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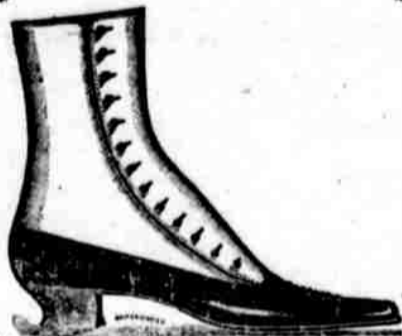

JUDICIAL JOTTINGS

Matters Before the First Circuit Court at Chambers.

Judge Cooper has signed an order of discharge of A. W. Carter, assignee of W. H. Smith, on his filing receipts of final dividend. The balance for distribution is \$510.31, the proved claims being \$415.77.

C. H. Bishop of Lihue, administrator of the estate of Kobachi, a dead Japanese storekeeper, has filed an inventory showing a valuation of \$448.32, all personal property.

J. A. Cummins, administrator with the will annexed of Malie Kahai, deceased, petitions for discharge. He has received \$3738.95 and expended \$2939.42, leaving a balance of \$799.53.

In the case of Edma G. Trousseau vs. Bruce Cartwright and H. E. McIntyre, executors of the estate of the late Dr. Geo. Trousseau, there have been filed the following documents: 1—Demurrer to amended complaint. 2—Answer to amended complaint. 3—Joinder in demurrer by plaintiff. 4—Motion of plaintiff for hearing on demurrer. Defendants' answer gives notice that among other defenses they rely upon illegality, the parties being husband and wife, and upon the statute of limitations, the plaintiff's cause of action, if any existed, having been barred in the lifetime of the deceased. Hartwell for plaintiff; Hatch for defendant.

Ita C. Patterson petitions for probate of the will of the late J. H. Gov. in which herself and S. E. P. Taylor are named as devisees and legatees, also as executors. She states that Mr. Taylor desires to renounce his appointment. Deceased left no heirs at law and no next of kin in the Hawaiian Islands or elsewhere to the best of petitioner's knowledge and belief. The estate is all personalty and valued at \$1500.

Judge Cooper has granted Jacob Cooper, bankrupt, a discharge from all his debts. W. O. Smith for petitioner; Mr. Rubinstein for creditors. Seven creditor firms had filed a protest against the discharge, on the grounds, in brief: that the assignee never took charge of any property, that it was incredible that so great an amount of claims should have been proved against him and yet he have nothing of any value in his possession when he petitioned to be declared a bankrupt; and, further, that before being discharged he should prove that he did not have property of any value, that the value represented by their claims was lost by him in a legitimate manner, and that he was still unable to make any payment.

The Cannon-Poor case is still on fifth day—before Judge Cooper. There is a cross action in the matter. Magoon for Cannon; Neumann for Poor.

SAN FRANCISCO JOURNALISM

Specimen of Falsehood Interjected Into an Interview.

In the San Francisco Call of March 31 appears the following interview: "Yes, the rumor that I am going back to Honolulu to take possession of the Hawaiian Government is quite true," said C. W. Ashford, ex-Attorney-General and exile, at the Lick House last night.

"But it is not true that I have chartered the schooner Alexander, or any other vessel, as yet. Of course we, the exiles, have had all sorts of secret meetings and councils of war, and have hatched some horrible plots.

"One of the propositions now pending before our grand council is for each of the exiles to take a gun between his teeth and swim over there by easy stages. We don't need a fast-sailing schooner. A common whaleboat, laden with a dozen determined men, arms, ammunition and provisions, would be sufficient. We held a very lively and highly edifying council of war to-night, and had an excellent supper along with it. What was said and done concerns our affairs of state, and must be kept diplomatically secret. When I am ready to issue a political manifesto I will publish it in the want columns of some enterprising evening paper in this city.

"Money? Oh, we have any amount of that. All the exiles came away with great wads of cash and other valuables. We looted the islands before we left. But we are not satisfied with what we got. Like Oliver Twist, we want more of the same; but we don't want it for ourselves or our friends in the cages over there, but for Mr. Dole and his fellow tyrants.

"But seriously," Mr. Ashford continued, "it is very likely that a filibustering expedition to Hawaii will be started and that I will be right in the middle of it. In justice to my common sense, however, I will say that when I charter a vessel to take me and my friends and our guns to Hawaii, the public at large will neither be informed nor consulted in the matter."

On the face of it the greater part of the foregoing interview is genuine. It is redolent of the fine satirical vein that characterizes Mr. Ashford's public and private utterances. When it comes to the last paragraph, however, the stamp of the counterfeit die protrudes through the paper. If there is one weakness that Mr. Ashford has not got it is stupidity, yet nothing could be more stupid than to tack the statements of that last paragraph upon the chaffing that goes before. This conclusion is one to be made on sight, but the BULLETIN has definite information that enables it to denounce the last paragraph of the interview as being entirely bogus.

Singular or Plural

The question whether the United States shall be treated as a singular or plural noun is being steadily settled in favor of the former wherever the reference is to the United States as a nation. The plural form was used by the framers of the constitution, as in the provision that "treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies," etc. So, too, when the thirteenth amendment was adopted, in 1865, the plural form was still retained in the prohibition of slavery "within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction." But in his recent proclamations President Cleveland speaks of "property belonging to the United States or under its protection." In like manner Attorney-General Olney, in discussing Governor Altgeld's position, says that "the soil of Illinois is the soil of the United States, and for all United States purposes the United States is there with its courts, its marshals, and its troops, not by license, or by courtesy, but as of right." As in all such cases the reference is to the capacity of a nation, the singular form is the one which agrees with the sense and the later precedents are likely to be followed hereafter.—New York Post.

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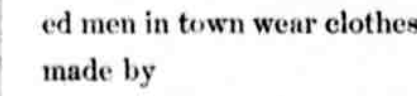

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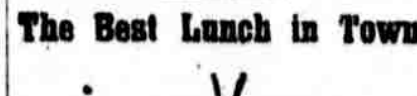

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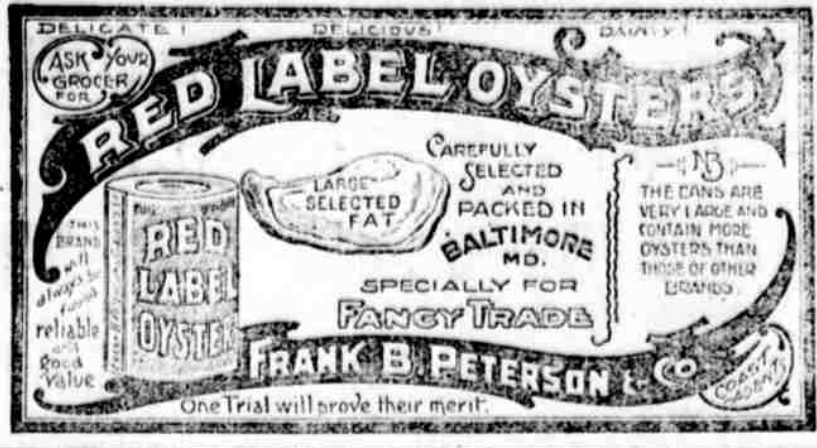

Important Decision by the United States Supreme Court

In the United States Supreme Court on April 1 Justice Gray rendered the decision of the court in the case of the survivors of the firm of Kalli Bros. vs. Howard D. Troops, a case in admiralty from the Circuit Court of the Southern District of New York, involving the question whether the destruction of property on a vessel by municipal authorities in case of fire interferes with the collection of the damages under the law of general average. In the present case the bark J. V. Parker was anchored in the port of Calcutta, when a fire broke out in the vessel in the absence of the master. The municipal authorities took charge of the fire and scuttled the vessel, in the face of the protest of the master, who recommended the application of more water after he arrived on the scene.

Justice Gray said, in effect, that the master of a vessel was, under maritime law, the judge of what was to be done in such emergencies, and that when the municipal authorities interfere they, by this action, make a sacrifice of property compulsory and not voluntary, and thereby the case is removed from the domain of maritime law and from the operation of the law of general average. The decree of the court below was reversed and the claim for general average disallowed. Justices Brown and Harlan dissented.

RELY NOT ON THE RICH.

Noteworthy Utterance by Chauncey M. Depew in Chicago.

At the Convocation of the Chicago University, held in the Auditorium April 1, Chauncey M. Depew delivered the address, and in the course of his remarks, said: "This institution, which owes its existence to the beneficence of Rockefeller, is in itself a monument of the proper use of wealth accumulated by a man of genius. So is Vanderbilt, and so are the old colleges, as they have received the benefaction of generous, appreciative and patriotic wealth. But, in view of the dangers which are about us and of the difficulties which are before us, we cannot rely upon what the rich may do or what the philanthropists may suggest. "It would be a long step forward in popularizing higher education if the Government had established at Washington a great national university."

Attention is requested to the editorial comments appended to the Call's reported interview with C. W. Ashford on another page.

There is a clergyman before the court at Los Angeles, California, charged with slandering a woman in a public prayer. He appears to have been a shade less self-righteous than the pharisee, who rather expressed satisfaction at having a despised publican beside him as a foil to his own piety.

An important decision in maritime law has just been rendered by the United States Supreme Court. The gist of the decision is given elsewhere, and is that when the master of a ship in port is compelled, by extraneous authority, to submit to the destruction of property in his ship, the settlement of damages cannot be effected under maritime law.

Chauncey M. Depew is one of the notably wealthy men of the United States, which makes it noteworthy that he should warn the public, as reported elsewhere, against reliance upon benefactions from the rich for the maintenance of higher education. He thinks the Government should have established a great national university at Washington. Hawaii, notwithstanding the praise it has received for its schools at home and abroad, has not yet attained to the distinction of having a free academy, much less a state college or university.

Judge Morrow's address to the jury in the strikers' case at San Francisco was the second longest on record. It covered 271 pages of type-written matter, and was only exceeded in length by Lord Chief Justice Cockburn's charge in the Tichborne case. The strikers' case is, however, a record-breaker in causing the longest criminal trial on record, it having occupied seventy-three days during a period of five months. Such long trials and voluminous speeches and charges suggest that the familiar symbol of Justice should represent the Dame as giving one hand to Father Time while letting the other balance the scales on the end of her sword.

TROUBLE BREWING.

There appears to be a serious crisis in the relations between Great Britain and the United States, over both the Nicaragua and the Venezuela questions. The Nicaragua indemnity claim has reached a more acute stage than the Venezuela boundary case, and the assembling of a formidable American squadron at the Isthmus, which is without doubt ordered, is in immediate connection with the Nicaragua matter. The BULLETIN yesterday gave a good deal of information on the latest stages of the Nicaragua question as viewed by the United States Government. It is intimated that there is no objection coming to the British demand for indemnity for the expulsion of Consul Hatch, but that the United States Government would adopt strong measures to prevent the taking of any Nicaraguan territory to satisfy such demand. Whether the British Government has come to that point with Nicaragua or not, it may be deemed certain that the present crisis is focussed immediately in that quarter. At the same time the attitude of Great Britain

with regard to the Venezuela boundary dispute helps to irritate the situation most decidedly, because in this case the whole matter is one either of the acquisition of territory or the retention of territory already acquired by Great Britain against the claims of that South American state. According to the latest news of this affair, British and Venezuelan troops are pressing each other closely in the disputed territory, and it is hinted from Washington that if Great Britain forces a collision, after refusing the requests of the United States to submit the dispute to arbitration, "the United States will feel obliged to follow the moral aid it has given to Venezuela in this matter by more substantial assistance." There is yet another cause of ill-feeling between the two great nations, in the refusal of Congress to vote money to pay the claims of British sealers under the terms of the Paris award. In this matter the British Government has given out "that, whatever Canada may desire, the decision of the Paris arbitration will be strictly adhered to during the ensuing season, and no side issue will be allowed to affect that decision." In other words, Canadian sealers will have to observe the agreement in the meantime whether damages already awarded them are paid or not. Notwithstanding this treble critical situation between the great English-speaking Powers, it is to be hoped that peace honorable to both may still be preserved.

SLANDER IN A PRAYER.

Judge Clark of Los Angeles Decides Such a Thing Possible.

Judge Clark of Los Angeles, Cal., has overruled the demurrer interposed by Rev. J. C. Campbell in the suit charging him with slandering Miss Tessa L. Kelso, librarian of the Los Angeles Public Library.

The basis of the action was a prayer offered by the defendant before his congregation in the First Methodist Episcopal Church, in which he said: "Oh, Lord, vouchsafe thy saving grace to the librarian of the Los Angeles City Library and cleanse her of all sin and make her a woman worthy of her office."

Mr. Campbell, in his demurrer, took the position that his statement was privileged. The Court says that a slander can be perpetrated in the form of a prayer as readily as in any other form of speech, and no communication made by a parson or priest to his congregation is privileged because of such relation, unless, perhaps, when made in the discharge of his pastoral duties with one subject to the discipline of the church, and then only unless made without malice.

YOUNG HAWAIIANS.

Their Institute is Growing and Flourishing.

There was a large attendance at the special meeting of the Young Hawaiians' Institute held in their hall, Foster block, yesterday evening. Seven applications were received for admission to active membership. They were accepted and will be initiated after passing the usual medical examination. The committee who had the revising of the constitution in hand reported the work finished. The constitution was ordered printed. Treasurer Fernandez made his quarterly report, which was accepted. All bills were ordered paid. The next regular meeting of the institute will be held on the 25th inst.

Boating Party.

A barge containing a party of boys and girls left Brewer's wharf near 8 o'clock yesterday evening for a moonlight excursion in the harbor. After rowing about for a while the party repaired to the dancing hall of the Myrtle boat club, where dancing was held. As usual J. L. Holt got up the affair, which was in every particular well conducted.

The most remarkable instance of rapid growth is said to be recorded by the French Academy in 1729. It was a boy 6 years of age, 5 feet 6 inches in height. At the age of 5 his voice changed, at 6 his beard had grown and he appeared a man of 30. He possessed great physical strength and could easily lift to his shoulders and carry bags of grain weighing 200 pounds. His decline was as rapid as his growth. At 8 his hair and beard were gray; at 10 he tottered in his walk, his teeth fell out and his hands became palsied; at 12 he died with every outward sign of extreme old age.

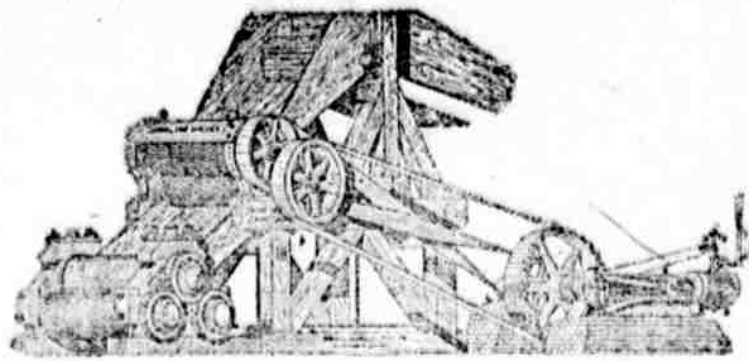
