Clearing-house certificates will be sued and the banks will in this way ettle their clearing-house balances nstead of employing gold as formerly. Checks passed over the counter for collection will be certified "Payble through the San Francisco Clearing House," and will then pass current as money. The banks will pay eash on small checks as desired nd will provide funds for pay rolls, but money in unusual amounts will e refused unless evidence is given that it is wanted in good faith and not for hoarding, the object being to revent the latter.

Conditions Are Sound
