RAIDERS COME TO GRIEF.

**Search of the Yacht Spray and Two
 Houses at Pearl Harbor.**

Port Surveyor Sanders, deputy
 port surveyor Archi Gillilan, Custom
 officers Cook, Moseman,
 O'Brien, Eoss and Koali went
 down to Kalaiao on the 1:45 o'clock
 train yesterday (Sunday) afternoon.
 The train was stopped at the Kapu
 station at Kalaiao and the Port
 Surveyor and his assistants jumped
 out. Paddy, the owner of the yacht
 Spray, Hiel Kapu and another na-
 tive were at the time on the Spray
 cruising about in the Pearl harbor
 locks. Presently the yachting party
 saw Customs officer Koali come to
 the water's edge and wave a letter
 which he had in his hand. He had
 been sent to attract the attention
 of the men on the yacht.

The Spray was brought to a stand-
 still and Paddy rowed ashore in a
 small boat. When he landed Sand-
 ers, Gillilan, Cook and Koali got
 into the boat, saying it was their in-
 tention to board the Spray. The
 party were rowed out and the port
 surveyor read a warrant authorizing
 the officers to search the yacht and
 the Kapu premises. Mr. Kapu told
 the officers to proceed and search
 the yacht from stem to stern. This
 the port surveyor and his assistants
 proceeded to do. Nothing of a con-
 traband nature was discovered. The
 officers were sorely disappointed, as
 they expected to make a haul
 of opium.

After the yacht had been subject-
 ed to a thorough overhauling, a
 start was made for shore in the
 small boat. Hiel Kapu and the na-
 tive swayed the number of those in
 the cockpit shot to seven all told.
 Within fifty yards of shore the boat
 was swamped and each one struck
 out for shore. It being low tide at
 the time the water was up to the
 men's armpits. They looked like
 drowned rats when they reached
 dry land. Shaking some of the
 brims off their clothes the customs
 officers proceeded to the Kapu pre-
 mises near by. Mrs. Kapu advised
 the officers to make a thorough
 search and leave nothing unturned.
 As in the case of the search on the
 yacht the officers found nothing.

It was a discomfited crowd which
 left the Kapu station and traveled
 to another native house owned by
 Kakaioa, a little below the Kapu
 premises. The house was searched
 from top to bottom, but nothing be-
 yond the furnishings of a native
 home was found. There was a bar-
 rel of poi in the house to eat of
 which Kakaioa would gladly have
 constrained the officers, but they
 were too sorry a plight from their
 ducks' experience to remain for re-
 freshment. The officers passed the
 Kapu station on the train on their
 way to town at 4:20 o'clock. They
 had only had their trouble for their
 pains, and probably no pleasant
 feelings toward whomever had led
 them to undertake the bootless ex-
 pedition.

SECOND LANTERN SHOW.

Captain Cochrane and Mr. Hedemann Entertain a Large Crowd.

Captain Cochrane, U. S. M. C., had fully as large an audience at his second lecture for the benefit of the leper band, on Saturday night last, as that which was delighted on the previous Saturday evening.

Preliminary to the lecture entrancing music was played in turn by the band of the U. S. cruiser Palladepbia and the orchestra of the Hawaiian Government band. Before coming to "Glimpses of the Mediterranean," promised as the main feature of the exhibition, several splendid views of the new cruiser Columbia were thrown on the screen, also a view of the old-style warship Lancaster from a painting by Conti. It may be said here that Mr. Hedemann had the stereopticon working at its best throughout the evening, there being neither explosions nor eclipses.

Gibraltar, guarding the gate of the Mediterranean, loomed up grand and clear, and Nelson's flagship Victory was shown, eliciting applause. An excursion was taken to the famous Alhambra palace, and the coloring upon its highly ornate architecture was most vividly portrayed. In giving credit to Washington Irving, the great American master in literature, for projecting the restoration of the Alhambra, a view was shown of "Sunnyside," his home on the Hudson. Seville, with its grand cathedral, and other notable views of Spain were presented, and then reproductions of scenes in the finding of the New World by Columbus, concluding with the death of the discoverer, attended only by a priest, in a humble bed at Valladolid. At the deathbed scene the orchestra played an affecting chant.

A visit was paid to the far famed gambling resort of Monte Carlo, from which only residents of the province are excluded. Beautiful views of Palermo, Naples, Florence and Venice were shown, as well as Vesuvius—including the railroad to the summit and the interior sending up its thick clouds of smoke and noxious vapors. The British stronghold of Malta and some of the most picturesque views in Egypt were set forth with ample comment. One of the most striking scenes exhibited was the bombardment of Alexandria, to which no small interest was added by mention of the fact that the lecturer, Captain Cochrane, was with the United States marines that landed on that occasion to assist the British in poling the city and putting an end to the anarchy that followed the attack on the forts. The smoking ships' sides and the blazing city made an awe-inspiring picture on the screen. There was also a splendid series of views of the troops of both nations on shore, and again of the American marines passing in review before President Carnot at the Paris Exposition.

Scenes of the coronation of Alexander III. of Russia were repeated from the previous lecture, and several local views were given, including squads of the Citizens' Guard and the National Guard of Hawaii. Damascus, "the oldest city in the world," Cairo, "the ships of the desert," and the great pyramid, were thrown in, and the pictorial entertainment closed with a view of the large painting in the American League hall, comprising the American emblem and a likeness of President Dole.

Special mention is to be made of the musical accompaniments to the pictures. The American martial and patriotic airs in connection with the parades of the troops made a great hit. At an intermission members of the Young Hawaiians' Institute sang so acceptably as to be called up for a repetition. This young society having made its debut as a public entertainer may be counted upon in future to come often to the front. Prof. U. J. Ordway, Dr. Cradall of the Philadelphia and T. Hennessey with a banjo performance contributed to the musical feast, and were encored. Professor Berger's orchestra gave unmingled delight with renditions of national airs corresponding to the pictures of every country visited.

In taking leave of his auditors Captain Cochrane thanked them for the patronage that had so well fulfilled the charitable object of the entertainments, to the musicians who had assisted and to the press for its promotion of the success that had been obtained. It is said that more than \$200 was realized by the second exhibition.

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DIDN'T LIKE LONG SPEECHES.

Some of the Peculiarities of Prince Bismarck

Bismarck never aspired to the fame of a brilliant rhetorician, but even from principle sharply condemned parliamentary volubility. "It is not my business to hold speeches," he said in the Prussian chamber of deputies, on Feb. 3, 1866, a statement which he further explained when a murmur was heard from the left:

"You know, I am no speaker—a privilege which I gladly concede to the speaker of the house, Professor von Gneist. I have not the faculty of working on your feelings by word play, which often tends to obscure facts. I am to render my speeches simple and clear."

A second adverse criticism of oratorical toomfoolery was heard from him at the time of the siege of Paris: "The gift of oratory has wrought much evil in the parliamentary world. Too much time is wasted because all who believe they know something feel prompted to have their say, even when their remarks contain nothing new. Much is said for effect, to gain the applause of the public in order to show how smart we are. The time will come when these long, tedious disputes will be looked upon as a simple nuisance."

Ten years later, on April 29, 1881, he addressed a similar appeal to the reichstag, but preached so long that he became the subject of much witty ridicule on the part of the comic papers.

Bismarck's unrelenting combativeness and bitter sarcasm created many enemies for him, but, on the other hand, none understood better how to gain and keep staunch friends. He attained popularity and insured the intimate friendship of many statesmen of influence at the famous informal parliamentary receptions on Saturday nights, at the daily dinners and at the still more exclusive gatherings toward midnight which he kept up almost uninterruptedly from 1862 to 1890.

Began in true German fashion as informal convivialities with "May wine" and beer, they were gradually and perhaps intentionally transformed into a species of parliament. It might be likened to a legislative kitchen in which all bills were first well prepared, cooked and baked until in the reichstag the parliamentary dishes were spread thoroughly done and garnished. Here it was that the chancellor proved himself the efficient chef, where he could test the statutory concoctions before they were served to the public. Not a but chronic malcontents had to be confronted in the reichstag. To them Bismarck's vocabulary never included the word "fear." He was master of the situation.

At these parliamentary dinners Bismarck was an exemplary host. Immediately after the war of 1866 at one of these repasts there were gathered General von Moltke, the Bavarian General Roon, a number of prominent military men, Herr von Bennigsen, Herr von Torckenbeck and several parliamentary celebrities. It was and is Bismarck's custom to pass the cigars around to his guests with his own hand. Holding the open cigar box before General von Volke over against him, he said:

"Do you know, dear general, when last you took a cigar from my hand?"

"I cannot remember," answered the veteran.

"I shall never forget that moment," Bismarck replied. "It was at the battle of Koniggratz, during an hour of intense suspense—for me at least." Von Moltke looked up in surprise as if faintly trying to recall the incident.

"The battle was at a standstill," continued Bismarck. "We seemed to be hemmed in, unable to retreat or advance. One adjutant after another was dispatched whose return was awaited in vain. We could obtain no news of the approach of the crown prince."

Von Moltke looked knowingly as one recalls a time and place.

"I was ill at ease," explained the host. "My eyes sought your excellency. I finally espied you at a distance on horseback. To my astonishment, when I drew near I found you looking over the field with a perfectly composed mien, carefully smoking the little stub of a cigar."

"Well," said I consolingly to myself, "if Moltke can look on so placidly it cannot be half as bad with us as it appears." I rode up to you and presented my cigar case. It held but two cigars, a good one and a poor one. You carefully selected the good one and left the poor one for me. I could not have smoked the best cigar in the world just then, though I was happily reassured. Gentlemen, later in the evening I smoked that poor cigar, but no smoke ever tasted as good to me as this one after the battle."

JUDICIAL MATTERS

Some Interesting Probate Matters on File in the Clerk's Office.

A. D. Isaac and Cecil Brown have filed an answer to the ejectment suit of Kapukela (w.), alleging that the property described in the complaint was conveyed to Brown among other property, to secure the payment of certain money, and that there is still due to this defendant \$125 or more.

J. A. Magoon has been appointed special temporary administrator of the estate of the late Madame Morisseau, of France, to prosecute a certain claim against the estate of the late Dr. Troussseau of Honolulu.

Mr. Magoon has been appointed also as special temporary administrator of the estate of the late Stephanie Caillot of France for the same purpose as in the last case.

In the ejectment case of Kailioka Waiauahe (w) vs. Kahookaamoku (k), Kimalae Davis, Chas. Kaka, Keae (w.) and John Doe her husband, Kalou (w.) and C. R. Holokabiki her husband and Kukaiau Plantation Company, a corporation, Chas. Kabae, Kalou and Holokahiki make answer, by their attorney, W. C. Achi, claiming an undivided one-half interest in the premises from which plaintiffs seek to eject defendants.

Hawaiian Hardware Co., Ltd., vs. W. C. Peacock and others have stipulated for a hearing on the 25th inst.

M. A. Goncalves, guardian of the da Camara minors, has filed a motion for authority to expend principal to give Bella, who has been married, her share of the estate.

Albert V. Gear by his attorney, Paul Neumann, petitions that he be appointed administrator of the estate of A. P. Peterson, deceased intestate, who left an estate, partly encumbered by mortgage, valued at \$20,000. D. P. Peterson, father of deceased, signs a supplementary petition for the appointment of Mr. Gear. The heirs are the widow and one child living in Massachusetts.

J. Sylvester, guardian of the minor children of Patrick Gleason, has filed an inventory of the estate. The first item includes a piece of rice land and one of pasture land, about 37 acres together, and a house and lot at Waiahole leased to Ah Swan for \$450 a year. The second is 2 75-100 acres leased to Ah Swan for \$50 a year. The third, a fishery not leased since 1893. Fourth, mortgage on house and lot at Bereania and Pensacola streets for \$2500 at 6 percent per annum. Fifth, mortgage on house and lot at Diamond Head, belonging to Mrs. Emma E. When the men were being brought from Ewa cloth was put on their faces to keep the wind off. The cloth adhered to the flesh and it will be very difficult to remove. The other two Japs are getting along nicely. The friends of the injured men called at the hospital yesterday and wanted to take the men to their homes. This was refused.

This afternoon the men in hospital are reported as improving.

LAST DRILL ON SHORE.

Naval Battalion to Land To-morrow and Go Over the Wall.

The battalion of the U. S. cruiser Philadelphia will be lauded for drill at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning. The battalion will engage in riot drill during the march to the League baseball grounds. POISONOUS FOOD.

Severe Illness in a Household from Pickled Pigs' Feet.

Mr. and Mrs. George Harris and a young lady staying at their house were made severely ill yesterday evening by a dish forming part of their supper. This was pickled pigs' feet, bought at one of the meat shops in town. Mr. Harris attended the evening service of the Second Congregation of St. Andrew's Cathedral as usual, but felt nothing particular the matter with him until after returning home. Mrs. Harris was the first to feel ill, had symptoms being felt by her while sitting on the veranda of a neighbor's house. She went home and became severely ill, and shortly afterward Mr. Harris began to experience the same symptoms as his wife. Then a young lady staying with them was taken down.

Dr. McLennan was called and administered remedies that brought the patients out of danger. He was of opinion that both the meat and the vinegar in which it was preserved were at fault. The vinegar had probably come from a tin container and absorbed deleterious metallic properties. As for the pigs' feet, the doctor thought that the article had been bought by the retailer from a Chinese jobber, and that chloride of lime had been used to whiten the meat according to Chinese butcher's practice.

Mr. Harris, who was the most severely affected of any of the sufferers, was nevertheless able to attend to his business this morning, although not feeling altogether recovered from the effects of his illness.

ROUND THE HORN.

Fastest Passages on Record Were Made Long Ago

"I noticed in the Call," said Captain Theodore Niebaum, "a statement that the distance from San Francisco to New York by way of Cape Horn is 7827 miles. While the figures given are probably correct when used to designate the air line distance, they are unsatisfactory to the mind of one who does not know what a vast difference there is between an air line and the track of a steam or sailing vessel. Here are the fastest records ever made by sailing vessels between New York and this city around the Horn:

"From New York to San Francisco: 1852, Flying Cloud, 13,610 miles, 89 days 19 hours; 1854, same vessel, same route and distance, 89 days 19 hours; 1852, Swordfish, same route and distance, 90 days, to inside the Farallones, where the vessel was becalmed; 1853, Flying Fish, same route and distance, 92 days; 1860, Andrew Jackson, same route and distance, 90 days 12 hours.

"From San Francisco to New York: 1853, Contest, 13,610 miles, 79 days; 1853, Trade Wind, same route and distance, 75 days; 1870, Young America, same route, 13,580 miles, 80 days 20 hours.

"All these vessels were built with one object in view—speed—and carrying capacity was sacrificed to that end. Of course a modern skipper wouldn't have these vessels as a gift, but the money in shipping during pioneer days was made by the man who got there first."—S. F. Call.

No Japanese woman is ever in a position of authority at home. She is obedient, if a daughter, to her father; if a wife, to her husband; if a widow, to her eldest son. This is discouraging, but there is some compensation in the substantial respect and kindness with which Japanese women are almost always treated. As to her dress, it renders exercise difficult, as it does not conform to her body. It is, however, cool in summer, warm in winter and very beautiful. It is cheap and easy to make over. 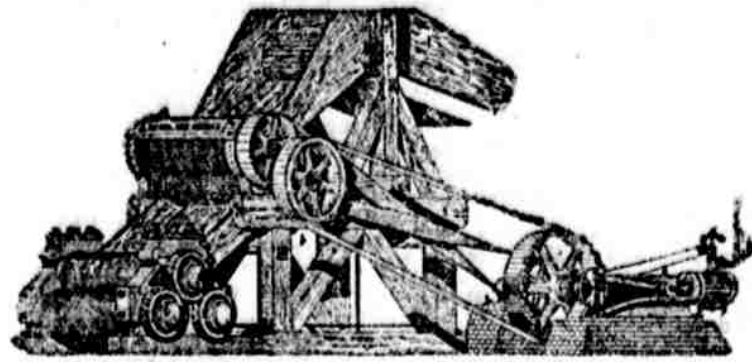

HYPNOTIC SINGING.

Most Disputed Incident of "Trilby" Supported by Fact

Among the many items apropos of Dr. Maurier's masterpiece, not the least interesting is the closeness with which he has stuck to the facts. One's first impression upon reading how Sveengal taught Trilby to sing—how he hypnotized her and commanded her to imitate the sounds he made on his flexible flageolet—was, no doubt, that this, at least, was a flight of poetic license. It seems, however, to be well within the possibilities.

A case which in all essentials covers it was reported as long ago as 1859 by James Braid, the first of the successors of Mesmer to approach the hypnotic sleep from the side of science rather than of charlatanism. After speaking of the heightened sense of hearing under mesmerism and of the increase of muscular precision, he says "feats of phonic imitation" are possible which are truly astounding.

"Many patients will thus repeat accurately what is spoken in any language, and they may be also able to sing correctly and simultaneously both words and music of song in any language which they had never heard before—i. e., they catch the words as well as music so instantaneously as to accompany the other singer as if both had been previously equally familiar with both words and music. In this manner a patient of mine who, when awake, knew not even the grammar or even her own language, and who had very little knowledge of music, was enabled to follow Miss Jenny Lind correctly in songs in different languages, giving both words and music so correctly and so simultaneously with Jenny Lind that two parties in the room could not for some time imagine that there were two voices, so perfectly did they accord, both in musical tone and vocal pronunciation of Swiss, German and Italian songs. She was also successful in accompanying Miss Lind in one of her extemporaneous effusions, which was a long and extremely difficult, elaborate chromatic exercise, which the celebrated cantatrice tried by way of taxing the powers of the somnambulist to the utmost. When awake the girl durst not even attempt to do anything of the sort; and after all, wonderful as it was, it was only phonic imitation, for she did not understand the meaning of a single word of the foreign language which he had uttered so correctly."

This is exactly Trilby's case (only more so), except that there is nothing to indicate in the report that "the patient" remembered Jenny Lind's songs and could reproduce them afterward; but the formation of a trance-state memory is a sufficiently frequent phenomenon. The quotation is from Braid's "Observations on Trance," page 43.—*New York Evening Post.*
