On Sunday, December 20th, there were ten vessels in Hilo Bay, viz: six schooners, one bark, one brig and two steamers. On Friday, the 18th, the Emma Claudina came near going ashore near Waiakea, but was towed by the Lehua to opposite Wainaku.

build owned by the Japanese in December last was 402; and the aggregate tonnage 44,176, of which 301 were under 100 tons, 66 above 100 tons and under 300 tons, 34 above 300 tons and under 500 tons, and one above 1,000 tons.

On the 30th of October a hail storm occurred at Nishinomura and other villages in Sachira, Kagoshima Prefecture, severely injuring cattle, poultry, and vegetables. The hailstones were three inches in length and weighing 7 or 8 woman (1 woman is equal to about 58 grains) and were sharply pointed in some instances. The storm lasted half an hour, and the ground was covered to a depth of eight inches.

There is a report current in Foochow that cholera is rife in the native city. The owners of the steamer Camorta have now filed a counter-claim against the Glenfruin for \$70,000; the claim of the Glenfruin is \$1,000,500.

The affair was conducted somewhat as a reception; as fast as the children and young people arrived they were conducted to the dining room and served with refreshments. The intervals were filled with instrumental music, solos, recitations, etc. At about half-past seven, in came Santa Claus, with snow-white hair and beard and great coat covered with snow flakes, giving a general idea of what the weather was on the other side of the world.

After the merriment of the older and the awe and even terror of some of the younger members had somewhat subsided, each one was

generously remembered by the beloved Santa, when he went as he came, with many good wishes for the New Year. Mrs. Southwick had so far recovered from her recent illness as to be present, and her cheerful face and lively banter with old Claus added much to the enjoyment of the evening.

Professor Scott then read a paper on the "Preparation of Elementary Teachers," which drew out considerable discussion. After the discussion of Professor Scott's paper a committee was appointed to draft a set of resolutions, embodying the views set forth. The Convention then adjourned until half-past one o'clock. The afternoon session was opened by a discussion on "The Teaching of Music in Public Schools." Mr. H. Berger, Mr. Townsend, Mr. Olsson, and others discussing the question at length. Mrs. J. M. Whitney read a paper on "Hygienic Physiology as connected with Alcoholic Stimulants and Narcotics" which drew out an interesting discussion by different members. The Committee on Resolutions then reported at length, and after an extended discussion, part of the resolutions were accepted, when the Convention adjourned to meet this morning at half-past nine o'clock at the Punahou Preparatory School-house, at which time the remainder of the resolutions will be discussed and voted upon.
