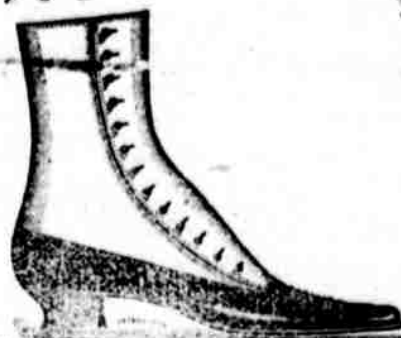

HELP FOR THE POOR.

Relief Society for the Benefit of Prisoners' Families.

A benevolent organization has been started among the natives. The object of the organization is to treasure up money for the purpose of providing for the families of natives who were imprisoned for participation in the late rebellion. Up to yesterday, April 4, the sum of \$314 10 had been raised, and as there are thirty-two families to be provided for the sum will have to be sparingly distributed.

Jas. K. Kaula, who has been appointed as secretary, will hand out \$2 to each head of family entitled who will call at his office to-morrow afternoon. This will be continued, weekly payments being made on Saturdays.

It is said some of the wives of those imprisoned as rebels are in destitute circumstances, and the mite will be gladly received. This is a chance for charitable persons to help fellow-creatures who are in need.

NEW ZEALAND CONNECTION.

Arrangement of the Canadian Steamship Line Contemplated.

OTTAWA (Ontario), March 15.—The Department of Commerce has been advised of negotiations for a re-arrangement of the direct Australian steamship service. The New Zealand Government has received an offer from Huddart, Parker & Co. to run a connecting steamer between Fiji and Auckland or Wellington. The matter was considered by the Government, and it was thought better to have its own direct steamers to touch at Auckland or Wellington, and New South Wales asked if that colony would allow steamers to come on to New Zealand. The Government of that colony is in favor of establishing a direct mail service via Vancouver, alternating every fortnight with San Francisco. In negotiating for connecting service, it was contemplated to include Samoa as well as Fiji.

DEATH OF J. H. GUY.

He Was a Veteran of the War of Rebellion.

J. H. Guy, who started a cash grocery on Union street a few months ago, died at the house opposite the Y. M. C. A., Hotel street, this morning. Mr. Guy was a bachelor. He was born Feb. 9, 1846, which would make his age a little more than 49 years. In 1861 he enlisted in the 4th Indiana Cavalry for a term of three years. He was promoted from private to first lieutenant. His company entered the field with 112 men, and retired with but 26, the rest having all been killed. Although Mr. Guy was not a member of the G. A. R., Geo. W. DeLong, Post will attend the funeral, which is to be at 3 o'clock to-morrow. Quartermaster R. J. Greene is attending to the details.

Deserting Sailors.

Sailors evidently do not relish the trip around the Horn, as evidenced by the wholesale deserting from ships bound to New York. Captain Reed of the ship T. F. Oakes lost four of his men the other day through desertion. The captain has offered twenty dollars reward for each man. Telephone messages have been sent to Waiaanae, Hauula, Koolaupoko and all the outer districts acquainting them with the fact, and a sharp lookout is being kept for the men. Their names are F. Keller, J. Johnson, W. Shellon and W. Platts.

Harbor Improvement.

The dredge is now working in the vicinity of the new wharves near the old Custom House. After the departure of the S. S. Australia, which is expected from the Coast on Monday next, the dredge will be moved over to the Oceanic wharf to deepen the harbor there. It has been ascertained that the bottom in that locality has been filling in. Departing steamers have long been noticed to stir up mud from the bottom with their propellers.

DEATH OF AN OLD MAN.

He Drops Down and Dies After a Rough Handling.

At 6:30 o'clock yesterday evening Captain Scott was called out to a rumpus near the corner of Queen and South streets. When the captain arrived he found a seventy-five-year old native lying dead in a yard.

The particulars as gained by Captain Scott are as follows: About 6 o'clock a man named Albert Hermanson had a few words with his wife which developed into a big row. Maia, the father of the woman, who lived in a separate cottage in the same yard, came in. Hermanson pushed the old man out of the house. He came back again and Hermanson caught him by the elbows and shook him. The native went away, but before he had got ten yards he fell, gave a few struggles and expired.

Dr. Cooper made a post mortem examination of the body this morning at the Police Station.

TAIHIN-KYOKWAI

For Receiving Foreign Visitors to the Kyoto Exhibition.

A great national exhibition is to be held at Kyoto, the birthplace of the world-renowned Japanese art, from April to August of this year. Secretary Narita of the Japanese Legation at Honolulu has handed to the BULLETIN a circular and a card of invitation to foreign visitors, inviting them to call upon the Taihin-Kyokwai, an association for the accommodation of foreign visitors to the Kyoto exhibition.

THE CANS ARE VERY LARGE AND CONTAIN MORE OYSTERS THAN THOSE OF OTHER BRANDS.

TRADE SHOWS A GAIN.

Improvement in Nearly All Lines in the United States

Substantially all indications of the state of business are rather more favorable, farm products are a little higher, railroad earnings a shade better, clearing-house exchanges a small percentage larger in comparison with two years ago than in February and most of the industries show a somewhat better front, though their gain is not large. Money markets continue undisturbed, the operations of the syndicate still prevent exports of gold, and withdrawals from the treasury have of late practically ceased.

There is not much enthusiasm about the situation, however, because the gain is slow and business is a long way from what is considered only a prosperous condition. Further, the gain is in some cases due to obviously temporary causes, and to some causes which do not make prosperity. The higher price of cotton, which has raised to 606 cents, results from belief that the acreage this year will be greatly reduced. Wheat has risen 1 cent because the government reports only 50,000,000 bushels in farmers' hands March 1, though practically nobody in the trade thinks the estimate correct, and the accepted estimates are about 60,000,000 or higher. Western receipts have again risen above, and exports continue below last year. Partial loss of the cotton and wheat crop or a great decrease in production would hardly be an unmixed blessing to the country. Corn has risen 1 cent, following wheat; pork, \$1.25 per barrel, and hogs, 10, and lard 30 cents per 100 pounds.

The output of pig iron March 1 was 156,979 tons, a decrease since Feb. 1 of 6412 tons weekly, and the increase of unsold stocks was 52,900 tons in February, or 13,225 tons weekly. Since Jan. 1 the weekly output has decreased 11,435 tons, and the accumulation of unsold stocks has been 125,515 tons. Prices do not rise and except at Chicago there seems to be no general increase of demand. This improvement is observed in nearly all parts of the industry, particularly in materials for agricultural implement works, and at Pittsburg the demand for structural forms continues large. But for the great number of new buildings that are climbing toward the sky all over the country, the condition of the industry would be much less favorable. Bessemer pig is weaker at Pittsburg, and while the demand for bar improves, it falls short of the supply. Sheets are inactive and also wire rods, without change in price.—*Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review.*

This is what the Chicago Times-Herald says about Attorney Kinney's wildgoose chase after Captain Martin and the schooner H. C. Wahlburg: "It is announced that the little Hawaiian government has sent its agents to this country in chase of alleged rebels. The infant republic will do wisely to imitate the magnanimity of its big brother, practised on a vastly bigger scale."

A decision has been rendered by the Supreme Court of Illinois, voiding on constitutional grounds a law prescribing eight hours as the legal working day for women. The court regards the provision as interfering with the liberty or property of women, whereas its object was for their protection. It appears further that the constitutionality of the law was attacked by rich employers, and defended by labor organizations and intelligent people supporting the rights of labor.

With the retirement of Mr. Thurston as Minister to Washington there is an opportunity for the Government to practise a little retrenchment. Nobody has ever yet learned of any reason for a little country like this keeping two diplomatic functionaries at Washington. If Mr. Hastings is not competent to be Minister let him come home, and if he is competent the billet should fall to him by promotion. Do not let another man be sent, however, to get the country into more hot water.

Indiana has been disgraced by its Legislature. The governor tried to get a veto to the house in time to be effective, but too late to permit the passage of the bill over the veto. The republicans, to keep the veto out, seized the governor's private secretary and imprisoned him in the elevator. This outrage precipitated a fight, in which the secretary had a rib broken and received serious internal injuries. "And the whole wretched episode, one blushes to recall," says the Indianapolis News, "had no motive except to keep or to win for one party or the other the sweepers and dusters of the state-house." The eastern press has raised a chorus of denunciation of the episode.

It is not the intention, as we understand the matter, to have the pumping plant supply the whole town with water at all times. The improvement was set on foot to supplement the gravitation system and provide against drought. At the same time those who are to get their supply ordinarily from the Nuuanu stream will be demanding an improvement in the quality of the water. It is simply unsafe to use that water without special purification in the households, which a majority of people will not take the trouble to have done. If the reservoirs were lined as they should have been years ago, and the water made to pass through a settling and filtering basin, the water would likely be rendered just as wholesome as that from the artesian system.

A Canadian named Allard has invented a method of tempering aluminum which, it is claimed, will make that metal adaptable for heavy artillery. It has all the needed qualities of tensile strength, but has been useless for firearms because its ductility and softness make it easily subject to dents, which would make the discharge of the weapon dangerous.

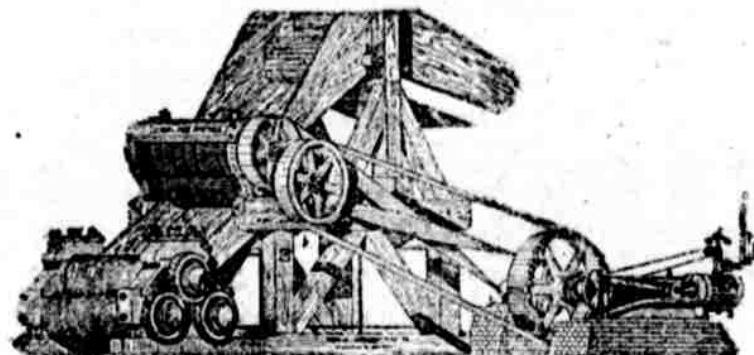
