to attract more resident workers.

But while businesses do not appear at all peeved at having to pay these fees, we must question the seemingly unnecessary expenditure.

More, we question the inefficient use of the hard-earned dollar and wonder if perhaps there is a way the government, jointly with the business sector, could put this resource (advertising fees) to more productive ways to improve the lot of resident applicants and job seekers, that is, if business must continue to pay advertising fees to satisfy the requirement of labor rules and regulations.

Requirements made academic by the fact that local workers simply do not want these jobs or that there is simply not enough local workers to fill the jobs.

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Wage board bill OK'd

THE SENATE yesterday passed a bill that proposes the creation of credible minimum wage review committees patterned after the American Samoa's special industry committee.


Once established, the wage review committees would set a minimum wage rate or rates for each industry in the Northern Marianas.

The bill states that the governor, in consultation with the administrator of the Wage and Hour Division of the US Labor Department, will appoint members to the committee.

The bill, S.B. 11-46, was introduced by Senate President Paul A. Manglona (R-Rota), and now heads to the House of Representatives, which will have a session today.

Speaker Diego T. Benavente (R-Prec. 2, Saipan) yesterday said the House leadership is currently reviewing the legislation and will decide whether to act on it today.

Manglona, in a separate interview, said his bill was drafted in consultation with the House leadership and Gov. Pedro P. Tehorio.

Senate Majority Leader Pete P. Reyes (R-Saipan), for his part, described the bill as the fulfillment of the CNMI leaders' promise to the US Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, which conducted a public hearing on the CNMI last March.

"We said we will reform our labor and immigration, and here it is," Reyes said.

No more special interests? Saying that it is in the CNMI's best interest to establish wage review committees, S.B. 11-46 states that its purpose is to facilitate the commonwealth's goal of setting minimum wage rate or rates for each industry, "as rapidly as eco-

nomicly feasible without curtailing economic prosperity."

The bill states that the current

wage and salary review board has been ineffective in accomplishing this goal and should be abolished.

The committees, according to the bill, will be "more broadly representative of the general public and not beholden to or unduly influenced by special interests."

Each industry committee will consist of 11 members:

- Two persons representing employers in the industry, appointed by the governor.

- One CNMI resident representing employers in the industry, appointed by the US Labor

Department's Wage and Hour Division administrator.

- One person representing employees in the industry, appointed by the governor.

- One CNM resident representing employees in the industry, appointed by the administrator.

- One person representing the CNMI's general public, appointed by the governor.

- Five additional members, one appointed each by the US House speaker, the US Senate majority leader, the administrator, the CNMI House speaker, and CNMI Senate president.

Sablan sees no more need for another US Congress hearing

LT. GOV. Jesus Sablan yesterday said there is perhaps no need for another public hearing on the US House Resources Committee's new legislation to reform CNMI's current labor and immigration policies.

"Perhaps US Congress has done a meticulous, arduous and rigorous hearing and the parties have been heard," he told the Variety, referring to the recent US Senate hearing conducted by Sen. Frank H. Murkowski.

Sablan also welcomes the postponement of the planned May 13 hearing since it will provide a lot more time to ana-

lyze the measures.

"It will give us ample time to prepare ourselves so that we can present the position of the Northern Marianas in a more convincing and more competent manner," said Sablan.

The legislation will be introduced by US Rep. Elton Gallegly. It proposes the creation of a CNMI non-voting delegate seat in the US House of Representatives, among others.

Sablan said that he hasn't heard anyone against a non-voting representation in the US Congress for the people of the Northern Marianas.

"For that, whatever analysis comes out, it will be in favor of having a non-voting delegate in the US Congress for the North-

ern Marianas people," he said.

Sablan also said that the CNMI's declining economy may hamper its ability to respond to all identified problems and there is a need for some help from appropriate US government agencies.

He added that with the establishment of US agencies' offices here, there will be more effective enforcement of laws.

"I think that with their and our resources, we can make things a lot better. By resources, I mean not only monetary, but also expertise in the field of enforcement whether in civil rights matter or human rights, or even non-payment of wages," he said.

Miller bill says US universities must take stand vs sweatshops

THE UNITED States House of Representatives has adopted an amendment that requires all the nation's colleges and universities to rid sweatshop and child labor from products bearing their names.

US Rep. George Miller (D-California) introduced the amendment, according to his media release yesterday.

He is urging all schools to follow the lead of several major universities that have adopted codes of conduct.

These codes require companies that manufacture t-shirts, baseball caps and other merchandise bearing the university logo or name to adhere to a rigorous set of labor standards.

Miller's media release said the codes of conduct are "in response to a growing demand by students and consumers to take steps to end the abuse of sweatshops and child labor."

The release did not mention if any of the local garment manufacturers, some of which have

Land dispute rages in Guam

HAGATNA, Guam— Norbert P. Perez, who is charged with obstructing government function, obstructing a public roadway, and reckless conduct, will not give up his fight for his family's property.

He defends himself against the charges without a lawyer.

"I hope they put me in jail, because as soon as I get out, I'm gonna block the road again!" Perez said in an interview after the trial.

Perez insisted that he be allowed to speak in Chamorro during the trial.

Despite the objection by prosecutor Donna Rodriguez, Superior Court Judge Joaquin Manibusan, Jr. on Monday gave in to Perez's request.

In an interview last week, Perez

said he was not asking for special treatment, but "for equal protection under the law. I'm asking for justice," he added.

He said the government of Guam took nearly an acre of his family's land at Cha'ot in Sinajana for the bridge, pump station and pipeline that are there, and to expand Route 4, which used to be a two-lane road.

He explained that the Navy originally condemned the area in the 1930s and deposited \$3,600 with the proper disbursing entity at the time.

The original owners of the land never took the money, and it remains to this day at the U.S. District Court, he said.

Perez said his family bought the land in the 1960s before the federal government turned over excess lands to the Guam govern-

ment. The compensation issue, he said, has never been settled.

Perez was arrested for early last year when he blocked the busy roadway. It was the third time he was arrested for the same offense.

He was arrested along with her mother, but only he was detained for five days.

Four months later, public officials — including Vice Speaker Tony Blaz and several mayors — blocked the road to the Ordof Landfill in protest of its use despite federal threats to fine the government for continuing to violate numerous environmental regulations.

"I'm bringing the government to bear with the issue of discrimination," said Perez who is a Vietnam war veteran. "What did those 71 Chamorros die for? It's ter-

rible! Lakus-hit, something is wrong here, and I'm gonna fix it." "This whole U.S. government was founded on civil disobedience... When I do it, I get pros-

ecuted," he added. Perez had subpoenaed mayors and senators to testify in his defense, but they declined.

House to act today on MVB reorganization bill

SPEAKER Diego T. Benavente (R-Prec. 2, Saipan) said the House of Representatives will act today on legislation that would reorganize the Marianas Visitors Bureau.

A FORMER police sergeant has denied government's allegations that he stole public funds while he was employed with the Department of Public Safety.

Joseph Arriola Flores, through counsel Pamela Brown, waived reading of information and advisement of his rights.

Flores during a hearing in Superior Court pleaded innocent to charges of theft and misconduct in public office.

Associate Judge Edward Manibusan set a status conference on June 29, 1998.

Assistant Atty. Gen. Marvin Williams in the complaint said in Sept. 1995 through Aug. 1996 "unlawfully took the property of the CNMI government by claiming and receiving overtime pay to which he was rightfully entitled to."

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Sec. Zachares leans toward extending May 25 deadline

COMMON sense dictates that there should be more time will be given to allow all of the estimated 40,000 guest workers undergo health tests, acting Labor and Immigration Secretary Mark Zachares said.

Zachares stressed though that government will closely be monitoring progress of the health tests and take appropriate actions should the number of guest workers taking it declines in case an extension is declared.

"We will still enforce strict compliance (of the emergency health regulation)," he assured.

Zachares said a only about one-fourth of the 40,000 nonresident workers have undergone HIV, syphilis and tuberculosis tests in the nearly four months that the regulation has been in effect.

Guest workers are required to take the tests before being issued alien registration cards.

Zachares' calls for an extension echo a similar request made

Wednesday by the Saipan Chamber of Commerce (SCC) which said that it is not "practical" to enforce the May 25 deadline imposed by government on the tests.

Jose C. Ayuyu, in an interview, said the Chamber is considering asking government for an extension.

He said four months is too short a time if all 40,000 guest workers are to undergo the medical check up.

Ayuyu added that most employers can not afford to "get too many people to the health clinics" for fear of hampering business operation.

Acting Health Secretary Joseph Kevin Villagomez had said nonresident workers who fail to secure medical certificates on or before the May 25 deadline may be penalized.

Government implemented an emergency health regulation in February 25 this year after a study by the Center for Disease Control (CDC) showed that TB has reached "epidemic" proportions.

'No need to extend health screening date'— Tenorio

GOVERNOR Pedro P. Tenorio yesterday said there is no thinkable reason to extend the May 25 health screening deadline even if nonresident workers are left with only 18 days left to undergo medical tests and secure health clearances.

"I don't see any reason why [there would be a need to extend health screening] unless there is a very good reason," Tenorio said, when asked if his government would be amenable for an extension of the deadline.

He said the date has already been set, stressing that facilities have also been made available since February to have all 42,000 foreign workers in the Northern Mariana Islands comply with the emergency health screening requirement.

"The date has been set, the facility has been available. I

don't see any reason why they cannot have the screening," he added.

Saipan Chamber of Commerce president Joe C. Ayuyu said the May 25 deadline is not feasible to have all 42,000 foreign workers undergo checks for communicable diseases like HIV, TB and sexually transmitted diseases.

Ayuyu said the period meted out for the testing was not fea-

sible, adding that the Chamber is looking at asking the government for an extension. He said the extension may not necessarily be too long.

"Just enough time to have everybody get their health certificates," he said in an earlier interview with the Variety.

The Department of Public Health on Wednesday issued a warning that penalties will be meted out against nonresident workers who fail to secure health certificates on or before the May 25 deadline.

Acting Health Secretary Joseph Kevin Villagomez said only 15,000 guest workers have been tested so far for HIV, TB and syphilis.

The government enforced the new health screening requirement following reports from Atlanta-based Center for Communicable Diseases indicated that cases of infectious diseases like TB, syphilis and HIV infection TB in the Commonwealth has already reached intolerable proportions.

So far, the public health division has documented four cases of HIV infection from the nonresident labor community. Two workers who tested positive for the AIDS virus have already been deported while the other two are still waiting for the results of their confirmatory tests.

The DPH has received 133 referrals to the Chest Clinic and 52 referrals to the HIV/STD Clinic. To date, there have been 51 new cases of active tuberculosis diagnosed since February 25.

Ten cases of syphilis have been confirmed from a total of 48 referrals. The total number of syphilis cases in 1997 was less than 10, according to Villagomez.

If non-compliance to regs persists

DPH fears TB outbreak

THE PUBLIC health department yesterday expressed alarm non-compliance with the emergency health regulation may put efforts to combat the disease in futile.

Noncompliance among foreign workers has been raising fears of a possible TB outbreak, considering that the disease is already endemic in the CNMI.

Acting Health Secretary Joseph Kevin Villagomez, while admit-

ting that examining all of the remaining 30,000 aliens by May 25 may not be possible, said the deadline remains.

"The public health is at stake. We can't take this issue lightly," he said.

Villagomez is urging all nonresident workers to comply with the emergency health screening regulation, citing the increase in the number of reported cases of HIV infection, syphilis and tuberculosis.

Dr. Artin Mahmoudi, medical director for tuberculosis and lung diseases, said the CNMI has the highest TB rate in the Pacific and in the US mainland.

Mahmoudi said at least 150 for every 100,000 persons in the Northern Mariana Islands are infected or are sick with TB.

This figure is dramatically higher than the rate in the US mainland at eight cases per 100,000 population.

The Commonwealth Health

Center is rooting the increase in TB cases to the influx of nonresident workers to the CNMI.

A disease ethnicity report indicated that 47 percent of TB cases on the island were from among

the Filipino community, followed by the Chamorro, Chinese and Carolinian communities respectively.

Villagomez said TB is a contagious disease.

Hillblom Estate: \$126M in 2 mos.

LARRY Hillblom's estate realized \$125.6 million return on investment in the past two months, according to documents filed in the Superior Court.

Estate executor Bank of Saipan in its activity report said the estate received in March approximately \$1,392,783 while in April the major cash receipt was \$11,422,198 through the DHL International escrow.

BOS Trust Officer Russell K. Snow said that last April 30, the estate earned \$112,835,549 from the sale of Hillblom's all A and B shares in DHL Corporation.

DHLC and DHLI and their

shareholders claimed they had certain rights to purchase the stock owned by a shareholder who died pursuant to a shareholder's agreement.

DHLC and DHLI are both Hillblom's major assets.

The Superior Court had approved an agreement to settle the claims, providing the estate \$112.8 million and \$282 million for DHLC and DHLI shares respectively.

On the other hand, Snow said, the executor anticipates the estate receiving approximately \$55,810,000 later this summer upon closing its sale to Northwest Airlines of all of its interest in Air Partners, L.P..

Another \$1.8 million is expected to be received by that time from Air Saipan, said the Trust Officer in the executor's report.

He added that the estate cash and investment position as of Feb. 28, 1998 was \$279,842,810.

Court papers showed that the estate was estimated to be worth \$600 million to \$700 million and not \$450 million as originally reported by the executor.

The executor has resolved 20 claims, including the heirship petitions by eight Hillblom's alleged children, in the probate which is now on its third year.

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CDA chair throws support Tinian Dynasty a 'success story'

THE CHAIRMAN of the Commonwealth Development Authority board said yesterday the first casino on Tinian is a "success story."
"Since the soft opening of the Tinian Dynasty Hotel and Casino last April 25, it looks like it's going to be a success story," Juan S. Tenorio said.
Tenorio said that since the hotel and casino opened, a new airline, Marianas Air, has started

to fly to Tinian.
Another airline, the Coral Airline, is also planning to come in, and the Northwest also plans to add flights, Tenorio said.
Within the last 10 days about eight private jets have landed on Tinian and Saipan, bringing in casino players from Hong Kong, Taiwan and Japan, Tenorio said.
He said the multiplier effect of the five-star facility, the first on Tinian as well as the CNMI, has resulted in more mom and

pop stores opening on the island.
The smaller hotels have also benefited as they enjoy full occupancy, Tenorio said.
"The whole town itself is blooming," he said.
A lot of people from Saipan have also been trooping to the new hotel and casino not only to take a curious look at its facilities but also to try their luck in the casino's 80 gaming tables and over 400 slot machines.

Tenorio said there are also a lot of Chinese and Koreans going to play in the casino.
He said the Tinian Dynasty "would put us in the map again and lure more investors to Tinian."
The CDA board chairman also expressed optimism for the Commonwealth as he said "we're moving up."
"We are accustomed in reaching the bottom, and we have always survived," Tenorio said.

Bulk of labor cases attributed by Zachares to manpower firms

AROUND 80 percent of all existing labor complaints can be traced to manpower agencies, acting Labor and Immigration Secretary Mark Zachares said.
The bulk of the complaints involve unpaid wages and unprovided work.
"Every major black eye that we got... (are linked) to manpower agencies," Zachares said in an interview.
These, he said, include the infamous Ubongen case which involved close to 200 Bangladeshi workers gypped by a Filipino cabdriver named Segundino Ubongen.
Zachares, citing government investigation on operations of manpower agencies, said most of these firms' only assets are its labor pool.

"That's why we are left stuck with these people (workers) once they (manpower agency operators) pack up and leave (the Commonwealth)," said Zachares.
"Their only assets are their people. Until they can show us fixed assets, they can not be allowed to operate," said Zachares.
The department, late last year, started implementing strict regulations requiring manpower agencies to undergo rigid financial screenings before being allowed to bring in workers.
The move came after a commerce department study showed that manpower agencies are creating an abnormal situation resulting to the unemployment of nonresident workers.
The department also found

out that there were over 400 sham manpower agencies operating in the Commonwealth.
Meantime, the new regulation has been forcing several manpower agencies to transfer their current labor pool to direct employers, fold up and open new establishments, mostly related to the direct employment of workers — guard duty and maintenance firms.
Government records show that there are now over 50 such manpower agencies.
The Department of Labor and Immigration (DOLI), in the past few months, have transferred close to 500 workers from these firms to their direct employers.
Zachares said the regulation is paying off as it has effectively closed down manpower agencies which does not have the financial capability to sustain employment of guest workers.

CDA endorses Tinian bond

THE Commonwealth Development Authority is endorsing the proposed flotation of up to \$150 million by the Tinian municipality, but said its legality has to be ironed out.
In an interview, CDA board Chair Juan S. Tenorio said the CDA is ready to help Tinian in carrying out this project.
"There's a potential income on the local level and that can be used for bridge financing for five years until such time that a permanent financing is established," Tenorio said.
The other day Tinian's legisla-

tive delegation and municipal council adopted a joint resolution authorizing the floating of a maximum \$150-million bond to be used in financing the islands essential infrastructure projects including the expansion and improvement of the air and seaports.
The resolution sets aside no less than \$5 million a year from the island's revenues and unused Covenant funds to pay for the bond.
"It is good that they will be using their local funds, and CDA is in support and is endorsing the concept that Tinian would take (the lead)," Tenorio said.
A past proposal of the Com-

monwealth Ports Authority to float a \$140-million bond didn't get the full support of the Tinian delegation on the issue of repayment, as two delegates did not like the idea of Tinian allotting a portion of the casino revenue.
"It's about time that the Tinian municipality gathered together in harmony and worked together," Tenorio said.
Tenorio said this would be the first time a municipality floats a bond.
However, Tenorio said the CDA will be discussing with its bond counsel the issue of whether Tinian is qualified to float a bond under the Constitution.
The Tinian bond will be discussed in the CDA board meeting Tuesday next week.
Tenorio said there are about four parties interested to finance the infrastructure projects under the build-operate-transfers scheme.
Also, the CDA will be discussing the bond proposal with five underwriters on how to go about the project, Tenorio said.

Legislator alarmed on 'evaporating culture'

A LEGISLATOR yesterday expressed dismay over what he feels is an "evaporating" local culture, as he urged the Arts Council to take aggressive steps in the promotion of the native teachings.
"Our culture is evaporating. With a westernized education that we are getting, I am beginning to sense the departure of our culture," Rep. Oscar Babauta said.
He said the youngsters have also apparently stopped speaking the local Chamorro language, adding that there should be hostile measures that have to be taken promptly to save the vanishing local culture.
"We can't afford to lose our own language," Babauta said.
This is the reason, he said, behind the regulation which obligates both public and private schools to include bilingual subjects in grade and high schools.
"We need concerted effort from volunteer groups, local residents and the Arts Council to intensify the promotion of our local way of life and tradition," he stressed.
Earlier, Rep. Ana S. Teregeyo has espoused the plan of building a CNMI Culture and Performing Arts Center. She introduced a house bill seeking to allocate a special fund for the establishment of the arts center.
She said a special account will be created by the finance department which will set aside 10 percent of the total occupancy tax collected, adding that the fund will be used for all the expenses in the construction and furnishing of the building.

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
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Mother's Day feature:

Mother: The 'tie that binds'

SHE WAS a beautiful and brilliant young girl. She had so many times been tapped to represent her school and her community in several beauty

and talent competitions during her youth.

I would also hear stories how many times she marched on stage reaping medals for her good scholastic standing during her grade and high schools.

She would have been a practicing doctor now had she not become *just a woman*.

I can no longer recall how many times she would sigh in disappointment because she failed to realize her



dreams only because her father believed she was *just a woman* whose world is confined inside the house - to prepare meals, wash the dishes and take care of her children.

Her parents did not allow her to go to college because she would be *just a wife* to a husband who shall do the breadwinning for the family, and *just a mother* to children who would be needing her services at home.

She was told that all she has to learn were how to do the household chores and how to rear her children - no more, no less.

But she was not immediately convinced by her parents' explanation that our culture dictates that *women are just women* confined inside the four corners of the house - that it is a tough man's world outside.

Her parents, however, were determined to stop her from pursuing with her dream to finish college and hold a degree. She says her parents never attended any of her school's recognition programs where she got a medal or two, to discourage her from dream-

ing big. Not even in her high school graduation did her parents show up.

And they have apparently succeeded. Because at 17, a year after she graduated from high school, Sofia married a small-scale businessman about nine years her senior. She was fortunate though. Her husband allowed her to work as a secretary in a big liquor company.

She never became a doctor as she wanted all her life. At least, she was given an equal chance by her husband to pursue a career. But her corporate life was never meant to last long since she had to resign after giving birth to her third baby who suffers from congenital heart disease.

Sofia, since then, devoted all her precious time inside the house taking care of her three, and eventually four, kids without regrets.

But she has promised herself never to deprive her only daughter the same opportunity she had been robbed of only because she was *just a woman*. Sofia allowed her only daughter choose the kind of life and profession she wants to follow.

Her daughter now works as an accounting staff in a leading commercial bank in Manila. Now, Sofia feels the fulfillment she had been dispossessed of. Her two older sons failed to finish college but they are now raising their respective families and their own businesses.

Now, Sofia says she does not regret leaving her corporate career in favor of her family. "Nothing can take place the time a mother spends with her children." For her, the most valuable experience a woman can have is spending full time in her home with her family.

For a lot of people, she was *just a woman*. And I thank God she preferred what she is now. After all, I cannot imagine my father working to earn a living and at the same time wash the dishes and do the laundry.

I can only thank God Sofia is there to do the other half of my father's obligation. We are lucky enough there are *just women* who definitely are more than just a man. Had Sofia not become *just a woman*, there will be no one I can call Mom.

She taught me how to value the role of women in the society. Because of her, I realized that *women are not just women*. They are not just sisters and grandmothers. Not just aunts and nieces. They will be mothers who will always be behind their husbands' and their children's success.

The truth is, women make the difference. For our family, at least, Sofia is the tie that binds.

'Bangladesh protest can hurt ties'

A RANKING federal official said the US State Department is now "looking into" a diplomatic protest recently filed by the Bangladesh government over the alleged abuse of its nationals in the Commonwealth.

This was gathered as a government official privy to ongoing talks on the matter described the concerns being raised by Bangladesh as having "serious" implications on diplomatic relations between the two countries.

"It is serious," the official said requesting anonymity.

Jeff Schorr, in an interview, meanwhile said the State Department is now trying to address the Bangladesh government's protest.

"The State Department is looking into it. I think they will probably arrange something... I don't have the details yet," said Schorr.

"They (federal officials) are trying to resolve this in a positive way with the CNMI government, at some point," he added.

The Bangladesh government's Washington D.C. embassy, in an April 27 letter, requested the State Department "to initiate appropriate measures to enforce, safeguard and uphold the rights and interests of migrant workers from Bangladesh working in the CNMI."

"It appears that workers from Bangladesh were in many cases lured into employment contracts with false promises of lucrative

employment in premium US companies in US leading to US "green cards," the Embassy said.

The Embassy noted that its workers tried to seek legal actions "to hold the employers to their contractual obligations but the authorities have not been helpful."

There are, according to official estimates, close to 2,000 Bangladeshi guest workers in the Commonwealth.

More than half of these have pending complaints of labor abuse filed at the Department of Labor and Immigration (DOLI). The bulk of the complaints involve unprovided work, and unpaid wages.

The department's Administrative Hearing Office (AHO), had, in most of these cases, issued rulings awarding the affected workers tens of thousands of dollars.

However, none has actually received the amount as the erring employers have continuously defied DOLI's directives.

Acting DOLI Secretary Mark Zachares, in a bid to address the problem, has initiated talks with the Attorney General's Office (AGO) to explore the possibility of seizing assets of these employers to have it converted into cash and paid to the workers.

Observers however noted that such move can be an uphill climb as CNMI employers, like those in the US mainland, can have immunity from seizures by declaring bankruptcy.

Marshalls president, speaker feud

MAJURO — Marshall Islands President Imata Kabua warned the nation that Speaker Kessai Note's denial of voting rights to Nitijela (parliament) members in the closing days of the March session has planted the seeds of dictatorship in the Marshall Islands.

The President confirmed this week during a nationally broadcast Continuation Day speech marking the Marshalls 19th anniversary that he and "other defenders of the Constitution will file a lawsuit against the Speaker of the Nitijela for unlawfully removing four votes from a properly called vote in the Nitijela."

In hard-hitting words that were a dramatic departure from the usual pabulum that typifies speeches on these occasions, Kabua declared that "our Constitution is under attack by individuals who have placed political ambition above the law."

In late March, Note declared several Nitijela members, including the President, to have a conflict of interest over two separate pieces of legislation related to imposing a ban on gambling, and prevented the legislators from casting votes.

Legislation to repeal the two year old gambling law was easily

approved 18-7, but a tandem law to ban all gambling except for church-sponsored bingo would have been defeated had Note not disqualified the President and others with business interests in gamb.

But the President said the issue was not about gambling or the church versus the state. "It is about protecting the Constitution and everyone's rights as individuals," he said. He called the Speaker's action a big step "backwards" that "plants the seeds of suppression, intolerance and dictatorship."

He warned that the Speaker's action has far-reaching implications for all Marshall Islanders. "Today, the vote denied just happened to relate to gambling," Kabua said. "In two years it could relate to the election of the President or the confiscation of your property and lands."

The Constitution is under serious threat by the Speaker's actions, he said. "These people have used an insignificant issue to create a law which would authorize new police powers," he said. "This would allow your home or business to be invaded, based solely on suspicion, not the law. They did this in a manner which is against the law and the rules of the Nitijela."

Note was off-island and unavailable for comment.

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

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RP exports rise by 24%

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Strong sales of electronics helped Philippine exports jump 24 percent in March from a year earlier to \$2.47 billion, the government said Wednesday.

March's exports represented an 11 percent increase from the previous month. For the first quarter of 1998, exports totaled \$6.82 billion — also 24 percent higher than a year earlier, the National Statistics Office said.

Shipments of electronics and components rose 48 percent to \$1.28 billion in March and accounted for 52 percent of total exports for the month. Garments exports followed, improving by 1.2 percent to \$195.6 million.

Computer peripherals and parts ranked third among the country's exports with total shipments valued at \$149.6 million, 19 percent higher than a year earlier.

The U.S. market remained the top destination of Philippine exports in March, accounting for \$813.3 million worth of goods. The amount was 19 percent higher than the year-earlier level.

Japan followed, buying \$417.9 million worth of Philippine goods, or 17 percent of Philippine exports.

The Netherlands, owing to continued demand for computer peripherals and inputs, ranked as the Philippines' third most important market, purchasing a total of \$156.6 million worth of goods.

The government announces imports separately each month. In recent months imports have slowed — a result, analysts say, of the region's currency crisis, which has made imports more expensive.

For the first two months of the year, the Philippines' trade deficit plunged to \$1.08 billion from \$1.96 billion a year earlier.

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

Imelda Marcos won't officially withdraw

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Imelda Marcos has decided not to officially withdraw from next week's presidential election in the Philippines, but will not actively campaign, an associate said Thursday.

The widow of former dictator Ferdinand Marcos, facing a jail term and trailing in the polls, announced on April 29 that she would withdraw from the race, leaving the race to 10 other candidates.

Hundreds of supporters physically blocked her, however, when she tried to file an official withdrawal with the Commission on Elections a day later.

One supporter grabbed the withdrawal form from her hand and tore it up.

Mrs. Marcos, known for having a flair for the dramatic, decided not to withdraw formally after some supporters threatened to commit suicide if she officially pulled out of the race,

Fiji tackles issue of doctors

SUVA (Pacnews)—Fiji's health minister, Leo Smith, says the matter of unregistered doctors practising in the country has been discussed with the Public Service Commission to streamline the situation.

Smith was reacting to claims by an expatriate doctor interviewed by Network News that

about 50 of his colleagues are practising without being registered with the Fiji Medical Council, Island Networks Corporation reports.

The minister says if legislation relating to the issue is outdated, it will have to be changed. Smith says the matter has to be sorted out quickly because of the doctor shortage the country is facing.

Elsewhere in the Pacific Bill to help FSM sailors

PALIKIR, Pohnpei (FSMIS)—President Jacob Nena is proposing to Congress the establishment of a sea duty differential pay for the patrol boat personnel of the Maritime Wing of the FSM National Police.

Under the current agreement, with elimination of overtime differential for public service employees which encompass the patrol boat personnel, they are entitled to compensatory time instead.

During several weeks at sea, many hours of compensatory time are accumulated which later are converted to annual leave.

This affects adversely the efficiency and effectiveness of the boat maintenance program, Nena notes.

Additionally, less time was available for boats to spend at sea as personnel are trying to exhaust their accumulated leave hours.

"An employee of the Maritime Wing of the National Police shall be paid his adjusted base salary

for all hours actually worked, up to but not in excess of eight hours per day, in any day or fraction thereof, including the sixth and seventh day of the work week, that he is on duty at sea," said Nena.

"No compensation, regular or overtime, no differential of any sort and no compensatory time shall be due for any additional hours worked in any such day, regardless of how many hours the employee was actually required to work in that day," Nena added.

Hours actually worked while at sea, up to but not in excess of eight hours per day, shall count as straight time for the purpose of determining compensatory time, if any, in a work week spent partially at sea or partially not at sea.

The holiday differential shall apply in lieu of the sea duty differential while at sea on holiday.

The hazardous work differential shall apply in addition to the sea duty differential while at sea, provided that being at sea does not and of itself constitute hazardous work.

"Typhoon emergency differential shall not apply while at sea," Nena said.

The current system has resulted both in reduced morale and less time at sea. The entire patrol program has suffered, Nena reiterated.

2 Samoan men plead innocent on theft raps

APIA (Pacnews)—Two Samoan men charged with alleged theft of over 70,000 tala (\$24,700) in total from the Air New Zealand office at Saleufi entered not guilty pleas through their lawyers Monday at the Supreme Court.

Filemoni Filemoni, 26, of Vailima, is alleged to have stolen 67,376 tala (\$23,800) from Air New Zealand between January 1, 1997 and April 16 1998.

The other man, Ieriko Afamasaga, 31, of Fasitootai, is alleged to have stolen 4,853 tala (\$US1,714) from the airline on March 2.

Court Judge Tiavaasue Palefatu Sapulu granted an adjournment until May 18 on application by prosecutor Andre Volentras, to allow the police to complete their investigations into the alleged offences.

Fiji union raps decision on Air Pacific

SUVA (Pacnews)—The Fiji Aviation Workers Union has described the sale of government's shares in Air Pacific to Qantas as the worst decision made in history by government.

Union leader Attar Singh says valuable profits from the company which could have been reinvested into Fiji's economy will be drained overseas, Island Networks Corporation reports.

Singh says the money will be sent away overseas and will not be used to create any employment within the airline and the country. Qantas now has 46 percent shares in the national airline.

The Fiji government Tuesday agreed to sell more Air Pacific shares to the Australian airline, which will now hold a total of 49 percent of shares in the Fiji carrier.

The Fiji government will retain the majority 51 percent share.

Estrada solidifies lead

MANILA, Philippines (AP)—Vice President Joseph Estrada, the main opposition candidate in next week's presidential elections in the Philippines, has solidified his lead, according to a survey published Thursday.

Estrada received a support rating of 33 percent, 18 points ahead of his closest rival, ruling party candidate Jose de Venecia, the Social Weather Stations survey organization said.

Estrada has dominated the field of 11 presidential aspirants in all five surveys conducted by the widely-respected polling group since January. A former movie star and college dropout, he has admitted to woman-

izing, heavy drinking and gambling in the past.

An SWS survey last week gave Estrada a 32 percent rating.

Despite his apparent popular support, some business groups worry that Estrada does not have the ability to lead the country's economy to continued strong growth.

Estrada and his running mate, Edgardo Angara, visited the Manila Stock Exchange Thursday to seek support from the business community.

"You have nothing to fear from an Estrada presidency, which is sure to come," Angara said.

"We must be partners for progress," Estrada told the traders in a brief

speech.

Ruling party candidate De Venecia received 15 percent support in the SWS survey, published in the Manila Standard newspaper.

De Venecia has served as House speaker and has a reputation as a wheeler-dealer. But he has been credited with mustering congressional support for President Fidel Ramos's economic reform agenda.

Sharing third place with 11 percent each were Senator Raul Roco and businessman Emilio Osmena. Manila Mayor Alfredo Lim, who is backed by former President Corazon Aquino, placed fifth with 10 percent and former Defense Secretary

Renato de Villa was sixth with 6 percent.

The ruling party vice presidential candidate, Senator Gloria Arroyo, received 42 percent support, far ahead of Angara's 18 percent. Presidents and vice presidents are elected separately and need not be from the same party.

Ramos is limited by the Philippine constitution to a single, six-year term and will step down June 30.

The election to replace him is scheduled for next Monday.

SWS said it polled 1,500 voters nationwide from May 2 to 4 for its latest survey, which has a margin of error of 3 percentage points.



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
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


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
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
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Fans mourn Japan guitarist

TOKYO (AP) — Tens of thousands of fans flocked to the funeral Thursday of a popular hard rock guitarist who killed himself last week. The rocker's death has already led three young women to try to kill themselves. The line of grieving fans

stretched for several kilometers (a few miles) outside the Buddhist temple in central Tokyo where services were held for Hideto "Hide" Matsumoto, guitarist for the band X-Japan. Police mobilized helicopters, boats and about 100 officers.

Another 170 private security guards were deployed to keep the throng of fans from disrupting traffic. Most of the fans were in their teens or early twenties and were clad in black clothes. Many had brightly dyed hair, a trademark of

Matsumoto's band, which broke up last September. Alarmed by the big turnout, the temple set up a first-aid room after about 12,000 fans

visited the temple for Matsumoto's wake Wednesday.

Ambulances were on hand Thursday to treat fans overcome by the heat.

Police had no official estimate of the crowd size Thursday, but it appeared to be well over 20,000.

The guitarist's death has generated an alarming outpouring of emotion.

A 14-year old girl tried to hang herself Monday night at her home in Tokyo using a towel tied around her neck, the same method Matsumoto used to kill himself, according to Japanese media reports.

Matsumoto killed himself last Saturday.

Another girl jumped from a bridge Monday night, and police were investigating her identity, the reports said.

Both girls were in critical condition.

On Wednesday, a 19-year girl who attended the wake and was taken to the emergency room cut her wrist with a paper knife.

She was taken to a hospital but had only superficial cuts, said a monk at the temple, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

X-Japan was among Japan's most popular hard rock bands before it broke up last September.

The band, whose hits included "Tears" and "Endless Rain," held its farewell concert on New Year's Eve.

Report: Japan Finance official hangs himself

TOKYO (AP)—An official who worked at Japan's beleaguered finance ministry has hanged himself, police said Thursday, just days after the suicide of a senior central bank executive.

Koji Onishi, 28, was discovered hanging Wednesday night in his room in a Finance Ministry dormitory in Tokyo, said police spokesman Shigetada Nagaoka.

He was the third finance ministry official to commit suicide so far this year.

Onishi was a junior official in the ministry's International Finance Division. Because of his young age, he was unlikely to

have been involved in a bribery scandal that has rocked Japan's most powerful bureaucracy. Kyodo News reported.

"This is something I decided by myself," read a suicide note found in his room.

The ministry has been a primary target of an investigation into influence-peddling by bureaucrats who were wine and dined by banks and other businesses subject to government regulation.

On Saturday, Takayuki Kamoshida, the Bank of Japan's chief executive in charge of anti-corruption efforts, hanged himself in Tokyo.

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Prominent politician foresees:

'Less power' for HK Legislature

HONG KONG (AP) — Hong Kong's first elected legislature under Chinese rule will have less power than its predecessor, and many people feel the relatively toothless body won't be worth voting for, a prominent politician said Wednesday.

Pundits have predicted voting on May 24 may be marred by low turnout, despite a costly government registration drive and a TV and poster campaign to stimulate interest.

The government has promised the legislature will be credible,

and international organizations have acknowledged its efforts to ensure fair elections.

Many believe one reason for reduced public interest in voting is "they doubt very much the efficacy of their vote," said Margaret Ng, a well-known barrister who was a member of Hong Kong's last elected legislature.

China disbanded that body when it took over in July 1997, saying it did not agree with the rules that produced it.

Under a new voting system, just 20 of the legislature's 60

members will be chosen by direct vote on May 24. Thirty seats will be chosen by an elite from selected professions, and 10 will be chosen by an electoral college of 800.

The system is largely a hold-over from British rule and gives great weight to Hong Kong's business and professional community, at the expense of middle- and lower-income voters.

The public feels "the whole election system is a sham. ... Everybody, I think, being hu-

man, wants to participate in such things which have power and make a difference, and are much less enthusiastic about participating in something which is only a gesture," Ng said.

Ng, who is seeking re-election in the legal constituency, said two new provisions in Hong Kong's China-written constitution would limit the power of the legislature.

Written permission from Hong Kong's China-appointed leader, the chief executive, must be obtained before a lawmaker

can introduce a motion that affects government policy — a "very big limitation" on their power, Ng said.

And new voting procedures within the legislature would make it harder to pass any such motion, she said.

Under the new constitution, Hong Kong, which has never elected its government or leader, will continue to have an executive-led government, but the number of directly elected members of the legislature is to rise to 30 over the next 10 years.

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Malaysian gov't, union debate joblessness rate

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — The government claims that 44,000 workers have lost their jobs during the economic slowdown, a figure disputed by trade unions.

Last year saw 18,863 layoffs, while another 25,210 workers lost their jobs from Jan. 1 through April 18 this year, Deputy Human Resources Minister Kadir Sheikh Fadzir told the New Straits Times for Wednesday editions.

The statistics were released Tuesday amid an ongoing debate between the government and the Malaysian Trades Union Congress (MTUC) over unemployment figures.

The trade union had been quoted earlier this week as saying that a half-million people were expected to be out of work by the end of the year, a staggering figure challenged by the human resource ministry.

Kadir told Parliament Tuesday that unemployment was not a serious problem and claimed that nearly all the laid-off workers had found other jobs.

In addition, the country still had 1.2 million legal foreign workers, while a shortage of workers was still being seen in the plantation industry, he said.

MTUC secretary-general G. Rajasekaran stood by its 500,000 figure and defended the trade union's right to derive its own estimates on unemployment figures since the government had failed to provide one.

Rajasekaran was quoted in local newspapers Wednesday as saying that the union based its figures on the projected decrease in the economic growth rate from 8 percent in 1997 to 2.3 percent this year.

He urged the government to provide a detailed forecast of the unemployment figure before telling trade unionists to be silent on the issue.



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Thousands protest labor laws

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Fueled by a bitter and protracted docks dispute, tens of thousands of unionists and supporters marched through Australia's second largest city Wednesday to protest the federal government's labor laws.

The crowd, estimated by police to be 75,000-strong but which organizers claimed swelled to more than 100,000, halted traffic as it marched through Melbourne and rallied at an inner city church to hear speeches and messages of support from international trade union organizations.


Leaders of various unions said the current battle for control of the nation's docks between government-backed Patrick Stevedores' Holding Pty. Ltd.'s moves to reform its ports by firing 1,400 union workers and hiring non-union labor.

The plan was short-circuited by the courts, which ruled firing workers just for being members

of a union is illegal. Patrick's docks remained frozen Wednesday as a stand-off continues between the union and the company about security on the docks.

The union has refused to return to work until guards who took part in locking out unionized workers on April 7 are replaced by guards unconnected to the dispute.

The company has refused to replace the guards and says security is needed to protect company managers and equipment.

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Anti-uranium protesters storm North Ltd. offices

BRISBANE, Australia (AP) — Demonstrators stormed offices of resources company North Ltd. Wednesday to protest the plan building of uranium mine in Australia's Northern Territory.

Five anti-uranium protesters occupied part of the companies offices in Brisbane for longer than two hours, offering staff cups of tea they claimed was made with water from a creek contaminated by a North Ltd. subsidiary company.

"None of them (the staff) accepted it, funnily enough," protesters' spokeswoman Kate Lecchisaid.

North owns 64 percent of Energy Resources of Australia, which operates the Ranger uranium mine in the Northern Territory and plans to open a second mine at nearby Jabiluka.

Protesters wearing mock radia-


tion suits hung banners from the roof of the North office, and asked investors not to invest in environmentally irresponsible companies.

"We are informing North shareholders that their hard-earned money is being used to create 60 million (metric) tons of radioactive waste in Kakadu," Lecchisaid, referring a national park surrounding the Ranger and Jabiluka mining leases.

"Shareholders should divest themselves of North shares or call on North to stop uranium mining activities."

An ERA spokeswoman, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the company "respects the right of the protesters to protest, as long as they don't break any laws."

There were no arrests at Wednesday's protest.

Japan arrests 12 'illegals'

TOKYO (AP) — A 36-year-old woman and an 18-year-old man were among a group of 12 Chinese arrested in the port city of Kobe Wednesday for trying to sneak into Japan by hiding in a cargo container, a police spokesman said.

The Chinese, ranging in age from 18 to 48, are suspected of violating Japan's immigration laws, said Tetsuo Nakayama of the harbor police in Kobe, 435 kilometers (272 miles) west of Tokyo.

The arrested Chinese, all from the southeastern province of Fukien, carried no passports, Nakayama said. The group was discovered after a security guard at the port heard noise coming from inside a container that had been unloaded from a Panamanian-registered vessel on Monday.

The container came from the Chinese city of Talian and according to shipping documents was supposed to have carried 20 boxes of silk mats.

Nakayama said the arrested Chinese told police they were hoping to find jobs in Japan. Each paid about 1.5 million yen (\$11,450) to an unidentified man who arranged the trip, the police spokesman said.

Police said they are investigating whether Chinese gangsters, known "Snakeheads," were involved in arranging the entry attempt. Meanwhile, police in Tokyo said

Wednesday they have arrested two Chinese alleged to be members of the Snakeheads on charges of confining another Chinese, who was also arrested on a charge of illegally entering Japan.

A police spokesman identified the two alleged gang members arrested as Shi Yianbo, 35, a construction worker, and Zong Zhiqing, 29, a shop employee.

Shi and Zong allegedly confined Li Lifang, 30, at Shi's apartment in Tokyo on Tuesday, forcing her to pay part of travel expenses from China to Japan, said the police spokesman who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Li, who told police she has entered Japan illegally under arrangements of the Snakeheads in January, was found after she called a friend for help on a cellular phone, the police spokesman said.

Last year, a total of 1,360 foreigners were arrested for trying to enter Japan illegally, more than double the figure for all of 1996, according to National Police Agency figures.

Of the total arrested, about 90 percent were Chinese.

Australia launches \$10M aid package to Indonesia

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — The Australian ambassador flew to the drought-hit province of Irian Jaya Wednesday to launch a \$10 million aid package of food, medicine and supplies.

"As a close neighbor and friend of Indonesia, Australia has a strong humanitarian concern for the welfare of the Indonesian people," the Australian Embassy said in a statement.

Ambassador John McCarthy was to witness the first delivery of supplies from the city of Wamena to Baliem Valley, the area worst-hit by the drought, the statement said.

The drought relief team, which includes a 90-member task force of Australian and Indonesian military personnel, will use three Black Hawk helicopters, a Caribou aircraft and a Hercules plane to air-lift supplies to remote villages.

Several tons of food, medicine and other supplies are expected to be delivered to about 90,000 people over the next two months.

The Australian Agency for International Development said last month that some 563 people had died due to malnutrition from the drought in the past year in the Wamena region.

Australia has contributed about \$50 million in aid to Indonesia since forest fires and economic turmoil swept the archipelago last year, the statement said.

Irian Jaya, which borders Papua New Guinea, is one of Indonesia's poorest regions.



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New Thai central bank chief

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — The Thai Cabinet approved the appointment of the blunt-spoken Chatu Mongkol Sonakul as central bank governor Wednesday in an effort to overhaul the institution, badly discredited in the country's economic crisis.

Chatu Mongkol, who quit as Finance Ministry permanent secretary in a row with the previous government over the crisis last year, is expected to restore independence to a bank that had become a tool of political and business interests in recent years.

Chatu Mongkol replaces Chaiyawat Wibulswadi, who announced his resignation Monday after nine months as Bank of Thailand governor.

Chaiyawat was blamed in a report on the bank's failings for squandering the country's foreign reserves in a failed defense of the baht against currency speculators.

The baht ultimately went into free-fall, triggering a chain reaction of economic crises across Asia. Thailand, Indonesia and South Korea have been forced to seek some

\$120 billion in bailouts led by the International Monetary Fund.

Chatu Mongkol's appointment still needs all-but-certain approval by King Bhumibol Adulyadej, a distant cousin.

Chatu Mongkol, 54, has garnered many enemies during a long career for shooting down financial policy proposals from corrupt politicians.

The reputation is expected to serve him and the government of Prime Minister Chuan Leekpai, which needs to increase the Bank of Thailand's credibility to restore investor confidence and lift the economy out of recession.

The report says the bank should surrender power to supervise financial institutions to a new agency and instead focus on doing a better job on monetary and exchange policy.

The Bank of Thailand eminently failed to oversee the operations of banks and finance companies, often pumping in money to trouble agencies without adequate checks.

More than half of Thailand's financial institutions have been declared insolvent and closed or taken over by the government due to huge amounts of bad loans.

Australian envoy sees some changes, and problems

By PAUL ALEXANDER HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — When Sue Boyd arrived in Hanoi 3 1/2 years ago to take up her post as Australian ambassador, there were no traffic lights and only two foreign restaurants.

Things have changed a lot since then, at least cosmetically. But as Boyd prepares to transfer to Hong Kong, what she sees are the challenges that remain as Vietnam slowly opens to the world.

She readily admits there is a tendency to forget the improvements and expect too much too quickly.

At the same time, "The last 10 years, they have made the easy changes," Boyd said Wednesday at a farewell lunch with reporters.

The political security that has attracted foreign investors comes at a price, she said.

Such stability is the result of a rule-by-consensus system that makes tackling fundamental changes difficult.

So while Vietnam is seeking more investment to fuel growth and improve living conditions, foreign businessmen are waiting to see if the government will come through on promises to improve the climate by slashing red tape and reducing insidious harassment.

From an Australian perspective, that means opening up the insurance sector, creating more favorable conditions for mining companies to operate and generally easing the day-to-day hassles that plague foreigners living and operating in the country.

Boyd realizes that major changes — necessary for a trade agreement to the United States, then membership in the World Trade Organization — will be painful, with unemployment rising as inefficient state enterprises shed jobs.

The ruling Communist Party relies on grassroots support, and there is no government safety net for those who will be idled.

"They must be very aware of what happened in Poland, East Germany and Hungary," she said, referring to former communist regimes that failed under public pressure to reform.

Boyd said change in Vietnam traditionally has come in times of crisis, and that the fallout from the Asian financial troubles are providing a "window of opportunity."

"Some are saying that now is a big enough crisis to mobilize change," she said. "The great incentive is to stay in power."

The new leadership — the party general secretary, prime minister and president all have been chosen several months ago — has shown some positive signs, but it remains to be seen if they will follow through on their promises.

Lawmakers hit Israel pressure

By Jim Abrams WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Newt Gingrich strongly condemned White House pressure on Israel to compromise on territorial issues, saying the administration has become pro-Arafat and is blackmailing Israel.

Gingrich was joined by lawmakers from both parties Wednesday in alleging that the administration is trying to force a solution in the Middle East that would be against the best interests of Israel.

President Clinton said at a news conference it was Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu who first advocated a faster pace toward talks on a final settlement between Israel and Yasser Arafat's Palestinian Authority.

"I have tried to find a way actually to do what he suggested," Clinton said. "I have done my best for a year now to find the formula that would unlock the differences between them to get them into those final status talks. That's all I am trying to do. There is no way in the

world that I could impose an agreement on them or dictate their security to them even if I wished to do that, which I don't."

At his own news conference, Gingrich, R-Ga., said: "Now it's become the Clinton administration and Arafat against Israel."

On Israel's 50th anniversary, Gingrich said, "The Clinton administration says 'Happy birthday. Let us blackmail you on behalf of Arafat.'"

The administration has indicated that the holding of a White House ceremony next week to open final status talks depends on Israel's agreement to a U.S. proposal to withdraw from 13 percent of occupied West Bank territory.

Arafat has agreed to the proposal, but Netanyahu has warned he will reject any invitation that comes with an effort to dictate the scope of any withdrawal.

Secretary of State Madeleine Albright, in an interview Wednesday on PBS' "The NewsHour with Jim Lehrer," said convening the talks Monday remains conditional on Netanyahu's acceptance of the U.S. proposal.

"He has to make his own assessment as to whether he thinks that the ideas that we've presented provide a basis for this process to go forward," Albright said.

Gingrich sent Clinton a letter Wednesday saying that America's most loyal ally in the Middle East "should not be punished with threats and ultimatums."

A separate letter, signed by a majority of the House's 435

members, also said conditioning Israel's participation in the talks to an American plan "would be counterproductive."

"It's absolutely outrageous," said Bill Paxon, R-N.Y., a sponsor of the letter. The administration position is "nothing short of extortion when it comes to trying to force the hand of Israel."

State Department spokesman James Foley denied that the United States was attempting to hand Israel an ultimatum.

"I can certainly assure you today that the U.S. has no intention of issuing any kind of diktats or ultimatums to a good friend such as Israel," Foley said.

He said the United States sees the invitation for a Monday meeting at the White House as a "strategic opportunity to put the peace process — which is in the interests of Israel, the Palestinians, the United States and all the peoples of the Middle East — back on track."

Kaczynski joins 'most dangerous' at Co. jail

FLORENCE, Colorado (AP) — Unabomber Theodore Kaczynski has been put behind bars at Supermax, joining some of the nation's most dangerous criminals at a \$60 million federal prison dubbed the Alcatraz of the Rockies.

Twelve-foot (3.5-meter) fences topped with razor wire and a cell with a concrete bed and a chair greeted Kaczynski, who began serving four life sentences plus 30 years on Tuesday for a bombing spree that left three dead and 29 injured.

The 55-year-old mathematician was sentenced in Sacramento, California, on Monday under a plea bargain that spared him a possible death sentence.

Kaczynski joins Oklahoma City bomber Timothy McVeigh; Ramzi Yousef, mastermind of the World Trade Center bombing; and Charles Harrelson, the hitman father of TV and film star Woody Harrelson.

The high-security federal prison opened in 1995 in this town of 3,500 people about 100 miles (160 kilometers) southwest of Denver.

Kaczynski, like all newcomers and prisoners deemed dangerous, was placed in solitary confinement.

He will be locked down 23 hours a day in a 12-by-7-foot (3.5-by-2-meter) cell designed so that inmates cannot make eye contact with other prisoners or see anything except walls and sky.

Solitary confinement inmates cannot go to the library or the dining room or attend religious services.

A courtroom inside the prison ensures inmates never have to leave the grounds.


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Pilgrims the first to use Malaysia's new airport

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — A group of Muslim pilgrims returning from Mecca Wednesday became the first passengers to use Kuala Lumpur's new international airport.

Led by Deputy Transport Minister Mohamad Ali Rustam, a group of Malaysian officials greeted the 340 pilgrims at the 9 billion ringgit (\$2.4 billion) airport, whose first phase was completed despite the economic crisis that has forced the government to put off many expensive projects.

The airport will be one of the largest in Southeast Asia once it is completed.

It opened with one operational runway and facilities to handle 25 million passengers and 1.2 million tons of cargo annually.

When finished, it is expected to have five runways and a capacity of 60 million passengers a year.


The new airport is being built to ease congestion at the existing Sultan Abdul Aziz Shah Airport that serves Kuala Lumpur.

Malaysian pilgrims arrive at Kuala Lumpur's new international airport Wednesday, the first passengers to use the \$2.4 billion airport. AP

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


JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — President Suharto will attend the meeting of the Group of 15 developing nations in Cairo on May 11-13, the government said Wednesday. Foreign Minister Ali Alatas said the 76-year-old leader will leave for Cairo on Saturday.

The announcement came as rioters looted in the northern city of Medan for a third day.

Alatas said the current economic crisis in Southeast Asia will be the main topic of the meeting.

The last G-15 meeting was held in Kuala Lumpur in November.

Suharto will remain in Cairo after the G-15 meeting to hold talks with Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak.

The two leaders will discuss ways of strengthening ties between the two developing nations, Alatas said.

Suharto is scheduled to return to Indonesia on May 15.

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Farmer to live with snakes in record attempt

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A farmer, who claims he can speak snake language, says he plans to live a record-breaking week with 100 of the poisonous reptiles in a glass-encased room.

"We are friends. We understand each other," said Boonruang Buachan, 29, when contacted by telephone inside his snake-infested chamber in a Bangkok shopping mall.

Used to the tough upcountry life, Boonruang said he was more worried about catching a cold from

the air-conditioning than the fangs of cobras and other deadly snakes that slither over him.

Boonruang, who began his cohabitation Tuesday, said he would break a Ripley's "Believe it or not" record if he managed to stay a full week.

Besides claiming he can easily communicate with the animals, Boonruang believes that in his previous life he was a "Prince of Snakes," a creature of Thai mythology.

Boonruang said he's been around snakes since his childhood in

Sisaket, a poor northeastern province, and only been bitten once. That's when he tried to stop a drunk man from a snake attack.

The only protective device he has donned are goggles to prevent some possibly poisonous saliva from accidentally entering his eyes when he curls the snakes around his neck and head.

The idea for the snake live-in came from Television Channel 7 which had earlier filmed Boonruang's remarkable relationship with snakes.

A room was arranged on the fourth floor of the Bang Khae Mall which has already attracted thousands of viewers. Boonruang performs two shows a day, playing with what he calls his "pets, like cats and dogs" and commanding them to "play dead."

Fifty of the snakes, he said, are his own, while the television station provided the others.

Also introduced into the snake pit Tuesday were 20 kilograms (44 pounds) of live frogs which will probably be enough to feed the snakes for a week.

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
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Samsung plans to downsize

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Samsung, South Korea's biggest conglomerate, said Wednesday it will drastically cut its debt and shed subsidiaries to help it weather the nation's financial crisis.

Industry officials said other conglomerates, including Daewoo, LG and SK, are expected to follow suit this week.

President Kim Dae-jung is urging the country's conglomerates to slim down under remedies imposed by the International Monetary Fund, which organized a record \$58 billion bailout package for South Korea in December.

Unbridled expansion by the conglomerates has been cited as a major reason for South Korea's financial woes. A typical conglomerate maintains 40 to 50 subsidiaries under its wing.

On Wednesday, Samsung said it will focus on electronics, financing, services and one or two other unspecified businesses while selling all or part of the minor subsidiaries.

But it did not say whether its future core businesses would include auto manufacturing. Samsung's entry into the auto market this year triggered angry reactions from other car makers and raised concern over a supply glut at home and abroad.

Samsung said it will use the money from selling subsidiaries to reduce its debt-to-equity ratio

from the current 317 percent to 200 percent by the end of next year. It also plans to dispose of billion of dollars of real estate.

In April, Samsung Heavy Industries Co. announced a \$765 million deal to sell its construction-equipment division to Volvo Construction Equipment Corp. of Sweden.

One of the key conditions of the IMF's bailout is a restructuring of South Korea's heavily indebted, family-oriented conglomerates.

Eight of them collapsed last year with heavy debts, aggravating the overall crisis.

The IMF is requiring big South Korean businesses to adopt a new consolidated accounting system that gives a clearer picture of their financial status.

With the old bookkeeping system, South Korea's big businesses have been accused of spreading their losses among numerous subsidiaries.

Samsung Electronics Co., for

example, reported \$89.5 million in profit last year. But under the new accounting system, which would include debt by its subsidiaries, the company actually had a \$442 million loss, according to the Korea Stock Exchange.

The old system has allowed big businesses to expand quickly, but when a subsidiary collapsed, the rest of the conglomerate also went under in a chain reaction.

That happened last year when eight of the nation's top 30 conglomerates, including Halla,

Sammi and Kia, collapsed with huge debts in bank loans. Korean conglomerates have grown in close partnership with past military-backed governments.

Their aggressive expansion enabled them to produce cheap products as diverse as cars, garments and television sets.

But they also have been accused of sponging up most of the nation's available credit, using unfair pricing to kill off smaller competitors and concentrating wealth in a few families.

Korean guilty of stealing military computer chips

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The Defense Ministry said Wednesday it was investigating whether classified electronic maps were divulged by a man convicted of stealing military computer components.

The man, identified only by his last name Park, was sentenced to a suspended 10-month prison term by a South Korean court Wednesday on a theft charge.

Park, 27, was a former employee of a South Korean company that makes electronic maps for the military.

He was accused of sneaking into the company's office within the Defense Ministry headquarters in December and stealing three computer hard disks and five computer chips.

He later sold them for 560,000 won (\$418) in a Seoul electronics market, prosecutors said.

Only one of the hard disks has been retrieved, they said. Park testified that he stole the goods to retaliate for his dismissal early last year.

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New Sri Lanka law to punish unlicensed practicing doctors

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — People practicing medicine without licenses can be jailed up to six months in Sri Lanka under a new law voted by Parliament on Tuesday.

As against 6,000 registered doctors in Sri Lanka, an estimated 75,000 unlicensed

people run clinics, mostly in villages, health ministry officials say.

Under the new law, those found guilty can also be fined up to rupees 50,000 (\$ 820).

If a person violates the law even after conviction, the fine and prison terms could be doubled.

Government subsidizes health services for 18 million Sri Lankans, but health centers don't have enough doctors, equipment or medicines.

The poor people often visit clinics run by unlicensed people who offer cheaper medical services.

Peace and order in Bangladesh 'at a low'

DHAKA, Bangladesh (AP) — Politicians have teamed up with criminals to nearly destroy law and order in Bangladesh, business leaders said.

In a strongly worded statement published Tuesday, leaders of the country's Chamber of Commerce and Industry and its affiliated bodies referred to the armed thugs who regularly extort money from or kidnap business people.

Many of the thugs work for political parties, who use them to intimidate political opponents and allow them to prey on businesses in exchange.

"All political parties seem to

have developed a mind set that they need armed criminals to ensure support for their political program," the business leaders' statement said.

"The unholy alliance between the political parties and criminals have brought about near collapse of law."

The statement urged the government and political parties to rededicate themselves to the rule of law, saying the morale of the business community has been "devastated by the unabated incidents of abduction of businessmen, rape, murder and hijacking."

Tamil rebels stop fighting as UN officials does visits

COLOMBO, Sri Lanka (AP) — Tamil Tiger rebels began a two-day cease-fire Wednesday as a top U.N. official probing the effect of war on children visited Sri Lanka's northern battle ground.

Olara Otunnu, special representative of U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan, left by road for the northern city of Vavuniya early Wednesday to meet government officials, military and Tamil Tiger representatives.

"We have every reason to believe that Mr. Otunnu's mission is going on well," said Arbe Ofstad, a U.N. official in Colombo.

Sri Lankan military officials said there were no reports of any fighting in the north and east theaters, where sporadic clashes are usually a daily occurrence.

The Tigers announced Sunday they would observe a unilateral cease-fire Wednesday and Thursday, apparently timed to coincide with Otunnu's visit

to the war theater.

Otunnu arrived Sunday on a week-long visit to Sri Lanka, one of the few countries identified by the U.N. as needing special attention to protect its children.

Otunnu is driving from Colombo to the government controlled Vavuniya town, 210 kilometers (130 miles) to the north, because there are no civilian flights to the area.

Otunnu will visit rebel-held territories near Vavuniya. He is scheduled to spend Wednesday at the rebel-controlled town of Madhu, near a 19th century Catholic shrine that now houses tens of thousands of Tamils who have fled the fighting.

The Tigers have been fighting since 1983 to create a homeland for the Tamil minority they say is discriminated against in jobs and education by the Sinhalese majority.

More than 52,000 people have been killed in the ethnic war.

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

Joining Clinton at a news conference, Italian Prime Minister Romano Prodi said Kosovo was a "hot point" in the Balkans and "a source of worry for us." More than 150 people have died in the restive Serbian province where ethnic Albanians make up more

than 90 percent of the population. After three hours of talks, Clinton and Prodi played down tensions caused by the deaths of 20 people when a U.S. Marine jet sliced through a gondola cable in the Italian Alps last February.

Clinton said it was "a horrible human tragedy" and "my regret is profound." He said he would ensure that "we behave in a completely honorable way" to rectify the tragedy.

Prodi said he was awaiting developments but added that "I've seen a deep involvement of the American political authorities."

With the two leaders trading effusive compliments, Prodi proclaimed a "magic moment of American-Italian relations. We have no point of disagreement." Clinton said the prime minister, who took office in 1996, has led Italy "on a path of fiscal responsibility and genuine recovery."

The president said they were both deeply concerned about tensions in Kosovo, a province of Serbia, which is Yugoslavia's dominant republic.

"The absence of a genuine dialogue there is fueling a conflict that could threaten regional stability," Clinton said.

"We're working urgently to establish unconditional talks that can avert escalating violence."

"But we must and will be ready to substantially turn up the pressure on Belgrade should it keep blocking the search for a political solution, or revert to indiscriminate force," Clinton said.

Last week, the United States and other leading countries authorized sanctions against Yugoslavia to pressure President Slobodan Milosevic into peacefully solving the crisis. Only Russia abstained from adopting the sanctions.

Keeping alive the possibility of sending allied troops to Kosovo, Clinton said, "No option should be ruled out. We do not want another Bosnia in Kosovo. Too many people have died there already in indiscriminate violence."

Clinton said the Serbs "don't want to give up a big part of their

country which they believe — and is — legally part of their country. So they obviously need to sit down and talk through how the legitimate aspirations of the Kosovo Albanians can somehow be manifest in giving them some measure of self-government and decision-making authority over their lives within the framework of Serbia."

Prodi said he agreed, but cautioned that sending troops is potentially dangerous because they become potential hostages.

Meanwhile, the chief U.S. mediator for the Balkans, Robert Gelbard, told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the outbreak of violence in Kosovo "has the potential, if allowed to spiral out of control ... to threaten stability, not just in Yugoslavia, but in the region as a whole."

"Despite repeated warnings, Belgrade so far has blocked unconditional dialogue," he said, adding, "I want to be very clear."



More than 150 people have died in a two-month Serb crackdown on ethnic Albanian militants.

Kosovo Albanian leader

Ibrahim Rugova, meanwhile, repeated that any talks on Kosovo's future should be held under third party mediation and in a neutral country — conditions Serbia rejects.

Last week, the United States and other key world powers introduced sanctions on Yugoslavia to pressure President Slobodan Milosevic into peacefully solving the crisis. Only Russia abstained.

There were no details on Wednesday's attack on the police unit, but the assault appeared to be the

work of the Kosovo Liberation Army, the clandestine armed ethnic Albanian group that has claimed responsibility for dozens of killings of Serbs and pro-Serb ethnic Albanians since 1996.

Tanjug, the state-run news agency of Yugoslavia, reported that two people — one a Serb, the other an ethnic Albanian loyal to Serbia — were killed Monday and Tuesday by the Kosovo Liberation Army.

The body of an unidentified third man was also found Tuesday.



PRISTINA, Yugoslavia (AP) — Ethnic Albanian militants seeking to wrest Kosovo province from Serbia attacked a Serb police patrol on Wednesday, killing one officer and wounding two, police said. An attacker was also killed.

Ethnic Albanian officials said one of their own was killed in a separate attack underlying the tit-for-tat nature of the struggle over Kosovo. He was identified as Rifat Shala, a regional politician. His brother was badly wounded.

Pressure appeared to be growing on the Serbs to accept ethnic Albanian demands for foreign mediation of talks between the two ethnic groups, with Russia,

the Serbs' most powerful ally, reportedly backing the idea.

The Beta news agency cited Russian Deputy Foreign Minister Igor Ivanov as suggesting that the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe get involved as a "participant in establishing negotiations."

Speaking in Belgrade on Tuesday, Ivanov was also quoted as saying that Russia is considering sending troops to Macedonia to join the U.N. peacekeepers there.

Russia is also interested in sending observers to the Yugoslav-Albanian border to help prevent weapons smuggling into Serbia, the larger of Yugoslavia's two remaining republics, said Ivanov.

according to Beta.

The newest killings came in the wake of warnings Tuesday from Veljko Odalovic, deputy director of the Kosovo Serb government, that ethnic Albanians must give up on independence or face a wider war.

Kosovo Albanians comprise 90 percent of the province's population. Most want independence from Serb-dominated Yugoslavia.

More than 150 people have died in two-month Serb crackdown on ethnic Albanian militants.

Kosovo Albanian leader

Ibrahim Rugova, meanwhile, repeated that any talks on Kosovo's future should be held under third party mediation and in a neutral country — conditions Serbia rejects.

Last week, the United States and other key world powers introduced sanctions on Yugoslavia to pressure President Slobodan Milosevic into peacefully solving the crisis. Only Russia abstained.

There were no details on Wednesday's attack on the police unit, but the assault appeared to be the

work of the Kosovo Liberation Army, the clandestine armed ethnic Albanian group that has claimed responsibility for dozens of killings of Serbs and pro-Serb ethnic Albanians since 1996.

Tanjug, the state-run news agency of Yugoslavia, reported that two people — one a Serb, the other an ethnic Albanian loyal to Serbia — were killed Monday and Tuesday by the Kosovo Liberation Army.

The body of an unidentified third man was also found Tuesday.

Clinton salutes PM Prodi

WASHINGTON (AP) — At a "magic moment of Italian-American relations," President Clinton saluted Italy's prime minister at a formal dinner Wednesday evening and presided over a night of Italian opera sung by American voices.

The "magic moment" quote came from Prime Minister Romano Prodi, who told Clinton during a joint news conference that it was an apt description because in the current state of relations between the two countries,

"we have no point of disagreement." That point made, the Italian guests and their American hosts and a guest list that included actress Sophia Loren could settle themselves at 16 round tables for 10 in the White House East Room, each set with porcelain from the Eisenhower and Franklin Roosevelt administrations.

Giacomo Puccini and Giuseppe Verdi, the Italian operatic giants, were the composers of the after-dinner entertainment. But the performers were all-American, more than 30 young singers from across the country.

The singers, who were performing excerpts from six operas, including Verdi's "La Traviata" and Puccini's "La Boheme," were selected at the suggestion of Placido Domingo, artistic director of The Washington Opera. Soloists included David Miller, Marcus Haddock, Angela Turner Wilson and Maria Spacagna.

In the distinctions that make up protocol, it was an official dinner, not a state dinner, because Prodi as prime minister is head of government, not head of state.

The menu, designed by Walter

Scheib, the executive White House chef, was a tribute to Italian tradition and the fresh produce of an American spring.

Thirty vegetables went into the dinner, including the artichokes and fiddlehead ferns with wild leek dressing that started in a spring vegetable tart.

The main course: Alaskan halibut with gremolata risotto. "It's a beautiful, beautiful fish," said Scheib. "We had it yesterday (in the White House kitchen) for lunch and then again for dinner."

The desert, a towering offering by

White House pastry chef Roland Mesnier, was an ice cream tower. Specifically, it was an 18-inch high representation of the Tower of Asinelli in Prodi's home town of Bologna.

It was made of chestnut ice cream on a cake of Georgia peaches frosted in white and accented with the Italian national colors, red and green.

"We used milk cartons for the forms," Mesnier said. "The base is a two quart milk carton and the top is a one-quart milk carton."

Commander: Jet flew too fast, too low in Italy

CAMPLEJEU, North Carolina (AP) — A Marine Corps jet was flying too low and too fast when it cut the cables holding an Italian ski gondola, killing 20 people, says the squadron commander of the plane's crew.

"It's not the way I would fly it... That's pushing it pretty hard," Lt. Col. Richard Muegge said Tuesday during an investigatory hearing into the incident on Feb. 3 over an Italian ski area.

Six witnesses testified on the first day of the proceeding, called an Article 32 hearing, against Capt. Chandler Seagraves, 28, and Capt. William Raney II, 26. Both were back-seat crewmen in the Prowler

EA-6B jet, responsible for operating radar jamming gear.

The hearing will determine whether the two captains should be court-martialed for the incident.

The tragedy strained relations between the U.S. and Italy and is likely to be discussed during Wednesday's meeting between President Bill Clinton and Italian Prime Minister Romano Prodi, White House spokesman Mike McCurry said Tuesday.

"This has been a subject of enormous concern and pain to both of our governments. I wouldn't be surprised if it does come up," McCurry said. "I think we have dealt with this in a sensitive way, and in a way that is designed to ensure

that justice is done." Muegge said that when he flew the low-level training route through the Italian Alps, taking off from an air base at Aviano, he flew at what he called the best speed of 420 knots (775 kph) and the minimum allowed altitude of 1,000 feet (300 meters).

The Prowler crew was flying between 480 knots and 530 knots (883 kph and 975 kph) and the pilot reported after the crash that he'd been flying at 800 feet (240 meters), Muegge said. The crash investigation report said the cable was sliced at about 370 feet (110 meters).

"I wouldn't say it was unsafe, but it reduces your reaction time," Muegge said of the jet's speed.

"I don't consider flying below 1,000

feet (300 meters) unsafe, but it's not what we're allowed to fly. If I see that, it tells me something is being done not the way it's supposed to be," he said.

The hearing was scheduled to resume Wednesday with six more prosecution witnesses. Defense attorneys estimate they will present between seven and 10 witnesses.

On Thursday, the defense plans to show the judge the back seat layout of a Prowler in a hangar at the Cherry Point Marine Corps Air Station, about an hour away.

Another hearing is scheduled for June 15 for the Prowler's pilot, Capt. Richard Ashby, 30, and navigator, Capt. Joseph Schweitzer, 30.


The four crew members each face 20 counts of involuntary manslaughter and 20 counts of negligent homicide. The maximum sentence for each manslaughter count is 20 years in prison.

After the hearing is completed, possibly as late as Friday, Lt. Gen. Peter Pace, commander of the U.S. Marine Corps Forces, Atlantic, will receive a written report and recommendation before deciding whether to order a court-martial for the crew members.

Earlier Tuesday, the judge heard conflicting testimony as to whether there were known gondola cables in the area.

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
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IRS bill moves in Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill to restructure the Internal Revenue Service moved closer to approval Wednesday as the Senate adopted a plan to finance the ambitious \$18.3 billion measure.

By a 56-42 vote, the Senate approved a plan by Sen. William V. Roth Jr., R-Del., the Finance Committee chairman, that would raise \$8 billion by allowing more senior citizens to convert their traditional Individual Retirement Accounts into Roth IRAs.

The vote was the first significant amendment to the \$18.3 billion IRS overhaul bill, which is expected to win final passage Thursday. The remainder of the bill is financed through other items, such as eliminating some targeted tax breaks and restricting foreign tax credits.

The bill would allow the IRS commissioner to revamp the agency to serve specific types of taxpayers. It would create a nine-member board with private citizens to oversee the agency. It also seeks to protect taxpayers from abusive conduct and more closely review the management and conduct of IRS workers.

With nearly 100 provisions, the bill covers much territory, from requiring the IRS to publish telephone numbers of local offices to banning the agency's use of the "illegal tax protester label."

Senate approval of the financing package came after Sen. Bob Kenney, D-Neb., vigorously challenged it as benefiting "a very select group of people," wealthy senior citizens who have more than \$100,000 in retirement income.

"It is essentially an accounting gimmick, used by people over 70 1/2, that will basically enable them to pass to their heirs, tax-free, assets that they currently own," said Kenney.

Congress' Joint Committee on Taxation estimates 170,000 taxpayers would convert to Roth IRAs, paying an average \$47,000 in taxes.

Kenney and others said the Roth plan has significant long-term costs that haven't been explained and would drain revenue away from needed social programs in the later years.

"In order to fund a growing tax cut for these individuals, we're going to be cutting programs for middle-income Americans," Kenney asserted.

Roth defended his proposal. "Those criticizing the rollover provision have the objective of limiting retirement savings choices for taxpayers who reach the end of their working years," he said.

Despite this argument, some lawmakers said Roth's proposal raises expectations that the Senate and House will quickly resolve differences in their competing bills for restructuring the IRS.

The other major debate was over an amendment by Sen. Fred Thompson, R-Tenn., to have an IRS union representative on the oversight board covered by conflict of interest rules.

Thompson's amendment would reverse a decision in the Finance Committee to waive criminal conflict of interest rules for the IRS union representative. The committee approved the waiver to make it easier to

recruit people for the panel and allow the person to vote on personnel issues. The GOP strongly opposed the waiver.

"Waiving these conflict of interest statutes establishes a very bad precedent," Thompson said.

In other major amendments, the Senate:


- Defeated 74-25 a proposal by Sen. Kit Bond, R-Mo., to make the oversight board a full-time instead of part-time board. The plan also would have denied the treasury secretary and an IRS union representative seats on the board.
- Approved by voice vote a plan by Sen. Harry Reid, D-Nev., to have the IRS commissioner issue a report on payments to informants in criminal investigations.
- Agreed by voice vote to require the IRS to study how to combat tax avoidance by foreign controlled corporations doing business in the U.S. The sponsor, Sen. Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., cited a study by two Florida International University professors that contends the U.S. government was cheated out of \$42.6 billion in tax revenues in 1997.



US Military training may yet be held 'separately'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Over Clinton administration opposition, a key House committee voted for separate military training for women and men Wednesday, accepting the argument that the change could thwart sexual misconduct and distractions.
 "All we're trying to do is get basic training back to basic training, not social experimentation," said Rep. Gene Taylor, R-Miss.
 Opponents on the House National Security Committee, in debating the defense authorization bill, said separating men from women during training will work against cohesion in the field and could result in less equality for female soldiers in the male-dominated armed forces.
 "It will roll back opportunities for women. ... It will not reduce sexual misconduct," argued Rep. Jane Harman, D-Calif. "We learned long ago that a policy of separate but equal results in un-

equal opportunities."
 Rep. Tillie Fowler, R-Fla., a leading opponent of separate training, failed to win committee approval for an amendment to hold off on a decision until a congressional commission studying the matter makes its report. The amendment failed, 23 votes for and 30 against.
 Under the legislation, the Army, Navy and Air Force would be required to house and train male and female recruits separately, something the Marine Corps already does.
 A panel headed by former Sen. Nancy Kassebaum Baker, R-Kan., studied the question last year after a sex scandal at an Army base in Aberdeen, Md., and recommended separate basic training last year for all military services.
 "The sexual dynamic is both an attraction and a distraction," Rep. Roscoe Bartlett, R-Md., said Wednesday in arguing for separation. "There's no place for this

in the armed forces."
 The Pentagon would have to begin gender-separate living and training by April 1999, although waivers would be allowed until October 2001 to give the services time to build facilities as needed.
 The committee approved \$8 million for the Army to buy locks and take other measures to separate the sexes until barracks can be built at a cost of about \$160 million.
 The House plan goes beyond recommendations of Defense Secretary William Cohen, who wants the services to house male and female recruits in separate areas but doesn't want separate basic training.
 On the defense budget itself, lawmakers grumbled that it falls short of needs to keep the military in fighting form.
 "This budget is good for economic security, but I'm not sure it's good for national security," complained committee Chairman Floyd Spence, R-S.C.
 Under last year's balanced budget deal between Congress and President Clinton, defense spending for fiscal year 1999 is limited to about \$270 billion, which Spence and several Republican members of his committee said isn't enough to maintain full military readiness.
 Spence calculated defense spending will fall \$54 billion behind the rate of inflation in the next five years, meaning programs will have to be curtailed, he said.
 The Pentagon acknowledged Tuesday that maintaining a high level of preparedness among its 1.4 million force is "a challenge." But spokesman Ken Bacon said the military is still able to fulfill its required capability of fighting two major regional conflicts at the same time if necessary.
 In other measures in the Defense Authorization Act for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, the committee voted to:
 • Boost funding by \$802 million for maintaining property, equipment and spare parts, saying this would help improve readiness.
 • Set a limit on spending for troops keeping the peace in Bosnia to \$1.86 billion for the year. So far, some \$10 billion has been spent.
 • Authorize annexation of 44.5 acres of military property around Arlington National Cemetery to allow for more burials. The veterans cemetery, now expected to be full by 2025, could accept burials for an additional 15 years.
 • Lift a one-year moratorium on deploying U.S. land mines that was to begin Jan. 1, 1999, which was approved in 1996 with an exception for the demilitarized zone in Korea.
 The Clinton administration refused to join a movement last year to ban the use of land mines worldwide, and Republicans in Congress don't want the moratorium to go into effect.
 The bill is expected to come up for a House vote the week of May

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10 more die as rains hit Italy

NAPLES, Italy (AP) — At least 10 people were dead Wednesday after two consecutive days of torrential rain caused massive landslides and flooding in southern Italy.

Using military helicopters and on foot, thousands of fire fighters and emergency workers searched for another 44 people feared buried, Italy's civil protection agency said.

Rivers of mud burst into town centers, tearing apart houses and bridges, swallowing cars and sending panicked residents fleeing.

More than 3,000 people were left homeless throughout the region from Naples to Salerno, about 60 kilometers southeast (37 miles), chief civil protection officer Andrea Todisco said.

Many residents spent Tuesday night on roof tops or on the highest floors of apartment buildings to avoid the flow of mud.

In Samo, a town of about 2,000 residents, the mud burst through the first floor of the "Villa Malta" hospital, sweeping away part of a staircase.

Relief workers were searching for several doctors and patients feared buried under the mix of rubble and mud, Italian news reports said. The approximately 200 other patients at the hospital were being transferred elsewhere, the reports said.

Piles of mud and boulders covered railroad tracks and roads in the area, bringing circulation to a virtual standstill.

Todisco said the army had been summoned to help with relief work and that experts were determining whether more slides were likely. Rain continued Wednesday, but meteorologists predicted an improvement later in the day.

Britain urges Asian govt's to help poor

LONDON (AP) — Britain's Treasury chief on Wednesday urged Asian governments to consider the plight of the poor and unemployed as they try to solve their financial problems.

"There's a modern need for welfare systems to be built throughout Asia and these are welfare systems that help people become more employable," Chancellor of the Exchequer Gordon Brown told BBC from Jakarta.

"It's the poor and the unemployed who suffer most if the economic reform programmes fail and every economic reform program must have a social element."

Brown, in Indonesia on a Far East tour, said he wanted Britain to set an example to the rest of the world by putting social concerns at the heart of economic reform.

He also said greater openness is vital in economic reform.

"I'm making a speech to the Stock Exchange in Jakarta and I will be emphasizing that the way ahead for every country, and that includes European countries as well as Asian countries, is to have far more open and accountable systems of government," Brown said.

"One of the most important things that has been learned is there has to be greater openness, transparency and accountability," he said.

"If that happens, then people can see how decisions are being made, you avoid crises by acting earlier on information available and you have a better understanding within the whole population of what governments are trying to achieve."

He dismissed a suggestion that he had been snubbed by the Malaysian Prime Minister, Mahathir Mohamad, who did not meet the chancellor when he visited.

Mahathir was reported to have been upset at British press coverage of recent riots in a Malaysian detention center for illegal immigrants.

Brown pointed out he had met the Malaysian deputy prime minister for several hours.

Dutch PM wins 2nd term

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — Boosted by a vigorous economy, Prime Minister Wim Kok won a second term in national elections Wednesday that strengthened his coalition's grip on parliament.

With 98 percent of the votes counted, media projections showed that Kok's ruling coalition would win 98 seats in the Dutch parliament's 150-member lower house — up from its current total of 92 seats.

Kok's left-leaning Labor Party led the way with 45 seats, followed by the right-leaning Liberals with 39 and the centrist Democrats 66 Party with 14 seats.

The results assured both Kok and his coalition of second terms.

thanks at least in part to strong economic growth and an unemployment rate of just 4.8 percent.

In the Netherlands, the government has been ruled by coalition since 1917, as no single party has been able to get enough votes to govern alone. Elections for parliament's less influential upper house were not held Wednesday.

Speaking to a euphoric crowd at a post-election party, a beaming Kok said he was delighted with the victory. "We have won big time," he said.

"I see today's result as an important expression of trust from the electorate — of trust and also appreciation for the clear social democratic Cabinet policy over the last years."

Though the coalition overall ap-

peared to post gains, the Democrats 66 Party was projected to lose 10 of its 24 seats. Party leader Els Borst had said the party would not rejoin the ruling coalition if it wins less than 12 seats.

"It is a disappointment," Borst said. But she did not immediately rule out taking part in new coal-

ition with Kok's party.

Turnout was expected to be about 80 percent of the 11 million registered voters.

Foreign policy was not an issue, since Dutch foreign policies have merged with those of the European Union in recent years. Instead, debates centered on pocketbook is-

ssues such as tax deductions on mortgages, health care and social security reforms.

The country's extreme-right Nationalists Party, which won three seats in parliament in the last elections in 1994 with an anti-foreigner platform, was projected to retain just one seat.


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Exiled Chinese dissident hospitalized in Canada

MONTREAL (AP) — Wei Jingsheng, a leading Chinese dissident in exile, fell ill and was hospitalized on his way to a human rights conference in Montreal.

There was no firm word on Wei's condition early Wednesday, or even where he was: Montreal's St.-Luc Hospital said Tuesday he had been treated and released.

"He suffered a minor heart attack, more or less," said Kenneth Cheung, a spokesman for a pro-democracy Chinese group in Montreal.

Wei, 47, was released from prison in China in November to seek medical treatment in the United States.

Wei had spent virtually every day since 1979 in prison for his pro-democracy work, and suffered from heart problems, high blood pressure and other illnesses that

worsened behind bars.

He had been on his way to Montreal to speak Tuesday at a conference sponsored by the writers' group PEN and the International Center for Human Rights.

Organizers told the audience at the conference that Wei "had great difficulty" earlier in the day in Toronto, on his way to Montreal, Cheung said.

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Militants kill 13 Hindus

JAMMU, India (AP)— Suspected Muslim militants killed 13 Hindus in remote northern villages in India's Kashmir state over the last two days, police said Wednesday.

The killings came barely two weeks after guerrillas massacred 25 Hindus in a mountainous village, prompting residents to demand better security in the area that borders Pakistan, India's hostile neighbor.

No group immediately claimed responsibility for the attacks, but police blamed guerrillas fighting for the independence of predominantly Hindu India's only Muslim-majority state.

Police said that a gun-wielding band raided the home of a retired government worker, shooting him and five of his house guests overnight.

The retired worker was among the two people who survived the attack in Surankote, about 200 kilometers (125 miles) northwest of Jammu, the state's winter capital.

In another incident Tuesday, guerrillas sprayed villagers with automatic gun fire in Mangalotha, 225 kilometers (140 miles) northeast of Jammu, killing five people, all Hindus. The villagers were returning from

a hospital in district capital Doda with the bodies of four other Hindus who had been gunned down by guerrillas a day earlier.

Police said 10 Hindus from Mangalotha village were missing. It was not clear if the militants had kidnapped them or if they had run away, a police officer said on condition of anonymity.

State police chief Gurbachan Jagat said the attacks were aimed at forcing Hindus to move out of the districts, where Muslims are in a slight majority.

Since last month's attack near the border, local lawmakers have urged Defense Minister George Fernandes to post more federal troops in the area.

Fernandes assured them his government was doing everything possible to restore peace.

Dozens of groups in Kashmir are fighting for independence or to merge with officially Islamic Pakistan.

India regularly accuses Pakistan of training and arming Kashmiri militants.

The two nations have fought two wars over Kashmir. Pakistan says it only gives moral support to the separatist movement.

Italian PM visits White House

WASHINGTON (AP) — Of the many issues President Bill Clinton may discuss with visiting Italian Prime Minister Romano Prodi, one looms large: the Marine jet accident that killed 20 skiers in the Italian Alps.

Clinton was expected to raise the tragedy Wednesday as he and Prodi meet at the White House in the Italian leader's first official visit.

Clinton is hoping to assuage any remaining sore feelings among the Italian people, said White House spokesman Mike McCurry, and is anxious to see how Prodi will respond.

"This has been a subject of enormous concern and pain to both of our governments," McCurry said Tuesday.

"We just need to see how they address it. I think we have dealt with this in a sensitive way and in a way that is designed to ensure that justice is done."

While Clinton prepared to greet Prodi, a military court in Camp LeJeune, North Carolina, began hearings into whether two crewmen should be court-martialed over the Feb. 3 accident, in which a low-flying Marine jet from the U.S. air base in Aviano severed a cable on a ski lift, causing a gondola packed with skiers to crash into the mountainside.

In ensuing days, angry Italians decried American pilots as careless "Rambos" and Communist leaders demanded the closure of U.S. military bases in their country. Clinton phoned Prodi and promised a full investigation.

Beyond the skiing fatalities, Clinton wanted to discuss the summit of industrialized nations next week in Birmingham, England.

A White House official, speaking Tuesday on condition of anonymity, said the president wants to feel out Prodi on matters such as international crime, global climate change and policy toward Kosovo, the Yugoslav province where ethnic Albanians are seeking independence, and the Middle East.

Clinton also was to update Prodi on his recent six-nation tour of Africa and ways to encourage development there, the official said.

An official close to the meeting, also speaking on condition of anonymity, said the White House anticipates Prodi would bring up the United States' failure to pay its dues to the United Nations and the financial crisis in Asia.

And, the official said, Prodi is expected to raise his country's disagreement with sanctions against Iran and Libya.

McCurry acknowledged "that general topic might arise," as well as the recent visit to Tripoli by members of

the Italian parliament. The visit breached a 1992 U.N. ban against flights to and from Libya, imposed in response to the 1988 Pan Am bombing over Scotland that killed 270 people.

During the trip, parliament member Vittorio Sgarbi was quoted on Libyan TV as saying he did not regret violating the ban and would fly to Libya again. "We do not accept that anyone should decide where we can go and how we should go to the place we want to go to," he said.

McCurry said he was not certain that the legislators' visit itself would come up in the meeting Wednesday, but was certain "our differing approaches on some matters related to Libya, Iran and others might be a topic."

While Wednesday's visit is Prodi's first as Italian prime minister, it is not his first visit to Washington. He was here in 1996 as president of the European Union.

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Hospitals in India, Canada forge tie-up

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — Doctors at two hospitals in India and Canada performing complicated heart surgeries on infants can now exchange medical information instantly through technology provided by an American computer company.

Two Intel Teamstations donated by the Intel's Indian subsidiary will help doctors at the Sri Ramachandra Medical College near the southern Indian city of Madras consult with experts at the Toronto Sick Children's Hospital.

The doctors will no longer be limited by slow telephone and fax links, Intel said in a statement Wednesday. Instead, they can share X-rays, pictures and other complicated medical data over the facility instantly.

The facility was set up at the initiative of doctors K.R. Balakrishnan, pediatric cardiovascular surgeon at Ramachandra Medical College and Peter Einstein of the Children's Heart Project International in Toronto who wanted to share the latest information instantly.

The two are among the few surgeons worldwide who perform complicated in heart surgery on infants, Intel said said.

"This technology has tremendous applications," said Balakrishnan. "The results will be shared with the medical community in India."

Several states in India have planned to set up videoconferencing facilities in small towns to enable doctors there to consult with experts in large hospitals.

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
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Plane crash kills 6 in RP

CEBU, Philippines (AP) — A single-engine plane crashed in the central Philippines Wednesday, killing all six people aboard, officials said. The Cessna 206 plane, reportedly owned by the Asian Christian Aviation Ministry, was on its way from the southern Philippine city of General Santos to Cebu when it crashed on Bohol Island. The plane skimmed coconut tree tops before smashing into the ground in the town of Tubigon. Bohol is about 610 kilometers (380 miles) southeast of Manila. No other details were immediately available.

HK share prices fall on bad regional news

HONG KONG (AP) — Share prices in Hong Kong fell below a support line immediately after opening Thursday to hit a new three-month low as investors were spooked by bad news in the region and at home. The key Hang Seng index fell 2.3 percent fifteen minutes after opening to 9,927.18 points. The market stayed below 10,000 all morning, ending the morning trading session at 9,880.79 points, down 228.35 points from the previous day's close. Escalating violence in Indonesia, a threat of strikes in South Korea and concerns about a rate increase in the United States all helped drag down the market, dealers said. The fall was the fourth straight decline so far this week. Analysts had warned that once the index slid below 10,000 points, it was likely to begin a free fall until hitting a support level near 9,800 points. In addition to worry about events overseas, traders said concern has grown over rising unemployment in Hong Kong. Hong Kong leader Tung Chee-hwa warned at a conference Thursday that "painful" structural changes in the economy "may go on for some time longer," and predicted it would take at least two years for Asia, and Hong Kong, to recover from the economic crisis that began last July in Thailand.

RP peso tumbles

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Philippine stocks and the peso tumbled Thursday as unrest in Indonesia spilled over into neighboring markets, traders said. The 30-share Philippine Stock Exchange Index fell 21.16 points, or nearly 1 percent, to 2,189.97, adding to Wednesday's 2.5 percent loss. The peso, meanwhile, briefly hit a low of 42 pesos per dollar. It averaged 40.532 pesos at midday, compared to 39.387 pesos on Wednesday. Currency traders said the weaker peso was due solely to the regional currency situation and not to any rekindled jitters over next Monday's national elections. Expectations of peaceful and largely fair elections have helped stabilize the peso in recent days. On Wednesday, rioters staged violent protests in Medan, Indonesia, over sharp increases in the costs of fuel, electricity and transportation. Indonesian police re-

sponded with physical force. Traders said the unrest in Indonesia has spilled over into the entire Asian region's currency and stock markets. Philippine bank stocks were also hard hit by a Moody's Investors Service report which said the country's banks had been adversely affected by the Asian financial crisis. The upcoming elections contributed to an uncertain tone in stock trading, said Jose Ricardo Garcia, vice president for Diversified Securities Inc. "The election is just a few days away, people are now more tentative. Volume of trades was light as investors don't want to be caught over the long weekend with their money locked up in the market," he said. Markets will be closed Monday for the elections. A post-election rally, however, is likely if the election turns out to be peaceful, he said.

Netanyahu shuns US dictates





By GWEN ACKERMAN JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Wednesday he would reject any U.S. "dictates" on the scope of an Israeli pullback in the West Bank but said he would nonetheless go to a new round of talks set for next week in Washington. Netanyahu convened his nine-member inner Cabinet to discuss what the Israeli press characterized as a U.S. ultimatum: Israeli acceptance by Monday of an U.S. proposal for a 13 percent withdrawal or cancellation of a White House ceremony to open final status talks. "We do not accept dictates," Netanyahu said on Israel Radio. U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright said that if Israel accepted the American proposals, U.S. President Bill Clinton would preside over the launching Monday of a new round of Middle East talks on the toughest issues: the future of Jerusalem, Jewish settlements, Palestinian demands for a state and refugees. "I went to London and I will go to Washington, and I will go anywhere needed," Netanyahu said. "We will not give up on peace just as we will not give up on security." Netanyahu's Cabinet has agreed in principle to make one further withdrawal in the West Bank provided the land transfer is matched by Palestinian steps including a crackdown on Islamic militants. Netanyahu has said he would give the Palestinians an additional 9 percent and indicated that he could agree to a pullback of up to 11 percent. The full Cabinet of 17 ministers was expected to make a decision on the U.S. proposal Sunday. Yehudit Ahronov reported Wednesday that Netanyahu would not reject U.S. proposals but would demand a U.S. letter promising not to recognize a unilaterally declared Palestinian state. Arafat has threatened to declare statehood in a year's time if negotiations remain stalemated. The daily Maariv said Netanyahu was prepared to accept a 12 percent to 13 percent withdrawal, a move certain to be rejected by right-wingers in his Likud-led coalition. Hard-liners have threatened to bring down his government if Netanyahu gives in to U.S. pressure. Palestinians warned a gloomier picture and pointed that U.S. credibility was at stake. "Netanyahu

always welcomes meetings in any place because this only buys him time. But eventually he will come to the end of his rope, and the closest ally to Israel will come out and say Israel does not want peace," said Palestinian Information Minister Yasser Abed Rabbo. Marwan Barghouti, leader of Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat's Fatah faction in the West Bank, called for suspending the talks altogether while warning that the alternative to peace was violence. In Jerusalem, a 28-year-old Jewish seminary student was stabbed to death by a Palestinian in the old walled city Wednesday. Israeli soldiers foiled a stabbing attack on a soldier in the West Bank city of Hebron. Receiving a rousing reception from his party members, Netanyahu returned from the London peace talks Tuesday night declaring that his flexibility in negotiations would not come at the expense of Israeli security. "I am prepared to be flexible where possible, but on the issue of security for the citizens of Israel I am not flexible," Netanyahu told cheering crowds at a convention of his ruling Likud party in Tel Aviv. The daily Haaretz newspaper quoted unidentified Israeli government sources as saying that the three sides agreed in London on two of the three main issues: steps Palestinians would take while Israel makes a three-phased withdrawal and putting aside Palestinian demands for a further pullback beyond the 13 percent. Palestinians currently have limited control over 27 percent of the West Bank, where 1.8 million Palestinians live. Under the U.S. plan, autonomy would be extended to about 40 percent of the area.

Jewish youth knifed dead in Old City

JERUSALEM (AP) — An Arab knifer stabbed to death a Jewish youth as he walked through Jerusalem's Old City on his way to pray at the Western Wall Wednesday, police said. Police cordoned off the Old City and were searching for the assailant. Several dozen Arabs were detained. Jerusalem Mayor Ehud Olmert called the incident "very, very grave," and urged the government to take further steps to stop "Arab terrorists." The knifing attack came after U.S. Secretary of State Madeleine Albright failed to reach a breakthrough in talks with Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu and Palestinian leader Yasser Arafat in London. The Old City is in a part of Jerusalem claimed as a capital by both Israel and the Palestinians. The fate of the area is to be decided in final status talks. An Israeli woman was slightly wounded in a stabbing attack in another Jerusalem neighborhood Sunday.

Yeltsin meets Uzbek leader

MOSCOW (AP) — Plans for increasing economic cooperation topped the agenda of talks Wednesday between Uzbek President Islam Karimov and his Russian counterpart Boris Yeltsin. "Links between Uzbekistan and Russia should be stronger," Yeltsin said at the start of the two sides' talks, according to the

Interfax news agency. "We understand the degree of your influence on the countries surrounding you, and we cannot but be interested in strengthening our two countries' relationship." Karimov arrived late Tuesday for a three-day visit to Russia. On Wednesday morning, he laid a wreath at the Tomb of the Un-

known Soldier just off Red Square. He then joined Yeltsin in an official welcoming ceremony in the Kremlin's ornate Catherine Hall on Wednesday morning. Interfax said. The two leaders headed into a meeting expected to result in several economic agreements, includ-

ing a contract for joint production of passenger jets.

Russia is already the Central Asian country's main trading partner. Uzbek Ambassador Shamansur Shakhaliyov said on Tuesday that the potential for even greater economic cooperation between the two former Soviet republics was vast.

In addition to aviation projects, the two countries are interested in cooperating in mining, processing minerals and other natural resources, he said.

Chechen official: Envoy's release a 'matter of honor'

MOSCOW (AP) — A top Chechen official said Wednesday that the release of President Boris Yeltsin's envoy was a "matter of honor" for Chechnya and urged close cooperation between Chechen and Russian investigators, according to a news agency report.

Valentin Vlasov was abducted at gunpoint Friday while he was traveling from Grozny, the Chechen capital, to the neighboring republic of Ingushetia. No one has taken responsibility for the kidnapping or set terms for Vlasov's release.

Both Chechen and Russian federal security services have launched investigations into Vlasov's kidnapping, and officials on Tuesday traded accusations over who was responsible for the crime.

Chechen National Security Service chief Lecho Khultygov blamed the abduction on Russia's Federal Security Service, a successor to the KGB.

In a letter to Yeltsin, Chechen President Aslan Maskhadov blamed the kidnapping on forces intent on "aggravating relations between the Russian Federation and the Chechen republic."

Kazbek Makhshayev, the Chechen vice-premier, said that Vlasov's release was "a matter of honor to the Chechen state," the ITAR-Tass news agency reported Wednesday from Grozny, the capital of Chechnya.

Saying that investigators were following every lead they had received, he counseled patience.

"One should not make haste in such a matter. Let's cast aside mutual accusations," Makhshayev said. "It is necessary to establish close contacts with Russia's law enforcement bodies in order to find the criminals and release the hostage."

Since Chechnya's two-year war of independence against Russia ended in 1996, hundreds of people have been kidnapped in Chechnya and neighboring Russian regions by armed gangs that were mostly motivated by ransom. Vlasov is the highest-ranking official to have been captured.

Chechnya considers itself independent and has run its own affairs since Russian troops pulled out in the fall of 1996. Moscow claims that the Muslim republic remains a part of Russia.

Local polls a test for Blair

LONDON (AP) — With everything to gain and nothing to lose, Britain's beleaguered Conservatives enter local elections Thursday hoping to put a crimp in Prime Minister Tony Blair's record popularity.

Most analysts say this year's results in 166 local authority districts can only make Conservatives look better, while Blair's Labor party faces voter complacency and charges that the party has become overmighty.

Also on Thursday, Londoners will vote in a referendum to give the capital its first mayor, the latest move in a constitutional shakeup by Blair. All the major parties are in favor, and a straw poll indicated strong support among the 5 million voters.

Although elections for London's mayor would not be held until late 1999, the race is already on for party nominations.

Thursday's vote in 166 local authority districts presents difficulties for each big party.

Twenty years of defeats have left the Tories running just 23 local authorities across the nation, compared with 250 in 1979. The Conservatives also did badly in 1994, when the council seats up for election on Thursday were last contested.

A year ago, Labor ousted the Conservative government in a landslide election victory.

"We expect to see the Conservatives will do very poorly," said Patrick Dunleavy, professor of government at the London School of Economics. "But they will do better than they did in the spring of '94. So there will be conflicting messages."

Despite the popularity of his centrist "New Labor," Blair's party faces supporters who might not bother to vote.

"The main enemy of the Labor Party is not any renewed enthusiasm for the Conservative Party, but complacency among Labor voters," Deputy Prime Minister John Prescott said Wednesday.

Critics also point to corruption or inefficiency in some town halls that are bastions of leftist Laborites, such

as Sheffield in northern England and Hackney in London's East End.

Both the Conservatives and Labor face strong challenges from the Liberal Democrats, the third-running party nationally that traditionally does well in local ballots.

Dunleavy believes that no municipalities outside the London boroughs

will change hands, partly because only one-third of the seats are being contested. In the capital, all 1,917 seats are up for election.

There is no voting this year in Scotland and Wales.

Labor controls 92 of the districts being contested, the Liberal Democrats 21 and the Conservatives seven.

Annan visit could spur Burundi talks

DAR ES SALAAM, Tanzania (AP) — U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan's meetings with three Burundians under tight rein by the country's military-backed government could jump-start stalled peace talks, a senior U.N. aide said Wednesday.

Annan planned to meet Thursday with former presidents Sylvestre Ntibantunganya and Jean-Baptiste Bagaza, and speaker of the National Assembly, Leonce Ngendakunana, during a brief visit to Burundi as part of an eight-nation African tour.

Authorities have sporadically confined the three men to their homes, and restricted them from engaging in politics and traveling.

The secretary-general's aide, speaking on condition of anonymity, said Annan's meeting Thursday could revive the peace process.

"Indications are that the process will begin again before long," the aide said.

During Annan's visit to Burundi, he will also meet with retired Maj. Pierre Buyoya, who deposed Bagaza in an army-led coup in 1987, and Ntibantunganya in 1996.

The U.N. head met Wednesday in Dar Es Salaam with Tanzanian President Benjamin Mkapa, whose government has spearheaded efforts to end the conflict in neighboring Burundi, which has claimed more

than 200,000 lives since 1993.

Regional leaders imposed trade and transportation sanctions on Burundi after a 1996 coup that installed Buyoya as president.

Mkapa said Buyoya must ease restrictions against Ntibantunganya, Bagaza and Ngendakunana before trade and transportation sanctions are lifted.

The U.N. aide also said the men should be allowed to travel abroad. Hutu rebels are trying to oust Buyoya's Tutsi-led government and army, and reinstate a Hutu as president. Tutsi paratroopers assassinated the country's first democratically elected president, a Hutu, in October 1993.

Although Hutus make up 85 percent of the population, Tutsis control Burundi's government, military and economy.

Ex-Thai PM Chatichai dies

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Chatichai Choonhavan, Thailand's "no problem" prime minister, died Wednesday of complications from cancer. He was 76.

He died at Cromwell Hospital in London, where he underwent surgery for cancer surgery a month ago, government officials and members of his Chart Pattana Party said. The hospital reported he had suffered from liver cancer.

The cigar-smoking, wine-loving Chatichai served as prime minister from 1988 to 1991, when Thailand enjoyed a booming economy. He countered critics

who called his government corrupt with a smile and a mantra-like slogan of "no problem," thus earning his moniker.

After leaving office in 1991, the veteran politician remained active in Thailand's hurly-burly, often corrupt politics. In November, he made a final, failed bid for the premiership.

"I grieve for him and his family," said Prime Minister Chuan Leekpai, at times a Chatichai foe. Chuan interrupted his Cabinet meeting Wednesday and ordered a moment of silence.

Thai embassies abroad lowered their flags to half-staff, while television stations showed file foot-

age of Chatichai at leisure, riding a motorcycle or playing golf and the violin.

The Chart Pattana Party, bound together by its respect for Chatichai, is now expected to be torn by a succession struggle. It is the No. 2 opposition party in the Thai parliament.

An advocate of big business, Chatichai was once accused by his university lecturer son of being "too capitalistic" and not caring for Thailand's majority farmers.

A millionaire playboy, ambassador to several countries and the youngest general in Thai history, Chatichai's ever optimistic —

some would say willfully blind — style as prime minister eventually wore thin with the country's top generals, who deposed him in 1991.

Fed up with graft, Bangkok's middle class at first welcomed the coup, only to revolt against the army in 1992.

Born April 5, 1922, in Bangkok.

he was the only son of Field Marshal Phin Choonhavan, the most powerful general of his day. He saw action in Burma and China during World War II, fought in the Korean War, and became an assistant military attache in Washington D.C. in 1949.

Chatichai is survived by his wife, Boonruen, and a daughter and a son.

Peru crash: 74 missing

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Rescuers battled sucking mud and heavy rain Wednesday to pull 13 injured survivors from the wreckage of an Occidental Petroleum plane that crashed in the Amazon jungle and burst into flames with 87 people aboard.

The survivors — some of whom were seriously hurt — had to be carried three miles on litters because driving rain prevented their evacuation by helicopter.

Company officials said the 13th person was found in the muck nearly 18 hours after the plane went down.

Despite mud that swallowed some bodies, authorities held out hope that more survivors could be found among the dense grass and foliage. But they also declared the remaining 74 people missing and feared dead.

"We still have hope. There are so many places for the injured to be," said Jose Diaz, spokesman for Los Angeles-based Occidental Petroleum.

The Boeing 737, which Occidental chartered from the Peruvian air force to transport oil workers, plummeted into the swamp late Tuesday, three miles short of the airport at Andoas, an oil camp 650 miles north of Lima.

Most of the 79 passengers on the plane, including an American and a Venezuelan, were oil workers employed either by Occidental or local contractors. The flight also carried a crew of eight, but there were no crew members among the survivors.

The lone American aboard the plane, engineer Harold Whitehead, was not among those rescued Wednesday, Occidental officials said. Whitehead worked for the Peruvian engineering company Grana y Montero, and his family lives in the Peruvian river port of Iquitos.

Both the air force and Occiden-

tal said they have no information on bodies found.


The plane was flying the workers from Iquitos to Andoas, an oil camp in a remote stretch of jungle near the Ecuadorian border.

The cause of the accident was not known. A light rain was falling at the time of the crash, but it should not have affected the flight, Diaz said.

The plane that crashed, a Boeing model no longer manufactured, was delivered in 1983 and later acquired by the Peruvian air force, said Russ Young, a spokesman for Boeing Commercial Airplane Group.

Occidental has pumped oil around Andoas for 26 years and has a contract with Peru's air force to transport its workers, company officials said.

It was the second Peruvian air force plane to crash in northern Peru in just over a month. On March 29, a Russian-made military transport plane carrying 61 people crashed outside Piura, 530 miles northwest of Lima, killing 22 people and injuring 40. The crash was attributed to engine failure.



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

Pope prays for dead in murder-suicide

 VATICAN CITY (AP) — Many details have emerged about the slaying of the pope's Swiss Guards commander and his wife, but one major mystery remains: the contents of a letter written by the guard said to have killed them.

Cedric Torney, 23, shot the couple in their home and then put the gun to his mouth and killed himself, papal spokesman Joaquin Navarro-Valls said Wednesday.

Torney's funeral was planned for Thursday in St. Anne's, the church inside the Vatican walls used by its employees and residents.

A buildup of resentment over a reprimand by Estermann and the denial of a decoration, combined with a "peculiar" psychology, led to the outburst of violence, the spokesman said. He acknowledged that Torney had not shown himself to be unbalanced before.

Ninety minutes before the slayings Monday evening, Torney gave a letter to a fellow guard, to be passed on to his mother and sisters, 17 and 25.

The Vatican has a copy, Navarro-Valls said.

But officials are leaving it up to the family to release the contents, he said. The letter could shed light on Torney's frame of mind and motives.

Meanwhile, another figure remained touched by mystery: Torney's former girlfriend. The spokesman said the guard had recently broken up with a young Rome woman. She is said to have prayed and wept over his casket in a Vatican chapel Wednesday, but the ANSA news agency report could not be confirmed.

Torney's funeral in the small church was to come a day after thousands of people filled St. Peter's Basilica Wednesday to mourn Col. Aloise Estermann, 43, and his wife, Gladys Meza Romero, 49. It was to have been Estermann's happiest day: the pope named him commander of the guards hours before the shootings, and he was to have been sworn in Wednesday.

Torney was nearing the end of his second two-year stint with the guards, the 100-member papal force that for five centuries has drawn on Swiss Catholic men to perform ceremonial duties in the Vatican and protect the pope.

His family has said the onetime mechanic was looking forward to returning to Switzerland to work.

Firms file motion to dismiss tobacco suit

 ST. PAUL, Minnesota (AP) — Tobacco companies asked a judge to dismiss the \$1.7 billion lawsuit filed against them in Minnesota, saying the plaintiff's claims hadn't been proved.

And the foreign-owned subsidiaries — B.A.T. Industries PLC, the British parent of Brown and Williamson; British-American Tobacco; and BAT (U.K. and Export) Ltd. — said the judge should rule in their favor because the plaintiffs did not show they had jurisdiction over foreign companies.

One defendant got its wish when the plaintiffs without explanation dropped their case against BAT (U.K. and Export) Ltd., about which the jury heard little in 14 weeks of testimony.

The plaintiffs — the State of Minnesota and Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Minnesota — also asked for rulings Tuesday on a number of complex legal issues in their favor.

By mid-evening, the judge ruled in their favor and said the defend-

dants can't claim the state filed the lawsuit too late.

Motions for directed verdicts are common before a case goes to the jury. Judges may direct verdicts if they feel there isn't enough evidence against a defendant for jurors to get the case.

Minnesota and Blue Cross claim the tobacco industry conspired to hide the dangers of smoking, marketed to children and manipulated nicotine to keep smokers hooked.

At issue is whether the defendants should pay \$1.7 billion that the state says it spent treating smoking-related illnesses. The plaintiffs also seek punitive damages.

Jury instructions were scheduled for Wednesday. If no settlement is reached, the defense was to give final arguments Thursday and the plaintiffs on Friday. The case was to go to the jury after final arguments are complete.

In Washington, Senate Minority Leader Tom Daschle said a settlement in Minnesota would "expedite" national tobacco policy in Congress.

Mayor wins senatorial primary

The mayor of Indiana's second-largest city won a close race for the state's Republican Senate nomination, setting up another tough fight with former Gov. Evan Bayh for the state's open U.S. Senate seat.

Fort Wayne Mayor Paul Helmke traded the lead with two rivals before pulling ahead in late returns.

Helmke had 129,309 votes, or 35 percent, while attorney John Price had 124,005 votes, or 34 percent, with 96 percent of precincts reporting.

Peter Rusthoven, an attorney and former speechwriter for Ronald Reagan, conceded earlier in the evening.

Bayh, the uncontested Democratic nominee, has a war chest of \$3 million. His father, Birch Bayh, once held the same Senate seat, until Dan Quayle beat him in the Reagan sweep of 1980.

The seat is open because Republican Dan Coats — who took it over when Quayle became vice president in 1989 — is retiring at 54 to return to the private sector.

Ohio's John Glenn, 76, is also leaving the Senate. The four-term Democrat is returning to space aboard the shuttle Discovery.

Gov. George Voinovich, barred from running for a third term, decided to run for Glenn's seat, and easily won the Republican Senate primary. Voinovich, 61, is heavily favored to beat Democrat Mary O. Boyle, a former Cuyahoga County commissioner, who faced no primary opposition.

In North Carolina, Democrats nominated millionaire lawyer John Edwards to challenge Sen. Lauch Faircloth.

The Republican incumbent, seeking a second term, was easily re-nominated over two political un-

knowns.

Edwards, 44, making his first bid for public office, won the Democratic primary with 50 percent, more than enough to avoid a runoff. He dedicated his victory to former governor and senator Terry Sanford, who died two weeks ago at age 80.

Sanford lost the Senate seat to Faircloth in 1992.

Faircloth, 70, himself a multimillionaire, said he wasn't worried about running against Edwards, who already has spent more than \$3 million of his own money on television ads.

In Ohio, neither party had a primary in the race to succeed

Voinovich. Republican Secretary of State Bob Taft — the latest in a long political line of Tafts and great-grandson of the late president — will face Democrat Lee Fisher, former state attorney general, in November.

Indiana and Ohio both had primaries to replace long-time Democratic congressmen who are retiring.

In southeastern Indiana's 9th District, voters faced their first election in 34 years without Lee Hamilton on the ballot. His party's nominee is Baron Hill, a former state representative, who easily beat two rivals Tuesday.

He'll face Jean Leising, who won a four-way Republican primary. Leising, a former state senator, lost

the last two elections to Hamilton.

In Ohio's 11th District, which covers Cleveland's east side and suburbs, Democrat Louis Stokes, the state's first and only black congressman, is calling it quits after 30 years.

Cuyahoga County prosecutor Stephanie Tubbs Jones won a five-way race to win the Democratic nomination.

Talk show host James Hereford defeated three rivals in the Republican primary.

George Michael arraignment delayed

BEVERLY HILLS, California (AP) — British pop star George Michael wasn't in court for his arraignment hearing on a misdemeanor lewd conduct charge, but plenty of reporters were.

Tuesday's court session was heavily covered, in particular by a contingent from Great Britain. Reporters and camera crews crowded into Beverly Hills Municipal Court, only to learn the proceeding would be postponed until May 15.

What's more, the 34-year-old pop star chose to stay home and let his attorney do the talking.

"He's terrific. There's no problem," said Michael's lawyer, Ira Reiner, when asked how his client is doing.

Reiner, the former top prosecutor in Los Angeles County, was recently hired by Michael and said he needed more time to review the case.

"We're just reviewing the entire file before a decision is made as to what the appropriate plea's going to be," Reiner told a news conference outside the courthouse.

When asked about Michael's well-being, Reiner said: "One is always anxious to get a matter like this, or any matter, resolved and get

it behind you."

He said his client is "in very good humor and good spirits."

Michael has been charged with a single misdemeanor count of lewd conduct that carries a maximum sentence of six months in jail and a \$1,000 fine.

He was arrested April 7 when an undercover police officer allegedly saw him commit a lewd act alone in a restroom at Will Rogers Park, which is across the street from the Beverly

Hills Hotel on Sunset Boulevard.

Michael posted \$500 bail and was released later that night.

He acknowledged later that he is gay and said he was embarrassed by the arrest.

He told CNN, "I won't even say it's the first time it's happened."

Michael and his band Wham! burst onto the pop scene in 1983, but the group broke up three years later. His hits include "Faith" and "I Want Your Sex."

Bishop commits suicide

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — A Catholic bishop shot himself to death in eastern Pakistan, apparently to protest a death sentence against a Christian for blaspheming Islam, police said Thursday.

Bishop John Joseph committed suicide Wednesday in front of the court building in Sahiwal, 270 miles south of Islamabad, after visiting the family of Ayub Masih, police in Punjab Province said.

Masih, 25, was convicted April 27 of speaking favorably about British author Salman Rushdie, who is under a death penalty by Iranian religious leaders for allegedly making blasphemous comments about the Prophet Mohammed in his book "Satanic Verses."

Masih is being held pending appeal. No date has been set for his execution.

Before killing himself, Joseph, of nearby Faisalabad, addressed a gathering at Masih's house, saying the charges were false and concocted to force 15 Christian families to drop a local land dispute.

Noting that Masih had been accused by a Muslim man, Joseph maintained that the case was essentially one man's word against another's. He alleged that the judge gave twice as much weight to the accuser's charges because he was a Muslim.

Pakistani law requires death for anyone who defiles the prophet's name. Critics charge that the vaguely worded law is often misused by religious zealots against religious minorities.

Several Christians have been sentenced to death, but those convictions were overturned by higher courts.

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates (AP) — The United Arab Emirates' oil minister said Wednesday that oil producers may have to further slash production to boost prices.

Obaid bin Saif al-Nasseri, who is currently serving as president of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, said he expects prices to rise later this year. "Oil producers have to exert efforts to protect oil prices from

deteriorating," he told the official Emirates News Agency.

He said he expected "an increase in the oil prices in the second half of this year."

In March, OPEC and non-OPEC producers promised to cut some 1.5 million barrels of oil a day to boost prices.

Prices fell to a nine-year low following the group's November decision to pump more oil just as demand was eroding because of

the Asian economic crisis and a mild winter.

Al-Nasseri said any decision to cut production must be coordinated between OPEC members and non-members.

Several other OPEC ministers have said recently that further cuts are likely at the organization's June 24 meeting in Vienna.

Oil is trading for about \$13 a barrel. Al-Nasseri said he sees \$20 a barrel as a reasonable price.

Malaysian ringgit recovers

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Offshore trading helped the Malaysian ringgit recover slightly against the U.S. dollar Thursday, after it plunged to a morning low of 4.06.

At mid-morning, the dollar was being quoted at a mid-range of 3.87, still up sharply from 3.77 ringgit the previous day.

The ringgit's strengthening off its morning low followed reports in Singapore that the Malaysia's central bank began selling dollars at the 4.00 ringgit mark, although both foreign and local dealers said they hadn't spotted the central

bank aggressively buying ringgit.

A Kuala Lumpur-based dealer expressed doubt the central bank would have enough "conviction" to aggressively defend the ringgit, given recent comments by Prime Minister Mahathir Mohamad that he'd like to see lower interest rates. The dealer believes most of the ringgit trading was offshore.

The ringgit has lost its value against the dollar by more than 30 percent since last July, when the regional currency crisis was sparked by a plunge of the Thai baht.

As the dollar's climb came

against the regionals generally, it would be futile to expend resources defending the ringgit, he said.

"It's a confidence game," he explained. "If there's a leak in one country, it all starts to unravel in the region."

A Hong Kong-based dealer noted that the denials from the People's Bank of China and Hong Kong's chief executive Tung Chee-hwa that China would devalue its currency as a result of a wave of currency devaluations elsewhere in the region has also taken pressure off the ringgit.

Who is lying about Korea financial crisis?

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — In an ongoing government investigation

into whom to blame for worsening South Korea's financial crisis, former President Kim Young-sam has pointed an accusing finger at one of his economic advisers, prosecutors said Wednesday.

Prosecutors said that in a written statement given early last week, Kim singled out his finance minister, Lim Chang-yuel, for mishandling the crisis and damaging South Korea's international credibility.

Lim was appointed finance minister only two days before South Korea officially asked the International Monetary Fund on Nov. 21 to bail out its sinking economy.

The ex-president said in the statement that his government had already agreed with the IMF on a bailout before Lim's appointment, said a spokesman for the Seoul prosecutors who spoke on condition of anonymity.

If true, it would raise questions as to why Lim told reporters after his Nov. 19 appointment that South Korea had not decided yet whether to go to the IMF for help.

Lim's remark was later blamed for aggravating South Korea's financial crisis by driving away uneasy foreign investors.

Lim rebutted his boss' claim, saying that he was unaware of the decision.

"Who in the government would defy when told by the president as many as three times of the decision to go to the IMF for help?" Lim told reporters on Wednesday.

In an earlier report to the government's Office of Audit and Inspection in March, the former presi-

dent was vague on Lim's role in the crisis.

But in last week's report to the prosecution, the ex-president claimed that he had told Lim three times that South Korea was turning to the IMF for help.

The dispute is expected to have a significant impact on the government's investigation into the crisis, for which two top officials of the previous government — former Finance Minister Kang Kyong-shik and former presidential economic adviser Kim In-ho — are already under investigation.

The two were fired a few days before South Korea called in the IMF for assistance.

The two could face criminal charges for worsening the crisis.

The dispute also has political implications as Lim is running as a governing party candidate in local elections on June 4 for the governorship of the populous Kyonggi province surrounding Seoul.

Lim's role in the financial crisis already has become a hot campaign issue.

South Korea's economy was bailed out by the IMF on Dec. 3 with a \$58 billion package.

Chrysler, Daimler talk merger

DETROIT (AP) — Chrysler Corp., a flag-waving champion of the Buy American movement that once staved off bankruptcy with a government bailout, said it is discussing a merger with Germany's biggest industrial company, the maker of the Mercedes-Benz.

Dow Jones News and the Detroit Free Press reported late Wednesday that the merger would be announced Thursday morning in London. Sources said the merger plans were completed after both boards met Wednesday.

The Financial Times of London reported Thursday that the transaction has already been approved by Deutsche Bank, Daimler-Benz's biggest shareholder, and by Kirk Kerkorian, the largest shareholder in Chrysler.

The proposed merger, which reportedly values Chrysler at more than \$35 billion, would be one of the largest industrial pairings ever.

The merged company would have a range of products and an international scope far greater than Daimler-Benz and Chrysler have individually.

Chrysler would get greater access to the European market, something it has strived for.

The No. 3 U.S. automaker also would round out its mainly mass-market offerings in light trucks with Mercedes, which primarily makes luxury cars.

Daimler-Benz would gain a bigger foothold in the American market, where it has been working to increase sales.

And since two of every three vehicles that Chrysler makes is a light truck, the German company could participate in the popular U.S. pickup and minivan segments that don't make as much sense for a luxury brand.

"To some extent there is a hand-in-glove fit," said Scott Merlis, an analyst with Merlis Automotive

International Inc. "I would say it looks like a match made in heaven to the extent the two cultures can coexist."

According to Dow Jones and the Free Press, both Chrysler and Daimler will exchange their stock for shares in a new holding company to be called Daimler Chrysler.

The company will have dual headquarters in Auburn Hills, Michigan, and Stuttgart, Germany and co-chairmen, Robert Eaton of Chrysler and Juergen Schrempp of Daimler.

The new company will be a German legal entity, Dow Jones reported.

If wholly merged, the companies would have had revenues of \$131 billion last year — \$70 billion for Daimler-Benz and \$61 billion for Chrysler.

By comparison, No. 1 world automaker General Motors Corp. had nearly \$178 billion in revenues in 1997 while No. 2 Ford Motor Co. had \$154 billion.

The companies cautioned earlier Wednesday, however, that a deal is far from certain.

They said in a joint statement Wednesday that a merger could take the form of a stock swap, but that any agreement would be subject to approval by the boards and shareholders of both companies — among other conditions.

Mercedes-Benz has increased U.S. sales 67 percent this year, largely with the help of its hot-selling M-Class sport utility vehicle.

But the German automaker is still a bit player in terms of U.S. volume, accounting for a little more than 1 percent of industry sales so far this year.

Similarly, Chrysler sold only 17,713 vehicles outside North America last month, more than half of that in Europe.

Chrysler sold nearly 221,000 vehicles in the United States last month.

were confirmed in a joint statement, and ended the day with a 7.2 percent gain.

Chrysler shares rose 18 percent, or \$7.37 1/2, to close at \$48.81 1/4 on the New York Stock Exchange, while Daimler's U.S.-listed shares rose 6.4 percent, or \$6.50, to \$108.56 1/4. Chrysler is a powerhouse in the United States, with 94,300 employees and a 16 percent share of new vehicle sales this

year. Only GM and Ford sell more, with shares of 31 percent and 24 percent, respectively.

Daimler, Germany's largest industrial group, produces luxury autos, trucks and buses via its Mercedes-Benz division.

Other Daimler divisions are involved in areas like aerospace, defense and financial services, and it wasn't clear whether they would be included in the deal.

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Asian flu stops book fair

SINGAPORE (AP) — The 29-year-old Festival of Books has been cancelled this year, partly because the regional economic crisis has caused a decline in participants, the organizer said Wednesday.

"There are not sufficient participants," said K.P. Sivam, explaining that the festival, which pre-sold 140 stalls last year,

would not take place in September.

Sivam said another factor is competition from the World Book Fair, which started in 1996, and takes place in June, three months before the festival.

"Our members have been participating in both fairs these last two years," Sivam said.

There are also a couple of other fairs that showcase books, but sell gift items, too.

Sivam said the members of the National Book Development Council of Singapore and the Singapore Book Publishers Association want to take a year or two "to review other trends" to determine how and whether the festival will continue.

Beatle George goes to court

LONDON (AP) — In a rare public appearance, George Harrison went to court Wednesday to stop the sale of a recording of the Beatles singing drunkenly in a Hamburg club in 1962.

Lingsong Music Ltd. wants to market CDs from the appearance at the Star Club, the group's last gig there after signing with EMI Records.

Harrison called the recording one of the "crummiest" ever of the band.

Edward Taylor, who made the recording, claimed John Lennon gave his verbal consent. Harrison said even if he did, the agreement wouldn't be binding.

"One drunken person recording another bunch of drunks does not constitute business deals," he said.

An album of songs from the tape was released in 1977 on the Polydor label after the Beatles failed to get a High Court injunction against it.

Lennon was shot to death in 1980.

Harrison said Lennon's widow, Yoko Ono, and the two other surviving Beatles — Paul McCartney and Ringo Starr — chose him to appear in court.

They want the original recording turned over to them or destroyed.

Campbell in Bucharest

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — Bread and salt aren't Naomi Campbell's cup of tea.

The supermodel skipped the traditional Romanian greeting on Wednesday after arriving in the city in a gleaming green Mercedes for a one-day publicity stop.

Journalists just got a glimpse of her clad from head to toe in stretch black before she headed off to hand out musical instruments and medicine, host a reception and visit a casino.

Campbell, 27, who didn't speak or pause for photographers, disappointed waiting journalists and a little girl who had come to greet her with bread and salt.

School cancels on Indigo Girls

KNOXVILLE, Tennessee (AP) — It's strike three for the lesbian folk duo.

The lesbian folk duo was supposed to give a free concert Wednesday at Farragut High School, but school officials canceled.

It's the Grammy-winning group's third high school show to be called off in a week.

Farragut Principal Ed Hedgepeth said the duo's sexuality wasn't a factor.

The concert was canceled because of news reports last weekend that the Indigo Girls used profanity at a previous concert, he said.

"I'm not sure exactly what context (profanity) was used, whether it was used in an actual song or whether it was used on stage at some point in a comment," Hedgepeth said.

"I'd rather err on the side of caution when it comes to the people that we have presenting in the schools," he said.

Kanishka Biddanda, co-editor of the school newspaper, tells a different story.

"It's understood by everyone that the show was canceled because the Indigo Girls are gay," she said. The newspaper helped sponsor the concert.

Malcolm X landmark mullied

BOSTON (AP) — Malcolm X's boyhood home is under study as a historic landmark.

The city Landmarks Commission voted unanimously Tuesday to look into whether the house in Roxbury meets legal requirements for landmark status, which would keep it safe from demolition or major renovation.

Malcolm X, then 14-year-old Malcolm Little, moved from Lansing, Michigan, to the three-story wood-frame house owned by his older sister Ella in 1941.

He was living there when he was sentenced to prison for burglary in 1946 and returned to it briefly when he was paroled in 1953.

The house is owned by Ella's son, Rodnell Collins.

Tyson graces Music Awards

MONACO (AP) — Former heavyweight boxer Mike Tyson presented the group "Savage Garden" with an award Wednesday at the star-studded 1998 World Music Awards in Monaco.

The American fighter had to request official permission to travel overseas as part of his probation for a 1992 rape conviction, and he must give his passport back to court after he returns home.

Tyson and movie star Mickey Rourke both gave out the award to the Australian group, which was named the World's Best Selling Australian group in 1998. Accompanied at one point by a top model, Tyson appeared relaxed and pleased to be in the limelight again.





The Job Vacancy Announcements (JVA's) have to be approved first by the Employment Service within the Division of Labor and Immigration.

After going through print and radio and/or TV advertisement for a period of 15 days, the JVA's are then certified by Employment Service, thus allowing businesses to renew or to recruit employees anew from foreign lands.

When the JVA's are for jobs which the local and U.S. eligible workers have consistently shown an interest in, the procedure has served its purpose and we must insist on it.

However, when the JVA's are for positions such as construction work, waiters, waitresses, garment sewers, and other areas where resident workers have generally not shown any interest, then we are asking businesses to dole out money simply to satisfy a requirement that is archaic and antiquated and no longer serves any useful purpose.

Are we missing out on the opportunity to use the resource (advertising fees) on something that could have far more beneficial results for everyone in the Commonwealth?

Instead of requiring businesses to spend money advertising such jobs, the employment service could provide its very own job vacancy announcement service in the form of a big bulletin board (and there is room for just such a board in the DOLI building).

Businesses can then pay a fraction of what they would normally pay for newspaper and radio and/or TV ads to have their announcements posted at this bulletin board.

Businesses will probably even pay the full amount (as paid for print and radio and/or TV ads) if this would save them the trips to the newspaper, radio, and/or TV offices and if this would mean more speedy processing instead of waiting for 15 days.

The few resident applicants and job seekers looking for opportunities in construction, garment, or as waiters and waitresses could be directed to this bulletin.

The funds collected from this activity could be deposited into the general fund and appropriated to government and private agencies to be used in the training of resident job seekers in the many areas in which they have always shown a strong interest.

These areas include but are not limited to cashiering, administrative assistants, accountants, front desk clerks, cooks, telephone operators, computer operators, and management trainees.

The list goes on and on.

Using our own locally generated funds has its obvious advantages over federal funds.

For instance, the Job Training Partnership Act Office helps many who are "economically disadvantaged" but there are many more residents who may not meet this definition but who may be in need of job training just the same.



50 poker machines and repeal the sunset provision on the excise taxes.

Tenorio, however, declined to say whether he will veto or sign the bill, H.B. 11-103, which was introduced by House Ways and Means Committee Chair Karl T. Reyes (R-Prec. 1, Saipan).

The bill proposes to repeal the sunset provisions in Public Law 9-22, which could mean an additional \$4 million for the administration's fiscal year 1999

budget proposal.

The 1995 law states that the 50 cent tax per cigarette pack, and 15 cent tax per gallon of fuel would only be in effect for three years.

The rates would then return to 25 cents for cigarettes and 10 cents for gas.

The sunset provision took effect last January.

At the same time, H.B. 11-103 seeks to eliminate the tax break on the earned income credit—which costs the CNMI \$4 to \$10 million a year—and open up the ownership of poker machines.

In addition, the bill seeks to lift the cap on the issuance of poker

machine licenses on Saipan, but would impose a limit on the number of machines that a person can operate.

The bill provides that an operator and his affiliate can only have a maximum of 50 poker machines. Licenses in excess of this limitation would not be renewed.

The current law, P.L. 9-22, allows the government to issue only 200 poker machines for each of the commonwealth's three major islands.

Saipan has 244 poker machines, but the law has a provision that allows for a reduction by attrition until the number goes down to the allowable 200.

The book contains the CNMI's history, as well as explanations of the nature of the Covenant that


There were 30 NMC employees who were given "Total Quality Improvement" certificates after their completion of the said seminar.



CHICAGO (AP)—Scottie Pippen watches Allen Iverson and Shaquille O'Neal's smooth moves, and he's impressed. But defense, now that's a different story.

"The younger players, they all come in and want to have a great, patented move. That's their thing coming into the game, have a killer crossover or have a great dunk," the Chicago Bulls forward said.

"From the defensive standpoint, there hasn't been anyone lately that's come in the league and really made a great defensive stand or been known as a defensive player."

Just look at the NBA's All-Defensive team, announced Wednesday. Michael Jordan—a veteran. Pippen—another veteran. Karl Malone, Gary Payton and Dikembe Mutombo. Veteran, veteran, veteran.

No rookie has made the first team

since the award began after the 1968-69 season, though Tim Duncan, Rookie of the Year from the San Antonio Spurs, made the second team.

"I pride myself on it," said Pippen, who made his seventh defensive team. "I think it's a part of the game that really goes unnoticed, to some degree."

Jordan, who won a record 10th NBA scoring title this season, made a record ninth defensive team.

He was the only player named on the maximum 28 ballots. Coaches could not vote for players on their own team.

Manning signs deal with Adidas


BEAVERTON, Ore. (AP)—Peyton Manning, the No. 1 NFL draft pick, has signed an endorsement deal with Adidas America.
