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

## **On a mission**

The mission statement of the Family Court is: "The mission of the Family Court is to provide for a fair, speedy, economical and accessible forum for the resolution of matters involving families and children."

On March 20, Adult Family Court was canceled for the next day, March 21, and the following Thursday, March 28. Notified were only the Prosecuting Attorney's Office, the Public Defender's Office, and the attorneys whose names were listed on the court calendar. No person involved in those hearings who did not have an attorney on record was notified.

On both days, people showed up at 1:30 p.m. to have their divorce hearings, bench warrants, and family abuse hearings held. Most of these people had taken the entire day off work. One woman, a school teacher, had used her last vacation day. These people were worried and upset, and had been fretting about the outcome of their cases. All of them had spent a lot of time preparing for their hearings. Many had a long drive to get to the courthouse in Lihue. Some of even had to pay for airline tickets and car rentals, as they traveled from outer islands.

These citizens arrived to find an empty rotunda and two lone representatives of the court, who proceeded to inform them that "court was canceled." "No, next week's court is canceled, too." "Sorry, we don't know



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when you're hearing will be rescheduled. ... We'll call you."

One woman was in desperate need of a temporary restraining order. Her attorney, rightfully outraged, demanded an explanation from the Senior Family Court Judge, only to be told to take it up with the Chief Justice, which he did. The response: Talk to the Senior Judge about it.

Bounce, bounce, bounce. Where does the responsibility lay? Who is in charge? Who is taking care of the court system? Who is ensuring that the mission statement is being honored? Who is watching out for the rights of the citizens of this island and this state?

Why did this happen? How did it happen? Hurricane Iniki itself did not cancel court! What power is there higher than an Act of God which has the ability to cancel court? Only the Chief Justice has this awesome power. Yet he did not even know about it occuring. Not even the Senior Judge knew it happened until after the close of the business day.

This happened because one hardworking woman went on vacation. She is a fantastic, dynamic, intelligent woman who is the backbone of the Family Court on Kaua'i. She is the Court Clerk. She easily does the job of three people: She works overtime, through her lunch, often through dinnertime, too.

How is it that this obviously undervalued employee brought down the court system? She requested in writing, three months prior, to take six work days off for a vacation with her family. Even with three months notice ... even with daily reminders, her supervisor neglected to secure a replacement court clerk.

The Judge who was to sit for those hearings asked, the day before the clerk went on vacation, "Who is going to clerk?" The supervisor's response was, "WE have a problem. WE can't get a court clerk." No apology, no truth, no "I'm sorry, I really messed up."

Ultimately, it appears this unsuspecting judge is the one who canceled court. At least that is what the supervisor told people afterwards

Was this incident allowed to be presented to an investigator who flew to Kaua'i to interview staff on May 2? Absolutely not!

The court and the government exist to serve the people. Clearly the public and the employees were not being honored or served during this incident and the resulting aftermath. Months went by and there were still individuals who had not gotten back much-needed bail monies. Why? Because their hearings weren't held! Some of these people have no telephone, or even a home! For weeks the court clerk and I tried to contact various people to clean up these problems, schedule their hearings, put them first on the calendar — any small gesture to make up for this mistreatment at the hands of the court. It is time for our people to speak up against the multitude of injustices perpetrated by the state government. I invite you to do as Thomas Jefferson directed when he said to "Leave no authority existing not responsible to the people." Take back your power and honor your rights! Make a phone call, write a letter. Fill out one of the "We want your opinion" forms located on the counters of each courthouse office! Write the U.S. Department of Justice's Attorney General Janet Reno, in Washington D.C. Share your government so that it doesn't happen to then the next person ... or child. In this case, I can only hope that those interested in the tales told enjoyed the cheerful tone, but understood the details to be agreeable fiction.

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



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






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## **Revitalization or degeneration?**

The Governor's Economic Revitalization Task Force has provided a wonderful opportunity for corporate interests and developers to disseminate misinformation.

On Sept. 12, during a discussion of the Task Force's work on the public TV show *Dialog*, Hawai'i's representative for the National Federation for Independent Business was asked to name one environmental regulation that unnecessarily hampers business. She could not.

Instead, she made one up. She claimed that in the Midwest, the Environmental Protection Agency was regulating the emissions from pigs and cows.

In fact, there is no such regulation. But that did not stop this business advocate from misinforming the public.

On Sept. 17, Robert Ady, an "expert" on business relocation, spoke to the Business Climate Working Group of the Governor's Economic Revitalization Taskforce. He asserted that Michigan was able to stimulate its economy without compromising the integrity of the environment.

Ady ignored the fact that in recent years, timber companies have slashed Michigan's forests with devastating impacts. In fact, Michigan's state government has eliminated all meaningful forums for public input into permitting decisions; Michigan has lowered clean-up standards for toxic waste sites; and Michigan has virtually halted its efforts to enforce its environmental laws.

On Sept. 24, the Business Climate Working Group supported developers' efforts to gut the State Land Use Law. Dan Davidson of the Land Use Research Foundation (a special-interest group comprised of large landowners and developers) and representatives from Alexander & Baldwin and Campbell Estate had lobbied the Business Climate Working Group to reduce protection of natural resources, seeking to deny the public the right to cross-examine developers and to present their own expert witnesses in certain crucial land-use determinations. They claim that the public's desire to know more about a developer's plans for the community - and present contrary opinions - impedes economic progress.

Somehow, the argument goes, the economy will miraculously rebound

## Grease is the word At 1:15 p.m., Oct. 1, HPD

Detective Joe Ryan was driving along Ahiki Street, a Waimānalo back road, when he passed a truck perched on a culvert above Inoaole Stream. He noted that the truck was marked with the words "Affordable Grease Trap Services." Beside the vehicle were two men. One of them, in a blue shirt, "was facing the stream and holding a blue hose in his hand. I could not see the discharge end of the hose, because it was out of my sight line," Ryan said. About 150 feet later, the detective threw his unmarked vehicle into reverse.

"When I backed up, I saw the guy in the blue shirt put the hose in the truck and going towards the driver's door," Ryan said. "In his hands, he had rubber gloves and a screwdriver, and he said that he was 'picking up water because the grease was too thick' from a concrete valve box." Ryan, a longtime Waimānalo resident, peered over the culvert to "see absolutely fresh grease."

The detective, who was out of uniform but wearing an HPD identification card, arrested the Affordable employees on the spot, and contacted HPD and other authorities. The truck was impounded, and later that evening the two men were released, pending an investigation that involves city, state and federal officials. The case could potentially be a violation of the federal Clean Water Act.

According to Michael Cripps, of the State Department of Health's Office of Hazard Evaluation and Emergency Response, "One hundredten gallons of grease-trap material was sucked up by the vacuum truck of a clean-up contractor, out of the streambed, which was dry at that time, and put into drums." Noel Pfeiffer, of the City & County's Department of Waste Water Management, defines grease-trap material as "animal fats, vegetable oil and food residue" that is "microbial, with lots of bacteria and all the endearing qualities of vomit." It originates as restaurant material that goes down drains and is caught by grease traps, where the matter congeals. These traps must periodically be cleaned, and the waste should be disposed of properly in a designated facility, at \$80 per ton.

Pfeiffer said the City could "withdraw permits and/or fine [offenders] \$25,000 per violation and per day," but adds, "Federal penalties are much higher." company has not authorized any illegal dumping."

The alleged dumping took place about half a mile from the Unisyn biowaste recycling plant, which Detective Ryan, coincidentally, is now suing. But Affordable and Unisyn reportedly don't do business together, and there is no known connection between them.

## Manoa Does Mānoa

Fiji poet and academic Pio Manoa recently visited several Hawai'i venues in a series of public appearances. At the East-West Center, Manoa's comments on different communication mediums were as hot and cool as those of another thinker: Marshall McLuhan. The Pro-Vice Chancellor of the University of the South Pacific at Suva spoke on the 'burden of literacy in the Pacific." "Literacy has become a culture, a style of seeing and living, in contrast with the oral life style. [Along with] imperialist armed ships and the promise of dazzling goods, civilization comes under many names. Number one is 'literacy,'" Manoa declared.

Manoa pointed out that missionaries introduced reading and writing, and that their literary form was as ideologically charged as the religious texts they debuted in Oceania. He quoted a proselytizer's 19th-century account of the first printing-press premiere: "Great was the astonishment and marvels of the ... heathens. The barbarous people revered the printing press as a god."

Manoa also noted that today's cyberspace has created new classes of haves and have-nots, be and benots — literacy assumed a supremacy over orality, much as Jehovah did over a "pagan" panoply of deities.

"The sound of language was translated into visual symbols in a moment of reduction, [so] some things were left out," Manoa stated, adding that the spontaneous element of "performance" is absent when the spoken is rendered written. He also delineated a unique example of passive/aggressive syndrome: "The native ... was reduced to ... the informant who has the information that the missionary wants, and solicits a story from," leaving the transcriber in control of the flow of information. And as with translation from one language - or medium — to another, something is



if development is allowed to proceed in areas that have previously been designated for protection. Never mind that enough land has already been placed in the state's urban districts to satisfy growth for the next two decades.

Now, the Governor is calling for reduction in corporate income taxes — again, under the auspices of "economic revitalization." Since consumer prices are dictated by supply and demand, how will consumers benefit from corporate tax breaks? We're not sure. But Alexander & Baldwin, foreign-owned hotels, Chevron, BHP Petroleum and their out-of-state stockholders will certainly be happy over news of these developments. Affordable has not been charged with this kind of eco-crime before, to Pfeiffer's knowledge, but he noted that "the City is processing enforcement action regarding the recordkeeping for 1995 and 1996" of the waste disposer.

Affordable's attorney, Robert Miller, said he was unaware of the record-keeping investigation. "The company makes a big effort to comply with record-keeping" requirements, Miller declared.

Affordable "will vigorously defend against any charges," the attorney said. "We will work closely with authorities, such as HPD. ... The always lost in the process.

Is there a free-speech battle brewing at University aVenue?

New news on campus

n independent student newspaper on the University of HawaNi's Manoa campus: Sounded like a liberating idea to three student journalists who'd previously worked on the university-affiliated student press, Ka Leo O Hawai'i.

After a two-year stint at the student daily, Michael Lee, Ryan Ozawa

and William Matsuda had learned enough in Ka Leo's classroom-style newsroom and wanted the freedom to write more in-depth stories without the pressure of "always being on deadline," or the restraining effect of operating under the auspices of the UH administration.

"Because of the 4 o'clock deadline, most of our stories were pretty shallow," admitted Ozawa, who served as Ka Leo's editor in chief for two years. "And, yeah, there were

times when I had second thoughts about covering certain stories, because Ka Leo's affiliated with UH. That's always in the back of your mind."

As the campus' newest alternative independent paper, with a circulation of 5,000, aVenue receives no student activity funds. UH-Manoa students pay \$13 per semester to fund the campus' Board of Publications, which oversees, among other publications, Ka Leo, the official campus student paper, which has a daily circulation of about 18,000.

Inspired by the multitude of diverse student voices expressed in 10 independent student newspapers on the UC Berkeley campus, Lee, Ozawa and Matsuda spent last summer facing the "trials and tribulations" of becoming trailblazers in establishing their own alternative monthly, University aVenue, free of the UH bureaucracy.

"It's great being your own boss," Lee said, who serves as photojournalist for aVenue, which distributed its first eight-page edition Aug. 25. "We divide the work and go about getting things done." That included personally dipping into their wallets for \$350 to augment cash collected for advertising to cover costs of the inaugural issue.

"People love the idea of alternative news, but it was difficult to sell advertising when you have no visible product in hand," Ozawa said. he most popular sentiment has been "it's about time" an alternative student newspaper graced the UH-Manoa campus. But just how free is free on the university campus?

Facing instant unpopularity with UH administrators, aVenue staffers have had to quickly brush up on legal precedents they believe protect their First Amendment rights to distribute the newspaper on campus without prior administrative approval.

aVenue first ran into trouble on the opening day of classes in August, when Ozawa, Lee and Matsuda handed out copies of the newspaper in the lower campus parking structure. After passing out some 3,000 issues, campus security stopped distribution and advised the threesome to use the Campus Center courtyard as a distribution point.

There they encountered a campus center administrator who discouraged distribution without a "use permit."

Now Lee, Ozawa and Matsuda must address University of Hawai'i restrictions, which require aVenue to apply for a campus center use permit before they distribute the October/November issue.

University policy on UH "free speech areas" (yes, they are delineated) requires administrative review and advance scheduling for all student- and department-related activities planned for the campus' designated speech areas, Varney



Circle and the Campus Center's indoor forum and outdoor courtyard.

Facilities management officials say they review requests for the use of Varney Circle to ensure that activities, including the distribution of written materials, don't interfere with the normal flow of traffic or the safety of pedestrians around Varney Circle. All banners and fliers, for example, must be submitted to facilities management for prior approval.

> an Javinar, the interim director of UH Co-Curricular Activities in the Campus Center, commented that as a public institution, the university has the right to determine "time, place and

manner" guidelines in the distribution of literature campus-wide. Those regulations don't constitute censorship, Javinar said. He added that as a "special-use facility," Campus Center administrators can also establish further rules and regulations for the building, as long as they don't conflict with the university's overall facilities-use policy.

aVenue staffers, however, argue that the regulations are aimed at scheduling concerts, lectures and other gatherings requiring sound equipment and technical support coordination. And they say Javinar's interpretation of the campus center regulations stifles the free exchange of ideas by burdening the distribution of the student newspaper.

Javinar says the across-the-board policy bans all unregistered use of the Campus Center facilities, including distribution of written materials.

"For them to use the Campus Center courtyard, like any other group, they have to sign out for it," he said. "I'm not trying to keep them from distributing. I simply informed them what the requirements were, and where the free speech areas were."

The aVenue staff takes issue with these requirements.

"Javinar is abusing his power," Lee said.

Attorneys at the Student Press Law Center, a free-speech advisory body in Washington, D.C., claim aVenue is on solid constitutional ground in challenging Javinar's interpretation of time, place and manner restrictions. The SPLC contends constitutional law and legal precedent establish that school administrators can't create unreasonable restrictions on the time, place and manner of distribution - especially when restrictions are intended to prohibit viewpoints they dislike.

courts have ruled, their only purpose must be to promote the orderly administration of school activities by preventing disruption, according to the SPLC.

uninterested students during an

English class lecture, that would constitute disruption," Lee said. "But handing out the paper at lunch time in a common student area like Campus Center doesn't constitute a disorderly or disruptive activity.

'Students have the right to freedom of expression, as long as they aren't causing a disruption," Lee said. "There is no way, short of holding people at gunpoint, that we'd be causing a disruption on campus by distributing to people who are just walking around."

Javinar responded that it's unfortunate aVenue staffers, whom he worked with at Ka Leo, didn't come to him directly to discuss the details of their complaint.

"I have to remember they are student journalists first, still learning the trade and the craft," Javinar said. "They are open to making errors that a more experienced professional would not.'


With aVenue's second edition close to completion, Lee, Ozawa and Matsuda are readying to challenge Javinar's strict interpretation of the use-permit regulations.

"We're going to distribute, and let them try and stop us," Lee said,



Next, in Yahoo, I went to rap and hip hop. I'll let the Players United (http://home4.swipnet.se/~w-40901/playaz.htm) intro do the talking — "Wassup all ya playaz! Thanx for stoppin' by at Players United's homepage. We're a phat live rap & hip-hop band from Hudiksvall, Sweden. The Players United clique consists of 10 Soldiez Fo' Da Funk, who all come from different musical backgrounds. We listen to every-

The site is well-designed, and you are given the option of flashy graphics or



(www.liveconcerts.com/listening/kcrw/), a public radio station out of California. Their "Morning Becomes Eclectic" show is something we definitely don't get here at home. Over 300 interviews and performances, ranging from Zap Mama to The Cranberries, are available online. They also list recent additions and the top 5 requests. My pulse quickened when I found Leonard Cohen in the top five (you'll now find him in the complete listing). Two clicks later, I was listening to Cohen singing "Hallelujah" and talking about his musical influences. The journey was worth it; I was hooked on Internet radio.

One of those infernal ads took me to Live Online (www.liveonline.com/), where the "left of the dial" link beckoned. My palms got sweaty as I clicked. I couldn't believe my eyes when I saw the "Internet-Only Stations" header. I pumped my fist and let out a primal yell. Internet radio is alive!

Twelve Internet radio sites are listed, and all are worth checking out. By the way, Brainwash (www.monsterbit.com/brainwash/) is a site you should check out about five in the morning before you've had your first cup of coffee. They do immoral things with color that should be outlawed. Assembled by King Coffey of the Butthole Surfers, Brainwash is a veritable cornucopia of

"interesting" music.

To call the sites AudioNet and Net Radio "radio networks" on the Internet is to do them an injustice. They are more like 500-channel cable TV on the Internet (except they do "radio"). AudioNet (www.AudioNet.com/)



Net Radio (www.netradio.net/): Let me first say that I love Net Radio. Just the other day I heard a surf version of Tennessee Ernie Ford's "Sixteen Tons." You can't get music like that on the FM dial. Now I'll bitch: You have to be Sherlock Holmes to get around. To find music, you must first find the "NetShow Studio" link hidden on the right hand side of the page. The site isn't as well laid out as AudioNet, or as cleanly labeled and categorized: ska, techno and '80s/new wave are listed as Modern Rock. (Modern rock is under Modern Rock, but only if you click on the big X. Reggae is under Vintage Rock, as is Surf. You'll find Punk under Dance/Urban.) It's better to look at a complete list of the 100 channels. (To do this, first get into one of the music pages, then

click on the "Music" button that appears at the top of the screen.) Net Radio doesn't have as extensive an offering as AudioNet; it is focused more on original music and entertainment content than broadcast feeds (this is a com-

pliment). The programs are obviously put together by people who know and love music.

(http://imusic.com/radio/): When I first hit the iMusic site I saw the magic words, "If you think a song sucks, then TRASH IT!" Finally, here I found interactive radio. iMusic isn't really pirate, but it is the music listeners want. Within a category - for example, "Classic Modern Rock," or "Current Alternative Rock" - listeners submit titles of songs they want placed in rotation, or that they want trashed. The votes are tallied, and the resultant changes reflected in the playlist. No commercials, either. iMusic doesn't have as many channels as Net Radio, or as tightly defined categories as AudioNet, but it does offer playlists and interesting - sometimes kooky - programming, driven by the listeners. iMusic is forward about wanting to sell you a CD, but the CDs are worth buying. Check out the Indie category to hear new bands.

BURBS, British Unsigned Rock Bands Station (http://users.powernet.co.uk/cool/index2.html -- click on the "Radio" button, then the "Listen To BURBS Radio NOW" button), is a 25-minute show showcasing, you guessed it, unsigned rock bands. The show changes once a month, and if you like it, you can download it for posterity. A new dj, Rik Rok, just came on board — he's a wicked throwback to the worst of the '70s DJs. Even so, the music is great; listening is highly recommended.


I found SPIN College Radio (http://www.premrad.com/music/sp in/) earlier this year, when I first dabbled at finding radio on the Internet. It's not really a radio station, but archives of a syndicated radio show, put out by Premier Radio Network. When I first listened to the shows, SPIN was so hip and cool that it was sponsored by Certs. Now hip and cool means

I list this site because it's trippy: English subtitles; the song hits come in both Swedish and English; the only time I've heard Elton John's tribute to Princess Diana was at HitFM; and finally, this is the first Swedish link that has actually gotten me to real live Swedish radio. At your next party, impress your friends and tune in the Swedes.

(http://zerolart.simplenet.com/): "Art worth hearing" says it all. Think Andy Warhol plugged in.

The Ultimate Band List people have an Ultimate Radio List (www.ubl.com/radio/) which really is ultimate, with links from Romania to Korea and a lot of points in between on both sides of the Atlantic. For more sites than I could ever cover, check out UBL's URL.

Benny is a techno-dancing demon that you control. He is guaranteed to get on the nerves of any pain in the ass you might know. Tranzfusion







With modern technology, there are a lot of ways to spend your money. Here are your options if you want to listen to music on the Internet.

Modem: You will get the biggest digital bang for your buck by buying a 56k modem. You won't really get 56k speeds but they do provide enough additional muscle to allow listening and cruisinmg the Web at the same time. Prices range from \$100-\$200. Before plunking down money, check out http://x2.usr.com/connectnow/linetest.html to make sure your phone lines will handle 56k speeds. If your Internet access is through a digital phone system or PBX, the new modems won't work unless you bypass the phone system. Also, make sure your ISP supports 56k access and your brand of modem.

You'll need ISDN if you want to watch real video or hear near CD quality stereo. ISDN modems range from \$300-\$600. You will be charged per minute for usage by the phone company and a higher access residential customers, and includes the rental of the cable modem. Cable access speeds are about 20 times faster and won't tie up your phone line.

If you don't have a detachable speaker system with sub-woofer, you should. Systems are designed specifically for computer usage and will not cause interference with your monitor or peripherals. You can hook your computer directly to your home stereo also. Keep the components and speakers at least three feet away from your computer, or your monitor will jiggle like Jell-O.

If you want to experience a world of music the local stations will never be able to provide, you should plan on investing some money in your hardware ---unless you think AM radio is just fine.

What about software? You'll need at least Netscape Navigator 3.0 or Microsoft Internet Explorer 3.0. When you start surfing, the sites will have information and links for other software you'll need. ---J.E.





## **Ain't That a Peach**

he Iona Pear Dance Theater's concerts are never what you would expect a dance recital to be, and this weekend's will be unlike any of its predecessors. As usual, director Cheryl Flaherty combines bold imagery, contemporary topics and singular notions of spirituality with the new wave Japanese art form known as butch. However, the anthology to be performed, entitled In God's Hands, includes two world premieres that address sexual abuse and domestic violence, and the company's concern with the issues doesn't stop with the choreography. Iona Pear will distribute complimentary tickets to 300 clients of domestic violence awareness centers, publicize the cause during intermission and conduct a series of workshops for victims after the performance.

## Chinese Modern

The Hawai'i Theatre is the perfect setting for the United States debut of the **Guangdong Modern Dance Company** — and not just because it sits on the edge of Chinatown. The

emphasis here is on Hawai'i, with which China's first and only professional modern dance troupe had bonded before a single dancer had set a sturdy foot on these islands. The company's original mentor was, after all, Carl Wolz, who headed the dance program at UH-Mänoa before moving into the top job at the Dance College of the Hong Kong Performing Arts College.

More recently, Honolulu's resident jet-setter Betty Jones taught the dancers both in China and at North Carolina's American Dance Festival, with which China enjoys a mostfavored nation status of some 10 years standing. In that short decade, the Guangdong com-

pany has developed sufficiently to perform in Europe and in neighboring Asian countries, where it has shown the modern dance crowd classically Chinese passages and contemporary celebrations of energy and light, will give us our first glimpse of what Chinese men *and* women can do with the modern idiom. Based on what we've already seen at the ballet, we'll make a prediction: They'll be fantastic. —Paula Durbin

## Theater Core Sample

s usual, **Lila Kane** has left us at a bit of a loss as to just how to characterize her latest performance. Theater? Concert? True, **Love**, **the**  *Ultrasonic Core* is at heart about music, but that's a bit limiting. Multilingual and four-octaved, Kane has assembled an all-woman ensemble — Chizuko Nishimura on taiko drums, Deborah Masterson on Korean drums, Rebecca Smith on harp and Pat Bentley on synthesizer — to, as she puts it, "combine languages, sounds and stories that identify with many aspects of the human condition ... and provides a transcending, experiential and entertaining vision."

And combine she does: The performance features songs, sounds and chants in Tibetan, English, Spanish, Sanskrit, Zulu, Arabic, Japanese and Hawaiian. (What, no Esperanto?)

Oh, yeah ... There's also the love thing. (Bitter, are we? You bet!) Let's just say that Kane's interest

in music transcends the ordinary. "Love is the universal theme —



auhala to Laotian weaving, ki ho'alu to Korean dance: You want it, the State Foundation on Culture and the Arts' Celebrate Folk and Traditional Arts" Festival has most definitely got it. Featuring more than 100 artists who have participated in the SFCA Folk Arts Apprenticeship since 1985 — and with more than 50 arriving from the Neighbor Islands — the daylong festival features performances of Hawaiian chant, slack key and steel guitar; Okinawan, Filipino and Korean dances by a number of local troupes; and craft demonstrations, including Hawaiian lauhala weaving,

Education, illumination and contemplation are goals. *In God's Hands* is like church with good music and without the collection plate," says Flaherty. As for the artistry, she promises a concert that is "very Iona Pear." Meaning, for her, "bold, twisted and thought-provoking." — P.D.



# Hawaiian Underground

o you find it hard to imagine that three local Hawaiian brothers straight out of paradise — weaned on Hawaiian music, roots reggae, dancehall, surfing and raw fish before being injected with soul and a near overdose of Public Enemy — would be capable of creating legitimate "rap music"; to cut an album that displays true hip hop rhythms and beats, flavored with Hawaiian and English consciousness lyrics woven together to erupt with ethnic-based attitude?

"Aloha from Hilo, Hawaii. Sudden Rush, the self-proclaimed originators of na mele paleole (Hawaiian Rap Music) are in the hale spreading the message of a nation — the Nation of Hawai'i."

Founded in Hilo three and a half years ago, Sudden Rush consists of five members: three lead vocalists, one DJ/producer/musical arranger and one manager.

The vocal trio is ignited by Kid Dynomite, Shane Veincent. Kid is the group's spontaneous visionary, never lacking in ideas, melodies or lyrical direction. Caleb Richards, a.k.a. Pakalo, is the bushy-haired wildman, a psycho loose-canon element who never fails to work the crowd into a frenzy and get them rocking during live shows — and the one most partial to an occasional stage dive or two.

Sudden Rush's third rapper/vocal stylist is King Don 1, Don Keala Kawa'auhau Jr. King Don is not only a musical performer, but a teacher of Hawaiian language at Punana Leo o Hilo, a private pre-school specializing in educating keiki in Hawaiian. Kawa'auhau's command of the Hawaiian language is a major factor in Sudden Rush's ability to fuse an ancient indigenous language with Afro-western drum and bass beats, unpretentiously maintaining proper consideration and respect for the essence and meaning of the Hawaiian language. "A lot of people thought the music, the Hawaiian language and the message wouldn't go together," says Kawa'auhau. "We're all part-Hawaiian, and the sovereignty issue is at the political forefront. We felt we could reach people who maybe don't like to read about these issues through the medium of music. Rap music."

DJ Radical, Rob Oneka, is the fourth performing member of Sudden Rush. Oneka came onboard in full capacity for the recording of the band's second album,  $K\bar{u}$ ' $\bar{e}$ ! He assumed mixing, arrangement and production responsibilities, with most of the album being recorded in his Way Out West Enterprises Studio, which also serves as the label  $K\bar{u}$ ' $\bar{e}$ ! was released on. Oneka admits that the creative process between him and the Sudden Rush vocalists is very stimulating and interactive.

"The musical approach we took for the  $K\bar{u}$ ' $\bar{e}$ ! album was straight hip hop on a Hawaiian tip — positive music for Hawaiian youth," Oneka says. "Sudden Rush is a diverse group of artists with a wide range of tastes and influences. We are Hawaiian and this album,  $K\bar{u}$ ' $\bar{e}$ !, needed to be done. Now we're anxious to relax and showcase the untapped, funky, wayout inclinations of Sudden Rush."

The behind-the-scenes fifth member of Sudden Rush is band manager Kwai-Chang Publico, or Tuko (Hawaiian for "glue"). It's an appropriate nickname because Tuko keeps everything together — bookings, dates and loose business ends. He maintains the focus of spreading the voice of the Hawaiian Nation real.

For years, rap music has been unfairly scrutinized and overlooked as a lucrative musical medium by the stuffy, old-school contingents that exist in the music industry. Rap music has been the oppressed minority's vehicle to fire off anger and frustration, no matter how offensive the ranting rhyme may be to the infringing establishment. This is exactly why Sudden Rush's "Polynesian Underground" aspirations work. They are telling the history of an oppressed people as best they can, not in an angry or vindictive way, but with honesty, with the hope to move on. "Being an entertainer and a teacher, I realize we have a responsibility about what kids listen to," Kawa'auhau says. "We shouldn't glorify violence, but you shouldn't hide it if it's out there. That's what the gangsta-rappers do. It's what they know, it's what they live. They should try to inform and educate others about their harsh realities.

Unlike their rap predecessors, who were met with opposition by the establishment, Sudden Rush's efforts have been embraced by the kūpuna and the Hawaiian music community at large. They have not only succeeded in gaining approval, but of obtaining musical contributions from a number of elite local artists sympathetic to the Sudden Rush cause — Keali'i Reichel, Ehukai, John and Guy Cruz, Uncle Willie K and Fiji.

"When we called Keali'i Reichel to ask him to help out on 'Don't Blame the Youth," Kwai-Chang recalls, "he said 'You can't forcefeed children the Hawaiian language.' If rap music would be responsible for encouraging one child to learn Hawaiian, he wanted to be a part of it." (Reichel has also included "Don't Blame the Youth" on his upcoming Japanese release.)

Being based in Hilo has its inconveniences as far as getting to gigs and working with other Island musicians. Sudden Rush takes it in stride, though, making the trip to O'ahu whenever possible. This Saturday, the band will take the stage with Allen Koa, John and Ernie Cruz, Moe Keale, the Nu'uanu Brothers, and others for Pālolo Pride III, the valley's annual food and music festival to celebrate Palolo roots. The same day, they will be at Border's Books and Music for a CD autograph session and live performance.


Some may write off or criticize Sudden Rush's attempt at hip hop as wanna-be-brothers-in-the-hood; gangstas without a cause, or Bones, Thugs and Sovereignty. Don't be so quick to label these Hawaiians as unschooled opportunists or flavors of the month. Their motivation and direction is straight up, and if you don't dig what they're doing or get it, it's probably because the music and the message aren't aimed at you: Sudden Rush is roaring Kū'ē! (oppose, resist, stand different) to the youth, Hawaiians and all who rise to answer the cry in this paradise - not lost, but found again.

## Radio

After years of false starts, KTUH-FM's proposed power increase is working it's way to the top.

Watt's Up?

I really wish they would invent something else in addition to radio. ... Future generations would then have the opportunity to be astounded by the way broadcasting made it possible to say what it had to to the entire Planet Earth and at the same time enabled the Planet Earth to see that it had nothing to say. —Bertolt Brecht, 1927

n the wrong hands, 100 watts is barely enough energy to power a dim thought. However, in terms of Honolulu's ever shrinking radio scene, KTUH-FM's 100 watts has taken on the importance of a beacon on a dark and crappy night.

Overly dramatic? Consider this: When Bill Clinton signed the Telecommunications Act of 1996, it was for the most part covered on the business pages as a potential boon for the communications industry (ignore the irony of the phrase "communications industry," for now). At the time, only a few isolated voices decried the fact that the Telecommunications Act actually allowed for the concentration of information outlets in fewer and fewer hands. For example, under the new legislation, a company can now own as many as eight radio stations in a single market.

Now consider this: In 1982, journalist and media pundit Ben Bagdikian found that less than 50 conglomerates dominated United States media. As of today, that number has shrunk to 10.

Seven of Honolulu's largest radio stations are now owned by two companies, Caribou and Patterson. This has had two interrelated results programming that is increasingly homogenized and/or dull as dirt, and an increasing tendency to exclude any voice, music or news item that might cost your favorite media conglomerate advertising revenue. In other words, what you hear is increasingly determined by what will best sell a station to the advertisers that are its lifeblood. Thus the rock you live on runs the danger of becoming the rock you're spoon-fed on . and some of the most vital music and commentary out there literally disappears. Oh yes, being the 28- to 35-yearold woman that I am, I often listen to STAR 101.9, but when I really want to hear programming with teeth - programming that is decided by the DJs themselves and runs the spectrum from a Hawaiian music show conducted completely in Hawaiian to the latest in hip hop, rock and electronica - where can I turn? When I want to find a radio station that instills in its staff and listeners the idea that a free flow of information and opinion is vital, what's out there? Enter UH-Mānoa's 28-year-old campus station, and its decade-long quest for a power boost.



What's the frequency, Kenneth? KTUH's power increase is now in the hands (almost) of UH president Kenneth Mortimor and the board of regents.

hey've been looking for a power increase longer than they've been looking for the Holy Grail." So laughed Honolulu Weekly founding editor and ex-KTUH DJ Julia Steele during a recent phone conversation. It's a sentiment that's shared by more than a few ex-staffers (many of whom have gone on to a variety of

alternative ventures in the community) and fans who have watched and waited since the mid-'80s as the station inched its way towards an increase from 100 to 3,000 watts --only to be disappointed more than once.

Some theorize that the reason the increase has taken so long has to do with a grand cabal on the part of the UH administration, but the truth appears to be simpler. Pamela Westcott, the station's General Manager from 1989 through 1991, echoes a belief held by many: The UH bureaucracy could stop an elephant in its tracks.

"I don't think there's some conspiracy to keep them down," says Westcott, who now works for 'Olelo. "The processes campuswide are just outdated — it's like that for everything from a parking pass to a power increase." During Westcott's tenure, the station's desire to find an offcampus site for their broadcast tower added a further layer to the process. which was already dense with paperwork and confused by a system without clear guidelines on how to apply for the increase. "You send it where you think it's supposed to go, and it gets kicked right back at you," Westcott says. It appears, however, that the walls may be coming down. Because the station has been ferreting away money for more than a decade — as a chartered student organization, KTUH receives \$3 per student each fall and spring and \$1 each summer — it now has more than \$50,000 set aside solely for construction costs, maintenance fees and FCC permits. Significantly, though it might mean less signal coverage, the station's latest proposal calls for building a new

broadcast tower atop Porteus Hall, rather than seeking a site off-campus. That's a move that should make the overall approval process a bit smoother ... and, hopefully, quick-

"We have everything we need," says current GM Frank McPherson. "We've done all of our paperwork, we've done our public notice, our petitions — everything. Now it's just a matter of everybody going 'hey, this is a good idea — let's do it.' It's not that the Board of Regents doesn't want this, it's just that they don't know about it. They seem to know that there's a college radio station, but I think that's all they know."


ome things the regents should know: The radio station will soon be broadcast internationally over the World Wide

Web via Real Audio; British Broadcasting Corporation radio network is nearing completion on a documentary featuring six of the United States' most interesting college radio stations — one of which is KTUH; and the station now has it's own Web site. These are not just kids fooling around.

"Yes, we're a college station, but we are also professional," says McPherson. "If we get this power increase, we're going to make UH proud ... we're going to make them happy we're around."



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Will the power increase effect programming? Not at all, says McPherson. "As long as it's clean, as long as it doesn't break any FCC rules, anything goes." Brecht would have been proud.

KTUH currently broadcasts at 90.3 FM in Honolulu, 89.7 FM in Hawai'i Kai, 91.3 FM on the North Shore or on channel 62 of Oceanic Cable's Music Choice. The KTUH Radiothon, which will raise additional funds for the station's power increase, continues through Sunday 10/12 at various Honolulu sites. 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




## Film

Director Oliver Stone keeps the (bloody) pot boiling in U-Turn.

he deeply shallow, artfully contrived U-Turn, turned out on a low budget by Oliver Stone (whose last three high-budgeteers tanked), might just be the most self-conscious movie you'll ever see. That is, if you choose to see it at all - and if you do, I recommend you wait for it to come out on home video, where it's a safe bet there'll be a more sexually-explicit "director's cut." (That'll also give you a chance to turn it off, or at least to take a breather: This is a real Oliver Stone hothouse number — in your face and up your ... well, never mind.)

As vivid as a peyote trip (with the same alternately saturated and desaturated colors, the same jittery pixilated visuals, the same shards of flashbacks), the movie — taking place in the never-never land of Superior, Arizona — tells the traditional noir story of a troubled man on the run (Sean Penn, good as always) trapped in a nightmarish small town full of

eccentrics with secrets (including hidden money and someone they need murdered). It's a story told in hallu-

cinogenic comic strips slashes of color and jittery steadicam swoops and angularities. (The sentence you've just tried to read is its print equivalent.) You've seen this all before, and Stone knows it: he just wants us to see how "well" he does it - bloodier and sexier and more nightmarish. And it is, it is.

The script, based loosely on the novel Stray Dogs, takes the classic alienated characters of noir, adds a dash of Southwest chic (a shamantype is the one-man Greek chorus here), adds a fillip of hot Salsa (Jennifer Lopez, with what looks to be an augmented ass) and tries to turn them into a comment on our real world — a world that has a lot more common sense than this movie can even fathom. In U-Turn, all people are basically animals with huge appetites, capable of angelhood but hardly ever achieving it. At least according to our "blind" half-Indian shaman/fakir (Jon Voight), who tells Bobby, our hero, the following: "Your lies are old, but you tell them good."

Bobby, you see, is on the lam from someone who's going to have him killed for gambling debts he almost

paid (until his pay-back money is lost in an unlikely heist). When his car gives out in Superior, Bobby finds himself in the clutches of a demonic mechanic (Billy Bob Thornton), a mysterious sheriff (Powers Boothe), a jealous shit-kicker (Joaquin Phoenix), and Lopez's old-coot husband (Nick Nolte). Both Lopez and hubby (he's also her father — it's that kind of noir) want each other offed; and Bobby, who digs Lopez anally, has to decide who(m) to kill in order to keep from being killed himself. Perhaps needless to say, everybody betrays everybody else endlessly - and a whole lot of blood is spilled in high-grunge detail, courtesy the superb cinematography of Robert Richardson, who perfected his low-budget shooting skills in earlier films by John Sayles.

Beautifully turned out, U-Turn is an exercise in craft designed to titillate audiences and critics alike ---and there will be those who like its excesses and redundancies and selfconscious camera-work and eccentric music-score. It's a movie designed to be talked about — and it will be. Is it worth your time? It's your call. Offhand, I'd say no.

As for Stone himself (and this is a movie about Stone, not his characters) — well, let's put it this way: His lies are old, but he tells them good.

Three years after the death of her beloved husband Prince Albert, Queen Victoria is inconsolable. She has withdrawn from public life and her household, including the whole Royal Family, is held hostage in the palace by her grief. In a desperate attempt to save her and the monarchy, palace officials send for John Brown (Billy Connolly), Prince Albert's former horseman and hunting guide, because "Highlanders are good for the health."

The no-nonsense Scot arrives and takes the situation by the reins, nearly forcing the monarch out of her castle and onto her pony. Soon the two have forged a close friendship and

responsibilities over the household, until he almost rules it. Rumors follow, public opinion shifts against the monarchy, something has to be done.

With the death of Princess Diana, Mrs. Brown, a story about private desires and public duties, has a spooky timeliness. (There is even a scene in which the protective Brown pummels a 19th-century version of the paparazzi.) But even though there are echoes of recognition that bring this period piece to life, the film isn't as compelling as it should be. It is missing something and that something is the relationship between the Queen and her servant. While it opens wonderfully with Brown bullying the stubborn ruler and progresses

snobs, the film doesn't quite know where to go from there.

Constrained by history, the film sputters along, jumping four years here and 15 years there to capture the occasional conversation or horseback ride. The Queen's love of her manservant is only hinted at and Brown's obsession with protecting her isn't really explored. Therefore, the dramatic climax about public obligation over personal happiness is sort of hurried through as the film moves on to other Brown moments — both big and small. As in most bio-pics, this one moves all the way through to the death of one of its characters. It would have been nice if it didn't end in death, but a little love and misunderstanding.

One actor, eight directors, six scenes, one devil of a good time.

verything about the latest Late Night offering at UH-Mānoa's Lab Theatre, The Devil and Billy Markham, carries the exciting taint of a dare: Can a one-man show pay off? A script in verse? Can it work with its six separate scenes, directed by eight student directors? Executed with 60 bucks, reckless energy and a lot of guts, The Devil and Billy Markham serves up a glorious 90 minutes of daring theater that manages to keep you hanging on every word.

Like Longfellow on acid, the poet Shel Silverstein (poet/author of A Light in the Attic, Where the Sidewalk *Ends* and several oddities in *Playboy*) uses a steady, driving, rhyming verse to weave a boozy, gutter legend of one Billy Markham. This devil-maycare blues guitarist takes on the Devil himself in a game of craps and coolly forfeits his soul. A sore winner, the Devil finds Markham's cool a more challenging prize than his soiled soul, so he tries to break him with

further torments that backfire until all heaven and hell are embroiled in their feud. Each new torture, each new twist, drives the plot forward with barroom humor and suspense.

Like a circus act, Megan Evans beautifully negotiates this show. Juggling all the roles and all the directors, she keeps the audience fascinated by her sheer dexterity. But her ability to keep the show focused as a narrated tale — just a damn good story — will win your applause. Even the dancers and occasional walk-on performers keep the play tied to this storytelling. The parceled directing does create awkward pauses between the scenes, unfortunately - but the invigorating variety and surprise are worth the waits.

Jodie Yamada, Brian Bozanich, Andy Utech, Ed Dyer with Nicole Tessier, Julie Iezzi and Marueen Freehill each make the show a surprisingly integrated mural, combining comic traditions, visual projections, dance, Asian theater and

even a bow to cartooning.

No one denies that this was an attempt to give more student directors a chance for space (for most, to flesh out their degrees). In other words, the script really doesn't lend itself to such contortions. But this creative solution to a space problem ground out a rare gem for Honolulu audiences. The Devil and Billy Markham keeps you on the edge of your seat, eagerly awaiting the next off-color rhyme, the next twist of fate, the next bizarre element, all in a heady rush of energy and skill.

Center. For those of you unfamiliar with the greater Honolulu territory, Niu Valley is the kissin' cousin to Hawai'i Kai, sharing its secrets with 'Aina Haina, on that blessed strip of road called Kalaniana'ole (now basking in all its newly completed road-warrior glory). CliQuo has been open for about two-and-a-half years, and it's inspired many of those "Have you eaten at that French place?" conversations with friendly foodlovers during that time. With all that word-of-mouth going on, I was amazed nobody I knew had eaten there yet. Well, they shall now. There's a quiet elegance to this place. A nice reception area at the front gives way to a deceptively large dining room. A large lovely vase brimming with sunflowers caught my eye, as did the multiple sconces illuminating skyward. The ceiling fans, taking their sweet time, seemed wondrously rhythmic, as Edith Piaflike music found its way inside me.

Podensac and has been made since the late 1800s. It's a touch sweet and is known to stimulate one's appetite (that's never been one of my challenges, by the way). We began with the petite Duck Pate (\$5.50) teamed with organic greens in a Dijon mustard vinaigrette. It was what I call "country style" coarse and chewy, not the pasty spreadable version, and it reminded me of my first visit to France, when my car broke down in near-freezing weather in the middle of the night, and all I had to eat for my nighttime repast was duck pate, cornichons and a baguette. One of the best meals of my life. The petite Medley of Lobster & Wild Mushrooms (\$7.75) was a treat, topped with a julienne of spinach and moistened with the juice of black truffle. The sweetness and tenderness of the lobster partnered well with the chanterelle and oyster mushrooms in this dish. Lobster note: This was what most people call "Maine

rare find. She was truly multi-national, as well, speaking Russian, French, Hebrew, Japanese, Italian and German. Talk about a smorgasbord, eh? She's cornered the market on languages, and I'm green with envy. The entree choices range from duck foie gras to rack of lamb, veal chop, roasted scallops, filet mignon and much more. I ordered the Roasted Breast of Chicken (\$16), knowing an accomplished french chef can make poulet ooh-la-la. Sure enough, it was splendid. The breast was sliced and fanned out on the plate, roasted golden crisp, and topped with haricot verte (long green beans). The side veggie was a sautéed mix of red and yellow sweet peppers nestled between potato slices. The sauce was subtle and thyme-inspired. Miss A. had the Filet of Opakapaka (\$24) with a ginger beurre blanc sauce. I applaud the inventiveness of this sauce and how well it worked with the thick juicy filet. Watercress rested beneath the fish, and a Maui

onion compote completed the picture. A side of mashed potato was offered as well, buttery and slightly chunky, the way it's supposed to be.

If you'd like to keep costs down and be introduced to Chef Yves Menoret's touch, CliQuo offers a 3course Prix Fixe menu (\$27 per person) that changes weekly and includes an appetizer, entree and dessert. You'll want to call for that week's menu offerings.

Desserts were prepared by Dwayne Chang, the extremely talented young man who serves as both the Sous & Pastry Chef for CliQuo. (Wearing two toques, you might say.)


Chang does a Vanilla-Chocolate Sabayon Glace with an orangecaramel sauce (\$6.25) that you'll want to come back for. Sabayon is traditionally a sweetened egg-based creamy dreaminess, a proper combination of pillowy-billowy-velvety clouds, heavier than meringue and lighter than custard. This one had thin, bittersweet chocolate sand-

wiched inside, gratineed lightly on top for a texture shift, and the previously mentioned orange-caramel sauce.

The Chocolate Mousse (\$6) had an airier-than-most consistency, topped with an almond tuille — a thin, very crisp, dark sugar almond cookie. The mousse did a disappearing act as soon as it touched our lips. Interesting fact about cocoa butter, from which chocolate is made in varying degrees of purity: In nature, cocoa butter melts at exactly 98.6 degrees Fahrenheit — that is, body temperature. Need I say more?

Don't harbor the illusion that we were finished yet. Dessert is the fifth season in Miss A's life (winter, spring, summer, fall and dessert), so sweettreat no. 3 was the CliQuo Tart of the Day (\$5.75). It was a citrus custard cream topped with orange, kiwi, banana, raspberry and blueberries, arranged over a very thin pastry shell and accented with a berry sauce. At the end of the evening, I asked to meet the chef to thank him for our enjoyable experience. Thinking I might get a pearl of wisdom to share with you, gentle eater, I asked chef Yves to describe his style of cooking.

Without skipping a beat, his eyes locked on mine, and he said, "French,





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n movies, when someone lands a punch there's this nifty slappy sound that real punches just don't make. What is that sound? -Adam S., New Haven, Connecticut

elcome to the world of "Foley artists," the unsung geniuses who create the larger-than-life sound effects that make a flick come alive. For a good face punch, a Foley artist might hit a piece of raw meat with his fist, maybe wearing a tight leather glove for enhanced smackiness. I'm told rib cuts are particularly good because they have bones to give a crunchy effect. Then again, maybe the Foley artist will just punch himself, hard. The beauty of Foley named after Jack Foley, chief sound effects guru at Universal for many years — is that nobody's telling you exactly what you have to do. All that counts is that it work on-screen.

Foley art is made necessary by the fact that (1) you need ambient sound (i.e., more than just the actors talking) to make a movie scene seem real, and (2) miking the entire stage or location during shooting just isn't practical. Even if it were, real-life sounds often don't have the oomph the big screen demands. In addition, dubs for foreign markets often require that a sound track be created completely from scratch. So Foley artists add sound in postproduction. The most basic type of Foley consists of one or more people walking around in a well-miked "Foley pit" filled with gravel, sand, loose audio tape (to mimic the sound of crunching leaves), etc. to re-create the sounds of the actors in motion. They do this while watching the movie with the sound off, synchronizing their movements with the action on the screen. This requires a good sense of timing and rhythm, and maybe for that reason a lot of Foley artists are also musicians. Some Foley effects have been around since the dawn of the talkies for example, walking on cornstarch in a burlap bag to create the sound of crunching snow. Another time-tested technique is drawing a paddle full of nails across a piece of glass to create the sound of branches scratching on a windowpane. Other sound effects are of more recent vintage. Foley artist Greg Mauer told us he was recently working on a vampire flick that had a scene in which a character's guts get pulled out. Greg used raw chicken, which he likes because you get a nice moist

sound he describes as "slimy." For a simple broken bone there's nothing like the crisp sound of snapping a stalk of celery or a chicken bone.

Not all Foley is fake. If a scene calls for somebody falling, a lot of Foley artists figure there's no substitute for actually falling. Same with walking on sand. But if you need the sound of 150 people running around, no way you're actually going to cram 150 people into the Foley pit. Instead you have maybe three Foley artists laying down a half dozen tracks. Mix 'em together and voila - crowd noise.

As you might surmise in this age of high-tech special effects, cinema sound can involve lots of fancy enhancements you'd need a master's in computer science to understand. But it's good to know that, at least for some stuff, they still rely on guts and red meat.



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


