KENTUCKY REPUBLICAN AND HEARST MEN LOSE

SUGAR CROP OF World Will Be LESS NEXT YEAR HAWAII CROP WILL BE LARGER

Willet & Gray's Sugar Journal for Oct. 24 is of especial interest on account of the estimate made for the next sugar crop. The estimate for Hawaii is 290,000 tons and if all other estimates are as conservative as this, the figures are very close. The report follows:

RAWS.—There has been no change in quotations during the week under review, and business has been done to a considerable extent on the basis of 3.96c. per lb. for 96-degree test, mostly for sugars from store, of which the supply remaining is now reduced to 3,270 tons.

European markets suffered further declines from 9s. 4 1/2-d. to 9s. 3d., with occasional quotations of 9s. 2 1/2-d., but closing fairly steady at 9s. 3d. per cwt., 88 degrees analysis, f. o. b. Hamburg, equal to 3.93c. per lb. for 96-degree test centrifugals, New York.

The special items of interest during the week are the first European beet crop estimates made by Mr. F. O. Licht, which will be found in full elsewhere, and of more especial interest will be found our own estimates of the world's crops of cane and beet sugars. These have been compiled by us after most careful consideration of the complete information at our command from all parts of the world. We call attention to the remarks connected therewith.

The figures which we give of the beet crops of Europe are those of Mr. F. O. Licht, Magdeburg. His competitor on crop estimates, who also stands high, is Mr. Otto Licht, whose estimates are as follows: Germany, 2,100,000 tons; Austria, 1,300,000 tons; France, 820,000 tons; Russia, 1,440,000 tons. All Europe, 6,520,000 tons. It will be noted that these two estimates for all Europe agree within about 60,000 tons.

The latest reports by cable to us from the European beet crop are of continued favorable weather, and from the Cuban crop that there is an improvement in general conditions, except that the western sections of the island are still in need of more rain to benefit the crop.

From Louisiana the full crop movement is delayed for a week or more to give the cane, which was found to be in a rather green condition, an opportunity to crystallize further.

We should also make a note of the extremely unsettled and panicky con-

ditions of the Wall Street stock and money markets, which have scarcely been as severely felt since the famous "Black Friday" of Jay Gould's time, and which, at this writing, show no signs of abatement. Naturally, attention is largely directed to these conditions to the exclusion of regular business in all branches of trade, for the time being.

The immediate outlook is for a steady sugar market, with light offerings both from store and from the small balances still remaining unsold in cane-producing countries, while beet sugars are still out of reach by reason of their higher parity of 3.93c. for 96-degree test.

The cargo of Javas which has been on offer arrived at Algiers and is ordered to the United Kingdom. There is now no unsold cargo of Javas which can arrive here before the end of November, and the price asked for November shipment (January arrival) is 10s. 1 1/2-d. c. & f., equal to 3.93c. landed.

OUR CANE CROP ESTIMATE.—In this number we give our preliminary estimate of the new cane sugar crops of the world for the season of 1907-08, by countries, amounting to a total of 7,196,000 tons, showing a net decrease of 165,936 tons, as compared with the cane crops of last season.

We now include in our table, the estimates of the production in British India, Natal (South Africa) and Formosa (Japan), as reliable statistics of same are now obtainable; these crops being consumed locally, do not enter into competition with other crops in the world's markets, but as the quantity produced is not sufficient to meet the demands of home consumption, the comparative

EDMUNDS ACT NOT APPLICABLE HERE Enforcible Only Where Mormonism Is Legal Institution

An attack was made on the legality of the enforcement of the Edmunds Act in this Territory this morning on the ground that it applies only in a Territory where Mormonism is a recognized institution. Magoon & Lightfoot, representing Lee Sha Kee, accused of adultery, sprang the proposition in Judge Dole's court by the filing of a demurrer in which the ground is taken that the Act does not apply in Hawaii.

This is not the first time the question has been raised in the United States Court. Judge Kingsbury brought it up on a previous occasion, and at that time the Judge ruled against him. This may be taken as an indication of the way he will rule in this instance.

The Edmunds Act as is well known was passed by Congress for the purpose of abolishing polygamy in Utah and was never meant to apply in any other State or Territory. It is

MOTT-SMITH SITTING ON THE LID

Ernest A. Mott-Smith, Secretary of the Territory, is now sitting on the lid of Governor Frear left for Washington this morning, sitting on the Alameda, and left Mott-Smith to run the Government as Acting Governor.

The Governor did not leave his office until about fifteen minutes before time for the boat to sail, being kept busy with final details of his work until the last possible minute. He went alone, none of the office force accompanying him.

Governor Frear stated this morning that he had not yet made up his mind what attitude he would take toward the suspension of the coastwise shipping laws. Circumstances at Washington, he said, might influence him in the matter.

From San Francisco Frear will go direct to Muskogee, Oklahoma, to represent the Chamber of Commerce at the Trans-Mississippi Commercial Congress. After that he will go on to Washington.

How long the Governor will be absent from the Territory is uncertain. He stated this morning that he hoped to get back by Christmas or New Year, but might be detained until later.

Jack Atkinson, moved by a sympathy engendered by his own experiences, sent to the Acting Governor a huge bouquet of carnations, which now decorate his desk.

Goodale requested that the Deputy Sheriff go to the scene immediately. No further particulars were given by Goodale, and no information about the matter could be obtained from Wahiawa.

CAMPBELL THE MAN

It is reported on good authority that a last attempt will be made this evening at the meeting of the Board of Supervisors to get an appropriation to pay the salary of A. M. Brown as Police Court prosecutor, and that in case this fails, Attorney Colin Campbell will be appointed to take the position.

MANY IMMIGRANTS FOR MEXICO ON KASATO MARU

The fact that the Japanese laborers are emigrating to Mexico and South America is proven by the arrival of the Japanese steamer Kasato Maru this morning with a large number of emigrants going to the places mentioned. The Kasato Maru, Captain Mori, which left Japan on October 23, came into the harbor and docked at Bishop wharf at 6:30 o'clock. She came here to coal, taking about 700 tons on board today. She brought no passengers or freight for this port, except a little assortment of Oriental mail. Of the Chinese emigrants who are on board the Maru, 76 are for Peru and 24 for Chile. The Japanese are distributed as follows: 294 for Mexico, 3 for Chile and 7 for Peru. Two Japanese stowaways, who escaped the eagle eyes of the Japanese officials in Japan, were, on examination of the local immigration officials, ordered deported on the Nippon Maru. They came from Kumamoto prefecture.

The Maru leaves for her destination immediately after she has taken in coal.

ROSENBERG FREE OF ONE INDICTMENT

Judge Lindsay this morning sustained the demurrer of Jacob Rosenberg, who was indicted by the Territorial Grand Jury for receiving stolen goods. This ends the matter so far as the Territory is concerned, but the indictment by the Federal Grand Jury, which is much more serious, still stands and the charges will be vigorously prosecuted.

FEDS MAY SUPPORT PLAN OF HUSTAGE To Remove Fishmarket Structure To Ala Park

The Civic Federation intends to take up the matter of removing the building on the old fishmarket site to Ala Park. This proposition was made by Chairman Hustage of the Board of Supervisors some time ago, and now that the matter of the sale of the fishmarket has been disposed of, several prominent members of the Federation believe that it would be a good time to push the proposition.

The idea is to place the building on the mauka side of Ala Park, where it could be used as an open-air auditorium for political and other meetings, a use for which it would be admirably adapted. It would also be an excellent thing for a shelter in rainy weather for the crowds which congregate in the park at the band concerts and baseball games. It is not believed that the cost of moving the structure would amount to much, as it is composed mainly of steel frames which could be easily taken

SHIP SEWALL REPORTED LOST

New York, Oct. 29.—That the big sailing ship Arthur Sewall, laden with coal for the United States fleet in the Pacific has been wrecked close to Cape Horn and her crew of forty caught by cannibals who infest the island near Terra del Fuego and the straits of Magellan, is believed on the Maritime Exchange.

Since the Sewall sailed from Philadelphia, April 3d, bound for Seattle via Cape Horn, not a word has been heard from her until today, when a letter was received by the Maritime Exchange which seems to indicate that one of the biggest square-rigged ships in the merchant marine has foundered.

The letter was from the straits under date of August 31st. It stated that on August 3d the sealing schooner Fritjof arrived and reported that while cruising near the southeast headland of Noir Island, half way between Cape Pillar and Cape Horn she sighted a derelict which is believed to be the Sewall.

The derelict was a four-masted, square-rigged ship. Only the topmasts were above water and the royals were

Ship Sewall Reported Lost

The Fritjof cruised about the neighborhood in the hope of getting some line on the crew, as it was evident that the wreck was recent. On the shore of Noir Island they found indications that they had landed, but though searching parties were sent out, nothing further was discovered.

The skipper of the Fritjof refused to allow his crew to leave the coast and search the interior owing to the presence of hostile savages.

In the belief that the wreck is that of the Arthur Sewall, divers have been dispatched to Noir Island to make an examination of the ship.

The Sewall, which has been 208 days out, was commanded by Captain Gaffey. She was owned by Arthur Sewall & Company of Bath, Maine, and was of 2,119 tons register.

A. N. Ahip, a young Chinese member of the Chinese Y. M. C. A., has been arrested and is now being held for investigation. The police suspect him of stealing trousers. He is alleged to have stolen a pair of these useful garments from Dr. Hodgins, but these he had to abbreviate somewhat to be able to use them.

He is also said to have stolen a pair of unmentionables from Alfred Kumos. These were found in the possession of a Japanese, but they were easily recognized as there was on them a patch on the place where patches are most frequently found. It was reported to the police that a large number of garments were a few days ago seen at Ahin's rooms at the Y. M. C. A., but these have since disappeared.

'FRISCO HOLDS MONEY

CLEARING HOUSE SYSTEM MEASURE OF PROTECTION

Banks Are Absolutely Sound and Action Taken Prevents Withdrawal of Gold from Circulation

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 29.—For the first time in its history business in San Francisco has been put on a clearing-house basis. This was decided upon yesterday afternoon at a meeting of the San Francisco Clearing House, as a measure of protection against the Eastern money markets. It is feared that the shortage of cash in the East, consequent upon the run on the banks there, will lead financiers to call on the West for money.

The action of the clearing house will keep money here.

Clearing-house certificates will be issued and the banks will in this way settle their clearing-house balances instead of employing gold as formerly. Checks passed over the counter for collection will be certified "Payable through the San Francisco Clearing House," and will then pass current as money. The banks will pay cash on small checks as desired and will provide funds for pay rolls, but money in unusual amounts will be refused unless evidence is given that it is wanted in good faith and not for hoarding, the object being to prevent the latter.

Conditions Are Sound

Local conditions are sound and satisfactory and affairs here are declared to be on the best possible basis. The public is specially asked to handle its funds as near normally as possible, as such action will tend to hasten resumption of normal conditions.

Last night the following explanation of the measure taken was given out by Homer King, president of the San Francisco Clearing House.

"San Francisco has taken the same action through its clearing house as that taken by the banks in the Eastern centers. At a meeting of the association held yesterday it was resolved to issue clearing-house certificates and put the financial business of the city on what has come to be called a clearing-house basis. To carry this into effect it was decided further that they should follow the methods in vogue in New York, Chicago and in all the business centers of the country—making no payments in coin except for the reasonable and clearly legitimate needs of business.

Will Release Gold

"Checks received by members of the community in regular course of business should be deposited as usual, each in his own bank, and they will be redeemed through the clearing house just as they always are, except that the clearing-house balances between banks will be settled by clearing-house certificates instead of gold.

"Checks when presented over the counter for collection will be certified 'Payable through the San Francisco Clearing House,' and then may be regularly used for all payments. Such checks will be freely accepted on deposit at the counters of the other banks or in payment of amounts due the latter. They will also answer for payment of bills, and, in short, pass current as money. Such checks under ordinary circumstances are preferred to money.

Will Pay on Small Checks

"The banks will pay money on small checks, as desired, and to provide funds for pay rolls and other legitimate uses. Should money be demanded in unusual amounts it will be refused unless evidence is given that it is required in good faith and for other purposes than hoarding, to prevent which is the main purpose of this step.

Prosperity Assured

"This is the first time that the San Francisco Clearing House has felt it necessary to pursue such action, although it has been taken several times heretofore by banks in New York, Chicago and in other important cities.

"Local conditions are sound and satisfactory. We are in the midst of marketing one of the most valuable crops the State has ever produced. All up and down the Coast we are in receipt of reports of unexampled prosperity. With these conditions locally our financial affairs are on the best possible basis. Suddenly, however, difficulties arise in the East, the banks there finding it necessary to combine their funds to protect the credit structure. Demands are di-

verted to the prosperous West, which must similarly protect its own community.

"It is hoped that these conditions will not long be continued. Meanwhile people should aim to handle their funds in a manner as nearly normal as possible, as this will tend to hasten the resumption of the usual order of things."

WOMAN'S BOARD HOLDS GOOD MEETING

The parlors of the Central Union church were filled yesterday with an unusually large attendance of members of the Woman's Board at the regular meeting of that body. Mrs. Scudler acted as chairman and Miss Yarlow led the devotional exercises.

Mrs. C. M. Hyde, a visitor from Ware, Mass., gave a short but interesting lecture on Missionary Life in the eastern states. Mrs. Philip A. Delaporte, a worker in the Mission on Nauru Island, told of the uplifting of the natives from uselessness to usefulness and of the material help that was being given her by the managers of the phosphate works on the island. Dr. Sereno Bishop's pleasing talk on "Old Whaling Days" was most interesting, being replete with the striking events of early days, and of the influence the men of that calling had upon the missionary work of these islands.

A paper by Mrs. Andrews dealt with the birth, growth and progress of several island schools, among which were mentioned Lahahualuna and Hilo schools.

The session was most satisfactory to all concerned.

RED CROSS HOLD SESSION.

The Honolulu branch of the Red Cross Society held its first annual meeting yesterday afternoon in Judge Dole's chambers. The election of the following officers effected the permanent organization of the society in this territory: President, Judge Sanford B. Dole; vice president, Mrs. H. F. Dillingham; secretary, Mrs. W. W. Hall; treasurer, C. H. Cooke; auditor, J. R. Galt; executive committee, Dr. Brinckerhoff (chairman), Mrs. C. B. Cooper, Mrs. Walbridge, H. M. von Holt and A. F. Griffiths.

The by-laws were adopted and a committee on finance appointed consisting of C. H. Cooke, W. E. Brown and W. W. Hall.

A letter has been drafted to the National Red Cross Society asking that the by-laws be amended so as to admit to membership others than actual citizens. President Dole endorsed the letter and it will be forwarded at once.

Judge Robinson this morning denied the motion of the defendant in the assumed matter of Solomon Kauhane vs. William Lee for a new trial. The plaintiff agreed to waive all damages in excess of \$440. The jury returned a verdict awarding damages in the sum of \$480, which was in excess of the amount the judge told them they could award.

SUGAR CROP OF WORLD

(Continued from Page 1)
estimates are interesting as giving some indication of the supplies required by those countries from outside sources.

The important changes are decreases of possibly 227,000 tons in Cuba and 50,000 tons in Mauritius and an increase of 105,000 tons in Louisiana and 100,000 tons in Java.

It is entirely too early to make a close estimate of the crop in Cuba, as it is dependent upon the weather which may prevail during the next three months and upon the length of time suitable for grinding. There was much less than the usual acreage of cane left over from last campaign, rain has been deficient, plantings have been less than normal and we can only say that the latest reliable reports indicate a yield this season of 1,200,000 to 1,300,000 tons sugar, according to the length of the grinding season, against the last record crop of 1,427,673 tons. Weather conditions, in most sections, are now more favorable than for several months past, and if these continue to improve, we may be obliged to increase our estimate.

OUR AMERICAN BEET CROP ESTIMATE.—We give in this number our preliminary estimate of the new American beet sugar crop for the season 1907-08, as being 420,000 tons, dependent upon suitable weather conditions until the close of the campaign. The production last season having been 433,019 tons sugar, under conditions much more favorable than are expected to prevail during this campaign, a decrease this year of 13,019 tons, or 3 per cent., is indicated.

WORLD'S PRODUCTION AND CONSUMPTION.—The new cane and beet sugar crops of the world give promise of a good yield, although estimated to outturn possibly 315,946 tons less than those of last season. In the 1906-07 campaign the production was in tons: Cane, 7,361,936; European Beet, 6,717,000, and American Beet, 433,019; total, 14,511,946 tons. While for the new season (1907-08) the estimates are: Cane, 7,196,000; European Beet, 6,580,000, and American Beet, 420,000; total, 14,196,000 tons.

The consumption last campaign was about normal and the production a very full one, yet the stock in principal countries on September 1st was reduced from 1,405,701 tons in 1906 to 1,264,318 tons in 1907.

If the estimated reduction in new crops proves to be approximately correct, it may be expected that stocks next September will show a further decrease, unless the consumption is checked by higher prices.

EUROPEAN BEET CROP.—Mr. F. O. Licht cables us specially from Magdeburg, October 22, 1907: "Weather favorable for the growing crop."

EUROPEAN BEET CROP.—F. O. Licht's Estimate: Mr. F. O. Licht cables us specially from Magdeburg, October 18, 1907: "The weather is very favorable for the growing crop."

"Estimate beet sugar crop of Germany, 2,225,000 tons (last year, 2,138,000); Austria, 1,375,000 tons (last year, 1,344,000); France, 825,000 tons (last year, 756,000); Russia, 1,300,000 tons (last year, 1,470,000). All Europe, 6,580,000 tons (last year 6,717,000)."

A month ago Mr. F. O. Licht made a preliminary estimate of from 6,230,000 tons to 6,700,000 tons.

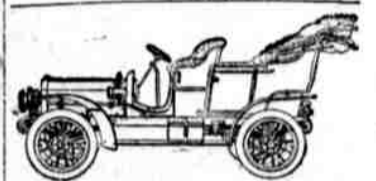
