LIFE ON THE TORPEDO BOAT.

Each of the torpedo craft carries a crew of from sixty to seventy men, and when one considers the size of the space in which it is necessary for these men to move about in operating the powerful yet intricate machinery, and find sleeping space also, one must marvel at the life aboard a vessel of this class.

To live in quarters the size of an ordinary dry goods box is not the life that the everyday citizens care to essay. To endure such life for hours at a stretch, without sleep or food, and to stand exposed in all climates—such is life aboard a torpedo craft for officers and men alike.

There is no discrimination; that is why one sees bearded faces and slender figures behind the conning towers when these long, three and four stacked tiers run into port for coal and water at frequent intervals, which is necessary on account of their limited space for carrying these necessities. In the comparatively smooth waters of this harbor the torpedo boats look very much like the motor racers in disguise, but they are far from being the pleasure craft that the auto boats are, and they go where the helmsman of a motorboat would not dare to venture.

The ocean is the place to see the torpedo boat under way, and life on board the craft can be seen in its true light. Sticking their bows into the long green swells, the spray flying above the signal staffs forward and the solid green water washing the low decks continually, is but one picture of life on the rolling deep in a mere shell of a boat.

In the harbor and when at sea in fair weather the torpedo boats run with the hatches open, the commanding officer stands on watch clear of the forward conning tower, and the crew lounge on deck, but when the little craft begins to roll and plunge in the seaway the hatches are closed, and, barring the stumpy smokestacks, the vessels resemble baby whales at play. It is then that the crew suffers most while at sea. All must remain below decks or place themselves in jeopardy. To venture above while the vessel is plunging about the sea with decks awash would be extremely hazardous.

Sometimes the steward will essay to climb along the deck from the stern to the forward hatch with a smoking dish clasped tightly in his hands. He is in a race with the seas. If he reaches his destination forward he is lucky. If the seas get there first the fishes get the food.

In the event of the seas overtaking him, then he has to scramble back to the galley and await another chance. This is an amusing incident of life aboard, to watch the steward essay the trip in rough weather.

Intense heat prevails below decks when the craft is under way with hatches closed, and the humidity is one of the inconveniences to which the crew of a torpedo boat is subjected, and is one of the most objectionable features of life

aboard the torpedo craft, as the heat is oppressive and fearful at times, with all four boilers under full draft and ponderous engines throbbing and pulsating at full speed of perhaps twenty-five to thirty knots.—The Bund (Shanghai).

JUSTICE WON OUT.

One would evidently infer, from seeing the Bulletin's black-type heading of last evening, that "Parsons upholds Home Rule," that it really was the case. Just to think that Circuit Judge Parsons, a Republican, "upholds Home Rule," is to invoke condemnation upon his head for so flagrant a strike at party entity, but upon reading the context of the wireless message that "Judge Parsons has decided against the Supervisors in the mandamus suit against Auditor Maguire" gives a different aspect altogether to the situation.

"Home Rule was not the question up before the Judge, but whether the claim of the Hawaii supervisors to appoint members of the police force was right or that the Sheriff had the right to make the appointments, subject to confirmation by the Board, and it is this question that he has decided against the Board and in favor of the "Home Rule" Sheriff. We infer from the Bulletin's heading that the Republican Judge should have decided

against an opposing office holder, disregarding the law in the case, and making politics the exigency in the matter whether right or wrong, and that Justice is to be ignored in favor of making party cussedness a success.

Judge Parsons did nothing more than what was right according to law. The supervisors have always been on the wrong tack ever since they were elected and now they should have a quietus for a time.

TOPICS OF THE DAY.

The gamblers and police may as well take notice that the crusade will be promptly resumed whenever there seems to be special occasion for it.—Advertiser.

What "special occasion?" When the money for the last "occasion" runs out?

Arbor Day should be welcomed in Hawaii. Its object is to instil into the young a habit of planting and nurturing trees. If faithfully carried out every year it is only a question of time when beautiful flora will take the place of barren plains. Let the work be encouraged in every possible way.

Honolulu missed a great treat in not hearing Bourke Cochran, who passed through yesterday, speak. As an orator Mr Cochran is, perhaps, second only to Mr Bryan. His pronounced views against the absorption of territory in the Pacific Ocean by the United States would have been something well worth listening to.

People of Kauai are kicking because the Treasurer licenses all applicants to sell liquor. They ought to come over to Honolulu and see licenses issued to grocery stores, restaurants, meat markets and other small shops. The only establishments here without saloon attachments of some sort appear to be the bakeries and barber shops.

One disappointed organization yesterday was the Hibernian Society, which did not know of the presence of Hon W Bourke Cochran here until he was almost ready to go. Mr Cochran is a distinguished member of that order. Although disappointed this time, however, Mr Cochran promised the committee that saw him that he would "come again."

The Kalibi Improvement Club is starting out right and has every promise of splendid success. It is a notable fact that the whole community, irrespective of nationality, seems interested in it. If politics and religion can be kept out of it—and that should easily be possible—the club will undoubtedly become a great and lasting power for good in that community.

If the news that the Empress line of steamers from Victoria will come to Honolulu be true, it is, indeed, good news. As Honolulu will be

the only American port touched between Canada and the Orient, these vessels will be able to carry passengers and freight both ways. That will mean competition of a kind that will count and will doubtless result in greatly reduced passenger rates.

If Secretary Atkinson succeeds in inducing the plantations to pay living wages to native and local Portuguese laborers he will have accomplished more, perhaps, than he himself imagines. Such a plan would not only give employment to our very large idle population, but would stem the tide of Oriental invasion. The move is one that deserves and should have cordial support at every hand.

The blanket warrant case from Kahuku was decided by Judge Robinson yesterday in a way that coincides precisely with the view and policy of Treasurer Trent. The Treasurer has steadfastly held against paying blanket warrants, claiming that money should be paid directly to the man earning it. It now appears that the court takes the same view. In future, therefore, the right of laborers will be duly protected.

The more one thinks of indignation of the Japanese people over the peace terms with Russia, the more one must be inclined to sympathize with the spirit of the demonstrations. Japan defeated Russia fairly and squarely, and after it was all over Japan was cheated out of an indemnity for war expenses. News now comes that the Japanese government will actually have to make a new loan with which to bring her troops home from Manchuria. This is, indeed, an appalling end to a most remarkable war!

The Palolo homesteaders, whose committee laid a petition before the Governor this morning for a road, deserve the sympathy and hearty support of the entire community. These people bought lots and built up there with the understanding that they would have good roads to their holdings. Although bluffs have been made at complying with the understanding, nothing of value has been done. The Governor has it within his power to order the expenditure of the appropriation for Palolo road and he should do so at once.

There are laws enough on the statute books of Hawaii to cover any and every case of gambling or chance. That these laws are properly enforced may be a reasonable subject for debate, but if they are not the law officers certainly have themselves alone to blame. They have been given the tools to work with. After all, however, are not many of these tales the fruits of imagination? It is awfully easy for rumor to beget the wildest kind of pipe-dreams, and as they run they

The steamer Kaulani, which arrived yesterday from Hawaii, will sail this afternoon for Kauai ports.

An appeal has been filed by the Rapid Transit Co from the judgment obtained against it by Harold Jeffe.

Mrs McCounell, 1223 Emma street has a one roomed cottage and a few spare rooms ready for immediate occupancy.

A committee of Palolo Valley residents called on Governor Carter this morning in regard to roads in their locality.

The transport Thomas is due at any hour from San Francisco. She is carrying troops and supplies for the Philippines.

Judgment by default has been rendered by Judge DeBolt in the suit of F E Thompson vs the wireless telegraph concern.

A concert and dance will be given at the Peninsula pavilion, Pearl City, on Saturday evening for the benefit of Ewa church.

Next Monday and Tuesday the ladies of the Catholic church will hold a rummage sale in the Bailey block on Alapai street.

It is again reported that the Empress line of steamers, running from Canada to the Orient, will make Honolulu a port of call.

The Iolais, Diamond Heads, Punahou and Five O'clocks have entered for the games of indoor baseball at the Y M C A.

Rev J W Wadman will deliver an illustrated lecture at the Salvation Army hall this evening, the subject being "An evening in Japan."

Wm Haywood will be a through passenger in the Siberia from the Orient to the Coast. He has been in Asia on business for the planters.

A meeting of Punahou Association footballers will be held at the Thistle club at 5 o'clock this afternoon for the purpose of electing officers.

Judge Parsons has decided the controversy at Hilo between Sheriff Keolanui and the supervisors in favor of the sheriff. The sheriff claimed the right to appoint his police officers and this right was also claimed by the supervisors.

Failed to Expose License.

A Chinese employee of the pork store, corner of Hotel and Maunakea streets, which place has a fourth class liquor license, was arrested this afternoon by Assistant Sheriff Vida for selling drinks to natives. The man and the stuff were bundled off down to the Station house and the Chinaman charged with not exposing his license in a conspicuous place. He later left the Station with all the stuff in a hack.

Although he is supposed to be one of the principal pillars of the local democratic party, it appears that he is going to take up the fight against the Taft policy of free trade with the Philippines. The body of Fred Baldwin, who died in New York last night after an operation for appendicitis, will be brought back to Maui for interment.

The hall committee of the Kalihii Improvement Association is figuring on securing a native church out there for meeting purposes. It is expected that the membership will shortly reach 130 and the present meeting place is entirely too small for so many.

Deputy Sheriff Chris J Holt, on arrival in town this morning from Waianae, was arrested on a charge of assault and battery on a Japanese woman. The assault is claimed to be the result of a raid on one of the plantation camps for illicit distillation of liquor.
