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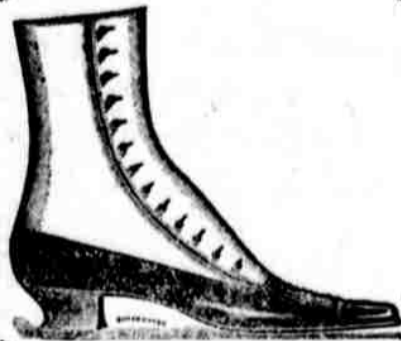

## MEETING OF COUNCILS.

### Pardon of V. V. Ashford—Dismissal of Disloyal Employees.

There was a meeting of the Executive and Advisory Councils yesterday afternoon too late for the BULLETIN press.

Minister Hatch submitted a unanimous recommendation from the Executive Council for the pardon of V. V. Ashford on condition that he leave the country never to return. In answer to Mr. Emmuluth it was stated that Mr. Ashford's fine had not been paid.

Dr. Wood stated that the prisoner had an affection of the spine which would result fatally if he did not go to another climate for treatment.

Upon a motion by Mr. Tenney, seconded by Mr. Eos, the Councils unanimously approved of the pardon.

Minister Hatch next submitted a report of the Executive Council on the matter of the loyalty of Government employees. It laid down loyalty to the Republic as an essential qualification of holding office. Yet the Executive could not adopt the test prescribed by the petitioners, namely, service in the military, police or citizens' guard prior to January 6, 1895. Some had applied for membership in military organizations and been refused. Others had official duties that would prevent their serving elsewhere than at their regular posts of duty in case of war. Besides, the citizens' guard was started as a secret organization. Some employees were members of the Hawaiian Republican Club, which had placed itself on record in favor of the Republic and against restoration of the monarchy, and this organization made a general rally to the help of the Government immediately after the opening of hostilities.

Appended to the report was a detailed statement of results of investigations of the cases of suspected or accused employees. Three had been discharged from the Health Bureau, three from the Tax office, one from the Survey Bureau and one from the Interior department office. Morris Keohokalole would be discharged from the Interior office, his reason for not joining any organization being that he had always avoided politics. Chief clerk Hassinger had guarded Pearl Harbor peninsula during the trouble and would star.

Chief Justice Judd had replied to Minister Hatch's note, inquiring about the loyalty of employees of the Judiciary Department. His reply was to the effect that he was satisfied with the loyalty of all the employees, and, as representing the appointing authority in his department, he did not acknowledge the right of the Executive to interrogate him upon the matter.

There was a discussion over the acceptance of the report forthwith or delaying it for further consideration. The report was laid on the table till next meeting. In the course of the discussion Mr. Emmuluth spoke of the "rottenness of the Interior Department," and before the close of the meeting Minister King demanded an explanation of the expression. Mr. Emmuluth in reply apologized to the Minister for the insulting language.

Minister King read a report of the Fire Commissioners on the petition of China Engine Co. against the decision to disband it. The company had helped to put out three fires out of eighteen. The petition of the company was sent to the Commissioners without recommendation.

Dr. Wood introduced a petition from the physicians and druggists asking for a change in the alcohol law, the same as had been tabled after a long controversy under the Provisional Government. It was referred to the Judiciary Committee. The Councils adjourned at 5:15.

STATE RIGHTS IN CANADA.

Manitoba on the Defense for Its Local Autonomy.

There is a serious controversy proceeding in Canada over a principle somewhat similar to the ostensible one of the great conflict between North and South in the States.

In 1890 the local legislature, which consists of one chamber, abolished the separate school system and the Roman Catholics appealed to the Dominion Government, which decided that a committee of the Governor General's Cabinet should hear the appeal.

The local chamber denied jurisdiction to the Dominion Government and refused to appear. Appeal was taken to the Queen's Privy Council, which has decided that the right of the Roman Catholics to a per capita in the general school fund of the province, to which they contribute on equal terms, was a vested right acquired by them constitutionally on admission as a province to the Dominion of Canada.

The local legislature of Manitoba is ordered to repeal the abolition measure, and not only to give Roman Catholics their per capita of the school fund, but also to exempt them from a proportional share of school taxation in consideration of their construction and maintenance of separate schools.

A Winnipeg dispatch of March 26 says: The first step in the renewed fight over parochial schools in Manitoba began in the legislature this afternoon when the full message was presented from the Dominion Government at Ottawa ordering the Manitoba legislature to give the Catholics their rights as they existed before the abolition of parochial schools in 1890.

The reading of the message occupied over an hour, and, removed of all verbiage, it amounts to the request above stated. An Ottawa dispatch of the same date as the foregoing contains all that is given below: Every other political issue appears to have been lost sight of in the face of the action the Dominion Government has taken toward re-establishing separate schools, which were taken away from the Roman Catholics in Manitoba by the government of that province in 1890.

As to the effect of the step just taken by the Dominion Government upon the two great political parties in Canada it is impossible at this stage to give a just opinion. The Roman Catholics of Canada number 42 percent of the whole population, and as the grievances of the Roman Catholics of Manitoba are shared by the whole Catholic population of the dominion, it may readily be seen that the fight for redress will be a bitter one, with the full force and influence of the Orange element arrayed against them.

The present premier, Sir Mackenzie Bowell, is a very prominent Orangeman, but with Sir Chas. H. Tupper, minister of justice, he took the ground that the highest tribunal in the realm had declared that the vested rights of the Catholics of Manitoba had been interfered with, and it became a question for him either to deny them that right or to restore to them that which they had been deprived of. He chose the latter course, even in opposition to the strongest Orange and ultra-Protestant influence that could be brought to bear upon him.

It was a daring step—a step not taken without several of his cabinet threatening to resign—one of his ministers, Paterson, minister of militia, having since carried out his threat. Clarke Wallace, comptroller of customs, who holds the position of sovereign grand master of the Orange order, still retains his position in the government, but it is said that he will have to resign, as the Orange lodges all over the country are passing resolutions strongly condemnatory of the government's action.

legislature may solve the question for a year, as the federal parliament has no jurisdiction till the government of the province acts or refuses to act on the remedial order. But this seems hardly likely to happen, judging from the reports of the feeling among the majority of the people of Manitoba. Assuming, then, that the order in council of the Dominion Government is ignored, what will be the steps taken by the government to enforce its commands? This question may be determined by the outcome of two by-elections, one in Quebec and the other in Ontario, which are shortly to be held.

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ENGLAND AND ASIA

Great Britain Will Be Jealous of Japan's Augmented Power.

We need, greatly need, a Port-mouth in the Far East, situated, we would suggest, in some point in Western Borneo, or, if there is a good harbor, on the island now belonging to the Dutch, called the Great Natunas, which, if the imperfect descriptions of it are reasonably correct, must be singularly defensible. That seems to us the clear deduction from the capture of Wei-Hai-Wei, which ought to impress Europe much more than the occupation of Corea, the slow march across East Manchuria, or even the storm of the great arsenal, Port Arthur.

The Japanese have exhibited at Wei-Hai-Wei not only the foresight which we now expect of them—the scientific knowledge and the power of adapting means to end—but the kind of soldier-like resolution and fidelity to duty which we have all been deceived into believing to be qualities exclusively pertaining to Europeans. Any navy in Europe would, we fancy, be proud to have executed that second rush of torpedo boats into the harbor of Wei-Hai-Wei, when the first one, though successful in blowing up one great ironclad, had suffered so terribly under the Chinese fire, when a storm was blowing outside, and when the cold ought to have frozen the very hearts of men bred in a gentler climate than ours. The English would have written things, we think, about that crew which went on, though a lieutenant and two men were frozen to death as they stood, and would have drawn auguries as to the continued vitality of the race from that exhibition of plucky endurance and of a fidelity to duty which withstood even death by torture.

If the Japanese navy, which we see to be well armed, well provisioned, and well commanded, is manned by men of that temper, Japan, we may depend upon it, is not only a considerable sea Power, but has in her a potentiality of being a very formidable one. She only needs more ships; and besides her capacity for building them for herself, she will shortly be in possession of a great sum of money with which to purchase more. Japan is, in fact, a Power which, if not absolutely first-class, is first-class in its power of action, and has arisen suddenly and, as it were, with a leap, at the extremity of Asia. It seems to us that our Ministers, we care not of which party, will be bound, as far-seeing statesmen, to provide against the possible hostility of the new Power. They are depending—we do not mean by "they" one party more than another—far too much upon the unity of Europe against the aggrandizement of Japan. We see no grounds for assuming that this unity will be durable.

We must rely in the end on our own strength, and our own strength may be severely tried by our want of a base near enough to be of use. It is all very well to say that Japan and Great Britain have no grounds of quarrel, but sea Powers are jealous of each other, and if the Mikado's Government resolves, as it will be tempted by the national elation to resolve, upon a policy of adventure and conquest, it is our property which offers most temptation and is most exposed. Hongkong, the entrepot for commerce with China; Singapore, which Lord Beaconsfield thought the key of Asia; Borneo, with its endless possibilities; even India or Australia themselves might be the subjects of attack. The Japanese in their elation hope to be the first Power in Asia, and to be that they must in some way prove to us that we have to content ourselves with the second position, which would mean a maritime war. How far are we ready for it? The Admiralty has strengthened the fleet very wisely, for we were wrong in thinking the movement premature; and the theory is, that we should in a great engagement destroy the Japanese fleet. But, suppose we did not; that the torpedo boats were too many for us; or, though nominally victorious, we were severely wounded, how then would the two Powers stand? The Japanese would retreat to their own arsenals to re-fit, or to Port Arthur, which they will not give up; and where should we go? We have coal in half a dozen known places, and one depot, Chagos, which everybody outside the Admiralty forgets; but where short of Bombay could we repair a battered iron-clad? Bombay is as far from North China as India from England, and entirely westward of all the positions we should be anxious to defend. We want, it seems to us, an arsenal of our own, in a harbor we can defend, 5000 miles more to the eastward than Bombay, and yet we have nothing of the kind, nothing even—though we write this with full submission to the experts—which would in an hour of emergency serve as a make-shift. \* \* \*

Without such a possession we remain exposed to chances, a defeat at sea or a drawn battle, which would involve our whole position in Asia, and which it would be insanity to risk.

We might have to put out our full strength to defeat an enemy of whom twelve months ago we never so much as thought, and whom, if we had thought of him at all, we should have placed on a level with Holland and with Greece. That illusion has passed away from official thought; and after the scene at Wei-Hai-Wei, it is time to ask whether it were not well that it should pass away also from official resolve; whether, to put the question in its concrete form, we do not need a Portsmouth in the far east?—London Spectator, Feb. 16, 1895.

Canada has a states right-religious question on her hands, which is so complicated in its bearing on party politics that the outcome will be exceedingly interesting.

According to an article copied from a prominent English paper, Great Britain sees in Japan a giant suddenly developed from a child. Unless, intoxicated with her sudden greatness, Japan strain her strength, she will henceforth be no feeble factor in any problem of the Pacific as well as of Asia.

Perhaps after the snub the Judiciary has given the Executive, in the matter of loyalty of employees, the constitutional principle of separation between these two grand divisions of the government will stand upon a surer footing than before. The Executive may suffer for want of unofficial counsel from the Judiciary in consequence, but the deprivation will be recompensed by a clearer definition of the boundary line. It is to be expected that the public will rejoice over this indication that henceforth the air of the temple of justice will not be impregnated with the dust of politics.

#### MR ASHFORD'S CASE.

V. V. Ashford has been pardoned on condition that he leave the country never to return. The reason is that if kept in prison he would soon die from malaria contracted before his committal. In the opinion of impartial minds the Military Commission convicted Mr. Ashford on testimony that would not be given a moment's respect by a jury. It is a pity that justice is not given as a ground of his release as well as humanity. Whatever he may have had to do with former plots has nothing to do with the late uprising. Many of his accusers and judges were his dutiful followers in the plot that started the revolutionary era in Hawaii. Besides, in all the intervening movements in which he is believed to have had a hand, his avowed motive was to promote the cardinal policy of 1893—annexation of Hawaii to the United States.

The schooner Wahlburg landed arms for the recent rebellion on the Diamond Head side of the island, and it was thought probable that the same locality would not be used a second time as a landing place. Hence the expedition to Waianae and vicinity. Specials left the city on Wednesday night for Waianae, but the two parties did not meet. Although several of the officers were seen the only answer that could be aduced was, "nowhere."

### UNKNOWN MEETING.

#### It Decides to Play Ball and Gets Three Recruits

The Unknown baseball club met yesterday evening at the Y. M. C. A. It was decided that the club would play in the coming season. George Clark resigned as captain and James Thompson of the defunct Athletics was elected in his place. In addition to Thompson the club was strengthened by the admission of Tom Pryce and Chris Willis. The battery of the Unknowns for the coming season will be George Woods, pitcher, and Tom Pryce, catcher. The Unknowns will go into steady practice on Monday afternoon. To-morrow afternoon they will give the Philadelphians a game on the League ground.

### COMMITTED FOR TRIAL.

#### Manslaughter for Killing His Father-in-Law.

Albert Hermanson, the man who is supposed to have caused the death of an elderly native near the corner of South and Queen streets, was committed for trial to the Circuit Court yesterday by Judge Perry.

It will be remembered Hermanson had a quarrel with his wife, who was the daughter of the old native. The father jumped in and tried to separate the couple, when Hermanson gave him a push. The old man fell on the ground and expired. Hermanson was arrested for manslaughter.

**FENCING SCHOOL JOINT.**

Another Japanese Institution Introduced in Honolulu.

A raid was made last night on a Japanese club house near the Eureka house, corner of Beretania and Manuka streets. A number of Japs who were engaged in giving fencing lessons were surprised. They had a complete outfit for fencing, including chest and head protectors. The entire gang was locked up, charged with common nuisance. The Japs have been giving these exhibitions for the past few weeks. No admission is charged, but once inside a victim is "bied" freely.

**NO WATER FOR THREE DAYS.**

Dry Times for People on the Slopes of Punchbowl.

P. McInerney, who lives on Punchbowl slope above the Queen's Hospital, says there has been no water at his place for three days. "There is a notice in your paper, he said, 'to get barrels, and boxes, and buckets, to collect water from 5 o'clock to 10, but what's the use, when there's no water?' They had collected a little rain water for drinking, but, if it was used for other purposes, it would not last three days.

#### SHAVE WITH GLASS.

Natives of Jamaica Use Broken Bottles for Razors.

The natives of Jamaica have no need to buy soap, for the woods abound with plants whose leaves and buds supply very well the place of that indispensable article, says Pearson's Weekly. Among these is the soap tree, so called, though it is more a bush than a tree. Its bulb, when rubbed on wet clothes, makes a beautiful lather, which smells much like common brown soap. The Jamaica negroes, some of them who are great dandies in their way, make a soap out of a coconut oil and home-made lye; and a fine soap it is, smooth and fragrant. This coconut oil soap is used for shaving. When a man wishes to shave he starts out with his coconut shell cup and his donkey-tail brush and bottle. It is never any trouble to find an empty bottle in Jamaica, even in the mountains. At least twenty generations of thirsty people have lived there, and thrown away the empty bottles. The man carries no mirror, because he has none to carry. Not one negro cabin in a dozen has a cheap looking glass. But nature supplies the mirror as well as the soap. The man goes to a convenient pool in the mountain stream, where the water is still, and there is his mirror. He breaks his bottle on a stone and picks out a good sharp piece. Then he lathers his face profusely and begins to scrape away with his piece of glass, which works almost as well as a sharp razor.

The men rarely cut themselves in this operation. "At first," says a writer, "I trembled for them, but afterward I tried the method for myself, and soon became almost an expert at it."

#### Send a Car Load of Flowers.

Ex Lieutenant Governor John C. Underwood, of Kentucky, visited Atlanta, Ga., lately for the purpose of arranging for floral tributes to be sent to Chicago on the occasion of the dedication of the confederate monument to be unveiled in Chicago on the 30th of May. The fund for the building of this monument was raised chiefly through the instrumentality of Colonel Underwood, a prominent ex confederate soldier of Kentucky. A car load of flowers will be sent from Savannah, and Atlanta, New Orleans and other southern cities will make contributions.

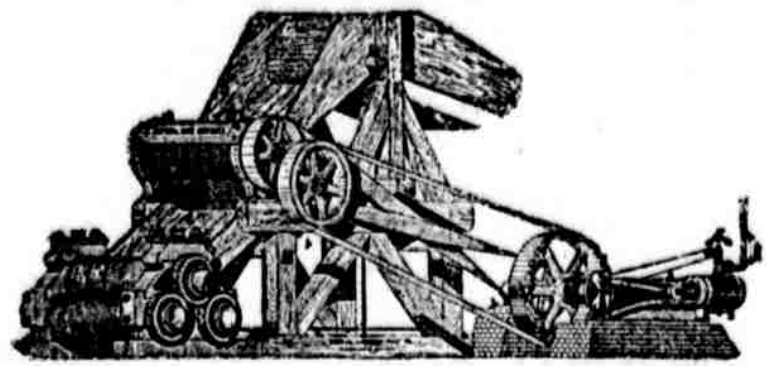

### FINES EIGHT RAPID SHOTS.

A Newly Invented Revolver Which Requires But One Pull.

What is claimed to be a most remarkable weapon—one which is as great an improvement over the ordinary revolver for military purposes as was the revolver over the old-time horse pistol—has been brought out by a Berlin firm. The construction of this latest development in firearm manufacture, says the Cincinnati Enquirer, is upon entirely new lines, so far as regards small arms. The cartridges, which are eight in number, are contained within a magazine in the grip. The action of the piece is so rapid that the eye cannot follow the movements, and the whole eight shots can be fired before the first shell ejected has struck the ground. The cartridges are brought to the front of the breech block, when the latter is moved to the rear in opening the breech, and closing the breech places the cartridge in its proper position in the firing chamber. The recoil at firing drives the barrel and breech mechanism to the rear, the three friction rolls of the rear link strike against the curved butt, and are forced downward, the middle-joint of the toggle is raised, and the breech block recedes, taking with it the empty shell by means of the extractor, until the ejector strikes the shell from below and throws it out, and the surplus momentum of the recoiling parts is taken up by the recoil spring, against which the friction rolls impinge.

As soon as the recoil, which is so eased as to be scarcely noticeable to the hand, is spent, the springs draw the toggle link forward and downward, the breech block pushes the upper cartridge into the barrel and the firing bolt is arrested and held cocked by the sear. The safety piece prevents accidents when the arm is not in action, otherwise the pistol is always cocked and ready for service. The pistol weighs 2½ pounds, with a 6-inch barrel, and 2-4-5 with a 7¼-inch barrel. The projectile weighs 85 grains and is projected by the cartridge at about 1200 feet per second.
