Latest Foreign News.

From Auckland papers to February 18th, received per steamship Australia on Tuesday last, we obtain the following items of foreign news:

LONDON, January 18th.—There is a probability that the obstruction in the House of Commons will soon be brought to an end. Professor Huxley, one of the Liberal members for Southampton, has discovered among the old orders of the House one which dates back to the year 1600, which empowers the speaker to "stay irrelevant speeches." It is likely that this will be used for the purpose of putting a stop to the present protracted discussion.

Several mass meetings of Irish have been held in England, in order to express sympathy with their countrymen in Ireland.

LONDON, January 22d.—Severe cold continues, and the Thames is frozen over. An ox has been roasted on the ice at Twickenham.

Mr. Gladstone's physician advises in order that he may obtain the repose he requires, that he should accept a seat in the House of Lords. Friends urged the same course, but Mr. Gladstone has declined.

LONDON, January 26th.—Renewed rioting has occurred in Lancashire owing to the strike. Several serious collisions have taken place between locked-out miners and the police.

In the House of Commons last evening, Mr. Gladstone moved that the consideration of the Irish Coercion Bill should take precedence of all other business. The House members thereupon proceeded to obstruct passage of the motion, and a stormy scene occurred. Mr. Biggar who proved one of the most violent obstructionists, was repeatedly called to order by the Speaker.

As he continued his disorderly conduct, he was "suspended" for the remainder of the sitting. The debate has now lasted many hours, but the Government are determined to pass the motion, and will make the sitting a continuous one, declining to adjourn until they gain their point.

The trial of the Irish Land Leaguers, which, since the 23d of November, the date upon which the Attorney-General filed a criminal information against them, has been a prominent topic, was concluded Jan. 26th, when the jury after being locked up for eight hours, declared their inability to agree to a verdict, and the traversers were discharged. There were fourteen defendants, namely, Charles Stewart Parnell, M. P., John Dillon, M. P., Joseph Gillis Biggar, M. P., Timothy Daniel Sullivan, M. P., Thomas Sexton, M. P., Thomas Brennan, Michael Mahoney O'Sullivan, Patrick Egan, John Wally, Matthew Harris, P. J. Sheridan, M. P., Boyton, J. W. Walsh and P. J. Gordon. All are members of the Land League except Wally, all are Roman Catholics except Mr. Parnell, and, save some of the members of the League, they do not occupy any special status. Brennan, O'Sullivan, and Egan are officers of the League, and Boyton (brother of the famous swimmer) is a rapid organizer. The others who are not members of Parliament are small tradesmen or farmers. The standing of the members of Parliament prosecuted is probably sufficiently well known. Mr. Biggar is a Belfast butter merchant. Mr. Dillon holds the degree of M. R. C. S., M. R. T. D. Sullivan is the proprietor of two weekly newspapers in Dublin, and Mr. Sexton is one of two contributors. The information against the traversers contained nineteen counts, charging them with conspiracy to prevent payment of rents, to defeat the legal process for the enforcement of rent, to prevent the letting of evicted farms, and to excite ill-will between different classes of her Majesty's subjects. The trial took place in Dublin, and when the result was made known and Mr. Parnell was retried from the Court he received a "perfect ovation" from a crowd of persons assembled outside.

LONDON, January 28th.—The debate in the House of Commons on the second reading of the Irish Coercion Bill was resumed to-day. Mr. Gladstone made a lengthy speech during the evening, in the course of which he reminded the House that the increase of agrarian outrages and the Land League had progressed together, and were strongly connected. The coercive measures which the Government proposed to adopt aimed solely at the punishment of evildoers, and the abettors in the agitation. The debate was again further adjourned.

LONDON, January 31st.—Renewed rumors of expected Fenian attacks have caused a panic in Manchester, and all the public buildings in the town are now placed under strong military guards.

LONDON, January 31st.—Thomas Carlyle, the well-known author, is seriously ill.

LONDON, January 20th.—The Dutch settlers of South Africa have made an appeal to the Government and people of Holland claiming their sympathy and protection in the present relations with Great Britain. It is considered very unlikely that assistance will be granted.

LONDON, January 21st.—The Portuguese Chambers are now debating a resolution that the Government should mediate between England and the rebel Boers, in order to bring about a cessation of hostilities in the Transvaal.

Mr. Gladstone has expressed sympathy with the loyal Boers, but regrets that it is impossible to grant them independence.

CAPE TOWN, January 28th.—Telegrams from official sources have been received this evening from Natal, announcing a serious British defeat in the Transvaal. The information to hand states that Sir George Colley made an attack in force on the Boer position at Langsek, Heavy fighting ensued, but the enemy offered a strong defence, and finally inflicted a severe repulse on the colonial force, which was compelled to retire with heavy losses in killed and wounded. Sir George has decided to await

the expected reinforcements from England and India before resuming the offensive measures against the Boers.

Further news to hand from the Transvaal state that in the defeat at Langsek, Sir George Colley's forces lost 190 rank-and-file, and five officers killed, and three wounded.

CAPE TOWN, January 29th.—Intelligence to hand from Kaffraria states that the rebellion of the Pondomies, Tenuhas and other tribes is daily collapsing, and is expected shortly to be completely quelled.

MELBOURNE, January 26th.—A serious accident has occurred to-day on the line near Ballarat, by which seven persons have been badly injured.

It has been decided that the Exhibition shall remain open to the 30th of April next. A company has been formed here to purchase Mango Island, in the Fiji Group. The capital will be £100,000.

STONEY, January 21st.—H. M. S. Emerald reports that she has recently visited the scenes of the Sandfly, Zephyr, and Borealis massacres in the Solomon Group. She shelled the places and burned down many villages. The natives generally had absconded, but armed boat's crews were repeatedly sent ashore, and one native was killed and another taken prisoner at Borealis Island. The Emerald brings two witnesses of the massacres.

The Gazette of to-day announces the appointment of Mr. De Voets, Governor of Fiji, to assist as High Commissioner of the Western Pacific.

LONDON, January 4th.—Rumors are current here to the effect that the authorities are in possession of evidence of an intended raid by Fenians on the armories belonging to the volunteers throughout the country. The authorities have in consequence of these reports, taken special precautions at all volunteer headquarters to prevent any raid being successfully made.

It is also stated that a torpedo has been discovered under the bow of H.M.S. Lord Warden, an ironclad belonging to the Channel Squadron, and now in the Frith of Forth.

These reports are occasioning great excitement throughout Great Britain.

LONDON, January 5th.—To-day an authoritative denial has been made to the rumor current yesterday, to the effect that a torpedo had been found under the bow of the Lord Warden.

LONDON, January 5th.—Great excitement was caused at Liverpool yesterday, in consequence of the discovery of an attempt to destroy the docks in that town. It appears that endeavors were made to effect the object in view by means of a series of explosions of petroleum; but fortunately the attempt miscarried.

Many reports are current as to the perpetrators of the act, but nothing yet is positively known as to their identity.

LONDON, January 21st.—In the engagement which took place between the Chilean and Peruvian forces at Chantellos, the fighting was very severe. The number of killed was 7,000 at Lima, the capital city of Peru. After yielding to the Chilean force, the War Minister of Peru was taken prisoner, but the President, Merola, managed to escape. After the signal advantage obtained by the Chileans, the diplomatist representing the foreign countries urged the expediency of an armistice between the contending parties.

STONEY, December 4th.—The scene of the massacre of three of the crew of the Leita is port Webber, New Ireland. H. M.'s schooner Beagle brings the news of the outrage. She also reports that the Morquis de Roy's immigrants have shifted from Hikitiiki bay, New Ireland, and are actively preparing to leave and settle in Queensland.

STONEY, December 6th.—The schooner Leita, which arrived to-day, reports that a vessel has been wrecked at Biki Iai, Bougainville Island, and some of the crew poisoned by the natives. The captain became ill and died, and was eaten. It is also stated that some friendly natives, for the purpose of avenging their deaths, organized an extensive expedition against the Bougainville natives.

A Strange Japan Race.

In her recent work, "Unbaten Tracks in Japan," Miss Isabella L. Bird gives some graphic pictures of the Ainos, or aborigines of the island of Yezo, Japan. "After the yellow skins, the stiff horse hair, the feeble eyelids, the elongated eyes, the flat noses, the sunken cheeks, the Mongolian features, the puffy physique, the shabby walk of the men, the restricted totter of the women, and the general impression of degeneracy conveyed by the appearance of the Japanese, the Ainos," she says, "makes a very singular impression. All but two or three that I have seen are the most ferocious-looking savages, with a physique vigorous enough for carrying out the most ferocious intentions, but as soon as they speak, the countenance brightens into a smile as gentle as that of a woman, something which can never be forgotten. The men are about the middle height, broad-chested, broad-shouldered, 'thick-set,' very strongly built, the arms and legs short, thick, and muscular, the hands and feet large. The bodies, and especially the limbs, of many are covered with short bristly hair. I have seen very few boys, whose bodies are covered with fur as fine and soft as that of a cat. The heads and faces are very striking. The forehead is very high, broad, and prominent, and at first sight give one the impression of an unusual capacity for intellectual development; the ears are small and set low; the noses are straight, but short, and broad at the nostrils; the mouths are wide, but well formed, and the lips rarely show a tendency to fallness. The neck is short, the cranium rounded, the cheekbones low, and the lower part of the face is small as compared with the upper, the peculiarity called a 'jowl' being unknown. The eyebrows are full, and form a straight line nearly across the face. The eyes are large, tolerably deeply set, and very beautiful, the color a rich liquid brown, the expression singularly soft, and the eyelashes long, silky, and abundant. The skin has the Indian olive tint, but is most common in this, and light enough to show the changes of color in the cheek. The teeth are small, regular, and very white; the incisors and 'eye-teeth' are not disproportionately large, as is usually the case among the Japanese; there is no tendency towards prognathism, and the fold of integument which conceals the upper eyelids of the Japanese is never to be met with. The hair is black, and is not as European rather than Asiatic. The 'ferocious savagery' of the appearance of the men is produced by a profusion of thick, soft black hair, divided in the middle, and falling in heavy masses nearly to the shoulders. Out of doors it is kept from falling over the face by a fillet round the brow. The beard

are equally profuse, quite magnificent and generally wavy, and in the case of the old men they give a truly patriarchal and venerable aspect, in spite of the yellow tinge produced by smoke and want of cleanliness. The savage look produced by the masses of hair and beard, and the thick eyebrows, is mitigated by the softness in the dreamy brown eyes, and is altogether obliterated by the exceeding sweetness of the smile, which belongs in greater or less degree to all the rougher sex. I have measured the height of thirty of the adult men of this village, and it ranges from five feet four inches to five feet six and a half inches. The circumference of the heads averages 22.1 inches, and the arc, from ear to ear, 13 inches. The average weight of the Aino adult masculine brain, ascertained by measurement of Aino skulls, is 45.90 ounces avoirdupois, a brain weight said to excel that of all the races, Hindoo and Mussulman, on the Indian plains, and that of the aboriginal races of India and Ceylon, and is only paralleled by that of the races of the Himalayas, the Siamese and the Chinese Burmese."
