SERIOUS ACCIDENT.
A Hack Horse Breaks Its Neck By
Falling Over Bricks.
A horse driven to a hack was
fatally injured about 9 o'clock yester-
day evening on King street near
McIntyre's corner and had to be
shot later by humane officer Green.
The horse belonged to Gus Schu-
mann. Joe Kalana was driver of the
hack. He was coming in from Walki
with the hack when the horse ran
into a pile of bricks in front of
Williams' furniture store. The back
capitulated and the horse fell, striking
its head on the ground, and lay
motionless. When the horse was
examined it was found to have its
neck broken. Mr. Green, agent of the
Humane Society, was called and the
horse was shot.
There were no danger lights on
the pile when the accident hap-
pened. The driver stated that the
bright light of the electric light
suspended in the center of the street
dazzled his eyes and he did not see
the pile of bricks. The animal was
valued at \$150. After the accident
which resulted in the loss of a valu-
able horse two lights were hung out.
"It's a clear case of damages," said a
well known lawyer.

An Ancient Boiler.
A tubular boiler 1800 years old
has been discovered at Pompeii. It
is made of sheet metal, probably
copper, in the shape of a large
siphon or two handled jar, with a
hollow space running half way up
the center of the jar. In this space
was placed a cylindrical fire-box
resting on five firebars, which are
tubes three-quarters of an inch in
diameter, connecting with the water
space. The fuel seems to have been
charcoal.

WIFE DESERTION

A New Crime Created by the Illinois Legislature.

The Illinois Legislature created a new crime—wife desertion. Formerly in that State, as elsewhere, a man could desert his family without any danger of imprisonment. He might be compelled to give up some money to provide for wife and children, but he was guilty of no crime, and was safe from arrest; he is no longer. Desertion of his family has been made a felony, punishable with imprisonment at hard labor in the penitentiary, and not only has the law been passed, but several prosecutions under it have begun in the Chicago justice courts. No one will complain of this. The abandonment of their families by men who forget honor and obligation has become an abuse so widespread as to call for the severest punishment. Men marry young women and desert them after the charm of the first intimacy has worn off; and this they have been able to do hitherto with perfect impunity. It is no longer possible in Illinois. The law may not result in restoring husbands to forsaken wives or in reviving lost love, but it will at least deter adventurers marrying young women without first considering the legal aspect of the matter.—*Humane Journal.*

DODGING A METEOR.

The Schooner Premier Was Fortunate

The lumber schooner Premier, which arrived yesterday from Gray's Harbor, had a narrow escape on her first night out from being crushed by a falling meteor.

The schooner sailed for this city on the 1st inst. and it was at 2 o'clock on the following morning that the missile from the heavens put in an appearance. According to the story told by those who were on deck at the time the meteor came from the west and traveled due east and downward, describing a semi-circle as it swept toward the ocean. It seemed to grow larger in size as it approached and was apparently bearing down directly upon the Premier. The appearance of the phenomenon was accompanied by a loud and gradually increasing noise, not unlike the whistling of a shell hurled from a mortar. The crew was badly frightened and had cause for thanksgiving when the ball of fire passed over the stern of the vessel and plunged into the sea less than a thousand yards distant from them. An explosion took place, which was like a great clap of thunder when the meteor struck the water, and then all became dark.

Mayor Sutro of San Francisco, after inspecting the Spring Valley waterworks that supply that city with the essential element, said he would not bathe in the water, let alone drink it. It flows through hog wallows and cow yards. Nuuanu Valley water is no better a good part of the year, for want of protection and filtration.

Captain Palmer does not worry the Advertiser any this morning, and the result is that the morning organ is comparatively free from the puerilities that have constituted its principal features for some days past. The new morning paper that our contemporaries report is to be established shortly will pray that Captain Palmer may not depart from our coasts. When the sheen of his binnacle lamps appears on the port bow, the Advertiser seems to forget all the rules of the road and the law of collisions.

A steamer that cannot make as good time as a sailing vessel is not likely to meet with much success even as a cargo boat. Maui has no reason to feel elated over its direct steam communication with San Francisco. The steamer Kahului arrived in port to day, 17 days from the Coast via Kahului. On her last voyage from here she was 15 days making the 2100 miles, and the brigantine W. G. Irwin arrived there the same day, having left this port about the same hour with the Kahului. On her return voyage the Irwin arrived here about a week ago, 17 days out.

It used to be proverbial that the ill-fated steamer Pele held an irrefragable record for being the slowest boat that was ever built. Now the Kahului becomes the sole legatee of the Pele in that regard. She was telephoned this morning before many good citizens were out of bed, but she only arrived in port after a greater number of people had gone hungry for luncheon waiting for news that had been brought by mails a fortnight old. Hitch the old thing up alongside of the famous Kaimiloa, as a landmark for mariners after they have weathered the placid channel by Williamsville.

There is much comment heard about town upon the absence of any demonstration over the birthday of President Dole. According to an intimation in the Advertiser this morning, the following program had been arranged: "During the early part of the morning the Hawaiian band will serenade the President at his Emma street home. At noon a salute will be fired, and a public reception held in the Executive building, at which the wives of the Cabinet officers will assist, followed by an 'at home' during the afternoon at the President's residence." The band serenaded the President all right, but all the rest of the arrangement has been honored in the breach rather than in the observance. No diplomatic or consular flags are displayed, the United States cruiser Philadelphia has made no

sign, and even the Cabinet has not given any public manifestation that it esteems this day above any other in the calendar. Why is this thus? Perhaps it is a borrowing from "Jeffersonian simplicity," but then why should the morning Government organ have made such an announcement as that quoted above? An officer of the Philadelphia, on being asked why that ship did not fire a salute to the President of "a friendly power," answered that "such a thing was never done. He was told that American ships used to salute the head of the nation under the monarchy, but he only answered with a bewildered shake of the head. The BULLETIN is sorry that the advertised functions have not been carried out, because it believes that there is more than democratic philosophy dreams of in the paying of due and conventional respect to the head of the nation, no matter under what title he governs.

OVER THE WALL.

The Philadelphia's Battalion Breaks Its Record in the Tactics

The Philadelphia battalion was landed, probably for the last time, for shore drill at 8 o'clock this morning. Headed by the flagship band the battalion marched to the League baseball grounds, and after being subjected to the different military tactics the men were marched to the Kawaiahae Church on King street.

The men were then sent over the seven-foot wall. On the second trial they scaled the wall from the street side in twenty-seven seconds. On the return the last man cleared the parapet in just twenty-five seconds. Loud applause greeted the boys in blue as they came over the wall.

The best time was made by the second company of bluejackets. This squad disappeared over the wall in fourteen seconds. In the final trial the time made was twenty-three seconds. When the men came over the wall a bluejacket named Johnson turned a complete back somersault from the top of the wall to the ground below. The feat was loudly applauded. The time was the best made by the Philadelphia.

After the lowering of the record the battalion marched back to the boat landing. On the way riot drill was executed in neat style.

But with the new pumping station almost completed the complaints against the Water Works Department will soon be a thing in forgotten history. It looks just now as though the government is doing everything in its power to alleviate the misery and reduce the annoyance which naturally ensues through lack of sufficient water with which to make a cocktail.

Here are some figures over which you may ponder if you are interested in wire fences: The European wire which we carry in stock has been tested at the Iron Works and shows a tensile strength of 2760 pounds. The galvanizing passed through all the tests it is possible to put it and shows that it is as near perfect as it is possible to make it. ARRIVAL OF THE KAHULUI.

She Makes Especially Slow Time From a Cracked Shaft.

The S. S. Kahului, Captain Tyson, arrived this afternoon, 17 days from San Francisco via Kahului. The Kahului left the Golden Gate on April 6, experiencing variable weather. Two days before reaching Kahului the propeller shaft cracked. Port was reached safely and on examination being made it was found the shaft was cracked all round. The crack was an old one and it seems the strain had been too heavy for it to withstand. One hundred and fifty tons of sugar was taken in after discharging freight at Kahului.

It was decided by Captain Tyson to come to Honolulu to make arrangements with the agents, H. Hackfeld & Co., for repairing the shaft. Consequently at 7 o'clock yesterday evening the Kahului left Kahului and steamed to Honolulu, making only forty revolutions a minute throughout the passage. That is why the steamer was so slow coming in after being sighted this morning.

Chief Engineer Hugh McMillan states that it had not been decided whether to have the repairs done here or not. If no satisfactory arrangements can be made here an order will probably be sent to San Francisco for a new shaft.

Chief Engineer Stoddart, of the Spreckelsville plantation, was a passenger by the Kahului from Kahului. Mr. Stoddart just came down on a pleasure trip. He is registered at the Arlington.

GREAT STEAMSHIP LINES.

The Peninsular and Oriental Company No Longer Heads the List.

The Norddeutscher Lloyd is the largest steamship company in the world, its vessels measuring 15,000 tons more than the Peninsular and Oriental, which comes next. It began in 1855 by running three small steamers between Bremen and England, and three years later opened a line to New York. It now has twenty-two lines, including two to South America, five to Eastern Asia and one to Australia. It has eighty-three steamers, with a total of 242,367 tons.

Of the other great companies the Peninsular and Oriental steamers measure 227,000 tons; the Navigazione Generale Italiana, 191,037; the Messageries Maritimes, 174,900; the Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, 173,800; the Hamburg-American, 166,586; the Austrian Lloyd, 137,822; the Anchor line, 136,512; the Allan line, 127,861; the Cunard line, 110,759, and the White Star line, 96,223. These figures are for 1893.—New York Sun.

PAPER HOSIERY.

Socks, Stockings and Gloves Are the Latest Novelty

Paper gloves and hosiery are named as among the very latest novelties. Stockings which shall sell at 3 cents a pair are proposed. In fact, the experiment of making paper stockings has been going on for several months, and the party engaged therein believes that paper mittens or gloves would possess advantages in their season. The goods are light and airy and very comfortable in summer.

When finished and dyed their appearance is similar to ordinary fabric goods. The knitting is from paper yarns. The paper yarns are made pretty much after the plan of making common paper twines, except that the former are put through certain special processes. The principle is that of making a sort of nap on the yarn. This is done automatically. Ordinary paper twine or yarn is too smooth, but a good gigning up gives the yarn a nap and this imparts softness. After the knitting has been done the goods are placed in a sizing bath made from potato starch and tallow, which imparts solidity and durability to the texture.

With paper passenger car wheels, paper water pails, why not paper socks and stockings?—The Gleaner.

BIMETALLISM ABROAD.

The Cause Gains Converts in the British Bankers' Institute.

The currency debate at the Bankers' Institute on Thursday, says a late London dispatch, disclosed the fact that there had been a very considerable growth of bimetalism in the institute. Hitherto bimetalism has been frowned upon, and bimetallists, too, have been well nigh excluded from the institute. For the moment the disclosure is not discussed very much in the newspapers, but it cannot remain suppressed a great while longer.

The Economist, referring to the decision of the Finance Committee of the United States Senate in regard to arrangements for appointing delegates to an international monetary conference, holds that committee's action as glaringly premature. The convening of such a conference, the paper says, is problematical, and it is doubtful whether President Cleveland will think it judicious to act upon the committee's resolution until the proposal for a conference assumes something like definite shape.

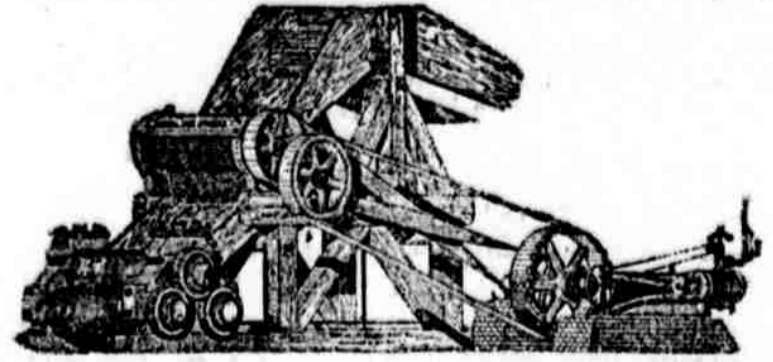

Acetylene, the most powerful illuminant of the hydro-carbons, can now be produced on a commercial scale, says Professor Lewes in a paper read before the Society of Arts. It is a colorless gas, with an intensely penetrating smell resembling garlic, so that the smallest leakage would be quickly detected. Five cubic feet of the gas will give a light equal to 240 candles for an hour.

It is made by mixing forty parts by weight of finely ground chalk or lime with twenty-four parts by weight of any form of powdered carbon in an electric furnace and adding water; the product is lime and chalcide carbide, a pound of which will yield 53 cubic feet of acetylene. The carbide can be made for \$20 a ton; the gas would cost about \$1.60 a thousand feet, but its illuminating power would make its cost equal to coal gas at 12 cents a thousand.—New York Sun.

WHY PHYSICIANS USE AN "R."

The Formula Is a Survival From the Middle Ages.

A woman of an investigating turn of mind started out the other day to discover why physicians begin their prescriptions with the letter "R." Well, she found out, but it took time and caused her some trouble. It seems that during the middle ages, when astrology was in fashion, a character very much like our "R" was the sign of Jupiter, the preserver of health. The physicians, being then equally devoted to the science of medicine and astrology, invariably began their prescriptions with the following words: "In the name of Jupiter take the following doses in the order set down hereinafter." In the course of time this formula was abbreviated, until at present only the letter "R" remains to teach us that the medical art was once associated with the science of the stars.—Boston Traveller.
